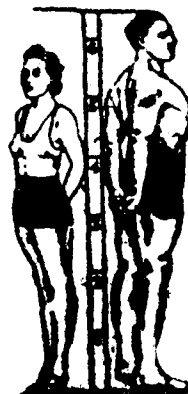

RHEE'S COUP AND AFTER

AT Dr. Syngman Rhee's unilateral action in releasing 25,000 North Korean anti-Communist prisoners-of-war there has been widespread indignation in every democratic country, East or West. After two years of talks between the Chinese and U.N. spokesmen, the truce was almost in sight. And the prisoner question was the key-point in the discussions.

Would Dr. Rhee have so openly flouted the United Nations and wrecked the truce negotiations had it not been for America's secret collusion? Generally, the U.S. has been firm, unbending and even merciless in the execution of its policies and plans of action. For days prior to the signing of the agreement, it is reported, the South Korean Government and legislature were loudly proclaiming their intention to prevent the truce and release the prisoners in their custody. Surely, the top leaders of the U.S. Administration could not have been unaware of these threats. Why did they not take sufficient precautions to foil such a move? At least there is a strong section of American opinion that favours continuance of the war. That is the plain truth.

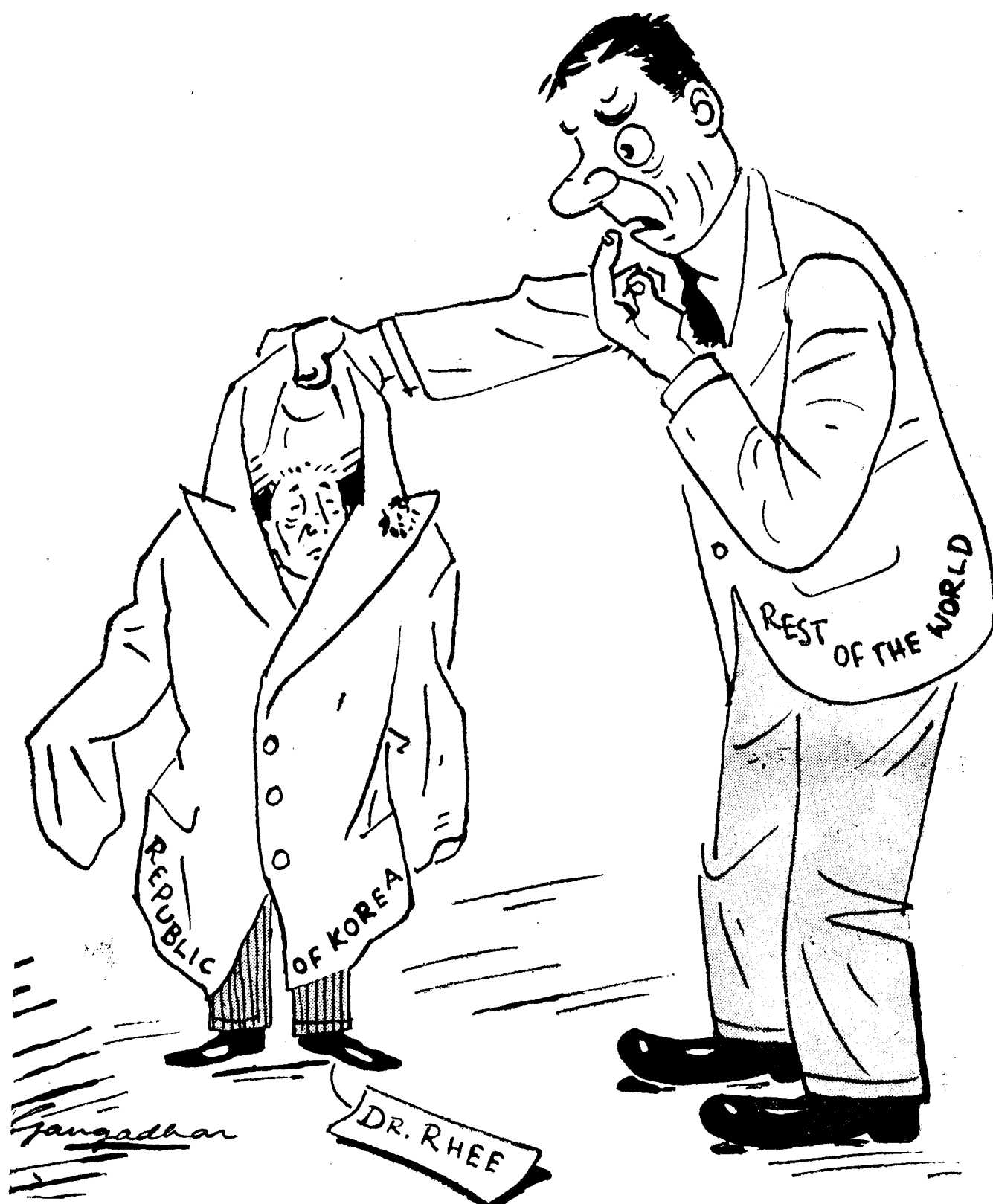
Meanwhile, more anti-Communist prisoners-of-war have been allowed to break out of camps and it is computed that more than 27,000 men have fled. They have either hidden themselves in the countryside or are being absorbed in the South Korean Army. Mr. John Foster Dulles while expressing horror at these happenings discounted the possibility of recapturing the prisoners.

Dr. Rhee's notes to General Mark Clark, U. N. Supreme Commander in Korea and his letters to President Eisenhower reek of defiance and insolence. He will think of signing an armistice only if there is a simultaneous withdrawal of both the Chinese and United Nations troops from Korea. The cease-fire must be preceded by a security pact between the United States and South Korea. Nor does Dr. Rhee believe in the unification of his country by means of a political settlement. War alone will enable him to achieve the object in view.

Both in Britain and the United States, the truth is being realised that a severe blow has been dealt to the prestige of the Western Powers. Britain, genuinely anxious to narrow the gap between the East and the West, is more perturbed at Dr. Rhee's action. While what is done is done, the immediate issue centres round the Chinese attitude. Will they insist on a recapture of all the prisoners as proof of American good faith or will they act on Delhi's advice to agree to a truce? Or will they break off the negotiations and renew the offensive?

That wiser counsels will prevail and China will signify her readiness for a truce is the hope of all her friends. The United States must give an assurance that the remaining prisoners will be safely removed from South Korean control. Besides, Washington must undertake to police South Korea and nip any mischief or trouble in the bud so that the five-nation neutral commission can set about its task and discharge its obligations without fear or favour.

Lure of The Sea

About three hundred fishermen residing in various kuppams on the Madras foreshore set out on their catamarans to catch 'flying fish.' They ventured nearly two miles off the coast and would have returned with plenty of their catch but the unexpected happened. Strong shore-winds damaged their flimsy sails and blew the catamarans forty to fifty miles off the coast.

The food and water that the fishermen had taken with them lasted just for three days. But they were drifting farther and farther away from the coast. Thirsty and hungry, they became desperate and threw away all the fish they had caught. When the fourth day came they abandoned all hopes and resigned themselves to the inevitable.

When relatives of these fishermen apprehending disaster on the sea approached the authorities for quick aid and action, they commissioned the I. N. S. Destroyer "Rana" for rescue operations. And three I. A. F. Liberators also assisted the "Rana" in its search. Even in the first sweep, the "Rana" had rescued 67 fishermen. Commander Mody, talking to pressmen, said that his job was like finding a needle in a haystack. "The ship found the 67 rescued men spread over a large area when it was 30 to 40 miles north of Madras. The men waved their hands, and the ship went alongside their catamarans and picked them up. One or two of them were in a fatigued state, but the rest were pretty good and he admired their endurance... None needed medical attention."

Next day, too, the operations continued and more were rescued. Over a hundred fishermen rowed

back to the shore after a mighty effort. When a final check-up was made, only five fishermen were missing and the authorities wound up their operations. Thus a serious loss to the community was averted. Our fishermen have shown extraordinary hardihood and presence of mind in the face of danger. Their adventure on the sea reads almost like a romance. One local daily has recommended mechanical gadgets to ensure their safety and lighten the burden of their work. But one fears that our tradition-bound fishermen may not take to them easily. They regard the catamaran as their unfailing friend. And, despite the recent major incident, they are sure to set out *en masse* time and again should the opportunity offer itself. For, they can never resist the lure of the sea.

Nehru Sums Up

During his recent brief stay in London, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru explained to many audiences and Press Conferences India's standpoint in regard to Asiatic and European problems, her relations with China and Russia and colonial imperialism in Africa, the Far East and elsewhere.

In his first broadcast for television from London, our Prime Minister bluntly and effectively answered a number of questions on world affairs, put to him by four leading British journalists belonging to different schools of thought. He stated that Russia had changed her attitude to the world and she had an earnest desire for peace. But whether she wanted it permanently or for the time being, he could not say. He had an idea that the policy of world revolution might be furthered by consolidating the results in the

Soviet itself. A war might well prove an upsetting factor.

In reply to another question, Pandit Nehru observed that he saw no external danger to India from Communism or any other part of the world. He did not think that China had any desire to expand. "She had enough problems of her own and so far as India was concerned, she had most friendly relations with China."

Taking up the question of colonial exploitation, Pandit Nehru remarked that Europeans were making the same mistake in Africa even as they had made in Asia. At the happenings in that dark continent, North, South, East or West, our Prime Minister expressed his deep distress. Pointing out that they were not numerically strong, he uttered a solemn note of warning. "If the Europeans suppress the Africans, undoubtedly the day will come when the Africans will try to suppress the Europeans and push them out."

The United Nations had not been helpful in resolving the Indo-Pakistan deadlock, stated Pandit Nehru. While tackling such problems, third parties were more a hindrance than a help.

India naturally figured among the questions. Pandit Nehru claimed that we had built up a good democratic structure. "They had advanced the unity of the country, put an end to the princely States and they had the general elections which had been remarkable. On the economic side also they had made progress, but this could have been faster."

When one of the questioners mentioned the lack of Opposition, Pandit Nehru corrected him saying that in the House of the People there was an Opposition of 150. Both in Parliament and outside

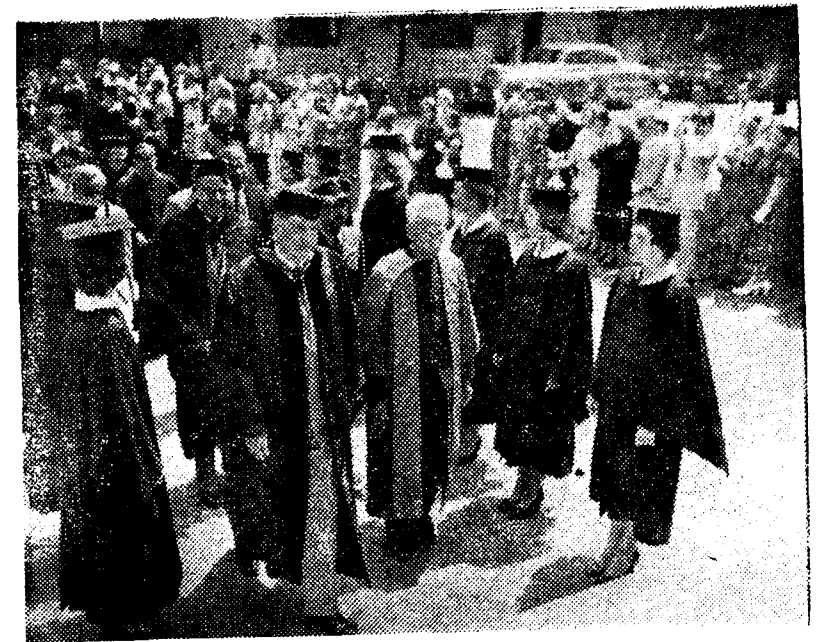

we had very good Opposition. The two-party system was preferable as the Opposition would then have a better sense of responsibility.

Finally, reverting to the United Nations, Pandit Nehru said that this body had undergone a great transformation since it was established. It started as an universal organization to which every independent country could be admitted. Now some of the biggest independent countries like China were refused membership and deliberately kept outside its fold. The question of liking or not liking China was quite irrelevant, he concluded.

Wanton Damage

Public telephones situated in lonely spots and at road corners suffer increasing damage. In some booths recently the receivers were broken, the dial was tampered with and pages were torn from the directories. So reports the District Manager of the Madras Telephones.

It is a matter of sorrow and shame for the citizens of Madras that a public utility service like this should be thrown out of gear. Boys in their teens, especially street arabs, do all this mischief, we are told. They have an eye on the coin boxes in the public telephones and press into service a bagful of tricks to grab it. The miscreants use tamarind, cigarette stubs, glass pieces, wires, etc., to extract the one-anna coins from the box.

Is it possible to prevent all this damage and petty pilfering? Can the public keep a ceaseless vigil and drive these imps away from the booths? In the second-class compartments of the (electric) suburban trains, for instance, cushions are torn and new paint is scraped off with pen-knives. What is worse, boys going to school to learn manners, indulge in malicious, scandalous writings on prominent places and even the ceilings of the compartments. How the boys manage to do it within the few minutes of their journey would puzzle not only the lay public but the railway authorities also. The mischief-mongers get away with it every time. All that remains to be done is to patch up the rents, renew the paint and erase the obscenities of the young writer and the budding artist at least partially. They

seem to carry with them some indelible ink or pencil or charcoal!

The best way to meet the menace would be to keep these booths locked up during certain hours of the night or there must be more frequent patrol by the police.

Off With the Cushions!

Most of us would feel inclined to endorse the Chief Minister's suggestion that if cushions in (Madras) City buses were removed, the vehicles would be lighter and the seating more hygienic. As it is, with cushions pinned to the benches, it is impossible to clean the buses or disinfect them. Sitting by the window and resting your elbow on the sill would be a pleasurable experience indeed. But a closer look would disgust the traveller. It is bespattered with pan juice, phlegm and crusts of other liquids. And then someone paws at you and you look startled. It is a leprous beggar apparently with sores on his hands, persuasively urging you to do your duty by him.

But we are digressing. Sitting on bare benches is another ordeal. Passengers occupying benches in trams used to carry swarms of bugs home. The same may be the case with buses also. What of jutting nails that may puncture the skin in the bottom or tear at your clothes as you hurriedly get up to get down at the stop?

We are, however, confident that citizens will readily forego the cushions if authorities reduce bus fare to the pre-war level. That way there would appear to be a gain for both.

Grievous Loss

The nation mourns the death of Dr. Shyama Prasad Mookerjee, one of our topmost leaders and Parliamentarians. The circumstances under which he came by a sudden end add a touch of poignancy and grimness to the occasion. He died while in detention in Srinagar. For nearly ten days, it appears, he had been laid up with fever and probably the biting cold of the mountainous territory proved fatal. He was otherwise strong and well-built and it was seldom that he fell ill. Perhaps if he had been taken to a warmer climate a week earlier, he would have rallied round.

It is no exaggeration if we say that Dr. Mookerjee was the uncrowned king of Bengal. During the Noakhali agitation when a reign of terror was let loose against the Hindus in East Bengal, Dr. Mookerjee raised his voice of protest. To the partition scheme before Independence he was very bitterly opposed and foreshadowed ill-treatment, humiliation and persecution of the Hindu minority in the Pakistan-to-be.

The critical state of the country's affairs after the attainment of freedom required a larger platform for Dr. Mookerjee and he turned his attention to the Centre. He was persuaded to enter Pandit Nehru's Cabinet as Minister for Industry and Supply and served in that capacity for three years. He cut through red tape and set up a record for speed and efficiency in administration. When the Nehru-Liaquat Ali Pact was signed Dr. Mookerjee left the Cabinet with the conviction that he could serve the country better from outside.

On the eve of the general elections, he formed the Jan Sangh Party and opposed the Congress. The great orator was in his element again when he found himself leading the Opposition in the House of the People. His brilliant debating powers, his spirited defence of civil liberties and his fierce criticism of Governmental measures won for him the admiration of the people and the respect of his opponents. Stout-hearted, patriotic and independent, Dr. Mookerjee scorned power and position and thought of the country first and last. And he fought for what he believed to be right and gave his unstinted support to the Praja Parishad movement. He deplored the Union's policy in regard to the Abdullah Government and demanded that the State of Jammu and Kashmir should be integrated with India.

He was chagrined and distressed at the Supreme Court's order to release him when he was arrested for defiance of Delhi's ban on the Parishad movement. So he thought it best to beard the lion in his own den and went to Kashmir to court imprisonment in furtherance of the cause he cherished so dearly. Alas! death snatched this great hero and martyr from our midst.

Temporary Capital

After a vigorous five-day debate Andhra legislators have chosen Kurnool town as the temporary capital of Andhra Desa. Communists had set their heart on Vijayawada. Even the claims of Ishakapatnam had been pressed hard. It was argued that Vijayawada was more central and afforded more facilities. But, as Mr. T. Viswanatham pointed out, the question to be decided was whether the capital should be located in Rayalaseema or in the Circars.

The Sri Bagh Pact which had stipulated that Andhras must have their capital or their High Court in Rayalaseema, must be honoured. The people in this backward, undeveloped area should not feel that they were being cold-shouldered. If the capital functioned in their territory, it would be a guarantee that Rayalaseema could soon be marching abreast with the Circars.

There were other reasons also why Kurnool should be their choice. Sri Viswanatham said that Ishalandhra would soon be an accomplished fact and there were unmistakable signs favouring its early formation. The Prime Minister, it was well known, had at first been totally opposed to the large-scale linguistic split-up of the country. But the Government of India would shortly be setting up a high-powered linguistic commission to go into the whole question. When the Hyderabad C.C. adopted a resolution favouring the disintegration of the state with the additional rider that the City of Hyderabad was the natural capital of Vishala Andhra, Pandit Nehru who was also President of the Congress did not object to the view expressed.

Mr. Viswanatham pointed out that Kurnool was once very famous as the seat of the Vijayagar Empire. It became decadent after a time. It would certainly regain some of its former importance and glory with the inception of the new State. Moreover, Kurnool was not far off from Hyderabad.

Now that the final choice has been made, we hope that Andhras, specially in the Circars, will abide by the decision and extend all possible support and co-operation to the Congress and the Praja

Socialist Party in the onerous task of launching the new ship of State. They must forget the controversy that so exercised their minds and march forward without looking back.

Railway Tragedy

The collision of a mixed train and a goods train between Mulakalacheruvu and Battulapuram, 20 miles off Madanapalle, must be considered a disaster of the first magnitude. Though the railway authorities have rendered all possible aid to the injured and have appointed a claims commission with the object of paying compensation to the victims of the accident, the public is yet to recover from the shock of the tragedy which accounted for seventy injured and nearly as many dead. Recently, there have been nasty accidents like this on the Southern Railway. Late in May, we would recall, there was a similar collision at Basin Bridge Junction. Twenty-five persons were injured when a train and a light engine collided.

How such accidents are possible is a mystery beyond the comprehension of the travelling public. It is stated that the block and telephone systems between Mulakalacheruvu and Battulapuram had been interrupted and that there was a resort to "proceed certificates" and "advice memo" method for running the service. Surely, whatever the device might have been, station masters on either side must have been aware that the mixed train was due to pass the line at a scheduled hour and that no other train must be allowed on the occupied track.

Since the line runs through open fields, could it not have been possible for anyone of the engine crew to avert the tragedy with the help of the searchlight and by means of warning whistles? Such speculation is apparently futile because members of the engine crew of both the trains lost their lives. To many, however, it would seem that there was gross neglect of duty coupled with indifference arising from the fact that, after all, a mixed train did not merit much attention.

We should have thought that at least from the Centenary year with such big talk about rapid progress

and modernising of our railways mixed trains carrying goods, cattle and human beings should be treated as an anomaly and a thing of the past. A public enquiry with which non-officials were associated would have helped to bring to light the real causes of the collision. It is regrettable that the Railway Ministry did not pay heed to the suggestions made by the Press.

C.R.'s New Scheme

The new Elementary Education Scheme, sponsored by Sri C. Rajagopalachariar, has aroused a good deal of interest not only in Madras State but in the rest of India. Hereafter youngsters in primary schools in rural areas will be let off after three hours of lessons. The drumming and the drilling will cease and the kid will romp home to learn his father's craft or some other trade.

The idea behind is admirable and, if pursued to its logical conclusion in the subsequent stages in schools and colleges also, may even revolutionise the very system of education and do much to mitigate the tragedy of unemployment. The oppressive routine of long school hours will be cut down ruthlessly and the student having learnt some craft and thus acquired a new sense of the dignity of manual labour need have no fear of a jobless future and endless misery and starvation. He will be confident that he can earn his livelihood with the practical knowledge gained in school.

Answering critics, the Chief Minister said that if the pupil did not wish to pursue his father's calling, opportunities would be created for him to learn some other profession. It is obvious that by shortening the hours and adopting the shift system, it should be possible to teach the forty lakhs of youngsters in the State who are idle and cannot go to school because of over-crowding. In a recent broadcast, the Education Minister made the welcome assurance that schools in Municipal towns and cities would shortly come under the scheme. There is no gainsaying the fact that too many hours in school impose a heavy strain on our little ones. The new Scheme promises them considerable relief and a bright future.

INDIANISE THE INDIAN!

A FEW days ago Dr. Nesan and I were sitting in the Marina. A cow was stretching itself at some distance chewing the cud. Just then a number of urchins went in procession along the road holding aloft placards giving the gratuitous advice "Vote for so and so" in the impending Corporation election.

Nobody seemed interested in the spectacle except the urchins themselves. The cow shook its head—probably because of the nuisance of flies or possibly because it did not like so much noise while it was quietly chewing its cud. Dr. Nesan shook his head because he disapproved of such tactics. I shook my head because I thought that the little boys should have been at school instead of gallivanting about.

But whatever might be our disapproval and its causes, the procession of urchins was followed by more processions on behalf of other candidates. There were also wall posters, writings on the roads, transparencies in the night indicating whom we should vote for, public meetings with lights, mikes, amplifiers, etc. Every election involves a huge waste of money. Yet we emerge out of one election only to enter into another. Such is modern life.

Just then the evening newspaper was brought. I spread it and read therein the advice of an examiner to the effect that all men should grow beards because India's annual bill in respect of razor blade imports comes to two crores. I told Dr. Nesan: "Look at this waste in the name of civilisation. Man is vainer of beauty of person than woman. The modern man is all attention to the crop on his

head though not to the crop in the fields. To him may be applied Kipling's famous lines:

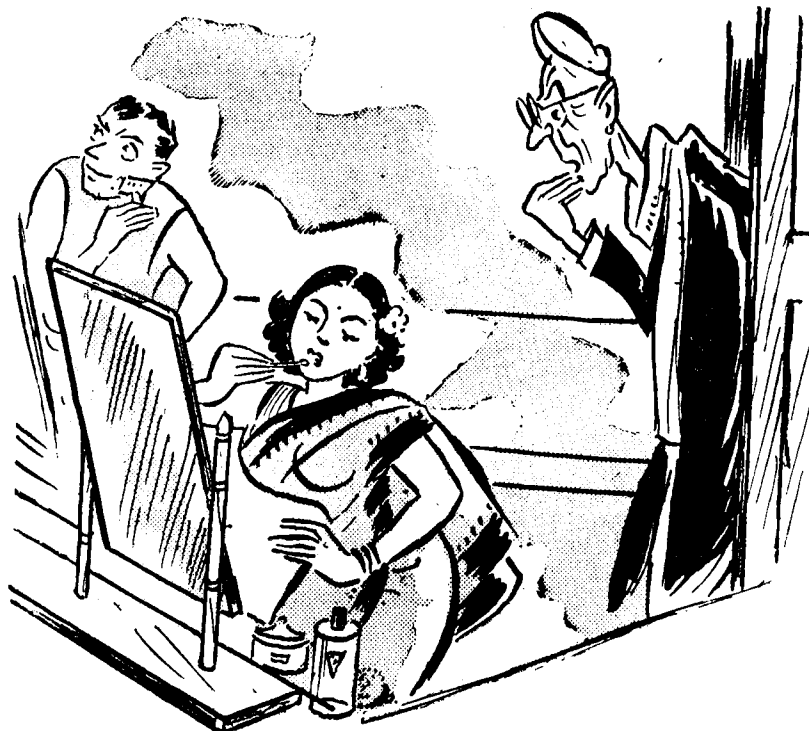
*"His life is a watch and a vision
Betwixt a crop and a crop."*

Dr. Nesan is himself a worshipper of 7 O'clock blades and Gillette blades and did not quite like my remarks. He said: "Why do you pick out the shaving blades for condemnation? Would you like me or your good self to be bearded like the ancient *rishis*?"

I said: "You can go to the barbers when you want smooth

cheeks and chins. Why starve the barbers and waste two crores on razor blades? There is also another aspect about razor blades. It seems that recently an inventor invented a razor blade that would last a life time. Some razor blade firm bought up the patent right in respect of the invention and scrapped the formula so that their profits might continue to flourish. Such is the stupidity of Man and such is the cupidity of Man."

DR. NESAN was nettled and rose up in wrath: "I agree with you as regards the modern man's vanity and wastefulness. But why do you pick out razor blades for

special mention? Do you know India's heavy bill for importing all sorts of tooth pastes, though many doctors condemn them as unhygienic? Every morning the newspaper advertisement interrogates us: 'Did you clean your teeth to-day?'

"What about our false teeth bill? In spite of tooth pastes, God-given teeth seem to fall off prematurely now-a-days. What about our biscuits bill? What about our foreign milkpowder bill? What about our foreign liquor bill both for the addicts with permits and the addicts without permits? What about our medicines bill and our books bill? What about our paper and newsprint bill and about our raw film bill? What about our automobile bill, our locomotive bill and our aeroplane bill? What about our sartorial bill and our socks and boots bills? Above all, what about our cosmetics and cigarette bills?"

I THOUGHT that this was the best time for interruption as Dr. Nesan was a chain-smoker. I said: "Pause for a minute, my friend. Knowing all that you have described just now, why are you a chain-smoker of cigarettes?"

He replied: "It is too late to put that question just as it is too late to put any question regarding most of the other matters mentioned by me. Some things begin as luxuries and end by becoming necessities. Others are necessities in this modern age."

"Do you want man to go back to the nomadic age, or to the pastoral age or to the agricultural age? Do not forget that we belong to the great industrial age of to-day. Do you want to tend flocks or go in a bullock cart?"

I replied: "I do not say that we must cancel and scrap all modern inventions and comforts and conveniences. But what saddens me most of all is that men not only hug useless, poisonous and costly luxuries but also revel in them and show off their greatness in revolting against and trampling down all the customs and habits of their ancestors. One

morning, last week, I went to call on a very young friend who had invited me to meet him over a cup of coffee. When I opened the door I saw him shaving before a mirror and his young wife before another mirror busy using her lipstick, cream and powder. Nay, even more saddening is the spectacle of humbug and hypocrisy now becoming so increasingly prevalent. I read a few days ago how in a *Puja mantap* liquor was given as holy water and the so-called 'worshipper' came out reeking of liquor."

Dr. Nesan said: "I also saw that news. That is really despicable. But surely there must be a correct middle way — in fact, the golden mean."

I replied: "All that I say is that we must not make a fetish of the much used and more ill-used phrase 'standard of life.' I am not against trains or steamers or cars or planes. I am not an advocate of the bullock cart as such. But surely in the name of civilisation and higher standards of life we should not give room for costly or worthless or poisonous luxuries. Mahatma Gandhi never scorned modern transport but cried down overmuch use of machinery to the detriment of man and stood for simplicity and spirituality."

"Take, for instance, the cinemas. You can use them for national moral welfare or national moral destruction. Like you, I stand for the golden mean. But let us do nothing to denationalise and de-Indianise the Indian. Let us Indianise the Indian."

DR. NESAN nodded assent vigorously but asked: "Ramul! What do you mean by saying categorically that the Indian must be Indianised? Do you want to gild refined gold or paint the lily or throw a perfume on the violet or smooth the ice or add another hue unto the rainbow or garnish with taper-light the beauteous eye of heaven?"

I replied: "No! Dr. Nesan, I seek no such wasteful and ridiculous excess. But crop or no crop, why waste two crores

on razor blades, while disemploying the barbers? Why waste money on tooth-pastes and false teeth? Why import any biscuits and milk powder when we can make our own biscuits and improve our milk-supply? Why not stop the import of liquor and honestly make prohibition a success?

"LET us make our medicines ourselves. Let us produce paper and raw films. Produce uplifting cinemas or scrap them altogether. Let us make our own automobiles and locomotive engines and aeroplanes. Why should we allow our money to be lost in crores by such imports paying enormous profits and freights and raising the standards of life of other peoples and depressing the standards of life of our own people, while glibly talking of modernising our country and raising our level of living?"

"Why should we ape the Western costumes and manners? Our dhoties and sarees are beautiful and the westerners themselves testify to this. Why should we send our hides and skins abroad and import footwear? Above all, why should we waste crores on foreign cosmetics and cigarettes? Let us remember the old adage that we should not tie a silk ribbon to a broomstick. But even when we make all the things needed for a life of reasonable modern comforts and conveniences, let us not give up our ancient ideals of simplicity and spirituality as stressed by Mahatma Gandhi."

Aquarists' Corner:

Aquarium Accessories

THE difference between the really good aquarium and the merely indifferently kept tank is very often no more than the difference in the number and kinds of appliances the tank keeper may have, writes Dr. C.W. Coates of the New York Zoological Society in an article which was reproduced in *The Indian Aquarist*, the official organ of the Aquarist Society of India, Bombay.

It is obvious at once, of course, that the fish keeper should have a net, preferably two or three, of at least two sizes. It is usually equally obvious that he should have a scraper of some sort, either a pad of untreated steel wool, a single-edged razor blade, or a razor blade mounted at the end of a long holder so that remote parts of the glass walls may be reached and scraped.

Most people have these tools, finding some use for them almost as soon as they get a tank. They may also have a number of others, too, but an astonishing number do not have a siphon, a tool which is almost more important than a net. It is also somewhat astonishing that many people do not know how to use a siphon.

For most home tanks, a siphon need be no more than about four feet of soft rubber tubing, but with this very simple tool many things may be done rapidly and cleanly. For instance, a full tank should never be moved, even if it can be lifted. The water should always be removed down to the last inch or so, even if the tank is only to be moved a few inches.

To bail out the water is sloppy and unsatisfactory. With any kind of siphon, however, the water may be removed without the slightest disturbance to the contents of the tank, and with no splashing at all. There is nothing like a siphon for cleaning the tank, for removing detritus of all sorts from the bottom without upsetting fishes and plants. For adjusting waters from different containers — necessary when changing fishes from one tank to another — the siphon is by far and away the most practical and simple device.

ALTHOUGH a length of rubber tubing of almost any size or kind may serve as a siphon, there are one or two small refinements which make work easier. For ordinary tanks, hose about one-half inch in internal diameter is most practical. To one end of this a length of stiffer material may be attached. A piece of glass or stiff plastic tubing is fine. If this is a foot or so long, its end may be handily directed into all parts of the tank to pick up bits of matter or it can be swept just above the sand so that it will remove all the debris without disturbing the sand at all, or it may be used to remove any particular part of the sand for cleaning. Small spring clip attachments have been available to hold the siphon in place on the edge of the tank. Sometimes it is desirable to fit a perforated cover over the end of the tubing to prevent small fishes from getting into it.

The method of starting a siphon usually is to put a pail or other container beneath the tank. One

end of the siphon is held an inch or so beneath the surface of the water and while the free end of the siphon is held below the level of the water in the tank, suction is applied long enough to lift water over the edge of the tank. The free end of the siphon may then be dropped into the container and the water allowed to run as long as necessary. To stop the siphon the tank end should merely be lifted from the water.

IF it is desirable to move more water than there are containers available, the siphon may be held full, but not running, by pinching the rubber tightly at any place, or by pinching the free end tightly. The tube may then be lifted and put completely into the tank and left until more containers are available. Then, by pinching the end again, lifting out and dropping into the container, the siphon will start working again without further suction. Filling the siphon with water from the faucet first and holding both ends until they are in place is also a good way to start it, and for very large siphons the only way.

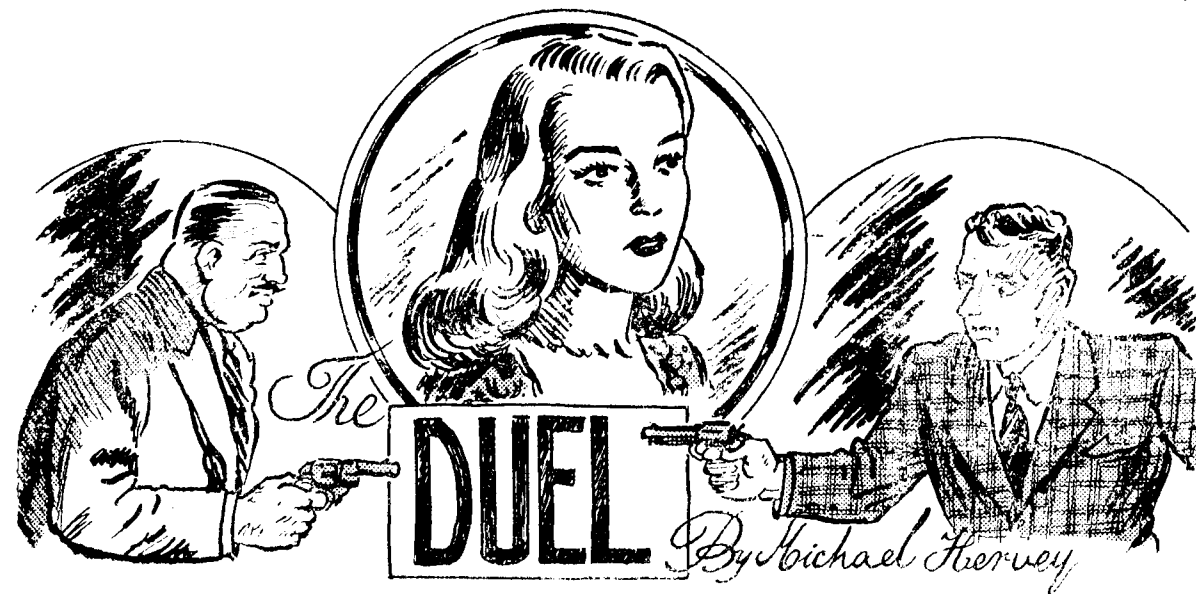

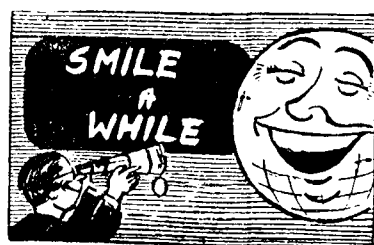

You are the son of God. No *Griha* or star will have any power over you. Practise *yoga* right from this moment. I will serve thee nicely.

Kindly write to me what *sadhana* you are doing at the moment. Draw up a regular programme for the day. Stick to it. That is the way to improve quickly.

If you are doing *pranayam* even for 10 minutes, very good. As you inhale, feel that the Lord's Omnipotent Will-Power is flowing into you—it is easy if you will try—and as you exhale feel that the demon of evil habit is being ejected. After a few rounds like this, do *japa* and feel that you are pure, Purity itself! Breathe slowly, rhythmically, noiselessly throughout.

Do *sirsasan*. Take cold hip-baths. Take light meals at night. Do regular *sadhana*.

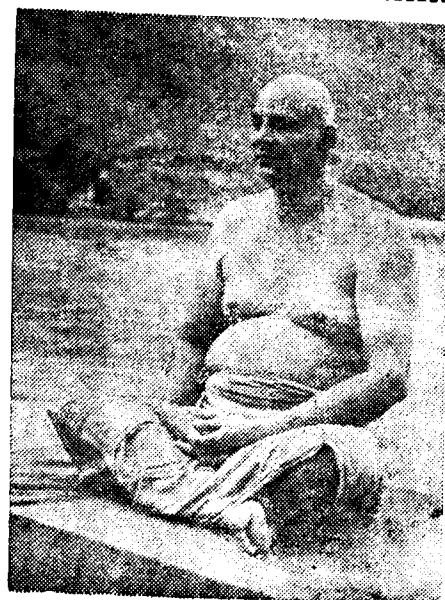
Everything everywhere about us is instructive! How many people die every day! How many people were killed in riots! How much was lost in looting! And, yet, ignorant man will close his eyes and ears and think that he alone is going to live till eternity with his wife and children! Is there a greater foolishness than this? Wake up! Reflect on the transient nature of the worldly pleasures. Do *japa*, *kirtan*, *swadhyaya*. Observe *mouna* and introspect. Pray for devotion to His feet. Conquer death through *yoga*.

Get up at 4 a.m. and meditate. Reflect within yourself the instability of material possessions and the permanent nature of the great treasure of devotion to Him. Repeat His name. Sing His glories (*kirtan*). Observe *mouna*. By degrees, gain complete control over all the *indriyas*. Turn your mind more and more towards Him. You must reach your goal—God—in this very life.

Kindly repeat *Om Namo Bhagavate Vasudevaya* daily. This is a very powerful mantra given by Sri Narada to Dhruva, which enabled the latter to realise Him. Kindly adopt this as your *Ishta mantra*. From today you should do at least 10 malas of *japa* of this mantra and also write it in your mantra notebook.

Cultivate the spirit of love and humility and the divine compassion and tenderness which filled the hearts of Lord Buddha and Lord Jesus.

Kindly try to adjust your *sadhana* programme according to circumstances. Cultivate the habit of repeating the Lord's name constantly—even while you are at work. Remember Him always. Try to perceive and receive the good in everything and see the Lord in all. This is a most effective *sadhana*. Follow the Twenty Spiritual Instructions—the cream of all *sadhanas*—which is enough to take you to the goal.

Kindly try to increase the number of *japa* steadily. Introspect and find out the subtle desires of the mind. Control the *vrittis* through *viveka* and *vairagya*. Ever live in the consciousness of the ideal—realisation of God—and strive hard to reach the goal.

You can practise *bandha traya*. Start with 5 *pranayama* along with *bandha traya*. While doing *tratak* you can do mental *japa* and also silent *swadhyaya* during the time of *mouna*.

Concentrate on your *Ishta devata*. Keep the photo of the Lord and meditate on it. Meditate on His glories such as *sarvajna sarvavyapi, sarvantharyami*, etc. If the mind wanders, change the programme and take to *japa, swadhyaya* and

singing the Name of the Lord. Read my book *Concentration & Meditation*. You will get all details about concentration and meditation in it.

Turn your mind back on the madding crowds of worldly-minded persons. Anchor your faith in the Lord and live a life of pure thoughts, high ideals and supreme wisdom. Adopt *ahimsa, satyam* and *brahmacharya* as your guiding stars in life. Refuse to swerve from the path or to look back and, in due course, you will attain Realisation.

But prepare for this by practising the necessary *sadhanas*. These are all designed to subdue and control the mind and its vagaries and culture the heart towards the ultimate ideal of universal life and love. Put into practice in daily life as much of the 20 Instructions as possible, with humility and faith. The more you succeed in doing so, the more will you have mental strength and peace. This will react on your physical condition for the better, and you will gradually grow more and more in strength.

It is very good to be a vegetarian. Pay no heed to what others say. They are like the fox who lost his tail. Do you not know that animals like the rhino and the elephant, the two strongest, and the monkey, the most agile of

living creatures, are strict vegetarians?

There are three elements in the mind which obstruct the vision of the Lord within—*Mala* (impurities), *Vikshepa* (oscillation) and *Avarana* (veil of ignorance). A steady mind will not be worried. It is only the wavering nature that brings in worry also. The *Mala* or the hidden past *samskaras* embedded in the mind on account of past misdeeds is responsible for your irritability and excitability. Anger or excitement is a kind of temporary madness. So you are not able to discriminate when you are angry.

Mala should be removed by study of spiritual books, by *nishkama seva* and by charity; *Vikshepa*, by the practice of devotion, *bhakti*; *Avarana* by deep meditation on the nature of Truth. The Lord's Name is the sovereign specific for all three. Lead the Divine Life. You will soon become a Superman.

The first positive step to intense *sadhana* is right resolution. When this is made, the next step should immediately follow—"Right exertion". Without right exertion nothing in the world is achieved. Therefore, stick to your resolves. Never swerve an inch from the path of truth, purity and love. Aspire to reach the goal in this very birth.

The aura that surrounds every one who leads the Divine Life protects him from all dangers.

It is a blessing to be a *yogi*. Practise *yoga* and preach. *Haitha yoga* ensures sound health, physical and mental. You must utilize this to best advantage by deep meditation on the *Atman* or the Inner Self. Self-realisation should be your goal. This should be achieved by constant remembrance of God, by righteousness, by a virtuous life and by the practice of *yoga*.

Saints will only show you the path. They will place before you a potful of nectar. But do not expect them to drink it for the sake of your Realisation. Vain quest for one who would satisfy your uncleansed mind will lead you nowhere. God is within you. He is your great Guru. Can you hear Him? Will you laugh at Him, too, because He does not satisfy your curiosities? Give up this attitude. Fall at the feet of *sanyasins* and saints. Attend to their words. Practise. Then you will see God in them all.

Start the ideas and ideologies. The world is never poor of ideas and ideologies: in theory we are much more advanced than our ancients. But they practised and lived their modest ideas and thus heralded their golden era of peace, progress and plenty. We in our times have all the ideas necessary for achieving the greatest era that man has ever seen in his history, but we do not live them.

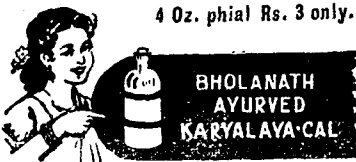

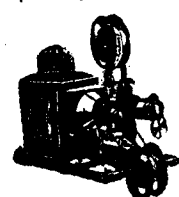

Gleanings

Volcanoes In Action

SIX miles off the northern coast of the Island of Mindanao, the most southerly of the Philippines, is a much smaller island called Camiguin, the site of the volcano now known as Hibokhibok, which means hot and boiling. Formerly both the island and the volcano were known as Camiguin.

According to the great 19th-Century geologist Eduard Suess, Camiguin was "born" in 1871, when this small island was built up by successive submarine eruptions. Eruptions have occurred as recently as 1948, 1950, and 1951, recalls Prof. Edward Smith in a Melbourne periodical.

It was, indeed, the eruption of December 4, 1951, that received so much publicity because of the death of nearly a thousand persons and the resulting evacuation of nearly half of the island's population. The 1951 eruption was typically explosive, showering portions of the island with fine, hot volcanic dust and larger rock fragments. This event recalls vividly to mind similar eruptions which have occurred within historic times, some of them far more destructive.

Three Classes

Generally speaking we may separate all volcanoes into three classes. They are:

- (1) The explosive type, whose eruptions are a series of great explosions releasing highly heated water vapour and other gases which have been under tremendous pressures. Usually little or no lava accompanies these tremendous outbursts.
- (2) The flowing or effusive type, which is characterised by the forcing out of larger amounts of molten rock and lava. Although steam and gases accompany such eruptions, producing some explosive activity, little or no volcanic dust is ordinarily produced.
- (3) The part explosive and part effusive type. That is, explosions may occur which throw out fine rock dust, often and erroneously called ash, and these may alternate with outpourings of various sorts of lava. Mount Vesuvius in Italy is typical of this third class.

Krakatoa Explosion

The explosion of Krakatoa in 1883 is an outstanding example of the first class of volcanoes.

Krakatoa is a volcanic island in the Straits of Sunda—a body of water about 15 miles wide which separates the islands of Java and Sumatra in the Dutch East Indies. Previous to 1883 Krakatoa embraced about 30 square miles. On August 26 and 27, 1883, Krakatoa literally blew

up, reducing its size about two-thirds and throwing perhaps as much as 10 cubic miles of rock dust into the atmosphere.

The sounds of the first explosions were so loud that they were heard at least 3,000 miles away, roughly as though an explosion set off in San Francisco could be heard in New York city.

Unquestionably the most terrible explosive eruption of recent times, measured in terms of loss of life, was that of Mount Pelee on the Island of Martinique in the West Indies on May 8, 1902. A zone of weakness on the southwest side of the mountain permitted the force of the explosion to be directed towards the seaport town of St. Pierre.

Fatal Day

At 8 a.m. on that fatal day a great black cloud charged with highly heated gases suddenly burst from the side of the volcano, and in a few seconds this dusty inferno—which travelled at least a mile a minute—swept down and destroyed St. Pierre, together with all but two of its approximately 25,000 inhabitants. Ships tied up at the wharves were demolished or severely damaged as were others riding at anchor.

The few eye-witness accounts which we have of this great disaster came from survivors aboard certain of these ships. Studies made on the bodies of the victims of the holocaust indicated that they were

killed by breathing the practically incandescent mixture of volcanic dust and gasses.

The classic example of an explosive eruption, I suppose, is that of Mount Vesuvius in 79 A.D., described in part by Pliny the Elder. At that time Pompeii and Herculaneum were overwhelmed as well as other smaller towns and villages at the foot of Mount Vesuvius, across the bay from Naples.

Previous Warning

There is no evidence that the inhabitants of the area generally had any hint that danger was lurking within this vine-clad mountain. The first intimation of trouble had come 16 years previously, in 63 A.D., when an earthquake occurred about noon, February 5. Much damage was done to Pompeii, Herculaneum and adjacent towns and many people were killed or injured.

There was, it is said, some question of abandoning the wrecked cities altogether, but they were rebuilt and beautifully so, the people little realising that this earthquake was heralding disaster on an even more terrifying scale.

The great explosive eruption of Vesuvius came on the 25th of August, 79 A.D., when severe explosions accompanied by local earthquake shocks startled the inhabitants of the area. Successive explosions ejected great clouds of water vapour and other gasses, together with vast quantities of volcanic ash, which fell around the base of Vesuvius and was soon covering the country-side with its fine impalpable powder.

The great clouds of steam and volcanic dust were, of course, easily seen from Naples and Pliny the Elder, by virtue of being in command of part of the Roman Navy, immediately boarded a vessel and set out to study the eruption of Vesuvius at first hand. Pliny, however, lost his life while making his observations. His nephew, Pliny the Younger, described in a letter to Tacitus how his uncle died of suffocation by volcanic ash, and thus became a martyr to science.

Queer Facts

In Douai, France, police who arrested Accountant Theophile Dieux, 60, for stealing two bricks from a building under construction, followed him home, found his basement stuffed with bricks, timber, nails, iron bars, flooring, window frames, lime, paint, nuts and bolts, heard him explain that he had spent the last 32 years gathering items on his way home from work in order to build a country house, but the process had been so slow that the tools he stole 20 years ago to do the job are now completely rusted away!

Mrs. Marguerite Norton, a Detroit woman, gave evidence in a divorce court that she worked for her own living because her husband spent all his time, money and affection on his worms—10,000 of them.

To save wear and tear on the vocal cords of stars, Hollywood pays Ezelle Poule £50 a day to scream for them in films.

In England, two young airmen who had pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering a house and stealing, were let off with a caution by the court when their commanding officer explained that, as members of an R.A.F. Special Assault Squad, they had been trained to break into buildings and capture documents. "It was only fair," said the officer, "that a man so taught might be inclined to put his training to the test when he is in drink."

When Roy Wallis' car crashed in Toronto, leaving him entirely uninjured, he later complained to the police that two witnesses insisted on applying first aid treatment. They dragged him out of his car, twisted his arm and made him lie down on the freezing footpath.

Hot Boiling Rain!

The great clouds of steam which condensed into a boiling hot rain washed the volcanic dust to the earth's surface, forming hot mud flows which together with the suffocating volcanic dust, served effectively to destroy all life with which it came in contact. So much rock dust fell that the cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum, as well as all other settlements around the base of the mountain, were obliterated.

As time went on and the Roman Empire fell, the existence of these cities was forgotten. It is said that the discovery of fragments of marble and their removal for building purposes by people who had no idea of the great buried cities lying beneath their feet led eventually to the various attempts that have been made to uncover Pompeii and Herculaneum. These attempts began in earnest in the early 19th Century and have continued intermittently ever since.

Extinct Volcanoes

Looking at the second class, the effusive volcanoes, we find that they chiefly pour out a highly liquid lava called basalt, which will flow for long distances before becoming immobilised by chilling. Such eruptions continued for long periods, gradually built up broad flattened cones whose gentle slopes rarely exceed an angle of eight degrees from the horizontal. Because these low cones look something like ancient war shields, they have been called shield volcanoes by some geologists.

Such a one is the greatest volcano in the world, which rises to a height of about 30,000 feet from the floor of the Pacific Ocean in round numbers 16,000 feet below sea level. It is the Island of Hawaii, whose volcanic summit is called Mauna Loa.

Successive outpourings of lava during who knows how many millions of years have built up not only the Island of Hawaii but all islands of this group, each being in fact a volcano. With the exception of Mauna Loa, however, all probably are now extinct. Twenty miles from the crater of Mauna Loa, on its southeast flank and but 4,000 feet above sea level, is the well-known active crater, Kilauea, where steam blast eruptions have occurred such as took place in 1924 and in 1930.

Earth's Internal Heat

One may well ask the question: "What causes these eruptions like a steam-boiler explosion on a stupendous scale?" Two sources for the water that forms the steam have been suggested. One is that the water comes from far inside the earth itself, having existed there since the birth of the earth. Another theory is that the steam is formed from the great masses of water that lie upon and within the earth's outer part, the oceans, lakes and rivers, and the ground water which saturates the upper portions of the crust.

Not all geologists are in agreement as to which source is the more important. It may be that both play active roles at different times and at different places. It is notable, however, that at Mt. Pelee in 1902, the evidence seemed to weigh heavily in favour of a surface, rather than an inside-the-earth source for the water which furnished the steam for great explosive eruptions.

A far greater problem is that of the source of the earth's internal heat which for more than 2,000 million years has been furnishing the energy—which in the last analysis is the ultimate reason for volcanic activity.

Jailed For A Kiss!

This year two Italian sweethearts were sentenced to three months' imprisonment. Their awful crime? Kissing in a cinema.

Public kissing in Italy was first banned by Mussolini before the war, the penalty being ten lira for each offence.

Other countries have made kissing illegal from time to time. The Puritans who emigrated to America disliked demonstrative love-making intensely, and echoes of their strait-laced views are still to be found in some States.

For instance, only a few years ago twenty-seven couples were fined ten dollars apiece for kissing in public in Atlantic City.

Young people in love are severely penalised in Connecticut, for a girl may not receive love-letters without permission from her mother.

In Newark, New Jersey, a man may whistle once if he spies an attractive girl. After all, admiration is beauty's due. The second time a man whistles, however, he is considered to be guilty of disorderly conduct and can be arrested, writes the London *Answers*.

There's a somewhat similar law in Venezuela, aimed not at the general public, but at the police, apparently a very gallant set of men. These officers of the law could not resist whistling whenever they saw a pretty girl without an escort.

To begin with, a fine was imposed, but the policemen considered it a point of honour to continue, and in the end the authorities had to substitute a penalty of three days in jail.

Shortens Life!

In ancient France, under the Salic Law, the fines were really burdensome for what we might consider to be only a minor offence of taste. Fifteen pieces of gold had to be paid by the man who improperly pressed a woman's hand.

Even in England, at times, the course of true love has been thwarted. In the seventeenth century a Sunday kiss resulted in the offenders being put in the stocks.

No excuse was allowed, not even that of the sailor who arrived home on a Sunday after three years' service abroad. Greeting his wife, he kissed her, and unfeeling magistrates sentenced him to a term in the stocks.

Before the war, in Russia, a Government-sponsored anti-kiss league was formed, and people were warned that every kiss spread thousands of germs.

Is kissing dangerous? American scientists have investigated the matter most thoroughly. With the aid of four chorus girls and twenty willing men, they carried out a series of tests, using special apparatus to test the effect of kissing on the heart-beats.

Every kiss, they reported, shortened a person's life by 180 seconds. Presumably, if one went in for a kissing marathon, it would cut short one's life by years. Some people might think it a wonderful way to die!

World Record In Wives!

Bruce Steele is just a seventy-two-year-old Texan plumber, a handy man with his spanner, but he has just established a new world record in wives. When he married forty-seven-year-old Estelle at El Paso recently he signed the marriage lines for the seventeenth time. Bruce has now had fourteen wives, but one of them he married twice and one three times, making seventeen marriages in all.

"Can I help it if I appeal to women?" Bruce asks his critics. "It's the plumber in me!" Women send for the plumber half the time, he claims, just to tell him their troubles while he works. But Bruce was a boxer with a travelling show when he married his first wife, Mary, back in 1911. When he moved on, she got a divorce and he wooed and won girls in other towns. "Just give the women what they want and give them a divorce every little while," he sums up. Yet to-day—although he never forgets his tools on a plumbing job—he cannot even remember all his wives' names, writes a British weekly.

There was Nellie whom he married twice, two girls named Rose, and Fannie whom he has cause to remember because she nearly fooled him with her third divorce. After being married to Bruce twice before, Fanny didn't want the divorce and contested it in court... but variety prevailed!

Blonde's Adventure

"Find their weakness and play it up—that's the way to be a good Romeo," Bruce declares. But his theory is contested by forty-seven-year-old Francesco Juliao of Brazil, who says that marriage has many complications. And Juliao—a successful white farmer—should know. He has twelve wives living with him all at once in his homestead near Rio de Janeiro.

Two recently presented him with sons to add to his total of twenty-three children. Legally speaking, more than one wife is against Brazilian law, but so far the authorities have smiled upon this happy dozen.

Platinum blonde, Betty Calamusa, too, has set all America gossiping with her twelve marriages in fifteen years. Two men she remarried for a second try, making ten husbands in all, and at thirty-nine she has no regrets. "Perfect marriages aren't rare," she asserts. "My marriages were so perfect they were just too good to last. Mother says she just can't understand what I'm looking for!"

Betty has married G-men, Air Force heroes (two), an undertaker and a full-blooded Cherokee Indian. Most of her ex-husbands still send her birthday and Christmas cards and some even remember her at wedding anniversaries. "But no children!" Betty sighs. "I just never planned for any."

The Bald Truth!

Baldness is not caused by (1) wearing a tight hat or (2) high-tension living, says Dr. Herbert Rattner of Northwestern University.

In no country do men wear hats so seldom as in Germany, he says, and yet in no country are there so many bald men.

A medical book written more than 100 years ago blamed high-tension living for baldness, he added.

"Today, there is revival of the same old theory but no proof."

Emperor Of Sugar!

The world's biggest sugar operator is a little known Havana trader named Julio Lobo, according to *Time* News-Magazine. A short, imperious man of 54, Lobo has more to do than anybody else with determining the world price of sugar. He handles about half the entire Cuban crop, at least a fourth of the Puerto Rican and Philippine crops, owns or controls up to 30 Cuban sugar mills, and dominates the market everywhere. "I am the market," he says. "I buy and sell sugar any time, day or night." Recently, as Cuba's 5,000,000-ton sugar harvest rolled towards the market, Lobo operated right around the clock, closing deals with New York, London, Frankfurt, Paris, Rio and Manila, involving millions of dollars.

Lobo's mastery over the marketing of Cuba's No. 1 product has won him a fortune estimated at £30 million. "I back my judgment," Lobo says, "with good, fast, accurate information, courage and cash." Powerful though they are, even the big U.S. refiners find it unprofitable to buy at any time and in any quantity and thus compete with Lobo; in practice, they have to come to him for their Cuban sugar, and sometimes pay through the nose.

Lone Wolf!

Born in Caracas, adds *Time*, whence his banker-father fled to Havana after a turn-of-the-century revolution, Lobo was schooled in sugar-mill engineering at Louisiana State University. He learned sugar marketing in the hard times following World War I.

So that he can spend more time with "my mistress, sugar," he has fitted out a penthouse over his office. Even when he travels, as he often does, to Europe, the U.S. and South America, Lobo deals in sugar day and night by international telephone. "This business needs me," he says. His name in Spanish means "wolf"—"lone wolf," he explains with relish. Evenings, he says, when the last of the day's 500 cables have been answered, "I like to walk alone from my office to the harbour. There I can sit on the edge of a pier, gaze at the lapping waves, and think about the future of sugar."

Russia: Woman's View

The Belgian-born wife of Sir David Kelly, the British Ambassador to Moscow from 1949 to 1951, gave a woman's viewpoint on Russia last month. It is the most puritanical country in the world, Lady Kelly told a lecture audience in Sussex. "You never see couples embracing in public, or (moving) pictures with the slightest suggestion of sex appeal."

Other feminine observations by Lady Kelly:

"I found (small children) friendly and well cared for, but propaganda affects them when they go to school. From the age of 14, you notice the hardening of their stare when they realize you are not one of them."

"Russia is neither a paradise nor a world of wicked people—most of them are quite well-meaning people pushed about by a crowd of hard-working officials in the grip of a stern doctrine to which they are prepared to sacrifice not only the ordinary individual, but themselves as well."

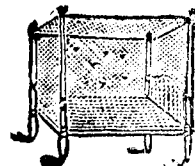

"Nothing, dear, only a ring."

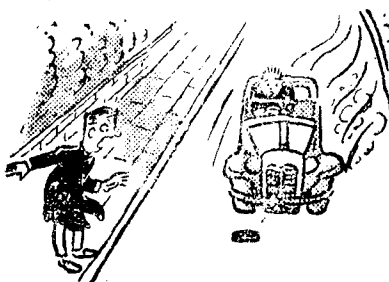
"What! You have lost a ring, have you? Did you inform Mrs. Reddy of the loss?"

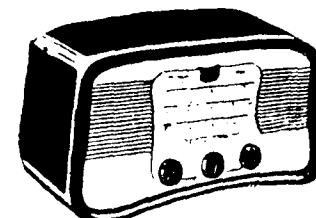

"Shri 420" Is Sequel To "Awaraz"

After the release of R. K. Films' *Aah*, Raj Kapoor decided to make another shuffling in the schedule of his forthcoming production activities. "I did not think it suitable to follow up with another stark tragedy immediately after *Aah*," Raj Kapoor reflected, saying that he was postponing *Ghat* in favour of *Shri 420*.

On the morning of June 1, which day was also Nargis' birthday, Raj Kapoor performed the "Muhurat" of *Shri 420*, at his Studios at Chembur. The Studio grounds were crowded from early morning that day, since the "Muhurat" was scheduled for 10 a.m. Besides the members of his staff, his family and friends, there were few others. Prithviraj, Raj's father, on whom the "Muhurat" shot of each of Raj's films is taken, drove up in style in his ancient Opel, now painted a bright cream-pink. After that, Raj's wife Krishna and her family drove into the Studio in Raj's Oldsmobile Convertible, the car Raj has possessed since the success of *Barsaat*. The "pandits" were already on the floors. All was in readiness for the ceremony. After the "pandits" finished chanting the prayers, Raj arose and went around to his grandfather, father, wife, putting the vermilion mark on their foreheads. After that, little Daboo, Raj's son, went running among the other guests, putting vermilion on each of their foreheads. Then Prithviraj went before the camera. The "shot" had already been composed by Radhu Karmarkar. He began chanting the "shlokas" we hear before the start of all R. K. Films' pictures.

As he was half way through, the lights inexplicably dimmed—then went right out! Radhu was shaken one terrible moment. The spectators on their part thought that this was another special effect by the ace cameraman of *Awaraz* Only Prithviraj, with admirable presence of mind, did not falter, and the shot was taken! After-

wards, it was found that the power of the full Chembur district had failed. Raj Kapoor laughed: "That was in keeping with our film! Even the lights went 420 on us!" The first treatment of *Shri 420* has been written by K. A. Abbas, based on a story idea by Raj Kapoor himself. The theme of *Shri 420* is a rollicking comedy which satirises modern city life, and the struggle for existence that

makes vagabonds of good men. The film is in the nature of a thematic sequel to *Awaraz*. However, this story makes a maturer advance on the previous one. The essential goodness of man is asserted in this story, runs a Publicity Consolidated press note.

Shri 420 will star Raj Kapoor in the title role, with the girls in his life. One of them will be Nargis, while the other has not yet been cast.

Raj Kapoor has already taken some shots of the current wrestling matches in Bombay, since the story of his film has such scenes. Raj has already shot a bout

between King Kong and Swedish Angel. This will be followed by shots of fights between King Kong and Dara Singh, and King Kong and Seelie Samara. This, in the film, will be followed by Raj Kapoor himself challenging King Kong to fight! The shooting of *Shri 420* will proceed without interruption from now on.

"Shagufa" Ready for Month-end Release

Premnath who began *Shagufa* in partnership with his director H. S. Rawail was later inspired to become sole owner of the film. This inspiration was provided to him by his lovely star wife, Bina Rai. She was extremely keen on having their own unit and freedom to produce whatever they felt should be filmed. And thus P. N. Films Ltd. was born, marking the launching into a production career of one of filmdom's top leading men, runs a Publicity Consolidated report.

Premnath, who was quite contented with being just a "hero," free from all the worries that beset a producer's career, had never considered burdening himself with additional responsibilities. He worked when he liked, and did not work when he was not in a mood. But then *Shagufa* went on the floors at the Famous Cine Studios at Mahalaxmi early this year. At present, director Rawail is busy editing the uncut reels of *Shagufa* in order to be in time for the already announced India-wide release date of July 31. The story of *Shagufa*, written by Afzal Shadab, with dialogue by Ramnand Sagar, is a psychological drama culminating in tragedy. The film concerns a pretty young neurotic, and a young psychiatrist who attempts to cure her. The picture has Bina Rai as the neurotic and Prem as the psychiatrist, while Purnima plays an important featured role. Others in the cast are Yashodhara Katju,

Bipin Gupta, Sunder, Leela Misra, Hiralal Iftizibhran, and Rajendra-nath. *Shagufa* is directed by H. S. Rawail. Its music is by C. Ramchandra, and its ten songs are by Rajendra Krishen. The audiography is by Mukub Bose. *Shagufa* has three dance numbers. One is a comedy dance by Sunder and Yashodhara Katju. The second is a "mela" folk dance, and the last a duet-dance by Gopi Krishen and Kusum. Art-direction is by Sant Singh, while general art is supervised by Kanu Desai.

Premnath, who has spread out his activities in manifold directions, such as exhibition and distribution, intends to release *Shagufa* himself in various territories, while plans for his next two ambitious productions in Gevacolor are already under way.

History in Technicolor

Released in Madras last week was the full-length record of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, *A Queen Is Crowned*, the greatest film of an historic national event ever made. A Queen Is Crowned runs for approximately an hour and a half—a never-to-be-forgotten screen document which will keep all the inherent pageantry of Queen Elizabeth's Coronation as a glorious record for the future. This film was also screened at various other centres as well.

The new process is to be known as

Columbia Vitascope. As counterpart of its stereoscopic picture on the larger screen, the studio has perfected a stereophonic sound which will give directional emphasis to all sounds emanating from the screen, including both voice and music. In enhancing the realism and to authenticate the illusion of motion pictures, brilliant photography is vital, but it is equally important to reproduce sound as accurately as possible; that includes giving it depth and movement, too.

Three Actors To Portray Eddie Cantor In Film

No fewer than three actors will play the part of Eddie Cantor in Warner Bros.' forthcoming *The Eddie Cantor Story*. While Keefe Brasselle has the star role of the entertainer as a grown-up, young Richard Monda will portray him at the age of thirteen, and for the "in-between" period has been signed seventeen-year-old Albert Walters, who will do a blackface musical number as Eddie Cantor at that age. 8. "Rudeness can scarcely be called —" NICE, VICE?

Riling the wife alone can never be the goal of a husband unless he happens to be a sadist. By pretending to be vexed when in fact she is not can only make matters worse for the wife. Some wives who lack tact get what they want from their husbands by behaving in a shrewish manner. But a clever wife won't put husband to all that humiliation and anger. She would pretend that she is Ruled by him, that she is a tool in his hands. By so pretending, she can easily make him do things which she cannot get done by adopting the hostile attitude. RULED scores.

10. "It's often hard to refuse a present when its value is —" TIDY, TINY?

I feel that it would be unfair to brand all our fellowmen as greedy people which would be the position if we accept the statement made by the Clue with Tidy as the missing word. It is an unjustifiable action to accept a present because it happens to be a Tidy one and to refuse another exactly because it is Tiny in value. That which makes a present worth accepting is not its cash value but its intrinsic value like the spirit in which it is given and by whom it is given. 16. "Most people have — difficulty in understanding world politics today." SOLE, SOME, SORE?

Reject Sole. I feel that Sore exaggerates the position. While most men are not political pundits, they are not as dull witted or as uninformed as those of a generation or two ago. Thanks to the rapid growth of newspapers and journals, most people know what is happening and where. It is this active and keen interest in politics that is a marked characteristic of modern democracy. Sore is not apt, therefore. Some difficulty or other may be felt by most of us to understand world politics because we are not aware of the inner political currents and cross-currents. SOME should score.

17. "Many a person in humble position — fill important one satisfactorily." COULD, WOULD?

Would is absolutely assertive without giving any valid reasons for such sureness. On this ground, I don't prefer Would. Many persons in humble positions have the talents and confidence which would make them occupy important positions well and discharge their responsibilities properly if only they Could occupy such positions. But the tragedy is that they do not occupy important positions for want of opportunities. The fact, however, remains that though they are in humble positions yet they Could fill important ones satisfactorily. Bet on COULD.

18. "Man who seemed never to be — in word or deed would prove

rather trying companion after a time!" CRASS, CROSS?

It is not stated that the person would continue to be Cross, short-tempered, all the while after a time. Hence, reject Cross. When we move with a man who had never seemed to be Crass, stupid, silly we would usually tend to introduce him to our other friends and relatives. But if he were to become Crass after that, even if it be only once or a few times, then he will prove rather a trying companion for we will be looked askance at by our other friends for having moved with and introduced such a person. Enter CRASS.

19. "Person who — serious wrong suffered by public usually gets plenty of public applause." FIGHTS, RIGHTS?

It is easy to plead convincingly for the aptness of both Fights and Rights here. Person who Fights for public good does get enough publicity and appreciation, whether he succeeds or not. And one who actually accomplishes it, Rights the wrong, will get greater public applause. "Plenty" does not necessarily mean "greater" or "more". Hence, permute both FIGHTS and RIGHTS here.

20. "Whether worker is — is often largely a matter of boss's opinion!" INDOLENT, INSOLENT?

Insolent worker is conspicuous by his undesirable behaviour. His being insolent or not is to be determined by his attitude and not by any circuitous method of mere conjecture. Some bosses would like to extract the maximum amount of work from their employees. Even a little easing of the tempo of work would be characterised as laziness by them. Some employers go merely by appearance. To them employee who appears to be busy but in fact does not turn out much work would be looked upon as hard working whereas employee who does much work but does not make any fuss about it would appear as an Indolent one. Thus, it is entirely a matter of boss's opinion! Bet on INDOLENT.

BOOK REVIEW

World Wars — Why And Whither? (By Sri P.M. Verma. Published by The Indian National Renaissance Society, "Swastika Bhavan", 46, Thonhill Road, Allahabad.)

This booklet is the printed version of the address delivered by the author at a meeting of the "Freedom-Culture Club" of Allahabad. After giving out the brief details that led to the two world wars and their political and economic consequences, the author attempts to assess America's role in the international field. While we do have to accept a few faults laid at America's doors, we cannot exonerate Russia's leaders of all faults. There is much to be said on both sides, for and against. But the author makes himself to be an unequivocal pro-Soviet person. His solution to the problem itself shows his leanings towards the Communist creed. Says he: "The

key to world peace lies in the hands of the British Labour Party, provided it were to act like good Socialists and part company with U.S.A., and make a new alignment with the U.S.S.R. through India and China as the connecting links." Otherwise, according to him, "war is inevitable and all those politicians who still think they can sit on the fragile fence of neutrality are living in a fool's paradise." The clear hint is that Nehru should be openly pro-Soviet! As the price of the booklet is not mentioned, it is presumed that it will be freely given to those who ask for it.

the boss might not be able to *Spare* him at all. The worker may quite exaggerate his importance to his boss but it cannot follow because of the boast that the truth is contrary to what he says. The truth may be slightly less or even much less than the boast but it cannot be the contrary of what is claimed. However indispensable a worker, no boss would allow him to misbehave or adopt an attitude of indifference and over familiarity. No wise worker would boast that employer can't *Scare*, frighten him. But it so happens that a worker who is very much *Scared* of his boss would usually boast that his boss can't *Scare* him at all. This is a kind of reaction peculiar to those who suffer from an acute inferiority complex. SCARE scores.

2. "Man with little experience of women is apt to be surprised at how — their ideas can be!" **FIXED, MIXED?**

If not many, at least some among women are likely to have *Fixed*, settled, ideas, deep rooted convictions about men and things. But we can't say that *all* women have such ideas. Besides the general reference made by the word "women" in the Clue, we have nothing else to understand what kind of women are meant. This vagueness, in my opinion, should make us drop *Fixed* for the other alternative. Man who has had occasions and enough time to move with women knows what uncertain persons they are. He would cease to wonder at their confused and confusing notions of things. But man who has never had personal experience with women and their ways would think that they have the same mental outlook and courage as he has come to know they have through his book knowledge. But when he does come into contact with them and moves enough, surely he would feel quite surprised at the fact that their ideas are all so *Mixed*! Back **MIXED**.

5. "We're apt to despise man who speaks lightly of something he should regard as—" **SACRED, SECRET?**

I feel that the word "lightly" clearly points to *Sacred* as the proper word here. If something is to be kept as a *Secret*, then any mention of it either openly or by hints would be wrong. There can, therefore, be no question of its being wrong because he has spoken "lightly" about the *Secret*. Otherwise, does it not follow by implication that it would be quite proper to talk of a *Secret* in a serious manner? We all expect a person to be respectful in his talk about something he should regard as *Sacred*. If he talks lightly, in a jesting, ridiculing, irreverent manner about something he should regard as *Sacred*, then we are apt to despise, dislike the person for his irreverence. This is a natural reaction. Back **SACRED**.

7. "Thoughtful people usually have sympathy for — criminal." **DEFORMED, REFORMED?**

The pointers here are "thoughtful" and "criminal." No person would have sympathy for any criminal. But those who are not thoughtful, reflective, by nature are

apt to feel sympathetic towards a *Deformed* criminal. They allow his deformity to sway them into minimising or even ignoring his criminal act. The thoughtful, however, would not do so. Besides, "*Deformed* criminal" is rather vague. Did the deformity exist before the man became a criminal or did it happen after he is a criminal already? Reject *Deformed*. To the average man who cannot be called "thoughtful", a criminal is a criminal. He would strongly believe in the saying, "Once a thief, always a thief." Hence, he would have no sympathy for a *Reformed* criminal. But the thoughtful people react differently. They will have sympathy for him. This is because of their view that the average man becomes a criminal due to environmental or economic factors. They feel that if a criminal is properly educated in the responsibilities of a man to society and the state and taught a trade, he would become quite good. Bet on **REFORMED**.

11. "Surely, seldom too much to expect of person whose life one has saved!" **REGARD, REWARD?**

Reward can be only in terms of a cash payment. If the man whose life has been saved happens to be a rich person, then it is right to expect a reward. If he is poor, how can one expect any reward? If the man who saves is needy, he would expect to get a reward. But can one who is well to do expect a reward or accept one if so offered? And why "seldom too much" to expect so? When we save a man's life, rescue him from what looked like certain death, we do expect that person to show us *Regard*, respect or grateful reverence for what had been done to him. If he does not do so, we would certainly feel annoyed at the obvious lack of appreciation. It can never be said that to expect *Regard* from person whose life has been saved would be too much to expect. In this sense, "seldom too much" has some relevancy here. Back **REGARD**.

12. "Sometimes called rag when referred to contemptuously." **DRESS, PRESS?**

Dress is what men and women wear. Unless the thing worn is really shabby and is torn, then we are not likely to refer to it as a rag. Men are usually not so sarcastic about other people's dress whereas women would refer to the dresses worn by other women as rags even though they are not so. It is contempt of the person that would lead to describing the dress he wears in contemptuous terms. If a big person were to be shabbily dressed, then we would not refer to the dress in a contemptuous tone. *Press* here refers to the newspapers or journals. It is usual for anyone to refer to any newspaper or journal which he dislikes or which has hurt his feelings as a "rag" to show his contempt for it. It is not always that it would be so described but only "sometimes." Enter **PRESS**.

13. "Usually, a man is pretty tough if he's not much affected by big dose of—" **POISON, PRISON?**

We have to take the word *Poison* to indicate the normal poison which would prove fatal to the average individual. Hence, no question of "toughness" overcoming the effects of poison would arise in this context. We are not concerned here with such cases of men who have been able to set up an immunity to any poison. In their case, it is not toughness but an immunity developed through a period that enables them to overcome the effects of poison. Besides, "big" is irrelevant here. Certain poisons like arsenic, cyanide, etc., are fatal even if the dose is a small one. Big doses of such poisons could kill any number of people. If a man is very sensitive, even a short stay in prison would do for him to never think of going against the law in the future. Some people wouldn't mind such short stays in a prison. But usually a big dose, sentence, of imprisonment would pull up the offenders. And the actual stay in the prison for such a long time would sober them up even more. It is evident, therefore, that a man who does not seem to be affected by a big dose of *Prison* should be considered to be a tough person, a tenacious and stubborn individual. Back **PRISON**.

14. "Popularity that has been deliberately — is often very shallow." **BOUGHT, FOUGHT SOUGHT?**

Fought is a very weak word here. How are we to say that popularity that is *Sought* should necessarily be shallow? It may be sought by a genuine worker. He does a lot of work in slums, teaching people there how to lead better lives. Supposing he seeks popularity by trying to be as sociable with others as possible, can that popularity be described to be of the shallow variety? No. Some people do undoubtedly buy popularity. The rich, for example, can throw big dinner or tea parties, donate for several charities, etc., thereby ensuring much publicity. This is what is meant by popularity that is *Bought*. This popularity can only be shallow and not enduring for it would disappear the moment money ceases to flow from the purses of the popularity seekers. Bet on **BOUGHT**.

15. "Never could experts transform — with such skill as they can to-day." **FACES, FACTS?**

What exactly is meant by "transforming" *Facts*? Are the facts to be turned to fiction? Who are the "experts" who can transform *Facts* with greater skill today than the "experts" of by-gone days? I feel that *Facts* does not at all suit the Clue here. By "transforming" *Faces*, the Compiler clearly refers to plastic surgery which is the latest in the surgical field. By means of this plastic surgery, surgeons are able to transform, change, ugly faces into beautiful ones. A mis-shapen nose, an outsize ear, twisted lips, a pock-marked skin etc., etc., can all be set right, thanks to this plastic surgery. Surgeons who undertake such operations are undoubtedly very skilful. And nobody can question the fact that no such surgery was known in the old days. Even if such operations were undertaken, there was not the same skill. Vote for **FACES**.

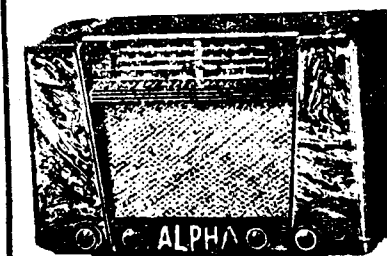
