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THE DIRECTOR OF ARCHIVES
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Staff

Dr. S. V. Desikachar who had been on deputation to the Gazetteers Unit of the Ministry of Education, rejoined the Department on 21 April and resumed his duties as Assistant Director. Shri D. L. Kaka, who had been officiating in his place reverted to his substantive post of Archivist. Shri U. N. Sarkar, Archivist, was promoted with effect from 5 March 1964 to officiate as Assistant Director of Archives *vice* Shri V. C. Joshi who had gone on deputation to the Institute of Public Administration, New Delhi, as a Project Director. Shri R. K. Perti, Assistant Archivist (Grade I) was promoted on *ad hoc* basis to officiate as Archivist *vice* Shri U. N. Sarkar.

On the recommendation of the Union Public Service Commission Shri S. N. Sharma and Shri A. D. Khan, both Assistant Archivists (Grade I), were promoted as Archivist (General) and Archivist (Oriental Records) with effect from 19 May and 10 August 1964, respectively. The latter was posted in the Regional Office at Bhopal.

Shri N. H. Kulkarnee, Shri S. N. Sharma and Shri B. D. Saxena, who had gone to France in 1963 for a course of training in Archive-keeping at the Archives Nationales, Paris, rejoined office after completing their training.

Miss E. David, who was awarded a fellowship by the Italian Government for a survey of records of Indian interest in the archives and libraries of Rome and the Vatican, left for Italy in December.

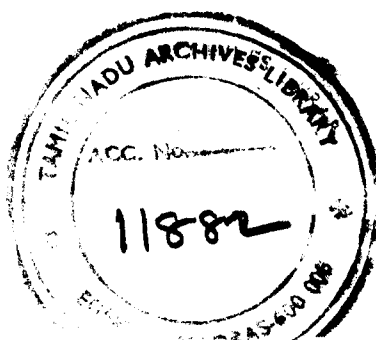
The administrative control of the Goa Archives was entrusted to the National Archives of India with effect from 1 October 1964.

For administrative reasons one Class II (Non-Gazetted), fifteen Class III and nine Class IV posts were left unfilled. Total strength of the establishment at the close of the year was 383.

Accessions

Public Records.—Acute shortage of storage space continued to impede the retirement of non-current records of the Union Government. The only records accessioned during the year were copies of 171 Bills passed by the various State Legislatures and assented to by the President of India.

Private Papers and Manuscripts.—Several interesting collections of private papers and historical manuscripts were added to the Departmental holdings, the most noteworthy among them being the papers of late Dr. M. R. Jayakar, donated by his trustees and executors. They comprise 1,143 files, 258 volumes of newspaper cuttings and a few diaries. Dr Jayakar's correspondence with Mahatma



Gandhi, Motilal Nehru, Tej Bahadur Sapru, Lajpat Rai, Mrs. Annie Besant, Ramsay Macdonald, Lord Irwin and others throws a flood of light on the leading political and social issues of his time, such, for instance, as the Home Rule Movement, the first Non-Cooperation Movement, Montague-Chelmsford Reforms, Simon Commission, Round Table Conference, etc.

Another important collection, the papers of late Purushottam Das Tandon, was a gift from the Servants of People Society, New Delhi. Most of these papers are in Hindi and deal with topics such as the National Convention of August 1949, Hindi Sahitya Sammelan, Rashtra Bhasha Prachar Samiti, the Panchayati Raj Bill, and women's education, to mention only a few.

The Department also received from Shri K. Chandra several original letters of his late father Krishnaswamy Iyer, the well-known leader belonging to the Moderate Wing of the Congress. His correspondence with Gopal Krishna Gokhale, D. E. Wacha, R. N. Mudholkar, C. Y. Chintamani, Sir William Wedderburn and others serves to illumine the history of the Indian National Congress both before and after the Surat split of 1907.

Other noteworthy additions include the papers of late Srinivasa Sastri, gifted by Shri P. Kodanda Rao, and the papers of the Indian Independence League purchased through the Indian High Commission at Singapore.

Microfilm Collection.—The Department received 25 rolls of Dalhousie Papers from the Scottish Record Office, Edinburgh, 24 rolls of Bentinck Papers from the University of Nottingham, 1 roll of the papers of Lord Hardinge from the Macgill University, Montreal, and 4 rolls of the papers of Sir Austin Chamberlain, Secretary of State for India (1915—17) from the Birmingham University Library.

Microfilm copies were acquired of 80 autograph letters of Gandhi addressed to Rambhuj Dutt Chaudhuri and his wife Sarala Devi. The originals of these letters are in the possession of Deepak Dutt Chaudhuri of Calcutta. The Department also obtained from the Collected Works of Mahatma Gandhi, Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, New Delhi, 397 photostat copies of Mahatma Gandhi's speeches and writings.

Besides the above, the Department received as a gift from Dr. Zahir-al-din Madani of Surat photo-copies of two rare documents in Persian: (i) a *farman* of Akbar dated Asfandiyar, 45 *Julus*, 1009 A.H. (March 1601), granting 420 *bighas* of land in *Suba* Gujarat to Khwaja Rafi-al-din, and (ii) a *nishan* of Jahanara Begam dated 9 *Rabi* II, 21 *Julus* of Shahjahan, 1058 A.H. (3 April 1648), granting 30 *bighas* of land in *Pargana* Chaurasi, *Sarkar* Surat, to one Bigh Mah, wife of Allah Quli Beg.

Books and Periodicals.—Additions to the Departmental Library comprised 1,163 books and 165 periodicals, acquired by purchase, gift or exchange. Among the rare publications accessioned by the Library mention may be made of: (i) *Mission to Afghanistan: Account of the Kingdom of Cabul and its Dependencies*, published in 1819; (ii) *Journal of Tour of the Himalaya Mountain and the Sources of the Jamuna and the Ganges*, published in 1820; and (iii) *Umdat-ul-Tawarikh* by Lala Sohan Lal Suri, published in 5 volumes in 1885—89.

Checking and Arrangement

19,860 files, 242 volumes, 114 carton boxes and 1,049 bundles belonging to the Revenue and Agriculture Department (1871—1906), Legislative Department (1872—85, 1906—20), Military Department (1874—89), Department of Education, Health and Lands (1871—1944), Home (Political) Department (1931—38) and the Ministry of Home Affairs (1948—51) were checked and re-arranged. Checking and arrangement of 381 historical maps of the Survey of India was also completed. (For details please see Appendix I).

Besides the above, the collections of private papers of M. R. Jayakar and Purushottam Das Tandon were fumigated and checked, and the checking and arrangement of the Inayat Jang Collection made good progress.

The cataloguing and arrangement of books and periodicals in the Departmental Library was continued. Nearly 10,800 printed volumes of the Political and Military Department records of the former Government of Bombay were sorted out with a view to their eventual return to the Government of Maharashtra.

Compilation of Reference Aids

The Department made satisfactory progress in preparing lists of the various series of records in its custody in order to facilitate their consultation. The records listed during the year covered 6,665 proceedings of the Military Department (1881—89), Home Department (1860—1947), Department of Education, Health and Lands (1945—47) and the Department of Agriculture (1945—47). Abstract lists were prepared of the records belonging to the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (1929—45) and the Central Board of Revenue (1924—46). The listing of the private papers of G. K. Gokhale, G. S. Khaparde, Dr. B. N. Khare and Badruddin Tyabji was completed and that of the papers of Dadabhai Naoroji, Sir Jahangir Coyajee and M. R. Jayakar was taken up. Lists were also made of the microfilm transcripts of the Argyl and Dalhousie papers.

Descriptive Listing of Secret Department Records was continued. Volume II of the series covering the years 1776—80 was sent to the Press. Final checking and editing of Volume III (1781—85) was completed. Descriptive listing of Volume IV (1786—90) was taken in hand.

Steady progress was maintained in the descriptive listing of Persian Correspondence (1804—07). Listing of the documents in oriental languages acquired from private custody was completed. Consolidation and editing of the index entries in respect of the *Alqab-nama* was continued.

Further progress was also made in editing and arranging the index entries prepared for Volume II of the *Index to Foreign and Political Department Records* (1781—83), and in preparing the index cards for the printed maps in the custody of the Department.

Appraisal

Appraisal was carried on, as in previous years, of the records which had become mature for final review under the terms of the

Manual of Office Procedure. 7,759 files of the late Department of Education, Health and Lands, 1,500 files of the late Eastern States Agency and 1,603 files of the Finance Department were evaluated and 1,163 files out of them selected for permanent preservation. Paucity of staff continued to obstruct the undertaking of a large scale review programme.

Research and Reference Service

During the year under report 273 scholars including those from U.K., U.S.A., Sweden, Germany and Australia availed themselves of the research facilities provided by the Department. Their subjects of research covered a wide variety of subjects ranging from Indian national movement to British relations with the erstwhile princely states, etc. (For details, please see Appendix II).

As usual, the Research Room remained open from 9 A.M. to 8 P.M. on week days and from 9-30 A.M. to 5 P.M. on Sundays and other holidays.

The Department continued to render reference service not only to research scholars but also to public and semi-public agencies. The number of requisitions attended to during the year was 88,303 covering 77,702 files, 150 volumes, 371 maps and 473 microfilm rolls borrowed by research scholars and members of the Departmental staff and various Ministries and other agencies of the Government of India. The files and other papers received back from these agencies were restored to their proper places.

The Department also supplied to research scholars and others for reference purpose 23,883 books and periodicals available in its own library and borrowed for them under the inter-library loan scheme 109 publications from other local libraries.

A large number of enquiries from public as well as private agencies involving search among both manuscript and printed materials were attended to. Among the interesting topics on which information was supplied were Church Mission Movement in Madras and Mysore (1850—1910), Indian Shipping in the late 18th and 19th centuries, the diaries of the celebrated Himalayan explorer Pandit Nain Singh, the legal status of the wives and children of the Indians in South Africa married to foreigners, revenue settlement reports of the former Bashahr State, property of the Raja of Poonch, India's maritime relations with South-East Asia (1830—70), and the *kalghee* of Guru Gobind Singh. (For details, please see Appendix III).

Preservation and Photoduplication

The Department continued to experience difficulty in procuring imported repair materials on account of tight foreign exchange position. Nevertheless it succeeded in getting laminated 1,19,845 sheets of records and 36 maps and to get repaired manually 23,334 sheets with tissue paper and 989 sheets, 9 palm leaves and a manuscript copy of the *Gita* with chiffon. Minor repairs were carried out in 2,730 sheets,

146 maps and 12 posters. 2,06,095 sheets were deacidified and stripped of old patches of paste and other repair materials sticking to them. 60,836 document sheets were flattened, 1,14,851 sheets and 24 maps provided with guards, 37,126 Original Consultations and 2,775 document sheets docketed, 272 maps mounted, and 998 sheets, 237 books and 532 miscellaneous items bound. Besides this, 2,312 volumes and 199 bundles of records were air-cleaned and fumigated. Leather preservative dressing was applied to 22,504 volumes.

The Department microfilmed 1,76,179 manuscript pages, processed 17,086 films, prepared 9,946 metres of positive print, enlarged 2,519 copies and checked 660 microfilm rolls. Among the papers that were microfilmed 47 diaries and collection of original letters of late G. S. Khaparde deserve special mention.

Research Laboratory

The Research Laboratory of the Department continued its experiments on the effect of Clenofix and other common insecticides on the durability of paper. It also carried out experiments to determine the suitability of certain repair and binding materials and drew up tentative specifications relating to them. The Handmade Paper Research Institute, Poona and the Khadi and Village Commission's Zonal Office, Bangalore continued their efforts to manufacture tissue paper in accordance with the specifications prescribed by the Department.

Technical Service

Difficulty in acquiring imported repair materials prevented the Department from rendering technical service to outside agencies on a large scale. Noteworthy among the agencies to whom this kind of service was rendered are the Central Secretariat Library, Ministry of Home Affairs, Library of the Ministry of Defence, Registrar General's Office, All India Congress Committee, Gandhi Smarak Nidhi, New Delhi, and the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute, Poona.

The Department extended photoduplication service to 140 institutions and individuals among whom mention may be made of the Directorate General of Posts and Telegraphs, New Delhi, Deputy Commissioner, Coorg, Dr. Anil Seal, Cambridge University, England, Mr. Von Den Dungen, National University, Australia, Mr. Seymour Scheinberg, American Institute of Indian Studies, New York, Mrs. Dolores Domin, German Democratic Republic, Mr. Zuriya Nakamura, University of Tokyo, and Mrs. Jeanette Mirsky, Princeton University, U.S.A.

The mobile microfilming unit of the Department visited Rajkot, Bhavnagar, Mahuva, Ahmedabad and Bombay at the request of the Gandhi Smarak Sangrahalaya, New Delhi, and microfilmed some of the documents relating to Gandhiji available there, the total number of exposures taken being 23,148.

The work of repairing, binding and microfilming the rare and valuable manuscripts of the Raza Library, Rampur, was continued and about 325 manuscripts were microfilmed during the year under report.

Advisory Work and Inspection

The Department tendered technical advice on the preservation of books and records to both public and private agencies which sought such advice. These included, among others, the Directorate General of Posts and Telegraphs, Railway Board, Central Secretariat Library, Ministry of Defence, Indian Council of World Affairs, Supreme Court Bar Association Library, New Delhi, Madras Record Office, Heavy Engineering Corporation Ltd., Ranchi, Asiatic Society, Calcutta, Life Insurance Corporation of India, Jullundur, Oriental Research Institute, University of Mysore, Mysore and the Library of Kurukshetra University.

In addition to the above, some of the officers of the Department visited certain institutions located in Delhi and after examining the state of preservation of their holdings gave on-the-spot advice in regard to their storage and preservation on scientific lines. Mention among those institutions may be made of the libraries of the Supreme Court Bar Association and the Council of World Affairs.

Training in Archive-Keeping

The three trainees admitted to the One-Year Diploma Course of training in Archive-Keeping during the previous year completed their training during the year under report. A fresh batch of five trainees was admitted to the session which commenced on 19 October. Of these trainees two were awarded a stipend of Rs. 150.00 per mensem each.

The facilities provided by the Department for short-term course of training in the maintenance and preservation of records were availed of by several State Governments, public agencies and private institutions mention among which may be made of the Himachal Pradesh Administration, Archaeological Survey of India, Oriental Research Institute, Mysore, Sanskrit College, Calcutta and Maulana Azad Library, Aligarh.

Necessary facilities were also provided to Shri Amarawansa Dewaraja, Archivist of the Government of Ceylon, who came to the Department on study-cum-observation tour under the Technical Co-operation Scheme included in the Colombo Plan.

Exhibition

The permanent exhibition of select historical documents and manuscripts at the National Archives of India continued to be popular with the public and attracted over 1,000 visitors during the year. These included some distinguished personalities from foreign countries like U.K., U.S.A., Italy, Turkey and Japan.

A special exhibition of documents and manuscripts of Oriental interest on the occasion of the twenty-sixth session of the International Congress of Orientalists held in New Delhi was organised by the Department. Noteworthy among the exhibits were the reports and memoranda of Major General Cunningham, the first Director-General of Archaeological Survey of India; letters of Sir William Jones, Sir Philip Francis, James Prinsep, Francis Gladwin, John Gilchrist and others, papers relating to Sir Aurel Stein's explorations in Central Asia and diary of Nain Singh, the celebrated mountaineer.

Publication

Steady progress was made in the work relating to the implementation of the Publication Programme of the Department. While under Scheme I of the Programme, printing of *Fort William—India House Correspondence*, Vol. VII (Home Public. 1773—76; Hony. Editor: Professor R. P. Patwardhan) made progress at the Albion Press, Delhi, scrutiny of Vols. XX and XXI of the series was completed. Three volumes were sent to the press during the year and these were: Vol. III (Home Public. 1760—63; Hony. Editor: Dr. R. R. Sethi) to the Government of India Press, Nasik, Vol. XX (Military, 1792—96; Hony. Editor: Dr. A. C. Banerjee) to the Government of India Press, Calcutta, and Vol. XXI (Military, 1797—1800; Hony. Editor: Professor S. R. Kohli) to the Government of India Press, Faridabad.

The printing of the volume of *Persian Akhbars*, being brought out in collaboration with the University of Delhi under Scheme III-A of the Publication Programme, made satisfactory progress.

Under Scheme III-B the volume of *Ochterlony Papers* (1818—25), the publication of which was undertaken by the University of Calcutta and the editing of which was done by Dr. N. K. Sinha on behalf of that University, came out of the press. Editing of the *News Letters* (1839—42), to be published under the same scheme by the Panjab University, made some headway.

As regards *Selections from Educational Records of the Government of India*, the Advisory Committee for publication of this series decided at its meeting held on 10 January 1964 to change the title of Vol. IV from "Development of Education Departments" to "History of Educational Administration" and to extend its chronological limit from 1882 to 1897. Relevant records of the period were, therefore, selected and transcripts thereof sent to the Honorary Editor, Shri J. P. Naik, for final selection and editing. In keeping with the recommendation of the said Committee steps were also taken to get Parts I (1781—1839) and II (1840—59) of the *Selections from Educational Records*, edited by Sharp and Richey respectively, reprinted by photo offset process.

While the printing of the *Calendar of Persian Correspondence*, Vol. XI (1784—95) made further progress, the preparation of Vol. XII (1796-97) of the series was completed and that of Vol. XIII (1798—1800) continued.

The Departmental journal *The Indian Archives*, Vol. XIV in its consolidated form covering the period January 1961—December 1962, reached the final stage of printing, and Vol. XV (January 1963—December 1964) was sent to the press.

Advisory Bodies and Committees

National Committee of Archivists.—The 17th meeting of the National Committee of Archivists was held at Trivandrum on 7-8 December 1964. Principal among the recommendations made by the Committee at this meeting were: (i) The Government of India should

allow necessary foreign exchange for importing tissue paper and acetate foil required by the Central and State Archives; (ii) The State Governments should arrange mutually inter-State visits by their Archivists; (iii) The Director of Archives, National Archives of India, should be authorised to allocate to the State Governments according to their requirements the funds earmarked by the Government of India for grants-in-aid in connection with the preparation of National Register of Records; and (iv) The State Governments should vest in their respective Directors of Archives the powers of inspection and retirement of non-current records where these powers have not already been delegated.

National Register of Records.—For the financial year 1964-65, a sum of Rs. 24,300 was sanctioned by the Ministry of Education, Government of India to the State Governments of Madras, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala, Orissa, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Mysore and Rajasthan in connection with the compilation of the National Register of Records in Private Custody. These Governments took keen interest in surveying the records in private custody and furnished lists thereof. The lists indicate the existence of invaluable source materials for reconstructing the history of India, particularly of the modern period. Those received from Madras refer, among other things, to the British expansion in the Carnatic and the Far South. In Uttar Pradesh the records surveyed include some more *farmans* of Mughal Emperors pertaining to local administration and land grants. The papers listed by the Archives Department, Punjab, throw light on the political history of the region during and after the revolt of 1857. The survey operations in Bhagalpur and Darbhanga Districts of Bihar have unearthed documents referring to the revolt of 1857 and also to the spread of education there.

Other Activities of the Director and Other Officers of the Department

Shri K. D. Bhargava, Director of Archives, Government of India and Dr. N. K. Sinha, Professor and Head of the Department of History, University of Calcutta visited the U.S.S.R. during the month of March under the Indo-Soviet Cultural Exchange Programme relating to Archives. The object of the visit was to study the organisation of archival services in that country and to explore materials bearing on modern Indian history in connection with the project of the National Archives of India for acquiring microfilm copies of records and manuscripts of Indian interest available in foreign repositories. They saw the records repositories and research libraries of Moscow, Leningrad, Erivan, Tashkent and Samarkand, and came across a large number of documents throwing new light on Indian history.

Shri S. Roy, Deputy Director of Archives, attended meetings of the Working Group held on 23 and 30 March for the purpose of advising on the retention schedule drawn up by the Ministry of Home Affairs. He delivered a lecture on "Record Management" to a seminar organised by the Indian Institute of Public Administration and another on the "importance of archives to the study of contemporary history".

Dr. S. V. Desikachar, Assistant Director of Archives (Records), represented the Department at the sessions of the Indian History Congress and the Institute of Historical Studies held at Ranchi on 29—31 December.

Shri R. C. Gupta, Assistant Director of Archives (Preservation), Shri R. C. Majumdar, Archival Chemist and Shri Ranbir Kishore, Scientific Officer attended meetings of the Documentation Sectional Committee (E.C.2), Leather Sectional Committee (C.D.C.16) and Inks and Allied Products Sectional Committee (C.D.C.13) of the Indian Standards Institution respectively.

Regional Office, Bhopal

Accession.—The Office Library accessioned 55 books.

Checking and Arrangement.—2,815 files of the Political Department of the erstwhile Bhopal State were checked before their listing was taken up. 896 files of *Jagir Sanads* and 1,373 files of *Daftar Vakalat* were checked, sorted and arranged. While 110 files of the External Affairs Section of the Political Department were docketed, 117 mutiny files were paginated and 366 volumes, 216 bundles and 100 carton boxes labelled. 235 bundles and 1,000 volumes of records were restored to their proper places.

Compilation of Reference Aids.—Lists specifying subjects and giving full references were prepared of 2,815 files of the Political Department (1932—35). Steady progress was made in the compilation of Vol. III of the *Descriptive List of Mutiny Papers* available at Bhopal.

Research and Reference Service.—Three research scholars availed themselves of the facilities provided by the Office for consulting the records in its custody. The excerpts taken by them from the *Jagir* records and the documents relating to the Rani of Jhansi were released for their use. Besides attending to requisitions for records and manuscripts, the Office answered enquiries from a few private individuals and public agencies involving search among records. Also it assisted Prof. Moinuddin of Seva Sadan Degree College, Burhanpur, in deciphering a number of documents written in Persian.

Preservation.—Besides the usual dusting, special cleaning was done of 37,882 volumes, 45,939 files and 3,814 bundles of records, and fumigation of 2,073 volumes, 168 files of *Daftar Insha* were repaired, and lists of the records of *Daftar Tarikh*, *Daftar Niabat-i-Mal* and *Daftar Tanzimat* were bound and placed on the shelves. In all 16,161 pages were flattened, 36,810 sheets guarded, 5,135 sheets repaired with tissue paper and 10,671 sheets with acetate foil and tissue paper, and 1,016 sheets were docketed and stitched.

Technical Service.—The records of the Regional Records Survey Committee, Government of Madhya Pradesh, kept in the Office for scientific preservation, were vacuum-cleaned regularly.

Exhibition and Visitors.—The permanent exhibition of historical documents within the Office premises continued to attract a large number of visitors. Among the exhibits in which they evinced special interest mention may be made of the official seals of the rulers of Bhopal and the document reporting the death of the Rani of Jhansi and the arrest of Tantia Tope. The visitors included, among others, Sarvashri A. P. Sinha, Deputy Accountant General of Madhya Pradesh, Habibuddin, Secretary, Posts & Telegraphs Board, Delhi, C. L. Nema, Secretary, Shahid Smarak Trust, Jabalpur, K. R. Chowdhuri, Conservator of Forests, West Bengal, and Col. Kartar Singh, E.M.E., Bhopal.

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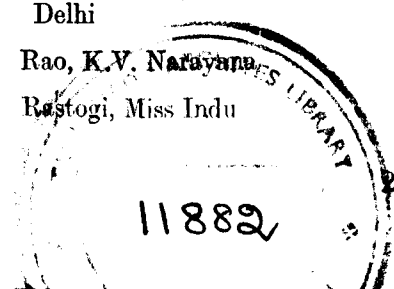
