

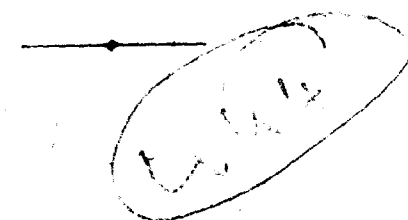

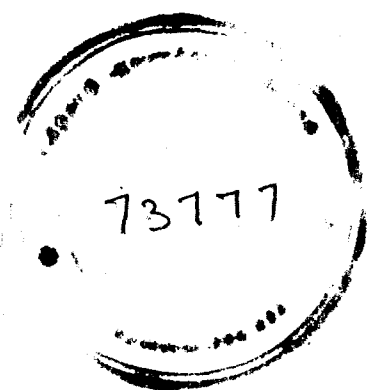

FROM 1827 TO 1835.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

1. *The Records.*—The Madras Record Office now holds the extant records of all districts in the Presidency up to the year 1835. From 1800, in which year it was ceded to the Company, until 1830, the tract of the Nilgiris remained part of the Coimbatore district. It then became part of the Malabar district and not till 1868 did it attain the dignity of becoming a separate unit of administration under its own Commissioner. The records which form the subject of this handbook are, however, Military records. As soon as the European settlement of Ootacamund began to grow up, Government appointed, in 1830, a Military Commandant to control all public buildings, public works establishments, and “all military persons of inferior rank to his own who may proceed thither.” References to the Nilgiris will also be found scattered through the pages of the district records of Coimbatore and Malabar.

2. *The Table of Contents.*—The table of contents is complete for all papers except a few, such as reminders, which are of no importance. A short list is added of papers which have been reprinted, all of them, however, several years after the date at which the record closes.

CHAPTER II.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

1. *Physical Features.*—The comparatively small size, mountainous conformation and unique position of the Nilgiris precluded that tract from having, at any rate in recent times, a history independent of its neighbours. Not that the neighbouring countries have affected it directly, its approaches are too inaccessible for that. But its history is mainly a record of successive immigrations, the result of causes operating outside. Its position is unique because it forms the apex of the great plateau of the Deccan, where, in the south, the containing walls of the Eastern and Western Ghats taper down to a point. It lies between latitude 11° and 12° north and longitude 76° and 77° east with the plateau of Mysore on the north, the plain of the Carnatic on the east, the Palghat gap, the highway from the east to the west coast, on the south and Malabar on the west.

2. *Early History.*—From the earliest historical times, the Tamils of the Chera, or Kongu kingdom, lay on its eastern flank and, eventually, had their capital at Talkad near Kollegal. The Kongas, a class of Badagas who live near Rangasami peak, are probably a relic of Kongu dominion. In the ninth century, the Cheras succumbed to the Cholas who probably left little impression upon the Nilgiris. From the 14th to the 16th centuries, the tract fell, like the rest of Southern India under the power of the emperors of Vijayanagar, a Canarese dynasty. Later it was subject to the immediate administration of the Wodeyars of Kalala who were of the Vijayanagar family and subject to the Hindu Rajas of Mysore. During the wars with the British, Haidar and Tippoo used some of the peaks overlooking the plains of Coimbatore as posts of observation.

3. *The Todas and Badagas.*—Of the races which constructed the cairns and barrows which we find also in the Anamalais and Palni hills, nothing is known. The origin of the still living but moribund race of the Todas is a subject of much dispute. They worship the sun and revere the buffalo and their religion is uninfluenced by Brahmanism. They claim to be descended from the

palanquin-bearers of Rama. They speak a language purely Dravidian. The Badagas are a Canarese-speaking race of Hindus, nearly all of whom are Saivites. They certainly came from the north but probably not so late as the overthrow of the Vijayanagar kingdom as some authorities have concluded. There is no space here to refer to the several other interesting races that inhabited these hills. So far, however, as we can trace the direction of immigration, it seems to have been always from the north.

4. *The British Period.*—The first European to visit these hills was a priest, the Reverend Jacome Ferrari, sent from Calicut to investigate the story that there existed certain Christian villages in a country called Todamalai, a story which proved to be false. Dr. Buchanan was the next, sent on an official economic survey in 1800. In subsequent years, a few surveyors visited the hills. In 1818 two officials went up on a shooting expedition and returned with a glowing account of the climate and scenery. In 1819, Mr. Sullivan, the Collector of Coimbatore, went up to investigate in person. He at once became an enthusiastic champion of the Nilgiris as a health resort and pressed Government to make grants for its development. In 1822, he selected Ootacamund as the site for the new settlement and immediately commenced to build his own residence of 'Stonehouse', which is now a part of the Secretariat buildings. By 1824, he had formed a lake and cut roads through the settlement. In 1826 Sir Thomas Munro paid the Nilgiris a visit. On his death in the following year his successor Mr. S. R. Lushington proved himself as enthusiastic for the development of Ootacamund as Mr. Sullivan himself. Several gentlemen began to erect private bungalows and Government themselves obtained a good return in rent from quarters which they had erected for visitors. In fact, for a long time, the demand for accommodation was greatly in excess of the accommodation available. In 1830, much to Mr. Sullivan's disgust, the settlement was put under the control of a Military Commandant and the Civil jurisdiction of the district as a whole was transferred to Malabar, and so remained during the five years with which the present records are concerned.

CHAPTER V.

THE TABLE OF CONTENTS.

1. The table of contents arranges the volumes in the order in which they are found in the catalogue. Certain series run parallel with or overlap others in point of time.

2. Each paper is headed by a brief title in thick type and most of them bear a sub-title in ordinary type. Personal names are used when the interest of the paper is mainly personal, e.g., the record of an appointment or claim for allowances. Most titles are particular (rather than general, as in the District Office Manual), but a key to the table of contents has been added to assist the process of collation. The official records of the Nilgiris contain an unusually large number of personal references. An index list of personal names has, therefore, been added.

3. Considerations of space demand that all unnecessary matter be excluded. Unless otherwise indicated a paper concerns an individual case. Orders or discussions of general application are specially indicated if their character is not clear from the context. The designation of a correspondent is specifically stated only when it is of special importance and is not clear from the context.

4. The spelling of words of Indian origin has generally been modernised in the title but left in the precis as it stands in the original. Abbreviations are sparingly used. Examples are, 'O.C.' for Officer Commanding, 'Rt.' for regiment, 'Bn.' for battalion. The names of the months are indicated by the first three letters of the word.

KEY TO THE TABLE OF CONTENTS.

This key to the table of contents gives a list of each heading which is printed therein in thick type, except those consisting of place or personal names. In addition to this most of the heads are grouped also under the main administrative classifications to which they belong.

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29- 1-1830	Jurisdiction Malabar and Coimbatore. From the Government. To prevent smuggling of tobacco and also to facilitate the carriage of invalids through the Nilgiris, the Government direct the Collector to arrange with Mr. Thomas, the Collector of Coimbatore, for the immediate transfer of the villages, marked yellow in the map accompanying, to his jurisdiction. The Collector should afford every assistance to travellers who ascend the hills. A map is transmitted to the Collector to take 2 copies in his office. A copy of the letter addressed to the Collector of Coimbatore is also transmitted.	1-7
11- 3-30	From the Board of Revenue. Forwards a copy of a letter addressed by the Collector of Coimbatore and extracts from the minutes of consultation.	9-10
19- 2-30	Extract from the minutes of consultation, dated 19-2-30. 1. The Government reviewing Mr. Sullivan's objections and other documents enclosed therein to the transfer of some of the Nilgiri hills to the Malabar district consider that they are inadmissible. The evidence and information adduced by Capt. Ward regarding the transfer are very accurate and unprejudiced. The Todawars, a barbarous and nomadic tribe, paid only a small revenue to the Coimbatore Collectorate. Mr. Sullivan's main contention is that the inhabitants would have to pay more for their tobacco, though it was never the intention of Government to extend that monopoly to them. 2. Regarding the distance that the hill tribes must travel to court, very few criminal cases take place in the locality and, if necessary, Government can order the trial to be conducted in any court without reference to jurisdiction. 3. The supplies can be facilitated, the markets improved and smuggling prevented, only if the Collector is enthusiastic for public service. By this transfer of the hills to the Malabar district, the revenue arising in Malabar from tobacco can be improved by protecting it from the present system of smuggling. The proprietary rights of the Todawars, a nomadic and barbarous tribe, to the land on the hills, are preposterous and unsupported by documentary evidence. The sovereign is the absolute owner of all lands. 4. Government desire the Board of Revenue to transmit to Mr. Sheffield, the Collector of Malabar, a copy of Mr. Sullivan's letter for such observations as he may think fit to offer.	13-60
29- 6-30	Jurisdiction Devarayapuram and Siliyur. From the Collector of Coimbatore. The Coimbatore Collector is of opinion that Devarayapuram and Siliyur should not be transferred to the Malabar district, as it prejudices the interests of Government in procuring sandalwood. The Malabar Collector is requested to state whether there is any objection to the re-transfer of these villages to the Coimbatore district.	61-2
5- 3-30	From Government to the Collector of Coimbatore. The Government approve the proceedings of the Collector regarding the transfer of villages to the charge of the Collector of Malabar. They did not intend the transfer of Devarayapuram and Siliyur and the Collector is directed to consult the Collector of Malabar regarding the re-transfer.	65-8

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30- 8-30	Revenue Servants Deputy Peshcar. From the Board. The Board of Revenue asks the Collector whether it would be possible for him to dispense with the services of the Deputy Peshkar and re-transfer him to the Coimbatore Collectorate, as the Collector of Coimbatore desires an establishment for collecting kist in the remaining portion of the hills not transferred to Malabar.	71-2
23-12-30	House-sites Ordnance artificers. From the Board. 1. The Board transmits to the Collector for information and guidance a copy of a letter from Government containing copy of an extract from the minutes of consultation in the Military Department regarding the requirements of the ordnance artificers in land for houses and gardens. 2. The Governor in Council directs that a detachment of the Carnatic Ordnance Artificers be transferred to Nilgiri hills. The Commissary General will direct the Assistant Commissary General to erect suitable dwellings and look to the comforts of the artificers. 3. The Commissariat officer in the Nilgiris will arrange with the Collector of Malabar for the assignment of land for house sites and gardens.	75-82
13- 1-31	Nilgiris Establishment Sanction solicited. To the Board. The Collector requests the Board to obtain the sanction of Government for the establishment charges of the Nilgiri hills now annexed to his charge. Owing to increased population and the great extent of the jurisdiction of the Revenue and Police officer, the Collector requests that a Tahsildar, Deputy Peshkar and a small establishment of peons may be sanctioned, so that the smuggling of tobacco may be effectively intercepted.	83-90

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19- 4-31	House-building Advances. From the Government. 1. The Government frame certain rules for advancing money to Europeans who desire to build houses in the Nilgiris. (a) They should be permanent residents of at least one year's standing and should be Civil or Military officers; (b) The advances are repayable in 6 instalments and bear 5 per cent interest; (c) The Government should get a mortgage of the building on which they advance money; (d) Rules observed in cantonments are applicable in renting the houses. 2. The Government grant a loan of Rs. 10,000 each to Sir William Rumbold and Dr. Baikie and Rs. 6,000 to Mr. W. Douglas. The advances are granted in accordance with the rules specifically issued for this purpose. 3. Sir William's request to enlarge the garden and to appropriate a sufficient quantity of land for a grazing farm is complied with and the Collector is directed to make necessary arrangements. Sir William is also permitted to purchase the Government buildings according to the estimate of the Engineer from the Collector. The O.C., the Nilgiris, is directed to permit Sir William to occupy the whole or such parts of the wood as he may approve, of course with no power to cut down the trees. 4. Maj. Jones's application for an advance is sent to the O.C. for report.	103-18
19- 4-31	Europeans Ownership of land. From the Board of Revenue. The Board transmits to the Collector the rules framed by the Court of Directors regarding the occupation of lands by Europeans in India. The rules to be observed in granting lands to Europeans must be uniform throughout the whole of India. Coffee may be profitably cultivated and sold at a very low price. Before the natives enter on speculation scope may be given to European enterprise and intelligence. The European planters are subject to the awards of the Collectors in all matters touching the payment of rent. An appeal may lie with the Board of Revenue. The tenure should be that of lease.	119-136
19- 4-31	House-sites Assignment approved. From the Government. The Government resolve to comply with applications for the grant of land. The letters from the O.C. will be sent to the Board with instructions to direct the Register of Government Grants to prepare grants for delivery to the parties, the ordinary rate of quit rent being first inserted as payable to the Government. The Board will issue certificates of possession to occupy the lands. No European who purchases the property is entitled to occupy it without a fresh grant. All grants of lands should be personal. The Board's proceedings regarding the applications for grants of lands or licences to hold land is approved. Surgeon W. Haine's application for the assignment of land is rejected. The Government transmit their proceedings to the Collector for his information and guidance.	139-50

31- 8-31	To the Collector of Coimbatore. 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28- 7-32	Building advance. From the Government to the Collector. The hotel erected by Sir William Rumbold being of a very superior description and of a value far exceeding the amount of the advance already made, the Government sanction him a further loan of Rs. 15,000 on a further mortgage of the building on the same conditions as the previous loan.	217-20
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28- 9-32	To the Board. The Collector requests the Board of Revenue to obtain the sanction of Government for the reimbursement of the sum retrenched by the Civil Auditor, as the sum was advanced by his predecessor for cultivation and it has now been recovered and credited in the account of his district.	221
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20- 7-33	European settlers. To the Board. The purchase of lands from the Todawars was effected through the officer commanding the hills, after paying a small compensation. These people were simple and unacquainted with the use of money. Now, they have become fully aware of the value of money and always try to drive a good bargain. No oppression in purchasing their lands is known to have occurred. The land bought for Sir William Rumbold was purchased after repeated entreaties and the offer of a large sum of money. The Collector recommends a reduction in the quit-rent charged to European settlers and that the lands cultivated by them may be given free of tax for 2 or 3 years and thereafter assessed at the same rate as that paid by the natives for the punja lands. The Collector encloses his orders and other correspondence pertaining to the subject for the information of the Board.	227-60

2- 9-33	Burghers' rights. From the Board. The Board, transmitting to the Collector the information already collected on the Ketti farm before the assumption by Government, calls for very detailed information regarding the rights of the Burghers and the mode of collecting tax from them.	261-70

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5-10-33	Ketti Farm—cont. Submitted. To the Board. The land which forms the Ketti farm had for many years been in possession of seven Burghers. No compensation appears to have been made to them, when the Government assumed their lands. The Government are the absolute owners of all lands and the Burghers were only cultivators. So they cannot claim any right in the lands. If Government desire to dispose of the farm, the Collector recommends that the Burghers may be given the option of occupying it on the same assessment as other lands in the hills.	271-80

11- 3-1834	Rumbold, Sir William Estate of. To Lt.-Col. Crewe. The Collector requests Lt.-Col. Crewe to furnish him with any available information regarding the property of the late Sir William Rumbold.	1-4
15- 3-34	From Lt.-Col. Crewe. Sir William Rumbold acquired his property from time to time on terms and tenure which are not known to Lt.-Col. Crewe. The Collector's certificates of grants of allotment to him cannot be found. Major Clubley's property was bought by the late Sir William Rumbold with the intention of transferring it to Mr. Teed. The boundaries are all clearly aligned. The wood behind Sir William's large house had always been considered Government property. Though Sir William was allowed to enclose and consider it under his control the trees were never felled or any new buildings erected in the compound.	5-10
25- 3-34	To the Registrar to the Supreme Court, Madras. The Collector regrets that he cannot furnish further information on the property of Sir William Rumbold as the grant to Sir William was made by the late Collector of Coimbatore. 5- 5-34	Assignment of Land Religious purposes. From the Board of Revenue. The Board of Revenue transmits to the Collector, the petition for the grant of land and also the Government order on it for his guidance and information. The Government desire that the cowle granted to the petitioners should be free of rent, but it is not meant to affect the private right of Todawars or others in the ground. The Collector should assign the land after communicating with the officer commanding the cantonment.	5-342
5- 5-34	From the Register of Grants. The Collector is requested to send the information called for on 23rd November 1831 regarding the grant of lands on the Nilgiri Hills at his earliest convenience.	35-6

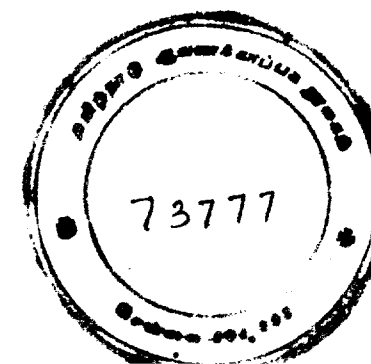

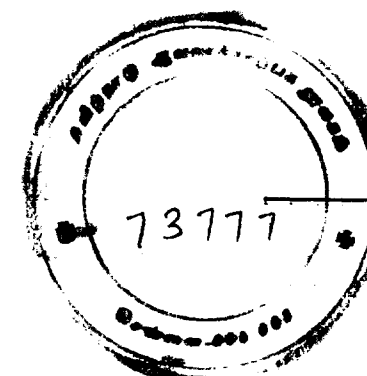
