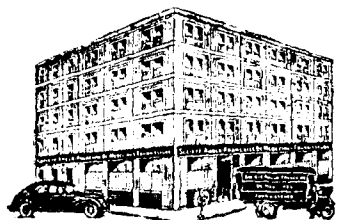

HOW THE PLAGUE CAME TO CAGNAC

The deceased must have been dearly beloved, for more than a hundred mourners escorted the coffin to the tiny burial ground of the village of Cagnac in Northern France. And Cagnac numbers but 735 souls, not counting the dead that lie beneath the sod. The priest, too, eloquently praised the departed, dwelling upon his outstanding contributions to the community. Nevertheless, as soon as the funeral service was over, the mourners dispersed quickly. They seemed to vanish from the scene in the autumn haze.

There was nothing untoward about the funeral. Nor did anyone comment on the fact that six more funerals followed in quick succession during the next

three weeks. It was a damp and rainy autumn—the year was 1940, to be precise—and in the autumn the ague seizes even the sturdy people of this harsh country.

"If you will pardon me, sir, who were the deceased, that they should merit such an outpouring of mourners?" asked the travelling salesman of the doctor who had driven over from the neighbouring village of Mandrague—for Cagnac itself supported no doctor. The salesman travelled out of Paris with a line of ladies' underwear, woven of ersatz fibre (made in Germany). According to his story, this salesman merely happened to come to Cagnac just in time to witness two more funerals on successive days. De-

spite the cold weather—for it was now December—a large crowd had followed the hearse each time.

The doctor cleared his throat importantly and told the stranger the sad story. An aged farmer in his seventies had been so beloved by his young wife of seventeen that the girl had been unable to bear his death, taking her own life the following day. "Paul et Virginie," the old doctor nodded sagely, tears in his eyes. "Love is stronger than death!" To the salesman Paul and Virginie meant no more than the name of a rival underwear firm. He let it go at that.

But this was only the beginning. On Christmas Eve three funerals were held at once. Again at least a hundred weeping mourners escorted the three coffins. many of them seemed to come from other villages in the neighbourhood. The mourners must have returned home that same night, for none remained in Cagnac. At the same time, word went around that more funerals would be held at sunrise on Christmas Day, for another travelling salesman—in tomato extract and powdered eggs (made in Germany)—had been asking too many pointed questions.

The plague seemed to gain ground. Twenty-seven times during January the cure's orotund voice rang out into deepening dusk, in eulogy of the departed's high standing in the community

or the dead girl's surpassing virtue. Again and again the doctor from Mandrague came trotting over in his buggy and was seen deep in conversation with Cagnac's mayor—the biggest and richest man in the village—as well as with the cure and the sexton. Clearly, space in the little burial ground of Cagnac must have been getting crowded, but evidently a solution must have been found, for the funerals continued in a steady stream throughout February and early March. They were always held in the late afternoon, when the shadows began to deepen. Larger and larger grew the crowds that saw the good countrymen of Cagnac to their last resting-place. Yet the mourners now seemed to bear their grief with singular self-control. One seldom saw anybody weep, though they were all serious enough in mien.

These were hasty and rather ghastly funerals that took place there in the little graveyard of the village. Frequently they lasted till almost midnight, as in times of plague, or like the funerals of miners in some countries. Strangely enough, few of the mourners left the cemetery by the main gate after the sad ceremonies were over. They just seemed to fade away into the shadows. The priest would get home worn out and pale, a gruesome and diabolical grin on his plump face which, thank the Lord, no one could see. Strangers

could find no explanation for these things.

But for the indiscretion of still another travelling salesman—salad oil from pulverized whalebone (made in Germany)—the dead might have continued on their wellbeaten course in Cagnac. On March 20, however, a small provincial paper printed a brief story about the mysterious plague that had afflicted the village. The Paris press (made in Germany) picked up the story, and one editorial characterized the epidemic as a scandal.

Many more virtuous women and law-abiding men had been put to rest in the Cagnac graveyard, escorted by crowds of mourners, when one day in April a venerable old professor from the Sorbonne arrived in Cagnac on a mission of inquiry, putting up for a single night in the only available guest-room over the little bistro—a room he shared with seven spiders and two hundred and twenty-three cockroaches.

The professor arrived on a Wednesday evening by the 7.10 train from Paris. Later that night he was seen successively in earnest conversation, first with the towering mayor, next with the cure, and finally with the sexton. The next morning, when he hurried from the bistro to catch the 8.28 back to Paris, he was accompanied to the little railway station by the whole village, including old men, children, and even the village idiot, for some mysterious reason called Jacques the Soap Eater.

The little train arrived shrilling its whistle, and the famous professor smilingly waved his umbrella from the window.

Everyone cheered, Jacques the Soap Eater tossed his old felt hat in the air, and the train disappeared around a bend...

Three days later, on Saturday—there had been four more funerals in Cagnac in the meantime—the old professor forwarded a document to the German Occupation Authorities. "A Report on the Plague Now Raging in the Village of Cagnac," ran the title. It was a long statement, but its chief findings were as follows:

The inquiry extended over a period of more than one week, during which more than two hundred (200) patients and other individuals were examined.

The results point unquestionably to an outbreak of a very rare epidemic disease of a highly contagious character, which I would identify as a curious compound of *Cemeteria etern major* and *Fraudulozia pernicioso*. Since medical science knows very little about this plague (which, however, seems to have become much more widespread since the war), I have been unable to do more than dispatch to Cagnac a large quantity of medicaments that seem indicated.

In brief, I prescribed that injections should be administered consisting of trimethylaminopyrazolonesulfate, combined with 4' diaminosulfoazobenzol and metanyturecophysostygmminobenzol ester. Of course, I also suggested the use of lozenges of trickogene, the well-known salt of 2' salicylate of stygmobenzodythylmalanytureon.

I am convinced that this simple treatment will succeed in the swift arrest of

this terrible plague, curiously confined to the village of Cagnac.

Pierre Francois Delarue, M.D.,

At the very hour the venerable professor was dispatching his report, the hulking Mayor of Cagnac, M. Augustin Bernes, was sitting at his desk over an ancient ledger, drawing up a balance-sheet. He wrote:

SNAKES FOR HEALTH



Strangest of all military units among the Allied forces is the South African Medical Corps' Snake Catching Unit, which hunts in the kloof, the thick bush country and along the steamy river banks of the Eastern Transvaal near the Portuguese East African Border.

Three men total the force of this strange unit which hunts down and captures deadly snakes and vipers and brings them back alive to the snake farm at their headquarters in an abandoned jail. For the venom removed from these reptiles is used in the manufacture of antivenom snakebite serum.

All three men are experts at their job of catching and "milking" snakes, and those for which they search the most are the "yellow cobra" and the puff adder. For it is these most deadly of reptiles that yield the most valuable venom.

When the two corporals and one private comprising the unit have extracted, weighed and dried the venom they send it to the S. A. Institute for Medical Research, where the next steps are carried out under the supervision of Dr. E. Grasset, a pioneer of snakebite antidote in the first experiments at Pondicherry.

Selected horses are injected with a mixture of the two venoms—nerve poison and blood poison—in gradually increasing doses over a period of about seven months. Then the horses' blood is drawn off and scientifically centrifugated—that is, spun round at high speed.

That vital serum separates off and is carefully withdrawn from the solution and is then ready to go into hypodermic syringe outfits. These have helped to save many lives and are the answer to the Nazi seizure of the Pasteur Institute in Paris.

It is not only for the treatment of snakebites that the venom of snakes is prepared in the Komatipoort laboratories. For example, the crystals of the puff adder's

dried venom find their way to the ends of the earth since they prove to be a very potent coagulant for the blood of haemophiliacs.

These unfortunate sufferers are afflicted with a dread bleeding disease that will not react to ordinary treatment. But now dried snake venom is saving many sufferers.

All the members of the unit are real experts and they handle deadly snakes with a confidence that is never at fault. They seriously affirm that if one is gentle and shows no fear, snakes are safe to handle and will never attack the human being who picks them up from the ground.

Certainly, they hunt their prey with nothing more formidable than an ordinary stick, and pick up the snakes with a sure grasp. But much practice has made them perfect, but theirs is not a practice that is likely to become generally popular.

TRIUMPHS OF TWO LONDON DOCTORS

Saved More Lives in Armies Than Anyone Else.

London, July 5: Lord Moran said last night that two doctors of St Mary's Hospital, London, had saved more lives in armies in the field than anyone else in the world—Almroth Wright, by his typhoid inoculations, and Prof. Fleming by the discovery of penicillin.

"I was called," he said, "to see a certain man, a great public figure, who was suffering from a form of meningitis from which in the past no one had ever recovered. We put penicillin into his brain and from that moment he never looked back. He is fit for work now and as good as ever."

Lord Moran was apparently referring to Lord Norman, former Governor of the Bank of England.

THE SCOURGE OF SYPHILIS AND GONORRHEA AND THE CURE.

From the Lancet. June 11, 1942.

Britain's figures of venereal disease have risen since the War. In 1940 the increase was 23 per cent over 1939. Proportionately this is better than the situation in World War I, when the V. D. rate doubled, but it is no occasion for complacency.

Treatment was woefully inadequate between 1914 and 1918.

The short courses of treatment then in use were responsible for tragic developments a generation later. If left untreated, syphilis has a tendency to clear up. This is disastrously deceptive. The disease may lie dormant for years, then suddenly break out again.

Syphilis is not a new disease. It has been treated a thousand different ways since 1493, when Dr. Diaz de Isla climbed aboard Columbus's ships at Palos to treat sailors loathsomely sick of the malady they had brought back from the West Indies.

Such things as China root and sarsaparilla have had their day, to say nothing of a medley of things like powdered serpents and even toad's spittle. It was not until March 1905, that science began to get at grips with syphilis.

In that year a bushy-bearded German named Fritz Schaudinn was ordered by Berlin's Imperial Health Office to make laboratory tests of a germ which was suspected of causing not only small pox, but the great pox. He got positive results, named the germ "the pale horror" because it could scarcely be seen, even under a microscope.

Another discovery in 1907 brought August von Wassermann's fixation test, which to this day is the doctor's quickest, most practical test for the disease: Three

years later Paul Ehrlich made the discovery which beat syphilis down from astronomical figures to something within reasonable understanding. This was "606"—salvarsan.

Although many lives have passed in the contemplation of Nature, attempting with infinite patience to solve the problems which she presents in such profusion, few philosophers have succeeded in making such a fundamental and far-reaching discovery as that of the function of the human glands.

It is not too much to say that enunciation of this principle revolutionised medicine and set it firmly upon a rational footing. So much was made clear and so many vistas were opened that it would seem that this conception was a lever powerful enough to set in motion those trains of scientific experiment and research which have brought us to our present state of knowledge and, still gathering speed and power, lead us confidently to hope for yet wider and deeper understanding of natural laws, in particular those which govern the great mystery of Life itself.
