UNEMPLOYMENT.

EVEN such a small profession as ours is not free from the effects of that much dreaded monster—unemployment! At least in this respect Government have made it possible for us to keep abreast of the times. Thanks be to them for this kind consideration. We were dreading the approach of that unwelcome guest for a long time past; but we were hoping that he may not include our profession in his programme, considering its infant nature. It is not to be. He has walked into our parlour now and has the knack of making himself very familiar, whether we like him or not. We have heard of the legacy he leaves behind in every walk of life. We care not to be his inheritors; but no, the Government would not see such injustice done to us. Perhaps, we are blind to our own interests, and it is in the fitness of things that a parental Government should see we receive our dues! We do not know to weep or to laugh at this inexplicable attitude of the Government. They create unemployment and then rack their brains to solve it. The whole affair is not without its humorous side, but for the grim facts that stare us in the face.
