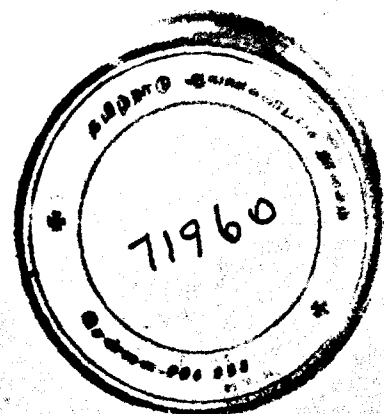

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

The Madras Record Office possesses the administrative records of the Guntur district from 1795 to 1835, consisting principally of correspondence with Government, the Board of Revenue and the Court of Wards. Though the East India Company obtained their title to the district from the Nizam in 1766 it was not till 1788 that they undertook its direct administration, placing it under the Chief and Council at Masulipatam. The records relating to the Guntur district from that year till 1794, when the Chief and Council were abolished, will be found in the series relating to Masulipatam. Guntur then became a separate district and the series of records with which this handbook deals dates from 1795. Those of the years subsequent to 1835 are still in the office of the Collector of Guntur.

The volumes from 1821 onwards and one item for 1800 (No. 3957) are a recent accession to the Record Office giving rise to a break in the serial numbering. One volume catalogued by error under the Bellary district (No. 385) and one under the Masulipatam district (No. 4694) have been included in the table of contents.

3. References to reminders and covering letters have generally been omitted. With this exception the table of contents is complete for all volumes except No. 4694 which deals with Zemindaris and from which a selection of entries has been made.

4. Few of the district papers appear to have been reprinted.

CHAPTER II.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

The modern district of Guntur, whose boundaries differ somewhat from those of the old district, has an area of 5,735 square miles. It is roughly fan-shaped, the handle of the fan being to the south, the sea delineating it to the east, while the curve of the Kistna river forms the semi-circle of the edge. The coastal area is deltaic. Further inland the country becomes an undulating plain rising gradually to the north-eastern outliers of the Nallamalai range.

2. For the first 5 or 6 centuries of the Christian era there existed a Buddhist civilization on the Kistna. By the 13th century Hinduism had finally triumphed. In the 14th century the Mahometans raided the country. In the 16th century Krishnaraya of Vijayanagar conquered and added it to his empire. But, with the break-up of that empire, the district came under Mahometan rule for the next two centuries.

3. In 1748 the French intervened in the disputed succession to the Subhadraship of the Deccan Monsieur de Bussy having organized an army which performed great services for the Subhadrar, Salabat Jang, obtained a grant of the Northern Sirkars for the maintenance of his troops. In 1758 he was superseded and marched south with a small force. Colonel Clive, thinking that the French were concentrating at Pondicherry for a supreme effort in the Carnatic, decided to send an expedition to the Northern Sirkars to distract their attention. The venture was successful and from that time French ambitions in the Telugu country ceased to be a menace to the Company's Government.

4. By the treaty of 1768 the Company obtained the right to hold the Northern Sirkars as tributary to the Nizam. The Guntur Sirkar, however, was to remain in the hands of Basalat Jang, the Nizam's brother, during his life time. In 1788 it came under the direct administration of the Madras Government and was joined with the district of Masulipatam to constitute the jurisdiction of the Chief and Council at the latter place. When the Chief and Council were abolished in 1794 the Guntur district came into independent existence.

5. The years of the Company's administration of this district exhibit a rather melancholy example of misgovernment. How far this was due to the prevalence of the zemindari as opposed to the ryotwari system of land revenue administration is a problem ready set for the historian.

The Permanent Settlement was introduced in 1802. Each Zemindari was to pay $\frac{1}{2}$ of half the gross produce of the lands. Theoretically the other half of the gross produce was to go to the cultivator. In some estates the peshcash was fixed too high, in others too low. By 1822 the district had come under temporary management by the Collector who was much hampered by the want of a trained staff. Rents were estimated by the old system of 'Kails' by actual measurement of the crop and villagers were held jointly and severally responsible for the rent of the village. In 1859 with the introduction of a system of Survey and Settlement the modern period began.

The table of contents includes all papers except more covering letters or reminders and except for Volume 4694 for which a selection only has been made. Each paper is headed by a brief title in thick type. Many of them bear below a sub-title in ordinary type. Place names are used as titles when the material under them is extensive and important. Personal names are used when the interest of the paper is mainly personal, e.g., the record of an appointment, or an application for leave. Titles are particular rather than general, e.g., the heading 'Toddy shop' would be preferred to that of 'Abkari.' Unless otherwise indicated a paper refers to a particular case. Orders or discussions of general application are specially indicated unless their character is clear from the context. The designation of a correspondent is indicated only when it appears necessary to make the entry intelligible.

2. References to the same subject occurring in different letters have sometimes been grouped so as to facilitate collation and save space.

3. The spelling of words of Indian origin has generally been modernized.

4. Abbreviations are sparingly used. Examples are 'f' for 'Fasli'; 'O.C.' for 'Officer Commanding'; 'Rt.' for 'Regiment' and 'Bn.' for 'Battalion.'

5. To save space, page numbers when consecutive have been coalesced thus, '17—20, 21, 22—3' would be printed 17—23. The page numbers do not, therefore, necessarily correspond precisely with the dates opposite which they are printed.

6. An alphabetical list of titles used in the table of contents precedes that table. It does not include proper names. Most of the heads are grouped also under the main administrative classifications to which they belong. The word 'under' placed before a particular head indicates that the head appears more than once in the index, e.g., the phrase 'Under Revenue' indicates that there is more than one head beginning with the word 'Revenue' as, 'Revenue Arrears,' 'Revenue Collections.'

He should suspend payment altogether and give notice to the parties concerned that no part will be paid until a decree or precept of a Court is produced. In the present case he should first issue notice accordingly.		
The Board observes that his interference with the pundit of the Court was grossly irregular.		
The Collector's various actions towards the pensioners and petitioners are very arbitrary and the Board warns the Collector against their recurrence.		
He seems to have accused the mother of late Venkatesam Row of murder. The Board is very dissatisfied at the intemperate and indecent charge of murder.		
On the examination of all the available materials the Board thinks that the Collector has not proceeded with due consideration in the progress of business.

Their grandfathers successively enjoyed the zamindari of Palnad under the authority of various sanads and written documents. During the reign of H.H. the Nabob Wallajah, some powerful enemies of Rajah Veerabadra Row, the grandfather of the claimants, prevailed upon the Nabob to proceed to Palnad and claim a considerable sum beyond the stipulated peishcush from the zemindar and the Nabob sequestered the zemindari. The zemindar then went to Hyderabad to get a letter from H.H. the Nizam to the Nabob of Wallajah to restore him to the zemindari, but died on the return journey. The Nabob after some time bestowed upon the zemindar's son Rajeswar Row a pension of Pag. 100 a month.		
On this the Board remarked that if the claim were to be decided upon on the ground of the justice or injustice of sequestration of the zemindari, some examination of the title deeds would be requisite. But as the family was not in possession of the country at the time when it was ceded to the Hon. Company the claim was sufficiently groundless. Agreeing with the opinion of the Board, Government rejected the application.

Vasireddi Venkatadri Naidoo died leaving a very great estate comprising several villages in the districts of Guntur, Masulipatam and Rajahmundry. He had no issue and therefore adopted a child named Jagannada who at the time of his death was 19 years and 2 months, and another child by name Ramanada who was then sixteen years and three months.

The Board from the file of papers sent by the acting Collector observes from a letter addressed to Vasireddi by his two adopted sons that they severally bind themselves to observe the distribution of property, mentioned in two instruments described as 'Vilanga patrika', and 'will' neither of which is extant. There was another deed named 'Fiaree Khut' which appeared to be one of final settlement and was registered in the Zillah Court. According to this document, the share named 'Woomamaheshwarapatam', comprising lands in Rajahmundry, the zemindari of Nundigama and most of the places in Masulipatam fell to the lot of Jagannadha Bauboo, the elder adopted son, while 'Chetoormukhapatam' comprising the estates of Nagaram, certain islands in the Masulipatam district and the estates in Nizampatam Vengeepuram, fell to the lot of the younger adopted son, Chinna Bauboo or Ramanada Bauboo and certain purgannahs computed to be one-fourth of the districts were set apart for charitable purposes under the name of 'Dharma Vahe.'

Some time after, the elder adopted son Jagannadha Bauboo represented to both the Collector and the Zilla Judge that Vasireddi's second adoption and the division of the property were illegal. The Collector apprehended that the elder son having the stronger party on his side might try to get possession of the whole estate without awaiting the decision of the Court or Government.

If the right of succession be disputed among several claimants one or more of whom might have taken possession of the estate, the Judge on a regular suit shall take sufficient security from the party in possession for his compliance with the judgment at a later date. If none of the parties agree to such a course, the Judge shall appoint an administrator. The Board does not find anything in the regulations which governs the conditions existing in the present case.

The question raised by the elder heir is whether with reference to the text in 'Lohita Samruti and Capila' the disposition of the property on the second adoption is not illegal. As a greater part of the estate is under attachment for arrears of rent and some of the lands have already been advertised for sale, neither party can be deemed to have taken possession of the entire estate. So the interference of Government in the Revenue department over the estates seems necessary.

The Board resolves to make known to the elder adopted son, Jagannadha, that he will be put in immediate possession of the entire estate included in 'Woomamaheshwarapatam' upon his discharging the public balances at present or giving satisfactory security for their discharge within 3 months.

As the two estates of Woomamaheshwarapatam and Chaturmukhapatam comprise joint lands in most of the districts it is to be held that both have joint possession until a subdivision has been effected. Till then a common manager should be appointed. If it is not favourable to the parties the elder son may be directed to move the Court to appoint an administrator. Meanwhile the Collector

should take possession of all accounts required for the eventual subdivision of the estates. As regards the Dharma vahi, there should be no two subdivisions and it should be left to the heirs to fulfil their pledges to the late zemindar. If it is the intention of the elder Bauboo to dispute the legality of the arrangements of the late zemindar he should be asked to file his suit without delay, leaving him in possession of the entire estate on his furnishing sufficient security and the Collector should move the Court to pass a speedy decision upon the ground that the interests of public revenue are concerned in ascertaining which party the Collector is to look to for payment. The respective parties may be left in possession of the estates until the decision of the Court. In which case Chaturmukhapatam will be taken under the superintendence of the Court of Wards as soon as the existing balances are liquidated.

As matters stand the Collector should have proceeded with the sale of the lands. But in view of the regular payments made by Vasireddi and as the arrears were due to adverse circumstances over which Vasireddi had no control and as the ultimate security of the revenue is considered unquestionable the Board is unwilling to enforce coercive measures.

On a further correspondence the Board observes that the Collector has not furnished any new information on the subject and authorises him to communicate to the parties the decisions of the Board.

As regards the Collector's failure to maintain the register of landed property the Board points out the advantages in maintaining such a register.

The Board communicates to the Collector of Rajahmundry, where some of the portions of the estates of Vasireddi Venkatadri Naidoo are situated, that as the lands have been advertised for sale for arrears of revenue he should proceed with the subdivision of such portions as are attached.

The plaintiff alleged that Rajah Maunnoory Venkataramana Row, late zemindar of Sattenapallee, had let the zemindari to Kistniah on a stipulated rent of five years. On the death of the Rajah, the zemindari came under the charge of the Court of Wards. Rajah Venkata Row before his death had paid the amount of 5 kists and the renter Kistniah had to pay the remaining 4 kists. But on the eve of the payment, Pindaris entered the land. The renter took shelter in Nizampatam and from there addressed a letter to the Collector that he would send his kist money and asked him to grant a receipt on realization. But the Collector replied that he would not receive any money until he received instruction from the Court of Wards. Afterwards with some difficulty Puttree Kistniah borrowed and paid the whole amount of the kists.		
Notwithstanding the regular payments made by Kistniah, the Collector sent a demand notice as if Kistniah was indebted to the Government. Again the Collector served another notice of demand. In reply he submitted an arzee to the Collector showing that he was not in arrears. Subsequently, the Collector issued a Hukum stating that Kistniah had collected sums larger than his dues from the people and that he should produce the accounts, etc. On examining the accounts, etc., he again sent a Hukum to Kistniah stating that as he had not by then discharged the Government dues he had appointed one Yeddavelly Venkiah to collect them. Accordingly Kistniah paid the balance demanded. Since that time the Collector caused accounts to be drawn out as he pleased.		
The Collector after some time presented a statement which showed that Kistniah was indebted to the Circar, to which he replied that he owed nothing further, and asked the Collector to furnish him with the accounts of his payments so that he could examine them and see whether he was actually in arrears. But the Collector without complying with his request issued an order to the Daroga of the Guntur division to sell the whole property in public auction. The Daroga accordingly attached it. Meanwhile the Collector replied to Kistniah that if he wished to see the accounts he should go to the Collector's cutcherry and that his request to see the accounts, etc., was merely made to cause delay. The Collector thereupon issued two warrants and asked him to produce maul-zameen for the amount of the property attached and Hozur zameen for the person of Kistniah till the decision of the Court of Wards had been obtained. On Kistniah's threat that he would file a suit in Court, the Collector said that he would not forward any accounts to the Court of Wards and that he should produce

responsible security for paying the demand immediately on the Court of Wards's sanctioning him to receive the amount, and till that time he would postpone the sale of the attached property. Otherwise, he would sell the property and send his person to the jail. The Collector sold the property in public auction and sent two peons to conduct him to the jail stating that the arrears due from him could not be recovered. The Zilla Court to which the Collector applied for imprisonment of Kistniah declared the suit to be contrary to the regulations.

The Collector fabricated certain summary complaints against him with the help of his manager and then applied to the Zilla Court to imprison him which the Court did now. But on receipt of other details the Zilla Court decided that it was not a fit case to be prosecuted summarily.

In consequence of the injuries done to P. Kistniah he gave a brief account of them for the information of the Provincial Court.

1. The Collector had no reason to demand payment of the creditors' money within the fasli as it was not a condition of either the cowle or muchilika that the amount of profit derivable should be paid to his creditors through the Company together with Company's kists.
2. In his arzees he stated that he would pay the creditors' dues in the next fasli.
3. All debts due by minors should be paid after all the Company's kists were discharged and that he, according to the regulations, was continuously and regularly paying Company's kists. Under such circumstances, the Collector had no authority to attach his three large estates.
4. Even after the sequestration of the three big villages, the Collector insisted on his payment towards the Company's kists. He had therefore no business to deprive him of the rent contrary to regulations.
5. The Collector demanded the profits derived from the exchange of rupees which he had no reason to do.
6. For all the sums of money paid up-to-date not a single receipt of any description was granted by the Collector to him.
7. The Collector's action in applying to the Court to place him in jail was illegal, etc., etc.

In support of the above plaint he produced the original cowle and copies of the muchilika, demand notices and his several arzees together with the summary motions to the Zilla Court, audit orders on the motions, etc. The Board, in setting forth the position to the notice of the Government, observes that the Collector's report was that P. Kistniah was in heavy arrears and it was on that report that the Board in its capacity as Court of Wards ordered the attachment and sale of his property and recommends that the suit may be defended as a public suit and expenses met from the surplus collections of the estate. Government agree to the Board's recommendations.

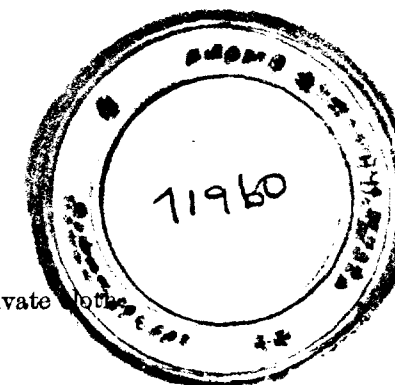

The collections from minor zemindaris are beyond the expectations of the Collector. In the Vasireddi Zemindari, Vencatadri Nayudu died. His dues to Government were Rs. 20,306 at his death. This amount was deposited by his elder son Peddabauboo but as there was a succession dispute between the two sons of Vasireddi, the estate could not be made over to either and as already the brothers collected the revenue, the Circar could not effect any collections. However, the Collector reports that he recovered Rs. 72,156 from the estate sequestered.		
4. The Collector proposes to introduce great changes into the Sayer department by removing some of the chowkis and the establishments on them and to increase the pay of certain servants in consideration of their hard and strenuous work, etc.

5. The motarpha branch is gradually improving. Formerly when the management was in the hands of Karnams, donations were made to Brahmans, conjurers and dancing girls. This department supplied money for temple festivals and the like gramakharch. The Collector proposes to make a ryotwari settlement of the motarpha tax granting cowles to each individual.		
6. Frontier duties increased owing to the increased trade with the Nizam's country.		
7. The salt revenue increased owing to increased demands for salt as a result of the late wars with the Mahrattas. The pay of certain salt servants is also proposed to be increased. The Collector suggests profitable ways of selling salt.		
8. The Abkari revenue increased slightly in spite of great defalcations in this branch.		
9. <i>Palnad</i> . An increase in the dry grain was chiefly due to repairs to tanks, etc.

The Collector reports to the Board that he has issued notifications to the managers of the minor zemindaris that they will be held answerable for their omission either to grant cowles or take cabuliats. With reference to the Board's orders to take effectual means to prevent all extraordinary collections on account of gramakharch, the Collector reports that the original intention of the gramakharch was to defray the necessary expenses of the village, but there was no check in the richer inhabitants plundering the poorer under this guise. From this gramakharch fund, bribes are sometimes paid to the Collectors. He furnishes the Board with a statement of the demand and collection under this head.	30- 9-18	152-246
2. <i>Chilacaloorpauddoo</i> . <i>Badigah Maniams</i> . These lands were originally granted free of tax. The zemindars fixed a tax on the maniamdars and made the renters enter into agreements with them. In this way, the zemindars were plundering the poorer people. The Collector proposes to make over the maniams to the maniamdars on the terms specified in their sanads, that is free of rent.		
3. <i>Sattenapalle</i> . With reference to the summary suit filed by the Collector against the guardian Puttree Kistniah, the Collector reports that the suit has been dismissed. In consequence, P. Kistniah prosecuted the manager for damages for false confinement. The Collector has advanced the manager certain sums from the estate to defend the prosecution as the act for which he was prosecuted was done under the orders of Mr. Gregory, under the regulations. <i>Resumption of villages</i> . The Collector reports that the two villages rented to karnams have been resumed and that he will put them under amani until a fair offer is obtained. <i>Agraharams</i> . The agraharamdar has a sanad granted to him by the great grandfather of the minor. The proprietors have inserted in the sanad a rent of Pag. 25. The court do not understand on what grounds the renter could recover any further sums on account of such rents.		
4. The Collector is not satisfied at the delay caused by the courts in passing decrees in Revenue cases by which the Collector loses the opportunity of collecting the demands at harvest time. He proposes that a regulation be passed authorizing the Board to deal with causes intimately connected with Revenue as it will be a better judge of such claims than any other person.

In conclusion, he recommends for favourable consideration two petitions received from the managers of Sattenapalle and Chilacaloorpauddoo estates praying for a grant of credit on account of the words in the sums of Pag. 500 each per annum, on account of motarpha tax which was included in the accounts on which the permanent settlement was formed, but which the zemindars are not authorized to collect under the later regulations. He reports that he had expressed the displeasure of the Board at the disgraceful manner in which Latchimidevammah, the widow of the late Zemindar of Chilacaloorpauddoo, had demeaned herself in concealing certain property which was in her hands at the time of her husband's death and which she has denied having received. For this the Board have deprived her of the monthly pension of Pag. 50 which by the time the minor attains age will accumulate to Pag. 5,400. On the death of the zemindar, the balance outstanding was Rs. 2,03,206 which was deposited by Pedda Babu when he claimed the entire zemindari from Mr. Thackeray, the Acting Collector. The disputed succession precluded him from making it over until the Court determined who the rightful owner was. Mr. Oakes, the Collector, sequestered the entire portion left to the younger son, as the elder has already taken measures to impoverish the estate of his brother. As both the brothers have made collections, the Collector realized only Rs. 72,156.		
It transpired that the elder Babu was throwing obstacles in the way of the Collector's realizing the revenues from the estate. This accounted for the heavy balances in that fasli.		
As regards the younger Babu the Collector is hourly expecting the Court's precept to make over to him the 85 villages in his charge.

Gundarow's son and successor Rajah Joopully Mulla Row presented a petition in the Provincial Court of Appeal praying that the rauzenamah alluded to might be carried into effect by Rajah Mannoor Vencata Row who was the heir of the deceased zemindar of Sattenapallee. The Court resolved that they see no objection to admitting Jupully Mullarow to defend suits of the deceased zemindar and issued orders to the Zillah Judge at Masulipatam to carry into effect the said rauzenamah. The Judge at Masulipatam intimated the Collector of Guntur for the realization of the amounts by the sale of such portions of the zemindari as may be sufficient to satisfy the demand. The Collector has prepared a subdivision list of the zemindari prior to the sale and submits the subdivision statement together with the Court's precepts, the original rauzenamah, etc., to the Board of Revenue for orders and approval of the subdivisions.

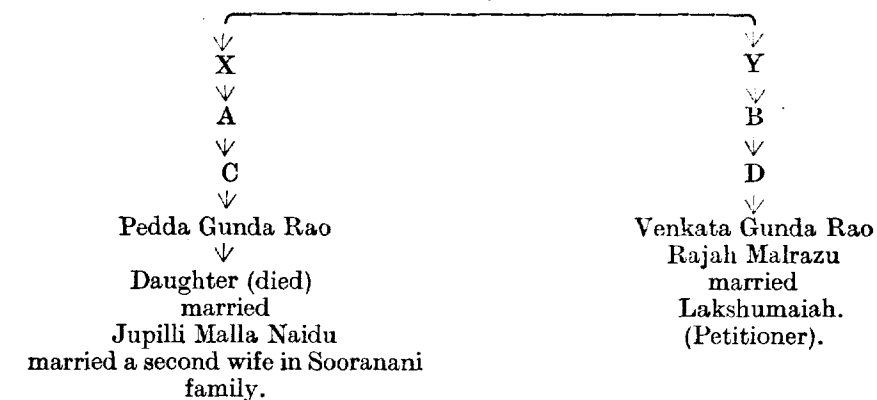

One Vangalreddi cultivated 1 ½ cutchella of land and received a cowl from the renter for a share of the produce. At the season of harvest, he, in conjunction with his brother, removed clandestinely the produce before division. This was discovered by the renter, who did not give the land to Vangalreddi in the next year. Vangalreddi first made a complaint to the Collector who ordered him not to commit any injustice to the ryots. The amins then put him in possession of the land but Vangalreddi now expressing his incapacity to cultivate it, the land was made over to someone else. He again addressed a 2nd petition to the Collector when certain portions had already been sown. The Collector issued another order that Vangalreddi should take over the lands and allow Ramareddi who cultivated it a certain proportion of the produce. But Vangalreddi wanted to be put in possession of the lands from next fasli. The Collector was unable to do anything more for him.

2. Lutchumiah, the widow of Venkata Gunda Rao, petitions that Jupilli Malla Naidu fraudulently assumed charge of the estates left to the petitioner by her husband. She preferred a complaint in the Provincial Court of Appeal and made a great many motions. The Judge, misled by false representations, precluded the defendant from furnishing security, which enabled him to make away with the estate.

The defendant Malla Naidu died. The petitioner addressed several petitions to the Magistrate to attach the muttas and place them under her management.

In the will purported to be left by Malla Naidu, it is stated that the petitioner's husband's real and personal property is delivered in charge of Malla Naidu to protect the Samasthanam. But the estate is not bequeathed to him by the petitioner's husband. The power of administering the estate left by the deceased is determined with the death of Malla Naidu and it does not descend to his heirs except the petitioner, according to Hindu Law.

She states that, in view of the disabilities of her sex, she cannot conduct the suit successfully for any length of time against the male members of the family who are influential and powerful. She craves the interference of the Government.

Mr. Oakes, the Collector of Masulipatam, required copies of the records pertaining to the estate. But Lakshumiah objects to such records being furnished to him and he asks the orders of the Board.

The plea of the widow is that he has done her more harm than good, that the Government taking her pitiable state into consideration have appointed a Committee to investigate into the records concerning her sad situation. As Mr. Oakes is unsympathetic towards her, he may raise further obstacles in order to render his own defence easier. Under these circumstances, she requests the Collector of Guntur not to grant Mr. Oakes any copies of the records concerning her case to be used by him in his defence.

The Collector reports to the Board that the widow of the late Rajah Venkata Gunda Rao had addressed the Magistrate that, since the matter had passed to the Court of Sudre Adawlet, the property was being carried away by persons connected with the defendants. As there are no regulations for the mode of the proceeding ordered by the Sudre Adawlet and adopted by the Provincial Court, no line of conduct could safely be taken.
