APPENDIX II.

SPECIAL STATEMENTS FURNISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE
LOCAL GOVERNMENT ONLY.

5. In paragraph 31 of the report, reference is made to the large increase in the number of cases of malarial fever in the Rajahmundry jail. No special remarks on this point are recorded by the Inspector-General in his detailed examination of the vital statistics. It is also observed that the proportion of admissions to hospital in this jail is higher than in any other central jail, not excepting Trichinopoly where, as explained in paragraph 50 of the report, the conditions are abnormal and a high sick-rate is to be expected. In view of the previous history of the Rajahmundry jail, and the unhealthiness which led to its temporary evacuation in 1898, a careful watch should be maintained over its vital statistics so that any tendency to exceptional unhealthiness may be at once noticed and, if possible, remedied.
