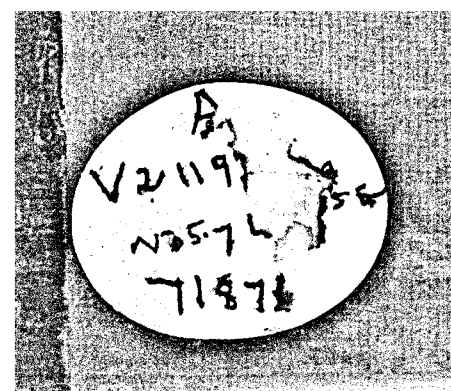

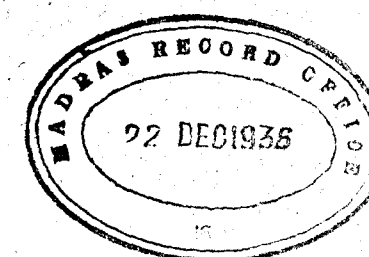

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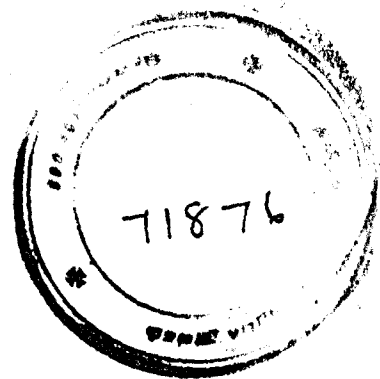
1821.

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	2. The circular letter from the Board, dated 1st July 1819, which is assigned as the authority, has been cancelled by a letter from the Board, dated 30th September following, which directed that "instead of writing off at once all the old balances of more than 15 years standing," a statement should be submitted of "all such balances" showing those which were considered "to be desperate" and those "deemed recoverable."	
	3. "Under these circumstances none of the old balances should have been written off." In the next abstract of collections and disbursements, "the balances of the old accounts may be again brought forward as a demand and so continued in the monthly abstracts, until the authority of Government be obtained through the Board of Revenue for the whole or any part of them being written off to profit and loss."	

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12-7-21	2. Replying to the Collector's letter of the 7th instant directing her to state her age, when she was married, who her husband was, what his property was when he died, whether she did not receive also a pension from the Danish Government and how much and why it ceased.	291-9
	3. She states that she was married in 1778 to Mr. H. Olivarius, then Magistrate in the Danish service at Tranquebar. He went as an Embassy to Seringapatam and in 1779 was appointed Danish Resident at Colechy, which office he held for 10 years. In 1789, was appointed Treasurer and Master Attendant at Tranquebar and died there in 1797.	

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	5. Her mother, the late Mrs. Meyer, obtained an application to the late Hon. Governor in Council at Madras a monthly subsistence of 3 pagodas, in consideration of the services of her late husband as clerk of the Protestant Church of Negapatam. She lived with her mother until her death on the 27th July 1820, when the pension ceased.	
	6. She requests the Collector to make a recommendation for her to obtain the continuation of the pension of 5 pagodas, "she was allowed till the year 1815." "In my present and advanced age of 56 years and infirmity, I cannot endure so much distress."	

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	2. The amount assumed in his estimate as realizable from the land revenue, both current and arrears, is Rs. 27,90,000 and if this sum is reduced by 4 lacs, the estimated revenue will not exceed Rs. 23,90,000. As the land revenue receipts last year amounted to Rs. 29,06,474 and in the year preceding to Rs. 28,59,816, the sum proposed to be assumed for the current year "will be considerably in decrease and much within the collections realized in any of the last 10 years."	
	3. The Collector is requested to "furnish information of the general causes that may operate to produce an expectation that the land revenue receipts in the current year will fall so low as Rs. 23,90,000, eventually even lower."	
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8-3-1822	Manali Chinniah Mudaliyar Estate of. From Mr. John Carruthers, Hon. Company's Solicitor.	293-7-B
	1. Moottoo Krishna Moodelliar and his brother intend to visit the several villages and inspect the mirassy and Teerva maniam lands lately belonging to their father Manali Chinniah Moodelliar in Tanjore and other places, to sign the jamabandy accounts, and to collect the revenues of those lands.	
	2. There are two other sons, of the said Chinniah Moodelliar, named Ponniah Moodelliar and Lutchamanah Moodelliar, both infants, and who were equally entitled to the estates. In a suit for partition in the Supreme Court by Lutchamana Mudaliar against his brothers, they have entered into an agreement to share equally the said estate. A receiver is to be appointed to collect the several outstandings.	
	3. It is requested that Moodookrishna Moodelliar and Krishnaswamy Moodelliar may not be allowed "to do any acts of ownership" to the prejudice of their brothers, until a receiver is appointed. The contents of the letter may also be made known throughout the districts wherein the estates are situated.

30-5-1822	Prompt despatch insisted on. From the Accountant-General.	85-7
	1. Replying to the Collector's letter of the 27th instant stating that as soon as the remittance boxes now on the way back from Madras are received and the escort applied for from Trichinopoly, the remittance ordered from the treasury will be despatched, the Accountant-General observes that "the state of the finance always requires the utmost promptitude on the part of Collectors in despatching their remittances and commanding officers have instructions to give immediate compliance with all applications for escorts to prevent any delay."	
	2. These observations are made because "the detention may eventually be attended with serious financial inconvenience, it depending on the arrival of these boxes when the Presidency resources will have the assistance called for from your district."	
22-4-22	Roberts, Mr. C. Sub-Collector, Negapatam—Conduct of. From the Sub-Collector, Negapatam.	181-7
	1. The Collector, Mr. Cotton, while expressing his sorrow at the Sub-Collector's indisposition, required that he should leave Negapatam. The Sub-Collector had already stated his intention of joining him for the purpose of meeting H.H. the Raja, so soon as he recovered and was able to move.	
	2. The range of seacoast in his division, which the Collector assigned as a reason for his quitting the station, did not offer the smallest shelter for himself or cutcherry.	

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	Roberts, Mr. C.—cont. So far from being able to secure the attendance of a medical gentleman from Combaconam when required, the only person in that line stationed there had such extensive duties as to render it impossible for him to travel a distance of 40 miles to attend on him.	
	3. Notwithstanding these circumstances, the Sub-Collector informed the Collector that he had determined to meet H.H. the Raja at the boundary of his division and to relieve the Collector from attendance on him.	
	4. He was prevented from accomplishing these duties by the sudden attack of a bowel complaint. The Collector in his letter of the 18th observed that the Sub-Collector's "business cannot possibly go on properly" while he continued at Negapatam and that in the event of its being necessary for him to remain there longer, he would obtain a certificate from Dr. Smarts to be transmitted to the Board.	
	5. The Sub-Collector states that the doctor is of opinion that he will be able to quit his station by the close of the week.	
	6. As regards the arrears of business, the Sub-Collector states that no communication from anyone of his Tahsildars remains "either answered or unanswered." As the Collector has so lately inspected his cutcherry it would have been easy to point out any neglect or error.	
	7. The Sub-Collector concludes, "It is unnecessary for me to offer an opinion on the nature and tendency of your correspondence." "As you are directing the preparation of copies, I shall leave it to the liberality of the Board of Revenue and of Government to decide whether there has been any impropriety in my conduct or whether the exigence of the service demanded communications such as you have addressed to me."

18-5-22	Revenue Establishments Increase—Statement of. From the Sub-Collector, Kaveripatam.	217-25
	1. A memorandum is submitted of the proposed increase in the husoor establishment. The additional expense proposed being trifling, the total expenditure will still be on a reduced scale in comparison with either the establishment of the then Sub-Collectors or those formerly existing in the Ceded districts.	
	2. Accounts. Great delay was experienced in the preparation of accounts owing to the insufficiency of the gumastahs. The pay of the 3 gumastahs now proposed is less than that of those on the present establishment, viz., Rs. 14 each.	
	3. Shroff. In proposing a fixed situation of a shroff, it is necessary to point out his duties. The principal duty has been (a) the receipt of sums recovered in the husoor cutcherry from the sales of estates in arrears, and which from October to March last amounted to Rs. 20,875-10-2, and

	(b) the receipts and shroffing of the sum of Rs. 5,089-11-2 being the current and outstanding balances collected by the Sub-Collector personally.	
	4. Dalayats. It is proposed that 12 dalayats on Rs. 5 each per mensem shall have an increase of Rs. 2. An addition is also proposed of 5 brass belt peons to be in charge of the revenue dufters and cash chests, there being none at present for this duty.	
	5. Cutcherry. A sum of Rs. 500 or Rs. 700 was required for the erection of a cutcherry, but as, there are buildings well adapted for that purpose, this expense is unnecessary.

17-6-22	Forged petition. Form the Sub-Collector, North-east Division. 1. It is found that the same system of delivering petitions with false signatures of which the Sub-Collector had to complain a short time ago still prevails and that those forwarded on the 14th instant for enquiry are of a similar description. A few instances of detection and punishment would operate as a check on a crime which is of common occurrence in the province. 2. "The person of the Gheanasammundum by whom one of the returned petitions purports to be given, being held in some veneration by the Hindoos and confined by the principles of his sect to his habitation, I would not urge his presence on entering on the enquiry, but I despatched a delayet with a memorandum directing him to send his gumastah, or vakeel. He denies the signature as that of the Gheanasummundum, denies even having heard a complaint against the present Thumberran of this place, does not think that the Gheanasummundum even heard, or had, any complaint to make against him." 3. "The Head Meerassydar, Cudawasal Soobia, replied that it did not admit of question, it was decidedly false." 4. The late tamberan Armugham, who effected his escape from the charge of a peon, is at Negapatam. A warrant has been issued for his apprehension. He still retains possession of articles stolen from the temple. He is the principal agent in getting up the present complaints.	251-61
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15-8-1822	Sub-Collector—Conduct. From the Board. 1. The Board has "perused with much concern the correspondence which you have been compelled, to submit between your subordinate, Mr. Roberts, and yourself, a correspondence which exhibits on your part the most forbearing and conciliatory disposition the observations which you found it necessary to make on his proceedings are judicious and in every respect proper." 2. "The Board will immediately submit the correspondence for the orders of the Governor-in-Council," and considers "that it rests with you to determine to what	13-4

	extent it is consistent with the interests of Government and the people that Mr. Robert should, pending such reference, remain in charge of revenue duties in the province of Tanjore."	
20-8-22	3. In reply to the Board's letter, dated the 15th instant, the Governor in Council expresses "the extreme displeasure at the whole tenour of Mr. Robert's correspondence with Mr. Cotton, which betrays a total absence of the spirit becoming a subordinate officer towards his superior and, in numerous instances, is intentionally disrespectful and offensive."	19-22
	4. "The Governor-in-Council is much satisfied, on the other hand, with the temperate and considerate manner of Mr. Cotton." It is resolved that "Mr. Roberts shall be relieved from his charge in Tanjore, and shall proceed to Madura to act as Sub-Collector in that district."	
	5. "The Governor-in-Council has observed with much regret that, in less than thirteen months and a half, there have been no fewer than five changes of Tahsildars in the six taluks of Tanjore under the Principal Collector's charge, and eleven in the three taluks under the Sub-Collector."	
	6. "It cannot be supposed that these rapid changes can have failed to injure the welfare of the people, the interests of the Government and the confidence of the public servants in the district; and they indicate something extremely defective in the revenue management."

21-8-22	Appointments, etc. From the Sub-Collector, North-east Division, Nannilam. 1. Replying to the Collector's letter, dated 13th instant, he observes that "the reasons assigned by the late Tahsildar of Combaconam for being desirous of quitting that taluk was by no means connected with the conduct of the servants under him, the only reason expressed was the continued interference and annoyance on the part of the servants in the Zillah Court being merassydars." The change was effected by "the removal of the Nunnillum Tahsildar." 2. An old public servant was appointed as the Deputy Tahsildar, who had proved himself honest and zealous. But both from the Tahsildar's account and from enquiries, it is found that "he has thrown impediments in the way of the Tahsildar. I have dismissed him, as you suggest." "In his room, I have appointed, the person you propose, Soobaramia." "I shall hereafter request your assistance in supplying me with these servants."	225-7

21-8-22	Sub-Collector, North-eastern Division, Nannilam—Explanation of conduct. From the Sub-Collector. In acknowledging the receipt of the Collector's letter of the 19th, giving cover to a copy of a letter from the Board, he states that, "he cannot but lament to find that a misconstruction of your observations induced me to enter into a correspondence of the nature of which they appear to have disapproved." "I consider it my duty to take the earliest opportunity of expressing my regret, that any conduct on my part has been reprehensible."

1. The Board transmits copy of a letter received from Mr. Roberts and asks the Collector to inform them of the nature of the apology alluded to by Mr. Roberts.
2. Mr. Roberts has observed in his letter that "the knowledge of my having expressed my regret to the Principal Collector, so soon as I was informed by him that I had incurred your displeasure will be considered, in some measure, to atone for the irregularity and induce your Board to favour me with such assistance by a reference on the subject to the Hon. the Governor-in-Council, as may tend to a reconsideration of the circumstances and the removal of the expression of their censure."
3. "I have the gratification of being able to state that during a period of fifteen years' service exclusively in the Revenue department, and for a preference for which my private interests have suffered, my conduct has, in no one instance, received other than the flattering assurances of the satisfaction of your Board."

Karikal—Payment of pension.

From the Secretary to Government, Public Department.

1. The copy of a letter is transmitted from the Secretary to Government at Fort Cornwallis with enclosures, and the Collector is requested to pay a sum equivalent to 72 Spanish dollars to Tangachy Ammal of Carical and to explain to her that the pension which her family enjoyed has ceased.
2. In their letter of the 17th of January, Government state that the pension paid at Fort Cornwallis to the family of her husband will be discontinued from the 1st of February next. The Superintendent of Police at the Presidency states that a monthly stipend of 3 dollars has been paid during the last 14 years and upwards to the family of a deceased Chuliahman named Kather Fakir, "whose accidental and unfortunate death induced this Government to grant the above sum for the support of his children."
3. The correspondence on the subject relates to the year 1806. "As the children, for whose support the allowance was granted, are grown up and able to earn their livelihood, the object and intention of this charity has been fulfilled."

4. "But as the widow and the rest of the family who reside at Carical have, I believe, been led to suppose the stipend was granted to them for life, and would, by being at once deprived of it, be thrown into distress," I recommend "a donation to the amount of one or two years' allowance, should the present one be withdrawn." "The best way would be perhaps to do it through the Madras Government, one of the public servants of which, residing near Carical, could see that the right parties receive the amount."

5-5-1823 Complaint by a sepoy.

From the Officer Commanding 1st Bn., 22nd Rt., N.I.

1. Forwards a complaint made by a naigue in the corps against a Tahsildar.
2. Erapah, a sepoy of C. Company, 1st Bn., 22nd Rt. N.I., made a complaint regarding the confinement, by the Tahsildar, of his brother-in-law Allagapah, a naigue, in F. Company in the same corps, in the village of Munnulcole near Tanjore.
3. It appears that the "Merasydar" of a village near his came during the night and plundered his house. The naigue took 2½ months' leave and made a complaint to the Tahsildar. The Tahsildar paid no heed to it, the defendant being a friend of his. The naigue laid a complaint before the Assistant Collector, who gave a letter to the Tahsildar.
4. His complaint was put off from day to day, though the Naigue continually urged for an investigation, as his leave of absence had nearly expired and should he overstay it, he would get into trouble. "The Tahsildar on finding that his time was out, placed him in confinement without any enquiry into the complaint he had preferred."

From the Assistant Commissary General, Trichinopoly.

1. "It being found extremely difficult to provide forage for the 13 public elephants which have for a length of time been stationed at this place, from its not being found expedient from the present scarcity of the durba grass to allow them any longer to be supplied with it," the Collector is requested to inform "whether they can be allowed to repair to the neighbourhood of the anicut, to be stationed there." "In the event of your granting permission to their being so supplied, I shall take every means in my power to prevent any injury arising to the banks of the river."

26-5-23	Chapel of St. Anthony Negapatam—Dispute with Pattana Christians. From Rev. Fr. Francisco das Dore, Vicar of the Roman Catholic Church, Negapatam.	149-50
	1. It is an established rule that the churches and chapels should ever remain in charge of the Vicar. But, on the 19th January last, the Pattana Christians committed assaults and injuries and forcibly took possession of the chapel. The suit for the restoration of the chapel could not be instituted owing to the want of a Judge at Cumbaconam. As Mr. Forbes is shortly to arrive, a petition has been forwarded to the pleader on the subject.	
	2. The 1st June is the commencement of the Feast of St. Anthony in the chapel. As the Pattana Christians intend to celebrate the feast, it is requested that an order may be sent to the town cutwall to prevent the said Christians from celebrating the feast till a decree is passed in the Zillah Court.	
10-6-23	Olivarious, Mrs. F. C. Pension petition. From Mrs. F. C. Olivarious, Negapatam.	155-7
	Since the death of Mrs. Hindes, her daughter, the petitioner has been suffering from acute poverty. In regard to her other son-in-law, Mr. Jamieson, as he is in a distressed condition, she cannot expect any help from him. She prays that she may be recommended for the allowance of 3 pagodas that her late mother so long enjoyed, as a consideration "of the long servitude" of her deceased father "as a clerk to the Protestant Church of this place" for upwards of 12 years.

8-7-1823	Manali Chinniah Moodaliar Estate of. From the Receiver, Madras	115-6
	1. The Receiver requests that the sum of Rs. 3,000 now remaining in the Collector's possession, being the arrears of the income of Oyacuttoo, belonging to the estate of the late Chinniah Mudaly, may be transmitted to him. The necessary documents had been forwarded to show that he is authorized to receive this money in the capacity of Receiver in the above estate.	
	2. He offers his best thanks to the Collector for the assistance rendered to his agent in the management of the villages.	

28-7-23	Olivarious, Mrs. F. C. Pension—Application. From Mrs. F. C. Olivarious of Negapatam.	119-B
	1. She informs the Collector that she is leaving Negapatam in the beginning of next month for Ganjam with her daughter, Mrs. Jamieson and grand-daughter, Henrietta. The pension of five pagodas allowed by the Honourable Madras Government for the subsistence of the child, which will be received from the treasury next month, may be paid to her or her order; but from the month of September following, she would draw it at Ganjam.

	1. The Board calls for "a distinct and full report on the state of the crops throughout your district, the proportion which they bear to an average crop and the extent to which they may be calculated to provide for the wants of the inhabitants throughout the ensuing season including the amount for seed grain as well as for food."	
	2. <i>Stocks of grain.</i> A statement is also called for as to "what share of grain there may be at present in the district and what proportion of the population of your district subsist chiefly on rice and what proportion on other kinds of grain."	
	3. "If your district is at all dependent on foreign supplies, you will state the extent of such supplies in ordinary years and the further quantity which any failure in the produce of the district appears likely to render necessary or desirable."	
	4. A weekly return should be sent "of the price of grain as compared with the actual prices of the last three years or with the average of those years of the same period of the season."	
	5. A report should also be made from time to time "on the water in the tanks and other sources of irrigation as well as in the wells and reservoirs for the use of the inhabitants and the cattle."	
	6. The Collector will also report "what quantity of grain of each description it has been usual to export by sea from your district to Madras and other places on the coast and what quantity may be expected to be exported this year." It must also be reported "whether the present failure of crops is equal to that which took place in f. 1216 or 1806-7."	

24-11-23	D'Monte, M. Lewis Writer—Pension application. From Lewis D'Monte, Writer, Negapatam.	146-7
	He states that he has served the Honourable Company for 22 years in the capacity of an English writer. "Some time ago, I have been affected with the trembling of my fingers, and now I am attacked with some impediment in my tongue, that I could not speak properly." "I had the misfortune to lose my employ." He prays the Collector "to intercede in my behalf and to recommend to the Board of Revenue for a pension."

25-11-23	Vessel 'Meerah Maideen' —Irregular departure. From the Captain Superintending Engineer, Presidency Division. 1. "A doney by the name of "Meerah Maideen" commanded by Tindal Shaick Andey, which was consigned with country redwood from Masulipatam for the use of the Public Works at this place, reached the port on the 9th instant and previous to the whole of the articles being landed, the vessel sailed off in the night, leaving the Tindal here." 2. The tindal thinks that "the other tindal on board has sailed to Mootoopettah near Negapatam, the place where the doney was destined after landing here the whole of her cargo, and where likewise resides the doney owner, Ellavah Pillai Maracar." 3. The Collector is requested "to order an enquiry to be made after the vessel" and to report the matter.	148-9

29-1-1824	Establishment Charges Estimate for f. 1233. From the Board. 1. The Board recommended to Government for sanction the revised moyen zabitah for f. 1233. It includes "the land revenue, salt, sayer and police establishments" amounting to Rs. 17,091-10-11 per mensem and exhibits a net increase of Rs. 4,707 over the amount of the former moyen zabitah sanctioned by Government under date, the 2nd February 1821. 2. The principal increase appears in the talook and salt establishments and has been occasioned by an addition to the pay of some servants whose former salaries "he considered inadequate to secure a faithful discharge of their duties" and the appointment of others whose services are stated by the Principal Collector to be indispensably necessary. 3. "The explanation given by Mr. Cotton under the head of remarks" is perfectly satisfactory. 4. The Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the revised moyen zabitah, amounting to Rs. 17,091-10-11 per mensem, and involving a net increase of Rs. 4,707 per annum.	24A-7

The Honourable Court of Directors, in pursuance of a letter from Thomas P. He was informed by a note from Mr. Hamilton, dated the 28th August 1821, that the expected answer had not yet been received. Having been repeatedly directed by his Court to bring the affairs to a close, he requests to be informed of the result of the enquiry.

12-3-1824	Prisoners of War Kandyan servants—Return to Ceylon. From the Chief Secretary to Government, Political Department. 1. The Resident, Tanjore, has reported that six Kandyans, who came over voluntarily from Ceylon with their masters, who are prisoners of war, are now no longer willing to remain in their service. They request permission to return to their native country and to defray the expenses on the road and passage money to Ceylon. 2. He requests instructions as to whether he may hand them over to the Principal Collector in order to their being embarked at Negapatam or such other seaport as he may find convenient. The prisoners of war request that they may be allowed the amount that is now drawn monthly for them, viz., Rs. 14-10-6 to enable them to maintain an equal number who are natives of this country.	1-7
22-2-24	3. The Secretary to the Kandyan Provinces, Colombo, replying to the letter from Government, dated 3rd instant, states that His Excellency has no objection to the persons returning to Ceylon. Passports may be issued to them with instructions to produce them on their arrival at the Kandyan Office, Colombo.	
4-6-24	Charitable Endowment Rajendra Sholaga Nellore. From Ramojee Ghantegeh, Tanjore. 1. Col. William Blackburne, the late Resident, had been so kind as to obtain Government orders for the continuance of his charity "with no interference whatever, either by Tahsildar or anybody else" and a piece of productive ground in exchange for that which he held free in the village called Rajendra Sholaga Nelloor. 2. As this was found insufficient, the complainant purchased some more ground with which to endow the pagoda which he built and "to bestow alms on the poor helpless and monks that pass austere life." 3. Ever since the purchase of the ground in 1815, the charity has been continued without any demand, except the tax due to the Sirkar. But now, a peshcar of the Hon. Company "unjustly compels my inhabitants saying that the paddy of my charitable ground should be measured out for the granary of His Highness." It is prayed that "an order should be issued out to the Tahsildar" not to give such trouble "contrary to the mamool."	227-30

1. The Board submitted to Government the letter of the Collector of Tanjore respecting the loss of a bag containing Rs. 350, from a remittance made by the Tahsildar of Manargoody taluk to the huzzoor treasury at Negapatam.
2. The remittance was entrusted to a naigue and 3 sepoy of the 35th Rt., N.I. and this guard was, for greater security, accompanied by two Gooty peons, a police peon and a visaripacaren. At Negapatam, one bag containing Rs. 350 was found missing.
3. A specific charge was preferred against the naigue and sepoy and they were found guilty of permitting the loss of the bag by a garrison native court martial.
4. The Board recommends that Rs. 300 be written off to profit and loss.
5. "The Governor-in-Council deems it necessary to withhold the solicited sanction for writing off the sum lost in transit from Manargoody to Negapatam until it is clearly explained why the public servants of the Collector are considered not responsible for the loss." "The conviction of the Naigue and sepoy by the sentence of a Court Martial on the charge of neglect of duty does not appear to be of itself, a sufficient ground for absolving the Collector's servants from responsibility."

1. Government have ordered the transfer to the Collector of the payment of pensions from the Native Pension Fund that were disbursed through the late Commercial Resident at Nagore. The pensions, payable under certificates Nos. 106 and 938 should be transferred to the Collector, as the pensioners are said to reside at Negapatam.
2. The pension in case No. 106 has been paid at the reduced rate of Rs. 6 a month from the 1st of March last, on account of the demise of two of the original four incumbents. Now, if the daughter and her husband are living as man and wife, that circumstance may fitly be held to annul her claim upon the fund.
3. In the other case No. 938, the persons included in the certificate are a deceased subscriber's daughter and her son who was adopted by her father. "In different instances pensions have been made to cease on the only sons of widows attaining their majority and it may at least be allowable here to lower the daughter's pension from Rs. 5 to Rs. 4 on her son's reaching the age of 18 years."

1. The conduct of Rameyengar has been brought to the notice of the Board in 3 instances of gross fraud. His declaration as to a fine of Rs. 550 having been levied from him, has misled the Board, being incorrectly represented as for one offence when there are two separate malversations.
2. In the April return, his name is entered as having been found guilty not only of making false estimates but even of having caused actual embezzlement of a large quantity of produce, for which he was sentenced to pay Rs. 451, but the Board having modified it, the amount was reduced to Rs. 250.
3. For the second case which was proved against him, he was sentenced to Rs. 300, as reported on the 12th November last. The letter, dated the 9th February 1826 will show that a similar motive has influenced him to betray his trust in another place for which he has been ordered a penalty of Rs. 150, being double the amount of what appears to have led to the treachery.

5th Rt., N.I.—Complaint by Appavoo.

From the Major-General, Commanding Southern Division of the Army, Trichinopoly.

1. He transmits copy of the proceedings of a court of enquiry assembled at Trichinopoly for the investigation of the complaint preferred by Appavoo against the sepoys of the 5th Rt. N.I. and also of a division order issued by him on the occasion to prevent "the reoccurrence of similar circumstances."
2. Narainan states that he lives at Eyellendoora and that Appavoo was his younger brother. A woman came and told him that the sepoys had met his brother on the road and taken him away to Tanjore. He could not trace him and returned to Combaconum where he was employed as was his brother as an inferior peon to the Collector. He went to Trivandrum with his mother but heard that his brother was sent off to Trichinopoly. They offered a cow to let his brother off but the sepoys declined it but pressed for Rs. 10.
3. Appavoo states that he lived at Eyellendoor and that he was going to Tanjore on 4 days' leave in February when he was met on the road by 2 sepoys of the 5th Rt. who seized him by the arm and forced him with them for 2 hours, when they arrived at Tanjore where he was kept for 2 days. Then he was sent to the subedar at Trichinopoly, who let him go on his refusal to become a sepoy.
4. Kishnaje Row, recruit sepoy of the 5th Rt. denies having used force and states that Appavoo said that he was willing to be entertained. He also states that he never received any bribes.

5. Maj.-Genl. Hall issues a circular that "recruiting parties in the southern division have been in the habit of carrying young men away by force as recruits from their villages, the Officer Commanding the Division most positively forbids this practice under penalty of the punishments attendant on disobedience of orders. Recruits are only to be enlisted with their own free-will and entire consent."

1. In the return for the month of June last, a karnam is charged with giving a bribe of Rs. 10 to a mirasdar and is sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 20.
2. The Board requests that the Sub-Collector who tried the case may be informed that offences of this description are not cognizable under Regulation IX of 1822. "Provision is made therein for cases in which private persons are charged with having given bribes to public officers, which are brought under the jurisdiction of the Criminal Judges," but in the present instance, "a public officer is charged with giving a bribe to a private individual—a case not contemplated by the Regulation." The sentence is illegal and the Board desires that it be reversed.

1. The Sub-Collector proposes modifications for the establishment in the division. The cost of present establishment amounts to Rs. 52,905-0-0. The modification amounts to an increase of Rs. 54,165-0-0 by the addition of a shroff, a record-keeper and 2 deputies.
2. The necessity for having a shroff is evident when about Rs. 1,800 a month pass through the cutcherry. For the mass of police business in the town containing nearly 20,000 people and in this rich and extensive taluk, a police officer and one deputy are insufficient. A second deputy was appointed for some time and then discontinued. His reappointment would be beneficial both to the police and revenue services.

1. The Board appears to have been under the impression that all the lands entered opposite the name of Rangarow in the statements A and B belong to him and expresses surprise to see that the first Sarishtadar has entered "almost all of his lands in the name of his Deputy."
2. Goondopunt has a son named Rangarow, and Appoorow, the late Sarishtadar, has an adopted son of the same name. The similarity of these 3 names appears to have been the cause of the unfavourable opinion of the Board.

The Accountant-General, in referring to the balance unadjusted at the foot of the account current for the period from the 12th to 31st July last, amounting to Rs. 5,56,724-13-9, observes that "the different items constituting such balances should be brought at once as a general principle to their proper heads in the account current, in order that the monthly accounts of collections should exhibit a bona fide state of the current transactions, and that no balance should be left to be adjusted at a future period."
 2. The balance is stated in a note below to be "caused by the amount of land, etc., collections included in the accounts but not received in the treasury until the report was made out." 1. In the return for October 1828, Vencatasawmy Reddy, Curnum of Codumdapoorum, was charged with bribery and fined Rs. 25. Under clause 4, section v, the sentence is irregular. The offence is a first-class one and the punishment should be under clause 1, section v, viz., a sentence to pay a sum not exceeding twice the amount of the money unduly received. In the present instance, the amount unduly received is not stated, and the Board is therefore unable to judge of the propriety of the conviction.
2. The commutation of fine by imprisonment in the case of Iyaveyen, curnam of Ragoonadapoorum in the Velungamaun taluk, who is convicted of an offence of the third class is not authorised by clause 1, section v, under which he is liable to punishment. If no property be forthcoming to satisfy the demand, the offender ought to be forwarded to the Zillah Judge under clause 2, section xiii.

1. The several balances of land revenue outstanding at the end of f. 1236 amount to Rs. 5,61,676-2-0, inclusive of tuccavy and tank repairs. Independently of the balances of more than 15 years standing, it is observed that even those which have accrued since are for the most part of remote date, and it is desirable that the whole should be adjusted.
2. The Collector is requested to submit a statement of balances in the prescribed form, showing particulars so as to enable them to determine what course to follow.
3. In the case of rents and shotriyams, these particulars should include the name of the defaulter, the name of his estate, farm or village, the amount of the arrear and the course thereof, his present circumstances and the arrangement recommended for the final adjustment of the demand.
4. For the balances under the ryotwari settlement, it will be sufficient to state the amount outstanding on account of each year in the respective taluks, the number of individuals from whom it is due, the general circumstances which led to the failure, in the first instance, and those which now favour or oppose the realization of the amount.
5. In every case, the Collector should particularise the amount he recommends to be written off and to be retained.

Mr. Hepburn, then Collector, represented to Government on the 31st August 1819 that he found the professional services of Mr. Henderson, the Garrison Assistant Surgeon of Negapatam essentially necessary to the revenue establishment, which, though stationed at Negapatam, was frequently on circuit in the taluks.
3. He recommended that the Garrison Assistant Surgeon should be placed in charge of the revenue as well as the Military department of Negapatam and that a palanquin allowance of Rs. 70 should be granted to him.
4. Government, in their reply, dated 15th November 1819, authorised him to draw palanquin allowance, so long as the Collector's huzur cutcherry was stationed at Negapatam and he should continue to afford professional assistance to the revenue establishment.
5. The medical duties connected with the civil establishment have, in the meantime, in no respect diminished since Mr. Hepburn's application. The preparation of cholera medicines etc., and the sick and wounded persons from all parts of the district occupy much of his attention. He therefore requests that the above circumstances may be laid before Government so that they may authorise the continuance of the grant from the date of the stoppage.

2. The applicant gets a pension of Mad. Rs. 87-8-0 per mensem, but as it is insufficient to support herself and her attendants, she applies for an advance of Rs. 700 for the marriage expenses of her sister's son, the amount to be deducted at Rs. 43-12-0 a month from her pension.
3. The Colombo Government transmit the application to the Madras Government and observe that "the advance solicited appears to His Excellency the Governor disproportioned to the amount of the applicant's pension." They request them "to authorise such moderate advance as may be deemed proper on the occasion."
4. The Madras Government direct the Accountant-General to furnish the Principal Collector with necessary instructions in the matter.

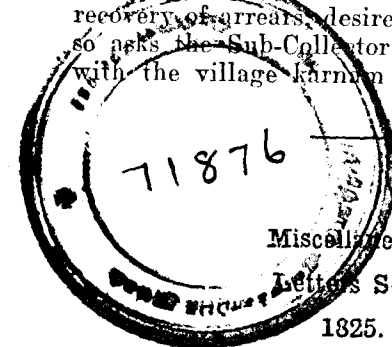

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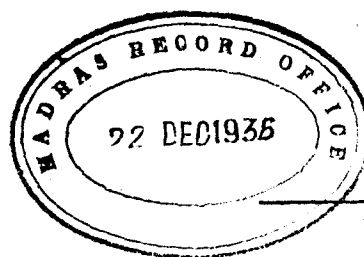

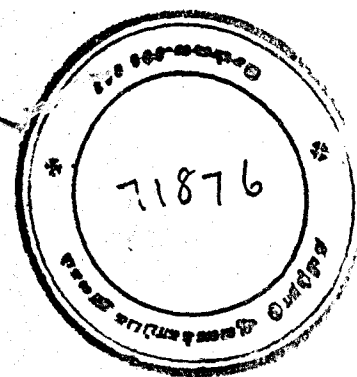
