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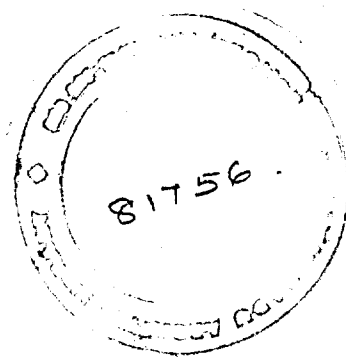

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PREFACE

The Census of India, Volume VI, has been divided into ten parts some of which have been further sub-divided depending upon the volume of material of each part. Part II-A, the present publication, contains General Population Tables(A-Series) and Primary Census Abstract. The former consists of four main tables, namely,

1. A-I : Area, houses and population,
2. A-II : Variation in population during sixty years,
3. A-III : Villages classified by population, and
4. A-IV : Towns (and town-groups) classified by population in 1961 with variation since 1901.

A-I : Area, houses and population:
The table gives information by districts and their rural and urban sectors in respect of area, population per square mile, number of villages and towns, occupied residential houses and sex-wise population. The area figures of the State on this side of the Cease-fire Line were neither available with the Directorate of Land Records of the State Government nor with the Survey of India. These have, however, been provisionally worked out by fresh planimetry on the basis of the boundary alignments supplied by this office to the Directorate of Map Publication, Dehra-Dun. As will be seen from the table, the area figures have been given both in square miles and square kilometers. In the case of urban areas, however, the area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioners and the Thesildars or the Administrators or other

authorities of the town and notified areas and municipalities.

The table also gives separately the number of inhabited and uninhabited villages of which no list had been prepared after the tribal raids of 1947.

The table has also been prepared upto tehsil level and gives in addition information in respect of each town-group, its constituents and every town and notified area.

Three appendices have been appended to this table. The first of these gives the 1941 territorial units constituting the present set-up of the State. The statement given in the appendix is, however, provisional and subject to incorporation, adjustment and correction when the actual surveys are made. The appendix mentions the details of the constituents of various districts and tehsils some of which had to be reconstituted after they were split up by the Cease-fire Line, while others were newly carved out to facilitate administrative work.

The second appendix gives the number of villages with a population of 5,000 and over and towns with a population under 5,000. Such of the territorial units in which there is no such village or town have, however, been omitted from this appendix. One criterion for the determination of an urban area for the Census of 1961 was that it should not have a population of less than 5,000. The appendix shows the number of towns in each district and tehsil which had to be treated for several considerations as towns, notwithstanding the fact that their population was less than 5,000.

The third appendix gives by districts and tehsils and by their rural and urban sectors the total and sex-wise figures of houseless and institutional population.

A small sub-appendix has also been prepared in respect of municipal towns which have undergone changes in area since 1941 when the last Census was held.

A-II : Variation in population during sixty years : The table gives the population with sex break-up of the State, its divisions and districts for the six decades from 1901 to 1961 as also the decade variation and the growth rate of population from decade to decade. The 1951 population of the State has, however, been estimated by taking the arithmetic mean of the 1941 and 1961 populations. For the previous decades, namely, 1901 to 1941, the adjusted population of each district has been worked out on the basis of its jurisdiction in 1961.

The table is followed by an appendix and shows the disposition of districts in Jammu and Kashmir in 1941 and 1961 Censuses. It contains details of the administrative localities currently under the occupation of Pakistan on the other side of the Cease-fire Line together with the estimated area of such localities, wherever available, and their population as it stood in 1941. Further, the appendix also contains the details of the constituents of various administrative localities now on this side of the Cease-fire Line, their area, wherever available, the 1941 population and the area and population in 1961. The population and area figures given in the appendix are in most cases only provisional and subject to modification.

A-III : Villages classified by population : The table gives by districts and tehsils the number and population by sex

of villages of various population-groups, namely, (I) less than 200, (II) 200-499, (III) 500-999, (IV) 1000-1999, (V) 2000-4999, (VI) 5000-9999 and (VII) 10,000 and above, as also the number of inhabited villages of each district and tehsil and its total and sex-wise rural population. The classification has further been abridged in the fly-leaf to table A-III, the broad population-groups being 0-499, 500-1999, 2000-4999 and 5,000 and above. It will be seen that of the 83% population of the State inhabiting the rural areas, no less than 54% is concentrated in villages with a population of less than 1,000.

A-IV : Towns (and town-groups) Classified by population in 1961 with variation since 1901 : The towns have been classified according to the size of their population into six classes. The table gives the variation in the population of each town for the six decades from 1901 onwards together with decade variation, percentage decade variation and 1961 area of each town-group, its constituent units and other towns.

A town-group is a constellation of satellite towns around a principal city. One such group consisting of Srinagar city, Badamibagh Cantonment and Natipora-Hyderpora notified area to be known as Srinagar town-group has been constituted this time so that the statistics relating to the entire area covered by the city and the two towns may be readily available.

As in the case of table A-II, the 1951 population of the towns given in the table represents the arithmetic mean of the 1961 population and the 1941 population. Further, the 1951 population has been given only in respect of those towns which existed both in 1941 and 1961.

This table is also followed by an

appendix which gives the names, area in square miles and square kilometres of new towns added in 1961, as also similar statistics in respect of such of the 1941 towns which have been declassified as rural in 1961. Two explanatory notes also appear after this appendix. The first of these gives the names, land revenue record number, area, wherever available, and 1941 population of the villages which constitute each of the new towns added in 1961. The second note specifies the names, land revenue record number, area and population of the village/villages into which such of the 1941 towns which have ceased to be towns in 1961 have relapsed.

Union Primary Census Abstract : The abstract gives the area in square miles, the number of houses and households and the total and sex-wise population for the State, each division, district and tehsil separately for the rural and urban sectors as also for each individual town. In addition, it also gives the total and sex-wise population of Scheduled Castes, literate persons, workers

and non-workers in respect of each of these units. Further, as will be seen from the abstract, workers have been divided into the following nine industrial categories:-

1. Cultivator.
2. Agricultural labourer.
3. Working in mining, quarrying, livestock, forestry, fishing, hunting and plantations, orchard and allied activities.
4. Working at household industry.
5. In manufacturing other than household industry.
6. In construction.
7. In trade and commerce.
8. In transport, storage and communications.
9. In other services.

The statistics given in the Primary Census Abstract have also been compiled in respect of each village, mohalla/block. This information will, however, be published in the respective District Census Handbooks.

NOTE

How the Census was taken.

The 1961 Census is the seventh in the series of regular decennial Censuses held in Jammu and Kashmir. The only Census held prior to 1891 is said to have taken place in 1873, but this can hardly be regarded a regular Census in view of the observation made in his report by the Census Commissioner of 1891 that 'no previous Census appears to have been taken, the enumeration of 1873 being far from reliable.'

No Census could be held in the State in 1951 on account of the abnormal conditions brought about by the tribal raids of 1947 and the subsequent splitting up of the State into two zones by what is known as the Cease-fire Line. As a result of this bifurcation, some of the districts and tehsils fell entirely on the other side of the said line, while many others including a number of villages were truncated. This necessitated the reconstitution of most of the districts and tehsils on this side of the Cease-fire Line so as to include within their jurisdictions the residual parts of the territorial units lying on the other side. In addition, two new districts and five tehsils were also carved out during the period 1948-1961 to facilitate administrative work and to ensure closer supervision of developmental projects. The fact that the complexion of the Census had undergone a complete change in 1951, and no personnel with previous background and knowledge of the technique of Census was available added in no small measure to our difficulties.

While the task of taking the Census was not, therefore, as easy in 1961 as

it had been during the earlier decades when no major changes were effected in the territorial jurisdictions of the various administrative units, one favourable change, however, which went a long way to facilitate our work, was the application in 1950 to the State of Jammu and Kashmir of the Census Act of India (No. XXXVII). The Act gives wide powers to the State Government for helping in organising the Census work and appointing Census Officers who have been declared as public servants within the meaning of Ranbir Penal Code. It also imposes an obligation on every person to answer questions put to him by a Census Officer to the best of his knowledge and belief and provides penalties against such of the Census Officers who refuse or neglect to use reasonable diligence in performing the duties assigned to them or who intentionally put offensive or improper questions. Similarly, the Act imposes penalties on persons who deliberately mislead Census Officers by giving false answers, or who refuse to answer to the best of their knowledge and belief the questions put to them, or who refuse to give access to Census Officers in their premises for the performance of work connected with the Census.

Fortunately, the vacuum created in the statistical data of the State due to non-availability of 1951 Census figures had already brought about a realisation of the importance of Census not only in the Government Departments but also among the people at large. The Census Organisation, therefore, received full co-operation both from officials and non-officials all over the State and in this way it became

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possible to tide over most of the difficulties which otherwise appeared to be fairly formidable.

Pre-tests.

There was, however, some delay in the setting up of the Central Census Office and the appointment of Superintendent, Census Operations, for the State. By the time the office was organised and a permanent Census Superintendent appointed in September 1959, two pretests, one in January 1959 and the other in July-August 1959, had already been carried out in other States. The results of these tests were discussed at length in the First Census Conference held in Delhi in September-October 1959 when it was agreed upon that the composite schedule originally devised and consisting of the Individual Slip and the Household Schedule would be inconvenient for handling and should, therefore, be split up into two separate schedules, one relating to Individual Slip only and the other to the Household Schedule and the Census Population Record. The Houselist Forms were also modified in the light of the experience gained as a result of the pre-tests.

The Household Schedule consists of two parts, the Household Schedule and the Census Population Record. The former gives the area and the local name of right on land, if any cultivated, whether owned or held from Government or held from private persons or institutions as also of land given to private persons for cultivation for payment in money, kind or share. It also gives the nature of household industry, if any, conducted by the Household together with the number of months in the year for which the industry is kept running. The Schedule is also designed to give sexwise information about the number of family workers and hired workers who are engaged in household

cultivation only or household industry only or in both.

The second part of the Schedule known as Census Population Record lists the names of the members of the household together with their sex, relationship with the head of the family, age, marital status and description of the work in case the member is a worker.

The Individual Slip is designed to give comprehensive information regarding each person enumerated, such as name, sex, age on last birthday, relationship with the head of the family, marital status, birth place, nationality, religion, literacy, mother-tongue and whether belonging to any Scheduled Caste or Scheduled Tribes. In addition, it gives information about a number of economic questions, such as whether the individual is working as a cultivator, an agricultural labourer, the nature of his work and of the household industry, if any, in which he is working, etc.

The Houselist consists of 18 columns which, besides giving information regarding the number of the building and of each of its Census houses, also indicates the purpose for which each Census house is used. In the case of such of the Census houses which are used as establishment, workshops or factories, the list gives the name of the product manufactured, the number of persons employed and the nature of the fuel used. It also contains information regarding the material of the walls and roofs, the number of rooms of the dwelling occupied by each household together with its population by sex and whether the accommodation is owned by the household or it is a rented one.

Census Dates.

Except for the non-synchronous areas consisting of the district of Ladakh, tehsil Karnah and parts of some of the tehsils,

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the Census was started on the morning of 10th Feb., 61 and was continued upto the sunrise of 1st March, 1961. It was followed by a revisional round which lasted from 1st March to 5th March, 1961.

Printing of Census Schedules.

The draft Houselist, the Individual Slip, the Household Schedule and the Census Population Record which had been prepared in English after taking into account the results of the pre-tests were translated into Urdu and got printed centrally at the Government of India Press, Aligarh. Care was, however, taken to verify the nuances and to ensure that the various terms and words appearing in English version were translated into appropriate equivalents in Urdu so that there may be no room for confusion or misunderstanding. Besides these, the Schedules were also got printed in English for taking the Census of non-combatants of the army. Other printing work assigned to the Government Press, Aligarh, included the printing of the Urdu and English versions of the abstracts of Individual Slip pads of two sizes, one of hundred slips and the other of 25 each. In addition, instructions for filling up of Houselists and Household Schedules and Individual Slips as also the English versions of abbreviations were printed centrally. The Household Schedules were bound in pads of two sizes, the larger containing 50 Schedules and the smaller 25 only.

Other printing work in Urdu which included the abstracts of Houselist Forms and Household Schedules, Instructions to Enumerators for filling up the Household Schedules and the Individual Slips, abbreviations and circulars, etc. were got printed by the local presses at Jammu and Srinagar.

Organisation of Census Operations.

1. Fixing of boundaries—For reasons already mentioned in the opening paragraphs of this note, no maps of any district or

tehsil had been prepared after the Census of 1941. The maps made available by the State Director of Land Records being very old were out of date and obsolete. In the circumstances, it was necessary to devise some other method for the determination of the boundaries of enumerators' blocks, supervisors' circles and the jurisdictions of the District Census Officers and Charge Superintendents. It was agreed upon that as the present administrative divisions had been carved out with due regard to the disposition of population, topography, communications and other relevant matters, these should also constitute Divisions for the Census of 1961. For the same reason, each tehsil was also declared a Census Charge except so far as its inaccessible parts, if any, which were included in non-synchronous areas, were concerned. The two municipalities of Jammu and Srinagar were treated as separate Charges and were not included in the tehsils to which they belong.

So far as the formation of enumerators' blocks is concerned, we were partly guided by the lists of Girdawar Circles into which each tehsil stood divided and partly by the estimated population figures of each village, town and mohalla which were obtained from the Tehsildars concerned. These figures were in most cases fairly accurate as the Tehsildars had been maintaining upto-date lists of the population of each area in connection with the rationing of foodstuffs.

While these were the guiding factors for the formation of blocks, circles and zones, etc. in the State as a whole, the principal consideration on the basis of which these were carved out in hilly and mountainous areas was the topography and the means of communications. In view of the very large area, extremely low density of population and uncongenial climatic conditions, the blocks and circles of smaller sizes were set

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up in these areas so that the field staff may not find it difficult to cope with the work assigned to it. Sufficient care was, however, taken to ensure that each block was well demarcated by properly defined boundaries, such as rivers, streams, hills, streets, lakes and the like.

2. The Census hierarchy of District Census Officers, etc.

The question of appointment of District Census Officers was discussed in a meeting of the Heads of the Departments of the State Government, presided over by the Chief Secretary. The suggestion that as the District Census Officers had already enough of work on their hands, Assistant Commissioners should be appointed as District Census Officers was not agreed to as it was apprehended that the latter may not inspire confidence and be able to exercise sufficient control over the personnel of other departments detailed on Census work. Orders appointing the Deputy Commissioners as District Census Officers were, therefore, issued as early as 22nd December, 1959. The selection of Charge Superintendents was made in consultation with the District Census Officers and the Financial Commissioner and their appointments were also notified along with those of District Census Officers in the State Government Notification of 22nd December 1959. The only areas where Officers other than Tehsildars had to be appointed as Charge Superintendents were :

- (a) the non-synchronous areas of Gurez and Keran which had to be assigned to the local Naib Tehsildar and Block Development officer respectively, and
- (b) the two cities of Jammu and Srinagar for which their respective Administrators were appointed as Charge Superintendents.

Each Charge was subdivided into a

number of zones which were placed in charge of Zonal Officers or Deputy Charge Superintendents. In the case of Local Bodies, the Chairman or the Secretary of the Local Body was generally appointed as a Deputy Charge Superintendent, but where suitable persons were not available, the work had to be assigned to a Naib Tehsildar, a Block Development Officer or a Tehsil Education Officer, etc.

The difficulty experienced in 1941, when the powers of appointing the enumerating agency were centralised in the State Census Commissioner, was obviated this time by delegating the power to the District Census Officers under Section 4 (3) of the Census Act of 1948. The District Census Officers selected the personnel from the lists of the staff supplied by the various administrative departments which contained, among other things, full details of the qualifications of each person, the nature of his duties and the place of his posting. The lists were discussed with the departments concerned and the appointments made after considering carefully the topography of each area, the population of each village, the distance between the blocks and the number of officials available at each place. As far as possible, only matriculates were appointed as enumerators, the restriction being relaxed only in the case of experienced persons like Patwaris and Girdawars of the Revenue Department. Similarly, the cadre of supervisors was filled up by graduates and undergraduates only, though it became necessary to waive this restriction in the case of appointments made in far-flung areas, such as Karnah, Ladakh, etc. where, due to non-availability of better qualified personnel, we had to be content with matriculates only. Most of the staff thus drawn consisted of school teachers, village level workers, compounders, head-constables, foresters, agriculture assistants, patwaris, girdawars, municipal and town area employees, etc.

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The appointment letters of Deputy Charge Superintendents and Supervisors were issued by District Census Officers and of enumerators by the Charge Superintendents concerned. In the case of army, the entire enumerating agency was appointed by the District Census Officers.

3. House-numbering and houselisting.

The house numbering and houselisting operations were carried out in the autumn of 1960 except so far as the non-synchronous areas are concerned. Housenumbering was taken up first and it was followed after about 10 to 15 days by houselisting operation, the interval being used for distribution of House-list forms, etc. Training camps were organised both before the numbering of houses as also prior to the houselisting operation, the period of training being two days on each occasion. The trainees were given theoretical instructions and practical demonstrations on numbering of houses and incorporating the particulars of each structure in the Houselist form. The housenumberer was first required to record with a piece of chalk the numbers of building and of its Census houses on the entrance of the structure. When these numbers were checked and declared correct, permanent numbers were painted on the main entrance.

During the theoretical training which was imparted with the help of a black-board borrowed from the neighbouring school, the printed instruction books were also gone through along with the trainees and explanation given in respect of all such points which needed elaboration. Two of the trainees were then asked to come to the board to give a resume of the instructions and to answer questions put to them by others.

The practical training consisted of numbering or listing of about 15 houses in the

adjoining locality by each housenumberer or houselister. The work was inspected on spot and mistakes, if any, were brought to the notice of housenumberer or houselister, as the case may have been.

Trainings were usually given at a Central place so that the housenumberers and houselisters may not have to travel long distances for the purpose. In urban areas, the local bodies placed the town halls at the disposal of the Census Department. In other cases, the halls of Central Schools and High Schools were used.

The material for painting of numbers was mostly purchased by the numberers themselves. In far-flung areas, where the paint, brush, etc. could not be had locally, the supplies were procured in bulk by the Charge Superintendent concerned from the nearest town or city and the savings, if any, available from the funds sanctioned for the purpose were distributed by him among the housenumberers along with the materials.

4. Training of Census agency.

Before organising training camps of enumerators and supervisors, printed instructions for filling up of Individual Slips and Household Schedules were discussed by the Census Superintendent in meetings held at district headquarters which were, besides District Census Officers, also attended by Charge Superintendents. The object of these meetings was to clarify ambiguities and to elaborate the instructions so as to enable Charge Superintendents to address the training camps in due course. Where, however, the Charge Superintendent was not available, the work was assigned to the Deputy Charge Superintendent concerned.

Each training camp consisted of Deputy Charge Superintendent, Supervisors and Enumerators. The Census Superintendent himself addressed the largest number of camps organised at Central places in various parts of the State.

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Besides the black-boards borrowed from educational institutions, two rolled up black-boards were obtained and made use of in the camps. Arrangements had been made in advance for printing a small number of Enumeration Slips and Houselist Forms in red as distinguished from black used in the normal Census Schedules, for experimental and training purposes. Each enumerator was supplied five Household Schedules and 25 Individual Slips printed in red for practical training. The red slips and Schedules when filled up in a neighbouring village were scrutinised on spot and the mistakes brought home to the enumerators and supervisors.

Attendance at the training camps was generally excellent, the incidence of absence ranging from 1% to 2% only. This was mainly because of the order issued by the State Government declaring Census work as duty for all purposes.

5. Census count and revisional round.

The Enumeration Slips and the Household Schedules were filled up simultaneously for a period of 19 days from 10th February 1961 upto the sunrise of 1st March, 1961, the reference data for the Census of 1961. The enumeration of houseless persons was, however, taken up on the night of 28th February and 1st March, 1961. During the following five days from 1st March to 5th March the enumerators paid a second visit to their respective blocks for a revisional round so as to ascertain whether during the interval, any births and deaths had taken place or any person not already enumerated elsewhere had arrived in the block. Additional Slips were filled up to account for the new-born babies and un-enumerated persons, whereas those already filled up during the first round in respect of persons who had passed away were cancelled.

6. Enumeration of non-synchronous areas.

Except for the valley of Kashmir and some of the tehsils of Jammu Province, all other areas of the State are wholly or partly cradled in difficult mountainous regions and are inaccessible during winter on account of heavy snow-falls. It was, therefore, agreed upon in the First Census Conference that all Operations including training, house-numbering, houselisting and enumeration, etc. of these areas should be carried out before the setting in of winter. The demarcation of accessible and inaccessible areas was made in consultation with the District Census Officers and Charge Superintendents, so as to ensure that only those areas which actually remained cut off from the rest of the State were declared inaccessible. As a result, the size of these areas varied from a few villages as in the case of Anantnag to a whole district, as Ladakh.

As will be seen by a perusal of the Census Calendar, which has been reproduced elsewhere in this note, the housenumbering and houselisting operations of the inaccessible areas were completed by 15th July, 1960 and the Enumeration Slips, Household Schedules and Census Population Record were filled up by 30th September 1960. This was followed by a revisional round from 1st October to 3rd October of the same year. As the reference date of the Census was the 1st of March, 1961, the Census count of September 1960 had to be brought upto-date after accounting for the deaths, births, migrations and immigrations which might have occurred during the period from 1st October, 1960 to the sunrise of 1st March, 1961. In order, therefore, to guard against the possibility of non-enumeration or double enumeration, effective measures were taken to ensure the preparation of new slips in respect of immigrants and new births

and cancellation of slips of those who may have passed away or migrated elsewhere during the period from 1st October, 1960 to 1st March, 1961. The work of filling up of the Individual Slips for fresh births and new arrivals as also of cancelling the written slips of persons who had passed away was assigned to the local Numbardars and Patwaris who were required to submit the slips at the end of every month to the tehsildar concerned. As regards migrations, check-posts were set up at appropriate places on the routes leading to inaccessible areas and the information thus collected was transferred at the close of each month to the Charge Superintendent of the tehsil where the migrant intended to stay upto 1st March, 1961. Tokens or certificates of enumeration were also issued to all persons enumerated informing the enumerating agency of the area, to which an enumerated person might move, not to enumerate him a second time. These tokens were collected from the migrants at the Check-post and transferred to the Charge Superintendent concerned.

The total population of the snow-bound areas as on 1st March, 1961 stood at 300657 or 8.4 % of the State population.

Enumeration of special areas.

Special instructions were issued for the enumeration of floating and migratory population consisting of

- (a) people living in boats;
- (b) wood cutters and other forest workers;
- (c) nomads, such as bakerwals, shepherds and gold-washers, etc.;
- (d) pilgrims attending fairs and festivals; and
- (e) carters.

Except for a few ferrymen in Jammu rovince, who live on river banks or in

tents, boat population is concentrated in Kashmir only. These and the owners of passenger boats generally living on land were not included in floating population. Special enumerators and supervisors conversant with the habits and movements of people living in boats were appointed for their enumeration. The population was divided into separate blocks, each spreading between two fixed points of the banks of river or lake Jhelum, Dal, Wular, Anchar and Mansbal Lakes, where the boats were being moored. Where a waterway formed the boundary between two tehsils or districts, the boat population was included with the tehsil with which the bank of the waterway to which the boat was tied was located. Boats found mid-stream were got tied to one bank of the river and enumerated along with the population of the adjacent boats. As a measure to obviate double or non-enumeration, passes were issued by each enumerator to the head of the family occupying a boat certifying that the household had been enumerated. The pass was required to be produced before the enumerator of the area where the boat might move after its occupants had been enumerated so that a re-enumeration may not take place.

In the case of wood-cutters and forest workers, information was obtained in advance about the works likely to be executed in the forests in September 1960 and February 1961 together with full particulars of each place and the approximate number of workers to be engaged so that they may be accounted for while carrying out the enumeration in the accessible and non-synchronous areas. Each such locality was treated as a separate block within a demarcated forest area and placed in charge of a forester. Where the number of workers was fairly large, several blocks constituting a circle were

set up. These blocks were kept separate from the adjoining villages but were treated as additional blocks of the same tehsil. The forest population thus enumerated also included Gujjar settlements existing far within the forests and at fairly long distances from the villages.

Precautionary measures to avoid double enumeration and non-enumeration of nomads and shepherds who usually move in early spring and late autumn from one part of the State to another or who enter or leave the State during these seasons were also taken. Such of the families as were enumerated in snow-bound areas in September, 1960 were required to produce their grazing permits before the enumerators who recorded a note on the reverse of the permit to the effect that the family had been enumerated. The name of the place where the family proposed to move for winter was also ascertained and the Charge Superintendent concerned asked not to enumerate the family in February, 1961 if its grazing permit showed that it had already been enumerated. Besides the notes recorded on the grazing permits, permits were also issued by the enumerators to the heads of the nomads' families enumerated in non-synchronous areas for being produced in the areas to which they would repair in winter in case they had no permanent headquarters.

As no important fairs and festivals are held in the State in the months of September and February, when the enumeration of non-synchronous and accessible areas was undertaken, it was not felt necessary to make any elaborate arrangements for the Census of pilgrims. The Vaishnu Devi Yatra at Katra and the Amar Nath Yatra in Anantnag District which attract tens of thousands of pilgrims from within and outside the State conclude before the

months of February and September respectively. In any case, care was taken to ensure that such of the pilgrims to Vaishnu Devi who stayed on in the State in the month of February were not left out of enumeration. The cave at Amarnath is not accessible after November and the area is completely depopulated during the winter months on account of acute cold and heavy snow-falls.

The number of carters who generally travel during nights has considerably declined during the last twenty years owing to the expansion of motor transport. The few carters who were still found on the road-side were either enumerated by the enumerator concerned if they stayed on till 1st March or by the enumerator in whose block they were found on that date.

Enumeration of houseless population.

According to the instructions received from the Registrar General, the enumeration of houseless persons was carried out during the night of 28th February and 1st March, 1961. These included people found sleeping in mosques, temples, shrines, dharamsalas, road pavements, shops and the like.

Peasants from Kashmir, particularly from the districts of Anantnag and Srinagar, usually move to the plains during winter in search of employment. They stay in open areas where they cook their meals and sleep for the night. Normally, they return home in March but as the month of fasts (Ramzan) had this time started in February and the Id Festival was approaching fast, most of them returned to Kashmir towards the end of February after having been enumerated as houseless persons. Their original enumeration slips had, therefore, to be cancelled and they were re-enumerated as members of the households in the district to which they actually belonged.

While the enumeration work was in progress in the month of February, a large number of Central Asian Refugees entered Ladakh and encamped in various places in tehsil Leh. They were treated as houseless persons and enumerated along with the rest of the population of the district.

Census Calendar.

The Census programme of the State started on 9th October 1959 with a conference of Heads of Departments of the State Government, presided over by the Chief Secretary. The decisions arrived at in this Conference were incorporated by the State Government in a press-note issued by them on 13th October, 1959. Discussions were thereafter held individually with a number of Heads of Departments who issued circular letters to their respective organisations announcing the 1961 Census and setting out its broad features and importance as a national activity and emphasizing the desirability of fullest co-operation being extended to the Census Staff.

On 18-11-1959, a circular letter was addressed by the Superintendent Census to all the Deputy Commissioners inviting their attention to the instructions issued to them by the Financial Commissioner regarding the important role they had to play in the forthcoming Census and the arrangements necessary to be made for the implementation of the Census scheme. They were informed that the Census Superintendent would call at District and

Tehsil offices on specified dates and hold discussions with them and the district and tehsil officers of various administrative departments.

During these meetings which were held from 25-10-1959 to 15-4-1960, a number of important decisions were taken so as to build up the basic material required for the holding of the Census. These included the compilation of lists of inhabited and uninhabited villages, preparation of maps of districts and tehsils and General Village and Town Registers and the formation of Census Divisions.

It was felt that the old maps, though obsolete, could by being patched up together still provide much guidance and facilitate the demarcation of new boundaries. The preparation of the lists of inhabited and uninhabited villages had not been attempted at any time since the last Census was taken in 1941 although large scale migrations resulting in the complete depopulation of certain areas had taken place during and after 1947. The utility of the General Village and Town Register was brought home to the Charge Superintendents, who were advised to prepare those in accordance with the instructions contained in the circular letter of Superintendent Census issued on 24.3.1960.

In addition, a number of measures to publicise the importance of Census were taken during the period October 1959 to 1st May 1960 as indicated below :-

Census Schedules.

As indicated earlier, the schedules employed for the Census of 1961 consisted of :—

- Houselist,
- Individual Enumeration Slip, and
- Household Schedule together with the Census Population Record. The Schedules, copies of which will be found at the end of this note, were designed to collect diverse type of information on a varied number of subjects. The houselist included as many as four columns about the particulars of establishments, workshops and factories, two columns about the materials of walls and roofs and six for incorporating the population of each household, the number of rooms occupied by it, its tenure status and the name of the head of the household.

The Household Schedule dealt with only such of the households as were engaged in cultivation, or household industry or both. It was designed to collect data regarding the local name of right on land, the area under cultivation, whether owned or held from Government or held from private persons and of land given to private persons for cultivation. The details of household industry included the nature of the household industry and the number of months in the year for which the industry was being run. Part three of the schedule contains questions regarding the number of persons of each family and of hired workers who worked in cultivation or household industry or in both.

The Census Population Record printed on the reverse of the Household Schedule replaced the National Register of Citizens which was introduced at the Census of 1951.

The Enumeration Slips dealt with the social, demographic and economic particulars of each individual. It related, among other matters, to the age, sex, marital status, birth place, religion and literacy of

the person enumerated, as also full details of the nature of work in respect of persons engaged in cultivation, household industries or other vocations.

Instructions for filling up the Houselist.

Each houselister was required to record in the first instance the names and location codes of the district/tehsil/town and village/ward/mohalla/enumerator's block in the blank space provided for the purpose at the top of the Houselist form. Following is a brief summary of the instructions given for filling up the various columns of the houselist :—

Column 1: Line No: In this column, the first nine lines had already been serially numbered in consecutive order. The only figure printed in the tenth line was zero and this was followed by another ten lines, nine of which were again numbered from one to nine, the tenth being numbered zero. The enumerators were instructed to insert the second digit from the tenth line onwards thus numbering all the lines on one side of the houselist from one to twenty. This numbering was to be carried over to the following page and so on until entries in respect of all the buildings and their Census houses in a block had been recorded.

Column 2: Building No: As no building in the State including those in urban areas had been numbered by the State Government or Local Bodies, the houselisters were required to record in this column the number assigned to the building at the time of housenumbering operation.

A building was defined as the entire structure on the ground with the modification that large or long buildings along a street or lane comprising portions partitioned or sold, which had distinct and separate main exits on the road and belonged to separate owners or occupiers, were treated as separate buildings and allotted independent

numbers. Likewise, series of houses which were joined each to each by common walls on either side giving the entire structure the look of one building were, if such houses belonged to different owners and had been built at different times, also treated as separate houses. Further, all structures within an enclosed or open compound belonging to the same person, such as the main house, the servants' quarters, the garage, etc. were regarded as parts of one building and allotted only one building number.

Column 3: Building number with Census house numbers: This column was meant for recording both the building number referred to in column 2 and the number of the Census house, the particulars of which were to be recorded in the subsequent columns of this line. If, however, a building consisted of only one census house, the entry made in column 2 was merely to be repeated in this column.

A census house was defined as a structure or part of a structure, inhabited or vacant, or a dwelling, a shop, shop-cum-dwelling or a place of business, workshop, school, etc. with separate entrance. Buildings having a number of flats or blocks each with a separate entrance of its own and independent of the other giving on the road or a common staircase or a common courtyard which lead to a main gate were treated as separate census houses. Additional buildings standing in an enclosed or open compound were also treated as one or more separate census houses depending upon whether or not the various parts into which the building was partitioned by walls were independent of each other in respect of accessibility.

Column 4: Purpose for which Census house used: The particular use, to which the census house referred to in column 3 was being put, was to be recorded here.

If, however, a census house was not being put to any purpose, it was to be treated as vacant.

Census houses which were being used for manufacturing, repairing or servicing were treated as factories if registered under the Indian Factories Act, all others being recorded as workshops.

Columns 5-8: If the Census house is used as an establishment, workshop or factory: These columns were to be filled up in the case of factories and workshops only and were to be left blank so far as census houses used for other purposes are concerned.

Column 5: Name of establishment or proprietor: The enumerators were required to record in this column the name of the establishment in case the census house was a factory or a large manufacturing concern. If, however, the census house was being used as a small workshop which did not bear any distinct name, the name of the proprietor was to be written here.

Column 6: Name of product, repair or servicing undertaken: The actual work done in the factory or workshop, such as shoe-making, paper-making, cycle repairing, etc. was to be mentioned here.

Column 7: Average number of persons employed daily: The column was meant for recording the average number of workers per day for the week preceding the date of the visit of the houselister. The workers were to include the owner or proprietor and members of his family, if working, as also all other persons, apprentices, paid or unpaid, who worked in the concern.

Column 8: Kind of fuel or power if, machinery is used: The name of the type of fuel, if any, used in the factory or workshop, such as electricity, water, kerosine, soft coke, wood, lignite, etc. was to be recorded in this column.

Column 9: Material of Wall: The names of the materials used in most of the walls of the census house, such as grass, leaves, reeds, bamboo, burnt or unburnt bricks, mud, stone, cement, concrete or timber were to be recorded here. In the case of houses consisting of separate structures, each built of different materials, the material used in the walls of main bed rooms was to be noted.

Column 10: Material of roof: This column was meant for recording the material of the outer roof exposed to weather, such as tiles, thatch, corrugated iron, zinc, or asbestos cement sheets or concrete, etc. It was made clear that a ceiling was not to be treated as a roof except that in the case of a multi-storeyed building, the intermediate floor or floors were to be regarded as roofs of the lower floor.

Column 11: Sub number of each Census household with Census housenumber: If a census house was occupied by more than one household, each of these was required to be allotted a separate number indicated by alphabets suffixed to the building and census housenumber. This composite number was to be recorded in this column.

A household was defined as a group of persons who commonly live together unless the exigencies of work prevented any of them from doing so.

Column 12: Name of head of household: This column was meant for recording the name of the head of household referred to in column 11. In the case of institutional population, such as a boarding house, hotel, etc., whose occupants have no ties of relationship with each other, the manager or the Superintendent was to be treated as the head of the household.

Column 13: Number of rooms in Census household: A room was defined as a structure having four walls with a doorway and

a roof over head provided it was wide and long enough for a person to sleep in. The enumerators were instructed to make sure that the length of the room was not less than six feet. Un-enclosed varandahs, kitchen, store, garage, cattle-shed and latrine, etc. were not allowed to be treated as rooms.

Where a census house was occupied by a number of households, the number of rooms occupied by each was required to be entered in each line against the name of the concerned head of the household.

Column 14: Does the household live in owned or rented house: In the case of census houses occupied by owned households, the enumerators were required to record 'O' in this column. If, however, the accommodation was a rented one, this was to be indicated by recording the letter 'R'.

Public buildings occupied by schools, hospitals, etc. were to be denoted by writing 'X' in this column.

Columns 15-17: Number of persons residing in Census household on the day of visit: These columns were meant for recording the number of males, females and total population of the household referred to in column 11.

Column 18: Remarks: The column was meant for recording such other useful or significant information about the building or the census house or the census household that had not been entered in any other column. For instance, if the census house was a shop, the name of its proprietor/owner was to be recorded here. In the case of census houses found vacant at the time of houselisting about which there was reason to believe that they would be occupied in the course of a few days and almost certainly before the census enumeration period, the enumerator was required to record "vacant and likely to be occupied shortly."

Instructions for filling up Individual Slip.

Before obtaining answers to the questions given on the Individual slip, every enumerator was required to write at the top of the slip the location code consisting of the number of the district, tehsil/town, village/mohalla and of the block, if the village/mohalla had been subdivided into more than one block, as also the number of the building, the census house and the household.

Question 1. (a): Name : The enumerator was asked to record the name of the person enumerated in this column. Women whose names were not disclosed were described as the wife, mother, daughter of such and such person. For newly-born infants, who had not been given any name till the time of the enumeration, the word 'baby' and the name of the father or mother were recorded.

Question 1 (b): Relationship to the head of the household: For the head of the household, the word 'head' was written against this. For all others, the relationship, which each person bore to the head of the household, was written. If the household included visitors, boarders, etc., the enumerators were asked to record here the word 'Visitor', 'Boarder' or 'Employee, as the case may have been. So far as boarding houses, hotels, messes, etc., where people

living together are unrelated to each other are concerned, the word 'unrelated' was recorded against this question.

Question 2: Age: The age of the person enumerated as it stood on his/her last birthday was recorded here. The age of infants less than one year old was treated as zero.

Question 3: Marital Status: Abbreviations were supplied to the enumerators for recording replies to the question. Thus the letters 'NM' were used for a person never married and 'M' for those married, whether for the first or another time, as also for others recognised by custom or society as married, and for persons in defacto union. Similarly, 'W' was written for a widowed person whose husband or wife was dead and who had not been married again. The fact that the person enumerated had been divorced in a lawful manner but had not re-married or that he/she had been separated from his/her wife or husband and was living apart with no apparent intension of living together again was indicated by recording the letter 'S' in this column. The marital status of a prostitute was recorded the same as declared by her.

Question 4 (a): Birthplace : The following abbreviations were used for answering this question :—

Name of the District and the State

Name of the country

Question 4 (b): Whether born in village or town : Persons born in a village were indicated by letter 'R' and those born in a town by the letter 'U'. For this purpose, the place of birth if considered a town at the time of the visit of the enumerator had to be treated as such even if it was not treated as a town when the person enumerated was born.

Question 4 (c): Duration of Residence: The duration of residence of persons born in the village, town or city of enumeration was recorded as 'X'. For others, the actual number of completed years was written. The fact that the duration of residence of the person enumerated was less than one year was indicated by 'O'. Periods of temporary absence on leave, holiday, tour or business were not taken into account.

Question 5 (a): Nationality : The name of the nationality was written in full in respect of all persons other than Indian Nationals. Persons of Indian Nationality were indicated by the letter 'I'.

Question 5 (b): Religion : The fact that the person enumerated was a Hindu, Muslim, Christian, Jain, Buddhist or Sikh was indicated by the letters 'H', 'M', 'C', 'J', 'B' and 'S' respectively. For all others, the answers actually returned were to be recorded.

Question 5 (c): Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes : There being no Schedule Tribes in Jammu and Kashmir, instructions in respect of this question were confined to the answers to be recorded for members of Scheduled Castes only. The enumerators were supplied with a list of recognised castes and instructed to record the name of the caste returned by the person enumerated. The use of general terms, such as Harijan, Achhut, etc., was disallowed. As for persons not belonging to Scheduled

Castes, the enumerators were asked to record 'X' in this column. It was also made clear to them that Scheduled Castes belong to Hindu and Sikh communities only and that no person belonging to other religions should be shown as a member of Scheduled Caste.

Question 6: Literacy and Education : I. Literacy—Here again, abbreviations were used, the letter 'O' being used for those who could neither read nor write or who could merely read but could not write in any language. For persons who could both read and write, the letter 'L' was used.

II. Standard of Education : In the case of literate persons who could not only read and write but had also passed some written examination, the highest examination passed was recorded in this question instead of Letter 'L'.

Question 7 (a): Mother-tongue : The mother-tongue including the dialect returned by the person enumerated was to be recorded here. Mother-tongue was defined as a language spoken in childhood by the person's mother to the person or mainly spoken in the household.

Question 7 (b): Any other language: If a person did not know any language other than his mother-tongue, the enumerators were asked to write 'X' in this column. As regards others, who could speak in other language or languages also, names of the languages not exceeding two were to be written.

Question 8 to 11: Working : These questions apply to workers only. A person, who was working, might be a cultivator, an agricultural labourer or working in a household industry or doing some other work. If so, necessary entries had to be made in cols. 8, 9, 10 and 11 accordingly. It was explained that there might be

persons engaged in more than one of these four categories, such as a person working both as a cultivator and an agricultural labourer. In such cases, entries had to be made both in questions 8 and 9 of this slip. There may be other persons working both as cultivators and also at household industry in which case entries had to be made both in question 8 and and question 10. Further, there may be still others who may be working in any possible combination of questions 8, 9, 10 and 11. In such cases, entries had to be made against all the relevant questions.

The basis of work for those engaged in seasonal works, such as cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., was that the person should have had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season. In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business, etc., the criterion to determine whether the person should be treated as a worker was that he should have been employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the date of his enumeration, even though he may have been found unemployed when the enumerator paid a second visit in connection with the revisional round.

It was also made clear to the enumerators that work did not include only actual work but also effective supervision and direction of work. They were also asked to treat as workers, persons under training as apprentices whether or not they were being paid any stipends or wages.

Adult women were also treated as workers if, besides attending to household duties, if any, they were engaged in such other work as rice pounding for sale or wages or in domestic service for wages or selling fire-wood and the like.

Beggars, pensioners, agriculturists or non-agriculturists, royalty, rent or dividend receivers who might be earning without participating in any productive work were not to be treated as workers unless they also worked in cultivation, industry, trade, profession, business or commerce, etc.

A public or social service worker actively engaged in public service activity or a political worker engaged in furthering the political activity of his party was also to be treated as a worker and entered in question 11.

Question 8 : Working as Cultivator : The fact that the person enumerated was working as a cultivator was denoted by writing letter 'C' against this question. If however the person enumerated was not working as a cultivator or was not working at all the enumerators were asked to write the letter 'X' here.

Question 9 : Working as agricultural labourer : A person working in another person's land for wages in money, kind or share was defined as an agricultural labourer provided he had no right or lease or contract on the land on which he worked. In such cases, the letters 'AL' were written against this question. For all others, 'X' was recorded.

Questions 10 (a) and 10 (b) : Household Industry : Except for persons, who were engaged in a household industry, the letter 'X' was entered in both these questions in respect of all other persons. If the person enumerated was working in a household industry, the nature of the work done by him was recorded in question 10 (a) and of the nature of the household industry against question 10 (b).

A household industry was defined as an industry conducted by the head of the household himself and/or mainly members of the household at home or with-

in the village in rural areas and only at home in urban areas provided further that the industry was not being run on the scale of a registered factory and that it related to production, processing, servicing, repairing or making and selling of goods and did not include professions, such as a pleader or doctor or barber, etc.

Question 10 (c) : If employee in household industry : A person working as a paid employee in another person's household industry was treated as an employee and this was indicated by writing the letters 'EE' against question 10 (C). For all others, 'X' was written.

Question 11 : Doing work other than that referred to in questions, 8, 9 or 10: The enumerators were instructed to record against this question the actual work which the person enumerated was doing if he was not working as a cultivator or as an agricultural labourer or at any household industry. If, however, besides working as a cultivator or as an agricultural labourer or at household industry, the person enumerated was doing some other work (including dairying or livestock raising, the orchard or plantation, etc. as distinct from cultivation of crops) which did not relate to any of the above categories, the enumerator was asked to note the name of the other work against this question. Where the person enumerated was engaged in more than one work, none of which related to any of the three categories mentioned above, the work on which he devoted more time was recorded here.

Question 11 (a) : Nature of Work : Except for persons not working or who work only as cultivators or agricultural labourers or at household industry in whose case the letter 'X' had to be recorded here, the enumerators were instructed to describe fully the nature of the work done

by the person enumerated giving complete and precise information regarding his assignment.

Question 11 (b) : Industry, business, trade, profession or service : This part of the question was required to be filled up in respect of persons whose nature of work had been recorded in question 11 (a). The enumerators were asked to avoid recording vague answers and to describe in detail the nature of industry, business, trade, profession or service in which the person enumerated worked. In the case of industries, for instance, he was asked to mention the articles which were being produced or serviced or repaired. If more than one article was being produced, the enumerators were asked to note the name of the chief article produced or serviced or repaired. Similarly, the principal article of trade was required to be mentioned in respect of persons engaged in business or trade. If the person enumerated was an employee, the nature of the service to which he belonged was to be described here.

The letter 'X' had to be repeated against this question also in the case of a person in whose slip 'X' had been written in question 11 (a).

Following are some of the important instructions given to the enumerators to ensure collection of correct information in respect of question 11 (a) and 11 (b) :—

(1) Women or children who help with work, such as rice pounding or doing domestic service for wages or minding cattle or selling firewood or making and selling cowdung cakes, grass, etc. should be described fully even if they work part-time. In the case of married or grown-up women who do any of the work mentioned above in addition to the usual household duties such work should

be fully described and 'HW' written in brackets after the full description.

(2) If a person makes the articles he sells, he should be entered as maker and seller of them.

(3) The following are too vague and must not be used by themselves :

Scientist, technician, civil servant, clerk, engineer, inspector, checker, foreman, overseer, supervisor, labourer, machinist, assistant, contractor, polisher.

(4) Labourers : For an unskilled labourer usually employed on one sort of work alone, the kind of work done, e.g., railway porter, market or bazar porter, labourer employed on road digging, brick-layer's labourer, etc. should be given.

(5) Shop-keepers, Retail Dealers, Shop Assistants : If the person enumerated is wholly or mainly engaged in selling, write, 'Dealer' (if principal), or Shop Assistant or Salesman (if assisting) against Question 11 (a) and state whether the business is wholesale or retail or both.

(6) Transport Workers : The nature of the transport, e.g., air transport, rail transport, transport by motor car or motor cycle, or vehicles drawn by horse, etc. should be written in full.

(7) Services : For a person engaged in the Defence Services 'Service of Central Government' should be recorded.

(8) Domestic Services : In the case of a private servant, e.g., a cook or domestic servant, 'private cook or domestic servant' should be written as the nature of work.

(9) Commerce : Special care should be taken to see that the distinction between retail and wholesale business is clear. Further, as in the case of industries, the goods handled should be clearly indicated.

Question 11 (c) : Class of Worker :

The following abbreviations were used for various classes of workers :—

MR for an employer; EE for an employee; SW for single worker; and FW for family worker.

An employer was defined as a person who hires one or more persons in his work described in question 11 (a).

If the person enumerated did the work described in question 11 (a) under others for wages or salary, he was to be treated as an employee.

A single worker was a person doing his work described question 11 (a) without employing others except casually and without the help of other members of the family except casually. Single workers did not include the head of household in a household industry. A person who worked as a member of a producers' co-operative or in joint partnership with one or several persons hiring no employees was also to be treated as a single worker.

A family worker was defined as one who worked without receiving wages in cash or kind in his own family in an industry, business or trade conducted mainly by members of family. Such of the members of the household as attended to household duties only were not to be treated as family workers.

The letter 'X' was to be recorded in this part of the question also on the slips of persons in whose case 'X' had been written against question 11 (a) and 11 (b).

Question 11 (d) : Name of establishment : Against this question, the name of the factory, workshop, business house, company, shop, etc. was to be described in detail. In the case of persons with no fixed place of work, the enumerators were asked to write 'No fixed place of work.'

The letter 'X' was to be repeated against

this question so far as persons in whose slips 'X' had been recorded in questions 11 (a), 11 (b) and 11 (c).

Principal work : The enumerators were further asked to ascertain from the person enumerated the name of the work on which he spent most of his time in case he was engaged in more than one activity. This was to be regarded as the principal work and the enumerators were instructed to put a ring round the number of one of the questions, 8, 9, 10 or 11, which referred to the principal work according to the answer given by the person enumerated.

Question 12 : Activity if not working : If the person enumerated was a worker, the enumerator was required to write 'X' against this question. Non-workers were divided into eight different categories, each being indicated by the abbreviations prescribed for it as indicated below :—

1. For a full-time student or child attending school who does no other work, such as make articles at home for sale, nor even help part-time in his own family cultivation, industry, trade or business ...ST
2. For a person engaged in unpaid home duties (like housewife or other adult female) who does no other work, such as make articles at home for sale or wages, nor help regularly even part-time in family cultivation, industry, trade or business ...HW
3. For any dependent, including an infant or child not attending school, a person permanently disabled from work because of illness or old age ...D
4. For a retired person who is not employed again, rentier, person living on agricultural or non-agricultural ...

royalty, rent or dividend, or any other person of independent means for securing which he does not have to work and who does no other work ...R

5. For a beggar, vagrant or independent woman without indication of source of income and others of unspecified source of existence ...B

6. For a convict in jail (an undertrial prisoner was to be shown as a worker if he used to work before he was apprehended) or an inmate of a penal, mental or charitable institution ...I

7. For a person who has not been employed before but is seeking employment for the first time ...NE

8. For a person employed before but now out of employment and seeking employment ...UN

If a non-worker could not be readily classified in any of the above categories, he was to be included in category 5 and letter 'B' written against this question of his slip.

Question 13 : Sex : The letter 'M' or 'F' was to be written on the slips of males and females respectively, as the case may be. For eunuchs and hermaphrodites, the letter 'M' was to be used.

Instructions for filling up of Household Schedules.

A brief summary of the instructions issued for filling up the Household Schedules is given below :—

To begin with, the enumerators were required to record on the blank space provided for the purpose, the location code of the household consisting of the number of district / tehsil / town / village / mohalla / block / building / Census house / household. The household number was

to be supplied by the supervisor from the houselist concerned.

If the household was an institution, such as a penal, charitable or mental institution, hostel, hotel, hospital, boarding house, etc. the enumerator was required to record the nature of the institution, viz, jail, hospital, etc., in the rectangle at the right hand corner of the location code.

The name of the head of the household was to be written next in the blank space immediately below that provided for location code. For purposes of census, a head of the household was defined as a person who shouldered the chief responsibility for the maintenance of the household. In the case of institutions, the manager or superintendent or the person who was regarded by common consent as the head was to be treated as the head.

If the head of the household was a member of any Scheduled Caste obtaining in Jammu and Kashmir or in the district of enumeration, the fact was to be indicated by writing the letters 'SC' within the parallelogram printed at the right hand side of the schedule against the full name of the head of the household marked 'SC/ST'. It was made clear to enumerators that there are no scheduled tribes in the State. In the case of those not belonging to any Scheduled Caste, the enumerators were instructed to write 'X' in the parallelogram.

As will be seen from the household schedule, it consists of three parts, viz., cultivation, household industry and workers at cultivation or household industry.

Sub-part A relating to cultivation was to be filled in only where the household cultivated land. Three categories of land are given in items 1(I), 1(II) and 2 of this part. It was made clear that items 1(I) and 1(II) relate to land actually cul-

tivated by the household and that item 2 refers to such land which is not cultivated by the household, but has been given by it to private persons for cultivation for payment in money, kind or share. In each of the three cases, the total of separate plots or parcels of land in different places, owned or held or taken or given were to be made and entered. If a household (a) cultivated land owned or held from Government or taken from private persons or institutions or (b) had given land to private persons or institutions, the local name of the right on such land was required to be ascertained and recorded in the column relating to 'local name of right on land.'

Categories 1(I) and 1(II) were to include only those plots and parcels of land which were cultivated by the household itself, i.e., lands which lie within the village or in adjacent villages, or within such a distance as would enable the household to work on the land or actively supervise the cultivation. Lands owned or held in distant places where distance itself was bar to active cultivation or its supervision or direction were not to be included in either of these items. On the other hand, category two was to include land in any part of the country, whatsoever.

The enumerators were asked to ascertain the extent of land in each category of local right in acres and to record the same in the column relating to 'area in acres.' In the case of separate plots or parcels of land under the same right situated in different places, the aggregate area was to be written.

This sub-part did not apply to households which did not possess any land. Thus, it did not apply to households consisting of agricultural labourers only without any land. In such case, an 'X' was to be recorded in all the spaces provided in the

right hand side and a bold cross was to be drawn on the sub-part.

Sub-part B relates to household industry. This part was to be filled up only where a household industry was being conducted by the head of the household himself and/or mainly by members of the household at home or within the village in rural areas and at home only in urban areas. The enumerators were instructed not to treat as a household industry, an industry which was of the scale of a registered factory. It was also made clear that a household industry should satisfy the following three tests :—

- (a) It should embrace manufacture, processing or servicing and may include sale but should not be confined to buying and selling only ;
- (b) It should be on the household scale where the workers mainly will be the head of the household himself and members of the household, the role of hired workers from outside being of secondary importance ; and
- (c) In the case of a village where free movement of members of the household to facilitate their participation is possible, the industry should be located at home or within the village. For urban areas, however, the location of the household industry at home was to be treated as an indispensable condition.

The enumerators were asked to ascertain from the head of the household whether there were any household industries and, if so, to write the nature of industry (S) in the column provided for the purpose. He was next to enquire the number of months in a year for which they were being conducted and to record the same in the appropriate column.

If no household industry was being

conducted by a household, the enumerators were required to write 'X' in each of the places in the right hand corner and to put a bold cross on the sub-part.

Sub-part C: In the case of households engaged only in cultivation, if the head of the household was working, the figure '1' was to be written under the column 'head'. Similarly, the numbers of male and female members of the family who were also working in cultivation were to be recorded in the respective columns provided for the purpose. The total of all the three columns was to be recorded next. The enumerator was next to ascertain the number of hired workers, if any, employed and to enter the same in the last column. It was, however, impressed on the enumerators that a hired worker was a person who was in whole-time employment during the last or the current working season.

Similar entries were also to be made in the case of households engaged in household industry only.

If a household was engaged both in cultivation and household industry and not in one of these only, the digit '1' for the head of the household and the sex-wise number of family workers, if working, were to be written in the appropriate columns against item 3. The total of all the family workers including the head of the household was to be recorded next. Here again, the number of hired workers engaged by the family both for cultivation and household industry, if any, was to be noted in the last column against this item.

The letter 'X' was required to be written in all the columns against "household industry only" and "both in household cultivation and household industry" in the case of such of the households as were engaged in cultivation only. Similarly, the letter 'X' was to be written in the columns

relating to "household cultivation only" and both in "household cultivation and household industry" in respect of households engaged in household industry only. With regard to the third category, namely, households engaged both in cultivation and household industry, the letter 'X' was to be entered in the columns against 'household cultivation only' and 'household industry only'. Where, however, the household was not engaged in household cultivation or in household industry or in both, letter 'X' was to be recorded in all the columns of the three categories and a bold 'X' drawn across the sub-part.

After filling up the household schedule, the enumerator was required to make necessary entries in the Census Population Record printed on the reverse of the household schedule. The total number of males and females in the household was then worked out and checked with the number of enumeration slip.

Preservation of block maps, house-lists and household schedules.

I. Block maps : Notional maps of the census blocks were got prepared by the enumerators indicating the demarcations and boundaries of the block, its physical features and the location of houses, streets, roads, dispensaries, schools, offices, cemeteries, graveyards, etc., etc. The maps have been arranged one below the other in the ascending order of their location code numbers. The same procedure has also been followed in respect of the block maps of towns and cities of each tehsil. The maps of the tehsils and districts which have likewise been placed in the ascending order of their location code numbers will be bound in volumes and preserved in the office of the Superintendent of Census operations.

II. Houselists : Houselists were got prepared in duplicate. One copy which was

used in the Tabulation Office is being handed over to the Collector of the concerned district for being deposited in the Revenue Record Room till the next Census. The other copy will be transferred to the Panchayat concerned by the Charge Superintendents.

III. Household Schedules : As in the case of houselists, the household schedules will also be deposited in the Collector's office.

Unique Features of 1961 Census.

Following are some of the distinguishing features of the 1961 Census :—

1. Block maps. The preparation of notional maps of the blocks has gone a long way in facilitating the work of enumeration. The maps clearly defined the jurisdiction of each enumerator, eliminating the possibility of overlappings of jurisdiction of different enumerators functioning in contiguous areas. The maps also enabled the enumerators to make sure that no house was left out of enumeration or enumerated more than once.

2. Houselists and housing tables: The housing census taken in 1961 for the first time in Indian Census History is, in view of the elaborate and comprehensive statistics collected, perhaps an attempt of the first kind made by any other country so far. The data provides not only valuable statistics about the housing conditions obtaining in the country, but also throws a flood light on the character and disposition of industrial establishments operating in various areas. Uniform houselists and housing tables have been prepared for all States to facilitate a comparative study of housing conditions, the materials employed in construction, the tenure status of the households, the nature of goods produced, serviced or repaired in workshops or factories, the type of fuel used and the number of workers employed, etc., etc.

3. Household Schedule and Census

Population Record: The household schedule is an innovation of 1961 census. The practice followed at the previous census was to confine the enquiry to the individual only, whereas in 1961, besides the individual, the household has also been taken as an entity or a unit of enumeration for the purpose of collecting data in respect of the principal economic activity of the household, namely, cultivation and household industry. It is a known fact that in a country, such as ours, where not all the goods produced in a household enter the money market and where most of the goods produced are consumed by the family itself, collection of information purely on the basis of individuals would have tended to be slightly misleading unless such information were also supplemented by additional data relating to the economic activities of the household as a unit of enumeration. Cultivation and household industry being the predominant activities of households almost in all parts of the country; the household schedule was designed for the collection of data in respect of these activities only.

The importance of the household schedule is also obvious in the context of the local conditions obtaining in this country. As is known, the various operations connected with cultivation are attended by several members of the household right from the time of ploughing lands until the crops are harvested and deposited in the godowns. Likewise, a household industry is a joint enterprise of several members of the family. In the case of handloom weaving, for instance, the female members usually spin the yarn, while the males prepare the warp and woof and attend to actual weaving. In order, therefore, to make an assessment of family economy, it was necessary to treat the household as a unit of enumeration in respect of the predominant activities in which large majority of the households are engaged.

The Census Population Record which gives information in respect of each individual of the household replaces the National Register of Citizens introduced at the Census of 1951. If this data is brought upto-date by periodical revision, it will prove of immense use for selection of samples for future surveys.

4.B-Series or Household Economic Tables: These tables have also been introduced for first time. The practice followed in the past was to lay stress on income or economic independence, there being only two categories of persons, namely, those who were economically independent and others who were not. An intermediate category of semi-independent persons known as working dependants, partly dependants and earning dependants was, however, introduced at the Censuses of 1931, 1941 and 1951 respectively. In the present Census, a departure has been made from this criterion in that emphasis has been laid on the work done and not on income, so that all those who work including members of the family who did not receive any wages were included as workers. This departure will make a definite improvement in the procedure employed to assess the economic characteristics of the country.

There are eight household economic tables in all which give information in respect of the land under cultivation, nature of household industry, period of working in the household industry and the number of persons employed as family workers or hired workers. Unlike other states, where household economic tables were prepared by Mechanical Tabulation all the tables of this State were tabulated by hand sorting in the Tabulation Office, Srinagar. The tabulation was, however, confined to 20% sample only as in other States.

Industrial and Occupational Classification.

While no Census was held in Jammu and Kashmir in 1951, elsewhere the Indian Economic Classification consisting of 10 divisions and 88 subdivisions of industries and services was introduced at the last Census. As observed by the Registrar General, this was "neither a purely industrial nor occupational classification of the population but was a combination of both". In the present Census, we have adopted the classification given in the National Classification of Occupations and the Standard Industrial Classification adopted by the Government of India. The economic activities have been divided into 9 divisions, 45 major groups and 343 minor groups with 331 occupational groups for which, sex-wise figures have been tabulated. The slips and the schedules were pre-coded both for industrial and occupational classifications before sorting was undertaken. The industrial and occupational divisions were cross tabulated by educational standards. In the case of urban areas, the occupational divisions were further tabulated by broad age-groups.

Special migration tables.

These consist of six tables of which four have been introduced at the Census of 1961, the other two, namely, D-I and D-II, being the only tables prepared in 1951. Further, the data given in these tables in the past related to inter-State migrations only, whereas this time inter-district migrations have also been tabulated to facilitate the assessment of the growth of population in each district. Tables D-III and D-V give the trends and size of migrations between the rural and urban sectors of the State. Further, two tables, one classified by occupational groups and educational standards and the other by industrial categories of workers, have also been prepared to

highlight the occupations which attract migrants.

An important feature of table D-III is that it gives the duration of residence at the place of enumeration of persons born outside the place of enumeration. For this purpose, migrants have been classified into six groups according to the duration of their residence, viz. (1) less than one year, (2) 1-5 years, (3) 6-10 years, (4) 11-15 years, (5) 16+ and (6) period not stated.

Tables for Scheduled Castes.

No special tables were being prepared at the previous censuses in respect of persons belonging to Scheduled Castes. The only table prepared in 1951 was table D-III which gave the lists of Scheduled Castes and their population by districts. This information was considered inadequate in view of the special safeguards provided in the Constitution for the uplift of the members of the Scheduled Castes. Special tables were, therefore, devised this time so that besides the population figures of each caste, information regarding religion, age, marital status, education and industrial category may also be made available.

Age Classification.

The age tables of 1951 census were prepared on the basis of 10% sample only. This time they have been prepared for full count which adopt the quinquennial age-groups recommended by the United Nations Organisation for population Census. The broad age-groups adopted are 0-14, 15-34, 35-59, and 60 and over. In addition, a single year age table has also been prepared for compilation of life tables.

Classification by educational qualifications.

One of the special features of the 1961 census is the industrial classification of workers and non-workers by educational

standards. The literacy statistics have been classified this time by different age-groups and broad educational levels separately for the rural and urban areas. So far as the rural sector is concerned, literates have been divided into three groups, viz. (a) literate without educational levels, (b) primary or junior basic and (c) matriculation and above. In the case of urban areas, however, a more comprehensive classification has been attempted. This consists of :-

- (a) Literate without educational level
- (b) Primary or Junior Basic
- (c) Matriculation or Higher Secondary
- (d) Technical diploma not equal to degree
- (e) Non-technical diploma not equal to degree
- (f) University degree or post-graduate degree other than technical degree
- (g) Technical degree or diploma equal to degree or post graduate degree,

Classification of non-workers

Yet another special feature of the 1961 census in the classification of non-workers according to one or the other of the eight

activities under which they were enumerated. These are :—

- (a) a full-time student or child attending school who does no other work,
- (b) house-wife or other person engaged in unpaid house duties who does no other work nor help the family in household cultivation, household industry, trade, business, profession or service,
- (c) a dependant, such as an infant or a person permanently disabled or in old age,
- (d) a retired person, rentier and such other person who lives on agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend without doing any work,
- (e) a beggar, vagrant and a woman without a visible source of income,
- (f) an inmate of jails, penal, mental or charitable institutions,
- (g) a person who has not been employed before but is seeking employment for the first time, and
- (h) a person employed before but now out of employment and seeking work.

AREA, HOUSES AND POPULATION

By the year 1911, the State was divided into 13 Districts by carving out of 3 new districts, one in each of the 3 administrative divisions. During this period, the area of the State seems to have been re-assessed and fixed at 84,432 sq. miles, as mentioned in the Census Report of 1911. The district-wise division of the state and the area comprising

At the next Census held in 1921, however, the area of the State was again reduced to 84,258 square miles on the advice of the Survey of India. This has been explained by the then Census Commissioner in the following words :—

“The present area figures have been revised on the basis of information obtained from the Survey Department of the Government of India. The resultant decrease at this Census is 174½ square miles.”

On comparing Provisional Table 1 of the Census Report of 1911 and 1921, it appears that the decrease of 174 square miles is due to the area of—

(a) Kashmir Province having been adopted at 8433 square miles instead of 8533, and of

(b) Jammu Province at 12439 square miles instead of 12165 square miles.

The area of the State again fluctuated between 1921 and 1931. The Report for 1931 shows that the area of the State was placed at 84,471 square miles, involving an increase of 213 square miles over the corresponding figure of 1921. This variation is reflected in District Udhampur and the explanation given by the then Census Commissioner according to the version of Officer Incharge No. 6, Drawing Office of the Survey of India is reproduced below :—

“Officer Incharge No. 1 Party supplied figures only for the area covered by Modern Surveys while I supplied the figures both for the area covered by the Modern Surveys as well as for that which is yet uncovered. In other words, Officer Incharge No. 1 Party gave figures for a portion of the District while I have given for the whole.”

During the inter-Census period 1921-1931, no change was made in the districts of Kashmir Province and Frontier Illaqa except that Kashmir North was known as Baramulla and the headquarters of Kashmir South were shifted from Anantnag to Srinagar. In Jammu Province, however, the Jagir of Bhaderwah was merged with the District of Udhampur and a new district consisting of Chenani Jagir was established. The headquarters of District Kathua were also shifted from Jasrota to Kathua proper and the district was named after its new headquarter.

In 1941, the Census Commissioner of India placed the area of the State at 82,258 square miles on the advice of the Survey of India. The variation between the 1931 area figure of 84,471 square miles and 82,258 square

miles adopted by the Census Commissioner of India was brought to the notice of the State Government by the then State Census Commissioner in his letter No. 118/8-41 dated 29-9-1941. The resultant decrease of 2213 square miles was ascribed partly to an increase of 112 square miles resulting from the survey conducted during 1931-41 of the north boundary of Gilgit (Leased Area) and partly to the decrease of 2,325 square miles caused by the re-alignment of North-west Frontier Province (Gilgit Agency) in 1934 on the transfer to the North-west Frontier Province of Indus-Kohistan. The State Census Commissioner was however advised by the State Government to repeat the figure of 84,471 square miles in the Census Report of 1941 and action was taken by him accordingly.

The Director, Map Publication, Survey of India has now intimated that the Census map of India appearing after page 22 of Census of India, 1941 Volume I, India, part I, Tables by M. W. M. Yeatts does not show the northern portion of the State boundary constituting the external boundary of India. He has added that the area figures of the State as supplied by the Directorate of Map Publication prior to 1959 were based on the boundary information shown on the above map and were only estimates for the northern districts which were uncovered by Modern Surveys or by large scale maps. The Directorate is now in possession of ¼" maps covering the area with the external boundary marked on them and the correct area of the State as arrived at after fresh planimetry on these maps stands at 86,023 square miles. The Census map of Jammu and Kashmir State appearing in Census of India 1931, Volume XXIV Jammu and Kashmir State, Part I is also said to be a sketch map which, so far as the external boundary of the State is concerned, is in the words of the Directo-

rate of Map Publication grossly in error all round.

During the inter-Census period 1931-41, the districts were re-organized and their number was raised to 14. The names of the districts and the area of each are given below :—

It will be seen from the above that the main change effected during the decade was that a new district was set up with headquarters at Astore and the name of the Frontier Illaqa was changed to Gilgit Leased Area.

There was no Census in 1951 owing to disturbed conditions obtaining then in this State. In 1948, the State was split up by the Cease-fire Line due to which the area shrunk by about 33,000 square miles. While some of the districts, such as Udhampur, Jammu, Kathua and Anantnag, remained unaffected by this division, the jurisdictions of others

fell either wholly or partly on the other side of the Cease-fire Line. The Districts of Astore, Gilgit and Gilgit Leased Area and the major part of Mirpur got detached. In the case of Ladakh district, the whole of Tehsil Skardu and a part of Tehsil Kargil passed on to the other side. The Tehsils of Bagh and Palendari and a number of villages of Poonch Jagir also met the same fate.

After the splitting up of the State, two new districts were set up, one with the headquarters at Srinagar and the other at Doda. The Poonch Jagir was merged with the State and constituted into a full-fledged districts with headquarters at first at Rajouri and later on at Poonch. Parts of the districts of Mirpur and Muzaffarabad which fell on this side of the Cease-fire Line were merged with the contiguous districts of Jammu, Poonch and Baramulla.

By the year 1961, when the Census was held, the State had been divided into 9 districts, 5 in Jammu Province, 3 in Kashmir and one in Ladakh. The district of Doda was carved out by detaching certain Tehsils and parts of Tehsils from the district of Udhampur and some villages of district Reasi. Similarly, Srinagar district was constituted by the transfer of some Tehsils of Anantnag district and certain areas of District Baramulla.

2. Effect of States Reorganization in 1956.

The boundaries of the State as demarcated by the Cease-fire Line have not undergone any change after 1948. The terms of reference of the States Reorganization Commission of 1956 did not extend to the State of Jammu and Kashmir and there was therefore no change in the boundaries of 1947 as a result of the acceptance of the recommendations made by this commission.

3. Figures of Surveyor General & D. L. R. & S.

The area figures of the districts except Kathua, which has not undergone any change since 1941, have not been assessed so far by the State Survey Department. Provisional figures have however been worked out by the Directorate of Map Publication, Dehra Dun, by fresh planimetry on the basis of the boundary alignments supplied to him by this office and stand as under :—

It will thus be seen that the aggregate area of the State on this side of the Cease-fire line stands at 53664.9 or 53665 square miles.

4. Full account of Changes in jurisdictions in State.

The jurisdictional changes effected during the inter-Census period 1941-61 were not limited to districts only. Five new tehsils with headquarters at Sopore, Sonawari and Ganderbal in Kashmir and Doda and Nowshehra in Jammu Province were set up by patching together certain areas transferred from the adjoining Tehsils. A detailed account of the changes effected with special reference to Gazette Notifications under which these were ordered is appended.

5. Critical Survey of Changes in Jurisdictions.

(1) The creation of some of the new

districts and tehsils was obviously necessitated by the splitting up of the State and consequent fragmentation of the old districts and tehsils. While this is particularly true of such of the districts as Poonch and Muzaffarabad and the tehsils of Haveli, Mendhar, Karnah and Uri of which these were previously constituted, the remnants of the old districts and tehsils now on the other side of the Cease-fire Line had also to be merged with the adjoining administrative units. Thus, the creation of tehsil Nowshehra became inevitable for the administration of 57 villages of the Pak occupied Tehsil of Bhimber. Another reason that weighed with the Government to enforce the jurisdictional changes was the abolition of Jagirs which did not previously fall in any district administered by the State. This is true of the Jagir of Chenani which was merged with district Udhampur and of the Jagir of Poonch which together with tehsils of Rajouri and Nowshehra now constitutes a full-fledged district.

(2) There have been other important reasons also which account for the birth of new districts and tehsils. Some of the old charges, such as districts of Anantnag and Udhampur, were too unwieldy extending to vast areas most of which were hilly and inaccessible. The people had to travel long distances involving journeys for several days to reach the district headquarter. As a result, the judicial and revenue work accumulated in the district and tehsil courts and the administration of justice was inordinately delayed. Udhampur district as then constituted covered an area of 5,070 square miles and measured about 130 miles north to south. The district headquarter was located at a distance of 96 miles from Kishtwar and 77 miles from Banihal. It consisted of 5 tehsils some of which extended to several thousand square miles of difficult mountainous terrain. Further, the area on

the right bank of river Chenab from Batote onwards is inhabited by people whose social and cultural life is easily distinguishable from those living in other parts of the district. In view of this and particularly in the interest of efficient and expeditious execution of the developmental plans, the bifurcation of the district was an indispensable necessity. The new district was headquartered at Doda and with its creation, a new tehsil was also set up with its headquarters at the same place. The splitting up of the two districts and the creation of two more districts has gone a long way to relieve the inhabitants of the inconvenience experienced by them in the past and to ensure expeditious transaction of Government business.

(3) Yet another important reason for the carving out of new administrative units was the decision of the Government to direct more attention on areas which were relatively less developed. Almost all the villages of Tehsil Sonawari, for instance, invariably got submerged during floods which washed away their crops, cattle and even the houses. On all such occasions, the Government had to rush relief measures to rescue the inhabitants from the distress in which they found themselves placed. With the setting up of a new tehsil extending to all such areas and by the implementation of a number of developmental plans, such as construction of bunds on either bank of river Jhelum, introduction of lift irrigation, etc., the complexion of the tehsil has completely changed and it is now not only self-sufficient in food, but the economic condition of the people has also considerably improved.

(4) The tehsil of Karnah is accessible only during a few months of summer and remains completely cut off from the rest

of the State for the remaining part of the year. In 1941, it consisted of 114 villages, covering an area of 1342 sq. miles. The Tehsil has been split up by the Cease-fire Line and it now consists of 48 villages only which are interspersed in difficult mountainous regions. In the interest of administration, therefore, the tehsil had to be classed as a separate administrative unit notwithstanding the fact that the number of villages included in it is so small. The same reasons apply with greater force in the case of Tehsils of Leh and Kargil which put together account for an area of 37753.8 square miles.

(5) The Tehsil of Ganderbal extends right from the outskirts of Srinagar city upto the lofty peaks of Zojila pass about 60 miles away. The area is mostly hilly and is sparsely populated. It is true that the villages of this Tehsil could have been conveniently merged with the adjoining tehsil of Sonawari which is at a distance of about 10 miles only from Ganderbal, but the object underlying the carving out of Sonawari Tehsil would, in that case, have been defeated.

(6) The Tehsil of Handwara previously known as Uttarmachhipora extended to a large area of 2239 sq. miles and included 550 villages. It stretched in the north to Chowkibal and in the south to Pattan, a distance of about 50 miles. The charge being an unwieldy one, the carving out of a new tehsil with headquarters at Sopore—a central place between Handwara and Pattan—was most desirable. The new tehsil consists of 336 villages some of which have been transferred to it from the old Baramulla Tehsil.

(7) Before 1947, Bhimber was the headquarter of one of the Tehsils included in district Mirpur. A number of villages of this Tehsil fell on this side of the Cease-fire Line.

Some of these, particularly the Chhamb area, were merged with Tehsil Akhnur. Others lying in the north-west of the Kalidar mountains were, together with a number of villages transferred from the adjoining tehsil of Rajouri, constituted into a separate tehsil with headquarters at Nowshehra. As the entire area is hilly and most of it is inaccessible, the establishment of a separate tehsil to facilitate administrative activities could not be avoided.

6. Rural and Urban Population.

The Registrar General prescribed the following 3 tests for the determination of urban areas for the Census of 1961 emphasizing that all the 3 tests should be satisfied with reference to the Census figures of 1951 before any area is classed as urban :—

- (1) An area/village whose population is not below 5,000,
- (2) An area/village whose 3/4th population consists of non-agriculturists, and
- (3) An area which has urban characteristics.

During the course of the first Census Conference, it was further agreed upon that all corporations, municipalities and cantonment boards should irrespective of their population or other characteristics be treated as towns. It was further decided that in exceptional cases an area with a population of less than 5,000 but possessing definite urban characteristics and amenities could be classed as a town with the concurrence of the Registrar General.

The definition of an urban area has varied from decade to decade since 1901 when the first regular Census of the State was taken. The Census Report for this year does not however make any mention of the criterion employed for the classification of rural and urban population. Table IV of

Volume XXIII—A, Part II of Census of India, 1901 shows that municipalities, suburbs, cantonments and civil lines alone were treated as urban with the result that except the municipalities of Jammu and Srinagar and the Jammu Cantonment, no other area was treated as a town. Table III of the same report shows that there were six areas each with a population ranging between 5,000-10,000 which were treated as rural although the Jammu Cantonment was, notwithstanding its population being 1251 only, included in urban areas.

At the following Census, the conditions prescribed in the Imperial Census Code, 1911 of classifying an area as a town were relaxed on the ground that local Self-Government was still in a backward state and that some semblance of it existed only in the cities of Srinagar and Jammu. The then State Census Commissioner has observed that Jammu and Kashmir being essentially an agricultural country, the existence in this State of areas with a minimum population of 5,000 prescribed in the Imperial Census Code could not be expected. Since, however, certain areas possessing considerable historical and administrative importance did exist and were known as Qasbas, the population limit had to be ignored and all such areas including those possessing urban characteristics had to be classed as towns. In view of this liberalised definition, 61 areas including the two municipalities were declared urban irrespective of the population limit.

The criterion adopted for the classification of urban areas at 1911 Census was also followed in 1921 with the modification that the minimum population standard was fixed at 2,000 eliminating thereby 24 areas which were previously classed as urban due only to the existence of small collection of shops on the main trade routes. This limit was however relaxed in cases of areas which, on

account of their historical or administrative importance, were locally known as Qasbas.

In 1931 also, the criterion of treating every continuous collection of houses inhabited by not less than 5,000 persons was again dispensed with and the population limit was fixed at 2,000, provided the area was important as a trade market and subject further to the condition that educational, sanitary and other amenities existed. The reason advanced for this departure from the definition was that the territory of the State is interspersed with high mountainous ranges dotted over with cliffs and forests and traversed by gigantic rivers. The number of urban areas thus stood at 39 including two municipalities and three cantonments at Jammu, Srinagar and Gilgit.

The definition and the classification adopted at the 1931 Census were rigidly followed at the following Census held in 1941 and the same areas were again treated as urban with the only difference that Gilgit Cantonment which had, in the meanwhile, ceased to exist, was omitted and the new cantonment at Nowshehra created during the intervening decade was included in the list.

We are not in a position to discuss the difference which the definition of urban area adopted for the Census of 1961 has made to the urban statistics of 1951, as owing to the disturbed conditions obtaining in the State in the early years of the post-partition period no Census could be held in 1951. A comparison with the urban areas of 1941 will however show that the following 14 towns have been omitted from the list of 1961 :—

Of these, 7 towns, viz, Mirpur, Manawar, Bhimber, Kotli, Muzaffarabad, Skardu and Gilgit are now on the other side of the Cease-fire Line. Item No. 6, Nowshehra Cantonment has ceased to exist. The remaining six towns could not be classed as urban, either because they had lost their urban characteristics or due to the reason that their population, as returned at the 1961 Census was below 5,000. In conse-

quence of these changes, the population of the remaining urban areas would have stood in 1941 at 3,67,932 only as against 4,14,435 representing the then total urban population. The corresponding population of the remaining areas, which were again classed as urban at 1961 Census, stands at 5,46,504 giving a net increase of 1,78,572 or a decennial growth of 16.35.

The 1941 Census Report does not give the urban area figures except so far as the two principal cities of Jammu and Srinagar are concerned. In the circumstances it is not possible to determine the extent of area covered by the seven towns which are now on the other side of the Cease-fire Line. The other six towns, which have since ceased to exist as urban areas, account for a total area of 24.6 square miles or 63.96 square kilometers. The area occupied by the 25 towns, which have been again classified as urban in 1961 Census, stands at 58.7 square miles or 152.62 square kilometers, giving densities of 6268 and 9310.1 in 1941 and 1961 respectively.

7. Progress in the number of Towns during 1901-1961.

The following statement gives the progress in the number of urban areas of the State during the last sixty years. The figures do not include towns which, though falling in these districts before 1947, are now on the other side of the cease-fire line. For the purpose of this statement the number of towns has for each decade been determined according to the 1961 jurisdic-

tion of the concerned district. As a result of this, some of the towns though once constituting a part of one of 1961 districts have been excluded because of their present location on the other side of the cease-fire line or transfer to some other District on this side. Further, the urban parts of such of the areas which being Jagirs only were not being classed as districts have been included in the districts with which they were merged after the abolition of Jagirs :—

8. Definition of villages.

The conception of a regular village was originally evolved in this State when the first settlement operations were carried out in 1887. It seems that these operations were conducted district by district and not all at once with the result that the definition could not be applied earlier in such parts of the State which came under settlement long after it was started. That is why the Census Reports for the years 1901 and 1911 disclose a large variation in the number of villages. The Jagir of Bhaderwah, for instance, is said to have been composed of 133 inhabited villages only in 1901 (See Table III of Census of India, 1901, Volume XXIII-A, Part II). The corresponding figure in the Provincial Table I of the Census Report of 1911, Volume XX, Part II stands at 294. The 1901 Census Report does not give the definition of a village, but it appears that areas where residential houses were clustered together or if sparsely located were separated from other similar areas by natural barriers, such as a hillock, a rivulet, a khul and the like were treated as Villages.

In 1911, a village was defined as an area already settled or under settlement, a territorial or revenue village which had been duly surveyed, demarcated and treated as a unit for purposes of assessment. In forest areas, the smallest forest division was

treated as a village. In the case of unsettled areas, every collection of houses having an independent existence and name was treated as a village. A hamlet was defined as a small group of houses detached from the main Abadi of a village but still depending upon the same. Hamlets were not allotted any separate Census numbers and were shown below the principal village of which they formed a part.

In 1921, a village was defined as the smallest unit of administration which was separately assessed to land revenue. The definition was not however strictly adhered to in 1931 and it was allowed to vary according to local conditions. Broadly speaking, a well organised unit with definite boundaries which had been surveyed in the recent past was treated as a village for purposes of Census. The same definition was applied in 1941 Census.

In 1961 Census also, every village with well-defined boundaries for revenue assessment having residential houses densely or sparsely populated has been treated as a village irrespective of the number of hamlets of which it is constituted.

The splitting up of the State by the cease-fire line in 1947 has resulted in the parcelling of a number of villages on the border which have partly fallen in the territory

known as *Azad Kashmir*. Each of these residual parts has also been treated as a separate and independent village. Another effect of the splitting up of the State has been large-scale migrations from the border

areas to the inner sectors disturbing thereby the average population of the villages inhabited by the migrants as also of those where they settled.

9. Number of Inhabited Villages, 1901-1961.

The following statement gives the number of inhabited villages from 1901-1961 according to the jurisdictions obtaining in each decade :—

Note :—As the districts of Srinagar and Doda were created after 1941, the number of inhabited villages of these districts has been shown against 1961 only.

10. Explanation of Variation in the Number of Inhabited Villages 1901-61.

Broadly speaking, the variations are due to :—

(a) large-scale changes in the jurisdictions of districts caused by the splitting up of the State in 1947;

(b) formation of new districts and inter-district transfers;

(c) formation of new towns and villages as a result of settlement operations;

(d) changes in the number of inhabited and uninhabited villages.

The total number of inhabited villages and towns stood at 8,948 in 1901 including the two cities of Jammu and Srinagar which alone were treated urban till then. The inhabited villages (8,946) included 2110

villages then constituting the districts of Bhimber (1019), Muzaffarabad (827) and Gilgit (264) which are either wholly on the other side of the cease-fire line or the major part of which is on that side. These have been left out while working out the number of villages from 1901 to 1941 notwithstanding the fact that some of these are now on this side of the cease-fire line, which also have been excluded as they did not fall before 1941 within the jurisdictions of the districts with which they have been merged in the last two decades. On the other hand, as the major part of district Ladakh is on this side of the cease-fire line, all the villages falling within its entire jurisdiction during 1901-1941 which included among others the tehsil of Skardu and 31 villages of tehsil Kargil now on the other side of the cease-fire line and village Mansor, Tehsil Leh now in Chinese occupation have been

included in the figures shown against each decade except 1961.

By the year 1911, the number of towns sprang up from two to forty-three (excluding Uri and Karnah then belonging to District Muzaffarabad and now merged with District Baramulla) resulting in the conversion of a number of rural parts of the State into urban areas. The total number of villages in the State in 1911 excluding urban areas stood at 7052. The district-wise variations are explained below :—

The number of villages in the three districts of Anantnag, Srinagar and Baramulla which together constituted as one district in 1901 stood at 2919. During the decade 1901-1911 the district was split-up into two and 17 new towns were established. The total number of villages in the two districts as given in the Census Report of 1911 stands at 1395 and 1376 or 2771, resulting in a decrease of 148 villages. The only available explanation for this variation is the reorganization of estates according to settlement operations and the urbanisation of villages whose number is not traceable from the Census Report.

The increase of one village in Ladakh District in 1911 is due to the inclusion of the village Mansor which seems to have been inhabited during the intervening decade.

The decrease of 233 inhabited villages in Udhampur district during the decade 1901-1911 is due to :—

(a) transfer of Tehsil Reasi (336 villages including three towns) from District Udhampur to the newly created District of Reasi-Rajouri,

(b) transfer of 56 villages of tehsils of Udhampur (38) and Ramban (18) to Tehsil

Reasi, district Reasi-Rajouri,

(c) transfer of three villages of tehsil Udhampur to tehsil Bashohli, district Kathua,

(d) increase in the number of villages of Bhaderwah Jagir, District Udhampur from 133 in 1901 to 294 and conversion of one village into a town in 1911 as a result of settlement operations, and

(e) transfer of 13 villages of tehsil Bashohli to tehsils Udhampur and Ramnagar of district Udhampur.

The net effect of these changes is the decrease of 220 villages reducing the number from 1188 in 1901 to 968 in 1911. The remaining 13 villages are partly accounted for by the formation of seven towns and partly by the fact that some abadis were treated as a single unit for purposes of Census even though these comprised several habbast villages.

The only explanation available from the Census Report for the decrease of 38 villages in 1911 in Jammu District is that—

(a) three villages constituting Jagir Karloop were transferred from Jammu to Poonch District,

(b) two villages of tehsil Bhimber, District Mirpur were added to Tehsil Akhnoor, District Jammu, and

(c) certain rural areas were urbanised resulting in the formation of four new towns, viz., Samba, R. S. Pora, Akhnur and Hamirpur.

The reduction of 13 villages in District Kathua is explained by—

(a) transfer of 13 villages from Tehsil Bashohli District Kathua to Tehsils Udhampur and Ramnagar, District Udhampur and

(b) increase of three villages in tehsil Bashohli, District Kathua transferred from

tehsil Udhampur, district Udhampur.

On this basis, the number of villages in 1911 should have stood at 574. During the decade, four towns were however set up by the urbanisation of certain rural areas, whose exact number except in respect of two towns, viz., Parole (5 villages) and Kathua (3 villages) could not be ascertained. This should have reduced the number of villages to 565. It is possible that as a result of the settlement operations, five of the villages may have been split into ten, raising the total number to 571.

The area known in 1901 as Poonch Illaqa was not a separate district. During the last sixty years, the tehsil of Rajouri now forming a part of district Poonch has been either a part of Reasi-Rajouri district or of Rajouri-Poonch district. For the purpose of comparing the decennial figures, therefore, Rajouri-Poonch has been taken as district Poonch for the entire period 1901-1961. The number of inhabited villages of this district in 1911 when it consisted of the tehsils of Reasi and Rajouri would come to 336 plus 320 or 656 only. To this may be added 491 villages of Poonch Illaqa which, as stated above, did not then constitute a separate district. The number of villages would thus come to 1147. Three more villages constituting Jagir Karloop were transferred to Reasi-Rajouri district during the decade from Jammu District, raising the number to 1150 against which the Census Report places the number at 1138 only. As in the case of other districts, five new towns were formed in this district during the decade 1901-1911 and this presumably accounts for the fall of 12 villages.

There has been an increase of one village in district Anantnag during the decade 1911-1921. This is due to the ruralisation of

two towns (Kulgam and Awantipora) and to the merging of one more village in Srinagar Municipality.

In Baramulla District, the number of towns was reduced during the decade 1911-1921 from eight to four. The units of which these four towns (Bandipur, Badgam, Handwara and Gulmarg) consisted were classed as villages and this seems to account for the increase of six villages during the decade.

In Ladakh District also, Kargil town was removed from the urban list during the inter-census period 1911-1921. Further one uninhabited village of Tehsil Leh had also been inhabited during the previous decade. This explains the increase of two villages in the figures of the year 1921. No explanation is forthcoming in respect of the third village.

The increase of 13 villages in district Udhampur during 1911-1921 is due to—

(a) Conversion of three towns, viz., Chenani, Doda and Ramban into villages, and

(b) Conversion of five uninhabited villages into inhabited villages.

In Jammu District, 17 new villages were declared inhabited in 1921. Further, the Jagir of Karloop consisting of three villages was transferred during the previous decade to this district. The total number of villages should thus have stood at 1172 as against 1163 shown in 1921 Census Report. The decrease of nine villages appears to be due to the re-distribution of estates as a result of settlement operations as stated by the then Census Commissioner.

The reduction of one town (Jasmergarh) and the transfer of two uninhabited villages to the inhabited list should have raised the

number of villages of Kathua district from 571 in 1911 to 574 in 1921. The decrease of four villages appears again due to redistribution of estates in accordance with the settlement operations.

The number of villages of Poonch district, in consequence of the deurbanisation of two towns and transfer of Karloop Jagir consisting of three villages to Jammu district should have stood in 1921 at 1137 (1138+2-3) against 1139 given in the Census Report. The increase of two villages appears to be due to re-distribution of estates.

The Census Reports of 1921 and 1931 disclose a decrease of 15 inhabited villages in District Anantnag during the decade. On comparing these figures with the village tables it has been found that the number of inhabited villages of this District stood at 1388 and not 1381 as given in the Census Report of that year. The decrease of 8 villages was due to :—

(a) Merger of 5 villages of Srinagar Tehsil, viz, Zunimar, Sonawar, Bonumsar, Sheopora and Rathapora with Srinagar Municipality.

(b) Omission of Idgah, Tehsil Srinagar in the village Tables of 1931.

(c) Conversion of village Nawpora, Tehsil Srinagar, into an inhabited village.

(d) Conversion of villages Darhama and Larhpora of Tehsil Kulgam into one village.

(e) Omission of villages Khaipura and Gund Honsi, Tehsil Kulgam, in the village Tables of 1931, due presumably to their being uninhabited.

(f) Conversion of village Gohpora Arish, Tehsil Kulgam, into an inhabited village.

(g) Omission of villages Taskara and Rasul Khandi Tehsil Anantnag in the village

Tables of 1931, due presumably to their being uninhabited.

(h) Conversion of village Hasanabad, Tehsil Anantnag, into an inhabited village.

(i) Conversion of village Machhibhawan, Tehsil Anantnag into a town.

(j) Addition of village Najain transferred from Tehsil Badgam, District Baramulla, to Tehsil Awantipura.

The Census Report for 1931 places the number of inhabited villages of Baramulla District at 1390 as against 1382 of 1921. Here again, a comparison with the village Tables of 1931 shows that the number of inhabited villages of Tehsil Handawara (Uttarmachipura) stood at 559 and not 562 as accounted for in the Census Report. This reduces the variation to an increase of 5 villages only, which is due to :—

(a) Conversion of 3 villages of Tehsil Baramulla, viz, Sriparigund, Arampora and Ghat Chaku into inhabited villages.

(b) Splitting up of village Nilasar Dudhibugh, Tehsil Baramulla, into 2 villages, Nilasar and Dudhibugh.

(c) Transfer of villages Lachmanpora and Bagh Nand. Singh, Tehsil Badgam, District Baramulla, to Srinagar Municipality, District Anantnag.

(d) Transfer of village Najain, Tehsil Badgam, District Baramulla, to Tehsil Awantipora, District Anantnag.

(e) Merger of villages, Arampora and Chinkipora, Tehsil Handwara with Sopore Town, Tehsil Handwara.

(f) Omission in the village Tables 1931 of 7 villages, viz., Kharagund, Thakarpura, Gundmulla, Chatiganahi, Nangarpura, Nalakangam and Dawarishpura, due presumably to their being uninhabited.

(g) Increase of 9 Ghats in Tehsil

Handwara, viz., Ghat Watlab, Ghat Zafar, Ghat Khanoch, Ghat Ashtangu, Ghat Harwalpura, Ghat Dano, Ghat Nekireshi, Ghat Kolahama and Ghat Nasoo.

(h) Increase of 2 villages, viz., Dudakhul and Sultanpora, Tehsil Handwara due to the former being declared inhabited and the latter being added in 1931.

(i) Splitting up of 2 villages, viz., Sulamatwari-Chhampur and Chitroshittlo, Tehsil Handwara, into 4 villages, Salamatwari, Chhampur, Chiltro and Shittlo.

The number of inhabited villages of Udhampur district has increased from 968 in 1921 to 995 in 1931. Following is the break-up of the increase of 27 villages :—

(a) The number of estates of Jagir Chenani which stood at 46 in 1921 was raised during the decade to 57.

(b) Villages Rakh Sanoh and Rakh Naronahal of Tehsil Udhampur which were classed as uninhabited in 1921 were declared inhabited in 1931.

(c) The number of inhabited villages of Kishtwar Tehsil increased from 154 to 166.

(d) Village Kothar which did not exist in 1921 was added to Tehsil Ramnagar.

(e) Addition of three new villages, viz., Darhalan, Talodi and Batoli and conversion of two inhabited villages, namely Barwah Chak Bewota, into uninhabited villages in Tehsil Bhaderwah.

The apparent decrease of 3 villages in the number of inhabited villages of Jammu District during the decade 1921-31 is the net effect of a large number of changes in the number of villages of the Tehsils constituting the District as indicated below :—

treated as uninhabited in 1921 were declared as inhabited in 1931 :—

(b) Village Udhawala which had been omitted in 1921 Report has been added in 1931.

(c) The following 6 villages classed as inhabited in 1921 were treated as uninhabited in 1931 :—

(i) Raipur Jagir

(ii) Chak Bhagwani

(iii) Chak Kolan

(iv) Chak Chatian

(v) Haripur

(vi) Shadore

Tehsil Akhnur

(a) 14 villages detailed below which were inhabited 1921 were classed as uninhabited in 1931 :—

(i) Gungwah

(ii) Pinyah

(iii) Pelale

(iv) Dagarhi

(v) Boum Kawlyas

(vi) Sunhar

(vii) Chak Ambi

(viii) Mangata Harwan

(ix) Tarpai

(x) Chak Savli

(xi) Chak Mundyial

(xii) Inderwal

(xiii) Gujral

(xiv) Chhani Manah

(b) Hamirpur, Sidhar a town in 1921 was converted into a village in 1931.

(c) Addition of the following 10 villages transferred from Tehsil Reasi :—

- (i) Tilgra Jagir
- (ii) Rehen Jagir
- (iii) Lakya Jagir
- (iv) Kandi Jagir
- (v) Chirgie Jagir
- (vi) Budhi Jagir
- (vii) Dana Jagir
- (viii) Chowki Jagir
- (ix) Taka Jagir
- (x) Jothal Khalsa.

(d) Addition of the following 4 villages transferred from Tehsil Bhimber :—

- (i) Tandal
- (ii) Amlot
- (iii) Arah
- (iv) Hardu Malwara

Tehsil Samba

The village Tables for 1931 show that Village Kamala was accounted for twice in these tables, vide serials 762 and 921. This mistake appears to have been carried forward in the Census Report also.

Tehsil Ranbirsingh Pora

Two villages, viz. Rakh Nihalpur Sumbal and Aminpora, which were inhabited in 1921 were declared uninhabited in 1931.

Summing up, it would seem that there has been an over-all decrease of 2 villages in Tehsil Jammu, increase of one village in Tehsil Samba and decrease of 2 villages in

Ranbirsingh Pora. As regards Akhnur, village Lakya Jagir of Tehsil Reasi which was transferred to Tehsil Akhnur has been omitted in the Census Report, in which only 9 against 10 transferred villages have been mentioned.

The Tehsil-wise distribution of the decrease of nine villages in the figures of 1921 and 1931 of district Kathua is as under :—

(a) Three villages of Tehsil Kathua, viz. Chak Saroh, Bhakrayal and Padri Bala and eight villages, namely Thakarpora, Dhuman, Chak Shudarman, Kirpalpora, Nihalpora, Chak Darya, Dolka and Rakh Rajpora of Tehsil Hiranagar were declared uninhabited in 1931. This decrease was, however, partially made up by the increase of three more villages, viz., Chak Shuba, Chan Chakri which were uninhabited in 1921 and were classed as inhabited at the following Census and village Bijiy Pora a new village added in 1931.

(b) A comparison of the Village Tables and Census Report of 1931 (Part II, Vol. XXIV) shows that the number of villages of Tehsil Bashohli in 1931 stood at 138 and not 137. This explains the apparent decrease of the ninth village.

The decrease of nine villages of district Poonch during the decade 1921-1931 is due to—

(a) Transfer of 10 villages of Tehsil Reasi, District Poonch to Tehsil Akhnur, District Jammu,

(b) Conversion of one village area of Tehsil Reasi in Katra town,

(c) Conversion of two uninhabited villages, namely Talian and Sabalsogor of Tehsil Reasi into inhabited villages,

(d) Decrease of one village, viz., Hanjli, Tehsil Rajouri due to its becoming uninhabited,

(e) Increase of one village, namely Lachmanpatan in Tehsil Sadhuti, District Poonch which was uninhabited in 1921.

As indicated in a preceding paragraph, the number of inhabited villages in Anantnag District stood at 1388 in 1931 and not 1381 as given in the Census Report. The decrease of 8 villages during the decade 1931-41 is explained below :—

(a) Villages Nawpora Kharapora and Yalibugh of Tehsil Anantnag treated as separate units in 1931 were merged in villages Panzmolla and Chie in 1941.

(b) Village Sakhras treated as a separate unit in 1941 was, according to the then Census Commissioner, included with some other villages in 1931.

(c) Villages Jadipura Khalsa and Bakhshipura, Tehsil Kulgam, treated as separate villages in 1931 were merged in 1941 with Villages Devipora and Heipura.

(d) Villages (i) Puranigam and Zostan, (ii) Charsu and Ghat Charsu and (iii) Bagh Inayatullah and Nambalbal of Tehsil Pulwama were amalgamated in 1941 and known respectively as (i) Puranigam-Zostam, (ii) Charsu Ghat Charsu and (iii) Nambalbal-Bhag Inayatullah.

(e) Village Baragam, Tehsil Pulwama, was merged in 1941 with villages Vopalwan and Beghgund, Tehsil Pulwama.

(f) Boat population of Tehsil Pulwama, which was treated as a separate unit (No. 6559) in 1931, was not treated as an inhabited village in 1941.

According to the Census Reports of 1931 and 1941, the number of inhabited villages of Baramulla District fell during the decade from 1390 to 1370. Since, however, as explained above, Baramulla District should have been shown to consist of 1387 villages only in 1931, the variation is reduced to a

decrease of 17 villages only. On scrutinising the Village Tables of the two Censuses and comparing these with the Census Reports, explanation is available for a variation of 18 villages as indicated below :—

(a) 11-Villages of Tehsil Handwara classed as inhabited in 1931 treated as uninhabited at the following Census.

These are :—

- (i) Labkachal
- (ii) Shanker Garh
- (iii) Ghat Watlab
- (iv) Ghat Zafar
- (v) Ghat Ashtingu
- (vi) Ghat Harwalpura
- (vii) Ghat Dano
- (viii) Ghat Nassu
- (ix) Ghat Niki Reshi
- (x) Ghat Kolahama
- (xi) Ghat Kanoch

(b) Village Duraspora and Thakarpora, Tehsil Handwara, which, according to the then Census Commissioner, were either unoccupied or included in some other village in 1931 were declared inhabited in 1941.

(c) Ghat Chako, Tehsil Baramulla, an inhabited village of 1931 was found unoccupied in 1941.

(d) 4-Villages, viz. Ushkara, Khanpora, Maharpura and Khwaja Bagh of Tehsil Baramulla were merged with Baramulla Town in 1941.

(e) Village Ushkara has been accounted for twice in the Village Tables of 1941, vide serial numbers 354 and 355.

(f) 6-Villages, viz., Chak Haklitri, Chak Fatehdin, Zangibagh, Chak Gojra, Amagroo and Rakh Arath were merged in 1941 with Villages Haklitri, Wangipura, Gogibagh,

Gojra, Wowoocha and Arath.

(g) Village Natipora, which formed a part of Srinagar Municipality in 1931 was transferred to Tehsil Badgam, District Baramulla, in 1941.

The above analysis indicates that there should have been a decrease of 18 villages during the decade. No explanation is forthcoming regarding the variation of one village.

There has been a decrease of 23 villages in District Udhampur during the decade 1931-41. This is accounted for by the following variations :—

(a) Village Barayan, Tehsil Udhampur, was included in some other village in 1931, as mentioned in the Census Report of 1941, but was treated as a separate village at the following Census.

(b) 3-Villages, Viz., Occhnala, Rakh Tanda and Rakh Nirahnal, Tehsil Udhampur, shown as inhabited in 1931 were declared uninhabited in 1941.

(c) The 1941 Census Report shows that the 10-villages of Tehsil Kishtwar, viz., Batwal, Makol, Dalber, Marh, Darein, Garh, Batwarah, Butan, Goreau Nalla and Dillar had been by a mistake amalgamated with village Chhatroo and shown as one unit in 1941.

(d) Village Losain and Sosan of Tehsil Kishtwar were merged together in 1941 and known as Losain.

(e) Village Kishtwar was shown twice in the Village Tables of 1941, vide Serial Nos. 104 and 105.

(f) Village Thandapani and Patabagla, Jagir Chenani (now Tehsil Udhampur) were declared uninhabited in 1941.

(g) Villages Chak Mala, Awani and Kanderi, Jagir Chenani, were amalgamated

in 1941 with Village Assar.

(h) Villages Nalhot and Kuthiara of Chenani Jagir, which were treated as two separate units in 1931, were merged together in 1941.

(i) Villages Darageri Suketar, Halyan-Pohni, Khayras, Mahout and Jatabar of Chenani Jagir were amalgamated with village Charota in 1941.

Following is the analysis of the increase of 5 inhabited villages in District Jammu during the decade 1931-1941 :—

(a) 7-uninhabited villages of 1931 of Tehsil Jammu, namely, (i) Bagmarh Sarkari, (ii) Chak Habib, (iii) Sangoteda, (iv) Chak Bhopat, (v) Chak Doulat, (vi) Rakh Chhatha and (vii) Bhagwani, were declared inhabited in 1941.

(b) 5-villages of Tehsil Jammu, namely, (i) Pinjol, (ii) Badola, (iii) Gleen, (iv) Mohdataranjali and (v) Sikligram, are not traceable in the Village Tables of 1931 and were, according to the presumption of the Census Commissioner of 1941, included in some other villages. These were treated as separate units in 1941.

(c) Villages Nowabad, Rakh Bahu and Rakh Bahu Nowabad Upper Raipur, Tehsil Jammu, not mentioned in 1931 Tables due presumably because of their being uninhabited were treated as inhabited in 1941.

(d) Village Majra Kotli, Tehsil Jammu, was acquired by the Government for Games Department and as such ceased to exist in 1941.

(e) Villages Rakh Naghani and Bag Hazuri, Tehsil Jammu, were merged in 1941 with Jammu Municipality.

(f) Village Panj Nandpur, Tehsil Jammu an inhabited village of 1931 was treated as uninhabited in 1941.

(g) Serial numbers 158 and 163 of 1931

Village Tables represent the population of the passengers of the two Railway Stations of Tawi and Jammu Cantonment respectively. In 1941 the entire population of the two Railway Stations was shown under one serial, viz., 239 only.

(h) The village Tables of 1931 included among others the City of Jammu also, vide serial No. 347. In 1941 the tables of the City were prepared separately.

(i) 3-Villages, Rakh Chadak, Chak Rak-walan and Chak Diyala, Tehsil Samba, were declared uninhabited in 1941.

(j) Village Kamala, Tehsil Samba, has as already explained in a preceding paragraph been accounted for twice in the Village Tables of 1931.

(k) Village Lalyana Sripratapsinghpura, appearing at serial no. 187 of Village Tables of Tehsil Ranbirsinghpura in 1931 was notwithstanding the population of 197 shown against it in that year, treated as an uninhabited village, as per note recorded on the margin of the table. This village has actually been an inhabited one both during, as also before and after 1931.

The increase of two inhabited villages in District Kathua during the decade 1931-1941 is the net effect of the following changes :

(a) 3-Villages of Tehsil Kathua, viz., Taraf Tajwal, Taraf Bajwal and Taraf Manjli, are said to have been included in 1941 partly in Kathua Town and partly in Tehsil Kathua. The then Census Commissioner has stated that the enumerating agency had, contrary to the instructions issued, included all the 6 parts in the Village Tables of Tehsil Kathua and treated them as 6 separate units. Further, another village named Manjli was entirely included in Town Area Kathua

in 1931, but was during the following decade transferred to the rural list. This gives an increase of 4 villages in this Tehsil during the decade.

(b) 4-villages, namely, Rakh Sarkar Bogni, Bakhrak, Spral Pain and Chak Budhu, Tehsil Hiranagar, were classed as uninhabited in 1941. This decrease was partially set off by classifying village Chak Daia which was uninhabited in 1931 as inhabited in 1941. The net variation in this Tehsil was thus a decrease of 3 villages.

(c) The village Tables of 1931 show that the number of villages of Tehsil Bashohli stood at 138 and not at 137 as given in the Census Report.

The variation of one village in District Poonch is explained below :—

(a) A reference to the Village Tables of 1941 will show that village Katra, Tehsil Reasi, was against the instructions issued by the then Census Commissioner split up into two parts and accounted for as two independent units, vide serial nos. 285 and 286. The 1931 Tables however show the whole of Katra as one village.

(b) Village Chak Grolah, Tehsil Bagh, an inhabited village in 1931 was treated as uninhabited in 1941.

(c) Village Halan, Tehsil Haveli, which constituted one unit in 1931, was split up into two villages in 1941, namely, Halan North and Halan South.

The variations in the number of inhabited villages during the period 1941-61 fall in the following broad categories :—

(1) Decrease on account of the villages of the districts, viz., Baramulla, Ladakh and Poonch which have fallen on the other side of the cease-fire line;

(2) Increase on account of the villages on this side of the cease-fire line which belonged in 1941 to districts now on the other side;

(3) Villages which have been transferred from one district to another in connection with the formation of new districts;

(4) Villages transferred from different tehsils in a district in connection with the formation of new tehsils within the same district;

(5) Transfers from rural to urban and vice versa;

(6) Conversion of inhabited into uninhabited villages and vice versa ; and

(7) Miscellaneous.

The number of inhabited villages of Anantnag district has been reduced by 189 during the two decades preceding 1961. The decrease is the net effect of the following changes :—

(a) The whole of tehsil Khas as constituted in 1941 comprising 219 inhabited and 4 uninhabited villages as also the city of Srinagar and Badamibagh cantonment were transferred from Anantnag district to form a part of the newly established district with headquarters at Srinagar,

(b) Nine villages (six belonging to tehsil Anantnag and three to tehsil Kulgam) were merged in urban areas, as per detail given below :—

(i) Villages Sarnal and Khanabal, Tehsil Anantnag included in Town Area Anantnag,

(ii) Villages Mamal, Laripora, Pahalgam and Nanawani tehsil Anantnag converted into the notified Area of Pahalgam,

Hanand, tehsil Kulgam, declared urban to constitute Kulgam town.

(c) Three villages, viz., Kanigam, tehsil Anantnag, Chak Aziz Shah and Ranbirpora Deh Nawabad, tehsil Pulwama became uninhabited.

(i) Village Puranigam Zoastan, Tehsil Pulwama has been split up into two villages, namely Puranigam and Zoastan.

(j) Village Baragam, Tehsil Pulwama, which constituted a part of villages Vopalawan and Beghgund in 1941 has been converted into an independent village.

(k) Villages Bagh Inayatullah and Khanqah Bag, Tehsil Pulwama, which formed part of Pampore town in 1941 were transferred to the rural list.

(l) Villages Drangbal, Kadlabal and Nambalbal, Tehsil Pulwama which fell in 1941 entirely within the bounds of Pampore Town Area have now been split up into urban and rural parts, resulting in an increase of three inhabited villages of these

names.

(m) The three towns of Doru, Machhibawan and Verinag, Tehsil Anantnag have been converted into three villages of the same names.

(n) The 1961 inhabited villages include, among others, two blocks of boat population, one in Tehsil Pulwama and the other in Tehsil Kulgam. These did not exist in 1941.

The decrease in the number of inhabited villages of Baramulla district during the period 1941-61 represents the net loss resulting from a decrease of 501 and an increase of 173 villages. These increases and decreases have been due to :—

The Tehsildar Hiranagar has however reported that villages referred to at items 20 and 21 of Tehsil Hiranagar have been merged with the adjoining villages, but he has not been able to locate the names of the latter.

The district of Poonch has lost about 52% of its inhabited villages during the two decades 1941-'61 mainly because of several of its Tehsils or parts of Tehsils having fallen on the other side of the Cease-fire Line. Further, one of the Tehsils which, though lying on this side of the Cease-fire Line, was also transferred to another district. These heavy losses have been set off to a small extent by the inclusion in this district of such of the villages of Mirpur District which fell on this side of the Cease-fire Line. Details showing how the variation is to be accounted for are given below :—

12. Villages Partly included in Towns.

The above statement shows that 19 villages in all have been partly included in the towns of districts Anantnag, Srinagar, Doda and Kathua.

Villages Hyderpora, Bagat Barzalla and Kursu Padshahibagh have been partly merged with the newly set up Notified Area of Notipora-Hyderpora and are partly included in Tehsil Badgam, district Srinagar.

Doda town comprises parts of villages Doda and Barshala, the residual parts of which are included in Tehsil Doda. Similarly, a portion of village Kishtwar has been merged with the town and the remaining area continues to constitute a part of the Tehsil. Batote town area has been constituted by patching together parts of villages Tringla and Dharmund. The villages of Deogole and Gandabalkoti have been parcelled and declared urban to the extent of the portions falling within the jurisdiction of Banihal town. Like-wise, Ramban town has been built of parts of villages Metra Govindpora and Seri.

Four villages have been partly merged in District Anantnag in urban areas. Of these, Zarapora falls partly in Tehsil Anantnag and partly in Bijbehara Town. The remaining three villages, Nambalbal, Drangbal and

13. Definition of a Census House.

For purposes of the present Census, a Census house has been defined as a structure or a part of structure inhabited or vacant, a dwelling, a shop, workshop, factory or a place of business or shop-cum-dwelling or school, etc., giving on the road or a common stair-case or a common courtyard leading to a main gate or enjoying separate entrance.

14. Occupied Residential Houses.

An occupied residential house has been defined as that part of a building which is occupied for residential purposes by one or more households. A household, on the other hand, signifies the entire group of persons who commonly live together in the same Census House, or houses and take their meals from a common mess unless the exigencies of work prevent them from doing so.

16. Observation on the strength of variations in each of the four topics of Statement 15.

It is apparent from the above statement that among the districts, the largest number of persons per occupied census house are to be found in Anantnag, Srinagar and Baramulla where the density stands at seven. On the other hand, the districts of Ladakh, Udhampur, Jammu and Kathua are inhabited, on an average, by only five persons per occupied census house.

In the rural sector, the districts of Anantnag, Srinagar and Baramulla top the list with an average of seven in each case. Doda and Poonch have an average of six only whereas the districts of Ladakh, Udhampur, Jammu and Kathua are inhabited by five persons per occupied house.

In urban areas, the city of Srinagar appears to be most congested with an average of nine persons.

The maximum number of females per 1,000 males are to be found in Ladakh district both in the rural and urban areas, where the proportion works out to 970 and 1012 respectively. For the district as a whole also, Ladakh is populated by 971 females per 1,000 males being the maximum proportion when compared with other districts. The district of Srinagar has the smallest number of women both in the district as a whole and in the rural sector. In the urban areas, the lowest proportion is to be found in Jammu district with 801 per 1,000.

The proportion of rural to total district population is largest in Ladakh, being 96% as against 54 of district Srinagar.

The growth of density for the State as a whole has been only 11 per square mile. This is accounted for by the fact that there has been no increase in the density of district Ladakh which alone is estimated to cover an area of 37753.8 square miles. If this district is omitted, it would appear that the relative densities for the projected population of 1941 according to existing jurisdictions and of 1961 would stand at 180 and 218 respectively giving an increase of 38 per square mile. The actual densities of the entire State including the area on the other side of the cease-fire line during 1941 and 1931 stood at 48 and 43 respectively.

For obvious reasons, there has been little or no change in the density of Ladakh

and Poonch district during the last two decades. Ladakh mainly consists of bare mountains and rocky soil. The plain areas wherever available are generally sandy and therefore uncultivable. The rainfall is scarce and vegetation is visible only at a few places. Further, Polyandry is being practised even now in the rural areas.

Like Ladakh, the entire district of Poonch with the exception of some parts of Nowshera Tehsil is also mountainous and very little land is available for cultivation. There have also been large scale migrations from this district during the tribal raids of 1947 which account for the fall of population and the consequent low density.

APPENDIX—I TO TABLE A—I

According to the Census Report of 1941, the State as then constituted covered an area of 84,471 sq. miles which has now, in accordance with the re-assessment made by the Surveyor General of India, been provisionally fixed at 86,023 sq. miles. In consequence, however, of the tribal invasion of 1947 and subsequent splitting up of the State by the cease-fire line, three whole districts, viz., Astore, Gilgit Leased area and Gilgit Agency and five whole tehsils, viz., Muzaffarabad, Skardu, Mirpur, Bagh and Sadhnuti as also 638 whole and 44 part villages and 4 towns representing the residual parts of such of the other tehsils which were truncated by this division, fell on the other side of the cease-fire line. The area occupied by these districts, tehsils and whole and part villages is estimated at 32,358.1 square miles approximately.

In 1941, the province of Kashmir consisted of the districts of Anantnag, Muzaffarabad, Baramulla, Ladakh, Astore, Gilgit Leased area and Gilgit Agency and covered an area of 73,648 square miles. The jurisdiction of the province was extended by 14.6 sq. miles (assessed area) during the period 1941-61 by the transfer to this province of twenty villages from the districts of Reasi and Udhampur of Jammu Province. On the other hand, the Province lost three districts (Astore, Gilgit Leased Area and Gilgit Agency), two tehsils (Muzaffarabad and Skardu) and 236 whole and 16 part villages being parts of the tehsils of Karnah, Uri, Handwara and Kargil now on the other side of the cease-fire line. In addition to this, one village of Ladakh Tehsil, namely, Mansor is at present under Chinese Occupation. The three districts and two tehsils put together account for an area of 26,860 square miles, while that covered by the 237 whole and 16 part villages is, on the basis of planimetry, estimated at 3210.8 sq. miles.

The net effect of these territorial gains and losses is that the area of the province has been reduced to 43591.8 sq. miles approximately.

The Jammu Province which consisted in 1941 of the districts of Jammu, Kathua, Udhampur, Reasi, Mirpur and the Jagirs of Chenani and Poonch, covered an area of 12,378 square miles only. The province did not gain any additional area during the last twenty years, but suffered a loss of 1038.6 square

miles plus the area covered by 402 whole and 28 part villages and 4 towns of the tehsils truncated by the splitting up of the State. The former included the tehsils of Mirpur (355 square miles), Bagh (321 sq. miles) and Sadhnuti (348 square miles), and 20 villages of the districts of Udhampur and Reasi which were transferred to Kashmir Province.

The district of Anantnag extended to an area of 2814 square miles in 1941. It has since been reduced to 2096.9 square miles approximately due to the transfer of Tehsil Khas (743 square miles) to the newly created Srinagar District and the merger in this district of twenty villages (assessed area 14.6 square miles) transferred from Jammu Province.

Srinagar District came into existence during the inter-census period 1941-61 with the tehsils of Ganderbal, Srinagar and Badgam as its constituents. The district covers an estimated area of 1205.1 sq. miles as indicated below :—

Baramulla District has suffered a net loss of 781.0 square miles of area during the inter-census period 1941-61. After the tribal raids of 1947 the residual parts of the Tehsils of Uri and Karnah of former Muzaffarabad District comprising 144 villages fully, 10 partly and 1 town (104 fully, 2 partly and 1 town belonging to Uri and 40 villages fully and 8 partly to Karnah Tehsil) were merged with the district. Further, 14 villages of Tehsil Srinagar were also included in Baramulla District as a result of inter-district transfers. As against these gains it lost to Srinagar District the tehsil of Badgam, less by 6 villages as also 12 villages of Tehsil Baramulla also transferred to District Srinagar. In addition, 14 whole and one part villages of Tehsil Handwara fell on the other side of the cease-fire line. It has not been possible to ascertain the assessed area of these villages and even the gross area covered by these is not separately available. Excluding these however the total gains and losses of assessed areas amount to 174.3 square miles and 487.7 square miles respectively, resulting in a net decrease of 313.4 square miles.

The district of Ladakh was the biggest district of the State before 1947 and accounted for an area of *47,317 square miles. It then consisted of three tehsils, Skardu, Kargil and Ladakh, of which the first, viz., Skardu (8522 square miles) and 31 whole and five part villages of Kargil are now on the other side of the cease-fire line. The Tehsil of Ladakh has also lost one village Mansor which is under Chinese occupation. The area forming the jurisdiction of 1961 census stands at 37753.8 square miles.

Like Srinagar, the district of Doda was set up after 1947 by detaching tehsils of Ramban (except 13 villages), Bhaderwah and Kishtwar from District Udhampur and transferring to it 73 inhabited and 3 uninhabited villages (48 from Udhampur tehsil, 16 from former Chenani Jagir and 12 from tehsil Reasi). The District consists of 4 Tehsils, Ramban, Doda, Kishtwar and Bhaderwah. The new tehsil of Doda comprising 126 inhabited and uninhabited villages was carved out by the following transfers from different tehsils :—

1. 61 villages transferred from Ramban Tehsil.
2. 36 villages transferred from Bhaderwah Tehsil.
3. 15 villages transferred from Udhampur Tehsil.
4. 16 villages (including 2 uninhabited) transferred from former Chenani Jagir to then Ramban Tehsil and subsequently transferred to Doda Tehsil. The two uninhabited villages referred to, viz., Thandapani and Pata Balga Jagwas have since ceased to exist and have therefore not been taken into account in 1961 Census.

Tehsil Ramban was compensated by merging in it the remaining 33 villages transferred from Udhampur Tehsil and all the 12 villages transferred from Tehsil Reasi. It however suffered a further loss of 13 villages which were included in the jurisdiction of Anantnag District.

The areas covered by Tehsils Ramban, Kishtwar and Bhaderwah in 1941 stood at 588, 3021 and 553 square miles. Both Bhaderwah and Ramban have suffered territorial losses as a result of the changes

mentioned above. The 1961 areas of the four Tehsils stand as under :—

Since the district did not exist in 1941, it has not suffered any loss at all.

Two important additions were made to the district of Udhampur after the Census of 1941, when its area stood at 5070 square miles. The Jagir of Chenani (95 square miles) was abolished and merged in this district and Tehsil Reasi of the then Reasi District was transferred to district Udhampur, extending thereby its jurisdiction by 1078 square miles.

As against these gains, the district lost three tehsils Bhaderwah, Kishtwar and Ramban which, except for 13 villages of Ramban Tehsil transferred to district Anantnag, claimed an aggregate area of 4154.3 square miles. In addition, 76 villages (including 3 uninhabited) of the Tehsils of Udhampur, former Chenani Jagir and Reasi were also transferred to Doda District.

The district has on the whole suffered a net territorial loss of 3338.4 square miles reducing its 1961 area to 1731.6 square miles only. A comparison of the areas of the three tehsils constituting the district at present however shows that tehsil Ramnagar has suffered a nominal reduction of 0.6 square miles (assessed area) as the result of transfer of one of its villages to Jammu District, whereas tehsil Udhampur has gained 11.1 square miles notwithstanding the transfer of 48 villages of this tehsil to District Doda. This is because the tehsil got 47 villages from Reasi besides the annexation of Jagir Chenani except 16 villages. Tehsil Reasi has, however, suffered a loss of 169.1 square miles as a result of 66 of its villages having been detached and merged in tehsils Udhampur, Ramban and District Anantnag.

*Note :—The area of District Ladakh as given in the Census Report of 1941 (Census of India 1941 Volume XXII Part II) stands at 45762 square miles which was subsequently revised by the Surveyor General to 47317 square miles.

The district of Jammu which measured 1147 square miles in 1941 has not lost territorially. On the other hand, 46 additional villages being the residual parts of tehsil Bhimbar of district Mirpur were annexed to this district and merged in tehsil Akhnour. Of these, only 27 are inhabited. In addition, village Kothar of Tehsil Ramnagar, District Udhampur with an assessed area of 3017 Kanals (0.6 square miles) was also transferred to Jammu District. If the increases thus caused are accounted for according to their assessed areas only, it would appear that the area of the district has been extended by 70.6 square miles. The gross area of the district in 1961 however stands at 1248.6 square miles indicating a net gain of 101.6 sq. miles in its jurisdictions since 1941.

Of all districts of the State, the district of Kathua alone has not suffered any change during the last 20 years and the area covered by it in 1961 stands at 1023.56 square miles, the increase of .56 square miles being due to fresh planimetry.

District Poonch has had a chequered career. The

area now constituting this district formed previously a part of the old Reasi District and was partly treated as a Jagir and kept out of district jurisdiction. After the abolition of the Jagirs and the transfer of Reasi tehsil to District Udhampur, Poonch was constituted into a full-fledged district with headquarters first at Rajouri and later on at Poonch proper. The District has since gained territorially by the addition of Tehsil Rajouri previously forming a part of district Reasi and of 60 villages fully and 10 partly being the residual parts of the tehsils of Kotli and Bhimbar, now on the other side of the cease-fire line.

As against these gains, the two tehsils of Bagh and Sadhnuti have entirely been lost to the district, being now on the other side of the cease-fire line. In addition, 104 whole and 18 part villages of the Tehsils of Haveli and Mendhar have also met the same fate. The subjoined statement gives the areas of the four tehsils comprising the district according to their 1961 jurisdictions :—

It is apparent from the foregoing statement that villages with a population of 5,000 and over which are inhabited by 1.1% of the total rural population of the State are mostly found in the districts of Srinagar and Baramulla of Kashmir Province and to a small extent in district Poonch of Jammu Province. Jammu Province claims a much larger number of towns with a population of less than 5,000 which constitutes 8.9% of the total urban population of the State as against the corresponding percentage of only 5.4% of Kashmir.

In the rural sector, there were only three villages viz., Nandpora in district Srinagar, Kalaruch in district Baramulla and Darhal in district Poonch with a population of over 5,000 on this side of the cease-fire line. All the three have continued to be classed as rural in 1961. In addition, two more villages viz., Charar-Sharrief in district Srinagar and Haihama in district Baramulla have, this time, been added to the list. None of the five villages could be classed as urban, as almost entire population of each village consists of agriculturists only and no urban characteristics are traceable in any of these.

There were 24 towns in 1941 excluding those now on the other side of the cease-fire line each of which had a population under 5 000. Of these, six viz., Duru, Verinag, Machha Bhawan in Anantnag district, Pattan in Baramulla district, Charar-Sharrief in Srinagar district and Parole in Kathua district have been de-urbanized in 1961. The main reason for the classification of these six areas as villages is that none of these satisfies even one of the three tests prescribed for the determination of urban areas for the Census of 1961.

On the other hand, eighteen areas, two in district Anantnag, one in district Srinagar, six in Baramulla district, four in Doda district, two in Jammu district, two in Kathua district and one in Poonch district

have been treated as towns for the Census of 1961. It is true that none of these satisfies the minimum population test of 5,000 and there are a few whose 75% population is not engaged in agriculture. In these cases the main consideration for classifying them as urban areas has been that they have acquired urban characteristics on a large scale and are otherwise important due to historical associations. In Anantnag district, for example, Pahalgam is an important tourist centre and has developed into a full-fledged modern town. The same applies to Gulmarg in district Baramulla. Again, Natipora-Hyderpora in Srinagar district is inhabited by people who are engaged in non-agricultural activities only. Kulgam has assumed great importance as a fruit marketing centre. Bandipur is a constellation of three villages and most of its inhabitants are non-agriculturists. All urban facilities, such as an electric station, drinking water supply, post office, telegraph office, schools, community development block and the like have been established in this town. The four notified areas of Sumbal, Hajin, Palhalan and Ajas are developing fast and have, therefore, been declared as urban areas by the State Government.

Doda was a town as early as 1911 and with the establishment of the headquarters of district Doda at this place, there has been a substantial increase in its population which consists mostly of non-agriculturists. The towns of Ramban, Banihal, Batote and Lakhenpur are important stations on the National Highway and possess all the urban characteristics. Bishna and Arnia in district Jammu, Hiranagar in district Kathua and Nowshehra in District Poonch have been declared urban due to large-scale migration of rural population inhabiting the border areas of the State. The number of agriculturists inhabiting these four towns is below 25% of the population.

APPENDIX III TO TABLE A—I

Detailed instructions were issued well in advance for the enumeration of all houseless persons and institutional population. In so far as institutions are concerned, the test checks conducted during the period of enumeration in the cities of Jammu and Srinagar did not disclose any discrepancies. The same cannot be said in regard to houseless population. As has been the tradition for several previous centuries, peasants from Kashmir, particularly from the Districts of Anantnag and Srinagar, move in winter to the plains in search of employment. During this seasonal employment, they usually live on pavements, or in the premises of mosques and other open areas. Normally, they return home in March, but in 1961 the month of fasts (Ramzan) had already commenced in February and the Idd festival was approaching fast. They therefore hurried back to Kashmir towards the end of February, 1961 after having been enumerated as houseless persons in the district where they had secured employment. They reached their homes before the revisional round was over and were counted again contrary to the standing instructions. For this reason, the houseless population as given in this appendix cannot be very much relied upon.

An institution has, for the Census of 1961, been defined as a Census household occupied by unrelated persons who live together and take their meals from a common kitchen unless the exigencies of work prevent any of them from doing so.

VARIATION IN POPULATION DURING SIXTY YEARS

This table furnishes data on the area and population for the six censuses from 1901 to 1961 as also the variation in population. In the absence of reliable vital statistics data being available, the table, as it gives the growth of population from decade to decade, is the main source for estimating the population. A significant fact about this table is that it also gives the percentage variation from decade to decade.

2. Details of adjustments of population from 1901-1951 district by district.

It is obvious that there has been an increase of 1,421,614 in the population of the State on this side of the cease-fire line over a period of 60 years from 1901-1961 giving a decennial growth of 11% on an average.

No Census could be held in this State in 1951 due to unfavourable conditions then obtaining. The population of the State and of the districts for 1951 as given in Table A-II has however been calculated by adding to the adjusted population of 1941 the decennial increase, as reflected by the 1961 Census for the State as a whole and for each district.

Of the nine administrative districts comprising the State in 1961, adjustment of population has had to be made in the case of eight districts only, as the jurisdiction of district Kathua has, due to queer coincidence, remained unaltered throughout these six decades. In this district, there have not been any changes of the kind experienced by other districts, on account of the splitting up of the State by the cease-fire line, formation of new districts or even inter-district transfers.

Following are the details of population changes on which the adjusted district figures calculated from decade to decade are based :—

Anantnag District

The jurisdictional changes which the district has suffered during the period 1941-1961 consisted of :—

(a) Increase of 20 villages, 13 transferred from Tehsil Ramban, District Udhampur and 7 from Tehsil Reasi, District Reasi and accounting for a total population of 4,308 and 4,449 respectively, or 8,757 in all ; and

(b) Transfer to the newly created district of Srinagar of Tehsil Khas including Srinagar City involving a population decrease of 3,33,881.

The 1941 population of the district has, after taking into account these changes, been estimated at 5,26,482.

The 1951 population has been worked out by adding to this figure half the increase registered during 1941-61.

The adjusted population of 1931, 1921, 1911 and 1901 has also been based on the changes mentioned above. The subjoined table indicates the losses and gains in the population during the period of 40 years from 1901-1941 :—

Srinagar District

This district came into existence for the first time in 1951, although another district known by the same name but extending to the whole valley existed in 1901.

The district was carved out by detaching the following tehsils and villages from the districts of Anantnag and Baramulla :—

(a) Tehsil Khas including Srinagar City less by 14 villages transferred to district Baramulla, accounting for a population of 318,781 (333,881—15,100).

(b) Tehsil Badgam, District Baramulla less by six villages not detached from the parent district of Baramulla involving a total population of 171,437 (174,583—3,146) ; and

(c) Twelve villages of Tehsil Baramulla, District Baramulla with a population of 5,769.

The district was later on split up into three tehsils viz., Srinagar, Badgam and Ganderbal by a re-distribution of the villages. Based on these changes, the population of the district as it should

have stood from decade to decade if it had been in existence has been worked out at 434,728 in 1931, 378,989 in 1921, 347,349 in 1911 and 313,666. The 1951 population has been arrived at by taking the mean in 1901 population of 1941-61.

Evidently in this case, there can be no question of any losses in the population prior to 1951.

Baramulla District

Baramulla district has had a chequered career after 1941. While it gained in population to some extent by the extension of its boundaries as a result of inclusion in it of the residual parts of the district of Muzaffarabad, the losses have been still greater due to the transfer of one of its tehsils and a number of villages from another to the newly established district of Srinagar as also because of the location of some of the villages of one of its constituent tehsils on the other side of the cease-fire line.

The 1941 population of the district according to its jurisdiction of 1961 which has been adopted as the basis for the determination of population of previous decades has been arrived at as under :—

(1) The district lost a total population of 181,918 as a result of the transfer of—

(a) Tehsil Badgam to district Srinagar less by six villages with a population of 1,71,437,

(b) Twelve villages of tehsil Baramulla, district Baramulla to tehsil Badgam district Srinagar with a population of 5769, and

(c) Fourteen and a half villages of Tehsil Handwara now on the other side of the cease-fire line with a population of 4712.

(2) This decrease was partially set off by the inclusion in the district of—

(a) One hundred inhabited and seven uninhabited villages of tehsil Uri, district Muzaffarabad on this side of the cease-fire line with a population of 41,815,

(b) Forty-eight villages of Tehsil Karnah, district Muzaffarabad on this side of the cease-fire line with a population of 16,595, and

(c) Fourteen villages transferred from tehsil Khas, district Srinagar with a population of 15,100.

The following table gives the variation in the adjusted population and the population figures as given in the Census Reports :—

Ladakh District

The district has had no territorial gains but has instead suffered heavily both in jurisdiction and population due to its biggest populated tehsil viz., Skardu and 31 whole and 5 part villages of Tehsil having fallen Kargil on the other side of the cease-fire line. Even the tehsil of Leh has lost at least one village namely 'Mansor' which is now in Chinese occupation.

The adjusted population for 1941 has, according to 1961 jurisdiction, therefore, been arrived at as under :—

(a) Loss of a population of 106,271 which inhabited Tehsil Skardu,

(b) Loss of 31 whole villages and } accounting parts of 5 other villages of Tehsil Kargil } for a now on the other side of the cease-fire } population line, } of 13,130.

(c) Loss of village Mansor in Chinese } occupation

The adjusted population of 1941 is thus estimated at 76,030.

Doda District

The district was born in 1948 and was constituted by detaching several tehsils and villages from the districts of Udhampur and Reasi-Rajouri. Evidently it could not have suffered any losses in population prior to 1948 and even the figure shown for the year 1951 which is the mean population of the two decades 1941-61 is an assumed one.

The various administrative units of which the

district was constituted together with the 1941 population of each are given below :—

(a) Ramban tehsil, district Udhampur with the exception of 13 villages transferred to tehsil Kulgam district Anantnag with a population of 71,485 (75,793—4,308),

(b) Tehsil Kishtwar, district Udhampur with a population of 60,893.

(c) Bhaderwah tehsil district Udhampur with a population of 44,518,

(d) Sixteen villages of Chenani Jagir district Udhampur with a population of 3,203,

(e) Forty-seven villages of Tehsil Udhampur with a population of 15,045, and

(f) Twelve villages of Tehsil Reasi, district Reasi-Rajouri with a population of 6,486.

The adjusted population of 1941 has thus been arrived at 201,630. The corresponding figures for the four previous decades have also been worked out on the basis of these changes :—

Udhampur District

The adjusted population of the district for 1941 placed at 211,693 is the net effect of—

(a) The loss of a population of 195,144 referred to at items (a) to (e) of the explanation given against Doda district,

(b) Loss of a population of 992 of village Kuthar tehsil Ramnagar transferred to district Jammu,

(c) Loss of a population of 4,308 of 13 villages of tehsil Ramban, district Udhampur transferred to district Anantnag vide item (a) of the explanation given against district Anantnag, and

(d) Increase in population by 106,124 on account of transfer to this district of tehsil Reasi, district Reasi-Rajouri less by 19 villages transferred to tehsil Ramban, district Doda and tehsil Kulgam, district Anantnag (117,059—6,486—4,449).

This, given a net loss of population at 94,320 which when accounted for against the 1941 census population of 306,013 (Udhampur district=294,217+Chenani Jagir =11,796) gives the adjusted population of district as 211,693.

A comparison of the adjusted population figures of the five decades 1941, 1931, 1921, 1911 and 1901 which have been worked out in the light of these changes gives the following variations :—

Jammu District

The district has, notwithstanding its territorial gains resulting from the merger of the residual parts of tehsil Bhimber, district Mirpur, lost in population due to large-scale migrations and consequent depopulation of as many as 139 villages. The adjusted population of 1941 viz., 428,719 has been worked out by adding/increasing the population of the following areas :—

(1) Population of 27 inhabited villages of Bhimber tehsil, district Mirpur on this side of the cease-fire line transferred to district Jammu=24,071

(2) Population of village Kuthar tehsil Ramnagar district Udhampur transferred to district Jammu=992; and

(3) Population of 139 villages declared uninhabited as a result of migrations=27,706.

The following statement shows the decennial variations of the adjusted population and the actual census figures :—

Kathua District

As there has been no jurisdictional change in Kathua district at any time during the last sixty years, the adjusted population in this case is the same as given in the Census Reports.

Poonch District

Poonch district has suffered both jurisdictionally and in the population during the period 1941-61. Its jurisdiction was reduced by three tehsils two of these viz., Bagh and Sadhnuti having fallen entirely on the other side of the cease-fire line and third namely Reasi having been transferred to district Udhampur. In addition, it has suffered a loss of 104 whole and 20 part villages of Tehsils of Haveli and Mendhar which now lie on the other side of the cease-

fire line. As against these heavy losses, it gained territorially by the merger of 70 villages of Tehsils of Bhimber and Kotli district Mirpur, being the residual parts of these tehsils on this side of the cease-fire line.

The adjusted population of 1941 which has been placed at 3,24,495 has been arrived at as under :—

3. The appendix to this table gives the adjustments necessary to bring the 1941 population, when the last census was taken of each district to its jurisdiction as at 1961 census. It is clear from this appendix that there has been a fall of 10,74,888 in the actual 1941 population of the State according to the jurisdiction prevailing then and the population covered by the 1961 jurisdiction, as it should have stood in 1941. While this drop is contributed to the extent of 1,19,401 by Ladakh district representing the 1941 estimated population of the tehsil of Skardu and 31 whole and 5 part villages of Kargil now on the other side of the cease-fire line, the same cannot be said in respect of the falls shown against the districts of

Anantnag, Baramulla and Udhampur. Srinagar did not exist as an independent district in 1941 and its population was included in the district of Anantnag of which it then formed a part. Similarly, the fall in the population of Baramulla district represents the population of areas transferred to the newly formed district of Srinagar. In the case of Udhampur district also, the fall is attributable to the formation of a new district with headquarters at Doda. The decrease shown against Poonch district is due to the large-scale migration of people from such parts of the district as constitute its present jurisdiction to the areas now on the other side of the cease-fire line.

5. The statement shows that the percentage variation of population of the whole State has increased by about 4.3 during the decade 1921-1931, when compared with the previous decade. From 1931 onwards, the percentage variation has remained more or less uniform upto the present Census. The percentage variation during the decade 1901-1911 has, according to the Census Report of 1921, been 8.69 which is almost the same as during the four decades from 1921-1961. The glaring increase in the percentage variation of the two decades 1911-1921 and 1921-1931 has been ascribed by the then Census Commissioner to the combination of several adverse forces which had the effect of arresting the growth of population. Among these may be mentioned the prevalence of influenza in 1918 which alone is said to have taken a toll of 44,514 human lives. In addition, there have been, during this decade, a number of other epidemics, viz., plague, cholera and small-pox which also account for 43,603 deaths. Yet another important factor responsible for the slow growth of population during

the decade 1911-1921 has been the out-break of Great War I, for which a large-scale campaign of recruitment was launched resulting in the enlistment of about 18,000 persons in the British Army besides those enrolled in the army then maintained by the State. These factors were further re-inforced by the failure of crops of 1920 and the unprecedented rise in the price index which is said to have increased by 100-200% when compared with the Pre-war rates.

These reasons hold equally good for the abnormal rise in the increase in percentage variation during the two decades so far as the rural sector is concerned.

During the decade 1911-1921, 16 towns were converted into rural areas, resulting in the fall of population by about 14,244.

7. It is obvious from the above statement that the proportion of females to males has been the largest in the District of Ladakh both in the rural and urban sectors. The figures of this District for 1951 and 1961 however show a sharp decline in the proportion of females in rural areas when compared with the previous decades.

On the whole, the variation in the proportion of females so far as the rural areas of the State are concerned, appears to have remained steady over a period of 50 years from 1911 onwards. The proportion in the urban areas however discloses a large increase, particularly during the period 1941-61. This increase appears to be reflected mainly in the Districts of Jammu and Poonch, where the propor-

tions have gone up from 647 to 801 and 680 to 855 respectively in the two decades. Increases in the proportion have also been registered by other Districts, though not of the same size except Doda, where the proportion has fallen from 881 to 806.

While it is not possible to hazard any positive explanation for the unusual increase in the urban female population of the Districts of Jammu and Poonch, which figure prominently in the context, it would not be altogether wrong to assume that the increase is due to decimation of the male population while on the other side of the Cease-fire line or migration of males to the other parts of the Union or State or rehabilitation of displaced families.

3. Comment on the statement of percentage of population.

It is evident from the above table that 90% of the rural population of Ladakh District as against 65% for the whole state is inhabited in villages having a population of less than 1,000 in each case. There is no village in this district with a population of 2,000 or above. Udhampur comes next with 77% population falling within the population group 999 and below. The least number of villages in these classes put together are to be found in Poonch with 55%.

Poonch has the largest number of villages with population of 1,000-1,999. Villages with population of 2,000-4,999 have mostly been returned from Baramulla, Doda and Poonch. There are in all 5 villages in the category 5,000-9,999 and these belong to districts Srinagar, Baramulla and Poonch.

The least number of villages with population 1,000-1,999 are in Ladakh comprising 10% of the

total rural population. Only one village of Kathua district falls in the group 2,000-4,999.

On the whole, 31% of the rural population of the State is to be found in villages whose population ranges from 500 to 999. Villages with population 200-499 come next and those in the group 1,000-1,999 rank third. The percentage of villages with less than 200 population or whose population ranges between 2,000 and 5,000 contribute 8 and 10% of the rural population respectively. Only 1% of the rural population of the State consists of villages with over 5,000 and less than 10,000 respectively. There is no village whose population exceeds 10,000.

Reasons accounting for 50% of the rural population of Ladakh district inhabiting villages with less than 500 population are obvious. The district consists mainly of rugged mountainous areas at heights ranging from 8,000-25,000 feet. Rainfall in the district is very scarce and cultivable area only negligible. The same applies, though with less emphasis, to the districts of Udhampur and Doda.

5. The foregoing statement shows that there has been a steady decline from 1921 to 1961 in the number of villages of less than 500 population both in the State as a whole and in each of the districts. This drop is accounted for by corresponding increases in the number of villages of other population groups.

In 1921, about half the rural population inhabited the villages of less than 500 population which then constituted 81% of the total number of villages in the State. As a result of the growth of population and consequent upgrading of about 11% villages of this group, only 1/3rd of the rural population of the State is now inhabited in the villages of less than 500 population.

The increase of 6% in the number of villages of the population group 500-999 is not proportionately reflected in the corresponding percentage of population which has gone up by 1% only obviously because the new villages in this category have a population of just over 500. The population groups 1,000-1,999 and 2,000-4,999 have however registered more marked increases both in the number of villages constituting these groups in 1921 and 1961 as also in their percentages of population to the total rural population.

As for the districts, Doda had the largest number of villages, viz., 88% in the population group of less than 500 in 1921 representing 56% of the total rural population of the district. As in the case of the whole State, the number of villages in this population group has progressively been declining, being 77% only in 1961 with corresponding fall in the proportion of population which stands at 38%. The same is true of Jammu district, of which 87% villages belonged to the population group of less than 500 in 1921, as against 77% returned at the 1961 Census. Both in Doda and Jammu, these decreases have been set off by corresponding increases in the number of villages of population groups of 500-999 and 1,000-1,999, which have gone up by 7 and 2% in the case of former and 7 and 3% in the case of latter, though the corresponding increases in the percentage of population of these districts have been comparatively small. While there has been no increase in the number of villages and the percentage of their population in the group 2,000-4,999 so far as Jammu district is concerned, the percentage of the villages of this group in district

Doda has gone up from less than 1 to 2% with corresponding increase in the population percentage which has shot up from 1 to 14%.

In 1921, the population of district Ladakh was contributed to the extent of 64%—highest in the State—by villages with population of less than 500 which constituted 85% of the total number of villages in the district. According to the 1961 Census, only 76% of the villages of the district now fall in the population group of less than 500 and these account for only half of the total rural population. Here again, this drop is accounted for by corresponding increases in the percentage of number of villages in the population groups 500-999 and 1,000-1,999 which have gone up by 7% in the former case and by 2% in the latter. The population of these groups have also registered similar proportionate increases.

The decline in the number and population of villages of less than 500 population has been more marked in the districts of Udhampur and Kathua where the former has gone down from 85% to 74% in both cases and the latter from 58 and 56 to 40 and 39 respectively. These decreases have been set off by corresponding increases in the population groups 500-999 and 1,000-1,999 in both cases and to some extent in the group 2,000-4,999 so far as Udhampur district is concerned.

Anantnag, Srinagar and Baramulla districts had a uniform proportion of the villages of the category of less than 500 population in 1921 which has come down from 78% to 65% in Anantnag and Baramulla districts and to 67% in Srinagar district. This decrease is also more or less uniformly reflected in the percentages of population which have come down from a maximum of 46% in Anantnag to a minimum of 28% in Srinagar district. As against these decreases, the number of villages and their percentages of population in the higher groups, namely, 500-999, 1,000-1,999 and 2,000-4,999 have gone up from 17, 4 and 1 to 24, 9 and 2 in Anantnag and from 17, 5 and nil to 20, 11 and 2 in Srinagar district. The percentage of population in the group 2,000-4,999 of Anantnag district which stood at 5 in 1921 has soared to 11 in 1961. The corresponding figures in the case of Srinagar district stand at 3 and 10 respectively. Baramulla district has, however, registered an extraordinary increase in the number of villages in the group 500-999 which has gone up from 6% to 23%, though with a 2%

nominal corresponding increase in the percentage of population. This phenomenal increase has however been set off in this case by the decrease in the population group 1,000-1,999 which now claims only 9% of the total number of villages as against 15% of 1921. In spite of this heavy drop, the proportion of population of this group to the total population has gone up by 2%.

Poonch district had the smallest number of villages in the population group of less than 500 in

1921 and it continues to retain this distinguishing feature to this day. For this reason, the percentage of number of villages in other population groups has not also undergone any significant change. On the other hand, it is interesting to note that the percentage of population of villages falling in the category of 500-999 has, notwithstanding some increase in the number of villages of this category, fallen from 35% to 30%.

around a principal city. During the course of the 3rd conference held in February, 1962, the Registrar General emphasised the desirability of the formation of Town-groups in cases of Urban areas which had grown in the suburbs of cities and were developing at a fast speed. It was felt that if there are indications that the vacant or rural areas intervening between the city and the towns would be urbanized before long, the city and the towns may together be treated as a Town-group. The advantage of grouping together such urban areas would be that the State Governments would for purpose of future planning reckon the entire urban area as a compact unit.

In view of these considerations, a Town-group with the city of Srinagar, Badamibagh Cantonment and Natipora-Hyderpora notified area as its constituents was set up for the Census of India, 1961.

PRIMARY CENSUS ABSTRACT

FLY-LEAF

1. Definition of Occupied Census House, Dwelling, Shop-cum-dwelling, work-shop-cum-dwelling, household.

In 1901, a house was defined as a structural unit irrespective of the number of households occupying it. This definition was modified at the Census of 1911 and a social unit instead of a structural one was treated as a house. According to this definition, every enclosure, shed, building or any other structure in which a single commensal family resided was regarded as a house. No change was made in this definition at the following three censuses held in 1921, 1931 and 1941. There was no census in this State in 1951 due to disturbed conditions. In other parts of the country, the census was taken and a Census House was defined as a group of dwellings, a dwelling or a part of dwelling with a separate main entrance. An Occupied Census House was regarded as an occupied house.

At the present Census, an Occupied Census House has been defined as a structure or a part of structure used for dwelling purposes only. An Occupied Census House does not include any non-residential buildings, thus making it synonymous with a dwelling.

A Census House partly used for residential purposes and partly as a shop has been defined as a shop-cum-dwelling. Likewise, a work-shop-cum-dwelling has been defined as a Census House used for residential purposes as also for manufacturing, repairing or servicing of goods.

A household means a group of persons whether or not related by blood who commonly live together and take their meals from a common kitchen unless the exigencies of work prevent any of them from doing so. By adopting this definition, institutional population, viz., residents of boarding houses, hotels, inmates of jails and the like have also been classed as households.

2. Statement of Percentage of Households to number of houses in rural and urban areas.

The following statement gives the percentage of

households to number of houses in the rural and urban areas district by district :—

Except the districts of Anantnag, Srinagar and Baramulla the percentage of households to number of houses in all the districts is lower than that of the State as a whole. This is also true of the rural and urban areas of these districts.

Baramulla district seems to suffer from housing accommodation more than any other district particularly in so far as the rural areas are concerned. The percentage of households to number of houses in the urban parts of Baramulla district is the largest in the state due to the shortage of accommodation in the various towns of this district.

The subjoined statement gives the names of the tehsils of various districts in which the percentage of households to number of houses on the whole is the highest among the tehsils of the districts concerned.

3. Statement of density of households per square mile in rural and urban areas.

As already stated, there have been many territorial changes in the State during the inter-census period 1941-61. While some of these have been caused by the State being split up by the Cease-fire Line, many others have taken place as a result of carving out of new districts and tehsils and inter-transfers of niabats and villages from one administrative area to another. No fresh survey of the areas included in the new jurisdiction have been carried out so far either by the Surveyor General of India or the State Government. The Director of Map Publication, Dehra Dun has however at the request of and in consultation with this office worked out by fresh planimetry provisional area figures of the districts and tehsils on this side of the Cease-fire Line, which have been mentioned in Table A-I. Based on these, the density of households per square mile in the State as a whole and in its rural and urban sectors as also in its constituent districts stand as under :—

It is clear that district Srinagar has the largest and Ladakh the smallest number of households in a square mile. The corresponding density of district Jammu, though not as high as that of Srinagar, is also comparatively very large. Similarly the number of households per square mile in district Doda, though not as small as in Ladakh is, when compared with all other districts, fairly low.

Ladakh is the biggest district in the State and its

area by far exceeds twice the aggregate area of all other districts put together. Doda, though comparatively a very small district, has the next largest area in the State. Both are almost entirely hilly and except for a few small and narrow valleys here and there where some dwellings are concentrated, by and large all other houses are dispersed over long distances and built on the slopes of mountains. This is why the density of households per square mile for the State as a whole and in districts Ladakh and Doda is very small.

Major part of the districts Srinagar and Jammu consist of plain and low level areas where cultivable land and irrigational facilities are available in much greater proportions.

In the rural sector, district Jammu has the largest number of households per square mile. The density of districts Anantnag and Srinagar is almost equal and that of Anantnag the next largest in the State. In this case also the number of households per square mile in Ladakh and Doda is very small.

The largest number of households per square mile of urban area has been returned from district Srinagar. This is almost 50% more than the corresponding density of Jammu which has the next largest number of households per square mile in the State.

The least urban density has been returned from district Doda and the next smallest from Ladakh. Even the density of Anantnag is less than 300 per square mile.

Among the tehsils, Srinagar and Leh have respectively the largest and the smallest densities at 315.2 and 0.3 households per square mile. In all other tehsils, except Jammu and Ranbirsinghpura, the corresponding densities are fairly low and do not exceed 81. Even Ranbirsinghpura and Jammu claim only 135.3 and 126.9 households per square mile respectively.

The highest density of rural households has been returned from tehsil Ranbirsinghpura at 126.4 per square mile. In all other tehsils the corresponding densities are below 76.3 per square mile being the density returned from Badgam.

As for the urban sector, tehsil Sopore has the maximum density of 5345.4 households per square mile in the State. The corresponding densities

of a few other urban areas which are also fairly high are indicated below :—

Following are the main reasons explaining these high densities :—

(a) Sopore is an important commercial centre.

(b) Large number of displaced persons have settled in Ranbirsinghpura and Jammu.

(c) Udhampur is the headquarter of the Army and of the district administration.

(d) Due to the availability of limited building space in Kishtwar town, which is situated on a small plateau, the dwellings are concentrated together.

(e) The density of Srinagar should have been much larger if the area occupied by the city had not gone up four times during the inter-census period.

The lowest density of urban households is claimed by the notified area of Gulmarg. This is because the town had been vacated by the tourists and visitors when the census was taken in February, 1961.

4. Definition of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Houseless Persons, Institutional Population, Literacy and Education.

The following definition of Scheduled Castes has been laid in Article 49 (1) of the constitution of Jammu and Kashmir :—

“Scheduled Castes means the castes, races or tribes or parts of, or groups within castes, races or tribes which are for the purposes of the Constitution of India, deemed to be Scheduled Castes in relation to the State under the provisions of Article 341 of that Constitution.”

Article 341 of the Constitution of India empowers the President to specify, by public notification, with respect to States specified in Part A or Part B of the First Schedule, after consultation with the Governor or Rajpramukh thereof the castes, races or tribes or parts of, or groups within castes, races or tribes which shall, for the purposes of the

Constitution of India, be deemed to be Scheduled Castes in relation to that State. Further, according to para 6 of Fifth Schedule of the Constitution of India, scheduled areas are defined as such areas which the President may, by order, declare to be scheduled areas.

In pursuance of these stipulations, the President made the Constitution (Scheduled Castes) Order of 1950 specifying the castes, races or tribes which shall be deemed to be the Scheduled Castes in the States. Since, however, the Constitution of Jammu and Kashmir came into force on the 26th January, 1957, the Presidential Order of 1950 which excluded the State of Jammu and Kashmir was amended and the following Castes were declared as Scheduled Castes for the State of Jammu and Kashmir :—

(i) Instructions were issued to the effect that it was possible that the names of castes given in this list may not, in certain cases, be in actual use and that any of these castes may be known by some other name. The Charge Superintendents were directed to institute proper enquiries in such cases by ascertaining the customs, modes of living, social aspects, etc., of the castes concerned and comparing the same with those of the castes specified in the above list, so that they could be regarded as synonyms and included in the appropriate castes. The use of general terms such as Harijan, Achhut etc., was disallowed and emphasis was laid on efforts being made for eliciting the name of the particular caste. Further, circular instructions were also communicated to all concerned to the effect that Scheduled Castes were to be found only among Hindus or Sikhs and that members of other religions will not be classified as belonging to any of these caste.

(ii) There are no Scheduled Tribes in Jammu and Kashmir State and it is not therefore necessary to discuss here the definition adopted in this case for the census of 1961 and the area restrictions according to the President's order.

(iii) Persons who did not form part of any house-

hold at the time of enumeration of the households such as pavement dwellers, wandering tribes, faqirs and sadhus, etc., were defined as houseless persons.

(iv) Institutional population was defined as a group of persons not related to each other who commonly live together and take their meals from a common kitchen unless the exigencies of work prevent any of them from doing so. Thus boarding houses, messes, hostels, hotels, hospitals and penal, charitable and mental institutions were all classed as institutional population.

(v) A literate person has been defined as one who can both read and write and not one who can only read or only write in any language. With a view to ensuring effective application of this definition, instructions were issued to verify, in each case, whether the person claiming to be literate was able to read a simple letter either in print or manuscript and whether further he could write a simple letter.

5. Definition of Workers and Non-workers, Industrial classificatory nature of classification of workers into 9 categories and definition of household Industry.

At the present Census, a departure has been made in the concept for the collection of economic data. During the last few censuses, economic independence was made a criterion for measuring the economy of the country and the data was compiled in respect of economically independent and economically dependent persons only. During the 1931 census, an intermediate category of economic semi-dependence was also introduced. This category was called working dependents in 1931, partly dependents in 1941 and earning dependents in 1951. It was felt that the strict application of the criterion of income on economic independence suppressed those who worked in family economic activity but did not actually earn an income like men

Category-I, Working as Cultivators

These include cultivators of land wholly or mainly owned,

plus

Cultivators of land wholly or mainly un-owned.

Category II. Working as Agricultural Labourers

This category consists of cultivating labourers.

other than the head of the household and women of the family or children working at cultivation or industries of the households.

The following definition of a worker has been adopted for the census of 1961 :—

“The basis of work will be satisfied in the case of seasonal work like cultivation, live-stock, dairying, household industry, etc., if the person has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season. In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, the basis of work will be satisfied if a person was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day on which his household was visited for enumeration”.

“An adult woman who is engaged in household duties but doing no other productive work to augment the family resources should not be considered as working for purposes of this question. If, however, in addition to her household work, she engages herself in work such as rice pounding for sale or wages or in domestic service for wages for others or minding cattle or selling firewood or making and selling cow-dung cakes or grass etc., or any such work she should be treated as a worker”.

Workers have been divided into nine broad industrial categories by a re-classification of groups and sub-divisions adopted in earlier censuses. This was done by relating the groups in earlier censuses to the groups in the Indian Standard Industrial Classification adopted in 1961 and then by consolidating them into the nine categories. Since, however, there was no census in Jammu and Kashmir in 1951, this re-classification was, in relation to the previous censuses, effected in the manner indicating below :—

Corresponds to groups 2, 3, 5, 6 and 8 of 1931.

Groups 2 and 3 of 1921 and 1911.

Corresponds to group 7 of 1931, groups 4 and 5 of 1921 and group 4 of 1911.

Category III, Working in Mining and Quarrying, etc.

Refers to primary industries not elsewhere specified,

plus

mining and quarrying.

Category IV, Working at Household Industry

Category V, Working in Manufacturing other than Household Industry.

Refers to processing and manufacture-foodstuffs, textiles, leather and products,

plus

processing and manufacture-metals, chemical and products,

plus

processing and manufacture not elsewhere specified,

plus

works and services-electric power and gas supply.

Category VI, Working in Construction

Construction and maintenance of works-other-wise unclassified,

plus

Construction and maintenance buildings,

plus

Construction and maintenance-roads, bridges and other transport works,

plus

Construction and maintenance-telegraph and telephone lines,

plus

construction and maintenance operations-irrigation and other agricultural works.

Category VII, Working in Trade and commerce

Refers to commerce.

Category VIII, Working in Transport, Storage and Communications.

Refers to transport and communication otherwise unclassified and incidental services,

plus

transport by road-owners, managers and employees connected with mechanically driven and other vehicles (excluding domestic services), Palki etc., bearers and owners, pack elephant, camel, mule,

Refers to health, education and public administration,

plus

services not elsewhere specified.

Similarly, non-workers include—

(a) all non-earning dependents.

(b) self-supporting persons with principal occupation as non-cultivating owners of land, agricultural rent receivers and their dependents,

(c) self-supporting persons with non-productive non-agricultural occupations,

(d) earning dependents whose own occupation (secondary means of livelihood) was agricultural rent,

(e) earning dependents whose secondary occupation was non-agricultural non-productive.

Corresponds to groups 4, 85, 86, 100, 127, 153-184, 186, 187, 189, 190 and 191 of 1931. Groups 80-82, 101-103, 130, 155-179, 181-183, 185, 186 and 187 of 1921 and groups 71-73, 85, 92, 93, 115, 137, 139-160 and 162, 163, 165, 166 and 167 of 1911.

Detailed instructions for the classification of workers/non-workers were also issued in respect of doubtful categories such as under-trial prisoners, temporary residents of hospitals and other similar institutions as also in respect of those engaged on seasonal work. All such cases, except convicts or long-term inmates of penal, charitable or mental institutions were treated as workers. With regard to regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, the criterion prescribed for determining whether the person concerned should be classed as worker was that he should have been employed during any of the 15 days preceding the

day on which he was enumerated. Similarly, a person who was working but was absent from work during the 15 days preceding the day of enumeration or even exceeding 15 days due to illness or other causes was treated as a worker. But persons who had been offered work and had not actually joined were treated as non-workers. It was emphasized that all people who worked including family workers who are not in receipt of any income or working children who cannot earn for their maintenance or persons under training as apprentices with or without stipend or wages should also be treated as workers.

Non-workers were placed in the following 8 categories :—

(i) full-time students or children attending school who do no other work,

(ii) house-wives and persons engaged in unpaid home duties,

(iii) infants and other dependents including permanently disabled or old persons,

(iv) retired persons, rentiers and others who are in receipt of income without doing any work,

(v) beggars, vagrants and others of unspecified source of existence,

(vi) convicts in jails or inmates of penal, mental or charitable institutions,

(vii) persons not employed before but seeking employment for the first time ; and

(viii) persons employed before but now out of employment and seeking employment.

The following extracts from the Manual of Instructions to Enumerators give the definition employed for determining household industry :—

“A household industry is defined as an industry conducted by the head of the house himself and/or mainly members of the household at home or within the village in rural areas and only at home in urban areas. The industry should not be run on the scale of a registered factory. Thus the main criterion for a household industry is the participation of one or more members of a household in rural areas. In the urban areas, the industry should be confined to the house.....”

“A household industry should relate to production, processing, servicing, repairing or making and selling of goods. It does not include profession such as pleader or doctor, barber or waterman or an astrologer.”

“A person, though he may not be working in his own household industry, may be working as a paid employee in another household industry. You should therefore enquire whether the person who is not working in his own household industry is working in any other household industry, etc.”

In order to facilitate the identification of a household industry and to distinguish it from a commercial activity as also with a view to elucidating the difference between rural and urban household industry, it was laid down that a household industry should conform to the following three tests.

(a) Household Industry should embrace manufacture, processing or servicing and may include sale but should not be confined simply to buying and selling. At least part of the goods offered for sale from the household should be manufactured or processed by members of the household.

(b) Household industry should be on the household scale where the workers mainly will be the head of the household himself and/or members of the household, the role of hired workers from outside being of secondary importance. Thus, in any household industry, members of the household should be in a position to lend a hand in the industry whenever they find the time in the course of their daily chores. Household industry cannot, therefore, be on the scale of a registered factory but can use machinery and employ power like steam engine or oil engine or electricity to drive the machinery.

(c) Location also is important, for proximity decides participation by members of the household. In a village this participation is possible if the household industry is located at home or within the village, because village organization is such as makes it possible for members of the household to move about freely in the village to look after their work. In urban areas, such a free movement is not possible and, therefore, for household industry in urban areas we should consider only those industries which are located at home. Where, however, part of the work is done outside the house, e. g., preparing and dyeing the yarn for weaving or winding into warp and wool or cleaning metal surfaces before electroplating in baths, it should still be considered a household industry, even in urban areas, as the main operation of weaving or of electroplating is conducted within the house and only one or two operations are conducted outside.

6. Statement of percentage of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes severally to total males and females by Rural and Urban areas.

There are no Scheduled Tribes in Jammu and Kashmir. Even Scheduled Castes are found in the districts of Doda, Udhampur, Jammu, Kathua and Poonch only and not in any other part of the State.

The statement shows that the number of females per 1,000 males in largest is the district of Ladakh not only when compared with the individual districts but also in relation to the State as a whole. Another significant fact is that the number of female workers in Ladakh also exceeds the males when compared with other parts of the State. As against this, the number of female non-workers is comparatively the smallest.

The persistence of polyandry in the interior of Ladakh district notwithstanding the legal ban imposed by the State Government explains the proximity of female population with the male. As regards workers, it is obvious that a fairly large proportion of females of this district is engaged in Household Industries.
