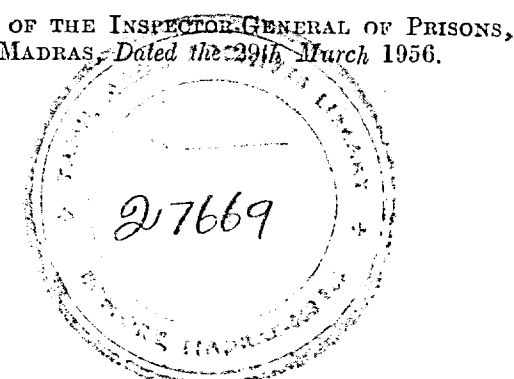
[Subject.—Jails—Annual Report on the Administration of Jails in the Madras State for the year 1955—Submitted.]

Introductory.—I submit my report on the Administration of the Jails in the Madras State for the year 1955.

2. Inspector-General of Prisons.—I held charge of the department throughout the year.

3. Classes of prisons.—The number of Central Jails and District and Special Jails continued to be the same as last year, viz., 8 and 2 respectively. The Central Jail at Cuddalore which was intended for the reception of ordinary prisoners was set apart as a Special Jail for confinement of habituels in G.O. Ms. No. 914, Home,

dated 9th April 1955. The special institution at Palayamkottai for the reception of adolescent offenders dealt with under the Madras Borstal Schools Act, 1925 (Madras Act V of 1926) continued to function throughout the year. The subsidiary jails at Denkaniehattah and Utankarai in the Salem district were abolished with effect from 10th July 1955—vide G.O. Ms. No. 1782, Home, dated 24th June 1955. The status of the Sub-Jail, Poonamallee, was raised to that of Grade II Sub-Jail during the year—vide G.O. Ms. No. 346, Home, dated 7th February 1955. The number of subsidiary jails at the close of the year was 154 including 4 special subsidiary jails.



JUDICIAL STATISTICS.

4. *General summary.*—The year opened with 17,861 prisoners of all classes. One lakh ninety-three thousand eight hundred and twelve were admitted and one lakh ninety-six thousand nine hundred and sixty-five discharged leaving fourteen thousand seven hundred and eight prisoners at the close of the year. The daily average decreased from 18,799.54 to 15,628.68 during the year under report.

There was slight overcrowding in the Central Jails at Madras, Coimbatore and Madurai during the year under report. The overcrowding is chiefly due to the confinement of a large number of remand and undertrial prisoners.

5. *Statement No. I—Convicts.*—There were 14,129 males and 648 females in the jails at the beginning of the year. Eighty thousand five hundred and eighty-seven males and 5,029 females were received by direct committal against 88,327 and 7,522 respectively during 1954.

As in the previous years, the largest number of direct committals was from the Madras City, viz., 17,991. Madurai comes next with 6,121 followed by Salem 5,500, Coimbatore 5,077 and North Arcot 4,914.

The number received by transfer was 25,964, the details being 2,289 by inter-transfers among jails, 131 from outside the State and 23,544 enroute prisoners from subsidiary jails to Central or District Jails or other subsidiary jails.

One lakh fourteen thousand one hundred and twelve were discharged during the year, the details of which are as follows:—

Female prisoners belonging to the State of Andhra and confined in the State Jail for Women, at Vellore were transferred to the Central Jail, Rajahmundry during the year—vide G.O. Ms. No. 1757, Home (Prisons), dated 7th July 1955 of the Government of Andhra.

The number of convicted prisoners remaining at the end of the year was 12,245. The daily average of this class of prisoners decreased from 14,670.95 to 12,602.10 during the year.

There were 123 prisoners suffering from leprosy in the Leper Annexes to the Central Jails, Salem and Tiruchirappalli. Three hundred were admitted and 304 disposed of leaving 119 at the close of the year (85 at Salem and 34 at Tiruchirappalli). None was discharged cured and there was also no death. The daily average decreased from 129.36 to 121.96 during the year.

The number of prisoners convicted under the Prohibition Act increased from 27,734 to 28,771 during the year under report.

6. *Under-trial prisoners.*—The number of under-trial prisoners confined at the beginning of the year was 3,071. Eighty-two thousand and forty-eight were admitted and 82,685 were disposed of due to all causes leaving 2,434 at the close of the year. The daily average of this class of prisoners decreased from 4,110.85 to 3,005.86.

Of the daily average, 2,238.28 relates to subsidiary jails against 3,089.43 in the previous year. The daily average of such prisoners confined in the Central and District Jails decreased from 1,021.42 to 767.58 in the year under report.

Excluding 17,223 transfers and those that remained at the end of the year, 65,462 were otherwise disposed of. Of this number, 40,873 or 62.44 were released against 43,801 or 62.14 and 24,581 or 37.55 per cent were convicted and sentenced against 26,556 or 37.85 per cent in the previous year. There were three escapes and all of them occurred in the subsidiary jails. The number who died during the year was two and both of them relate to Central Jails.

The average period of detention in jails of prisoners whose cases were pending before the Sessions and Magistrates' Courts increased from 18.40 to 18.97 and 9.40 to 10.68 days respectively during the year.

The legal position in regard to the application of section 29 of the Prisoners Act III of 1900 in so far as it relates to the transfer of under-trial prisoners from one subsidiary jail to another or to a Central or District Jail or vice versa was examined and instructions were issued in G.O. Ms. No. 2692, Home, dated 3rd October 1955, as to how such transfers should be regulated.

7. *Civil prisoners.*—The number of civil prisoners at the commencement of the year was 13. One hundred and eighty-four were admitted and 168 discharged leaving 29 at the close of the year. The daily average was 20.72 against 17.74 in the previous year. There was no death.

8. *State and security prisoners.*—Prisoners of these classes were not admitted into the jails during the period under report.

9. *Statement II—Religion.*—Of 85,616 admitted during the year, 85.05 per cent were Hindus and Sikhs, 5.87 per cent Muslims, 6.19 per cent Christians, 0.18 per cent Buddhists and Jains and 2.71 per cent others against 83.16, 6.41, 7.00, 0.10 and 3.33 per cent respectively during the previous year.

10. *Age of convicts.*—Admissions during the year according to age as compared with that of the previous year are as follows:—

The number of admissions under 16 years of ages increased from 46 to 72 during the year.

11. *Appendix to Statement II—Age of children, juveniles and adolescents.*—The number of juveniles between the ages of 14 and 15 admitted into jails increased from 35 in 1954 to 54 during the year. Of this, only 4 relate to Central Jails, the remaining 50 to the Subsidiary Jails. Eighteen under the age of 14 years were admitted in the subsidiary jails. The number of adolescents from 16 to 20 and 21 to 23 increased from 6,578 to 8,852 and 10,040 to 10,169 respectively.

12. *Education.*—The percentage of literates and illiterates admitted during the year was 24.89 and 75.11 as against 23.28 and 76.72 respectively in the previous year.

13. *Previous occupation.*—The occupation percentage of male convicts admitted during the year compared with that of 1954 is given below:—

Of 5,029 females admitted during the year, 4,072 were married, 580 were unmarried and 377 were widows against 5,420, 1,239 and 863 respectively in the previous year. The number of prostitutes admitted was 25 as against 4 in the previous year.

14. *Statement III—Nature and length of the sentence.*—As compared with the year 1954, the percentage of convicts sentenced to simple imprisonment decreased from 21.55 to 18.61 and percentage of those sentenced to rigorous imprisonment increased from 78.45 to 81.39 in the year under report. Of the 15,933 prisoners sentenced to simple imprisonment, 10,427 prisoners were sentenced to undergo imprisonment in default of payment of fine or failure to furnish security. No prisoner was sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement nor imprisonment with whipping. Whipping as a judicial punishment was abolished with effect from 19th December 1955—vide G.O. Ms. No. 3544, Home, dated 13th December 1955. The number sentenced to death was 135 and to transportation for life 286 against 124 and 275 respectively in the previous year. During the year no prisoner was sentenced to transportation for a term. The number sentenced to imprisonment not exceeding one month decreased from 43,241 to 37,329 and the number of persons sentenced to between one and three months also decreased from 40,388 to 39,619. Fifteen persons were sentenced to imprisonment exceeding ten years against 11 in the previous year. One thousand four hundred and sixty-seven were sentenced to period from one to ten years and 6,765 persons from three months to one year. The number of prisoners remaining at the end of the year was 12,245; their sentences being 74 sentenced to death, 1,468 to transportation for life, 2,232 to periods exceeding two years, 1,017 between one and two years and 7,454 under one year.

15. *Statement IV—Previously convicted prisoners.*—Of the 85,616 prisoners admitted during the year, 3,421 or 3.99 per cent of the direct committals were previously convicted against 3,018 or 3.15 per cent in the previous year. This number includes 392 convicts imprisoned for the first time, in default of furnishing security under section 110, Criminal Procedure Code, and classified as habituals. Of the remainder, 2,067 had one previous conviction, 676 had two previous convictions and 286 more than two previous convictions. All the 3,421 prisoners were classified as habituals by the convicting courts.

16. *Classification of star class.*—There were 237 star class prisoners at the commencement of the year. 159 were classified as such during the year and 115 discharged leaving 281 at the close of the year.

17. *'A' and 'B' Class prisoners.*—Fifty-seven prisoners of these classes remained at the beginning of the year. Forty were received by direct committal, 1 by recommitment from bail and five by transfer from other jails. Twenty-two prisoners placed in 'C' Class were reclassified to these classes and two received on P.T. Act making a total of 127 for the year. Of this, 45 were released under remission rules, 4 on bail, 9 transferred to other jails, 1 under P.T. Act, one released on parole and three were reduced to class 'C' leaving sixty-four at the close of the year.

18. *Youthful offenders.*—Seventy-two youthful offenders were admitted during the year against forty-six during 1954. Eighteen under 14 years of age were admitted in the following subsidiary jails:—

19. *Borstal School.*—The number of inmates in the Borstal School, Palayamkottai, at the beginning of the

year was 626. During the year, 175 were admitted and 273 discharged leaving 528 at the close of the year.

The modified Borstal Sections in the four Central Jails at Vellore, Cannanore, Salem and Coimbatore continued to function satisfactorily during the year. The opening of a Modified Borstal Section in the Central Jail, Madras, was sanctioned during the year—vide G.O. Ms. No. 804, Home, dated 29th March 1955. The number of adolescents undergoing modified borstal treatment in the jails at the commencement of the year was 778. Eight thousand five hundred and fifty-nine adolescents were admitted and 8,423 were discharged leaving 914 at the close of the year.

During the year under report 19 prisoners appeared for E.S.L.C. Examination and 13 of them came out successful.

20. *Escapes and recaptures (convicts).*—There were 10 escapes against 13 in the previous year, i.e., 9 from the Central Jails and 1 from the Borstal School, Palayamkottai. All the escapes occurred from extra-mural gangs. The unexpired portion of the sentence of the ten escapees was: 4 less than one year and 6 above one year and under seven years. There was no escape from inside the jails of the State during the year under report. The following jails contributed to the escape of the prisoners:—

These escapes generally took place due to slack supervision on the part of the warders in charge of the extra-mural gangs. The subordinates responsible were suitably dealt with departmentally.

Ten escapees were recaptured during the year including 2 who made good their escapes in the previous years.

21. *Offences and punishments.*—During the year 418 offences including 4 dealt with by criminal courts were committed by convicts against 509 in the previous year. Of the 414 offences dealt with by Superintendents, 106 relate to work, 60 to prohibited articles, 14 to assaults, mutiny and escapes and 234 to all other breaches of jail rules against 94, 100, 29, and 284, respectively in the previous year.

Of the offences dealt with by the Superintendents, 225 "Major" and 189 "Minor" punishments were awarded as compared with 222 and 285 respectively in 1954.

Of the 4 cases dealt with by criminal courts, 2 relate to escapes from lawful custody, 1 for stabbing a fellow convict and another for inflicting grievous injuries on a convict warder. The sentences imposed on the 4 convicts whose cases were disposed off during the year are as follows:—

The percentage of punishments (including the 4 disposed of by criminal courts) to the daily average population decreased from 3.47 to 3.32 in the year under report.

No unusual incidents or serious disturbances took place during the year under report.

The conduct of the prisoners was generally satisfactory

22. *Corporal punishments*.—Corporal punishment was not inflicted during the year.

23. *Conduct of habituals*.—The number of habituals at the beginning of the year was 1,691 against 2,113 in the previous year. The number received by direct committal was 3,421, by transfer from jails in the State 386, outside the State eight, making a total of 5,506 against 5,459 in 1954. Habituals formed 6.55 per cent of the convict population of 69,293 against 6.73 per cent in 1954. The percentage of punishments inflicted by the Superintendents for prison offences on habituals was 16.18 against 21.14 in the previous year. No habitual prisoner was awarded corporal punishment. The conduct of habituals on the whole was satisfactory.

24. *Education of convicts*.—(i) Each jail is provided with a well-equipped elementary school. Educational facilities are provided for convicted prisoners who are likely to be benefited by it. Education imparted in the jail schools does not go beyond the elementary stage and is not normally given to persons above the age of 40. Prisoners who desire education after the elementary stage are given necessary books and available assistance. The officers of the Education Department inspect the schools regularly. Education on model lines is being imparted by the teachers trained in Adult Education methods. In the Central Jail at Cannanore, an experiment is being tried to teach prisoners under the Adult Education method by utilising the services of literate prisoners.

The Government in G.O. Ms. No. 195, Home, dated 24th January 1955, sanctioned the opening of an Elementary School in the District Jail at Pudukkottai. The school began to function from 11th April 1955.

(The number of convicts and borstal inmates on the rolls of the school at the commencement of the year was 1,663. One thousand seven hundred and seventy-two were admitted and 1,633 discharged, leaving 1,802 at the close of the year. Nineteen prisoners (six convicts from Central Jail, Coimbatore, and thirteen inmates from Borstal School, Palayamkottai), came out successful at the E.S.L.C. Examination held during the year under report.)

Each jail is provided with a library for the benefit of the prisoners. These libraries are well stocked with books of educative value. Every facility is afforded for reading and prisoners are encouraged to make free use of the libraries. There were 11,540 books in the libraries at the beginning of the year, seven hundred and seventy six books were added making a total of 12,316. Of these, 420 books were condemned as they were torn by frequent use leaving 11,896 books at the close of the year.

Film shows were given in the Central Jails, Tiruchirappalli and Salem, by the Five-Year Plan Publicity Officers. The shows were much appreciated by the prisoners.

For the benefit of the Bharat Scouts and Guides, Coimbatore, a Tamil Drama "Chandrasekharan" was staged on 4th February 1955 by the prisoners of the Central Jail, Coimbatore, under the patronage of Sri C. Subramaniam, Minister for Jails. Sri K. Venkatasamy Naidu, ex-Minister and Chief State Commissioner for Bharat Scouts and Guides, Madras, also attended the drama. The performance was a complete success.

(ii) Every endeavour is made to cultivate a moral and religious atmosphere and for this purpose each jail has its own religious and moral lecturers who visit the jail and deliver lectures to the prisoners of their particular religious persuasion on suitable moral and religious topics. In addition, the members of the teaching staff also deliver lectures to the prisoners. During the year under report, 1,354 lectures were delivered, i.e., 666 by Christians, 441 by Hindus and 247 by Muslims. Training in Ambulance and First-Aid continued to be imparted during the year. One hundred and seventy-four prisoners were trained. Of them, 76 were awarded certificates.

As usual, the Central and District Committees continued to render every possible help to discharged prisoners who sought their help. All the Honorary Secretaries evinced keen interest in the rehabilitation of ex-prisoners. I wish to place on record the gratitude of the department for their good work and trust that the same zeal and enthusiasm will continue to be given by them in the future years. Prisoners in some of the jails were given treats on festive occasions by the concerned Discharged Prisoners Aid Societies. At the request of the Discharged Prisoners Aid Society, Madurai, the authorities of the local Tirugnana Sammandhar Mutt are conducting Bhajana in the Central Jail, Madurai.

Sri G. Janakirama Chetty, Honorary Secretary of the Madras State Discharged Prisoners Aid Society (Central) was reappointed as a visitor to the jails including subsidiary jails in the State in G.O. Rt. No. 3883, Home, dated 26th November 1955.

26. *Fetters*.—Sixty-nine prisoners were fettered as a punishment for jail offences against 122 in the previous year. No convict was fettered for safe custody as a means of security.

27. *Working of remission system*.—The result of the working of remission system is shown in Statement No. 'C' appended to this report. It is working satisfactorily.

The number of prisoners released under the remission rules during the year was 13,058 against 17,068 in the previous year. No convict released during the year who came under the remission system failed to get remission.

One thousand seven hundred and fifteen prisoners were awarded good conduct remission against 1,269 in the year 1954. Special remission under clauses (1), (2) and (3) of rule 324 of the Madras Prison and Reformatory Manual, Volume II, was awarded to 6,618 against 5,490 in the previous year. No prisoner was given money in lieu of remission for extra work done. Of the prisoners released under the remission rules, the maximum remission earned by any one convict was 3,702 days including Independence Day Special remission and the maximum gratuity of Rs. 43-4-0 was earned by a convict in Central Jail, Tiruchirappalli. Among those released during the year 1,471 prisoners earned an aggregate sum of Rs. 1,014-8-0 as gratuity. In lieu of a part of this sum, viz., Rs. 559-12-0, the prisoners were granted a remission of 4,228 days.

28. *Advisory Board*.—Advisory Boards constituted to review the sentences of prisoners met 43 times in the several jails. The cases of 851 prisoners came for consideration by the Boards and 182 of them were recommended for premature release. The cases of 198 prisoners (including lifers whose cases were not recommended by the Board but required to be sent under the rules) were submitted to the Government for orders. The remaining 653 cases were not submitted as they were not required to be sent.

Of the twelve cases pending at the beginning of the year, the Government ordered the release of eleven prisoners and the case of one was rejected.

Of the 198 cases submitted, the Government ordered the release of 104 prisoners and rejected the release of 67 prisoners. The cases of 27 prisoners were pending orders of the Government at the close of the year.

29. *Total expenditure*.—The total expenditure of the department excluding the outlay on jail buildings by the Public Works Department, the expenditure relating to the Certified Schools and the charges in England was Rs. 68,62,462-7-0 against Rs. 79,23,865-5-0 during the previous year. The fall in expenditure, viz., Rs. 10,61,402-14-0 is mainly on account of the decreased population in the jails and sub-jails and also due to slight fall in the price of certain dietary articles.

From the total expenditure of Rs. 68,62,462-7-0 a sum of Rs. 16,75,874-13-5 (details furnished below) has been deducted and a sum of Rs. 2,755-13-4 being the value of stationery articles supplied to the jails by the Stationery department, has been included as expenditure under "Contingencies". The total expenditure in guarding and maintaining the prisoners in jails and sub-jails of this State during 1955 was, therefore, Rs. 51,89,343-6-11 or Rs. 51,89,343 roundly as exhibited

in Financial Statement No. IX against Rs. 59,44,291 in the previous year.

40. *Jail dairies*.—The dairies in the Central Jails at Salem, Coimbatore and Tiruchirappalli continued to work satisfactorily during the year. The dairy at the Central Jail, Vellore, has exhibited a loss of Rs. 508-5-10 against a loss of Rs. 2,370-0-7 in the previous year and it is hoped that the dairy in this jail will improve further and begin to function profitably during the current year. The profit realized in the dairies of the Central Jails at Salem, Coimbatore and Tiruchirappalli during 1955 and 1954 are furnished below:—

The slight fall in the profit realized during the current year is due to the fall in the number of yielding cows on account of conception and also due to the increase in the cost of fodder during the year.

The total value of milk produced in the Jail dairies during the year amounted to Rs. 94,078-9-11 against Rs. 1,03,992-14-3 in the previous year. The amount realized by the sale of bulls, bull-calves, unserviceable aged cows and crossing fees was Rs. 4,836-10-0 against Rs. 5,940-11-0 in the previous year.

Poultry farming.—Poultry farming is working satisfactorily in the following jails, viz., Central Jail, Tiruchirappalli, Central Jail, Salem, Central Jail, Vellore, Central Jail, Coimbatore and District Jail, Pudukkottai. The profit for the year 1955 is shown below :—

Bee-keeping.—The bee-keeping in the Central Jails at Coimbatore and Madurai is still in the experimental stage owing to unfavourable conditions obtaining in those places.

42. Grand total.—The grand total of expenditure as exhibited in column (14) of Statement No. IX decreased from Rs. 59,44,291 to Rs. 51,89,343 during the year and the average cost per annum increased from Rs. 316-3-1 to Rs. 332-0-8 during the year. The increase in the cost per head is mainly on account of the appointment of additional warder peons in the sub-jails and also due to the increased expenditure under "Hospital charges", "Sanitation charges" and "Clothing and bedding" during the year.

43. Statement XI.—Employment of convicts.—The average number of convicts under sentence of labour on working days during the year was 12,140-57 against 14,003-57 in the previous year. The average number of convicts not sentenced to labour was 201-71 against 735-17 in 1954. During the year, the average number of sick decreased from 179-92 to 175-54. The average number of convalescent and infirm decreased from 1,066-11 to 866-54. The average number of convicts employed on manufactures was 4,740-74, on gardening 1,414-53, in the preparation of articles for use in jails 861-08, as prison officers 817-80 and as prison servants 1,007-56 against 5,249-99, 1,624-99, 896-96, 829-29 and 1,090-54, respectively, in the year 1954.

The Government in G.O. Ms. No. 2966, Home, dated 21st October 1955, sanctioned the employment of 100 prisoners for work connected with the Zoo Centenary Exhibition, 1955. Convicts with short unexpired portion of sentences were selected and sent in gangs consisting of 10 prisoners under the supervision of warder staff. Annas eight per head per day was collected as labour charges from the Corporation of Madras. This enabled the prisoners to mix freely with free labourers from outside. The question of employing prisoners on municipal works is under consideration of the Government.

44. Statement XII-A.—The total receipts of the department excluding those under "Quinine manufactures" amounted to Rs. 25,66,030-9-7 against Rs. 26,87,842-1-11 in the previous year. The Central Jail, Coimbatore, shows the largest cash earnings, viz., Rs. 13,39,739-4-0 against Rs. 15,51,963-4-8 in the previous year. Among the other jails, the Central Jail, Madras, has done well with a cash earning of Rs. 3,50,222-1-11 against Rs. 2,76,179-11-9 in the previous year.

The total profit for the year, taking into account the opening and closing balance of cash, stock, tools and plant, etc., amounted to Rs. 5,68,283-13-0 against Rs. 7,08,519-10-0 in the previous year. The fall in the total profit is due to decrease in the volume of orders received from the consuming departments, consequent on the formation of the

The Central Jail, of Rs. 2,19,773-10-2 against previous year. Among the other jails, Madras, has done well with an asset of Rs. .. against Rs. 1,05,280-11-6 in the previous year. The .. of articles purchased and supplied to the Medical department during the year was Rs. 13-13-0 against Rs. 3,536 in the previous year.

The quinine section which was attached to the Central Jail, Coimbatore, was transferred to the Cinchona department with effect from 1st April 1955. The cost of distribution of quinine products to various institutions up to the end of 31st March 1955 amounted to Rs. 9,239-3-9. The profit in the quinine section at 20 per cent on the cost of distribution comes to Rs. 1,847-13-6.

45. Statement XII-B.—The total value of articles manufactured in jails during the year amounted to Rs. 22,12,921-2-3 against Rs. 25,70,239-13-2 in the previous year. The percentage of convicts employed on manufacture during the year was 39-52 against 39-00 in the previous year.

46. Statement XIII.—The total cost of maintenance under column (14) of Statement IX is Rs. 51,89,343 and the total "net profits" as exhibited in column 6 (a) of Statement XII-A is Rs. 5,68,283-13-0. The net cost for maintaining prisoners during the year works out to Rs. 46,21,059-3-0 against Rs. 52,35,771-6-0 in the previous year. The net cost per head works out to Rs. 295-11-0 against Rs. 278-8-0 in the previous year. The reasons for the increase in the cost per head are explained in paragraph 42 above.

47. Value of supplies made by jails for departmental use.—The value of inter-jail supplies amounted to Rs. 4,74,476-5-6 against Rs. 4,54,784-6-4 in the previous year. The total quantity of vegetables produced by jails during the year was 1,822,273 lb. against 2,174,398 lb. in the previous year. The cost of vegetables produced in the jail gardens works out to Rs. 1,90,043-5-7 at market rates against Rs. 2,52,382-10-3 in the previous year. All

the waste water is being used for gardening purposes. The value of convict labour supplied to the Government Press, Madras, amount to Rs. 53,616-14-0 against Rs. 62,546-14-0 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 60 was realized during the year on account of convict labour supplied to the Public Works Department against Rs. 92-14-0 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 761-3-0 was realized during the year on account of convict labour supplied to the Zoo Centenary Exhibition held in October 1955.

The total number of admissions to the hospitals decreased from five thousand three hundred and eighty-nine in 1954 to three thousand and fifty-one during the year under report. The number of admissions to the hospitals in the jails, excluding subsidiary jails decreased from four thousand and eighty-two in 1954 to two thousand four hundred

eighty-seven in 1955. The Central Jail, Madurai, recorded the largest number of admissions, while the Central Jail, Cannanore, comes next.

The daily average number of sick excluding subsidiary jails decreased from 192-61 in 1954 to 170-08 during the year under report.

The number of deaths and the death-rate per mille of average strength decreased from one hundred and six in 1954 to sixty-four and 7-36 to 5-19 respectively during the year under report. The sixty-four deaths during the year were due to enteric fever 2, pulmonary tuberculosis 8, pneumonia 2, general respiratory diseases 3, dysentery 2, diarrhoea 3 and all other causes 44. Every possible care and attention in regard to nursing, treatment, diet and other remedial measures were bestowed on the patients.

51. Subsidiary jails.—The number of admissions to hospitals and the daily average sick decreased from one thousand three hundred and seven in 1954 to five hundred and sixty-four and 11-25 to 5-21 respectively in the year under report. There was no death in the subsidiary jails during the year as against one in 1954.

52. Health of prisoners repatriated from Andamans.—The Andaman Colonization Scheme has been abolished—Omitted.

CHIEF DISEASES.

54. Cholera.—As in the previous year, there was no admission and death under this disease.

Dysentery.—There were one hundred and forty-seven admissions, and two deaths against this disease. Of these admissions, one hundred and two were in the Central Jail, Tiruchirappalli, seventeen in the Central Jail, Madurai, nine each in the Central Jails at Coimbatore and Vellore, six in the Central Jail, Cuddalore, and four in

District Jail, Pudukkottai. The two deaths which occurred during the year relate to the Central Jail, Vellore.

Malarial fevers.—There were 59 admissions. Like last year there was no death. The Central Jail, Vellore, recorded the largest number of admissions, i.e., 27. Admissions in the other jails were 9 in Central Jail, Coimbatore, 6 in Central Jail, Cuddalore, 5 each in Central Jails, Tiruchirappalli and Salem, 4 in the Central Jail, Madurai, 2 in Central Jail, Madras, and 1 in the State Jail for Women, Vellore.

Tuberculosis.—The admissions and deaths under this disease were 161 and eight respectively. Of the 8 deaths, one prisoner died in the Government Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Tambaram and the remaining deaths were contributed by the undermentioned jails:—

Pneumonia.—The number of admissions and deaths during the year were 44 and 2 respectively. Of the two deaths one relate to Central Jail, Cannanore, and the other to Borstal School, Palayamkottai.

Anaemia and debility.—The number of admissions and deaths were seventy-six and seven respectively. The Central Jail, Salem, recorded the largest number of deaths, viz., 5 and the remaining two relate to Central Jail, Vellore, and Borstal School, Palayamkottai.

Ankylostomiasis.—There were three admissions under this disease; two in the Central Jail, Coimbatore, and one in the Central Jail, Vellore. No death occurred due to this disease.

Enteric fever.—The number of admissions was the same as last year, viz., 9. One prisoner died in the Central Jail, Cannanore.

Syphilis.—The number admitted was thirteen against eighteen in the previous year.

Cerebro-spinal meningitis.—There was neither admission nor death during the year under report.

55. **Number of deaths according to length of time passed in jails.**—Of the sixty-two deaths in the Central, District and Special Jails, thirty-nine were within six months after their admission and twenty-three after six months against fifty-eight and thirty-six respectively in the year 1954. Of the thirty-nine deaths, nine occurred in the Central Jail, Tiruchirappalli, seven in the Central Jail, Vellore, five each in the Central Jails, Cannanore and Madras, four in the Central Jail, Coimbatore, three in the Central Jail, Salem, two each in the Central Jail, Cuddalore, and Borstal School, Palayamkottai and one each in the Central Jail, Madurai, and District Jail, Pudukkottai.

56. **Prisoners' weight.**—Statement 'B'.—The number of prisoners released was fifty-seven thousand and eighty-one. Of this number thirty-two thousand eight hundred and ninety-five or 57.62 per cent gained weight, one thousand four hundred and eight or 2.47 per cent lost weight and twenty-two thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight or 39.91 per cent remained stationary against thirty-six thousand five hundred and forty-seven or 54.32 per cent, two thousand six hundred and sixty-seven or 3.97 and twenty-eight thousand and sixty or 41.71 per cent respectively, in the previous year.

57. **Water-supply.**—(1) All the jails except those at Cannanore, Salem, Cuddalore, are linked with the municipal water-supply. These three jails get the water supply from the wells inside or outside the jail. All wells are protected against accidents and contamination.

The King Institute, Guindy, analyses the water of all jails periodically. Any defects brought to the notice are being immediately rectified. Drinking water is systematically chlorinated and field tests carried out to maintain efficient sterilization.

(2) **Kitchen.**—The kitchens in the jails were under efficient sanitary control and were working satisfactorily.

(3) & (4) **Conservancy and drainage and other sanitary arrangement.**—The conservancy and drainage and other sanitary arrangements were kept up to the mark.

58. **Grow More Food Campaign.**—Every endeavour has been and is being made to grow more food. Almost all the institutions are self-sufficient in their kitchen requirements. Local purchase has not been resorted to except under extraordinary circumstances in the case of one or two jails. The target given below showing the production of vegetables has a considerable increase in the production and will speak of the efforts made in this behalf. The decrease in the figures in respect of Central Jail, Vellore and Madurai, is due to cyclonic effects and the failure of seasonal rain.

In addition to the figures shown against Central Jail, Salem, 151,746 lb. of cholam stalk and 239,400 lb. of guinea grass as cattle fodder have been produced.

59. **Visit to jails.**—Three hundred and thirty-eight visits were paid by official and non-official visitors to the several jails and Borstal School, Palayamkottai, during the year against three hundred and seventy in the year 1954.

On 16th December 1955, Srimathi Durgabai Deshmukh visited the Central Jail, Madras.

One thousand three hundred and fifty-four visits were paid by moral and religious lecturers for imparting religious and moral instructions to the prisoners during the year against one thousand five hundred and fifty-nine in 1954.

60. **Inspections.**—I inspected all the jails, and Borstal School, Palayamkottai, and also paid additional visits as required by the rules. All subsidiary jails in the State were inspected by me except Sub-Jail, Pennagaram, in the Salem district. Additional visits were also paid by me to some of the subsidiary jails.

The number of inspections of the subsidiary jails made by the Collectors, District Magistrates, and Subdivisional Magistrates was four hundred and thirty-nine and by the District Medical Officers thirty-eight. Number of visits paid by other visitors is furnished below:—

The total number of inspections and visits paid by official and non-official visitors was one thousand two hundred and ninety-two against eight hundred and three during 1954. The number of visits paid by the members of the Legislature and special visitors to the jails in the State was thirteen.

61. **Records—Civil Stores and Service Registers.**—The rules relating to the maintenance of service registers, leave accounts and the periodical destruction of records were complied with and inventories of stores in the various jails and in my office were written up to the end of the year.

62. **Important events and notable administrative measures undertaken during the year were.**—(1) Setting apart the Central Jail at Cuddalore for the reception of prisoners who are declared as fit subjects for detention in a special habitual jail.

(2) Revision of the scale of pay of Boot and Sandal Overseer and appointment of additional chukler maistries in the Central Jail, Vellore, to increase the outturn and improve the quality of workmanship.

(3) Provision of a frigidaire in the Central Jail, Madras.

(4) Transfer of female prisoners convicted by the Courts in the Andhra State and confined in the State Jail for Women at Vellore to the Central Jail, Rajahmundry, consequent on the opening of a jail for women in that State and committal of Andhra women prisoners to that jail from 1st August 1955.

(5) Issue of korah mats and pillows in place of jute mats to "C" class prisoners in the Central Jail, Tiruchirappalli, as an experimental measure for one year.

(6) Opening of Carpentry Industry in the Central Jail, Cuddalore and the District Jail, Pudukkottai, and creation of a post of one Carpentry Foreman, Grade II, in the scale of Rs. 50—3—80 and one Grade II Warder Rs. 30—1—40 in the latter jail.

(7) Participation in the Congress Exhibition held at Congress ground at Teynampet, Madras.

(8) Introduction of hand-spinning by charka by prisoners in the Central Jail at Vellore, Cannanore, Salem, Madurai, Coimbatore and Madras.

(11) Orders have been issued to mechanize the carpentry section in the Central Jail, Madras, and to the employment of certain technical personnel to increase output.

(12) Permitting "C" class prisoners either to have two bedsheets or a bedsheet and a cumby instead of two cumblies.

(13) Raising the educational qualification of Grade II Warders in jails to a pass in III Form or E.S.L.C. with a view to improve the morale and conduct of warder establishment towards prisoners.
