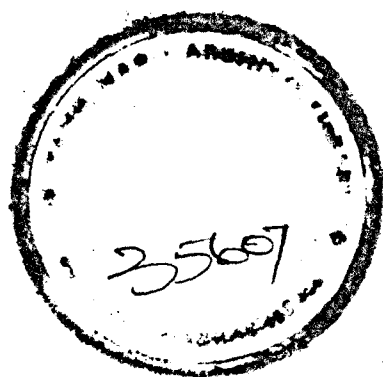


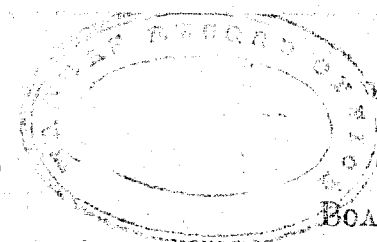

HONORABLE SIR & SIRS.

1. In obedience to your commands of 27th September 1774, accompanying We send you the exactest accounts We have been able to obtain of the Farm of Trevenduporam for ten years; from the beginning of the year 1763 to the end of 1772. The accounts of the first nine years, contain in an abstract of the neat Revenues said to be collected by the Company's Renters; the neat amount received by the Inamdars; and the neat amount received by the Chontrumdars; in the Farm for each of the 9 years: and the accounts for the first five of these years, are drawn out allowing the then Nattars of the Farm their full privileges; the four last without them: as the privileges of the Nattars were ordered to be abolished in the beginning of 1768.—With respect to the abovementioned nine years accounts, as well as to the accounts for the year 1772 which will be hereafter more particularly mentioned, the reason why we have not mentioned the exact produce of grain in any one of them is, because the greatest part of the lands have been let out to rent, of which land it is said, no accounts have been ever kept of their produce.

2. As the accounts of the Renter and Village Concopies of this Farm, are not we are told wholly settled later than the year 1772, the accounts we have now sent for that year are intended to show as nearly as possible the present and particular state of the Farm, because the lands cultivated that year are either the same as what are now cultivated, or are now fit for cultivation, and no more; because the Inams and Chontrums therein set down are those only which now subsists; and because the Number of Houses and Looms mentioned to be in each Village, and the described condition of the Yaries, Tanks and water courses, is the account now given of them.

3. In these accounts for 1772 we have drawn out a separate account of every Village in the Farm, and in each Village account we have first specified the whole quantity of ground said to be contained in the Village, and how it is disposed of; We have then particularized the manner in which the Circar cultivated ground in it was cultivated, and by whom, such of the Circar ground as was rented out for Sant Pans, the neat amount from the above lands collected, or that might have been collected by the renter, the amount of the fess received by him in the Village, also the amount of the Nattars privileges in the Village had they been allowed; and further we have inserted in this particular account of the Village of Amanetty the neat amount of the Juncus received by the renter that Village.

We have next set out a list of all the Inams in the Village, and shown the yearly amount of them received by the inamdars, and last of all we have inserted the Number of Houses and Looms described the condition of the Yaries, Tanks and water courses in the Village; mentioned the repairs wanted to any of them; what the repairs would amount to; and what benefit might be expected to be derived from such repairs.

4. It was out of our power to insert the quantity of cloth manufactured in each village, as on such account has ever been kept.

5. And that a general view may be had of the neat amount of this Farm for 1772, and of its capacity for Improvement, we have besides these separate village accounts made an abstract account, and in this account We have inserted the neat Revenue that was, or might have been collected by the Renter, and the neat amount received by the Inamdars, and Shontrumdars in each village and what would be the amount of the Nattars privileges if they were allowed the number of Houses and Looms in each village: also the repairs necessary to be made to the Yaries, Tanks and water courses in each Village: the expence of those repairs; and the advantage that may be derived from

making them; We have likewise added the neat amount of Juncans received by the renter; the neat amount of Juncans received by the Polygar; and the neat amount of fees received by Individuals on articles upon which the Juncans are collected in the whole Farm.

6. It will here be necessary to assign the reason why in the explanation we have above given of each Village account, we have made use of the expression the neat amount collected or that might have been collected by the Renter from the cultivated ground. It is because notwithstanding the privileges of the Nattars were ordered to be abolished in the beginning of 1788, the enjoyment of their Inam Lands in each village, as also the extraordinary allowance made to them on all the lands they themselves have cultivated in each village as part of those privileges, have from that time to this as we are informed, been allowed them. But as those Village accounts are intended to shew what should have been the just neat Revenue from each Village, and as it was the fault of the Renter for allowing the Nattars any part of their privileges after the whole had been ordered to be abolished, we had those parts of their privileges struck out; and added their Inam Lands to the quantity of Circar ground cultivated by them in each village and have calculated their allowance on this ground in the same proportion as what was allowed to the Husbandmen called Oucudies, in which light they should only have been considered. By our having done so, it is obvious what we have wrote down to be the neat Revenue of each village, is more than what the Renter collected: we have therefore called it the neat Revenue collected or that might have been collected by the Renter; but what would have been the amount of those privileges to the Nattars had they been allowed by us we have inserted, at the foot of each Village account.

7. As a distinct knowledge of this Farm, the method hitherto followed for the management of it, and the nature of its Revenue, is further necessary for the fully comprehending the accounts we have sent for 1779 as well as for furnishing a foundation for making any new Regulations, we shall endeavour to give this information with the utmost brevity. We shall then conclude with making such Remarks on the whole as may appear necessary.

8. This Farm was given to the Company by the present Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn in the year 1749; it formerly contained 32 Villages but now only 30, two of the Villages by name Cootavakum and Vadagumbum having long since been gone to decay; but the lands of Cootavakum are now and have as it is said been immemorially held as Inam lands by some Bramins, who have hitherto had the management of these lands themselves without making any render of Rent for them either in Specie or Grain by Government; the appointment of village servants which now subsists to these lands, was originally made it is said by the Country Government, and that it cannot now be abolished or the particular Persons of which it at present consists be turned out at their different employes or their privileges destroyed by the Bramins, neither can they annul some small Grants on these lands for charitable uses made by the Country Government previous to their obtaining this Inam: they are likewise it is said obliged to allow the husbandman employed in the cultivation of the lands, the same share of the produce as what was originally settled by the Country Government for the share of Husbandmen in all the other villages of this Farm: the neat amount of these lands will be seen under the Head of Village of Cootavakum.

9. Five other of the villages by name Ponniancoopang, Pillaly, Mavay ponam, Joomarapetta and Vettucolum have been immemorially held it is said as a Choutrum by the present Polygar and his ancestors; as the mention of a Choutrum will not occur again we shall here explain what is meant by it; it is said to be a gift of land to a man and his Heirs, upon which an annual rent is reserved by Government to be paid in Specie by the Choutrumdar or holder of it, which rent is fixed and invariable, and is always said to be less than the supposed yearly value of the land; besides the payment of this rent, Government generally imposes some personal services to be performed by the Choutrumdar; the present Polygar and his ancestors have therefore hitherto had the whole management of these villages, on their paying to Government Ps. 250 annually for the rent of the whole of them, and on performing certain personal services, which services will be hereafter explained under the head of Polygar.

10. The appointment of village servants to these villages, was originally made it is said by the Country Government, and that it cannot now be abolished or the particular persons of which it now

consists be turned out of their different employes or their privileges destroyed by the present Polygar; neither can he annul some small Inam lands in this Choutrum, given by Government to certain Persons it is said previous to the grant made to his ancestors for the holding of this Choutrum: he can likewise it is said grant whatever Inams out of these villages he thinks proper. He is likewise obliged to allow the husbandmen employed in cultivating the lands of these villages the same share of their produce as what was originally settled by the Country Government for the share of the Husbandmen in all the other villages of this Farm; he must also follow the same rule for the collecting of the Fees in them as what was originally established by the Country Government. The neat amount of these villages will be seen under the head of villages held by the Polygar as a Choutrum.

11. The remaining 25 villages and the lands of Vadagumbum Village which we shall for the sake of brevity consider as a village making in all 26 villages, are those only under the immediate management of Government, and from which the Company's Revenue in the Farm wholly arises except the 250 Pagodas paid by the Polygar for his Choutrum.

12. The mode followed for the managing of these villages since the Company have had possession of this Farm, has with little variation been the same as what had been before established and pursued by the Country Government; the Revenue arising from them since has been of the same nature consisting of what arises from the cultivated lands, from lands rented out for Salt Pans from Fees and from Juncans; the same privileges since have been considered to be the due of the different husbandmen on the lands cultivated by them except to those husbandmen formerly called Nattars; the same Rule since has likewise been observed for collecting the Fees and Juncans and the Inam lands in these Villages are nearly the same in quantity as when the Company received possession of this Farm. What Inam lands have since been given in them, as well as by whom the other Inam lands in them were said to be given previous to the Company's having possession of this Farm will be seen in the particular account of Inams we have made to each village.

13. Having promised thus much; what relates to the management of these 26 villages and the nature of their Revenue; the established share of the different husbandmen on the lands they cultivate in these 26 villages, as well as in the other villages of this Farm, the nature of the Inam lands in all the Farm and how far the duty of the Polygar and 4 Watchers extends to the care of the whole Farm we shall explain under the following Heads viz.

Amuldar & Renter.	Husbandman Nattars subjoined.
Polygar & 4 Watchers.	Juncans.

AMULDAR AND RENTER.

AMULDAR.

14. The Amuldar was the Circar superintendent in the 26 Villages—a Person who transacted the business of Government in them and who collected the Government's share of the Revenue in the whole Farm; his Office was not hereditary but only during pleasure, and he had no other allowance made to him but an annual stipend, which was paid him by the Circar; under him were placed the Polygar and 4 watchers, also all the village servants in those 26 villages he had likewise allowed him by the Circar, (with an annual allowance for each of them) Tuffdars and private Conicopies the former to act as his Deputies in those villages, and the latter to keep for him the counterpart of the accounts of those village Conicopies.

15. The other particulars of the Amuldar's duty were to have a general survey made of all the lands in those 26 villages, and to settle the best method for improving and cultivating them which latter duty he usually performed by the advice of the Nattars, to survey likewise the Yaries, Tanks, and water courses, and if any considerable repairs should be found wanting to any of them he was to make those repairs at the expense of the Circar—but if the repairs wanted were only trifling he might oblige the Nattars and other husbandmen of those villages that were benefitted by the water, to send a number of coolies assessed by himself, with baskets and mamatteys to work at those repairs, but he was to pay batta to those coolies on account of the Circar, to advance the Circar's money when necessary to the different husbandmen towards en-

abling them to cultivate the lands. He had authority to settle all disputes between the husbandmen, as well as the other Inhabitants and had likewise the power of using compulsory methods with such of the husbandmen as were negligent in cultivating the lands as well as with those who were indebted to the Circar to oblige the former to be more diligent and the latter to discharge their debts.

RENTER.

16. The Renter is a person authorized by Government, to collect and receive on his own account the Government's share of the revenue of the Farm for a limited time, on his performing during that time certain conditions prescribed to him by Government. He is therefore during his Rentership supposed to be invested with the same power as an Amuldar; it is therefore obvious that the Offices of Renter and Amuldar cannot subsist at the same time.

POLYGAR AND 4 WATCHERS.

17. The Offices of the Polygar and 4 Watchers extend throughout the Farm; they are said to be hereditary offices as well as the privileges annexed to them, and that the present Polygar and 4 Watchers are the descendants of those persons primarily appointed to these offices by the Country Government. The duty of the Polygar is now, and is said immemorially to have been to appoint Taliars to watch in 26 villages of the Farm both by night and by Day at his own expense, for to prevent any of the Inhabitants as well as strangers from being robbed; and in case any person is robbed within the precincts of the 26 villages, he is to make good his loss to him, unless he apprehends the thief; one month before the paddy and small grain is fit for cutting in these villages, he is to provide Taliars to watch it, as also after it is cut and lies in the fields; and if any of it is stolen he is to make it good to the cultivator. He is to take care of all thieves that are apprehended in these villages, he is to prevent the husbandmen from quitting the villages themselves, or from driving away their working cattle, and from carrying away their instruments of husbandry. In case an Invasion is apprehended from a Foreign Enemy, he is to furnish if ordered by the Amuldar or Renter a body of Peons or Sibbendy to protect the whole Farm, for which charge of Sibbendy is paid besides his usual privileges.

18. His usual privileges are as follows. The five villages which he holds as a Chontrum he has likewise small Inam Lands in such other of the 26 villages of which he is the Polygar: the quantity of these Inam lands is particularized in the account of Inams we have given of each village; on all paddy and small grain lands cultivated in share in those 26 villages to which he appoints Taliars to watch he is allowed two bundles of grain supposed to contain to marcals, out of every 400 marcals produce, as soon as the grain is cut down in the field and before the Circar and Cultivators divide their share. On all paddy and small grain land cultivated for rent in these villages he is allowed 2 bundles of grain supposed to contain 2 marcals for every cawnee of such land. He is also allowed a fee or tax of 2 Fanams yearly on every loom in these villages, and he has allowed him besides $\frac{1}{3}$ part of the amount of the Juncans collected for the Government or the Company in the whole Farm, except on the amount of the Juncans collected in the village of Arriavetty, from which he receive no part.

19. The Villages in which the 4 Watchers now exercise their offices are 6 in Number and by name as follows. Viz.

20. The Duty of these 4 watchers in their respective villages is the same as the Polygars in the 26 villages, except that of raising the Sibbendy which duty is solely performed by the Polygar for the whole Farm.

21. Three of these watchers have likewise the same privileges, in their respective villages as what the Polygar has in his, but they receive no allowance on the Juncan; the fourth "the watcher of Arriavetty" has additional privileges in his village, consisting on some further allow-

ance of fees on Boutigues &c., and some fee on most articles on which Juncans are collected in the said village; these will be seen under the Heads of Fees and Juncans.

VILLAGE SERVANTS.

22. The offices of the village servants are said to be hereditary offices as well as the privileges annexed to them, and that the present village servants are the descendants of those persons primarily appointed by the Country Government; their number and the particular duty of each is as follows Viz.

1. POLYGAR.

23. Why he is here ranged as a village servant, the particular account given of his duty and privileges will shew.

2. ASTROLOGER BRAMINEY.

24. His duty is to tell the most lucky day to plough the ground, to sow the seed, to cut the grain, to repair tanks, yarries and water courses; his privileges are, on all those lands that are cultivated in share whether they be paddy or small grain lands to have one (1) measure of the grain in every 400 marcals of the produce; as soon as the grain is cut down and measured on small grain lands that are let out for rent to have one measure of grain from the produce of every cawnee of land; he has likewise some small Inam lands in the village as particularized in the accounts we have annexed of the Inams in each village.

3. VILLAGE CONICOPOLY.

25. His duty is to keep all the Public Accounts of the Village for the inspection of the Amuldar or Renter his privileges are to receive $\frac{1}{4}$ marcals of grain out of every 400 marcals of the produce on all paddy and small grain lands that are cultivated in share as soon as the grain is cut down and measured on all paddy and small grain lands that are let out for rent, to have 3 marcals of grain from the produce of every cawnee of land he has likewise some small Inam lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have annexed of the Inams of each village.

4 AND 5 CARPENTER AND SMITH.

26. Their business is to make all necessary Implements of Husbandry for the husbandmen who are to furnish them with wood and iron for the purpose: and they are to work them upon being allowed by such Husbandmen as employ them half a measure of rice per day. Their privileges are on all paddy and small grain lands that are cultivated in share to receive each one bundle of grain supposed to contain one marcal out of every 400 marcals as soon as the grain is cut down; on all paddy and small grain lands that are let out for rent, one marcal of grain from the produce of every cawnee of land; they have likewise each of them some small Inam lands in the village as particularized in the account we have annexed of the Inams of each village.

6. SHROFF.

27. His duty is to sort, and examine all the money that is paid by the Husbandmen for their rents, and he is likewise to keep it in his hands till it is demanded either by the renter or his Turphdar; his privileges in grain are the same as the Carpenter's and Smith's. He has likewise some small Inam lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

7. COLLECTOR OF MONEY.

28. His duty is to be assisting to the shroff; his privileges in grain are the same as the shroff's; he has also some small Inam Lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

8, 9, AND 10. TOATIES.

29. The duty of one of these is to measure all the lands, also to measure all the grain after it is trod out; his privileges are to receive $\frac{1}{4}$ of a marcal of paddy out of every 400 marcals on all lands that are cultivated in share, after the grain is trod out and measured; before the Circar and Cultivators divide their share on all lands that are cultivated for rent he is to receive $\frac{1}{4}$ of a marcal of grain from the produce of every cawnee; he has also some Inam lands as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

30. The duty of the 2nd Toaty is to make a proper distribution of water from the water courses to the different cultivators; his privileges are to receive $\frac{1}{2}$ a marcal of paddy out of every 400 marcals produce on all lands that are cultivated in share, before the Circar and Cultivators divided their share. On all lands that are let out for rent he is to receive $\frac{1}{2}$ a marcal of grain from the produce of every cawnee; he has likewise some small Inam lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

31. The duty of the 3rd Toaty is to superintend the dams made by the renter in the rivers; his privileges in grain are the same of the 2nd Toaty's; he has also some small Inam lands in the village, which are particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

11. WASHERMAN.

32. His duty is to wash the cloths for the husbandmen, for which each husbandman allows him two marcals of paddy yearly on their private account; his public privileges in grain are the same as the Toaty's that superintends the dams; he has also some small Inam lands in the village as particularized in the accounts we have given of the Inams of each village.

12. BARBER.

33. His duty is to shave the husbandmen; his private allowance from the husbandman is the same as the washerman's; his public privileges in grain are likewise the same; he has also some small Inam lands in the village which are particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

13. SNAKE DOCTOR.

34. His duty is to keep the village clear of snakes, and if any of the husbandmen should be bit by a snake, to give them Medicines. He is allowed some small Inam lands in the village by the Circar as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams in each village, but no privileges in grain, though the husbandmen allow him out of their own share of grain one Quarter of a marcal for every cawnee of paddy and small grain lands that they rent from the Circar.

14. POTMAKER.

35. His duty is to furnish the husbandmen with pots, for which he is allowed on their own private account some small consideration in grain; his public privileges on all lands cultivated in share to receive 1 marcal of grain out of every 400 marcals of the produce after it is measured and before the Circar and the Cultivators divide their share. On all lands that are cultivated for rent, he is to receive one marcal of grain from the produce of every cawnee; he has likewise some small Inam lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

15. SHOEMAKER.

36. His duty is to furnish the husbandmen with the leather they may be in want of for their Implements of husbandry and to make them sandals on both which accounts the husbandmen allow him some private consideration in grain. His public privileges are to receive $\frac{1}{4}$ of a marcal of grain out of every 400 marcals produce on all lands that are cultivated in share, after it is measured and before the Circar and Cultivators divide their share, but he has no public allowance on lands let out to rent; he has some small Inam lands in the village as particularized in the account of each village.

16. PLAYERS OF COUNTRY MUSIC.

37. The duty of the players of country music is to attend all religious shews and public ceremonies, for which service they are allowed $\frac{1}{4}$ of a measure of paddy out of every 400 marcals of the produce, and also some small Inam lands in the village, as particularized in the account we have given of the Inams of each village.

38. In addition to the above number of servants, which is the general appointment of each village, there is one more to the villages of Allapankum and Veerapermanullore called a MADAGA-MULLIER or a kind of Diver. His duty is to go into the yary, when it is filled with water, and to stop with clay and other things all openings and crannies, that may be in the bank of the yary, part of which without this precaution to strengthen it would be the conflux of water be carried into the water courses and stop them up. He is at the same time to block up with

indles of straw the doors of the yary to prevent the water unnecessarily passing out; and when necessity requires he is to remove these bundles of straw, and by the doors of the yary to give the passage to the water into the water courses. The public privileges of the diver of the village

Allapankum are, on all lands that are cultivated in share to have $\frac{1}{4}$ of a measure of grain out of every 400 marcals produce, after it is measured and before the Circar and Cultivators divide their share. On all lands cultivated for rent he is to have $\frac{1}{4}$ of a measure of grain from the produce of every cawnee. He has likewise 10 culies of paddy land as an Inam in the village. The public privileges of the diver of Veerapermanullore is only 10 culies of paddy land, which he enjoys as an Inam in that village.

39. Besides the abovementioned village servants appointed by the Circar there are in every village the male and female slaves of the husbandmen called Panacaras and Panacarcheys; these reform the manual labour of cultivating the lands and have the following established privileges; on all lands cultivated in share to receive amongst them 4 bundles of grain supposed to contain 16 marcals out of every 400 marcals produce, as soon as the grain is cut down on all lands cultivated for rent to receive amongst them 4 marcals of grain from the produce of every cawnee of land.

40. The undermentioned public servants are not considered nearly as village servants but they are placed here to prevent a further division of heads viz.

HAD CONICOPLY OR NAUTUCANACAN.

M. HATADY PEONS.

41. It is said they were originally appointed by the Circar and that their employs are hereditary; their duty and privileges are as follows.

EA CONICOPLY.

42. His duty is to attend at the Amuldar or Renter's Cutcherry and to make an abstract of him of all the accounts of the village conicopies; his privileges are some fees on goods passing and repassing through the Farm, as particularly explained under the head of Juncans, he has likewise some Inam lands in some of the villages, on account of which is given in the account of Inams in each village.

SHATADY PEONS.

43. Their duty is to attend the Amuldar or Renter and to carry such messages from him to different husbandmen, as he may think for the good of the public business; they are also to take care of such of the husbandmen, who are indebted to them as they may think proper to commit to their custody; they receive a monthly allowance from the Amuldar or Renter; and two of them which are considered as the head peons, have also small Inam lands in some of the villages which are particularized in the account Inams of the villages.

JOINT CHARGES.

44. Joint charges are deductions on the grain after it is cut down in the field, made before Government and cultivators divide their share of the produce on such lands as are cultivated in share; half these charges are allowed by Government and half by the cultivators of them; on lands cultivated for rent these charges are allowed wholly by the husbandmen who rents the land from the Amuldar or Renter.

45. These joint charges were originally fixed by the Government, as we are informed and are now fixed in every village to be 42 $\frac{1}{2}$ marcals or 10 collums and 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ marcals out of every 400 marcals or 100 collums produce of all lands cultivated in share; and 32 marcals or 8 collums every cawnee of land cultivated for rent, besides 2 Fanams in every pagoda on the amount of rent of the cawnee. On all lands cultivated in share 4 collums of these joint charges, is to be divided among the village servants, 4 collums to the Pannacaras and Pannacarachies, the male and female slaves of the husbandmen and the remaining 2 collums 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ marcals to the Pagodas of Avendipuram and Tremaniculy and three quarters of these joint charges are to be given with the straw, before the grain is trod out and one quarter of them after it is trod out and measured.—

the land cultivated for rent 4 collums of the joint charges is to be divided among the village servants 4 to the Pannacaras and Pannacarachies, and the 2 Fanams in every Pagoda on the

amount of the rent of the cawnee to the Pagodas of Tervendepooram and Termaniguly—the quarters of the amount of the grain to be given with the straw before the grain is trod out, and one quarter after the grain is trod out and measured.

HUSBANDMEN, NATTARS—*Subjoined.*

46. The husbandmen employed in the cultivation of the lands were immemorially as we are informed divided into three classes; the Nattars the Oulcudies and the Peracudies; the paddy Nattar as well as the privileges enjoyed by that class of husbandmen were ordered to be abolished in January 1768 by the President and Council, but we have hereto subjoined a *History of Nattars*, under which we have explained the particular privileges claimed by that class of Husbandmen; the class of Nattars then by the Order of 1768 sunk into the class of Oulcudies in which and that of the Peracudies, the whole of the husbandmen who cultivate the Circular lands are now comprised. The Oulcudies are those who have themselves as well as their ancestors constantly resided within the Farm; the Peracudies are those who are occasionally brought into the Farm to cultivate such lands as are unoccupied by the Oulcudies.

47. The Circular cultivated lands in the 26 villages from which the Company's revenue in the Farm principally arises, are divided into paddy lands and small grain lands; from the paddy land are occasionally taken some lands for Beetle gardens, which lands so occasionally taken it has been the constant usage to let out for an annual rent; from the small grain land are also occasionally taken some lands for the growth of Tobacco, chillies &c., which lands so occasionally taken it has likewise been ever usual to let out for an annual rent. The paddy lands are then divided into paddy lands cultivated in share, and paddy lands cultivated for rent; paddy lands cultivated in share are afterward subdivided into those that are watered by water courses from rivers, yaries, and tanks, and those watered by the use of peccotas from Wells. Paddy lands cultivated for rent are also subdivided into those upon which a rent is annually fixed, and into those upon which the annual rent has immemorially been fixed, and upon which fixed annual rent it has been the usage for many years past after the lands have been rented out to impose Taxes. The small grain lands have constantly been let out for rent, but the nature of the rents in the same manner those of the paddy lands are two fold some of the lands being let out for a rent which is annually fixed, and some upon which fixed rent has immemorially been fixed, and upon which fixed rent has been usual for many years past after the lands have been rented out to impose Taxes.

48. As it may appear very extraordinary why two modes of rent should be used, we will give the reasons assigned to us for the cause; the rents of all the paddy and small grain land cultivated for rent, immemorially had been fixed, and continued for a long time to be invariable but these fixed rents by the considerable increase of price in all sorts of grain for many years past, having been found to be less than the yearly value of those lands, the Amuldars under the country Government thought it proper that these fixed rents should be increased to the computed yearly value of those lands; and accordingly let out some of the lands at a rent annually fixed by themselves, and others at their immemorially fixed rent, and afterwards on seeing the crops on these lands, taxed the fixed rent in such proportion, as to make it equal to the full rent of the lands; they were obliged it is said to use this method of taxing the immemorially fixed rent because many of the husbandmen would not rent the lands from the first at their computed value for fear of losing by a bad crop, but those rather to take them at their immemorially fixed rent, which was much under their supposed value, and to have this rent taxed afterwards in proportion to the crops; by which method in case there should be little or no crops on the land they would lose less than if they were from the first to rent the lands at what they might be supposed to be worth.

49. In consequence of the beforementioned reasons since the Company have had possession of this Farm, the same usages for renting out the small grain lands, and such of the paddy lands as are cultivated for rent, have been considered as a rule by the renters.

50. Besides the Circular cultivated lands in each village, there are in some villages lands appropriated for the making of salt, which have been constantly let out for an annually fixed rent to any of the Inhabitants indifferently.

51. We shall now explain the settled rights or shares of the Oulcudies and Peracudies on the lands they cultivate; such lands for beetle gardens and such as are occasionally taken from the small grain lands for the growth of Tobacco &c., whether they be rented to the Oulcudies or Peracudies, the rent of them is neither more nor less on that account but neither of them pay any fees on the produce of these articles to the Polygar or village servants.

52. On all paddy and small grain lands the Oulcudies and Peracudies cultivate whether in share or for rent, they find the seed themselves, cultivate the grounds at their own expense, and after the crops on them are cut down, pay such joint charges on the crops and in such proportion as is mentioned under the head of joint charges; after the deduction of these joint charges from the crops of all the land cultivated in share, the remainder is considered as the produce, which is afterwards divided between the renter and the husbandmen. Having promised this, the Oulcudies on all paddy lands they cultivate in share that are watered by water courses from the rivers, yaries, and tanks are to receive 40 per cent on the produce, the Peracudies 45 per cent. On all paddy lands cultivated in share by the Oulcudies and Peracudies that are watered by the use of Pecotas from wells, they are to receive two thirds of the produce. Paddy lands and small grain lands cultivated for rent upon which the rent is annually fixed whether rented by the Oulcudies or Peracudies the rent of them is neither more nor less on that account, but such paddy lands and small grain lands cultivated for rent on which the rent has immemorially been fixed and upon which fixed rent, taxes are afterwards laid; there is some distinction, for on such of these lands as are cultivated by the Oulcudies the taxes laid on the immemorially fixed rent are in such proportion, as to make them amount with the fixed rent, to the full value of the rent of those lands; but on such of these lands as are cultivated by the Peracudies, twelve and a half (12½) per cent is deducted from the immemorially fixed rent, and the after taxes laid on the remainder, which taxes being in the same proportion as those laid upon the lands rented by the Oulcudies, these lands turn out to the Peracudies 12½ per cent. cheaper on the immemorially fixed rent, than what they do to the Oulcudies.

53. As this explanation we have given of the paddy and small grain lands cultivated for rent that are afterwards taxed and the distinction made in them when rented by the Oulcudies and Peracudies may be better illustrated by example, we beg leave to refer your Honour &c. to the village accounts, as in them both the immemorially fixed rents and the mode of taxing them is clearly set down.

54. The Peracudies as it has been before observed cultivate only such part of the land as are unoccupied by the Oulcudies; this reason and the expense they are at in bringing their oxen and implements of husbandry from distant parts, is why in some cases they enjoy superior privileges to the Oulcudies.

NATTARS.

55. "The original number of Nattars in this Farm it is said was only six, and that those persons who called themselves Nattars when the rights and privileges of the Nattars were ordered to be abolished in January 1768 by order of the President and Council were the descendants of those six. The rights and privileges claimed by these descendants were no other, as they now assert, than what had been uniformly enjoyed by the Nattars from their first Institution—what had been repeatedly confirmed to the Nattars by several Cowles from the Amuldars before this Farm came into the Company's possession and afterwards confirmed to them in a Cowle given by the Governor and Council of Fort St. Davids for the renting of this Farm dated in the year 1750 when Mr. Saunders was Governor, wherein it is said the Reddies meaning the Nattars should be allowed the duties on paddy grounds and the privileges they had always enjoyed; these rights and privileges and the services annexed to their enjoying of them are as follow. That they were the Tenants or Land holders of all the lands within the twenty six villages in this Farm from which as we have before observed the Company's revenue principally arises, except of the Inam Lands in them.

56. Not that these descendants were joint Tenants of all the lands, but the particular descendants of each of the original Nattars claimed the particular tenancy of particular villages; the des-

cendants of the first of the original Nattars of whom Kistna Reddy is now said to be the eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular tenancy of seven of the villages viz. Manamadavy Annavelly, Patchancopang, Chinnaganganamcopang, Murdaud, Wargalput and Kelasopang.

57. The descendants of the 2nd of whom Mylarumperoomal Pillay is now said to be the eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular Tenancy of seven of the villages viz. Allaganuthum, Cudecaud, Wottary, Trevendeeppuram, Arisheperiancopang, Carupedytundo and Arriavetty.

58. The descendants of the 3rd of the original Nattars of whom Vishvanadda Reddy is now said to be eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular tenancy of 7 of the villages viz. Tondamanottum, Allapaukum, Kamapooram, Tremaniculy, Vadagumbum, Pudupetta, and Tirtoriare.

59. The descendants of the 4th of the original Nattars of whom Datatry Reddy is now said to be eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular tenancy of two of the villages viz. Mundagaput and Nellatocr.

60. The descendants of the 5th of the original Nattars of whom Teanty Reddy is now said to be the eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular tenancy of two of the villages viz. Toataput and Sundaravandy.

61. The descendants of the 6th of the original Nattars of whom Chundashaira Reddy is now said to be the eldest male descendant claimed for themselves the particular Tenancy of one of the villages named Veerapermal Nellore.

62. And as being the tenants or land holders of all the lands except the Inam lands, the descendants of each of the original Nattars were entitled in those villages of which they were the particular Tenants or Landholders to receive the following proportion of the crops on all the lands in them cultivated in share, after the joint charges on them had been deducted; and the following allowances on all the lands in them let out for rent; on all paddy lands that are watered from the rivers, yaries and tanks and cultivated in share by themselves 50 per cent. On the same kind of lands cultivated in share by either the Oulcudies or Peracudies 10 per cent. On all Paddy lands that are watered by the use of Pecotás from wells cultivated in share by themselves, two thirds of the crops; but no proportion of the crops on those lands when cultivated by either the Oulcudies or Peracudies. On all paddy and small grain lands as well as those upon which the rent is annually fixed, as those upon which the annual rent has immemorially been fixed and afterwards taxed rented by themselves they were allowed 25 per cent. deduction in their rent, and on such of these lands as were rented by the Oulcudies and Peracudies they were allowed 10 per cent. on the amount of the rents—and on the same account of being land holders, the particular tenants of the several villages were entitled to mortgage any of the lands in those villages to the amounts of their privileges and the particular Tenants of those villages in which the Juncan places are were entitled to some Fees on all those Goods upon which Juncans are levied. Besides the before-mentioned privileges from being Landholders, the descendants of each Nattar claimed in the several villages of which they were the particular Tenants some Inam lands which they say had been immemorially enjoyed by their ancestors.

63. The services annexed to the enjoying of the above privileges were that the descendants of the six original Nattars should in the several villages of which they were the particular Tenants or Landholders use their utmost endeavours to have all the lands of the villages cultivated either by themselves or others, and should jointly with the other cultivators in them be at half the expense in keeping the water courses in good repair; also that the eldest male descendant of the six original Nattars in whose name alone for himself and the descendants from the same stock, every transaction with Government was carried on, should whenever required by the Amuldar or Renter attend him in his Cutcherry and inform him of the state of the several villages.

64. In the accounts We have furnished of the cultivated ground in each village, we have inserted under the head of husbandmen formerly the Nattars the particular quantity of ground and no more including their Inam lands, which we have before mentioned to have added to that particular quantity, but was ever cultivated by the Nattars themselves.

65. "We shall now take the liberty of inserting the Petition made to us by the descendants of the Nattars. They earnestly entreat we would represent to your honour &c. that they hope

on you the renewal of their ancient privileges, and urge in favour of it besides the cowle granted to them by the Amuldars of the country Government and the cowle given by Governor under and the Council of Fort St. Davids that those privileges are supported by immemorial age—the same foundation which now supports the privileges of other Nattars almost over the whole Carnatic, the same foundation which now supports other customs both here and in other parts of the country and gives them the force of law; that therefore the denying them the same benefit from a long established custom granted to others, or the requiring them to produce the original grants of those privileges they claimed (which was the case when their privileges were ordered to be abolished) was making so unfavourable an exception with regard to them as they humbly trust your future consideration will revoke, at least so far revoke as to grant them a renewal part of those privileges, the enjoyment of their Inam lands in each village, 50 Per Cent after a deduction of joint charges, on all lands in each village that are watered from the rivers, yaries and tanks cultivated in share by themselves, and 25 Per Cent deduction in the rents of all the lands in each village rented by themselves neither of which privileges as we are informed Moodukistna late renter deprived them of, nor the present renter to this time has deprived them of, notwithstanding the order of 1768. "What these privileges will amount to in each village, we have inserted at the foot of each village account.

JUNCANS.

66. Juncans are customs levied on goods that are brought in and carried out of the Farm as well as upon those that only pass through it. Eight places have been immemorially established for the collecting of all the Juncans of this Farm viz. Arriavetty, Sharady, Ramapooram, Padrycopang, Comerapuram, Toutapat, Cuddalore River side, and Tremaniculy, but the rate of the Juncans levied in those 8 places is not the same, less being paid at Arriavetty and Tremaniculy, and at the other six places, and the Juncans paid at Arriavetty are still lower than those paid at Tremaniculy. The reasons assigned for this are that in Porto Novo to which Arriavetty joins a Nabob's people levy Juncans, as also at Tremaniculy, but that the Juncans levied in Porto Novo are higher than those levied by the Nabob's people at Tremaniculy.

67. The Juncans are collected by Conicopies appointed by the renter, but the amount of one collected in Arriavetty village, are carried by the renter to the amount of that village, and is not added to the amount of Juncans collected at the other 7 places. One Eighth part of the amount of the Juncans collected in the Farm for the Government is paid to the Polygar except on the amount the Juncans collected in Arriavetty village from which he receives no part. At Sharady, Ramapooram, Padrycopang, Comerapuram, Toutapat and Cuddalore River side, some merchants pay the Juncans on their goods than what other merchants do, which indulgence is said to be shown to them on account of the large quantity of goods they both bring in and carry out of the Farm by the Juncan places. On most of goods on which Government levies a Juncan at each of the 8 Juncan places, fees are likewise paid on them to some Individuals, which fees are collected by the renter's Conicopies, and paid by the renter to the Individuals; the rate for collecting the Juncans well as the Fees at the Eight Juncan places, likewise to what Individuals the fees are paid, and the merchants who pay less Juncans than others at 6 of the Juncan places are as follow.

68. At the Juncans places of Sharady, Ramapooram, Padrycopang, Comerapuram, Toutapat and Cuddalore River side on the following articles Sandalwood, Broad cloth of all sorts, nutmegs, mace, cloves, Lead, Tin, Tuthenagur, Washing stuff, Mahmoties, Iron, Steel, Beetle Nuts, Turmeric, Long pepper, Pepper, Chillies, Saffron, Copper, Musk, Ginger, Garlic, Quinter seeds, Chayroot, Jagary, gar, Salt petre, Physic salt, Brimstone, Hing, Mustard seeds, Mint seeds, Common seeds, Garlinger, a single ox load or for a single man's load the Juncan is fee. 3-25, and the fees to Individuals 1-55 the individuals to whom the fees are paid are as follows.

70. The Calicoes brought in by the merchants for the Company by these Juncan places pay neither Juncans, nor Fees.

71. Indigo and Tobacco for a single ox load the Juncan is fs. 7-70, and the fees to the Individuals is fs. 3-30; the Individuals are the same as beforementioned, and their shares are in proportion to the above rates.

72. Ganjeo or bang for a single ox load the Juncan is fs. 16-50, and the fees to the Individuals are fs. 3-30, the Individuals the same as above and their shares are in proportion to the above rates.

73. Gingelee and lamp Oil seeds, Horse Gram, Cotton seeds, Sanigalo, Wheat, Amoun, Callivances, green, black, and red Gram, Indigo seeds and Jayara seeds for a single ox load or man's load the Juncan is fs. 2-49 and the fees to Individuals are fs. 1-55, the Individuals are the same as beforementioned and their shares in proportion to the above rates.

74. Warago without husk and Rice, for every single ox load and for every single man's load the Juncan is fs. 1-73, and the fees to Individuals 1-27 the Individuals are the same as beforementioned and their shares are in proportion to the above rates.

75. Paddy, Combo, Warago, with husk Natcheny, Shama, Cholum, Tona and Caudamny every single ox load and for every single man's load the Juncan is fs. 1-6, and the fees to the Individuals Ca. 69- but for 110 small oxen load of any of the above grain the Juncan is 29-20, and the fees to Individuals fs. 35-60.

76. Coconuts, Jagary balls, Plantains Limes and Jacks for every single ox load the Juncan is fs. 2-24, and the fees to Individuals fs. 1-56.

77. Beetle leaves for every single ox load the Juncan is fs. 2 and the fees to Individuals fs. 1-56.

The Individuals who receive fee on all these articles are the same as mentioned in the foregoing list, and their shares are in proportion to the rates there specified:—

INAMS.

The Inam lands in this Farm signify in general we are told such lands as the use and possession of which have been given by Government to certain persons, therefore called Inamdars to be enjoyed by themselves and their descendants without making any render of rent for them to Government either in specie or grain; but the tenure of them is different, some being no more than allegiance to, and praying for the success of Government; others personal services from the Inamdar of the latter sort are all the Inams granted to the village servants and other public servants of the Farm; and the remainder of the Inams are included in the former but on the crops of all the Inam lands in general such joint charges must be allowed by the several Inamdars, as is allowed by Government on other cultivated lands.

REMARKS.

The first remark we shall make is that though the ground in all the Villages is divided in Cawnies and Culies, the measure of the Cawnee and Culie in most of the Villages is every different the reason assigned for this is, that the Villages were taken from different Perganas or Districts in each of which the measure of the Cawnee and Culie differed; and as there was no order at this Farm was formed or made up for reducing the Cawnee and Culie in all the Villages to the same standard the Villages taken from the different Districts have hitherto preserved the same Rule for the measure of the Cawnee and Culie as what was observed in the particular District from which they were taken; we therefore take the liberty of recommending that a standard should be fixed for the measure of the Cawnee and Culie in all the Villages.

The second remark is that as an accurate Survey and measurement of all the lands in the Farm by some proper person will afford more certainty about them than the accounts we have now taken from the Village and Renters' Conjeevrees and transmitted to your Honour &c. we would recommend such a Survey and measurement to be made which done, as private claims on the lands should be publicly annulled or confirmed, we would recommend that your Honour &c. would annul or confirm the claims of the Choutrumdars and several Inamdars on the lands by some written Instruments, and direct that in future no grant of land to any individual should be deemed valid, but what was expressed to him in writing, and the grant of it sealed with the Company's Seal.—and as the necessity of some regularly confirmed system for the conducting of this Farm is obvious, that those who are entrusted with the management may know what they have to do, and the people residing in it what they have to expect, we would recommend that your Honour &c. would be pleased either to confirm what is said to be, and we have mentioned to be the system hitherto used or that you would be pleased to make such alterations and additions to it, as you may think necessary.

The third remark is that we observe in January 1763 when the President and Co. ordered that the privileges of the Nattars should be abolished; they ordered likewise at the same time that all the lands should be let out to the husbandmen by the renter for an annual rent to be paid to him in specie, the same as practised in the Cuddalore Bounds, but though this latter order was made known by the Chief and Council here to the then Renter Moodukistnapillai and was published by them in the Trevenduporam Farm by beat of Tom Tom, yet neither in Moodukistnapillai's Rentership nor till this time in the present Renter's has this order been complied with.

As the enforcing of this order cannot we think without great detriment to the Farm take place till the expiration of the rentership of the present Renter your Honour &c. will be pleased to determine, whether it shall then be included as part of that system we have recommended to be established, and the execution of it enforced by us.

As soon as we have finished our Enquiries concerning the other Farms, we shall send you the accounts of them. We are with respect.
