Stirling Moss, the British racing driver, has officially opened the first of what may become a nationwide chain of high speed cars wash service stations. The new automatic car-washing station, opened in London's Brompton Road, cleans a car inside and out in three to five minutes at an average charge of ten shillings. The man who has financed the station is a New Zealander, Mr. Hilton Lowndes.

The Wimbledon Again

The much awaited Wimbledon tournament is on at the moment. As we go to the press the matches have come up to the quarter final stages. India's hope Ramanathan Krishnan has secured a place in the last eight in Men's Singles, by beating Italy's Orlando Sirola. He is reported to be in peak form this season. But Krishnan the No. 7 seed and also last year's semi-finalist has to face stalwarts of world tennis from now on. Emerson, Laver and Fraser, the reigning champion, are already in the "last eight arena" to contest and win the world's greatest tennis title, the Wimbledon Champion.

Regatta at Henley

The world's most famous rowing regatta, Henley, which takes place on July 5, 6 and 7 has drawn a strong, if surprising entry from the Soviet Union. Heading the list is a powerful Soviet sailors' team which will compete in the Grand Challenge Cup. Berkutov and Tiukalov, silver medalists, are entered for the doubles sculls. Olympic single scull champion Ivanov has been dropped and his place taken by Turian, who will be making his Henley debut.

The Marathon Barefooter

Bikil Abebe, the 29-year-old Ethiopian runner who rocked the athletic world by winning bare-feet, the 1960 Olympic Games Marathon in record time, is living in poverty.

He is out of work.

And life for him and his wife and young son, even in the most humble of homes in Addis Ababa, the Ethiopian capital, is made possible only by the help of friends.

Orissa is now producing its own requirement of sport goods in a factory which has been set up in an industrial estate under a pilot project. The factory is manufacturing footballs, volley balls, pingpong bats, shuttle-cocks, carrom boards, children's park equipment, etc.

It is further proposed to manufacture cricket bats, hockey sticks and tennis rackets.

With three years to go for the Tokyo Olympics, the Australian Olympic Federation has set in motion a plan to find the best possible way of preparing the nation's team.

The Federation has sent a detailed questionnaire to all Australian sporting bodies, covering all aspects of financing, selection and preparation of the team. Australia's Olympic organisers are anxious that all methods employed to send the Australian team to Tokyo with the general appeal of all sporting bodies so that co-operation for success will be as strong as possible.

Krishnan falters before the winning post

It is a great pity that Ramanathan Krishnan, India's tennis champion succumbed to Rod Laver of Australia, second seeded player, who annexed the coveted Tennis crown.

Krishnan, with his delicate artistry and perfectly executed shots, combined with superlative court craft coasted to the semi-final, one of his remarkable victories being that over Emerson, the Australian champion who had accounted for Laver in his own country. His amazing victory in quarter final naturally raised hopes that he would be the world champion this year, since he had beaten Laver on three previous occasions. However, he struck a bad patch while dualling with Laver. His world renowned back hand refused to function, his first services were weak and his volley did not function with the usual precision. On the other hand Laver swept like a volcano, carrying everything before him. It was power tennis the like of which had not been seen after Hoad won the Crown a few years back. Krishnan also lacks mobility on the court.

However, he avenged his defeat at the hands of Laver by beating him within a week in the Netherlands tennis tourney. It can be recalled that Krishnan has in his victory bag almost all the top stars in the world. He beat Fraser this year, he has beaten Olmedo, the previous champion twice, he has conquered Drobny and accounted for Schmidt of Sweden.

He will again try his hand at winning the coveted Wimbledon title next year. If he turns professional in the meanwhile, the world would have lost a great amateur player.

Angela Mortimer

21-year-old Angela Mortimer of Great Britain, the disability girl whose afflictions include partial deafness, a virus infection which nearly forced her retirement from active tennis has become the world woman tennis champion this year. She is the first English woman in 24 years to win the coveted woman's single tennis title.

She beat Christine Truman. Truman played magnificent tennis and was almost winning when she was

involved in an accident. She dislocated her left leg and was limping for the rest of the match.

The final produced bright as well as dull tennis. The champion played effective tennis without being impressive.

Australia on the top

In the men's doubles final, Australia's Fraser and Emerson conquered their comrades Bob Hewitt and Stolle. The match went to five sets. For two hours of power packed tennis, Fraser and Emerson were kept on the run by the youngsters but at last age and experience prevailed over youth and impetuosity.

Australia thus won both the singles and doubles titles. It will take a long time for other countries to beat the rising hopes of that Continent.

New World Champ

Australia continues to be on the top of the tennis world. This year too, a noted player from that country annexed the coveted Wimbledon Crown. He is Rod Laver, runner up for the last two years who blasted his way to victory over mercurial McKinley, the American player.

Laver took less than an hour to maul his opponent. It was power tennis at its peak. Never since the days of Hoad has London seen such a tornado in action. He was master of every department of the game. He served with deadly severity, volleyed with devastating effect and smashed with punch and precision.

He said after his victory that he would not turn professional. He will defend his title next year. He paid a tribute to R. Krishnan who gave him the best fight. Krishnan avenged his defeat at Laver's hands by licking him in an exhibition match in Netherlands recently.

Who is an amateur?

Russia has come out clearly in favour of professional competition in the Olympic Games. An amateur is defined as one whose participation in sport is not the sole source of his living. If this definition is accepted, one would earn £100 per week as a sportsman and a token payment for a part-time job and still enjoy the amateur status.
