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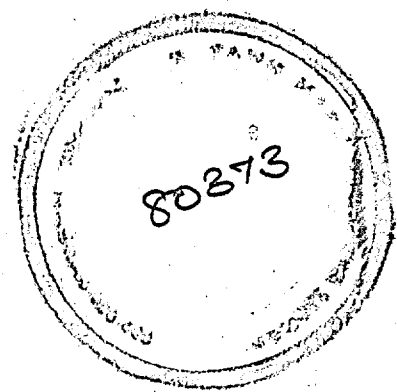
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PREFACE.

THIS pamphlet has been compiled with a view to direct attention to the more salient features of the recent Census. The full report of the Census is in two volumes aggregating 518 pages, and is therefore too bulky for the ordinary reader to obtain at a glance the essential figures relating to vital statistics.

As economic questions are at present receiving special attention in the State, it is very necessary that accurate ideas regarding Census statistics should spread among the people, to enable them to compare local conditions with those of foreign countries; and it is with a view to meet this object that this brief compilation has been prepared. It is divided into twelve sections according to the subject matter, and the essential statistics are abstracted at the end in the form of tabular statements.

BRIEF SUMMARY

I—DISTRIBUTION OF THE POPULATION.

1. *Area, population and density.*—The area and population of the Mysore State (including the Civil and Military Station of Bangalore) are 39,474·93 square miles and 5,806,193 persons respectively, the mean density of population being 197 persons per square mile.

The mean density of the State compares as follows with that of certain selected countries in Europe, Asia and America.

2. *Density of population in the divisions, districts and taluks.*—The mean density of population in the Eastern Division (comprising the *maidan* districts of Bangalore, Kolar, Tumkur, Mysore and Chitaldrug) is 214 against 151 in the Western Division (comprising the *malnad* districts of Hassan, Kadir and Shimoga). In the *maidan* districts of the Eastern Division density varies as rainfall, but in the case of the districts of the Western Division density decreases as rainfall increases.

In the Eastern Division the taluk of highest density (excluding taluks containing cities) is T. Narsipur in Mysore District with a density of 410, Arkalgud being the taluk of maximum density (312) in the Western Division. The taluks of least density in the Eastern and Western Divisions are Hiriyur and Nagar with 99 and 71 persons per square mile respectively.

3. *Towns and their population.*—There are 91 towns (including 4 cities). The urban population consists of 658,329 persons and forms 11·3 per cent of the total population. In England and Wales 78 per cent of the population live in towns; in Scotland and Ireland 69·8 per cent and 31 per cent respectively; in the Baroda State 19·9 per cent and in Bombay and Madras (including States) 11·7 and 18·1 per cent respectively. For every 1,000 males in the urban population of the State there are 942 females. Of every 100 persons of urban population, 76 are Hindus, 17 are Musalmans and 6 are Christians.

4. *Villages and their population.*—There are 16,740 inhabited villages in the State, the average population per village being 308. Among the villages, two, viz., Robertsonpet in Kolar District and Turuvanur in Chitaldrug District contain a population of more than 5,000 persons each.

5. *Houses and families.*—The number of occupied houses per square mile has increased from 38 in 1901 to 39 in the present Census. The average number of persons per house in the State is 5 and has remained stationary since 1901. There is a fairly close correspondence between the number of occupied houses (1,158,004) and the number of married women of 15 years and upwards in the State (1,126,379).

II—GROWTH OF POPULATION.

1. *Results of the several Censuses.*—The results of the several Censuses and the rates of increase from one Census to the succeeding Census are shown in the marginal statement. The percentage of net increase during the 40 years 1871-1911 is 14·9 for the whole State. The mean density of population per square mile has steadily increased from 142 in 1881 to 197 in 1911. The increase in the natural (i.e., born in the State) population during the decade as distinguished from the actual population is 5 per cent.

2. *Analysis of the growth of population in districts.*—(i) *Bangalore District.*—The percentage of increase during the decade has been 7.4 for the district including Bangalore City. Of the nine taluks in the district, only one, *i. e.*, Anekal Taluk, has suffered a loss of population to the extent of 3.29 per cent, the increases in the other taluks varying from 3.39 per cent in Nelamangala Taluk to 13.70 per cent in Kankanhalli Taluk. The Deputy Commissioner attributes the decrease of population in Anekal Taluk to the effects of plague. The increase in the occupied area during the decade has been 55,292 acres, but the irrigated area has declined by 4,759 acres.

(ii) *Kolar District.*—The population of the district (including Kolar Gold Fields) has grown by 7.8 per cent during the decade and all the taluks have shared in the general growth, the increase varying from 1.25 per cent in Chikballapur and Sidlaghatta Taluks to 13.67 per cent in Bowringpet Taluk (including Kolar Gold Fields). There has been an increase of 50,940 acres in the occupied area and of 21,116 acres in the irrigated area during the decade.

(iii) *Tumkur District.*—The percentage of increase during the decade has been 9.7. All the taluks, except Pavagada, show an increase of population, the percentages of increase varying from 7.64 in Kunigal Taluk to 15.09 in Sirsi Taluk. The diminution of population in Pavagada Taluk is trifling; but the large decrease of 7,200 acres in the irrigated area and the large increase of 45,545 acres in the occupied area of the taluk during the decade are rather abnormal. During the decade, the occupied area and the irrigated area in the district have risen by 127,683 acres and 16,894 acres respectively.

(iv) *Mysore District.*—The population of the district including Mysore City has risen by 3.6 per cent during the decade. The growth of population has been general in all the taluks, except Seringapatam and Yelandur, the increases varying from 2.16 per cent in Hunsur Taluk to 10.70 per cent in Mandya Taluk. The decadence of Seringapatam Taluk is due to the effects of plague and malaria in reducing the birth-rate and increasing the death-rate. Constant recrudescence of plague in the Yelandur Jahgir accounts for the decrease of population in it during the decade. The increase in the occupied and irrigated areas in the district has been 3,576 and 6,225 acres respectively during the decade.

(v) *Chitaldrug District.*—The population of the district has increased by 10.4 per cent during the decade, the increases varying from 3.94 per cent in Molakalmuru Taluk to 16.72 per cent in the Holalkere Taluk. The occupied and irrigated areas in the district have increased by 190,269 and 8,358 acres respectively during the decade; but a portion of the increase in the occupied area represents the area transferred in 1902 from the Chiknayakanhalli and Kadur Taluks to the then newly constituted Hosdurga Taluk.

(vi) *Hassan District.*—The population of the district as a whole has increased by 2 per cent during the decade, the increases varying from 4.7 per cent in Hassan (including Alur Sub-Taluk) to 12.63 per cent in Hole-Narsipur Taluk and the decreases varying from 7.01 in Belur Taluk to 14.70 per cent in Manjarabad Taluk. The heavy decreases in Belur and Manjarabad Taluks are ascribed to the decline in the coffee industry and to the excess of deaths over births owing to the ravages of malaria. The Deputy Commissioner further states that there is employed on the coffee and cardamom estates of Manjarabad Taluk a large floating population of labourers from South Kanara and also from other taluks of Hassan District and that this population returned to their homes prior to the date of final Census.

The occupied area in the district has decreased by 13,894 acres and the irrigated area has increased by 11,861 acres during the decade.

(vii) *Kadur District.*—The population of the district has declined by 5.8 per cent during the decade, *i. e.*, to about the same extent as during the decade 1871-81. The decreases have taken place in all the taluks except Kadur and range from 5.79 per cent in Koppa (including Yedahalli) to 11.29 per cent in Tarikere.

The occupied and the irrigated areas have increased by 4,891, and 16,047 acres, respectively, during the decade.

The causes of the decrease of population are similar to those in the case of Belur and Manjarabad Taluks. The Deputy Commissioner also ascribes the decline in part to plague.

(viii) *Shimoga District.*—The population of the district has declined by 2.8 per cent during the decade and the decrease has affected all the taluks except Shimoga and Channagiri. The decreases vary from 5.7 per cent in Honnali to 10.15 per cent in Sagar Taluk.

The occupied and irrigated areas in the district have increased by 22,097 and 6,343 acres respectively, during the decade.

3. *General summary of results.*—The above analysis discloses the uniform decline during the decade in the population of the *malnad* and *semi-malnad* taluks of the Western Division. The decrease of population in Sagar, Nagar and Tirthahalli Taluks has been going on since 1891. The increase of population in the *maidan* districts of the Eastern Division has generally proceeded with equal pace with the expansion of cultivation and the extension of irrigation in the tracts where the increases have occurred. At the close of 1910-11, 1,062,729 acres of assessed waste land were available for cultivation in the State.

4. *Growth of population from 1871 to 1911.*—The explanation for the different rates of increase between the several Censuses (*vide* para 1 above) has to be sought in the material and sanitary conditions of each decade and in variations in the age-distribution of the population and the distribution of the population by race and religion from time to time.

III—MIGRATION.

1. *Immigration into the State.*—Out of 5,806,193 persons enumerated in the State, 312,908 persons or 5.4 per mille of the population have been returned as born outside the State. Of this number of foreign-born, 308,202 persons or nearly 98 per cent are born in India (outside the State); and 4,263 or more than 1 per cent born in Europe. Of the rest 283 are born in other Asiatic countries; 46 in Africa; 76 in America; 34 in Australasia and 4 at sea. Out of the Indian-born, 230,484 persons came from the districts adjoining the State—Dharwar and North Kanara of the Bombay Presidency, Bellary, Anantapur, Cuddapah, North Arcot, Salem, Coimbatore, Nilgiris, Malabar and South Kanara of the Madras Presidency and Coorg. To this number of immigrants must be added fully half of those who were returned as born in Madras and Bombay (district unspecified), for, there can be no doubt that that number does not overstate those who were born in these adjacent districts but did not know the name of the birth-district, though they could readily name the Presidency. If this be done, it will be found that 254,110 persons or 82 per cent of the Indian-born (outside the State) are born in districts adjoining the State. The same figures, put in another way, show that out of every 1,000 enumerated in the State 946 were born in the State, 40 in the contiguous districts, and 14 in other parts of India and in countries outside India.

2. *Emigration from the State.*—The information received from the several Provincial Census Superintendents discloses the fact that 131,257 persons born in Mysore have left for other parts of India the chief provinces of their sojourn and residence being Madras, Coorg, Bombay and Hyderabad. Of these 16,117 persons have been enumerated in Coorg and 74,960 persons in the contiguous districts of the Madras Presidency. The figures by districts of the Bombay Presidency are not available, but even thus, 91,077 persons or a little more than two-thirds of the emigrants from the State to other provinces and States in India are to be found in the districts adjoining the Mysore State. The emigrants to Ceylon number 8,189. The emigrants to Hong-kong, Rhodesia, the Straits Settlements and Federated Malay States number 1, 3, 1, and 122 respectively.

3. *General conclusions.*—(a) Though an inland country, Mysore has a large population of immigrants (5 per cent) as compared with most Provinces in India, *e.g.*, Madras (which has less than 1 per cent). This is due to the demand for labour on the mines and on coffee and cardamom plantations.

(b) The proportion of emigrants to immigrants is 45 per cent, showing that Mysore gains more by migration than it loses.

(c) The proportion of females to males, whether among emigrants or immigrants, is greater in the case of contiguous districts than in the case of other places.

(d) In the case of immigrants into Bangalore City, a few castes like Beda, Brahman, Holeya, Mudaliar and Vakkaliga comprise nearly 41 per cent of such immigrants, while in the Kolar Gold Fields, Holeyas, Europeans, Anglo-Indians and Indian Christians claim as many as 22,401 or more than half the number of immigrants into the area.

4. *Variation in migration since 1901.*—Noticeable fluctuations since 1901 in immigration are: Bombay (−7,112), Madras (+8,445), the Punjab and North West Frontier Provinces (+1,567), Europe (+1,957); remarkable changes in the emigration figures since 1901 are: Bombay (+821), Coorg (−8,596), Madras (+3,073), Hyderabad (+2,520). The following remarks are made in respect of a few of these countries:—

(i) *Bombay.*—Going down to district figures, we see decreases of Bombay immigrants to Kadur, Chitaldrug, Hassan and Mysore. The coffee industry in Kadur and Hassan is not so paying now as it was a decade or more ago; in Chitaldrug the large public works on the Marikanave lake have been closed; in Mysore the skilled artisans, who were in 1901 engaged on the new Palace works in Mysore City and who were mostly from Bombay must have returned to their homes after completion of the works.

(ii) *Madras.*—The increase is noticeable in Bangalore City, Bangalore District, Kadur and Shimoga. The building industries of the Bangalore City, which in 1901 was very thinly peopled owing to the prevalence of plague, have attracted nearly 5,000 more immigrants in 1911. The exploitation of manganese in Shimoga accounts for nearly 5,000 more in 1911.

(iii) *The Punjab and North West Frontier Province.*—The Civil and Military Station, Bangalore, alone accounts for an increase of over 1,000 immigrants. These comprise the ranks of the British army; in Civil and Military Station, Bangalore, the mining watchmen in the Kolar Gold Fields and ranks of the detachments of the British army on the line of march in Tumkur and Bangalore Districts.

(iv) *Coorg.*—The work on the plantations, in Coorg being slack, there were less emigrants thereto.

(v) *Europe.*—The increase of 1,957 is chiefly due to increase in the immigrants from the United Kingdom. There has been an increase of nearly 1,200 in the Civil and Military Station, Bangalore. The increases of 319 and 315 in the Bangalore and Tumkur Districts respectively are due to enumeration of units of the British army on the line of march on the 10th March 1911.

5. *Migration into Kadur and Shimoga Districts.*—The migration in 1911 into these districts has been specially examined and compared with that in 1901 in order to ascertain how far variation in migration was responsible for the decrease in population of these districts. In the Kadur District, there is a decrease of nearly 18,000 in the number of persons born and enumerated there. Of the immigrants from the other districts of the State, the total decrease is nearly 6,000, the decrease being marked in those from Bangalore and Shimoga Districts. There is a further decrease of nearly 2,500

in the immigrants from the Bombay Presidency, against which might be set off the increase in the case of immigrants from the Madras Presidency (notably from the district of North Kanara).

In the Shimoga District, there has been a decrease of 21,000 in those born and enumerated in the district. Against this there is a slight increase of immigrants from the Bombay Presidency and an increase of more than 5,000 immigrants from the Madras Presidency.

IV—RELIGION.

1. *General distribution of the population by religion.*—The State contains 5,340,908 Hindus, 314,494 Musalmans, 72,196 Animists, 59,844 Christians, 17,630 Jains, 622 Buddhists, 293 Sikhs, 101 Parsis, 65 Brahmos and 40 Jews making in all 5,806,193 persons. There has been a steady increase, during the decade, in the numbers of the Hindus, Musalmans, Christians and Jains, amounting to 4·7, 8·6, 19·5, and 28·9 per cent respectively. As the growth of the total population from 1901 to 1911 amounts to 4·8 per cent, the only notable increases are in the case of Jains, Christians and Musalmans. The Animists have on the other hand declined by 16·7 per cent. The decrease is found to be due to many of the Animist castes (16,491 persons) returning themselves as Hindus in the present Census.

2. *Hindus.*—The Hindu population has increased in all the districts and cities, except Kadur and Shimoga, the percentages of increase varying from 27·5 in Bangalore City to 1·9 in Hassan District and the decreases being 1·1 and 5·3 per cent in the Shimoga and Kadur Districts respectively.

3. *Musalmans.*—The urban Musalman population forms more than one-third of the total Musalman population and consists mostly of artisans and traders. The Mughals (8,151) and Pathans (44,689) seem to be the only numerous indigenous tribes.

4. *Animists.*—These form 1·2 per cent of the total population and are mostly found in the Bangalore, Tumkur, Chitaldrug and Shimoga Districts.

5. *Christians.*—Fully seven-tenths of the Christian population are urban and more than 71 per cent of the Christian population are Roman Catholics.

V—AGE.

1. *Factors affecting age-distribution.*—The age-distribution of the population is mainly determined by the normal birth and death-rates, the other disturbing factors being famine and migration. The effect of famine is to reduce the numbers of the very old and the very young, those in the prime of life sustaining only a comparatively small diminution in their numbers. The effect of emigration is, as the emigrants will consist mostly of adults and if their number is sufficiently large, to reduce the proportion of the middle-aged and raise that of children and old persons in the tracts from which they go, and produce an opposite effect in the age-distribution of the population of the country receiving them. Immigration and emigration have thus counteracting tendencies. M. Sundbarg, Deputy Director of the Central Statistical Bureau, Stockholm, has, in an address before the International Statistical Institute, pointed out that in almost all countries the proportion of persons aged 15-50 to the total population is uniformly about half. This standard cannot be expected to be always conformed to in a country like India where the age-distribution of the population is liable to rude disturbances from periodical visitations of famine and from migration.

2. *Birth and death-rates.*—The death-rate per mille per annum as roughly calculated from the mean age comes to 37. The birth-rate will then be 43, assuming the normal annual rate of increase of population to be 6 per mille. The birth and death-rates as indicated by the departmental returns of births and deaths are however very low and indicate defective registration of vital statistics.

3. *Contrast with European countries.*—From the marginally noted statistics it will be seen that the birth and death-rates in Mysore are much higher than those prevailing in European countries, while the excess of birth-rate over death-rate in all these countries, except France and Ireland, is considerably greater than in Mysore.

VI—PROPORTION OF THE SEXES.

1. *General.*—Taking the population of the whole State, males outnumber females, there being only 979 females for every 1,000 males. The marginal statement exhibits similar proportions for a few other provinces and countries for purposes of comparison.

2. *Divisions and districts.*—The Eastern Division possesses proportionately more females than the Western Division, the actual figures being respectively 986 and 958 per 1,000 males. It is only in the Mysore and Hassan Districts that females exceed males, while the lowest proportion of females is to be found in the Kadur District.

3. *Cities.*—Of the four cities, the Kolar Gold Fields shows so low a proportion of females as 739 per 1,000 males and this is attributable to the greater demand for male labour in mining operations.

4. *Taluks.*—The number of females per 1,000 males in the several taluks varies considerably, ranging from 744 in the Koppa Taluk to 1,108 in the Nagamangala Taluk. Mysore, Malvalli, Belur and Manjarabad Taluks show a deficiency of females, though in the two districts of Mysore and Hassan there is a preponderance of females over males generally.

5. *Urban and rural.*—The total rural population of the State contains 983 females for every 1,000 males, while the proportion of females in the urban population is only 942.

6. *Proportion in natural and actual population.*—Making allowances for immigration and also for emigration as far as available figures permit, the proportion of females in the natural population of the State works up to 990 per 1,000 males as against only 979 in the actual population.

7. *Religions.*—The main religions in the State stand in the following order, arranged according to the proportion of females to males:—Hindu, Animistic, Musalman, Christian and Jain. The

marginal statement gives the number of females per 1,000 males in each of these religions. The low proportion of females among Musalmans, Jains and Christians is partly due to the large preponderance of the male sex in the immigrant population.

8. *Castes.*—It is only among Bestas that females exceed males, and it is remarkable that more than two-thirds of the total population of this caste is to be found in the Mysore District. If the several castes, tribes and races are arranged in order according to the proportion of females, the first six places are taken by Besta, Vakkaliga, Lingayat, Kuruba, Ganiga and Agasa, while the last six are held by Sheikh, Vaisya, Mahratta, Indian Christian, Pathan and Saiyid.

9. *Contrast with European countries.*—In the greater part of Europe, females outnumber males, while in India it is just the reverse. Some European statisticians have suggested the possible omission of several females in Census enumeration as an explanation of this fact. But this hypothesis does not now hold good in the case of Mysore as the people have willingly furnished all the information that was required of them. The following may be mentioned as the causes that tend to bring about this state of things:—

Infant marriage and premature child-bearing; unskilful midwifery; confinement and bad feeding of women at puberty and during their menstrual period and after child-birth; the hard life of widows and the hard labour which women of lower classes have to perform.

VII—CIVIL CONDITION.

1. *Contrast with Europe.*—The marginal statement compares the number of unmarried per 1,000 males and females in India and England according to the Census of 1901. The disparity in the figures of the two countries is due to the married condition being much more common in India than in Europe and the marriage among the Hindus being generally performed before the girl attains puberty.

2. *General review.*—In Mysore, according to the Census of 1911, out of every 11 males 6 are unmarried and of the latter more than two-thirds are less than 15 years of age. Out of every 20

aged 15-40, only 9 are unmarried and among those aged 40 and over, only 1 in 30 is a bachelor. Among females, 4 out of every 11 are unmarried and more than five-eighths of the total number of spinsters are less than 10 years of age and ten-elevenths under 15. Among females aged from 15 to 40, only 1 in 14 is unmarried while among older women it is even less than 1 in 70. There are practically no married males less than 15 years old. At "15-20" one in every 12 males has a wife and the proportion rises steadily to 2 in 5 at "20-25," to 7 in 10 at "25-30," 17 in 20 at "30-35" and 18 in 20 at "35-40," after which there is a gradual decline corresponding to a complementary increase in the proportion of widowers. Females enter on matrimony much earlier in life, and between the ages of 5 and 10, 8 per mille are already married. At "10-15" more than 1 in 5 is wedded and the proportion goes up to 3 in 4 at "15-20" and culminates at "20-25" with more than 17 married out of every 20. Beyond the age 25, the proportion of married females suffers a steady decline owing to mortality among husbands and increase in the ranks of widows. It is interesting to note that the highest proportion of the married among males is claimed by the age-period "35-40," while it is "20-25" for females.

3. *Variation by religion.*—(i) *Hindus.*—Among Hindus a slight excess is noticeable in the proportion of the married at "15-20" in the case of males and at "10-15" and "15-20" in the case of females. This must be due to the prevalence of early marriage among them.

(ii) *Musalman.*—Compared with Hindus, there are in every 200 Musalman males 5 more unmarried, 2 less married and 3 less widowed. The higher proportion of bachelors is due to Musalmans marrying at a comparatively later age than Hindus. The decrease in the proportion of Musalman widowers may be attributed to the existence of greater facilities for their re-marriage. Among Musalman females, although the proportion of wives of all ages is the same as among Hindus, it is only half that among the latter between the ages 5 and 10 and two-thirds of the same at "10-15." This deficiency is made up at later age-periods where the ranks of the married must have been augmented by the re-marriage of Musalman widows. This also accounts for the lower proportion of widows as compared with Hindus.

(iii) *Animists.*—Among Animists the proportion of married males is the same as among Musalmans although from age 10 to 20 marriage appears to be more frequent. The proportion of widowers is higher than among Musalmans but lower than among Hindus. The Animists have proportionately the largest number of married women and the smallest number of widows. Marriage in the earlier ages prior to 20 seems to be less common with them than among Hindus, Musalmans or Jains.

(iv) *Jains.*—The Jains possess a smaller proportion of the married of either sex than Hindus, Musalmans or Animists. The statistics indicate that early marriage is most prevalent among them. They also show the highest proportion of widowers and of widows and especially those of the latter under 20 years of age.

(v) *Christians.*—Among Christians the married state is least common in either sex and the early marriage of boys and girls is least in evidence. They show a very low proportion of widowers and of widows, the Animists alone showing a still smaller figure as regards widows.

4. *Variation by natural divisions.*—In the case of both sexes the married condition is more prevalent in the Eastern than in the Western Division, the latter having a larger proportion of the unmarried and the widowed. This variation is to be observed in each of the main religions except in the case of Christians. Taking the entire population of all religions in the two divisions, it is found that the higher proportion of bachelors and spinsters in the Western Division obtains in all the age-periods and that the proportion of girl-wives aged from 10 to 20 is only three-fourths of that in the Eastern Division.

5. *Child marriage.*—Turning to the Census figures of Imperial Table VII, we find that in a total population of nearly 6 millions, the number of married children under 5 years is 26—9 male and 17 female—besides a single child-widow of the same tender age. Among boys between the ages of 5 and 10, numbering in all nearly 370,000 in the State, 90 have wives and 2 are widowers, while among girls of the same ages 1 in every 128 is married and the actual number of widows is 55 which comes to about 1 in 7,000. The marginally noted figures indicate that infant marriage in Mysore is much less common than in either of the adjacent British provinces or in a Native State like Baroda. Judging by the statistics of unmarried girls between 5 and 10 years of age, the main religions stand in the following order with regard to the prevalence of child marriage:—Jain, Hindu, Animistic, Musalman and Christian.

On comparing the marginal figures indicating the proportion of unmarried children of less than 10 years of age for the past three Censuses, it will be found that there has been a steady improvement since 1891 in the discontinuance of infant marriage, apparently due to the Mysore Infant Marriage Prevention Regulation of 1894.

6. *Prevalence of widowhood.*—(i) Out of every 1,000 females aged from 15 to 40 years, 130 have been returned as widows. The proportion of widows at this age-period is lowest among Animists, being only 71 per mille. The figure rises to 91 for Christians, 96 for Musalmans and 133 for Hindus and finally goes up to 204 for Jains, among whom widowhood is most common.

The proportion of widows of child-bearing age has been steadily declining since 1881. In that year it was so high as 234 per mille owing to the famine of 1876-77. It fell to 152 per mille in 1891, to 139 in 1901 and finally to 130 in 1911. A similar improvement is also observable in the steady decline of girl-widows (of less than 15 years of age) from 1881 onwards.

VIII—EDUCATION.

1. *General review.*—Taking the whole population of the State, only 1 in every 16 persons can read and write. Among males 1 in every 9 is literate, while among females it is only 1 in 77. The proportion of the literate among males less than 10 years of age is 19 per mille; and it increases to 103 per mille at the age-period "10-15," to 137 at "15-20" and finally to 152 at "20 and over." There is a similar rise in the proportion of literate females from 5 per mille at "0-10" to 20 at "10-15" and 24 at "15-20," but it drops down to 13 per mille for higher ages.

2. *Literacy by locality.*—(i) *Divisions.*—The Western Division is more advanced in respect of literacy, containing 62 literate persons in every 1,000 as against 59 in the Eastern Division. It is however found that the superiority of the Western Division is maintained only in the case of males and that as regards females it is more backward than the Eastern Division.

(ii) *Districts.*—Of the eight districts excluding the cities, Kadur stands first with a proportion of 70 literate persons per mille. Then comes Shimoga followed in order by Tumkur, Chitaldrug, Kolar (excluding Gold Fields), Hassan and Bangalore (excluding Bangalore City) with proportions varying from 64 to 53 per mille, while Mysore comes last with not even 4 persons literate in every 100. Though it is not easy to determine the causes for the above variations, it may be observed that the varying proportion of the Christian population in the several districts will slightly affect their relative position in the scale of literacy owing to the greater prevalence of literacy among Christians as compared with Hindus or Musalmans. A high or low proportion of immigrants, the diversity of occupation of the people and the varying degrees of prevalence of primary education are also factors which influence the statistics of literacy (*vide* marginal statement). As regards literacy among males, Kadur

once more stands first with 1 literate male in every 8 and Mysore District (excluding Mysore City) comes last with only 1 in 14. There is generally no connection between the density of population and literacy. The prevalence of literacy among females is very poor when compared with that among males. The highest proportion of literate females is to be found in Kadur District and even there it comes up to only 11 per mille, while the Mysore District (excluding Mysore City) exhibits the meagre proportion of 5 per mille.

(iii) *Cities.*—The inhabitants of cities are far more largely literate than those of rural parts. In the total population of the four cities of the State, 352 males and 101 females per mille can read and write as against 112 males and 13 females in the whole State. Bangalore City contains the highest proportion of literate males, while the lowest is in the Kolar Gold Fields. As regards literacy among females, the Civil and Military Station of Bangalore stands first owing chiefly to the strength of its Christian population. Considering both sexes together, the relative position of the cities stands in the following order:—Bangalore City, Mysore City, Civil and Military Station of Bangalore and Kolar Gold Fields.

3. *By religion.*—Considering the main religions of the State, literacy among males is most widespread in the Christian population among whom 4 in every 9 can read and write. The Jains come next with 2 literate males in every 5 and the proportion drops down to 1 in 5 for Musalmans and still lower to 1 in 10 for Hindus, while the Animists come a long way behind with the lowest proportion of 1 in 91.

Among females also the Christians take the lead with 7 literate females in every 25; next come Musalmans with 1 in 24 followed by Jains with only 1 in 26. The proportion of literate females among Hindus is so low as 8 per mille, while it is even so negligible as 1 per mille among Animists.

4. *By caste.*—The proportion of literate males among the different Hindu castes ranges so wide as from 707 to 5 per mille, the Brahman and the Madiga being the most advanced and the most backward respectively. Next to the Brahman comes the Vaisya with 581 literate males per mille followed in order by the Kshattriya, Panchala, Neygi, Lingayat, Banajiga, Mahratta and Ganiga all of whom exhibit a higher proportion of literate males than the average for the Hindus as a whole. Just above the Madiga at the bottom of the list stand the Vadda and the Holey with a proportion of only 9 and 17 per mille respectively. As regards female education, the Brahman again takes the lead with 119 literate females per mille. A long way behind comes the Kshattriya with a proportion of only

0 per mille, followed by the Vaisya, Banajiga and Mahratta with 22, 20 and 12 per mille respectively. At the lowest rung of the ladder, the Madiga and the Vadda can boast of very few literate females, while the Holeya is only slightly less backward with a proportion of 1 per mille. Europeans and Anglo-Indians are far ahead of Indian Christians. The proportion of literate persons among Protestant Indian Christians is nearly as high as among Anglo-Indians, while the Indian Roman Catholics how only 28 males and 9 females literate in every 100 of each sex.

5. *By language.*—Among the languages of Kanarese, Telugu, Tamil, Hindustani, Mahratti, Sanskrit and English, the language cultivated by the largest proportion of the population is Kanarese which can be read and written by 49 per mille of the population. Then comes English with 7 per mille, followed by Tamil and Hindustani with 5 per mille each, while only 4 per mille can read and write Telugu and 1 per mille can do so in Mahratti and Sanskrit. Viewed by religion, we find that among Hindus, Jains and Animists, Kanarese is the most widespread language of literacy. Hindustani holds a similar place among Musalmans and English in the case of Christians. Among the latter, literacy in Tamil and Kanarese is also fairly well diffused to the extent of 111 and 71 per mille respectively.

6. *Literacy in English.*—In the total population of the State, 12 males and 2 females in every 1,000 of each sex can read and write this language. Knowledge of English is naturally most prevalent in cities and especially in the Civil and Military Station of Bangalore with its large European and Anglo-Indian population. Among the several districts, Kadur which contains the largest proportion of Christians is likewise the most advanced in respect of literacy in English, while Mysore District (excluding Mysore City) stands at the bottom of the list. Again, if the statistics be examined by religion, it will be found that Christians are considerably in advance of Hindus, Musalmans, Jains or Animists. Among Christians the proportion of English-knowing persons is 284 per mille in the case of males and 194 per mille for females. The proportions are naturally even higher among Europeans and Anglo-Indians as English is generally their mother-tongue, while the figures for Indian Christians are much lower, viz., 123 and 55 per mille as regards males and females respectively. Here again, among the Indian Christians themselves, English-knowing persons are proportionately thrice as numerous among Protestants as among Roman Catholics. The Jains come a very long way behind Christians, with a proportion of only 13 per mille for males and 1 per mille for females, closely followed by Musalmans and Hindus. But in a few of the Hindu castes, viz., Brahman, Kshattriya, Vaisya and Banajiga, the proportion of English-knowing males is comparatively high, ranging from 156 to 17 per mille. In fact, the Brahmans claim a higher proportion of males literate in English than even Indian Christians, although Brahman females lag considerably behind their Christian sisters. In the whole female population of Hindus numbering more than 2½ millions, there are only 662 who can read and write English, while 50 can do so in a population of nearly 150,000 Musalman females. The entire Animistic female population of more than 35,000 is absolutely ignorant of English, while among Animistic males, the number returned as literate in English is actually 4.

We have hitherto been discussing the proportion which the number of persons literate in English

7. *Comparison with previous Censuses.*—There has been a steady advance since 1891 in the diffusion of literacy in the State. The progress made by females has been more rapid than in the case of males. In the spread of English education there has been likewise a steady improvement since 1891 when the proportion of males and of females literate in English stood at 51 and 11 per mille respectively. The figures rose to 83 and 16 in 1901 and to 117 and 21 in 1911.

8. *Departmental statistics.*—We may now conclude with a brief review of the figures compiled from departmental returns throwing

Military Station of Bangalore) as compared with similar expenditure in 1900—01.

9. *Newspapers and books.*—The number of newspapers and periodicals published in the State in 1911 was 47 with a total circulation of 35,898, against 24 and 18,082 respectively in 1901. Journalistic activity has thus nearly doubled during the decade and this may be taken as indicating a

corresponding increase in the thirst for general information and knowledge on the part of the literate public. The progress in journalistic output has been greater in Kanarese than in English publications.

The total number of books published during the past decade was only 733 as compared with 1,327 in the decade 1891-1900, although the output in the English language in particular shows a remarkable increase.

IX—LANGUAGE.

1. *General linguistic distribution.*—In the whole State (including Civil and Military Station, Bangalore) the number of persons speaking the vernaculars of the State, viz., Kanarese, Hindustani, Marathi, Tamil and Telugu, is 5,691,625; those speaking the Indian vernaculars foreign to the State number 99,323, while 1,706 persons speak vernaculars of Asiatic countries beyond India and 13,539 speak European languages.

The statement in the margin shows that the decrease in the past decade among those speaking

the vernaculars of the State is very noticeable in Kadur and Shimoga Districts and in the Kolar Gold Fields, while there is a slight increase in the Mysore District and Mysore City. Of persons speaking vernaculars of India foreign to the State, there has been a marked increase in the Kolar Gold Fields, Kadur and Shimoga Districts. Among speakers of European languages there is an increase in Bangalore City and decreases are seen in the Kolar Gold Fields and Mysore City.

2. *Vernaculars of the State, (i) Kanarese.*—This language is spoken by 714 per mille of the

population. The marginal statement shows that Mysore, Hassan, Kadur and Shimoga Districts return more than four-fifths of their populations as Kanarese speakers. In Kolar District Telugu displaces Kanarese as the principal mother-tongue. The proportion of Kanarese speakers is very low in the cities, being most marked in the Kolar Gold Fields and the Civil and Military Station, Bangalore. Mysore District (including Mysore City) contains 29 per cent of the Kanarese speakers in the State, Tumkur District, 14 per cent, Bangalore District (including Bangalore City and C. and M. Station) and Hassan District 13 per cent each, Chitaldrug and Shimoga Districts 10 per cent each, Kadur District 6 per cent and Kolar District (including Kolar Gold Fields) 5 per cent.

(ii) *Hindustani.*—The speakers of Hindustani number 53 per mille of the population. Kolar and Shimoga Districts have each a little more than 6 per cent of their populations speaking this language, while Mysore District has only about 3 per cent. Of the cities, the C. and M. Station of Bangalore has nearly 23 per cent of its population speaking Hindustani, Mysore City 20 per cent, Bangalore City 12 per cent and Kolar Gold Fields only 5 per cent.

(iii) *Marathi.*—The Bangalore District (including Bangalore City and C. and M. Station) and the Shimoga District contain altogether 50 per cent of the total number of Marathi speakers in the State, who themselves form a little more than one per cent of the whole population.

(iv) *Tamil.*—This language is spoken by 4 per cent of the population of the State. Seventy-seven per cent of the population of Kolar Gold Fields, 42 per cent of that of the C. and M. Station and 22 and 11 per cent respectively of those of the cities of Bangalore and Mysore speak Tamil. Bangalore and Kolar are the only districts having more than 6 per cent of the population speaking Tamil, while it is less than one per cent in Shimoga and Chitaldrug.

(v) *Telugu*.—Nearly 16 per cent of the population of the State speak Telugu. As many as 93 per cent of these live in the four districts of Kolar (including Kolar Gold Fields), Bangalore (including Bangalore City and C. and M. Station), Tumkur and Chitaldrug.

3. *Other numerically important languages*: (i) *Lambani*.—(43,667). This language is chiefly met with in Shimoga, Chitaldrug, Kadur and Bangalore Districts. (ii) *Tulu*.—(31,995). This is spoken mostly by immigrants from South Kanara. Kadur District has 21,976 speakers, Shimoga 5,265 and Hassan 4,518. (iii) *Konkani*.—(9,358). This dialect of Marathi is spoken chiefly by immigrants from the Konkan who are mostly found in Kadur and Shimoga Districts. (iv) *Malayalam*.—(4,692). Nearly one-half of the total Malayalam-speaking population in the State is to be found in Kolar Gold Fields. The only districts having above 500 speakers are Kadur and Hassan.

4. *The English language*.—This language has been returned as mother tongue by 13,120 persons in the State.

X—INFIRMITIES.

1. The chief infirmities for which statistics were collected at the present Census are (i) insanity, (ii) deaf-mutism (from birth), (iii) blindness (total) and (iv) corrosive leprosy. The number of persons suffering from such infirmities in the State is given in the margin along with figures for 1901 for purposes of comparison.

There were altogether 596 cases of admission into the Lunatic Asylum at Bangalore during the ten years 1901-10, of which the cause of insanity was known in 283 cases, 56 being due to moral causes and 227 to physical. Out of the latter 83 were due to alcohol and *ganja*, 38 to epilepsy, 17 to congenital and hereditary causes, 14 to masturbation, 11 to child-birth, 7 to over-study and the remaining 57 to other physical causes. The different types of insanity due to *ganja* tend to become chronic and are not easily curable. Sexual excesses and consanguineous marriages as also enforced widowhood among Hindus and the *Zenana* system of the Muhammadans have likewise been alleged as tending to insanity.

3. *Deafmutism*.—The marginal statement gives the number of deaf-mutes at the present and the previous Censuses as also the proportion of females to males in the afflicted population. These figures will show that the males suffer more than the females from deafmutism as is the case in most other forms of congenital malformation.

4. *Statistics by age, locality and caste*.—The statistics by age go to show that the deaf-mutes are generally short-lived, the proportion being highest between the ages of 10 and 20. This infirmity is not peculiar to any locality in particular, but is seen to prevail more or less uniformly in all parts of the State, ranging from 70 per 100,000 in the Kolar District to 87 in the Kadur District.

5. *Blindness*.—The statistics of the blind according to the Censuses of 1911 and 1901 compare as follows:—

6. *Causes of blindness*.—More than other infirmities, blindness depends on (1) occupation, (2) habitation and (3) locality. Sedentary occupations have their bad effects on eye-sight. The

proverbially ill-lit and ill-ventilated habitations of rural tracts, continuous or frequent exposure to dust and glare and the pernicious treatment of eye-diseases by quacks have not a little to do in impairing the vision and producing blindness.

7. *Relief for the deaf-mute and the blind*.—To brighten the cheerless lot of these unfortunate persons, a school was started at Mysore in 1901, where the deaf-mutes are taught drawing, weaving, sewing, knitting, mat-making and such other simple industries. The blind are taught the three R's by the Braille method. Music, vocal and instrumental, ratan work and tape weaving also form part of the curriculum. In 1904 a hostel was attached to the school wherein the inmates are lodged, clothed and fed free of cost. The American method of oral teaching is adopted for teaching the deaf-mutes. There were 14 boys in the class for the deaf-mute and 17 in that for the blind during the official year 1909-10. With a view to alleviate the sufferings of the eye, an ophthalmic hospital equipped with the most up-to-date appliances and directed by a specialist has been located at Bangalore and is doing good work.

8. *Leprosy*.—The marginal statement shows the number of lepers of each sex according to the

Censuses of 1911 and 1901. An examination of the statistics by caste shows that leprosy is prevalent almost uniformly among all the castes in the State and is not peculiar to any one of them in particular.

2. *Variations since 1901.*—While the increase in the number of Hindus (all castes) in the State since 1901 amounts to 4·7 per cent, it is noteworthy that the Kshatriyas and Mudalis have advanced by 49·1 and 52·2 per cent respectively, while the Idigas, Kumbaras and Mahrattas have declined by 19·6, 4 and 14 per cent respectively.

(a) *Kshatriya.*—There have been notable increases in the Chitaldrug, Bangalore and Kolar Districts.

(b) *Mudali.*—The increase has occurred in the Civil and Military Station, Bangalore.

(c) *Idiga.*—The marked decrease in this caste is more apparent than real, owing to the 'Hale-paikas' being variously classed under 'Idiga' and 'Vakkaliga.'

(d) *Kumbara.*—The decrease is general in the Western Division and also in the district of Chitaldrug.

(e) *Mahratta.*—The decrease is noticeable in the Mysore, Chitaldrug and Kolar Districts; the result in the case of the first two districts being mainly due to the closure during the decade of the large public works on the new Palace and the Marikanave lake respectively.

XII—OCCUPATIONS.

1. *Classification of occupations.*—For purposes of the Census Report, all occupations have been divided into 4 main classes, 12 sub-classes, 55 orders and 169 groups (*vide* Classified Scheme of Occupations appended to Chapter XII of the Report). The four main classes and the twelve sub-classes are given below :—

(a) *Distribution of population by classes and sub-classes of the occupation scheme.*—The percentage distribution of the population by the main classes will show that 74·0 are engaged in the production of raw materials, 12·2 in the preparation and supply of material substances, 5·3 in public administration and liberal arts and 8·5 in miscellaneous occupations.

4. *Review of statistics by sub-classes.*—(a) *Agriculture.*—In every 1,000 persons in the State 724 are supported by agriculture. Viewed by districts, the proportion is highest in the riverine districts of Hassan and Mysore, being 801 and 800 per mille respectively; next comes Tumkur (769); and this is followed by Bangalore (762), Shimoga (740), Kolar (729), Kadur (717) and Chitaldrug (715).

(b) *Extraction of minerals.*—Ninety-one in every 10,000 are supported by this sub-class, of whom 3 are employed in the extraction of earth salt in the Chitaldrug District and 87 on the gold and manganese mines of the Kolar and Shimoga Districts respectively.

(c) *Industries.*—Next to agriculture comes the industrial occupation supporting 764 in every 10,000 persons in the State. Of these, 177 are supported by the dress and toilet industries. Textiles, industries of luxury, building industries, wood and ceramics come next employing 175, 92, 84, 70 and 46 respectively.

Apart from the information collected on the general population Census schedules regarding the occupation of each individual in the State, special statistics were also collected in regard to factory industries employing not less than 20 persons on the date of the Census, with a view to ascertain the recent industrial development in the State. The total number of factory employees, including those employed on the gold mines of Kolar, manganese mines of Shimoga and the coffee, cardamom and rubber plantations of the Kadur and Hassan Districts, is 58,613, of whom 45,382 or 77 per cent are males and 13,231 or 23 per cent females. In every 1,000 employees in factories, 37 are engaged in direction, supervision, etc., 171 are skilled labourers and 792 are unskilled workmen; and among the latter 704 are of age 14 and over, and 88 under 14. The percentage of Europeans and Anglo-Indians to the total number employed in the superior staff of direction and supervision is 33·6. Among skilled workmen 5 in every 100 are Europeans and Anglo-Indians and the remaining 95 Indians. Among the big industrial undertakings in the State may be mentioned the gold mines of Kolar, the woollen and cotton spinning and weaving mills of the Bangalore City, the cotton ginning and pressing mills of Davangere and the Cauvery Electrical Power Scheme at Sivasamudram in the Mysore District. The last of these which supplies power to the gold mines of Kolar and which was completed in 1902 has largely stimulated the production of gold and contributed to the increase of the mining population of the Kolar Gold Fields from 38,204 in 1901 to 48,635 in 1911.

(d) *Transport.*—Transport supports 53 in every 10,000 of the total population. Of these 53, one comes under 'Transport by water', 30 under 'Transport by road', 16 under 'Transport by rail', and 6 under 'Postal, telegraph and telephone services.'

(e) *Trade.*—Four hundred and six persons in every 10,000 are traders in the State. Among the districts, Bangalore has the largest proportion of the trading population (65 per mille) and Hassan the least (25 per mille). The high proportion in the Bangalore District is due to the inclusion in it of Bangalore City and Civil and Military Station, Bangalore, which are the chief trading centres in the State.

(f) *Public force.*—Twelve per mille are supported by this sub-class; and the Civil and Military Station of Bangalore alone contributes more than 15 per cent of the total population comprised under this sub-class in the State.

(g) *Public administration.*—Two hundred and twenty-nine in every 10,000 persons in the State are supported by this sub-class, of whom 55 only are actual workers and the rest dependants.

(h) *Professions and liberal arts.*—The number supported by this sub-class per 10,000 of the total population is 140; and these are distributed under detailed heads of this sub-class as shown in the margin. Among them 45 are workers and the rest dependants. Of the 45 actual workers, 19 follow 'Religion,' 1 'Law,' 4 'Medicine,' 14 'Instruction' and 7 'Letters, arts and sciences.'

(i) *Persons living on their income.*—Thirty-six per 10,000 of the total population are supported by this sub-class, of whom 12 are actual workers and the rest dependants. This sub-class comprises all kinds of proprietors (other than agricultural), fund and scholarship holders and pensioners.

(j) *Domestic service.*—All persons who earn their livelihood as cooks, water carriers, private grooms, coachmen, etc., are comprised under this head. They form 66 per 10,000 of the total population, 35 of them being actual workers.

(k) *Insufficiently described occupations.*—This sub-class includes all persons who returned their avocations in general terms which did not indicate a definite occupation, and their proportion per mille of the total population is 69.

(l) *Unproductive.*—In this sub-class are included the inmates of jails, asylums and hospitals and also beggars, vagrants, etc. They form 89 per 10,000 of the total population.
