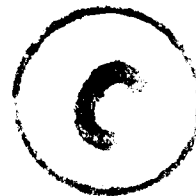
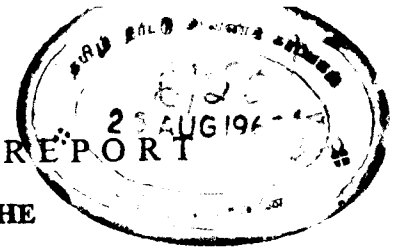

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1963

Staff

The year under report was notable for a number of changes which took place in the administrative sphere of the Department. The services of Sarvashri V. C. Joshi and S. K. Saxena, Assistant Directors of Archives, were placed at the disposal of the Institute of Public Administration, New Delhi, and the Gazetteers Unit, Ministry of Education, respectively. Shri D. L. Kaka, Archivist, was promoted on 28 August 1963 to officiate in one of the vacancies thus caused. On the recommendation of the Union Public Service Commission Shri H. R. Ramachandran was appointed as Librarian on 16 January 1963, and Sarvashri Satya Pal and N. H. Kulkarnee, Assistant Archivists (Grade I), were appointed as Archivists with effect from 2 February 1963 and 16 August 1963, respectively.

Dr. Dayal Dass, Archivist, and Shri N. R. R. Chari, Microphotographer, rejoined the Department after completing in France a course of training in archive-keeping and microfilming, respectively. Sarvashri N. H. Kulkarnee, Archivist, S. N. Sharma, Assistant Archivist (Grade I), and B. D. Saxena, Assistant Archivist (Grade II), went to France for similar training at the Archives Nationales, Paris.

For administrative reasons one post in Class I, one post in Class II, 16 posts in Class III and 12 posts in Class IV services had to be kept unfilled. The total strength of the establishment was 381 at the close of the year.

Accessions

Public Records.—As in other years, the record-retirement programme of the Department continued to be impeded by chronic shortage of space. In the circumstances only such records had to be welcomed as filled up gaps in the existing series or could no longer be accommodated by the owning agencies. Thus the fresh accruals consisted of the records received from the Ministry of Home Affairs and a few other agencies of the Union Government, altogether comprising 1,232 files, 641 index volumes, 139 sheets of maps, and 167 authenticated copies of bills passed by the various state legislatures and assented to by the President of India. (For details see Appendix D).

Private Papers and Manuscripts.—The acquisition of private collections of historical value was vigorously pursued. Among the collections acquired during the year particular mention may be made of the personal correspondence and other papers of G. S. Khaparde, a close associate of Lokamanya Tilak. Loaned on permanent basis by his son Prof. B. G. Khaparde, the collection comprises his letters to and from well-known politicians like Tilak, Motilal Nehru, Motilal Ghosh, V. D. Savarkar, Bipin Chandra Pal, Annie Besant, James Ramsay MacDonald and James Keir Hardie. The papers form a valuable source for the study of the Indian Home Rule League. Besides letters, the collection includes a detailed diary covering 40 years, which would be useful for the political as well as social history of contemporary India.



Another collection of private papers of great importance, acquired during the year, is that of the eminent Indian leader Gopal Krishna Gokhale, which was deposited with the Department by the Servants of India Society, Poona. Besides Gokhale's own correspondence with a host of distinguished contemporaries, both British and Indian, particularly with William Wedderburn, the collection includes letters written by a number of such illustrious personages as Surendranath Banerji, Dadabhai Naoroji, Rabindranath Tagore, Sarojini Naidu, Henry Cotton, Sydney Webb, Pethick-Lawrence, William Wedderburn, Dinshaw E. Wacha, A. O. Hume, to give only a few names. The collection also includes a mass of papers which throw a flood of light on some of the important problems connected with the history of Modern India, e.g., Indian emigration to South Africa, reforms introduced by Minto and Morley, elementary education, etc.

Additions to the Department's collection of papers relating to Mahatma Gandhi included three files in Gujarati throwing light on Gandhiji's life, transferred by the Record Office at Porbandar, and some original documents relating to his school days, received from the Gandhi Smarak Sangrahalaya, New Delhi. Other private papers acquired during the year were some more letters of Dr. N. B. Khare.

Besides the private papers mentioned above, four rare manuscripts, three in Persian and one in English, were purchased by the Department on the recommendation of the Historical Documents Purchase Committee. One of these manuscripts was "Shigarfnama" in which its author I'tsam-aulah, who accompanied Capt. Swinton as his Persian *munshi* to England in 1765, gives an interesting account of European life from the Indian point of view. Another one giving a topographical account of the principal buildings of Delhi is entitled "Sairul-Manazil", and the third one bearing the title "Kitab-i-Falahat" is a work on agriculture. The manuscript in English, "Field Army Orders", is a collection of 132 orders issued by Major General Sir Ewen Baillie from his headquarters at Kanpur to his field army between the years 1807 and 1810.

Microfilm Collection.—Valuable additions were made to the microfilm collection of the Department. 31 rolls covering the papers of Lord Dalhousie were received from the Scottish Record Office, Edinburgh. Belonging to the period of his Governor-Generalship of India (1848-56) the papers contain, besides his minutes, his correspondence with the Court of Directors and the Board of Control.

The Department obtained from the Commonwealth Relations Office, London, microfilm copies of the papers of certain Secretaries of State for India and Viceroys of India. These comprised among other items: (i) 18 rolls of Salisbury papers covering the period 1874-78 when Lord Salisbury was Secretary of State for India, and containing his correspondence with Lord Lytton and other British officials in India; (ii) 15 rolls of the papers of the Duke of Argyll, Secretary of State for India (1868-74), including the letters that passed between him and the Viceroys Lord Mayo (1869-72) and Lord Northbrooke (1872-76), respectively; (iii) 2 rolls of the papers of Viscount Morley, Secretary of State for India (1905-10), containing letters from Lord Minto and Governors of Bombay and Madras on the turbulent political situation in India and throwing light on the Curzon-Kitchener controversy and the Indian revolutionary movements in

Paris. Among the host of subjects dealt with mention may be made of the Central Asian policy of the British Government in India, Afghan affairs, frontier defences, ruling chiefs, public works, decentralization of Indian finance, etc.; (iv) 14 rolls of the papers of Sir John Lawrence, Viceroy of India (1864-69), of particular interest among them being those relating to his Afghan policy; and (v) 14 rolls of Curzon papers covering the period of Lord Curzon's Viceroyalty (1899-1905).

Besides the above, the Department prepared and added to its collection a positive microfilm copy of Lansdowne Papers from the negative copy in 9 rolls available in the University of Delhi. The correspondence covering Lord Lansdowne's Viceroyalty (1888-94) throws interesting side-light on problems bearing on the Indian frontiers, Indian States, Government of India Act of 1892, etc.

Books and Periodicals.—The Departmental Library added 1,078 books and 275 bound volumes of periodicals to its shelves through purchase, presentation and exchange. These include a number of old volumes of Gazettes received from the Central Secretariat Library and the Ministry of Food and Agriculture and some valuable out-of-print publications donated by the India International Centre. Noteworthy among the rare publications acquired are: (i) *Journey from India to England through Persia, Georgia, Russia, Poland and Prussia in the year 1817* by J. Johnson, published in 1818; (ii) *Journal of Tour Through Part of the Snowy Range of the Himala Mountains and to the Sources of the Rivers* by James Baillie Fraser, 1820; (iii) *Speeches of Lord Brougham*, Vols. I-IV, 1838; (iv) *Narrative of the late Victorious Campaign in Afghanistan under General Pollock* by Lt. Greenwood, 1844; (v) *Himalayan Journals; or Notes of a Naturalist in Bengal, the Sikkim and Nepal Himalayas, the Khasia Mountains, &c.* by J. D. Hooker, 1854; and (vi) *Mutinies in Rajpootana* by I. Prichard, 1860.

Checking and Arrangement

Besides checking and arranging the new accessions, re-arrangement of the records already in the custody of the Department, in their original order, was continued. 11,000 bundles and 700 volumes of records belonging to the Departments of Industries, Education, Defence, Revenue and Military Finance, the Directorate General of Health Services and the Railway Board, etc. were re-arranged during the year under report. (For details see Appendix II).

The work of sorting out the Parliamentary Papers in the Departmental Library and arranging them chronologically neared completion.

Compilation of Reference Aids

Steady progress was maintained in preparing reference media in regard to the records in the custody of the Department. While abstract lists were prepared of the records of the Departments of Commerce and Industry, Railways, Education, Health and Lands, and Finance, detailed lists were prepared of 6,375 files of the Reforms Office, 300 files of the

Foreign Department (Internal Series) and 700 files of the Central Treasuries in Hyderabad and Rajputana. Also subject-lists were prepared of the Survey of India records (village plans) and of the records of the Home Department (Special Branch) for the period 1927-30.

Speedy progress was made in listing records in microfilm received from foreign repositories. Check-lists were prepared of Morley, Curzon and Lawrence papers, and listing of the Marathi Mission Papers of the American Board of Foreign Missions, received from Harvard University, Massachusetts, and of the papers of Lt. Col. Duncan Campbell received from the H. M. General Register House, Edinburgh, was completed. Similarly lists of microfilm copies of miscellaneous records acquired from Bodleian Library, Oxford, John Rylands Library, Manchester, National Library of Scotland, Edinburgh, Guildhall Library, London, and Library of Congress, Washington, were prepared.

The private papers of Gopal Krishna Gokhale received from the Servants of India Society were paginated and listed.

Press-listing of Secret Department Proceedings continued apace. Lists for the years 1781 and 1782 were completed, and of those for the period 1783-85 made further progress. Press-lists were also prepared of the Persian Correspondence available among the Foreign Department Proceedings for the period 1804-07. Hand-listing of the same Correspondence pertaining to the period 1819-22 was completed. Listing of the seals found among the Original Persian Letters Received was also completed. Besides this, lists were prepared of maps in foreign languages available in the Survey of India collection and of those meant for official use only.

Consolidation of index slips of the *Alqab-nama* which comprises the names and titles of Indian and foreign chiefs and rulers, was taken up and satisfactory progress made therein. Further progress was made in compiling Index to the Foreign and Political Department Records, Vol. II, covering the years 1781-83, and editing of half of the volume was completed. The work of preparing index cards of printed maps in the custody of the Department was continued.

Appraisal

The project launched by the Department of assisting various Ministries in appraising their non-current records, in sorting out those worthy of permanent retention in the National Archives, and in drawing up schedules of unimportant papers with a view to their eventual destruction, made good progress. 6,537 files belonging to the Ministry of Home Affairs, 1,449 files of the Ministry of Finance and 439 files of the Ministry of Food and Agriculture were examined in their respective record rooms, and among them only 1,864 files were found to be of enduring value. From among the records already transferred to the Department, 6,347 files of the Punjab States Agency were similarly evaluated and out of these 254 files were found worthy of permanent retention. Surplus material among the holdings of the Departmental Library, appraised earlier, was delivered to the universities and research institutions which had agreed to acquire the same.

Research and Reference Service

During the year under report there was a marked increase in the number of scholars who availed themselves of the facilities offered by the Department for consulting records and other materials in its custody. 190 scholars made use of them as against 170 last year. Quite a few of them were from foreign countries like Australia, Germany, U.S.A., U.S.S.R., and United Kingdom. As in the past years, the Research Room was kept open for them from 9 A.M. to 8 P.M. on week days and 10 A.M. to 5 P.M. on Sundays and second Saturdays. The subjects of their research covered a wide range touching almost all aspects of modern Indian history. (For details please see Appendix III).

The *bona fide* research scholars as well as officials of the Government and semi-Government agencies, who wanted to consult the records, were provided with research aids and requisite guidance, and were helped in tracing out the papers required by them. Requisitions from the scholars for 55,587 files, 7,016 volumes and 541 maps and those from the various Ministries and other Government agencies for 9,290 files were attended to. 22,524 exposures of negative microfilm, 732.7 metres of positive microfilm, 381 photostat copies and 30 enlargement prints were prepared for various public and private institutions and individuals. Besides non-current records, the scholars were supplied papers from the Gopal Krishna Gokhale collection recently acquired by the Department, from the collection of Gandhiji's papers, and from some other private collections available in the Department. 42 manuscripts in Oriental languages and 500 reels of microfilm were also supplied to them for consultation in connection with their research work.

The Departmental Library attended to nearly 64,000 requisitions for books, periodicals, Parliamentary Papers and other printed materials from research scholars, members of staff and some Government and semi-Government agencies. 48,810 files, 12,227 volumes, 1,805 maps and 53,550 books and other materials which were received back from them were restored to their proper places. Reminders were sent to those against whom such materials were outstanding for a long time.

The two Research Fellows working under the National Archives of India Fellowship Scheme, who were granted extension of their term, completed their work during the year.

Apart from rendering reference service to those who personally visited the Department, a number of enquiries from public and private individuals and institutions on various subjects involving detailed search among manuscript, printed and photographic materials, were attended to. Among such enquiries may be mentioned those relating to : order of precedence among former princely states at formal functions, designs of post office buildings 100 years ago, Gandhiji's letters to C.F. Andrews, export of cotton from India to the U.K. (1862-72), Indian career of the French adventurer Francois Daniel du Jardy (1749-91), important civil and military persons connected with the Survey of India in the 20th century, management of Jagannath Temple at Puri, speeches of Sir C.P. Sivaswami Aiyar in Central and Madras legislative bodies, and the history of Saiyid Jamalud-Din, the Iranian revolutionary. (For further details please see Appendix IV).

Preservation and Photoduplication

Considerable difficulty was experienced in obtaining certain repair materials from abroad owing to the very limited amount of foreign exchange made available to the Department for this purpose during the year under review. However, the normal work of air-cleaning, fumigation, deacidification and repair of records, books and other materials continued. 4,500 books and 90 map volumes were air-cleaned and an equal number of books and map volumes fumigated in addition to the fumigation of 213 bundles of records and 2,500 other volumes. 2,84,629 sheets were deacidified and cleared of old patches of paste and other repair materials, wherever necessary. 33,416 sheets were flattened; 4,946 sheets repaired with handmade paper and 25,015 sheets with tissue paper or cellulose acetate foil. The quantity of chiffon being very limited, its use was restricted to the barest minimum and only 88 sheets were repaired with it. 3,09,174 sheets were laminated and 1,06,535 sheets guarded. 6,670 Original Consultations were docketed and 1,412 volumes and 346 books bound. Leather preservative dressing was applied to 25,157 books and volumes and gold-lettering done on 570 of them. 386 maps were mounted besides repairing 309 maps with handmade paper or cellulose acetate foil, 15 with tissue paper and 4 with chiffon. Also 95 palm leaves were repaired, 41 of them with tissue paper.

Further progress was made in the programme of microfilming the series 'Report on Native Newspapers'. 18 volumes relating to Bengal (1916-29), 28 volumes to Bombay (1918-32), 24 volumes to the North-West Provinces (1891-1911), 8 volumes to East Bengal and Assam (1907-11), and 31 volumes concerning Central Provinces, Central India, Burma and Ajmer-Merwara (1896-1927), altogether running into 24,000 exposures and covering twice that number of pages, were microfilmed. Microfilm copies were also prepared of the private papers of Gopal Krishna Gokhale in the custody of the Department, and of some volumes of the daily *Independent* (1919-21), the bi-weekly *Panjabee* (1904-09) and the weekly *Organiser* (1947-56), the total approximate number of exposures in this connection being 26,000.

Research Laboratory

Experiments in regard to the effects of various commercial insecticides used by many record-repositories in the country, as also those relating to the durability and permanence of paper, which were started in the Research Laboratory of the Department a few years ago, were concluded during the year under review. A final report on the subject, entitled 'Effect of Clenofix and other Common Insecticides on the Durability of Paper', incorporating the conclusions arrived at, was prepared and a copy of it sent to the ICOM Committee on Laboratories for the Museums, International Centre for the Preservation of Cultural Property, Rome, for the consideration of the Committee.

Owing to foreign exchange difficulties, search for suitable indigenous substitutes for imported repair materials was continued. Samples of long cloth, tissue paper, handmade paper, maida, cellulose acetate foil and other repair materials were tested in the Departmental Laboratory with a view to assessing their suitability for repair work. The Handmade Paper Research Institute, Poona, continued its efforts to produce tissue paper which would conform to the specifications prescribed by the Department.

Technical Service

In spite of the cut in the import of repair materials the Department continued to render technical assistance to institutions and individuals who did not have facilities for the repair and rehabilitation of their manuscripts and documents. Noteworthy among such outside agencies and persons who availed themselves of this service are : All India Kashiraj Trust, Varanasi; Geodetic Survey & Research, Survey of India, Dehra Dun; and Asiatic Society, Calcutta. Items which were renovated for these agencies by lamination and other processes of repair included an old manuscript copy of 'Balmiki Ramayan' in four parts, a manuscript inscribed on palm leaves, 13 sheets of old *farmans* and 9 manuscripts in Arabic, Persian and Urdu. Documents in private possession relating to Gandhiji's life and work also continued to receive free repair service. Thus three documents relating to Gandhiji's career at the bar were laminated for the High Court of Bombay and his autograph letter to Prof. Indra was repaired for Shri P. G. Deshpande.

Besides rehabilitation of documents, the Department helped outside agencies in other matters relating to the preservation of books and records. The library of the Directorate of Economics and Statistics, Ministry of Food and Agriculture, was fumigated. Fumigation of books was also carried out at the National Library, Calcutta whose Chinese collection comprising more than 15 thousand volumes was infested with white ants. The microfilm reader of the National Buildings Organisation, New Delhi, was re-assembled; and the Jamia Millia Islamia, Delhi had its microfilm and microcard readers assembled and installed with the help of the Department.

Photoduplication service was rendered to 120 outside agencies and individuals, including, among others, Dr. Robert I. Crane of the Duke University, North Carolina, Dr. M. Krasa, Oriental Institute, Prague; Mr. Peter Van Den Dungen, Australian National University, Canberra; Mr. Michael E. Marmura, Toronto University, Canada; Jewish National Library, Israel; South Asia Institute, Heidelberg University, Germany; Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Poona; and Nagari Pracharini Sabha, Varanasi. The mobile microfilming unit of the Department went to Kathmandu where about 300 rare and precious manuscripts belonging to the Bir Library were microfilmed under a scheme sponsored by the India Aid Mission to Nepal. The unit also visited Bikaner in response to a request from the Director of Archives, Government of Rajasthan, for microfilming some historical documents in the custody of the State Archives.

The repairing, binding and microfilming of rare and valuable manuscripts belonging to the Raza Library, Rampur, were continued and about 225 manuscripts were microfilmed during the year under report.

Advisory Work and Inspection

Several libraries, record-repositories, research institutes and documentation centres in the country as well as abroad sought the technical advice of the Department on problems connected with the preservation and rehabilitation of records and books. They were furnished with detailed information regarding hand lamination and other repair methods, fumigants and insecticides, film used in microfilming, techniques of testing paper, binding of books, etc. Among the institutions to which this information

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was supplied mention may be made of the Central Archives of Fiji, Suva; Public Record Office, Selangore, Malaysia; Maharashtra Association for the Cultivation of Science, Poona; All-India Braja Sahitya Mandala, Mathura; I.V.K. Rajwade Samshodhan Mandal, Dhulia; Indian National Scientific Documentation Centre, New Delhi; the State Archives of Kerala, Madras, U.P. and Orissa; and the Universities of Mysore and Jammu and Kashmir.

Besides the above, the officers of the Department visited certain record-creating agencies and manuscript-repositories located in Delhi and gave on-the-spot advice regarding the storage and preservation of their holdings. The agencies so visited were the National Council of Educational Research and Training, Punjab National Bank, Institute of Indology, and the offices of the Chief Election Commissioner and the Union Public Service Commission.

Training in Archive-Keeping

The One-Year Diploma Course in Archive-Keeping was successfully completed by the six trainees admitted to the course during the preceding year. They were awarded diplomas after they had passed the prescribed tests. The Department arranged for them a study-cum-observation tour of the State Archives of Rajasthan, Maharashtra and Madras. Also some eminent scholars and foreign archivists, among them Dr. W. Nölle, Second Secretary to the Embassy of the German Democratic Republic in New Delhi, were invited to deliver to the trainees lectures on certain aspects of the archival science.

Three trainees, one of them a nominee of the Government of Andhra Pradesh, took up the course at its fresh session which commenced on 1 October 1963. The two private candidates were granted a stipend of Rs. 150 each p.m. and the third trainee a special allowance of Rs. 75 p.m.

Besides the regular batch, four nominees of the Government of Nepal, who had joined the Department for practical training for six months under the Technical Co-operation Scheme of the Colombo Plan, completed their training in the preservation and photoduplication of records. Similar short-term training in preservation was also completed by the persons deputed by the Maulana Azad Library, Aligarh, Central Secretariat Library, Photo Engineering Group of the Army Headquarters and the West Bengal State Archives.

Lectures on preservation of records were delivered by the officers of the Department to the trainees at the Central Secretariat Training School and also to a batch of librarians undergoing training at the Delhi Educational Co-operative Society.

Exhibition

Select documents and manuscripts illustrating different aspects of modern Indian history, which are on permanent display at the Premises of the Department, continued to be popular. About 800 visitors came to see the exhibition during the year, notable among them being the students and teachers of the Department of Museology, Calcutta University; A.E.C. Training College and Centre, Pachmarhi, and Benares Hindu University; Mr. & Mrs. J. F. Pereira of the Geological Survey of Uganda; and Mr. S. Chojnochi of the University of Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

Publication

The publication programme of the Department made further headway during the year under report. Under Scheme I of the programme, envisaging the publication of the series *Fort William-India House Correspondence*, Vol. XV (Secret Department, 1782-86; Honorary Editors: Prof. C. H. Philips and Dr. B. B. Misra) came out of the press, and printing of Vol. VII (Home Department, 1773-76; Honorary Editor: Prof. R. P. Patwardhan) made steady progress. The scrutiny of Volumes XI, XVIII, XX and XXI of the series, received earlier from the honorary editors, was continued with a view to making them ready for the press.

The printing of the volume, of *Persian Akhbars*, being published in collaboration with the University of Delhi under Scheme III-A relating to the publication of records in oriental languages, made further progress.

The University of Calcutta executed a formal agreement to publish Ochterlony Papers relating to Delhi and Central India (1818-25) under Scheme III-B envisaging the publication of records in English in collaboration with institutes of higher learning. Progress was made in the editing of *News-Letters* (1839-42) to be published under the same scheme by the Panjab University which also executed a similar agreement.

Under the scheme of publishing *Selections from Educational Records of the Government of India*, Volume II dealing with the development of University education during 1860-87 was published, and collection of materials for the third volume relating to the development of education departments during 1859-82 was completed.

As regards the *Calendar of Persian Correspondence*, printing of Vol. XI (1794-95) was taken up. Compilation of Vol. XII (1796-97) of the series neared completion, while calendaring of the Persian Correspondence for 1798-1800 made good progress.

Volume XIII (January 1959-December 1960) of the Departmental journal *The Indian Archives* was issued during the year under report. Among its contents those of special interest are the articles: "Office Work and the Archive Service in Yugoslavia" by Sergije Vilfan, second instalment of "Archives in the Soviet Union" by V. V. Maksakov, and "An Introduction to Rajasthan State Archives" by N. R. Khadgawat. Material for Vol. XIV (January 1961-December 1962) of the journal was sent to the press.

During the year under review the Department also published Vol. II of the *Descriptive List of Mutiny Papers in the National Archives of India, Bhopal*.

Advisory Bodies and Committees

National Committee of Archivists.—The 16th meeting of the Committee was held on 30 and 31 December 1963 at Poona. Before discussing the agenda, the Committee condoled the death of its former members Dr. S. N. Sen, Shri S. Chidambaram and Dr. B. A. Saletore. The Committee's recommendations related to the grant of special pay to the State

Archives staff; training of district and *taluka* record-room keepers at State Archives headquarters; control of Directors of State Archives over inactive records in district and *taluka* record-rooms; provision of photo-duplication units at State Archives; and airconditioning of rooms containing records in microfilm. The Committee also discussed other problems connected with preservation in the course of which it was informed of the suitability of chiffon manufactured at Srinagar Government Silk Factory for repair of documents. It decided to hold its next meeting at Trivandrum in September 1964.

Committee on Archival Legislation.—The report of the Committee has been under the consideration of the Government of India for some time. Chief among the recommendations of the Committee, recently accepted by the Government, are those relating to record management and retirement, policy in regard to non-archival materials, and publication programme of the National Archives of India.

The Government of India has agreed with the Committee's view that the tendency to divide, disperse, re-classify or re-number records following every re-organisation or re-distribution of functions of a record-creating agency should cease. It has also agreed that the records should be subjected to review not later than 5 years after they have passed out of their active use and all files surviving this review should be subjected to further review not only when they reach their 25th year but also when they reach their 10th year, and that the final review should be done in association with the National Archives of India. However, files marked for retention for 10 years according to departmental schedules need not come up for review at the earlier point.

With regard to non-archival materials the Government has accepted the Committee's recommendation that the National Archives of India should be stripped of all such material except publications, etc. bearing on archival science, modern Indian history and related subjects and that the acquisition of non-archival manuscripts should be discontinued.

As regards publication programme of the Department, it has been decided in keeping with the Committee's recommendation that the present indexing programme should be discontinued and replaced by descriptive listing, the latter operation being limited to important collections and series; that the existing practice of publishing full texts or calendars of entire record series or selections from them should be abandoned as soon as the programmes in hand have been completed, the privilege of full publication being extended to only certain special collections; and that the publication of *The Indian Archives* should be continued.

National Register of Records.—The term of the Advisory Committee on National Register of Records expired on 17 January 1963. The grants-in-aid for compiling the Register, made available by the Union Government, were utilized by the State Governments of Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Madras, Mysore, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh. The survey reports and lists of records sent by these Governments were scrutinised.

Historical Documents Purchase Committee.—Two meetings were held by the Committee on 15 January and 3 May, 1963 to appraise historical documents owned by private parties and offered by them for sale, and to make requisite recommendations regarding their purchase.

Other Activities of the Director and other Officers of the Department

The Director of Archives visited the Rajasthan State Archives at Bikaner on 3 and 4 January, 1963 at the request of the Government of Rajasthan. He attended a meeting of the Advisory Committee for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict, held at New Delhi on 11 February 1963. As a member of the Board of Management, Khudabaksh Oriental Manuscripts Library, Patna, and the Combined Arts Purchase Committee of the Government of India, he also attended the meetings of these bodies.

Shri R. C. Gupta, Assistant Director of Archives (Preservation), attended a meeting of the Advisory Committee for Goa Archives, held at Panjim on 29 July 1963. Shri S. K. Saxena, Assistant Director of Archives (Records), attended a meeting of the working group of the Cabinet Secretariat, held at New Delhi on 9 October 1963 to review the record retention schedule.

Shri Ranbir Kishore, Scientific Officer, attended the meeting of the Ink and Allied Products Sectional Committee of the Indian Standards Institution, held at Bombay in the first week of June 1963. The Department also continued to be represented on various other committees of the Institution, such as those for Leather, Library Buildings, etc. Some members of the Preservation Division of the Department participated in a symposium on white ants organised by the Burmah Shell Company at New Delhi in June 1963.

Shri H. R. Ramachandran, Librarian, represented the Department at the conference of the Indian Association of Specialised Libraries and Information Centres, held in October 1963 at Poona.

Regional Office, Bhopal

Accession.—No records were accessioned during the year under report. The Office library accessioned 11 books.

Checking and Arrangement.—Sorting, checking and arrangement of 1,200 files of the Political Department, 1,525 files of *Moin-ul-Mahami*, 465 files of *Jagir Sanads* and 1,200 files of *Daftar Insha* were completed. Besides, 2,331 files of the Political Department, 615 files of *Daftar Insha* and 658 files of *Moin-ul-Mahami* were checked before taking up their listing. 1,200 files were docketed, 266 bundles and 139 volumes labelled, and 148 bundles and 800 volumes restored to their proper places.

Compilation of Reference Aids.—Lists specifying the subjects and references of 2,331 files of the Political Department for the period 1930-35, 658 files of *Moin-ul-Mahami* covering the period 1910-14, and 615 miscellaneous files of *Daftar Insha* belonging to different years, were prepared. The subject heads in Persian and Urdu on 930 files of *Daftar Vakalat* were rendered into English. Progress was made in compiling the third volume of the Descriptive List of Mutiny Papers. More than a thousand books in the Office library were catalogued.

Research and Reference Service.—Two research scholars availed themselves of the facilities afforded by the Office for consulting records

in its custody. Besides requisitions from these scholars, the Office attended to those from the Government of Madhya Pradesh. Search was carried out among the records and other sources available in the Office in response to queries from private individuals as well as Government agencies. These related to the papers of the Chamber of Princes and female education in Madhya Pradesh during the 19th century. Books of the Maulana Azad Library, Aligarh, were inspected by the Keeper of Records and a report thereon submitted by him.

Preservation.—Besides the usual dusting of records, 60,219 volumes, 3,51,319 files and 4,924 bundles were specially cleaned. While 1,089 bundles were re-bound, 139 volumes were cleaned, repaired and bound, 5,101 gathers stitched, 30,141 sheets trimmed and 1,980 volumes fumigated with paradichlorobenzene. Some files of the Political Department, the *Jagir Sanads* and the Mutiny Papers were put in carton boxes provided for the purpose. Periodical disinfection of the stack area and the library was carried out. The repair and rehabilitation of the records of *Daftar Insha* and of those relating to the Mutiny made further progress. 15,930 sheets were flattened, 29,896 sheets full-pasted and 11,966 sheets repaired with tissue paper and 15,900 sheets with tissue paper as well as cellulose acetate foil.

Technical Service.—Vacuum-cleaning was carried out regularly of the records of the Regional Records Survey Committee of the Government of Madhya Pradesh, kept in the custody of the Office. Advice was given to the Superintendent, Central Jail, Bhopal, on the scientific storage of records and control and eradication of white ants.

Exhibition and Visitors.—The permanent exhibition of documents of historical importance at the Office premises continued to attract many visitors. Noteworthy among those who visited the Office during the year were Dr. Wayne A. Wilcox of Columbia University, Louis Jacot of California University, Dr. Maqbool Ahmed, Reader in Arabic and Islamic Studies, Aligarh University, and M. Y. Koli, Chief Engineer of Madhya Pradesh Electricity Board.
