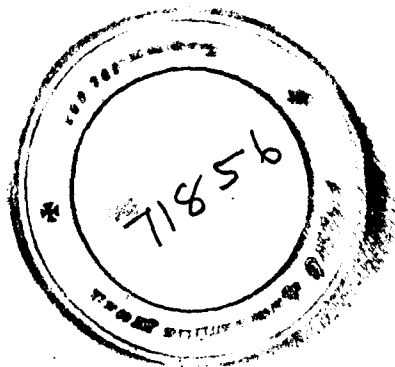

She is directed to liquidate the arrears before the end of the current fasli. 2. She is informed that the long period during which the arrears have been outstanding renders any further postponement out of the question. The reasons advanced for not signing the paper sent are insufficient. If the arrears are not liquidated within the time allowed the wheel of the regulations will be set in motion.	1-2

31-3-08	Madras Fanam Circulation of. To the Board. 1. The Collector in his report about the circulation of the Madras fanam in his division explains how it affects those who pay to Government and secondly how it will affect the receipts of revenue. 2. The settlement with the mirasidars of Tanjore has been concluded uniformly in chuckrums and once the value of a chuckrum is determined in terms of the Madras fanams, they do not object to the payment of revenue in these coins, but had there been any dearth of these coins there would have been loud complaints. 3. The only effect it has on revenues is that it at once shows the real instead of the fallacious value. "The fallacious value alluded to is the book rate of bringing the revenue to account in star pagodas at 24 Tanjore fanams for each, while in fact the real value of the star pagodas seldom exceeds 22½ which seems to be universally admitted as the fair and equitable rate." 4. "In compliance with the Board's orders I transmit a copy of a statement formerly prepared for the mint master showing the relative rates of exchange between the coins usually current in Tanjore and the star pagoda." He advocates the currency of the new coins. "I can't take upon myself to say how the adoption of the former will affect the latter at a future period. But there can be little doubt that it would be greatly beneficial to the community at large, were the currency restricted in its denominations to the new coinage and this could be done by a notification."	92-5

He has been requested to communicate to His Excellency the Raja of Tanjore that if he wishes any departure from the usual rules, his intention may be conveyed through the Resident at Tanjore instead of his sarishtadar, who it seems has been desired to receive the Raja's brother-in-law in the same manner as he would receive the Raja himself if he passes through his district. This application has not been supported by the Raja and an innovation cannot be carried out without his express orders.	96

3. On their refusal to comply with this demand, the nature of the demand was explained to them and this petition is the outcome of the explanations. 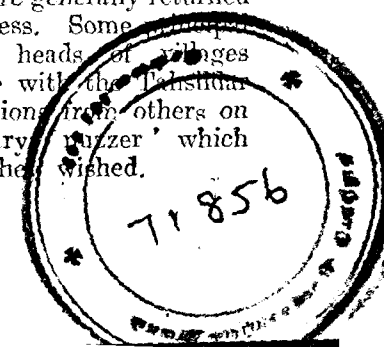

2. "The occupancy of its lands is periodically changed by the proprietors." Statements of the measurement, classification and description of lands are prepared in detail and transmitted for the information of the Board.
3. There are about 39 proprietors. Statements showing the extent of land held by each, the total amount of assessment paid by each are also prepared.
4. In addition to the nunjah and punjah lands, there are certain tope lands, a statement of their extent, assessment etc., is also furnished. A statement of the different shares of the Government, cultivator and swaduntrums etc., is also transmitted.
5. "Regarding the question whether it is possible to assess separately and independently all the subdivisions into which these kutlies are divided. . . I fear the obstacles are so many and powerful as to leave but little hopes of success at present." "The total uncertainty also either of the number or value of these subdivisions adds greatly to the difficulty as both are liable to vary annually with the state of sources of irrigation. ."

1. Since the transfer of the country to the British Government in fasli 1210 aumani management was carried on till fasli 1213 and up to the end of the fasli 1216 annual settlements were formed upon dowle.
2. A committee was appointed to advise on the best method that could be adopted in the district. The village decided on renting which was, accordingly, enforced. Entire attention to the sources of irrigation increased the quantity of produce.

3. The Collector chronicles the vicissitudes of the season, grain market, production etc., year after year and what steps were taken to remedy the grievances of the unfavourable seasons.
4. Attention to the sources of irrigation "together with all the benefits of a mild and steady system of Government and the protection it affords to persons and property . . . tended to produce a great degree of prosperity to the community at large."
5. "This province has never been under a Muhammadan Government. It has from its earliest records till its transfer to the British Government, been governed by its own Hindu princes. . . All the Hindu laws and religion are scrupulously maintained and adhered to." No province surpasses Tanjore in this respect.
6. The whole activities of cultivation, sale etc., are performed by the whole body of villagers in the cheapest manner as they all have an equal concern in it. "Were all these interests however at once divided and broken asunder, every individual of the community would be obliged personally to conduct all these various undertakings, to many of which he would prove comparatively unequal."
7. The village rent system has infused in them a sort of freedom to manage their own affairs after their fashion but the ryotwari settlement tends to lessen this freedom and "creates too intimate an interference on the part of the Government." "The less the direct hand of the Government, generally, is seen, unless in cases palpably obvious as to carry the conviction of all men along with the propriety of it, the more efficacious and more popular will it prove when it does exercise its powers. . ."
8. "If the ryotwari system is introduced an abatement to the extent of 15% will at least be required in all 'Peshangerry villages' and probably about 1% more on the jummah, to be further remitted."
9. The Collector considers Col. Munro's remark that "traces remain of money teerwahs having been once established in this district" to be groundless. The introduction of joint responsibility to discharge in obligation of the Government has proved "an excellent preventive against the misappropriation of means for extravagance etc."
10. The sale of lands is generally effected in small portions, "not holding sufficient temptation to the public servants to run the risk of detection" and consequent loss of their situations. Preference should be given to public sale of lands over the private purchase as it is founded upon the "Law of the country and does not in any way proceed from the nature of the revenue administration."
