THE MADRAS PRESIDENCIAL
ADDRESS.

To Her Most Gracious Majesty, Victoria.

*Of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and
Ireland, Queen Empress of India.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY:—

We, the undersigned, representing Your Majesty's subjects of every race and every creed throughout the Presidency of Madras, do unanimously desire, on the auspicious occasion of Your Majesty's Jubilee, to approach Your Majesty with our loyal congratulations. Your Majesty's assumption of direct Sovereign supremacy over the Empire of India is accepted as the most glorious event in the annals of this ancient land. In Madras it heralded the dawn of a new era of progress and prosperity. Education has been encouraged and sanitation promoted; roads have been made, rivers bridged, railways opened, telegraphs constructed, and irrigation extended; a system of local self-government has been introduced, industries have been stimulated, and the resources of the country largely developed. During the fifty years of Your Majesty's reign the Presidency of Madras has conspicuously enjoyed the blessing of tranquillity, the result of the wisdom and impartiality which have pre-eminently characterised Your Majesty's Government. The even tenour of events in this Presidency was disturbed in

1877 by a famine of unprecedented severity, which evoked from Your Majesty's subjects in the United Kingdom a response, unparalleled in its munificence, to the appeal made for help in our great extremity. Your Majesty's personal sympathy, on that occasion, is not the least of Your Majesty's many claims on our gratitude. In profound thankfulness for the noble words of Your Majesty's Proclamation that in our prosperity is Your Majesty's strength, in our contentment Your Majesty's security, and in our gratitude Your Majesty's great reward. We earnestly pray for the long continuance of Your Majesty's beneficent reign, and for the welfare of Your Majesty and the Royal Family. With sentiments of deepest loyalty and attachment we subscribe ourselves Your Majesty's most obedient and devoted subjects.

THE JUBILEE.

Indian History has not furnished a Jubilee for 800 years, but English History has already given us three such joyful events for solemnization. First Henry the Third's Jubilee, which was commemorated when England was disturbed with internecine disputes. This Sovereign gave England the greatest national assembly in the world, the British Parliament. The Jubilee of

King Edward the Third followed, but was not observed in a fitting manner, considering that to his pious memory we owe great intellectual and moral reforms. In more modern times we have that of George the Third, on which occasion there was great national rejoicing and enthusiasm. Rich and poor were sumptuously feasted and royally fêted. Deserters from the Army were set free as a mark of Sovereign clemency. To George the Third we are indebted for Constitutional Law and Improved Procedure. It is the special privilege of the present generation, to celebrate the fourth and most illustrious Jubilee the world has ever witnessed, in honor of our Gracious Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, whom "We admire for her domestic virtues; we admire for her untiring devotion to duty; we admire for her determination to do all that is right and graceful as the head of Society, we love for her boundless sympathy with the joys and sorrows of all sorts and conditions of men. We cannot but remark the advances in civilization that have been made, during Her Majesty's reign throughout her vast dominions. We are proud of the growth of England's power. If we look only at the map of Asia, we see how the British Empire has extended to the borders of Afghanistan in the North-West and the confines of China in the South-East. We find this great empire peaceful and contended, traversed by roads, railways, canals and telegraphs. If we look around these lovely hills, we find that the wild forest, which fifty years ago was the haunt of the

tiger and elephant, is now the site of smiling villages tenanted by a prosperous peasantry. When His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent was on his death bed, feeling his end approaching, he asked for his little daughter to be brought to him. Placing his hands on her head he prayed fervently that, if ever she came to the throne she would rule her people in the fear of God. The prayer of the dying parent has been answered, and the child set herself, conscientiously to serve her God.

By shaping her August decrees,
Which keep her throne unshaken still,
Broad leased upon her people's will
And compassed by the inviolate sea.

To the people of India, Queen Victoria's reign has been one of the most beneficent for which the Thanksgivings of a grateful nation can be devoted. Political Glory, Military Triumphs, and Territorial Expansion have marked her reign elsewhere, but in this country the British Empire has achieved a vast industrial progress. India has, within the past fifty years, made sufficient advancement to compete with the markets of the world. She no longer retails luxuries, which only the rich can afford to buy, but she is a wholesale producer of food and of fabrics, that feed and clothe nations scattered over the globe. In 1837 India exported about ten millions sterling worth of luxuries for which she got her own price. In 1887 she will export 90

millions of staples, the prices of which will be regulated by the competition of the world. This great revolution has occurred, within the fifty years we are now celebrating, and it implies vast changes in the working life of the people of this country. What better form of commemoration can there be of this stupendous industrial development, than by the effort, to fit India for her new industrial place among the nations, by technical education. England and India have at this moment a unique opportunity. India has the cheapest labor market; England the cheapest capital, and these forces combine under most favorable auspices. England can supply India with machinery and steam power to develop, on a great scale, her exquisite but labored manufactures. In Europe and America, a new industrial era has called into existence new methods of instructing the national labor and rendering it more effective. India's future position in the industrial world will be in proportion to the degree she adopts similar methods. The cry we have lately heard, throughout India, for technical education was a providential introduction and direction to the permanent means proposed of accentuating national industrial progress. The education of the people has within itself an inherent life which can never perish and which promises to throw out simpler growths from generation to generation.

On the suggestion of the Madras Committee, the Collector of the Nilgiris, convened a public meeting on the 20th October last, to consider the fittest manner of celebrating the Jubilee of her most Gracious Majesty on the Nilgiris.

The meeting was a representative one and well attended, Sir Harry Prendergast presiding. The date then fixed for public rejoicing in India, was the 1st of January, being the Tenth Anniversary of the Assumption by Her Majesty of the Title of Empress of India. Several gentlemen spoke on the occasion and various proposals were put forward, one that a gold nugget should be presented to Her Majesty, in token of our loyalty, which she might keep and hand down as an heirloom to posterity. With the nomination of a District Committee, that meeting terminated.

The Viceroy subsequently fixed the 16th of February as the day for celebrating the Jubilee throughout India, and this date has been accepted everywhere, although a few dissentients appeared here and there.

On the 5th Instant, a District Committee assembled at the Brecks school and decided upon uniting with the Madras Committee in adopting.

A general Address of loyal congratulation, and in contributing towards the cost of a Casket, a Memorial Volume, the Victoria Technical Institute and the Imperial Institute in England. For these objects 15 per cent. of the total District Jubilee Fund of the Nilgiris will be devoted, plus special contribution for any particular objects.

The Mohamedan Community of Ootacamund presented a loyal address in Hindustani, accompanied with a translation, both on parchment, and illuminated, for transmission, through the Madras Committee, to Her Majesty.

Having thus provided for objects in common with the rest of the Presidency, the Committee resolved to devote the balance of the funds in carrying out the following

Programme.

1. A Thanksgiving service at 9 A.M.

At 6.45 a display will be made on the Polo Ground.

7. Illuminations. Lights will line the roads starting from the Brewery, over the Brahmins bridge, past Commercial road, to Charing Cross, along the Serpentine to the Garden Gate, then back and up the Commissioner's road, past Oakes' and Spencer's, to the Club, down Peyton's road to the Willowbund and along the Lower Bazaar road.

The entrance to the Library will be illuminated; the Club and the grounds attached, the front of Messrs Oakes' and Spencer's shops, the Hindu temples, the Agraharum Temple, and the Soobramani Temple.

The Murree Brewery will not illuminate, but will be decorated with a profusion of bunting, which will also be used to set off the ornamental proportions of the A. B. C. Pavillion. At night this building will be illuminated with an abundance of Chinese lanterns.

The bonfires will be kindled on Church Hill, Elk Hill, Dodabet, the Hill above Government House and on Teneriffe and Dodabet in Coonoor.

The days amusements will conclude with a public Ball at the Assembly Rooms at 9.30 P.M.

There were several Meetings of the Asylum Staff to take steps for the commemoration of the Queen's Jubilee at the Lawrence Asylum, and it was finally decided to devote two days, the 16th and 17th to that object,—the 16th to be entirely for the pleasure and amusement of the children, and the 17th as a general holiday for the Staff. At the request of the Principal, the Committee were so good as to sanction an expenditure, not exceeding Rs.500, to provide a fête for the children, whilst the Staff without exception, subscribed liberally for their own entertainment on the following day. It was also decided to give the native servants, in permanent employ at the Asylum, a good meal on the 17th.

The proceedings on the 16th will open with a special service at 9 A.M., immediately after which a memorial tree will be planted, and will be followed by the distribution of money to the children, to enable them to take part in the day's entertainment, which will be conducted on the lines of a Fair in England, and to carry out which, the whole of the Asylum staff will devote their services throughout the day. Sports and fun of all kinds, merry-go-rounds, and Jugglers will be provided. The children will sit down to a substantial dinner and tea, and the day's proceedings will conclude with a display of fireworks and the burning of a huge bonfire on the summit of Chinna Dodabetta, which commands a view of Ooty, Wellington, Coonoor and the low country around Coimbatore.

The programme for the second day is a Cricket match, the Asylum *versus* the Blue Mountains Club, the gentlemen composing which having kindly consented to help in the day's amusement. A luncheon will be provided to which the staff and families, as well as invited guests will sit down, and the evening will finish with a dance.
