The train arrived at Salem Railway station at 6-30 A.M. on the next day. The arrival at the station was private. On alighting from the train, His Excellency was received by Mr. J. P. was public. On his way His Excellency halted for a few minutes in a pandal at Chitrachavadi put up by the Shevapet merchants where he was garlanded by M.R.Ry. Jamnadas Sait on behalf of the merchants of the town. On arrival at the Town Hall, which had been prettily decorated for the occasion, His Excellency was received by Mr. Bedford, Mr. N. E. Q. Mainwaring, Deputy Inspector-General of Police, the Hon'ble Mr. C. Vijayaraghava Achariyar and the Hon'ble Mr. B. V. Narasimha Ayyar and conducted to his seat on the dais. Mr. Bedford then introduced to him M.R.Ry. E. S. Ramaswami Ayyar Avargal, Chairman, Salem Municipal Council, who, after garlanding him, read the following address on behalf of the Municipal Council:—

Municipal

“We, the members of the Salem Municipal Council, respectfully beg to offer to Your Excellency a cordial welcome to our town and our humble thanks for this visit.

“2. It is our pleasing duty to express our indebtedness to Government for the favours received by us in the immediate past, such as the introduction of water-supply, the acquisition of land for town extension, the undertaking to provide the town with new hospital buildings, a veterinary hospital and the sanction accorded to the railway connecting Salem with Suramangalam being constructed on the broad gauge. The Council understands that it is proposed to postpone the railway through Salem to Suramangalam until two other Branch railways are completed. In view of the fact that this railway has been

“long deferred, the Council begs that orders may issue to take up this work on hand in the first instance. Oct. 22,

“3. The advantages of the water-supply have already begun to be realized in the total disappearance of cholera and in the improvement of the general health of the town. However, they can be only realized to the full when the drainage scheme for the town, which has already been investigated, receives Your Excellency's sanction. But to our misfortune, apparently through the want of proper care in their selection and purchase in England, the main steel pipes have not proved entirely satisfactory and may have to be renewed before long, and the municipality cannot but look to Your Excellency's Government for the necessary grant to meet this unexpected cost. Though taxes are levied at the maximum rates, the income of this municipality is lower than that of other municipal towns with the same population by reason of the general poverty of its inhabitants, the majority of whom are petty traders and weavers. We are, therefore, obliged to approach Your Excellency with our pressing wants whenever they are beyond our means.

“4. Thanks to the liberality of the Government of India, the Council has been enabled to improve the condition of the elementary schools under its management and to provide them with suitable school-houses. But in respect of secondary and collegiate education, the Council yet needs substantial help from Your Excellency in the matter of providing the college with suitable buildings and its teaching staff with a

"scale of salaries in keeping with those obtaining in similar institutions.

"5. This institution has to adjust itself to the new conditions of University reform. The college is located in a building originally intended for a high school and constructed more than fifty years ago, and want of space prevents the extension thereof. Moreover, the building is low and unsuited to modern requirements. The Council has, therefore, after careful consideration, decided to give up the present building and erect a new building elsewhere, and a detailed report has been submitted to Government with plans and estimates for the necessary sanction.

"6. The Council requests that, owing to bad state of its finances, the Government may be pleased to make a grant of the entire cost of the new building.

"7. We cannot close this address without making a reference to the hardship caused to the public by the handing over by the Forest Department of the fuel depots in their charge to private contractors in consequence of which the price of fuel in this town has nearly doubled, and we humbly request Your Excellency to pass such orders as may be necessary in a matter like this affecting the interests of the poor.

"8. We express again our gratitude and pleasure at seeing Your Excellency in our midst.

"9. We shall ever pray that the Giver of all good may grant you health and strength for the right discharge of the arduous duties of your exalted office."

After reading the address, the Chairman presented to His Excellency the remaining members of the Municipal Council.

The Collector next introduced to His Excellency Mr. J. R. Coombes, Treasury Deputy Collector and Vice-President of the Salem District Board, who read the following address on behalf of the District Board:—

"We, the members of the District Board of Salem, respectfully beg to convey to Your Excellency the expression of our pleasure at your first visit to this district, and to offer you, in the name of the inhabitants, a most loyal and cordial welcome.

"2. Our pleasure is enhanced by the fact that this is the first occasion on which this District Board has welcomed the head of the Administration.

"3. The geographical position of the Salem district, remote from seaports and from large educational centres of the Presidency, has reflected its disadvantages on the material and social life of the people, but, thanks to the vigorous and beneficent railway policy of the Madras Government, the opening up of the country by district railway lines is tending to minimise our difficulties.

"4. We take this opportunity of thanking Your Excellency's Government for the many favours recently bestowed in this direction. We are deeply grateful for the support we have received in the matter of the extension of the railway line from Suramangalam to Salem. It was our cherished wish to have the broad gauge line to this town, and we greatly appreciate the decision of Your Excellency's Government in our favour. The extensions to Dharmapuri and Krishnagiri have connected these important centres of trade with Salem and other towns. The very recent

" completion of the line from Dharmapuri to Hosur has
" made this rich and salubrious plateau conveniently
" accessible to the rest of the district. With the
" extension of this line to Bangalore and its conver-
" sion into the metre or broad gauge and with the
" proposed extension of the railway line to Attur (which
" is 32 miles from head-quarters, entailing a long and
" wearisome journey) and the linking of line with South
" Arcot, the immediate railway needs of this district
" would be supplied. We look forward to the time
" when easy and speedy communication with the south-
" eastern ports through the adjacent districts will help
" to develop the mineral, agricultural and industrial
" resources of this district and add to the wealth,
" prosperity and contentment of the people. We,
" therefore, acknowledge our indebtedness to Your
" Excellency's Government for material assistance in
" furtherance of these ideals.

" 5. In the matter of sanitation, we are thankful
" for the repeated and timely grants received from Gov-
" ernment. The prevalence of plague has necessitated
" the opening of congested areas, the building of model
" houses in plague infected localities and the employ-
" ment of a Special Sanitary Agency. These unusual
" expenses have been liberally met by Government from
" time to time. The last personal favour is indicative
" of the liberal policy now followed. It is a source of
" legitimate pride to us that our little hill station of
" Yercaud, which Your Excellency has signified your
" intention of visiting tomorrow, should be a centre of
" attraction to many distinguished English and Conti-
" nental visitors, and the very recent grant for the

" acquisition of 95 acres of forest land solely in the
" interest of the sanitation of this hill station has given
" general satisfaction. The construction of the new
" ghat road for wheel traffic with its many feeder roads
" has brought the station in easy communication with
" the plains and has largely benefited the planting
" community.

" 6. We have also had our fair share of financial
" support under medical institutions. Dispensaries at
" Mattur and Dharmapuri have been recently built and
" the Local Fund Hospital at Yercaud reconstructed
" and extended. Sanction has been accorded for the
" construction of a veterinary hospital at Salem. Appli-
" cations for the completion of schemes of sanitary
" improvement of a permanent nature have met with
" a favourable response, and the town extensions at
" Hosūr, Dharmapuri and Denkanikota are fast
" approaching completion. Substantial wells for the
" supply of pure water have been constructed or are in
" course of construction at Hosūr, Harūr, Tiruchen-
" godu, Mettuganapalli and Tirtamalai.

" 7. We are grateful for the liberal policy of
" Government in the matter of education. Provincial
" contributions for the extension of elementary educa-
" tion are being largely increased; new elementary
" school-houses have been and are being built in villages
" where the population exceeds 500; school build-
" ings have been enlarged and equipped with better
" furniture, and the staff strengthened. These improve-
" ments, no doubt, merely touch the fringe of a great
" want: much still remains to be done. Finally, we
" heartily thank Government for the annual recurring

"8. Our wants, we fear, are many. Firstly, in spite of the continued and systematic efforts of local boards to supply pure drinking-water, the water-supply of the district, as a whole, is far from being satisfactory, and the want is especially felt by the Pan-chamas and poorer classes. Excluding the portions watered by the Cauvery and the Pennar, the greater part of the district depends entirely on wells, both for irrigation and domestic purposes, but, in consequence of the nature of the soil and the want of scientific methods in sinking wells, the majority of them dry up in times of drought. The Divisional Officer, Hosūr, has asked that a bore hole may be made for the new Denkanikota extension with a view to finding a good water-supply, and the Sanitary Engineer to Government has been addressed on the subject. This is a typical instance of the wants of the whole district. We respectfully solicit, for consideration, the establishment of an expert Scientific Agency which will indicate the places where successful borings may be made and the kind of wells to be constructed. There are places in which artesian and tube wells are the only means of possessing an unfailing supply of wholesome water for the health and comfort of the ryot. Secondly, a few bridges over rivers and large streams on main roads remain to be built. Thirdly, malaria, which is still a scourge in several parts of the district, notably in the forest belts at the foot of the hills, and the ravages of plague at intervals necessitate the strengthening and improvement of the

"9. We are extremely thankful to Your Excellency for your kindness in finding time, in the midst of important matters of State, to come into our midst and obtain a more intimate and personal acquaintance with our needs, and we pray that Your Excellency may be granted health and strength to carry on the arduous duties of your exalted office. District Board's Address.

After the address had been read, the Vice-President presented to His Excellency the other members of the District Board.

The Collector next introduced Mr. E. S. B. Stevenson, C.I.E. (retired Deputy Inspector-General of Police), President of the Reception Committee, who read the following address on behalf of the Reception Committee:—

"On behalf of the people of the town and district of Salem we beg to offer Your Excellency a cordial welcome and our humble thanks for this visit to our district. Reception Committee's Address.

"2. We beg leave to apprise Your Excellency of certain natural defects from which our district suffers as several of our needs arise from them. Even in normal years we get no more than the fringe of both the monsoons, and as a matter of fact one or the other of the monsoons entirely fails us, and not seldom, both of them. Other districts similarly situated have the compensating advantage of large rivers of unfailing irrigation canals, neither of which have been among our blessings. Hence the uncertainty of Rain/fall.

rainfall renders our sources of irrigation, which generally consists of rainfed tanks, mostly precarious.

"3. We have, therefore, heard with great satisfaction of a project for the diversion of the Toppur river into the Omalur taluk, bringing the blessings of an unfailing source of irrigation to a large portion of that dry area. We would respectfully urge that this project, in common with all other similar irrigation schemes, may receive the primary attention of Government.

Railways.

"4. Railway facilities are almost of equal importance to our district. We are, therefore, deeply grateful for the extension of the line from Dharmapuri to Hosūr which we hope will be ultimately extended to Bangalore. But we very urgently need railway connection with the rice-producing valley of the Cauvery and a direct outlet to the sea at one of the southern ports. With regard to the former, we are very much gratified to hear that the Imperial Government is proposing a railway from the Dharmapuri line to Karūr via Salem town and the fertile taluk of Namakkal. We would respectfully pray that the influence of Your Excellency's Government may be used towards hastening the realization of this great boon.

"5. As regards the outlet to the sea, our District Board has long had in view the construction of a line from Suramangalam (the present Salem Railway station) via Attur taluk to the confines of our district whence the South Arcot District Board would carry the road on to the neighbourhood of Cuddalore or Negapatam. The recent development of groundnut cultivation, the market for which is in the south, has

"rendered this line an urgent necessity. As the only possible set off against the precariousness of our rainfall, thanks to the generosity of the Government in working the Agricultural and Land Improvements Loans Acts, our farmers have dug and are digging a large number of small wells. The cultivation of cereals by means of well irrigation is prohibitive in cost and therefore of necessity cereals are giving place to economic rain products such as groundnut, Cambodia cotton, sugarcane and tobacco. This gradual change of staple cultivation is likely to continue steadily. And therefore our district needs facilities on the one hand for importing cereals and on the other for exporting raw materials.

"6. We are thankful to hear that the Government have approved of the construction of the first section of the line between Suramangalam and Salem on the broad gauge, as it will further enable the tax-payers of this district to earn a portion of the freight earned by the extensive goods traffic of this town; but the actual sanction for the construction of the whole line is still awaited. We, therefore, pray that orders may be issued for the completion of this line at an early date and that the District Board may be authorized, if necessary, to raise loans for the purpose.

"7. In this connection we venture to suggest the desirability of transferring back to this district the taluk of Namakkal as, owing to its Cauvery irrigation and its natural richness, it was largely contributing to our railway fund and its withdrawal from this district simultaneously with that of

"Tiruppattūr, another rich taluk, has crippled the resources of our District Board in this behalf. We feel convinced that this measure will be quite welcome to the inhabitants of Nāmakkal as they are dissatisfied with their transfer to the Trichinopoly district for various reasons.

"8. The natural defects from which we suffer constitute an opportunity to the money-lender. Small holdings are steadily giving place to large estates, and peasant proprietors are reduced in increasing numbers to the status of farm hands, much to the detriment of agriculture. Our district was therefore one of the first to respond to the generous move of the Government in the matter of co-operative credit societies. A large number of our villages now have their rural banks and a much larger number is eager to have them. We pray that there may be a great augmentation of the facilities for the spread of this movement both in banking business and in promoting combination for various useful economic and agrarian purposes. The benefits of the extension of this measure to the menials in the service of the local municipality are already being realized in hundreds of families of the scavengers and sweepers of this town being saved from starvation. A liberal expansion of the movement will greatly help not only our farmers but also our weavers who are no small section of our population. Our weavers yield to none in the matter of skill. But neither the advantage of skill nor favourable seasons in the market help the actual weaver. The only solution to the chronic

"poverty and misery of our weavers seems to be the adaptation of the co-operative principle in such a way that the profits of the trade may be available, at least in part, to the skilled labourer. We, therefore, beg to urge on Your Excellency the necessity for the appointment of more inspectors for this district as we understand that hundreds of applications from the villagers of this district for the opening of rural banks are lying unanswered with the co-operative staff owing to want of time.

"9. We cannot help craving Your Excellency's attention to what we may characterise as a 'fuel famine' now prevalent in this town. When the fuel depôts of this town were managed by the Forest Department, the cry was naturally raised that the Government was unduly competing with private dealers in selling fuel. Since then these depôts were made over by the Forest Department to private contractors without laying down any restrictions as to the price at which they should sell fuel or confining their trade to this town. The result has been that the fuel trade of this town has now developed into a sort of monopoly in the hands of these contractors, and the price of fuel has within these three years more than doubled. It would appear that the contractors utilize the fuel sent to their depôts for supplying railway companies or for selling it outside the district. This works a great hardship to all and especially to the poor. We, therefore, pray for the necessary orders being passed to secure to the public a thorough reduction in the price of this necessary commodity of every

"household; and we suggest that the old system of
"issuing permits for head-loads to the poorer classes
"may, with advantage, be revived as it will also enable
"them to earn a living.

"10. We next beg leave to place before Your
"Excellency a matter of grave and increasing anxiety
"to the State as well as to the general public, viz., the
"annual emigration of coolies to Ceylon and other
"colonies. We hear that the most exaggerated visions
"of the prospects of serving in the colonies are
"held up to the unwary farmers by the professional
"canvassers employed by the Emigration Agents, and
"in consequence many of the villagers are caught
"owing to their youth and want of experience. It
"need not be added that the indiscretion and error of
"the step is discovered by these unfortunate youths
"only when it is too late and that in a foreign land and
"when they are without the means to go back to their
"country and heavily burdened with the terms of their
"bonds imposing almost slavery on their imprudent
"selves for the stipulated period of their service. The
"number of coolies that were despatched to Ceylon
"from the Salem Emigration depôt during the past
"calendar year is reported to be 2,100. This heavy
"draft of coolies year after year has been telling rather
"severely on the public. Wages have considerably
"risen of late, and the complaint of want of workmen
"is already beginning to be heard everywhere. The
"roads of our district once noted for their excellent
"condition have been for some time past in a miser-
"able state, and the reason often alleged is the difficulty
"in getting labourers to gather the requisite road

"materials. We, therefore, pray that Your Excellency's
"Government may take this matter into your serious
"consideration and devise proper measures for the
"arrest of this annual draft of the able-bodied work-
"men of this district and the blighting of their lives.

"11. The congestion of the second and third
"class passenger traffic on the Mangalore mail is a
"matter to which we have to make some reference
"as it has become intolerable of late. The serious
"inconvenience caused to the travelling public by the
"overcrowding in the second and third class compart-
"ments can only be remedied by Government insisting
"on the Company running another through train
"between Mangalore and Madras with the same speed
"as that of the mail train.

"12. We beg leave to mention the necessity for
"providing the chief stations in the taluks of Attur,
"Omalar and Uttangarai as well as the growing town of
"Rasipur with telegraphic communication. The value
"of this species of communication has been so largely
"appreciated of late by the public that its absence is
"felt as a real want in centres of trade and of growing
"importance such as the chief stations in every
"revenue taluk.

"13. The distance of the District Court-house
"from the town has been long felt a great hardship
"by the people of this town as well as by the
"litigants from outside. The latter have to find
"their meals in a new place and hurry to the court
"before the usual hour of business, and the distance
"of the court from the town naturally adds to their
"trouble. Either the premises of the former residence

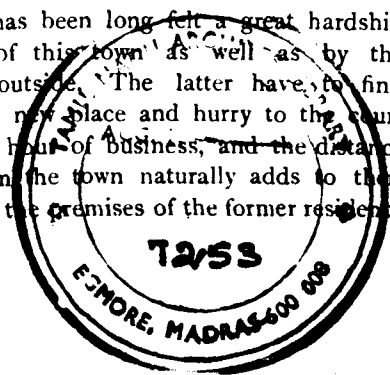

 "recent policy in regard to the extension of elementary
 "education to the rural tracts of the country. We
 "would only point out the necessity for fixing the
 "starting salary of the teachers of the elementary
 "schools at Rs. 15 *per mensem* in order to make
 "it sufficiently attractive to the really efficient and
 "hardworking men.

Non-official Presidents for Taluk Boards. "15. We beg to express our indebtedness to
 "Government for the privilege recently conferred
 "on some Taluk Boards of electing or having non-
 "official Presidents. We beg to point out to Your
 "Excellency the desirability of conferring a similar
 "privilege on the Taluk Board of Salem.

"16. It affords us a great pleasure that Your
 "Excellency's visit to us is in a very auspicious
 "period. Recently we celebrated the Birthday of
 "our King-Emperor and of our Governor-General.
 "The name of His Imperial Majesty will ever be
 "associated in our minds with the enunciation of
 "the principle of sympathy as the corner stone of
 "administration. The name of Lord Hardinge will
 "never be forgotten in India as the Viceroy who

"set in motion the great blessings that were inaugu-
 "rated at the memorable and epoch-making Delhi
 "Darbar of 1911. Your Excellency's name had long
 "preceded your arrival here in connection with the
 "yeoman services rendered in the cause of popular
 "education in Scotland. We feel that we could not
 "have a more fortunate combination of Rulers,
 "and we pray that Heaven's richest blessings and
 "guidance may rest with Your Excellency so that
 "your rule over us may promote the permanent
 "prosperity and well-being of the people of this
 "Presidency."

His Excellency then made a joint reply to
 the three addresses as follows:—

"GENTLEMEN,—I must thank you first of all for
 "the kind welcome you have accorded me, and must ask
 "you to accept my expression of regret for any incon-
 "venience caused by the altered date of my visit.

"I was greatly disappointed at not being able to
 "come to Salem when I had intended, but now that I
 "am here I hope to enjoy not the less my stay among
 "you, and to be able to learn both from you and from
 "my own observations something of the conditions of
 "your district and city.

"All the addresses which have been presented to
 "me have dealt with the subject of railways. The
 "Madras Government recognize fully the importance of
 "the subject, which they have closely at heart, and are
 "making every endeavour to bring the lengthy discus-
 "sion as to ways and means to a satisfactory and speedy
 "conclusion. Recently I am glad to say a final settle-
 "ment has been reached on one important question,

"with the result that District Board will now be able to
"borrow capital needed for railways in the open market
"on reasonable terms, so that I hope the construction
"of the Salem-Attur line will soon be taken up.

"As to the extension of the Dharmapuri-Hosur
"line to Bangalore, and its conversion to the metre
"gauge, the former question is, on the representation
"of the Mysore Government, now under the considera-
"tion of the Railway Board, while, as to the latter, though
"I do not know that it has been raised before, I think
"that, if the District Board later finds itself in a position
"to extend the line to Karur in the other direction, the
"question of changing the gauge to metre gauge would
"be well worth examination.

"The only other matter connected with railways
"which remains is the congestion of the second
"and third class passenger traffic on the Mangalore
"mail. There was, I understand from the Agent, a
"certain amount of over-crowding at the time of the
"strike which it was beyond the power of the Company
"to prevent, this, it is hoped, was only a temporary
"matter but in any case the question is being carefully
"considered by the authorities concerned, who, if the
"amount of the traffic warrants it, will be glad to
"increase the service of trains.

"defects found in your water-supply plant will prove to
"be successful, meanwhile the investigation of a
"general drainage scheme for the town is to be com-
"pleted during the current year and the possibility of
"its being financed and executed next year will be

"Technical advice as to the best locality and
"method for sinking wells is the proper function of the
"Sanitary Engineer and his department, who will
"always be ready to give any assistance required in
"the matter. A separate scientific agency for this
"purpose does not at present appear to me to be
"required: but I agree heartily as to the importance
"to the ryot and indeed to everybody of a pure and
"adequate supply of water.

"Both last year and this an allotment of several
"lakhs has been entered in our budget for distribution
"to districts to aid them in the construction of bridges
"for which their own resources are insufficient. If the
"Salem District Board will make an application for a
"share of this allotment, I can assure them that their
"request will receive full consideration.

"The scheme for a large reservoir on the Toppur
"river was considered in 1905, and it was then found
"impracticable at a reasonable cost and was abandoned.
"Since then suggestions have been made for smaller
"schemes to irrigate comparatively small areas in the
"river valley but it is doubtful if they could be built
"remuneratively unless the present water rate is raised,
"and in any case as the Toppur river discharges into
"the waterspread of the proposed Cauvery Reservoir,
"I am afraid that the question must lie over until the
"larger one of the big reservoir is settled.

 " an understanding has been arrived at with fuel sellers
 " not to raise the price of best fuel above Rs. 9-6-0 a ton.
 " Namakkal taluk was taken away from the Salem
 " district, together with the Tiruppattur taluk, in order
 " to afford relief to the Collector whose work had be-
 " come too heavy. Representations against the change
 " have twice before been considered by the Government
 " and on both occasions no sufficient reason was found
 " to reverse the decision. The grounds for the repre-
 " sentation on the first occasion were the existence of long-
 " standing business ties with Salem, the peculiarity of
 " land sub-tenures which the Trichinopoly Courts might
 " not appreciate, and the difficulty and inconvenience
 " of the journey to Trichinopoly. The principal argu-
 " ment now advanced is that the resources of the Salem
 " District Board have been crippled by the removal of
 " the taluk. In 1910-11 Namakkal taluk subscribed
 " some Rs. 8,400 to the Railway Cess of this district out
 " of a total collection of about Rs. 55,000. The loss
 " to the District Board is no doubt considerable, but
 " can hardly I think be said to have crippled the
 " Board's resources, and as an argument against the
 " transfer of the taluk cannot, I fear, be allowed to
 " weigh against the administrative reasons which after
 " full consideration led the Government to order the
 " transfer.

 ment. " I have heard with pleasure of the success of
 " Co-operative movement in your district and I sympa-
 " thise warmly with your desire to extend it, and in
 " particular to extend it to the skilled labourers of the
 " weaving community.

" I would, however, ask you to appreciate the
 " fact that co-operation, if it is to be of any use, must
 " come from within and not from without; the pace of
 " its advance, if that advance is to be real, must depend
 " upon whether those concerned truly grasp the princi-
 " ples which are the life of the movement: and it is
 " for the weavers of Salem to join together to improve
 " their commercial position, and for the Registrar when
 " he is satisfied of the earnestness of their intention to
 " register and foster the co-operative society formed by
 " them. So far there is only one registered weavers'
 " co-operative society working and the success of this,
 " though it is improving, is not quite all that could
 " be desired; I am indeed informed that more willing
 " and actual co-operation on the part of the weavers
 " themselves is the chief factor wanting to make
 " it completely successful. The last impediment
 " which I have to mention to the development of co-
 " operation in Salem district is that the District Urban
 " Bank has not received from the public that measure
 " of support which is necessary to enable it to finance
 " more new societies. If the public of the district is
 " earnest in its desire for co-operation it will as its first
 " step, I hope, lend more substantial support to the
 " Bank.

" Another point to which reference has been made
 " is the shortage of labour, rise in wages, and the
 " increasing emigration of coolies to Ceylon and other
 " places. This latter is attributed in part to the exag-
 " gerated accounts of their prospects abroad held up to
 " coolies in the south of India whom it is desired to
 " persuade to emigrate. I am prepared to believe that

"these prospects are sometimes exaggerated. On the other hand, it must be remembered that coolies have been emigrating to Ceylon for many years now, and that the conditions of service there are by this time without doubt well known to the South Indian labourer, who is as quick as most other people to see any material advantage or disadvantage to himself. The truth which has to be faced is that coolies can earn considerably higher wages abroad, and that this fact reconciles an increasing number of them to leave their homes each year and seek to improve their fortunes."

Education.

"Under the head of education you have, as is natural, certain remarks to offer and requests to make. The Madras Government have in the past done all in their power to promote the interests of education and have given assistance alike to local boards and to private institutions to the full extent which the funds at their disposal permitted. This I can assure you will continue to be their attitude, and I am glad to be able to inform you of the Government's sanction of the proposal to rebuild the college, and of their willingness to provide Rs. 80,000 for the purpose."

"As regards the pay of teachers you may remember that the Educational Conference at Allahabad two years ago expressed it as their opinion that no trained teacher should receive less than Rs. 12 a month. With this end in view the Government sanctioned the raising of the minimum pay of trained and approved teachers in Board schools for last year and this to Rs. 10 and this arrangement has since been made permanent. With capitation allowances and appropriation of fees this will

"raise the average emoluments of these teachers to not less than Rs. 12. The funds available do not allow us to go any further for the present."

"Like other districts you have suffered from attacks of disease, but it is a source of great gratification to me to learn that since the introduction of the new water-supply cholera has completely disappeared and the general health of the town improved. I am glad to hear also of what has been done in the district by extending town-sites and in other ways to improve sanitary conditions and note with especial pleasure the very favourable comparison between this year's plague figures and those of last year."

"With the remaining points raised in the addresses you have delivered to me I must deal briefly if I am not to detain you too long. I appreciate the willingness of the non-officials of the town and its neighbourhood, as shown by the request for a non-official President of the Salem Taluk Board, to accept a greater responsibility for the conduct of local affairs. At present the system of non-official presidents is still under trial, but if it proves a success, and if it is shown that suitable men are available who have not only the capacity but also the leisure required for the position of President of the Salem Taluk Board, the Government will be very willing to consider the question of the appointment or election of such a President."

"The only point that remains is the location of the District Court. As far as I understand it the difficulty about accepting the proposals put forward is that of the two sites suggested for the District Court one is required for the Police station which already occupies it while the other has been expressly acquired for a new hospital, but I shall be better able to form an opinion about this at the end of my visit than I am now.

"Gentlemen,--I repeat my cordial thanks for the loyalty and warmth of your welcome, and I should like also to add my hearty appreciation of the taste and workmanship of the caskets in which you have enclosed your addresses. I shall be proud to retain them and shall value them always as a memento of this my first visit to Salem."

His Excellency also unveiled the oil-painting of Sir Thomas Munro which was presented to the town of Salem by M.R.Ry. T. Narasinga Rao Avargal.

Mr. Narasinga Rao's grandfather, M.R.Ry. T. Appu Rao, served under Sir Thomas Munro and retired as Huzur Sarishtadar of Coimbatore about 1844 on a pension of Rs. 4,500 a year for himself and the next two lives. M.R.Ry. Narasinga Rao is now in receipt of a pension of Rs. 62-8-0 a month. The portrait is believed to have been presented to the grand father of Mr. Narasinga Rao by a former Collector of Salem as a

remembrance of one to whom he was so much attached during his public service.

Sir Thomas Munro was, in the year 1788, on general staff of the army and associated, in the Intelligence Department, with Captain Alexander Read, who during the first war with Tippu superintended the convoys and communications in the Baramahal which comprised the taluk of Krishnagiri, Dharmapuri and Uttangarai of this district besides the Tiruppattur taluk and the Kangundi zamindari in the North Arcot district. He then served with the army under Colonel Maxwell, which invaded the Baramahal in 1790. He subsequently shared in the pursuit of Tippu by Lieut.-General Medows through the Toppur pass on the 18th of November of that year and in most of the operations under Lord Cornwallis including the siege and capture of Bangalore.

By the treaty of Serangapatam in 1792, the greater part of the district including the Baramahal fell to the share of the Honourable the East India Company. The period was a critical one. The people had never till then had any intercourse with Europeans. The Baramahal was the route by which the Mysore armies made their descents into the plains of the Carnatic and was the scene of the operations of contending armies. The people were therefore suffering from the effects of war recently waged amongst them. It was felt that the Baramahal required the presence of discreet men in order to reconcile its people to a foreign yoke. The Honourable

Company's servants had neglected the language of the people, "and the very first requisite in the individuals appointed to conduct so delicate a charge was their ability to communicate directly with the inhabitants." No one possessing the requisite qualifications being available among the civil servants, Lord Cornwallis decided to place the district in charge of Military officers and selected Captain Read as the fittest person to undertake the task, and that officer selected Mr. Munro as one of his assistants and placed him in charge of the Baramahal which became the scene of his first labours in Civil administration.

The Land Revenue collections were in great confusion due to the inefficient administration of Tippu Sultan and the oppression of the farmers and officers appointed by him to collect the revenue. Captain Read applied himself vigorously to place the matter on a satisfactory footing and introduced several measures of reform. To him is due the credit of having introduced the germs of the ryotwari settlement into the district, which in after years was extended to the whole of the Madras Presidency. Survey and assessment of each individual field being an essential feature of this system, Captain Read had the district surveyed. Mr. Munro soon became an admirer of the ryotwari system and an advocate of moderate assessment and fixity of tenure. He had a good knowledge of Persian, Hindustani, Telugu and Canarese, which afforded him facilities for freely moving with the people.

He had a great love for the country and the people and his life was one of incessant labour. He wrote "We have only to guard the ryots from "oppression and they will create revenue for us." His head-quarters was at Dharmapuri, where he made a garden which was a great source of interest and amusement to him. His love for the country is illustrated by the following extract from one of his letters :—"It is a romantic country, and every tree and mountain has charm which attaches me to them. I began a few years ago to make a garden near Dharmapuri, sheltered on one side by a lofty range of mountains, and on the other side by an aged grove of mangoes. I made a tank in it about a hundred feet square, lined with stone steps; and the spring is so plentiful that, besides watering every herb and tree, there is always a depth of ten or twelve feet of clear water for bathing. I have numbers of young orange, mango and other fruit trees in a very thriving state. I had a great crop of grapes this year; and my pine beds are now full of fruit. When I happened to be at Dharmapuri I always spent at least an hour every day at this spot; and to quit it now as much goes to my heart as forsaking my old friends." The garden and the tank are not identifiable now and nothing remains of the house but a sun dial. To commemorate his association with Dharmapuri a pillar has been erected by Government near the site of his house and garden which he loved so dearly. The pillar bears the following

inscription:—"This pillar is erected by the Government of Madras to mark the association of Dharmapuri with Sir Thomas Munro who lived here from April 1792 to March 1799 as an Assistant to the Superintendent of Revenue in the Baramahal. His house and favourite garden were a few yards from the site of this pillar."

He administered the Baramahal from 1792 to 1798. On the renewal of hostilities with Tippu in 1798 both Read and Munro were recalled to military duty and Munro did not return to his old charge, as higher honours awaited him in other parts of the country.

Before proceeding to unveil the portrait, His Excellency said:—

"Your gift will be very much valued by the people of Salem. I need not preface the unveiling of this picture by many words of my own. Mr. Narasinga Rao is better known to you all than he is to me and I am very glad to have the pleasure of meeting him on this occasion. You are all aware that his grandfather served under Sir Thomas Munro. That alone, I think, is a very interesting family and historical circumstance, and it is, I may say, pleasant both to you and to the family of Mr. Narasinga Rao, that it should be marked by this presentation. I too have a little personal interest in this matter, because I have the pleasure of knowing the family of Sir Thomas Munro. It is a rather remarkable fact that Sir Thomas Munro closed his distinguished career which was largely spent in the Madras Presidency—closed that career as Governor of this Presidency—if

"my memory serves me right, in 1827, which is a long time ago. Only this year his son died. His name was Sir Campbell Munro. He was his second son, his eldest son being of the same name as Sir Thomas and these two, Sir Thomas Munro and Sir Campbell Munro, who only died this year since I came out to India, were both small boys when the great Sir Thomas Munro died as Governor of this Presidency.

"It is only a few months ago that I received a letter from his son, who has just died, Sir Campbell Munro, asking me to find out some particulars about his father, the distinguished Governor of this Presidency, Sir Thomas Munro. His present descendant, Sir Hugh Munro, and others of the family live in a county for which I was a Member of Parliament for many years, a County in Scotland—Forfarshire. That and other circumstances brought me into touch with them and so it is a particular satisfaction to me both personally and in my position, as Governor of this Presidency, to discharge the duty of unveiling this picture and memorial of Sir Thomas Munro."

His Excellency and party on leaving the Town Hall drove through the Agraharam to the weavers' quarters. Here His Excellency was met by M.R.Ry. B. Venkoba Rao and taken to the house of a weaver (M.R.Ry. T. N. Nannaiyar) where he was shown a number of silk looms working. After spending a short time in inspecting the looms and several specimens of the work turned out by them, His Excellency and party motored to the Collector's bungalow where they arrived at 9-20 A.M.

later. As the accommodation is still insufficient, the managing committee has prepared plans and estimates for four new class rooms which are now under the consideration of the Director of Public Instruction.

It is also proposed to build a hostel for the accommodation of pupils from a distance. The Home Board of the London Mission have been asked to give a grant of money for this purpose, and it is hoped the Government will also make a grant.

As at present worked, the school pays its way without any teaching grant from Government, but it is increasingly difficult to obtain the services of properly qualified teachers for the salaries now offered, and the management have under consideration a proposal to increase considerably the salaries of teachers. With an increased expenditure, it will probably be found necessary to ask for a grant-in-aid.

After the inspection of the school was over, His Excellency walked across to the grounds where a garden party was given by the Reception Committee in honour of His Excellency's visit to Salem. Here His Excellency was received by Mr. E. S. B. Stevenson, C.I.E., Chairman of the Reception Committee, and Messrs. E. S. Ramaswami Ayyar and T. A. Raja Chinnathambi Mudaliyar. His Excellency was introduced to the European ladies and gentlemen of the station and to the following Indian gentlemen:—

After thanking the members of the Reception Committee for the entertainment they had given, His Excellency and party returned to the Collector's bungalow at 6-50 P.M.

On the next day, His Excellency, accompanied by Messrs. Cotterell and Mainwaring and Captain Colmore, left the Collector's bungalow at 8-10 A.M. by motor for Yercaud, arriving there at 10-20 A.M. At the foot of the hills, His Excellency was met in a pandal by the ryots of Kannankurichi and was garlanded. During His Excellency's stay in Yercaud, he resided at Fairlawns. Oct. 23,
1913.

At 11-30 A.M. His Excellency received a deputation of Yercaud planters consisting of Messrs. B. Cayley, S. M. Hight, C. G. Lechler, F. D. Short and Charles Dickins (Honorary Secretary). YerCAUD.

The first subject was introduced by Mr. Short and concerned the acquisition of survey No. 72, a piece of land measuring about 74 acres above the lake on the south-west side. It was pointed out that this land was at present privately owned and might at any time be sold for building or other purposes which would endanger the sanitary condition of the lake. It was also pointed out that survey No. 54, measuring about 90 acres above it on the south-west, had already been acquired by Government.

His Excellency said that the proposal to acquire the land would be sympathetically considered by the Government if represented to them by the District Board, and suggested that the scheme, if it is to safeguard the lake all round from pollution, should include all the private land between the lake and the Lower Lake road. If this were done, it might be possible later for the District Board or the inhabitants of Yercaud to contribute towards making the whole area round the lake, with the addition of the Sacred Grove on the north, into something of the nature of a public park.

The second subject was introduced by Mr. Cayley, who discussed the question of opening up by means of roads or bridle-paths the eastern portion of the Shevaroy Hills. The roads and paths existing at present were stated to be the Vaniyar road from Yercaud to Puttur which is a metalled road in charge of the Public Works Department, and the Manjavadi bridle-path from

Pullikattaraman Koil to a point at the foot of the hills about three miles from the Salem-Harur road. It was ascertained also that the Forest Department is about to construct a cart-road from Venkatasamudram on the north of the Shevaroy plateau up the valley of the Vaniyar as far as Pullikattaraman Koil to join the Manjavadi bridle-path mentioned above. The request made by the deputation was that the Vaniyar road from Yercaud which ends at Puttur should be continued to join the Manjavadi bridle-path at Pullikattaraman Koil and also that the Manjavadi bridle-path should be extended at its lower end some three miles to meet the Salem-Harur road. The cost of these two schemes was estimated by Mr. Inglis to be respectively Rs. 10,000 and Rs. 5,000.

His Excellency considered that when large sums had already been spent on the construction of the roads and paths referred to it was to be regretted that the chain of communications should be rendered incomplete and to a large extent useless for want of the comparatively small extra amount required to carry out the two extensions, and promised that Government would consider the proposal put forward sympathetically.

The third subject was introduced by Mr. Hight, who drew attention to the necessity for metalling the first five miles of the Yercaud-Craigmore road, which he stated was rendered almost impassable in wet weather for wheeled traffic, especially at the time when it was chiefly required

to carry planters' produce and supplies. Mr. Hight pointed out that this portion of the road was used by a large number of planters and that all of them felt the difficulty greatly. The cost of metalling the road would be, Mr. Inglis stated, from Rs. 12,000 to Rs. 15,000 and its maintenance would involve an increase of about Rs. 750 a year in the maintenance charges of feeder roads.

His Excellency sympathised with the request and stated that Government would be the more ready to consider favourably the three schemes put forward by the deputation if they were assured of the earnestness of the planters and other residents in wishing them to be carried out by the offer on their part of a contribution towards their cost.

An informal discussion followed on the subject of the produce of the Shevaroyis, the markets in which it was disposed of and the means of communication with these markets on all sides. During the discussion Mr. Hight mentioned that he was constructing, at his own cost, a cart-road from Mangalam village on his estate which lies on the slopes of the Shevaroyis to connect at Poomalattur with the first bridle-path which runs in a northerly direction to Akkara whence there is a first cart-road to Bomidi railway station. He had already constructed three miles and this, with the four miles which remained to be made, would cost him about Rs. 20,000 and he estimated that it would shorten the distance through which his produce had to be carried to the railway from

28 to 14 miles and would save him annually some Rs. 2,000 in cart hire.

At 5-15 P.M. His Excellency, accompanied by Captain Colmore, Aide-de-Camp, and Messrs. Bedford and Liston, Assistant Superintendent of Police, attended a Garden Party at the Victoria Library which was given by the residents of the Shevaroy Hills in honour of His Excellency's visit to Yercaud.

On arrival at the Library, His Excellency was met by the Members of the Reception Committee which consisted of the following ladies and gentlemen :—

At the Garden Party His Excellency was introduced to several other ladies and gentlemen who were present there. At 6-15 P.M., His Excellency returned to Fairlawns.

At 6-30 P.M. His Excellency informally met the Revenue Officers of the district.

On the 24th, His Excellency and party, after breakfast, visited the Shevaroyan peak, starting from Fairlawns at 10 A.M. and returning at 2 P.M. In the afternoon, they drove round the Circular road which connects Yercaud with the various estates.

His Excellency returned to Salem at 9-40 A.M. on the 25th October, and after breakfast, accompanied by Captain Colmore and Mr. Bedford, visited the Central Jail. Here His Excellency was received by Captain W. L. Forsyth, I.M.S., Superintendent of the Jail, and Mr. J. T. Gillespie, I.C.S., District Judge.

Messrs. T. Narasinga Rao and T. Adinarayana Chetti, non-official visitors to the jail, were also present. A guard-of-honour, furnished by the warders at the entrance to the jail, presented arms as His Excellency arrived. After inspecting the guard-of-honour, His Excellency proceeded to inspect the jail and was conducted by Captain Forsyth over the various departments, such as ragi mills, weaving, aluminium and other workshops, kitchen, hospital, leper ward and quarantine. He also inspected the show room in which the carpets, rugs, etc., which are manufactured in the jail, are stored. During the inspection, several prisoners had representations to make but none complained of their treatment in the jail. Their complaints were chiefly about their conviction.

The Central Jail was built in 1862 and is at present capable of accommodating 898 prisoners, of whom 738 can be confined in cells. The total cost is estimated (by the Public Works Department) at Rs. 1,50,971. The buildings are arranged on a rather singular plan. The whole enclosure is bounded by a wall having 12 sides. Five of the sections of the wall have outworks attached to them and in these enclosures are placed a close

prison, a hospital, a cellar block for quarantine prisoners, an annexe for criminal lepers and an imposing two-storied gateway with offices for jail officials. Agreeably to the wishes of His Excellency Sir Arthur Lawley, the late Governor of Madras, the leper annexe, which consisted of association wards, is being converted into cells, for which an estimate amounting to Rs. 19,960 has been sanctioned by Government. The main blocks of the jail are arranged in the centre of the space in six interrupted segments of two circles, three of a smaller circle and three of a larger. All the blocks are double-storied and the cells are well placed for ventilation. The upper cells are said to be infested with bugs owing to the wood-work and wire-netting separating the several compartments. A proposal is, however, under consideration to alter the present locking arrangements and remodel the top cells in accordance with the type-design, and the plans and estimate for this work are awaited from the Public Works Department.

There is a separate extramural block of buildings with a walled enclosure for civil debtors. Female convicts have not been confined in this jail since 1893. They are committed to Vellore Central Jail.

Juveniles are transferred direct to the Reformatory School, Chingleput, when so directed by the courts, as soon as accommodation is available in that institution. Adolescent convicts sentenced to long terms of imprisonment are transferred

to the Special Jail at Tanjore. Condemned prisoners and those sentenced to solitary confinement are lodged in separate cells set apart for the purpose.

The following additional works are said to be required :—

- (1) Construction of a new kitchen on the latest design.
- (2) Construction of six condemned cells.
- (3) Additional storage accommodation for ration materials.
- (4) Improvements to the existing ragi-grinding shed.
- (5) A wood-yard outside the jail with tiled roofing.
- (6) Additional accommodation for manufactory stores.

There are three large contiguous workshops for jail industries. The convicts are employed in weaving cotton goods, country woollen blankets (or cumblies), korai grass matting, rattan work, coir work, lantern and tin work, blacksmith work, aluminium work and gingelly-oil pressing. The net cash earnings for 1912 were Rs. 5,416 against Rs. 3,769 in 1911.

The health of the jail has always been good, and when cholera and plague are prevalent in the town the inmates enjoy remarkable immunity from the diseases. The water-supply and bathing arrangements have recently been improved by the provision of a turbine pump driven by an oil-engine. This raises the water from a well into an elevated masonry reservoir, whence it is

drawn off by hydrants for drinking and cooking and for an overhead shower bath for the daily ablution of the prisoners. The death-rate for the past ten years is as follows :—

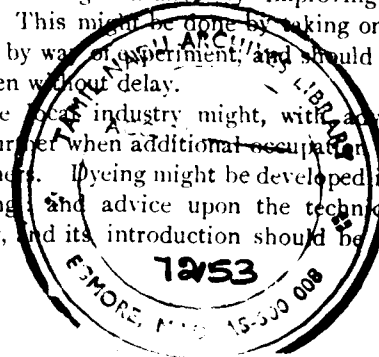

His Excellency made the following remarks in the Visitors' Book :—

"I visited the jail to-day. The buildings are in some respects old fashioned, but they are substantial and suitable and in good order. Various improvements are, I am informed, under consideration. The most urgent of these would seem to be an attempt to remedy the bug nuisance by improving the cells affected. This might be done by taking one block of cells first by way of experiment, and should I think be undertaken without delay.

"The local industry might, with advantage, be carried further when additional occupations are required for prisoners. Dyeing might be developed in addition to weaving, and advice upon the technical aspects of dyeing, and its introduction should be asked from

Leaving the Jail, at 12-10 P.M., His Excellency
and party proceeded to the Salem College, where
he was received by M.R.Ry. E. S. Ramaswami
Ayyar Avargal, Chairman of the Municipal
Council, and Mr. S. A. Shutie, B.A., the Principal.
Mr. J. H. Stone, Deputy Director of Public
Instruction, and Mr. A. G. W. deRozario, Assistant
Inspector of Schools, were also present.

This college has developed out of an Anglo-
Vernacular school founded by Sir Alexander J.
Arbuthnot in the year 1856. It was at first located
in a rented building, the late weaving establish-
ment, now taken up for the new hospital, and
previously the residence of the District Judge of
Salem. The first headmaster was Mr. J. McArthy.

A committee with Mr. George Fisher as its
President set about collecting subscriptions
for erecting a school building in 1858. Their
contributions supplemented by a grant from
Government resulted in the erection of the main
part of the building now occupied by the school
department. It was constructed on what was
then the standard plan for school buildings in
the shape of a capital I, the headmaster being
supposed to take his seat alternately at either

end so as to keep an eye on the classes at work,—
a most unsuitable plan for modern requirements.
Subsequently additions were made from time to
time, as the need for expansion arose, but without
improving the architectural qualities of the build-
ing. The most important of these is the college
block consisting of two class-rooms erected
at a cost of Rs. 4,600 in 1905 and the two
laboratories erected in 1909 at a cost of Rupees
7,389-8-8.

The school was raised to the standard of zilla
school in 1856. A few years later, under Mr. John
Small, college classes were opened and the first
candidates prepared for the First-in-Arts Examin-
ation. In the year 1885 Government handed over
the management of the college to the munici-
pality. Mr. Small was succeeded by Mr. E. E.
Perrett in 1883, and Mr. Perrett by the present
Principal in 1892. At that time the total strength
of the school and college was 174. In the year
1909 the two preparatory departments in Shevapet
and Salem town with classes from the infant to
the fourth standard were added to the college, so
as to make it a complete secondary school. The
present strength is 806.

The college department is affiliated to the
Madras University in Groups I and III. The total
fee income of the college for the year 1912-13
was Rs. 19,549-2-3 as against an expenditure of
Rs. 21,411-0-10.

The Government have recently granted Rupees
7,500, being half the cost of acquisition of

buildings for a hostel for the college students. The Council has applied to Government for a grant to construct a new set of buildings for the college, and the scheme is pending with the Government for orders. The Council has also asked for a grant to increase the salary of the science assistant to Rs. 120—5—150 as no suitable person could be obtained for the present sanctioned pay.

His Excellency was conducted through the various classes which were at work and spent a few minutes in the Laboratory watching the experiments. His Excellency and party left the college at 1 P.M. for the Collector's bungalow and on his way inspected the proposed site for the construction of a new building for the college.

In the evening at 4 P.M. His Excellency, accompanied by Messrs. Bedford and Cotterell, left the Collector's bungalow for the Panamarathupatti Reservoir, which supplies water to Salem town. His Excellency and party were received by Mr. J. Inglis, the Executive Engineer, and M.R.Ry. E. S. Ramaswami Ayyar Avargal, Municipal Chairman. There were also present a few European and Indian officials and non-officials. His Excellency was conducted to the Inspection bungalow, where Mrs. Inglis and Mrs. Nuttal were presented to His Excellency. In a tent pitched in front of the bungalow His Excellency and party had tea after which they proceeded to inspect the reservoir.

The Salem water-works scheme was sanctioned by Government in 1907 and was completed last year.

The following is a description of it :—

At a distance of about nine miles from the town of Salem, and to the south-east of it, is situated an irrigation tank with an ayakat of 327 acres, called the Panamarathupatti tank. This tank is supplied partly from its own free catchment of $8\frac{1}{2}$ square miles, and partly by a supply channel from the Varattar river, taking off just above an old masonry anicut across this river.

Under the water-supply scheme the full tank level of this tank has been raised by 21 feet and it has been connected with the town of Salem by a steel main, nine miles long. A new anicut has been built across the Varattar river about half a mile above the site of the old anicut and a new supply channel to the reservoir has been executed, three-quarters of a mile in length, and a regulating sluice has been constructed at its head. A surplus weir, a valve tower and an irrigation sluice have also been constructed in the bund of the new reservoir.

The filter beds, of which there are three, are situated at a short distance below the bund of the reservoir.

The water from the reservoir passes through the valve tower into the filter beds, and from thence by gravitation, through the steel main, to the town of Salem.

At the end of the steel main is situated a service reservoir, which will hold sufficient water to supply the present population of the town of Salem, with water for half a day, *i.e.*, 420,775 gallons. The capacity of the new reservoir when full is 220 millions cubic feet. This quantity of water, after allowing for loss by evaporation and absorption, and for the water required for the irrigation of 327 acres of wet cultivation, will be sufficient to supply the present population of the Salem town for $1\frac{1}{2}$ years at the rate of 15 gallons per head *per diem*.

The catchment area of the Varattar river above the new anicut is 16 square miles, which can be extended by another $3\frac{1}{2}$ square miles, if found subsequently necessary.

The filtering material in the filter beds is partly broken stone and partly well-washed sand.

The water is distributed over the town of Salem, through cast-iron branch pipe lines, and is made available to the public by means of 105 fountains.

The total cost of the scheme is Rs. 9,40,835, of which Government have contributed Rs. 5,30,300 and have granted a loan of the balance Rs. 4,10,535, repayable in thirty years, to the Salem Municipality.

Work on the scheme was begun in 1908-09 and finished at the end of 1911-12. The water-works were formally opened by the Collector and District Magistrate, Mr. J. P. Bedford, on the Coronation Day of His Majesty the King-Emperor, at Delhi, *i.e.*, 12th December 1911.

The cost of the construction of the various works connected with the scheme is as noted below :—

After the completion of the works, some of the steel pipes were found to have been attacked by corrosion. It has therefore been decided to re-paint the whole of the main steel pipe line, and this work is under execution at present, the cost being met from the savings on the original estimate.

The fencing of the filter beds has been sanctioned, and this work also will be executed from savings on the original estimate.

Estimates for the execution of the pipe lines to Ammapet, Shevapet and the Central Jail, Salem, are under preparation, and will be shortly submitted for sanction.

His Excellency returned to the Collector's bungalow at 7-15 P.M. and left it again at 7-55 P.M. for the District Judge's bungalow, where His Excellency was entertained to dinner by Mr. and

On the morning of Monday, 27th October, at 7-45, His Excellency, accompanied by Messrs. Bedford and Cotterell and Captain the Hon'ble Coulson Fellowes, left for the Municipal Hospital, where Mr. P. F. Mathias, B.A., M.B., C.M., Acting District Medical and Sanitary Officer, and M.R.Ry. E. S. Ramaswami Ayyar Avargal, Chairman of the Municipal Council, received His Excellency and conducted him round the various wards. There were 46 in-patients in the hospital.

The Salem Hospital has been working since the year 1858, when it was under Government control. In the year 1872, it passed under the Town Improvement Trust, and in the year 1884 it came under the control of the newly-constituted municipality. It is not known when the present in-patient wards were erected, but the administrative block was erected in 1872-73. A new operation room was built in 1904 through the exertions of Major Tucker, I.M.S.

The unsatisfactory condition of the buildings and their unsuitability for modern requirements

began to draw the attention of successive Governors of the Province and Surgeons-General since the year 1901, and plan and estimates for the new hospital have just been sanctioned. The land has been acquired already and building will shortly be started.

The attendance and work at this hospital since 1905 are given on the next page in tabular form. It will be seen that this institution has improved markedly in the work turned out. The number of in-patients has nearly doubled itself, and the increase in out-patients is also well marked.

This institution was built as a memorial of the Coronation of King Edward VII from public subscriptions aided by a Government grant.

On Tuesday the 28th October, His Excellency, accompanied by Messrs. Bedford and Cotterell and Captain Fellowes, Aide-de-Camp, left the Collector's bungalow at 10-30 A.M. to inspect the Hindu Girls' School which he reached at 10-45 A.M. On arrival at the school, His Excellency was received by Mr. J. H. Stone, Deputy Director of Public Instruction, and Miss Lynch, Inspectress of Girls' Schools, Central Circle, and conducted through the classes which were then at work. After the inspection, His Excellency and party were entertained by the school girls with action songs, dancing and dialogues. Miss Lynch represented to His Excellency the need for raising the institution to the status of a secondary school and also for enlarging the building, the garden and playground. His Excellency then walked round the compound and, at the request of Miss Lynch, planted a palm tree in memory of his visit. The girls of the school, who were assembled on the verandah outside, sang the National Anthem before His Excellency and party left the school.

The earliest existing records of the school show that it was established in the month of July 1865 by the late Mr. P. Subbaraya Chetti, B.A., B.L., Secretary, Vada Samaj, Salem, but was taken over by Government in 1875. For some years it was staffed entirely with male teachers, but as it was found by experience that the parents of the caste girls were unwilling to allow their daughters to remain at school beyond the third standard

efforts were made to secure a staff of women teachers and with their entertainment, the higher standards were gradually added, the sixth and seventh standards being opened in the years 1891 and 1894, respectively. As the school grew in strength and required a larger building, it was removed to the present site in 1911. This situation is central but the recent rapid development in numbers has been such that further expansion, it is said, has again become necessary. The present strength of the school is 364, out of which 24 girls are in the fifth, sixth and seventh standards. It is attended by the children of the well-to-do and professional classes.

The following remarks were recorded by His Excellency in the Visitors Book of the school:—

"I visited the school today and saw all the "classes, some dancing and drawing and first aid to "the wounded; also heard some singing both in "English and Tamil. The children looked well and "cheerful; the staff seem capable and attentive; the "buildings airy and convenient, perhaps a little over- "crowded, and when more surrounding play-ground or "open space is possible, it will be a useful addition. "I am much pleased with all I have seen of the "school."

His Excellency and party then drove to the Lois Memorial School where they were received by Miss A. M. Crouch and Miss M. G. Lodge, Managers of the London Mission Girls' Schools, who conducted His Excellency through the various classes where elementary science, nature

study, physiology, drawing, claymodelling, arithmetic and house-work are taught. The pupils of Ammapet, Kichipalaiyam, Shevapat Fort and Gogai Girls' Schools which are under the same Mission were also assembled in front of the school. His Excellency was shown specimens of the pupils' drawn thread work and cookery, and grains and vegetable products grown by them, as also natural history specimens collected by the different classes. After the inspection, His Excellency witnessed dumb-bell exercises and drill by the girls and, after congratulating the authorities on the excellent work they are doing, His Excellency and party left the school at 12-15 P.M. The girls sang the National Anthem.

This institution was started in 1895 to provide education for the Christian girls living in the Lois Memorial Home; later, finding that the girls in the villages round were without any educational advantages, it was decided to admit them also and girls of all classes pass through the school.

Beginning with some ten girls in the three lowest classes, the school has attained a strength of 120 in eight classes with a staff of eight teachers and with a special industrial class.

The numbers on the roll include 83 Christians, 24 caste Hindus, 3 Panchamas and 10 Muhammadans.

Some thirty girls have been sent for normal training, most of whom are now filling positions as teachers in various schools.

The chief aim of the school, however, is not to provide teachers but to train the girls to be industrious and enlightened housewives and useful members of the community and in the furtherance of this purpose, all the teachers but one who have themselves passed through the school, co-operate with the Manager. The resident Christian girls, 50 in number, are also taught agriculture and out of school hours, with their teachers, do all the women's share of the work of cultivating some 10 acres of land.

In the afternoon, His Excellency and party left the Collector's bungalow by motor to Sankari, a distance of 25 miles, and returned at 7-30 P.M. After dinner, His Excellency accompanied by Captain Fellowes motored to Salem Railway station at 10-15 P.M. and left for Malur by special train at 10-30 P.M. Mr. J. P. Bedford, the Collector, accompanied him as far as the station where Mr. J. T. Gillespie, I.C.S., District Judge, Muhammad Amin-ud-din Sahib, Acting District Superintendent of Police, Mr. W. H. H. Chatterton, Deputy Collector, and many others were present to bid him farewell. Mr. R. J. M. Mayne, Superintendent of Railway Police, travelled in the special train. Mr. Carmichael, District Traffic Superintendent, South Indian Railway, went in charge of the train from Salem to Jalarpet and Mr. J. A. MacGregor, District Traffic Superintendent, Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway, from Jalarpet to Malur.

Mr. C. B. Cotterell, I.C.S., Private Secretary, did not accompany His Excellency to Malur but returned to Madras by the Mettupalaiyam mail.

On arrival at Malur at 7 A.M. on 29th October 1913, His Excellency was met by Major Loch, Superintendent of the Remount Depôt, and introduced to Mr. Mayne, the Railway Superintendent of Police, and Mr. J. A. M. MacGregor, the District Traffic Superintendent. His Excellency left Malur at 7-45 A.M. and set out for Hosur. At Bagalur village His Excellency halted to be received by the villagers who gave him a hearty welcome and was garlanded by M.R.Ry. Erappa Nayudu, the Poligar of Bagalur. On arrival at Hosur His Excellency was cordially greeted by the villagers and was received by songs of welcome sung by the school children. He was introduced by Mr. S. Burn, I.C.S., Sub-Collector, to the leading officials and non-officials of the locality. His Excellency spent a short time in visiting Kenilworth Castle, the residence of the Sub-Collector, and then went on to Mattigiri, where great preparations had been made for his reception, and where the welcome was enthusiastic. Here he received an address presented by the inhabitants of Mattigiri which was as follows :—

"On behalf of the inhabitants of the Hosur Remount Depôt, Mattigiri, we beg respectfully to offer Your Excellency a most cordial and hearty welcome on the occasion of Your Excellency's visit to this depôt.

"We rejoice that this depôt is honoured by Your Excellency's visit and we avail ourselves of this

"opportunity to express our sentiments of loyalty and devotion to the British Throne.

"The many sanitary and other improvements inaugurated by Major Badcock and still carried on have had, we are glad to mention, far-reaching effects upon the health of this village, which was previously visited with plague annually but has been free from it for over a year. The introduction of a co-operative bank in this village two years ago has afforded us great relief and we are gradually being extricated from the hands of usurers.

"We still have our wants such as opening of a secondary school somewhere between Mattigiri and Hosur, drinking water-supply and extension of railway communication from Hosur to Bangalore, but we do not wish to mar the pleasure of the occasion by pressing these upon Your Excellency's notice, as we have the fullest confidence that these representations through proper channels will receive Your Excellency's sympathetic consideration.

"We must tender our thanks to Major Loch, Superintendent of this depôt, for affording us this opportunity of approaching Your Excellency with this address of welcome, which, we trust, Your Excellency will accept as a memento of your visit to this depôt."

His Excellency made the following reply :—

"GENTLEMEN,—It gives me great pleasure to be able after unavoidable delay to pay now the visit which I had intended to pay to your depôt in August last, and I am glad to have this opportunity of seeing not only the horses which are being trained

"here, but the conditions under which you live and under which the work of the depôt is being carried on.

"I rejoice to hear that the sanitary and other improvements of which you speak have been attended with excellent results, and it is particularly satisfactory to me to learn that for over a year you have been free of the terrible scourge of plague. I trust and believe that under the care of the Superintendent and his staff this improvement in the conditions of your work will be maintained, and I am glad to see the evidence of the keen and vigilant public spirit in these matters which exists here.

"I shall not fail to discuss with Major Loch the subjects which you mention, and can assure you that when the time comes for your representations to be dealt with by the Government, they will receive full and sympathetic consideration.

"I thank you, gentlemen, for your expressions of loyalty and for the very cordial and pleasant welcome you have given me."

Major Loch introduced to His Excellency the leading European and Indian gentlemen who were present there.

After the reception of the address, His Excellency proceeded to Major Loch's house and at 11-30 A.M. visited the Remount Depôt, where were introduced to him Captain W. C. Lowe of the Army Veterinary Department and Mr. Tucker, Major Loch's assistant. Here His Excellency spent close upon three hours and made a thorough inspection of every department of the depôt.

Further inspection in the afternoon was interrupted by a sharp rain storm.

At 3 P.M., His Excellency granted interviews to M.R.Ry. C. B. Srinivasa Ayyangar, Manager, Remount Depôt, and M.R.Ry. B. Sitarama Ayyar, Union Chairman, Hosur, who spoke to him about the raising of the present Higher Grade Elementary School at Hosur to an incomplete secondary school. They said that a memorial had already been submitted to the Educational authorities on this subject and the matter had been under correspondence for the last four years. They urged the necessity for the establishment of a secondary school and requested a Government grant of Rs. 1,200 a year for its upkeep.

At 5-30 P.M. the rain having ceased, His Excellency, under the guidance of Major Loch and Captain Lowe, visited some of the remoter parts of the depôt.

The depôt is 4 miles south of Hosur at Mattigiri. The population consists almost wholly of persons connected in one way or another with the depôt which now occupies 1,578 acres of ground. It is situated on open high ground being 60 feet higher than Bangalore. The depôt was first established at Mangalore in 1779 for the purchase of horses. In 1814 it was transferred to Kungul from which place it was again transferred to Mattigiri in 1828. In September 1881, Hosur Remount Depôt was placed under the control of the Director, Army Remount Department, so far

as supply and purchase of remounts were concern-
ed. In 1895, the internal economy of the depôt,
etc., was entirely taken over by the Director,
Army Remount Department, on the abolition of
the Military Department in Madras. From August
1909, the Army Remount Department has been
under the control of the Quartermaster-General
in India on the abolition of the Military Supply
Department of the Government of India.
