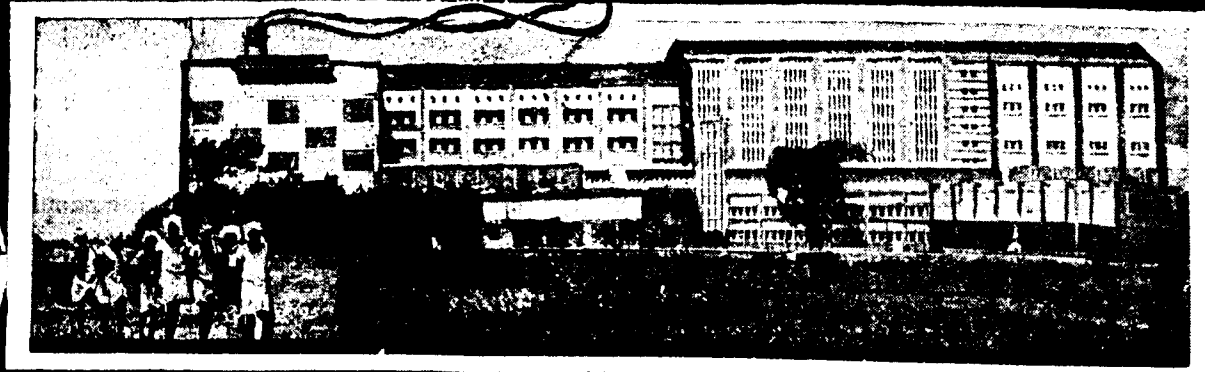

EFFICIENT use of FERTILIZERS and PLANT PROTECTION

Fertilizer is described as spear head of agricultural production. Increased use of fertilizer, introduction of high yielding varieties, efficient water management and recommendation of suitable package of practices form the instruments of the Country's new strategy for increased food production which is popularly referred to as 'Green Revolution'.

Woodash and other house hold waste materials were the first manures used for increasing yield, though not on a scientific basis. Later, emphasis was laid on increased addition of organic matter in the form of legumes to the soil to enrich the soil fertility and increase crop production in early fifties. That time, the use of fertilizers was feared as deteriorating the soil and yield in course of time. When the need for increased crop production

was laid, the use of chemical fertilizers came into vogue, in the later fifties.

Advances made in the field of agriculture have shown different means of fertilizing the crop for its efficient use viz., split application, placement of fertilizers right at the root zone and avoiding gaseous loss, and applying the needed quantity of fertilizer based on soil and plant analysis. Scientific information obtained go to show that the crop yield can be raised by growing algae in wetlands and inclusion of bacterial cultures for efficient fixation of atmospheric nitrogen. Addition of Azotobacter and phospho bacterin cultures to different crops have been found to give increased yield. Foliar application of nutrients found to give increased yield and to reduce the quantum of fertilizers.

To-morrow, the concept will be different from that of to-day. Since more and more research is being conducted in India and abroad to best utilise the costly input 'viz', fertilizer, that a farmer has to pay. The different approaches that are being considered include broadly under the controlled release concept, the balanced dissolution approach and bio-chemical considerations. The controlled release concept envisages chemical and or physical modification of conventional nitrogen fertilizers with the objectives of (a) minimizing immobilization, leaching and volatilization losses and (b) releasing an adequate amount of available nitrogen at a rate slightly in excess of the demands of the growing plant. To achieve these objects, attempts are made to cover fertilizer granules of urea and ammonium nitrate with rather inert, water resistant coatings or membranes such as plastics, resins, waxes elemental sulphur etc. The balanced dissolution approach is based on the solubility of the compound which is governed by the granule size. The balanced dissolution may be achieved by selection and mixing of different sized granules of varying water solubility. The bio-chemical consideration aims at repressing or inhibiting specific soil microbial groups which perform various bio-chemical transformations and conserving chemical energy within the plants by allowing the plants to take certain short cuts in their bio-chemical reactions.

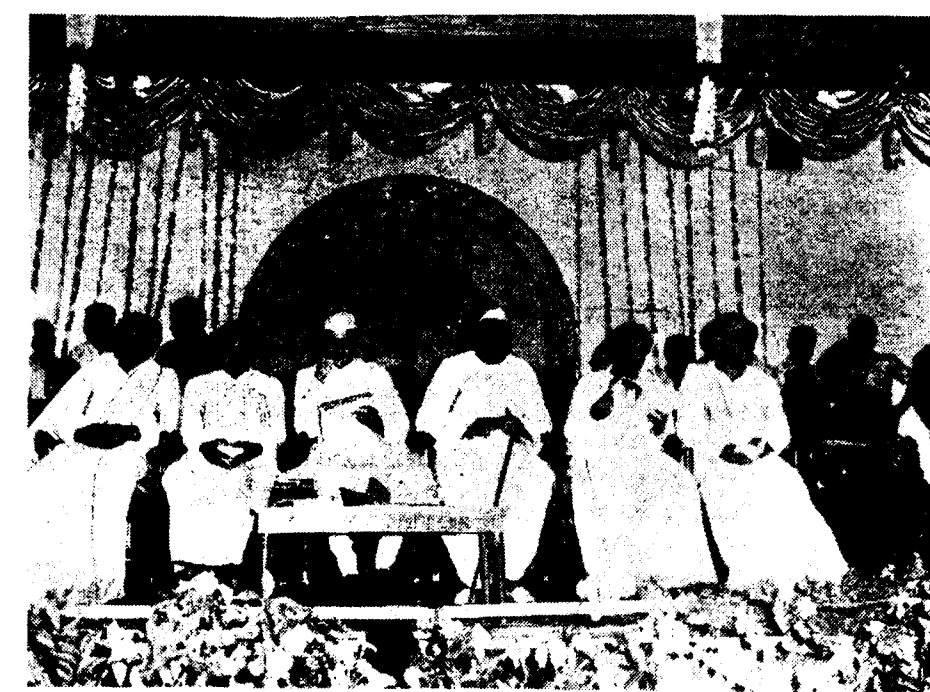

in the aggregate), about 5500 people may come forward to start small business like this. $5,500 \times 30,000 = \text{Rs. } 16,50,00,000$. This amount of Rs. 16.50 crores is not too big a sum for Tamilnad.

Tamilnad is also registering marked advances in the sphere of joint-sector industries. Apart from industries, efforts must be taken on hand to start companies to carryout Engineering contracts in foreign countries.

Appeal to take up Ambitious projects

In additions to these, I appeal to Dr. Kalaignar that his wisdom and knowledge should be directed more to the successful fruition of such useful major projects as the Rs. 1000 crore proposal for linking Godhavari, Krishna and Cauvery; changing the course of the rivers that flow from the western ghats; negotiation with the government of Karnataka (Mysore) for Joint sector development etc. If need be, I volunteer to place my services at the disposal of Tamilnad for the success of these schemes. Union Agri Minister compliments Sugar Industry

The Union Agriculture Minister, hon'ble Mr. Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed, complimented the Sugar Industry for its performance during 1972-73. The sugar production, he said, had gone up from 31.1 lakh tonnes in the last year to 38 lakh tonnes so far, and it was estimated to reach about 39 lakh tonnes.

40th annual general meeting of I. S. M. A.

Inaugurating the 40th annual general meeting of the Indian Sugar Mills Association at New Delhi on 21st July, Minister Ahmed said the government would announce its decisions in regard to excise rebates well before the next crushing season.

He said that there would be no change in the existing policy of partial control. The statutory minimum cane price for sugar would continue to be Rs. 8 per quintal linked to a recovery of 8.5 percent with a premium of 9.4 paise for every 0.1 per cent increase in recovery.

Regarding the revision of the levy prices, Mr. Ahmed said the interim report of the Tariff Commission had been examined. Certain clarifications obtained from the commission, he said were being studied.

He said he was aware of the industry's worry about the decision of the Government on the interim report, recently submitted by the sugar Industry Inquiry Commission. The Government he assured would take appropriate decisions keeping in view the interests of cane growers, producers and consumers.

Earlier, the outgoing president of the Association. Mr. M. L. Apie, hailed the existing policy of partial de-control, which had not only proved effective in increasing sugar production, but also ensured supply of levy sugar to consumers at a reasonable price.

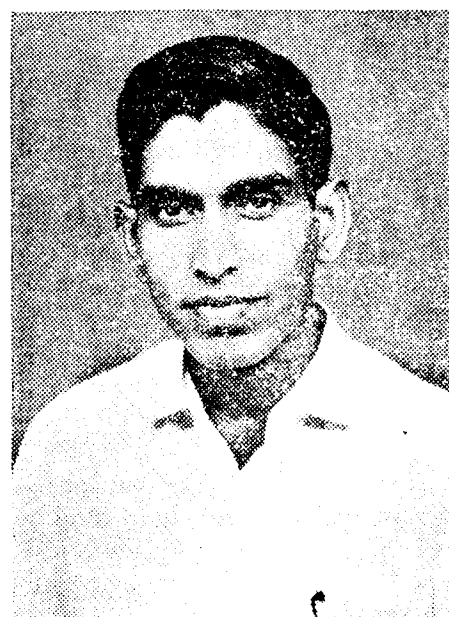

Mr. Apte went on to add that given the same policy as in the last year, the coming season could be a record sugar production year. This year despite the drought in certain parts of the country an increase of 11 per cent acreage was expected.

He opined that no national gains would be derived by nationalising the industry. Mr. Apte also opposed the suggestion to bring the industry increasingly under the co-operative sector. He pointed out that in an essential consumer goods industry like sugar, monopoly of any one sector was fraught with danger and thus thoroughly undesirable. He also claimed that the industry had surpassed every plan target for production.

Mr. Apte emphasised the need for early announcement of the excise incentives policy. He also felt that the existing levy price of sugar was based on extremely tight cost schedules and the return allowed was "unrealistically low".

OUR SUGAR COMPLEX AT SAKTHINAGAR

A DECADE of PROGRESS in SAKTHI SUGARS

.....K. M. Periasamy, Chief Engineer.....

We started our factory Sakthi Sugars—now a great name in Sugar—in December 1964, with a crushing capacity of 1250 tonnes per day. We were able to crush 2,01,994 tonnes of cane in the first season itself and we had no trial season.

In about few months time, we shall be completing the first decade of service both for ourselves and for the country we belong to. Within this short span of a decade, we were able to improve the efficiency and the crushing capacity of the factory from 1250 to 2600 tonnes of cane per day. Year by year, we added machineries to various sections and the achievement of the higher rate of crush was possible because of the encouragement and guidance vouched by our Chairman Thiru N. Mahalingam, an enterprising Industrialist with variegated talents and our Commercial Director Thiru V. M. Kailasam, a progressive and mature businessman of multiple talents.

The work in the factory had to be stopped often during the first two seasons due to Mechanical or Electrical troubles. But the same had been reduced to a great extent in the following seasons. We were able to achieve this, mainly by introducing Preventive Maintenance in the year 1966-67:

In spite of the Experts' opinion in the field that the introduction of Preventive Maintenance in a Sugar

Industry would not be practicable because of the continuous processing involved, we could successfully adopt this in our factory because of the encouragement and guidance given by our Chairman, Commercial Director and General Manager.

Some may feel that the Preventive Maintenance is costlier because of the investment involved in the procurement of Spares. But considering the reduction in the stoppages and the subsequent reduction in losses, it is clear that it is not so in the long run.

The Preventive Maintenance squad is headed by a Preventive Maintenance Engineer and assisted by the Workshop Engineer for carrying out the Programmes. A few skilled fitters, fitter-mates and Machinists are also working in the squad.

In carrying out Preventive Maintenance, we first chart out a schedule for a season and the jobs such as overhauling of pumps, reduction gears and other moving parts like Stirrers etc. are being done as per the Schedule.

Preventive Maintenance helped us in reducing the duration of the off-season since the repairs and overhauling are done to the machineries during the season itself and only the major jobs like replacing of mill, rollers, cleaning of Boilers etc. are attended to during the Off-season. It is heartening to mention here that we run our factory for 11 months and because of the preventive maintenance adopted, we could complete our overhauling within a short span of one month and resume season after the short period.

I am proud to mention here that we are one of the leading Sugar factories which maintains longest accident free period. Some of our Engineers have undergone training in Safety

precautions and periodical safety classes are conducted inside the factory for the employees to teach them the safety precautions under the able guidance of our General Manager, who is an authority on the subject. We have been awarded the running shield both by the Government of India and Government of Tamil Nadu for the Longest Accident Free Period for the last three years continuously.

We have achieved a targetted crush of 2600 tonnes per day and propose to run this season which commenced in July 1972 till October 1973 to achieve a record crush, perhaps the highest in India. Because of the very progressive ideas of the top Management, I am proud to say here, that we envisage a programme of Expansion in such a way that by the time we expand our factory to 4,000

Sugarcane Breeding Institute at Coimbatore :

REMINISCENCES of a DIRECTOR

N. R. BHAT

(With due acknowledgement to "INDIAN FARMING")

The period that I spent as Director of the Sugarcane Breeding Institute, Coimbatore, was short and tough, but not devoid of useful achievements. I had been offered the post under peculiar circumstances. A senior geneticist who was to take over from the retiring Director had to retire a little earlier for some official reasons. This left some other seniors, who were directly or indirectly connected with sugarcane breeding, to aspire for the Directorship. To them, it was perfectly legitimate; for how were breeding methods based on Mendelian genetics relevant to sugarcane which is a highly heterozygous polyploid? In such a crop, a good seedling was but a chance event, and all one could do was to 'cross the best with the best and hope for the best'. By accepting the post without the least knowledge of such a situation, I had landed myself in an uncongenial atmosphere where friendliness and co-operation could not willingly be forthcoming. There was a redeeming feature, however. It was the disciplined working habits of the inmates ingrained in them by long tradition. The clouds of prejudice also cleared fairly soon and I settled down to work.

On a happy note

Actually, my work commenced on an auspicious and happy note. I joined on 16th August 1958, and on the third day arrived Dr. Harry F. Clements, the internationally reputed Sugarcane Physiologist of Hawaii, on a F.A.O. mission. He delivered a series of ten lectures on 'crop-logging', the technique he had evolved to judge the nutritional or water requirements of a growing or maturing crop from the analyses of plant parts at certain

positions from the crown. There was a big gathering of trainees consisting of sugarcane specialists, estate managers, chemists and others from various cane-growing states. The lectures and discussions were instructive and useful. There were discussions also on merits or otherwise of compost manuring, modes of fertilizer application, earthing up, tying up of mature stalks, etc. These together with pleasure trips to interesting nearby places made the period enjoyable. Eventually, crop-logging was given a trial by the Indian Central Sugarcane Committee at the Research Stations at Anakapalle, Padegaon and Mandya and also by some sugar factories on their estates. But, by and large, it did not make an impact on enlightened sugarcane culture in India.

More sound than light

A couple of months thereafter were the meetings of the Indian Central Sugarcane Committee at Rampur (U.P.) which offered opportunities to meet, and gather experience

from, sugarcane research and development workers from the states. But, there was little to learn from the technical discussions in the formal meetings which were marked by more sound than light. I remember my having given rise to a scene by suggesting an unorthodox experiment in which mixtures of agronomically and physiologically similar varieties could be tried to combat the menace of numerous races of disease pathogens and species of insect pests.

After this, I visited a few sugarcane areas and factories both in the north and in the south. On reflecting over my observations and the data collected on tonnages and recoveries by Shri Gopal Aiyer the Institute's Chemist by visiting various sugar factories in the country for 3 years, I felt convinced that there was scope to rationalise the breeding procedure at the Institute and the supply of material to the states for trials and selection work.

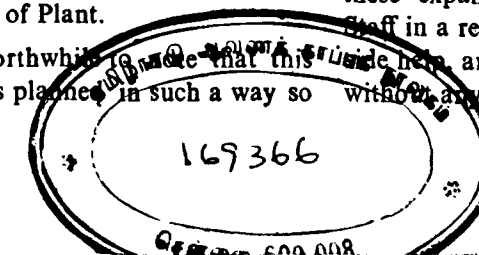

tonnes of crush per day, this factory will be a very ideal one in many respects. We will be able to complete the expansion, side by side without stopping the existing mills by putting another exactly similar plant of the same make which not only helps us to reduce the investment on store materials but also helps easy operation since our Technical Staff are accustomed to this pattern of Plant.

It is worthwhile to note that this expansion is planned in such a way so that we can run the entire factory without stop for the purpose of overhauling. Also, if there is any major breakdown in anyone of the plants, we will be able to crush a minimum of 2600 to 2800 tonnes per day till we rectify the trouble as against our capacity 4,000 tonnes.

I am happy to mention that all these expansions are done by our staff in a record time without any outlay in such a way so that we could run the factory without any major breakdowns.

Agro-climatic Regions

Firstly, it was evident that the cane growing areas in the country deserved to be demarcated into agro-climatic regions characterised by fairly distinct patterns of crop growth and sugar recovery. The main factors involved were latitudes, atmospheric humidity and sunshine (vs. cloudiness) during the optimal growth period, availability of flowirrigation and occurrence of water-logging over long periods. Accordingly, 7 regions in all, 4 in the subtropics and 3 in the southern peninsula were formulated. These were thought justified also because the varieties which had found favour with growers in the areas were more or less different. The validity of these regions is evident from the fact that they are being adopted till today as the basis not only for breeding work, but also for various kinds of field experiments under the All-India Co-ordinated Sugarcane Research Project.

Regionwise breeding

Secondly, breeding work had to be done regionwise using the adapted varieties of each region as the agromomic base. Crosses were to be planned primarily for covering up their deficiencies in field and commercial characters, and further to make additional improvements. Mates for the adapted varieties had to be found from among those which had locally been found to excel in characters to be introduced into the former. Some proven indigenous varieties were already available for the purpose. Additional ones could be found among foreign varieties in the World Collection maintained at Taliparamba (Kerala). This implied organising in each region trials of varieties which had made their mark in areas abroad, characterised by fairly similar latitudinal and climatic conditions. After exhausting such varieties some others also could be tried

Yield and Juice

Thirdly, as cane yield and sugar content of juice, the two most important characters in cane improvement, are both governed by numerous genes with small effects, only a special method called 'Reciprocal Recurrent Selection', consisting of a series of alternate steps in grading up and reselection, could prove effective in evolving varieties combining improvement in both characters. The method was useful in building up in the adapted varieties of each region, even other characters like disease and insect pest resistance. Switching over to this special method, which was in vogue in Hawaii, was an important and urgent desideratum.

Fourthly, for making the breeding programme effective, selection work had to be carried out essentially in the regions concerned. This meant that seedlings were to be raised at the sugarcane research stations in the various states from fluff of crosses effected at Coimbatore. Sugarcane Specialists had already been wanting to do this; but, in the case of some of them at least, ambition to earn a name by evolving their own varieties was almost their entire assets in usefully implementing a selection programme. However, there being no other alternative, this had to be done under supervision of the breeding staff at Coimbatore.

I presented all the above ideas in the Fourth All-India Conference of Sugarcane Research and Development Workers, held at Waltair in January 1960 and found them acceptable and proceeded to implement them.

Studies of Genetic stocks

Regional studies of genetic stocks selected for special merits in India and abroad was a very important desideratum. Though it looked that they could be carried out by the local Sugarcane Specialist and his staff, under the conditions then obtaining, I felt it imperative that only persons

specially trained for the purpose could achieve results. On this view, I strongly urged for the establishment of Sub-stations of the Institute at Lucknow and Motihari (Bihar) which was frowned upon by Government as an act of 'empire building'. But, the extremely useful information gathered at these substations and appreciatively utilised in the All India Co-ordinated Project has proved the validity of my action.

Some additional steps appeared essential by way of improvement in techniques employed in sugarcane breeding. One was in the method of testing canes for their reaction to the red rot disease. The basis of evaluation in the method in vogue was the lesion length produced in the cane by the disease pathogen. Past data and information available showed that the method was not very satisfactory. So, the Pathologist was advised to undertake a series of new tests by employing a pure culture of the 'D' strain which was the most virulent at that time and record, in addition to lesion length, all other important symptoms in canes of various grades of susceptibility, tolerance and resistance. The results obtained later brought out that the drying of tops, width of lesions and development of white spots in the lesions were the most significant symptoms connected with susceptibility and led to the formulation of a key for grading canes for red rot reaction

Hussainy Technique

As sugarcane was being grown in waterlogged areas of over 11 lakh acres in 'Terai' of Uttar Pradesh, screening of seedlings from appropriate crosses was started with a complement of about 7000 seedlings in the waterlogged fields of the Thiru-Arooran sugar factory, where also there was scope to grow waterlogging-tolerant cane. It is gratifying to learn that a couple of good varieties have emerged from this work.



Yasodha — Kannan

The happy wedding of Selvi Yasodha, B. A. beloved daughter of late Mr. R. Srinivasan (former P. A. to our Chairman) and sister of civil Supervisor Jagannathan of Sakthi Sugars, with Selvan N. Kannan, B. Sc. son of late Mr. G. S. Nagaraja Rao of Karaikudi, was celebrated solemnly at Pollachi, on Friday the 22nd June, before a distinguished gathering of friends and relatives.

Since both cane yield and sugar content in juice were characters governed by numerous genes and there was abundance of variability in sugarcane, it was thought worthwhile to begin with irradiation treatment aimed at mutations only in major genes which were assumed to govern (i) reaction of varieties to red rot and (ii) spininess of leaves which made the good variety Co. 527 unpopular. This work has proved fruitful as a spineless Co. 527 and red rot resistant Co. 449 and Co. 312 were secured in a few years after my retirement. I learn that the work has now been expanded to improve even sugar content in juice.

By taking recourse to tiller separation, a small but replicated experiment was carried out to test the usefulness of the 'Bunch Planting' technique of Hawaii which did not give the expected results. The seedlings surviving in competition were not necessarily the vigorous ones suitable to be selected for commercial cultivation.

The 'Melting Pot technique' however, was adopted. The 'Marcotting-

operation for rooting of crowns perfected by the late Shri Hussainy came in handy for the purpose.

Seedling House

The most memorable spot at the Institute was the 'Seedling House', the birth place of sugarcane breeding in India. It was the main working place of the pioneers, Barber and Venkatraman, who by bringing about a revolution in productivity of sugarcane laid a strong foundation for a prosperous sugar industry in the country. The Seedling House was but a humble thatched hut where a few tools and equipment used in Sugarcane breeding, and some tins of fluff to be sown were kept. In it were exhibited coloured pictorial charts of the

Ramayana legend about the origin of sugarcane in Bharat and how Alexander the Great took it with him to Europe; and, also the genealogies of the first hybrid Indian cane, Co. 205, and of Co. 213 which first enthused the growers in the Punjab with its strikingly higher productivity.

In the surrounding compound were pots and platforms for raising seedlings from fluff, live clumps of specially good varieties and of hybrids of sugarcane with sorghum, maize and bamboo. There was also a tin wall from which were hung posters made of dry canes illustrating the genealogies of some historical and original hybrids and hybrid varieties popular in various states.

Mecca of Cane

Coimbatore was the Mecca for sugarcane and, therefore, there were numerous visitors to the Institute, even some foreigners, all round the year. They were of various professions and standing, and included dignitaries, legislators, executives scientists, professors, students and farmers. Except when they were scientists and V. I. Ps whom I or some senior officer had personally to attend, the work was explained by the late Shri Hussainy who was a competent and knowledgeable Field Assistant in charge of the Seedling House. His talks were as interesting as instructive and were highly appreciated. I had a technical assistant who yearned for an opportunity to impress visitors with his orations on how difficult sugarcane breeding was and how, in spite of this, highly productive and sugar-rich varieties had been bred at Coimbatore. The lay visitor just gaped at being told that a single tassel contained as many as about 40,000 flowers and how the expert sugarcane breeder could cross so many tiny flowers! His orations were often so impressive that an irrigation engineer from a foreign

country exclaimed that his real place should have been in the Parliament!

Visiting V. I. P's.

Among the great scientists who visited the Institute in my time. I remember the American wheat rust pathologist, Dr. Stakman, the East German Radiation Geneticist, Dr. Stubbe and the Director of the Commonwealth Institute of Biological Control, Dr. Simmonds; amongst the foreign dignitaries I recollect Mr. Okpara, the then Prime Minister of Eastern Nigeria who was accompanied by his Commerce Minister and Chief Secretary. There were also a few trainees one of whom was an Egyptian, Mr. Bari.

The experimental area of the Institute lay in 3 locations, the wells in all locations being deep and yet dry during most part of the year. The area near and on the eastern side of the Seedling House was dry sandy loam where growth was just satisfactory. Here, in addition to doing experimental work on thin varieties of cane, was maintained the World Collection of Spontaneums made by the Botanist, Shri R. R. Panje. The lowlying area called 'East Chitra Chavdi' had been acquired specially for the breeding of thick varieties of cane. The famous varieties of the South, viz., Co. 419 and Co. 740, in addition to other improved varieties were evolved hereby N. L. Dutt and his associate and successor (as second Cane Breeder), Shri Subbarao.

It was in E. C. C. that very significant strides in cytogenetics of *Saccharum* species and their crosses with allied genera had been made by Janaki Ammal, Parthasarathy, Narayanaswami and Raghavan; and some also by Dutt and Subbarao. When I went to Coimbatore, this work was mostly in the nature of chromosome counts. Genetic stalks required for the work had been maintained in the premises of the laboratory shed.

The third area called Vedapatti was small and, because of its isolation,

Ancestral bequest

I am a firm believer in the dictum that 90 percent of toil and 10 percent of knowledge go to make a genius.

My father bequeathed me three things - a will to work hard, the A. B. T. Company and the Sanmargha Sangh. Mother 'Rukmani Ammal trained me in thrift, taught me to appreciate the value of kinship, and ingrained in me the art of associating with natural ease and love with all relatives. My paternal grandfather Palaniappa Gounder was an ordinary ryot of average means with a 15 acre holding, of which 5 acres were garden land and the rest a stretch of elevated ground. He was very much attached to Gandhi and Khadi.

After my primary education in the London Mission School at Pollachi, I joined the Municipal High School for further studies and passed out of it in 1938 with the S. S. L. C. It was the solitary high school at that time in that taluk, which today can boast of not less than 23 high Schools.

I regard my grandfather and mother as the two persons who had much to do with the shaping of my life in those early days. Lacking proper encouragement from grandfather my father had given up his studies with the 7th standard and started his own vocation. I would think that the beginnings of the present parcel service vehicles that ply the land with the symbol of Hanuman, date back to the time my father drove his bullock cart carrying loads to the Anamallais.

That Tiled House

In the country-tiled house in Imam Khan Street where I lived in those days, I have experienced the hard impact of rains during the summer monsoon and cold winds in the winter. Thanks to the toils and continued labours of two generations, we have

progressed to earn the appreciation of the elite of the state today. The basis of this success was work, —hard work, —honest work. My mother who could not have any considerable share in this elevation of ours, and my father who enjoyed it in a district wide limit, are the real architects of this success of ours. Those who worked with us in the different industries and trades, and the employees who work with us and the friends who toil alongside us also are responsible for these successes.

... a criticism of self

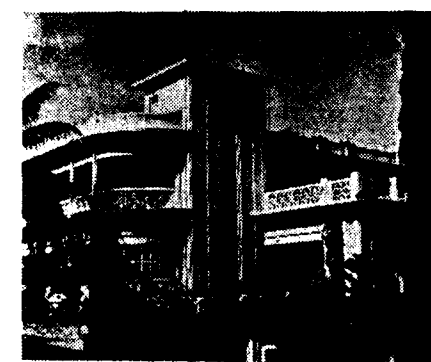
Several speakers alluded to my calm, quiet and peaceful nature. This I would confess is a virtue of circumstances. Only my colleagues and members of the family know the bounds of my tempers. But that would have been occasioned by some incidents or on account of some events and not about any individual. Fortunately, both in the family and in the business circles, this trait in my nature is sympathetically understood and co-operation extended. But I could not get that much toleration in the political sphere.

While I regard Mahatma Gandhi as my political preceptor, Pandit Nehru remains my beacon light. It is because of the fact that I labour within these great boundaries, I am able to continue to work in the public life of the country today even after coming out of party politics.

Grievances of a wife

My wife and children had to endure severe inconveniences when I remained in politics. In fact, my wife used to complain often, that

I did not have the spare time even to talk and move freely with my children. If I had moved to Madras in 1964, the object of the move was to be able to spend at least ten to fifteen days with the members of my family. But even the days I spend in the house are taken away by problems of Industry and business, and visits of political acquaintances; leaving me little time to enjoy the company of my family members. Still, we are left a wee bit time at least to spend together, here.

In Western countries, the worth of Politicians and statesmen is appraised by their record of service in positions of public life. In our country they are judged from different angles. No man is perfect. Mahatma Gandhi laboured, with the sages of vedic times as his ideals, and was able to accomplish great things. Even then, he was not able to win the confidence of Jinnah.

Overcoming a Problem

Gandhi is my guide. But during the time I practised his precepts following his path assiduously, I was confronted with the dire problem of want of friends in the different fields of activities. Though I still continue to follow the path of Gandhian cult I have since eschewed the habit of finding fault with others for not following the Gandhian path, and have thus earned friends in all walks of life.

Political or social leadership is not easy. So the community should afford protection to the leadership by confining its critical reviews of an individual, to his acts during term of office.

As against this, today's public life has been tarnished by dragging to newspaper columns and public platforms the private and personal activities of persons in political life.

Review of party life and state of the state

Though twenty five long years have flowed past since India got

Independence, its present state remains that of the U. S. A. of 1931. It was an excellence of Nehru that he never regarded himself as inferior to anybody. He was able to take the greatest intellectuals of India and use them for the development of the country, without ever feeling inferior to any of them. But it was the misfortune of Tamilnad that the chief man of this State was suffering from an inferiority complex at a time when Tamilnad could have registered excellent progress. The result of this complex was that the second generation of leadership was skipped over and third and fourth line of politicians were utilised. That was the reason why governance by congress had to quit. I sounded a note of warning in 1962, only to earn the opposition of the leaders, for giving voice to my opinions in the party meeting. In 1966 I advised in private that congress should join other parties to oppose the anti-congress front; but I was not able to change the path of Thiru Kamaraj. This resulted in the victory of the front in the 1967 general elections. Kalaingar who used to debate from the opposition benches is the Chief Minister of Tamilnad today.

With due respect to the senior leaders of his party he made them his Cabinet Colleagues in the Ministry. Because of this reason he is able to maintain a stable government at a time when talks of "revolutions" are in the air. Tamilnad is the one state where there is peaceful administration, and where rice is available for food. While Delhi is languishing in the grip of champions of political dogmas Tamilnad is progressing with a practical outlook.

Babu Jagjivanram

Shri Jagjivanram who is continuing to serve in the central cabinet right from the year 1946 is here today. His is a life which any politician will do well to emulate. Yesterday he was a friend of Nehru; today he is the Bhishma who gives practical counsels from rich experience to Smt. Indra Gandhi,

In spite of the fact that left-congressmen indulge in abuses against him, he has never felt aggrieved against Smt. Indra Gandhi. To him belongs the adroit political wisdom, of knowing the right time to move the coins in political chess.

The reason for the success of the present governing party in Tamilnad's politics was, Rajaji-Anna alliance in 1967 and D. M. K.-Indra congress alliance in 1971. The state of the present political atmosphere is such that no individual party can come to power on its own in the elections. So our leaders would do well to contemplate and consider deeply as to what the future holds in store. Jagjivan Ram and Karunanidhi are representatives of two parties; it will augur well for the country, if this good and happy relationship is continued.

Perhaps, there is no portfolio in the Indian cabinet that Shri Jagjivan Ram has not handled. As Mahatma Gandhi said once, he might be the great Harijan who would adorn the Rashtrapathi's (presidential) chair oneday. If the congress party split, it was due to the fact that he did not accept the presidential post when it was offered to him.

I would like to submit a suggestion, inspite of the fact that our Chief Minister is a very brisk and smart person, much more active than I.

Gama was famed as the greatest wrestler of the world. Yet in his later days he contended himself by quietly answering challenges thrown to him by new aspirants to the world title, that only those who overcame his disciple Imam Bux could enter the ring with him. In the same way, our Chief Minister should leave the challenges hazarded in the politician arena by new aspirants, to be taken care of by his colleagues and others. Several problems tend to assume bigger proportions by the mere fact that the chief minister condescended to take personal cognizance of them.

Let me quote from my experience also. Whenever I feel that my colleagues could handle a problem, I never interfere in it. May be it will be a bit irksome and even difficult if perforce we have to tackle it on a later occasion. But the fact remains, that if we cultivate the habit of not permitting our colleagues to take care of small problems even, there may come a time when all the work will get dumped on us. It is my submission that this defect which has crept into Delhi, should be guarded against in Madras.

Able younger generation

During yesterday's session, my respected friend Hon'ble Mr. C. Subramaniam and Hon'ble Chief Minister Farook Maraicar expressed their opinions about the younger generation. As for me, I am quite confident that the generation of to-day could shoulder responsibilities, provided that suitable and correct persons are chosen. Far more advances have been made in the field of Education than it was 30 years ago. In the same way, if people with necessary training and experience are selected and entrusted with responsibilities, we can rest assured of sure success. Instead of doing things this way, it is not proper on the part of certain elders, who in order to establish their own indispensability, by-pass men of knowledge and ability in favour of youngmen without the proper experience and then complain — "What to do, I myself have to do everything".

Civilisation of Sind and universities of Tamilnad

This is the proper time for Tamil language and the Tamil land to make rapid progress. To establish that Tamil language is more ancient than Sanskrit, extensive researches must be undertaken about the civilisation and culture of the Indus (Sind) plains. I am afraid that the universities of Tamilnad who should shoulder this

work are not devoting much thought to this sphere.

Taxation policy of the central govt.

Modern industrial concept is that forces of production should not get accumulated. But, taxes and duties have so increased as to prevent the saving up of any money. This problem could not be solved unless Delhi government comes forward to make reductions in the taxes on individuals. underneath is given the rates of taxation that are current in certain advanced Countries of the world:—

U. S. S. R.	— 25 % — maximum
U. S. A.	— 60 % — above 9 lakhs
Japan	— 40 %
Sweden	— 65 %

The rates of taxation on individuals obtaining in India is as follows:—

Income	— tax
20,000	— 7,000
40,000	— 15,000
50,000	— 23,000
1,00,000	— 48,000
2,00,000	— 1,45,000

In our society, it is only about their 35th to 40th year of age that talented and efficient Advocates, Doctors, Engineers, Auditors and small Industrialists reach a stage of good success. If they struggle up so far to success, the Central government comes out with a demand for a big share of their earnings.

Medical facilities, children's education and retirement Insurance are not taken into account for Incometax. No wonder talented people emigrate to America. Those who could not do so are not able to maintain proper accounts here. How could this pattern of society which converts the intelligentia into breakers of the law, lead to success?

Out of the 5000 Crore total national Income of India, the share of incometax is 340 crores. 150 crores could be reduced by extending concessions. It would appear that the central government which is printing thousands of crores, would do well to print 100 crores more for the progress of the country. Alternately this could be made good by easy levies by way of Excise duty. But Delhi remains inactive for fear of criticism by leftists.

Many such defects were pointed out by our Chief Minister in the National Development meeting at Delhi.

I am glad to welcome the recent developments in Tamilnad in the Industrial field. The appointment of a new chief for the T. I. L. C. has given rise to the hope that the T. I. L. C. which for some time past had become a mere safe deposit vault for money, will now start functioning usefully.

Loans for starting small business

Permit me to make a submission to the Chief Minister, that just as in the case of Engineers to whom a loan advance of 90 % upto Rs. 2 lakhs is granted, all efficient business people in Tamilnad like those who run a Tea-Kiosks, Ice-cream parlours, aerated-water works, laundries, hair-cutting saloons and skilled workmen like Turners, fitters and Mechanics should be given financial accommodation of 90 % upto a maximum of Rs. 1 lakh, for starting their small trades or industries. On an average of 25 persons in each of the 70 municipalities and 150 major panchayats (220 places

was utilised for testing for red rot by the Pathologist, Srinivasan, and for screening for waterlogging-tolerance by the Botanist, Thuljaram Rao.

Just before I went, an imposing building providing spacious accommodation for all laboratories, library and officers had been built and had been given water and electric connections. The building urgently needed a garden. In spite of great water shortage, a fairly good garden was laid out along the frontage of the building with a lawn fringed along the road with Larger-stromias and with beds of Cannas, Daliahs, Zinnias, etc.

By the side of the lawn on the southern side were pandals erected for photoperiodic treatments, both 'dark' and 'illumination' treatments, which had been successfully developed for the first time in the world by Vijayasaradhy the Physiologist for making

sugarcane stalks flower almost at will. This helped me to plan crosses with non-flowering stalks to evolve non-flowering improved varieties particularly for humid areas in the Southern peninsula where flowering is profuse. I learn that one good variety not flowering in the Hyderabad area has now been secured. Before I left Vijayasaradhy had, for the first time, made the sugarcane-maize hybrid to develop flower primordia by giving a treatment of optimum temperature, humidity and photoperiod.

Nucleus of Library

There was almost no library at the Institute, not even half a dozen periodicals, the understanding having been that the library and reading room of the neighbouring Agricultural Research Institute could be used by the researchers of this Institute. Understandably, this did not work well at least in the case of the uninitiated lower research staff, who felt the distance and had also the feeling that

general knowledge in genetics and plant breeding was of little value in sugarcane breeding research. So, immediately, I had to order some good books and subscribe to a score of scientific periodicals. It was made obligatory for research assistants to read relevant articles, make index cards and discuss their difficulties with their officers and occasionally with me. Seminars were also started.

The Institute was in a small village. For those who had been provided with quarters on the estate, life was drab and dull, except when the whole estate reverberated continuously for 4 days and nights with the music of the 'Talikkattu' ceremony in the neighbouring villages. Cobras were but a common sight. For better communication with the town, a bus service was got started. A post and telegraph office and a small dispensary were established. A reading room was provided and a small sports club formed.

IMPACT OF TRICHOGRAMMA for Sugarcane Borer control in Gobichettipalayam area

Sugarcane crop is threatened by the attacks of many pests and diseases and the internode borer (*Chilo indicus*) is a major pest in this region. The borer causes extensive damage to the canes by feeding from inside resulting in loss of cane weight, stunting and poor quality. Also this pest is difficult to control since it mostly lives concealed inside the cane. So the only method that will be useful in controlling this pest is by preventing its entry into the stem. In this effort the eggs of the borer could be effectively damaged by using an egg parasite "Trichogramma".

Though this parasite has been known to be a good parasite on sugarcane borers elsewhere they have not been tried in individual regions which differ markedly in the nature and extent of borer incidence. Gobichettipalayam in Coimbatore District of Tamil Nadu, area is a distinct sugarcane region having its own specific methods and conditions of cane cultivation. So a study was undertaken to assess the impact of releasing "Trichogramma" in controlling the borers with special reference to this region.

The release of the parasite at 25,000 insect per acre was made in

a selected locality covering a compact area of 100 acres during December 71 to January 72. To assess the successful establishment of the parasite, egg masses of the borers were collected at random from different places where ever the parasites have been released. It was found that 83 % of the egg masses were parasitised out of which 50 % was by "Trichogramma" and the remaining 33 % by the native "Telenomus" parasite. Also the infestation level of the internode borer was brought down significantly where ever the parasite had been released.

Thus the studies suggest that "Trichogramma" could serve as an efficient as well as indispensable tool in combating the threat to sugarcane by the internode borer. The parasite breeding centre is continuing its efforts to mass multiply the parasite so as to be of practical use to the sugarcane industry of this region.



Sugarcane road development Scheme

Our Civil Department at Sakthinagar is busy laying one more road under sugarcane Road Development scheme; from Mevani to Karungaradu in the Factory region at an estimated cost of Rs. 9 Lakhs. Pictures above show the bridge under construction, where the road crosses the Tadepalle irrigation Canal. This road which is being formed in conformity with state Highway standards, will benefit nearly one thousand acres of Wet lands.

RESEARCH BY AGRICULTURAL UNIVERSITY

HILL VEGETABLES SUITABLE FOR THE PLAINS

(PROCESSED BY COMMUNICATION CENTRE • T. N. A. U. • COIMBATORE-3)

● BEANS, RADISH & CAULIFLOWER

At present the demand for the hill Vegetable is on the increase and the cost of such vegetable also has gone up considerably, due to increased transport charges.

The Olericulture section of the Horticulture Department of the Tamil Nadu Agricultural University has undertaken some trials to locate suitable varieties for plains in Tamil Nadu. Cauliflower, Beans and Radish were tested at Coimbatore.

Cauliflower:

Cauliflower can be grown successfully between July to March. The varieties, Indian Snow ball and Early Patna are found promising under the plains giving heads of 1-1½ kg. with fine curd quality.

Beans:

A good collection of beans were made and varieties like Fonch Yellow, Contender, Canadian Wonder are found suitable to advance even in the summer months. This is a highly suited vegetable to grow in the kitchen garden all through the season.

Radish:

Radish, though gives maximum yield in the cool season, it can be grown throughout the year except the hottest months of April and May. At Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, two varieties were isolated which are available for harvest within 30 days of sowing. The Tubers are small round, less pungent, non-pithy and attractive in colour. It has a very low tap root ratio which offers scope to increase the population density. The seeds can also be sown on either side of ridges formed at 30-45 cms., at 8-10 cms., spacing. The Tubers

can be consumed as raw as a salad. This variety is well suited as an intercrop in many long duration vegetables like Brinjal, Onion. It yields 5,000 to 8,000 kg. per acre in 30 days.

CABBAGE:

The Department of Horticulture of the Tamil Nadu Agricultural University has undertaken the testing of a number of Cabbage varieties that will be suitable for plains in Tamil Nadu.

Cabbage is cultivated commercially between July to February in the plains of Tamil Nadu. In the trials at Coimbatore, several warm winter varieties were introduced and tested for their performance. The varieties

"Pride of India" and "Golden acre" perform exceedingly well giving compact heads up to 2.0 kg. within 80-90 days after transplanting with 15,000 to 20,000 kg. per acre which is comparable to the yield in the hills. The variety 0.5 gross, gives not less than 2.0 kg. per head while heads of 4.0 kg. is very common which boost the acre yield to 25,000-30,000 kg. per acre.

A good collection of "Chinese Cabbages" were assembled. Few of the varieties are promising giving heads up to 3.0 kg. This type can be used as a vegetable as well as salad like lettuce and has good market appeal. Work is now in progress to evolve varieties suited to grow even during the summer months in the plains, by mutation breeding.

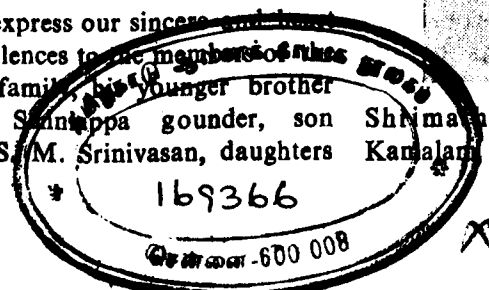
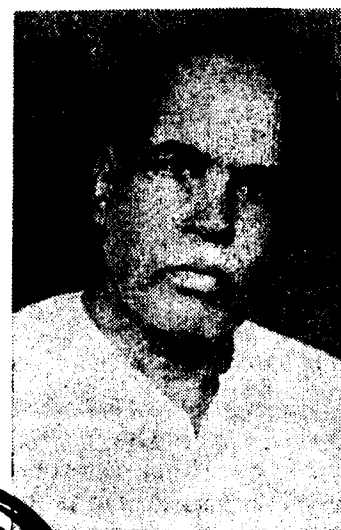
Directors Bereaved

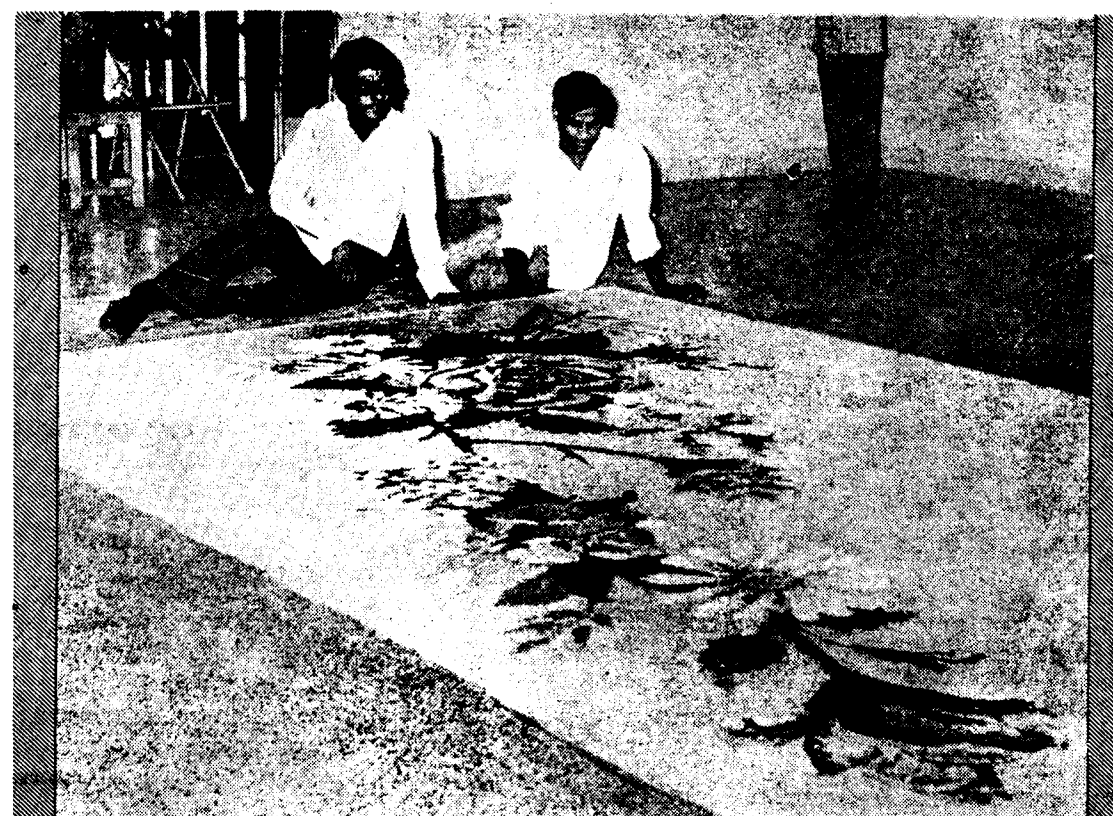

doubled twice since then: the first doubling took about 120 years and the second about 65: the next doubling to around 7000 million persons, may take not more than 85 years. The doubling time has decreased not because individual women are producing more babies but because more babies survive to live longer.

The acute seasonal shortages of food are widespread that there are local famines in our country and elsewhere that many of the poor are hungry and that some of them, particularly in the towns, die of their hunger.

In developing countries agriculture is so diverse and is changing so rapidly while the attacks of many pests are so sudden and so devastating that biocides will be essential for foresee-

able future. All progresses in agriculture requires that losses due to pests of all kinds be minimised.

In agriculture we are more interested in providing apt environment for the plants to grow and produce better yield. Many sorts of organisms compete with man at primary and secondary stages of production and during transport and storage. These organisms include plants (weeds, poisonous and parasitic plants), fungi, bacteria and viruses, birds, mammals, insects, mites, nematodes and other insect vectors. The above mentioned organisms may be put under one head as pests.

In developed countries, the control of pests has been given secondary

importance next to the national use of fertilizers. Theoretically, this should be determined by costs, benefits and competition. In practice, it is carried out if supported by fiscal means of the individual farmer.

The different methods of pest control include cultural method through resistant varieties of host organisms and direct control of pests and their vectors.

The different systems of farming have their own influences on the pest prevalence. For example, shift cultivation was in vogue, which had some sort of control over the multiplication of pest especially for soil borne pathogens. Now, permanent cultivation is followed and more the intensive use of land is being arrived at in the near future to feed the growing population. It is undoubtful, that in this new venture, controlling of pests is going to be big problem of the farming communities and so more sophisticated means of control of pests will be needed.

High-yielding varieties that are being grown are susceptible to pests. So, farming with these varieties need many number of biocide sprayings to get good yield.

Breeding varieties resistant to insect pests and diseases are being intensified by the Plant Breeders all over the world. In maize, a variety has been released with resistance to American maize rust, so also in cotton for bacterial blight and in Cassava for mosaic virus etc. Releasing resistant varieties for cultivation is the best way of regulating a pest. Against weeds, birds and mammals, breeding has so far been able to do very little.

Biological method of pest control is also a good technique for controlling insect pests and weeds. Insect pests of sugarcane are controlled by predators and screw worm by releasing radiation-sterilised males.

Chemicals that are used for controlling insect pests, diseases and

weeds of many kinds ranging from quite simple chemicals like chlorates, arsenates or copper sulphates phenoxy-acetic acid weed killers to biological materials like vaccine, antibiotics, sex attractants and repellents. BHC and DDT and other chlorinated hydrocarbons are supposed to persist in plant system and cause toxic effect when consumed to both humans and animals. So, in future the use of these chemicals should be totally avoided.

Weedicides are being commonly used in foreign countries to control weeds and found that there is no need for ploughing the land when weed competition with crop plants completely controlled. This recent technique is popularly known as minimal tillage. Under Indian condition, experiments with different herbicides are being conducted in different centres of Agricultural University in the country. In course of time, conventional method of weed control may be replaced with chemical means of weed control.

It may be concluded that in the years to come, one single method of pest control may not work well, as we do now. Since the different pests develop resistance, for the chemicals. So, an integrated means of different methods may be necessary for the purpose.

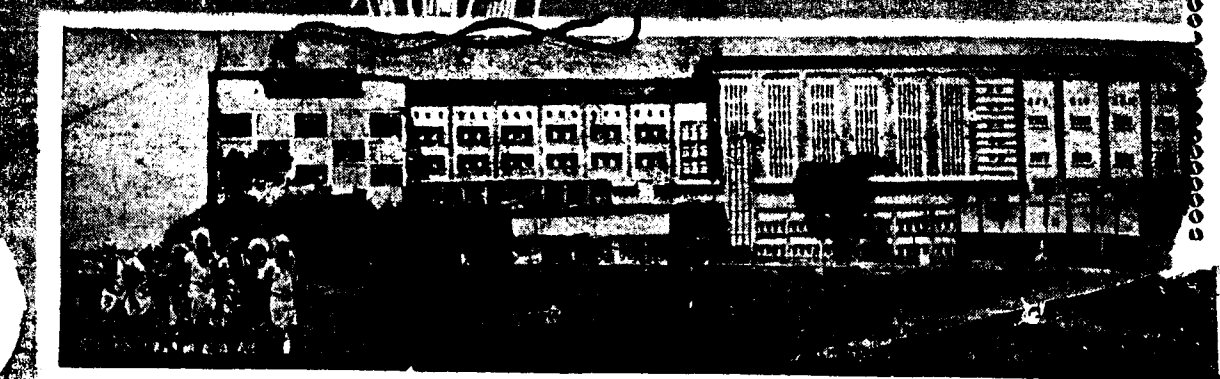

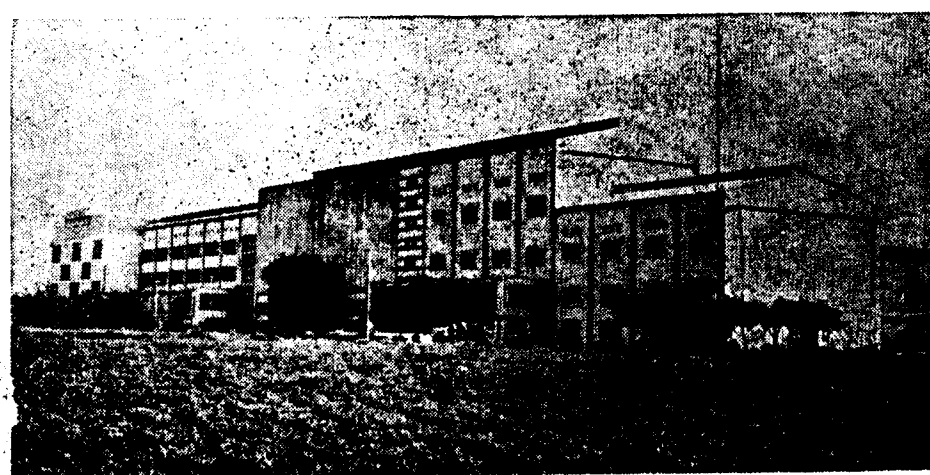

Introduction:

It is a general practice that the ryots do not grow any intercrop in sugarcane. Some ryots have the practice of growing vegetables like Bhendi as a border crop. The spacing between two rows of cane ranges between 2' and 3' in this region. Just after planting of sets in the furrows, this interspace is left unnoticed which encourages the growth of number of weeds in the field. Thus there is a competition between these weeds and the sugarcane crop for the plant nutrients and moisture. If these weeds are allowed in the field, a sizable portions of plant nutrients are taken by the weeds. To arrest the growth of such weeds, the interspace should be utilised for raising an intercrop.

Bisagi-Moong as an Intercrop:

The sugarcane crop takes nearly a month for its complete germination. The Interspace will not be covered by the foliage of sugarcane upto about three months. So weeds come up luxuriously during these months. A competition can very easily be created among the weeds by just growing BISAGI MOONG in between rows of sugarcane.

Initiative:

To have an experience on Bisagi as an intercrop in sugarcane, about 2.00 acres of sugarcane field of Thiru Saravana Gounder of Kugalur in Gopichettipalayam Taluk was intercropped with Bisagi-moong as an intercrop during March-May 1972. The performance of Bisagi was closely studied and by raising this Bisagi it was found that the weed growth was to some extent arrested. The staff of sugarcane development scheme were taken to this field and the owner of the field expressed his opinion that Bisagi can be grown as an intercrop in cane to obtain an additional income without affecting the main crop.

Follow-up:

Further as a follow up, the sugarcane development staff has been geared and efforts have been taken to raise Bisagi in cane fields just at the time of planting of setts. The total area so far covered is 2196.55 acres. The yield particulars and cost of cultivation are furnished in the Annexure.

Cultivation:

Bisagi-moong can be raised during any month. But sowing during the months of heavy rainfall and cold weather should be avoided.

Season	...
Seed rate	... 2 Kgs per acre
Duration	... 58-70 days (average 65 days)
Sowing	... 2 seeds per hole with a spacing of 9" (22.5 cm)

The seeds can be treated with Rhizobium culture and sown for better yields.

Method of Sowing:

The setts are planted mostly at the centre of the trench, and the Bisagi seeds are sown on one side of the side of the Cane rows, at the ridge with a distance of 6" to 8" from cane row immediately after planting of setts, at the rate of 2 seeds per hole with a spacing of 9" between holes. In this method, it is quite easy for weeding and earthing-up at 45 day of planting of setts. On the side of the cane where there is no bisagi-moong plant, the required quantity of fertiliser is applied, covered with soil and irrigated. The Bisagi plant does not, in any way, give hinderance for

weeding, earthing and applying fertilisers. The plant population of Bisagi moong roughly works out to 25,000 per acre which is required for obtaining a good yield.

Plant Protection:

This is also found to be necessary against aphids and Grasshoppers. Dusting with BHC 10% at 20th-25th day after sowing.

(or)

Spraying with Endrin or Rogor

Again just at the time of flowering or 40th-45th day, another dusting or Endrin or Rogor spray is needed.

When the Bisagi moong crop is sprayed with Endrin, the cane crop can also be sprayed. This gives a prophylactic treatment against early shoot borer.

Harvesting:

Fully matured pods are picked. Numbers of pickings will be a four at the maximum. The pods are non-dehiscent. No bursting of pods is seen in the field. The crop matures even at 51 days after sowing. The maximum duration will be about 70 days

Yields:

Average 100-125 Kgs per acre
Highest yield obtained 200 kgs per acre
Lowest yield obtained 95 kgs per acre.

Advantages:

1. To some extent weed growth is suppressed.
2. After picking the pods, Bisagi-moong plants can be incorporated in the soil.
3. It gives an additional revenue of about Rs. 150-250 from an acre in about 2 months.

EFFLUENT THAT EMITTED NO ODOUR ...!

Surprise at Sakthinagar for Hon. Minister

— "JERUJA" —

Surprises, two in number, but both pleasant in nature, awaited the Hon'ble Mr. Anbil Dharmalingam minister for agriculture in the Tamil Nadu Cabinet, when he made an unscheduled visit to the effluent disposal spot of our distillery, making a detour, while on his way to our Industrial complex at Sakthinagar on the evening of 22nd January. He was accompanied by our Commercial Director V. M. Kailasam, legislator A. M. Raja, M.A., M.L.A., President N. K. K. Periasamy of Bhavani Panchayat Union and our administrative officer K. P. Ganesan.

Utilitarian waste...

The minister was visibly astonished and he did not hesitate to express it frankly that unlike other places the effluent from Sakthi distillery gave out no odour! He was amazed to see that the waste water was utilised as an effective source of irrigation to reclaim arid wastelands, and grow crops in an area of bow 130 acres.

He could not help remarking that this happy state in Sakthinagar was in sharp contrast to the complaints in some other places that the effluents there not only produced unbearable stinking foul smell in the vicinity but was also destructive to crops.

At Sakthinagar, the effluent is carried by underground pipes to a distance of two miles, after high dilution with fesh water in the ratio of 1:10 and emptied into two deep brick and cement troughs, from where it is distributed through channels for irrigation. During the visit of the minister, the sugarcane planted in the reclaimed land irrigated by the effluent was a luxuriant standing crop of six months. This waste water has been found to be specially good for irrigating crops like cholam and chillies besides sugarcane.

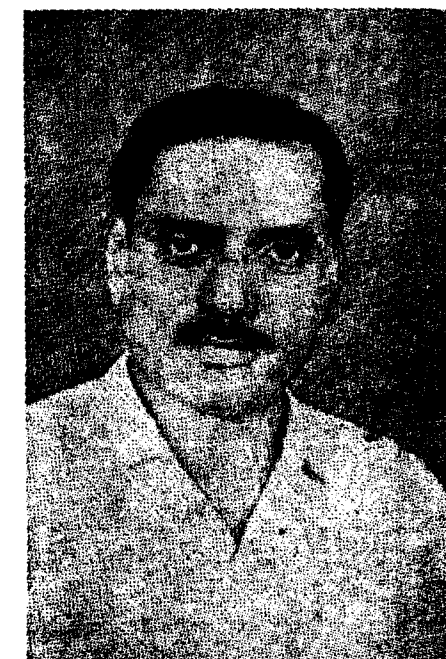
Cane-cess Road...

Prior to this, Hon. Mr. Anbil Dharmalingam declared open the new eight Kilo Metres long Road from Jambai to Ooratchikottai constructed at a cost of Rs. 3.5 lakhs, under Sugarcane development scheme with the help of cane-cess fund.

The function which took place at 3.30 p. m. on Monday the 22nd of January in Selambagoundenpalayam, was presided over by Legislator A. M. Raja, M. A., M. L. A. who represents the Bhavani constituency in the state assembly.

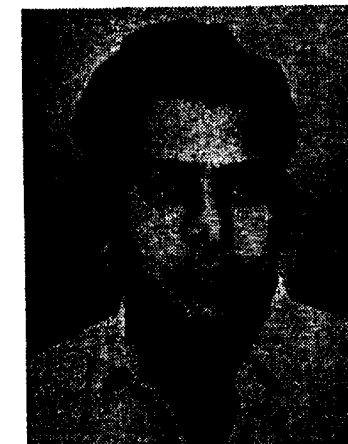

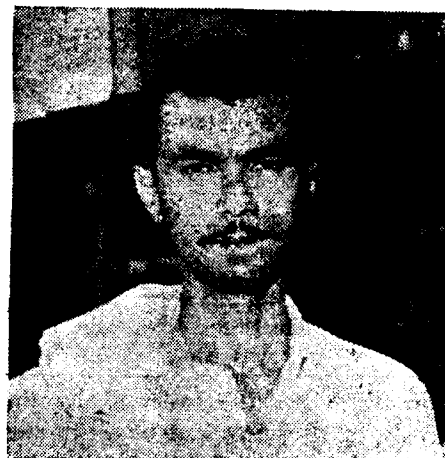

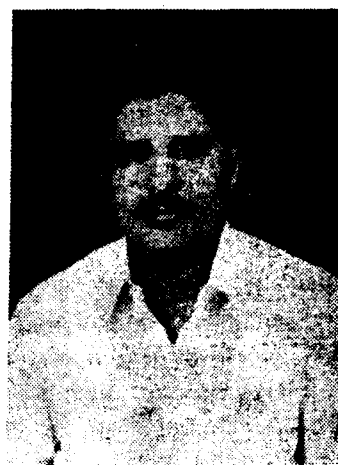

Indian Sugar Bowl**RELEASE OF SUGAR FOR FEBRUARY 1973**

The central government has ordered release of 2,75,000 tonnes of sugar from factories for February 1973, of which 1,85,000 tonnes will be for levy and 90,000 tonnes for free sale. This was announced by the Ministry of Agriculture in New Delhi.

NO CHANGE IN TARIFF VALUE

SUGAR OUT-PUT IN INDIA IMPRESSIVE

Sugar out-put in the first quarter of the current season has been quite impressive. The out-put during October-December, is understood to have exceeded substantially that of the corresponding quarter of the last season.

As against 8.69 lakh tonnes during the same quarter of the last season, the present out-put amounts to 11.75 tonnes. Consequent on larger production, the supply position has become more easy. But the release of sugar for internal consumption is not likely to be liberalised. The out-put of the season is expected to be more than the internal consumption, which has been drastically cut by smaller monthly releases.

Under an expansion blue print which is expected to be completed early next year before March 1974, Sakthi Sugars Ltd., contemplates a further increase in its crushing capacity to 4,000 tonnes of cane per day from the present 2500 tonnes. The details of this phase of expansion are being worked out and the Board of Directors are confident that it would be possible to implement this scheme with further accretions to internal reserves and borrowing from financial institutions.

This was revealed by Chairman N. Mahalingam in his speech delivered at the eleventh annual general meeting of the company held at Coimbatore on 22nd December 1972.

He was optimistic that the outlook of the concern for the 1972-73

season could be considered quite encouraging, as it would be in a position to handle larger quantities of cane and the distillery also would be in operation throughout the year. He indicated that the quantity of cane crushed might exceed 6.5 lakh tonnes in the accounting year and sugar production also might touch a new peak, in spite of the fact that excessive rains in early December and unfavourable weather conditions in the earlier months had affected the quality of the cane.

Prospects for the State

Regarding prospects for Tamil Nadu, Chairman Mahalingam said: "Tamil Nadu will be having the reputation for an excellent performance even in the current season as many units have plans for increasing the

quantity of cane crush substantially. On a rough estimate the quantity of cane handled may be in excess of the last year's crush by 10 percent.

“The higher cost of cane will necessarily be reflected in higher manufacturing costs. The Government has been quick enough to refix ex-factory prices for 1972-73 levy sugar on the basis of the previous Tariff commission's formula and the revised cane prices. But adequate note has not been taken of the possibility of a decline in the average recovery. The adjustments in this regard have to be carefully effected as an increase in working expenses will bear heavily on those units which fail to increase their output sizably.”

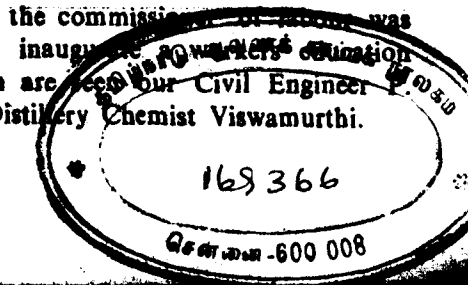

THE DECCAN SUGAR FACTORIES ASSOCIATION

At the 33rd annual general meeting of the Deccan Sugar Factories Association, Bombay, held on 26th December 1972, Mr. D. N. Popat and Mr. A. N. Ruia have been re-elected president and Vice-President respectively of the association, for the year 1972-73.

NO STEP-UP IN EXPORT OF SUGAR

The union government, it is understood, is not contemplating any step-up in the quantum of exports for 1973, beyond the preferential quotas to be eventually made available from the U. S. and the U. K. The country is likely to have a quota of about 70,000 tonnes from United States.

The union government, according to informed sources, will in effect continue for 1973, the previous year's export policy and pay exports to the level of about one lakh tonnes; though according to the terms of the international sugar agreement, India usually gets a yearly quota of 2.50 lakh tonnes. As required under the relevant provisions of the agreement, the government will declare a shortfall at the appropriate time.

Evidently, the union government prefers to toe a cautious line in respect of sugar export. The anticipated increase of three to four lakh tonnes in the current season's production will be more than off-set by the spurt in consumption. Therefore, it wants to restrict exports mainly to preferential quotas. However, within the frame work of the export policy for 1973, provisions involving small quantities against past commitments and emergent overseas requirements will be made.

Likewise shareholders M. H. Nachimuthu of Malayampalayam, N. Ramasamy Gounder of Ooratchikottai and Samiappa Gounder of Nerinjimangalam also eulogised the services of the Directors in general and Chairman N. Mahalingam in particular.

Commercial Director V. M. Kailasam and Chairman Mahalingam were garlanded on behalf of the shareholders, for the timely, and prompt help extended to those affected by the Bhavani floods.

Dividend

As recommended by the Directors the general body was pleased to declare a dividend of 9.3% (taxable) on Redeemable cumulative preference shares and 15% (Taxable) on equity shares for the year ending 30-6-1972, on the paid up share capital as at 30-6-72, to be paid from Dividend Reserve, subject in respect of equity capital, to the approval of Industrial Finance Corporation of India and the Tamil Nadu Industrial Investment Corporation Limited.

Bonus Shares

It was also decided to issue fully paid up Bonus shares in the proportion of 2 Bonus Shares for every 5 Equity shares held by a member in the 9,60,000 Equity shares of the company by capitalising the General Reserves of the Company accordingly, subject to the approval of the controller of capital issues and the Industrial Finance Corporation of India.

Donation to V. H. S.

It was decided to make a cash donation to the extent of Rs. 5 lakhs to the Voluntary Health Service, Madras, for enabling it to start a unit at the factory area for starting a hospital and dispensaries and to gift 6.34 acres of land for location of hospital, subject to certain provisions.

The meeting ended with proposal of a vote of thanks by General Manager P. V. Viswanathan. There was also a tea party.

Governor lays Foundation Stone for VHS Hospital

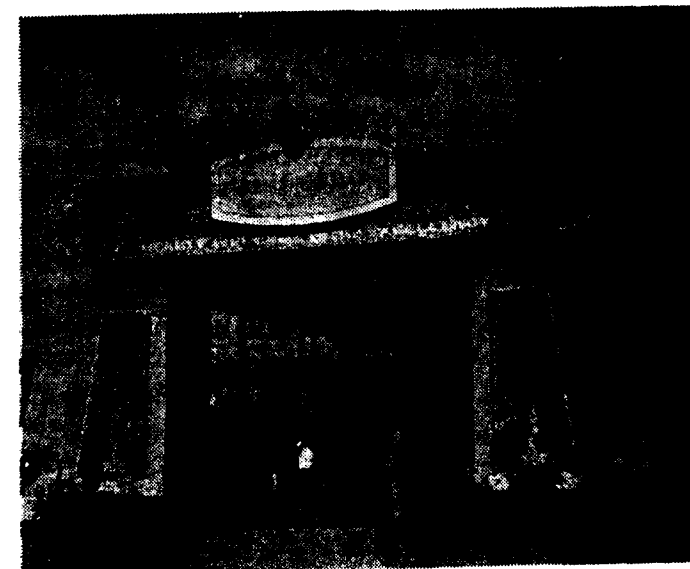

Increase anticipated in World Sugar Production

♦♦♦♦♦♦♦♦♦♦

Sugar statistician F. O. Licht has predicted a rise in World Sugar production of 4.6 million tons (ie: 46,00,000 tons) in 1972-73 to a total out-turn of 7,71,39,000 tons, in his first estimate for the season. In general, the Licht estimates are closely in line with those issued by the London merchants, C. Czarni-Kow. Over a period of years, sugar has shown a very regular rise around 4 percent a year, but not surprisingly this rate of growth has not been maintained during the present period of high prices.

In spite of this, consumption is still expected to exceed the higher production figure and cause a further small decline in stocks, before output gains sufficient impetus to move ahead again.

► Uganda cancel's Tender for Sugar ..

A tender for the supply of sugar to Uganda, which had been accepted by the State Trading Corporation at Kampala, was subsequently cancelled on president Amin's orders. The reason was that the successful tenderer was an Asian (-one Mr. Lakshani of Kenya) A statement issued by president Amin's government stated: "The government will not entertain tenders from Asians who have been milking the economy".

Uganda recently invited tenders for 40,000 tons of sugar worth over £ 3 millions.

► Greece decides to Import sugar...

Greece will import 45,000 tons of sugar to meet its domestic requirements, under a decision by its ministry of national economy. The import is to be effected not later than 30th April, 1973. Of the quota approved, 26, 150 tons must be imported from the E. E. C.

Sugar production in Greece last year amounted to only 1,30,000 tons as against 142,000 tons in 1971. Sugar consumption this year is estimated at 1,80,000 tons. Adverse weather conditions and switch over by beet growers to more profitable crops were the main reasons for the lower sugar output by Greece's three refineries last year.

► Russia pays double price for cuba sugar

According to Cuban premier Fidel Castro, Soviet Russia has agreed to pay almost double the price it currently pays for Cuba sugar. Cuba it is understood will be allowed a delay of 13 years to repay its debts in a series of far reaching long-term economic accords.

Premier Fidel Castro announced in a television radio address early this month that under the agreements signed during his visit to Moscow in the middle of December 1972, the Soviet Union would modernise Cuba's sugar and nickel industries which account for nearly 90 per cent of its exports.

Bishop Jeevanandam, Thangamuthu, the pupils and preceptors of Vellalar College for Women from Erode, the Ramakrishna Mission, the Y. M. C. A., and Coimbatore Unit of Red Cross rendered signal service in carrying out ameliorative measures distributing rice, household utensils like aluminium platters, tumblers and cooking vessels and new cloths.

It is a sad story of great pathos that a youthful student volunteer from Madras Christian College engaged in flood relief work at Bhavani found a watery grave in the torrents of the angry river.

Preventive measure

Planning commission member Dr. Natarajan undertook a short tour of the region to survey the possibility of constructing dams as a flood control measure.

When a similar flood occurred (though not of the present magnitude) about half a century ago in 1924, the then collector of the district Mr. Vernon, arranged building sites on higher levels in Bhavani town to avoid the submersion of residences during floods in the rivers and a grateful people named the place as Vernonpuram, but which today has come to be known as "Varnapuram"!

MIDNIGHT FLOODS and HAVOC in FACTORY REGION

oooooooooooooooooooooooooooo

Not less than 30 villages on the north and south banks of River Bhavani, and in the three taluks of Bhavani, Gobi, and Erode in Coimbatore district, were very seriously affected and submerged entirely by floods which took the people in the areas completely unawares, on the night of Friday the 8th December 1972 by about 11 P. M.

To aggravate the situation, consequent on torrential and continuous rains, the Thadapalli, Arakkankottai canals and big tanks at Appakudal, Odathurai and Anandasagar recorded a total of over 183 breaches.

Devastations

The resultant flood havoc, rendered over half a lakh of people homeless. Heavy damage was caused to roads, irrigation works, communications like telegraph and telephone lines and crops like paddy, sugarcane and turmeric. Breaches in the irrigation sources will

affect cultivation to the extent of over 1,500 acres.

Factory affected...

Cane growing areas serving Sakthi Sugars factory have been affected, and the pumps and motors used for taking water to the factory along with the pump house, were heavily damaged requiring immediate replacements at heavy cost. The crushing operations had to be suspended for about two weeks.

Hands to the succour

The spontaneous, effective and immediate action taken by the management of Sakthi Sugars, for rescuing the stranded folk, providing temporary shelter, and arranging supply of wholesome food packets to the people and milk to the children; with the staff working round the clock in dedicated service, came in for all round appreciation. It is at such times of human crisis that the nobler traits of humanity also manifest themselves!

His excellency the Governor K. K. Shah, Tamilnad Ministers hon'ble Mr. Sadique Pasha and hon'ble Mr. Kannappan, accompanied by the legislators and parliament member representing the constituencies, chairmen of panchayat unions and district collector J. Sivakumar visited the affected taluks on the 13th and 14th of December, for on the spot studies to effect prompt relief measures.

Later, Chief Minister hon'ble M. Karunanidhi and central Minister hon'ble C. Subramaniam also visited the affected regions at the end of the month.

Voluntary agencies

Close on the heels of relief measures undertaken by Sakthi Sugars, panchayat unions and the government, private agencies like Volunteer corps of college students from Madras, the church of South India unit led by

● Cane crushed during 1971-1972

During the financial year ended 30-6-1972, the total cane crushed in our Sakthinar factory was 5,26,102.730 tonnes and the sugar manufactured was 50,062.80 tonnes with recovery of 9.52% as against 4,34,861.53 tonnes of cane crushed and 40,158.52 tonnes of sugar obtained in respect of the previous year with the recovery at 9.23%.

The crushing operations continued for the period from 1-7-1971 to 11-8-1971 before the off-season. After completing the overhauling of machinery, crushing recommenced on 29-9-1971 and continued without break upto 2nd June 1972.

● First place in Ind: Record crush!... and after...

For the sugar season ending 30th September 1972 the factory has crushed the maximum in India for a single unit, namely 5.91 lakh tonnes of cane with a recovery of 9.42%.

It is a happy news that our sugar factory has increased its crushing capacity to 2500 tonnes of cane per day from July 1972. The letter of intent for increasing the crushing capacity to 4000 tonnes per day, has been received from the government of India, this month.

● Distillery

Our new Distillery which started production of Industrial Alcohol from 22nd June 1972, with a capacity of two million (twenty lakh) gallons per annum is working to its full capacity.

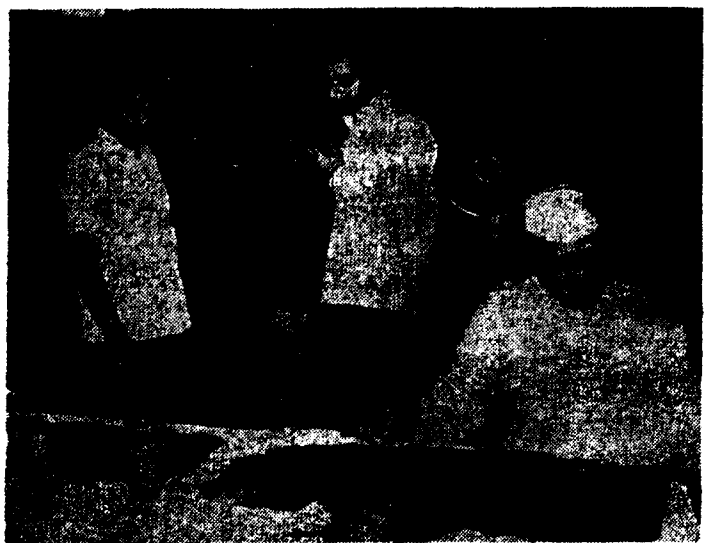

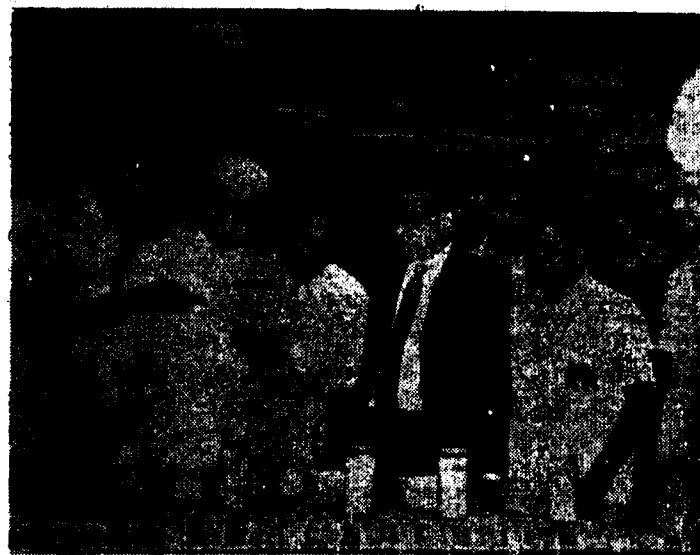

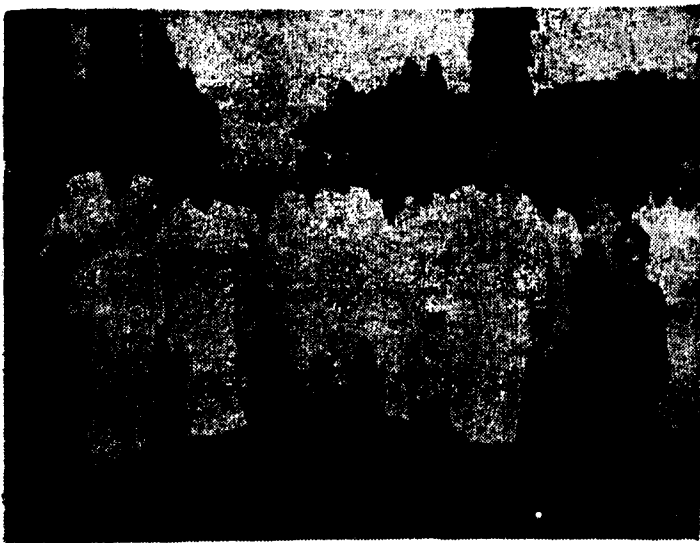

HOLIDAY TREK AND...

HOMAGE to a HERO at MIDNIGHT

◆◆◆◆◆

— "Tappal"

During the course of the 853 mile holiday trek by road in the South (referred to at page 6 above), our motorcade stopped at midnight in historic Kayattar — the place where the dauntless Veerapandia Kattabomman, the last of the brave poligars of Panchalamkurichi who refused to submit to the invading English East India Company, and was hanged on 16th October 1799 at the orders of Major John Bannerman after he was betrayed to the English Company's army by the then Thondaman of Pudukkottai (in Tiruchirapalli) and the poligar of Ettayapuram.

Against the skyline

Silhouetted against the starless sky on that dark night, stood the majestic statue of the hero, sword in hand, on a lofty pedestal alongside the highway. By the light of electric torches and flickering match-sticks we scanned the inscriptions on the pedestal before we paid our homage at the memorial to the fearless patriot, erected 170 long years after his death.

An interesting anecdote is the way that the memory of the freedom fighter of the 18th century was kept alive by grateful people in the face of dire threats and bans by the English rulers of the day. At the site of the execution on the side of the trunk road (where the old Kayattar fort stood once), about three quarters of a mile to the north of the village,

stands a great pile of stones of all sizes, which represents the accumulated offerings during the past 173 years, by wayfarers who tarry a while to silently honour the departed soul of the great man, before they continue their journey.

"Firm and Daring"

It is recorded by an English Gazetteer that to the last the poligar maintained an attitude of cool defiance.

Writing in his diary under the date 17-10-1799, Major John Bannerman noted — "The manner and behaviour of the Poligar, during the whole time of his being before those who were assembled yesterday at the examination which took place was undaunted and supercilious. He frequently eyed the Ettayapuram Poligar who had been so active to secure his person and the poligar of Sivagiri with an appearance of indignant scorn; and when he went out to be executed he walked with a firm and daring air, and cast looks of sullen contempt on the poligars (chieftains) to his right and left as he passed. On reaching the foot of the tree in which he was hanged, he regretted that he left his fort in the defence of which it would have been better for him to have died".

A fortress ploughed...

But such was the terror that the name of the Kattabomman and their stronghold Panchalamkurichi instilled in the hearts of enemies, and the loyalty and confidence inspired in the hearts of sympathisers, friends and followers that when the little fortress was finally captured from Veerapandia's younger brothers Sivathiah Kattabomman and Umai-Thurai, in March 1801, it was razed to the ground. According to an English Writer of the time — "...the fort was razed to the ground, the site was

ploughed over and sown with Castor seed and the name of the place was expunged from all the registers of the district."

All these past events of history passed before our minds as we gazed with admiration on the statue of the mighty warrior, a reminder to the saga of nearly a century of unflinching fight by the dynasty of Kattabomman of Panchalamkurichi against invading hordes, first of the nawabs of the Carnatic and later of the English East India Company.

A HERBICIDE TO YOUR HELP

"ATROZINE" for Weed Control in Fodder Cholam

Fodder cholam is sown thick using a higher seed rate and without any regular spacing. So, hand weeding operation is considered time-consuming and costly. To economise on the cost of weeding, the use of a herbicide may help.

To test the efficacy and economics of the use of "Atrozine" to control weeds in fodder cholam, an observation trial was laid out in F. No. 72 of the Central Farm of the Agricultural College and Research Institute, Coimbatore-3. The details and the results are given below:

The crop was shown on 2-10-71. 1540 sq. metres (consisting) of 110 smaller plots of 14 sq. metres) of

area was allotted to each of the following four treatments.

1. Control (no hand weeding or herbicide).
2. Hand weeding once.
3. Hand weeding twice.
4. Atrozine @ 400 gms. ai. per ha.

The herbicide was sprayed on 8-10-72. Hand weeding was done on 6-11-71 for Treatment 2 and on 6-11-71 and 26-12-71 for Treatment 3. The costs of the different treatments are given in Table-1. Other cultivation expenditures are common for all the treatments).

It could be seen from Table-1 that the cost of herbicide application

was much less compared to the hand weeding operations. Besides there was good control of weeds in the herbicide treated plots.

Yield of fodder under the different treatments is given in Table-II. Herbicide applied plot has given the highest yield over all the other treatments.

From the results of this trial it may be concluded that for effective and economic weed control, in fodder cholam, Atrozine can be recommended.

Tamil Nadu is now growing a few varieties only; among them the Dwarf Cavendish (Pachavazhai, Morris Mauritius, Kulla Vazhai) is now in demand for export. This variety has a close relation in Robusta which has of late, become popular in the banana growing regions of India.

The varietal trials at the Tamil Nadu Agricultural University have brought out to the front another interesting variety introduced from Bihar called 'Wather'. This is closely related to Cavendish banana. The first crop gave an average yield of 112 fruits, weighing 33 kg. Length of each fruit is about one foot with an average of 16 fruits per bunch. This outstanding quality of the fruit is on par with the world famous variety-Gros Michel. It comes to bearing in 10 months from planting.

Another advantage of this variety is that the disposition of the fingers are very uniform without the so-called 'Octopus' hand with played-out fingers which is a bad character in the variety of Dwarf Cavendish.

If this variety maintains its performance it will prove a good substitute for Cavendish or Robusta for the Banana growers.

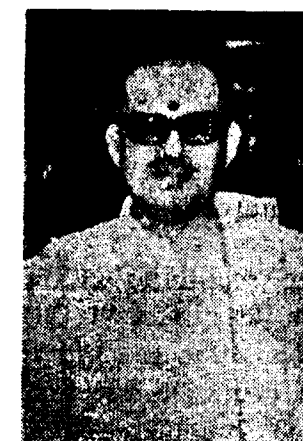

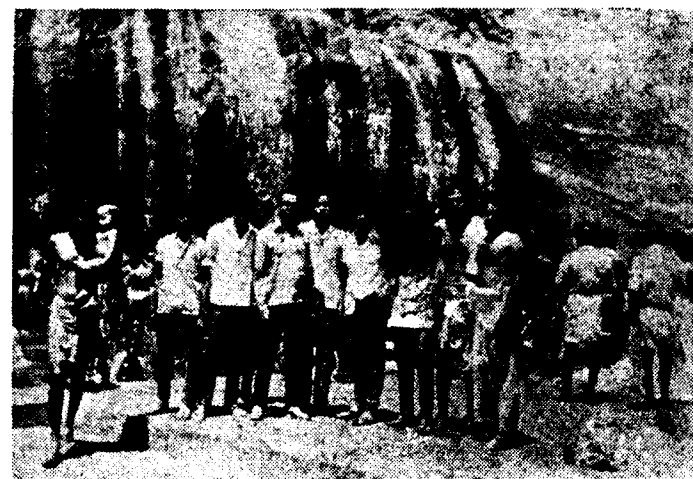
