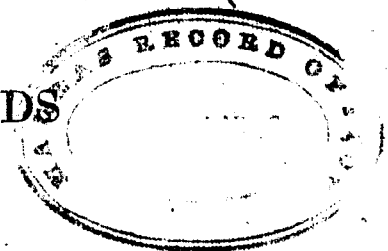

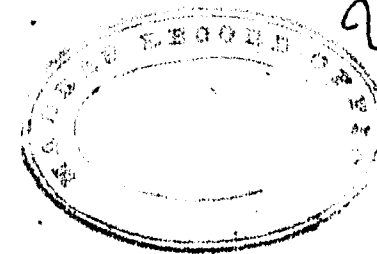

TO THE CHIEF SECRETARY TO GOVERNMENT.

SIR,

I have the honor under instructions from the Medical Board, to forward the enclosed returns of sick treated in the Dispensaries throughout the provinces, and in the several civil institutions at the Presidency during the year 1855, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor in Council, and for transmission to the Honorable the Court of Directors.

2. Throughout the greater part of the peninsula food has been scarce, and the prices of the several grains considerably above the usual rates, yet it is satisfactory to point out, that for the most part, there has been but little epidemic disease; many districts have enjoyed a great immunity from such disease, in those marginally noted, not a single case of cholera appears in the returns, and the public health otherwise has been good. This immunity from epidemic disease in a season otherwise favourable for its appearance may in part perhaps be attributable to public works now being carried on of a very extensive nature, giving employment to thousands who would otherwise have felt severely, and must have suffered in many instances from the want of food.

3. The increase in the number of applicants shewn in the accompanying returns over those of the preceding year, has not been occasioned by the prevalence of any unusual or epidemic disease, but is solely attributable in the opinion of the Board, to these institutions becoming more and more appreciated by the native community, who apply for aid more readily and in greater numbers than formerly. The total number treated has been 184,069, viz. 10,744 in-patients, and 173,325 out-patients, giving an increase of 22,855 above the number treated during 1854.

4. A perusal of the extracts from the several dispensary reports appended, will shew Government satisfactorily, the high estimation in which these institutions continue to be held by the native community generally, and that their utility is daily increasing. The beneficial influence exerted by these institutions is not to be estimated simply, by numerical returns: in many instances relief has been obtained and health restored long after they had been given over as hopeless by their own hakeems, and cases of disease, peculiar in their nature and of great severity have frequently been brought to our dispensaries by patients who had themselves experienced the advantages of European medical and surgical aid; thus extending the influence of the governing class over that of the governed, elevating it in their estimation, and undermining it is to be hoped, many of the native prejudices as well of caste as of education.

5. The following table exhibits in a small compass the working of each dispensary, not only during the year, but for the previous twelve years. In 1843, only eight dispensaries were in operation, two at the Presidency, and six at out-stations. At the latter, the number of applicants were few compared with the multitudes who now present at one and all of these dispensaries. In 1843 at Masulipatam the number treated was only 268, while in 1855, no fewer than 7,694 applied for medical aid. At the Vellore Dispensary opened only last year, not less than 6,852 applicants presented in 1855, while in the whole number of dispensaries, including those not yet fully established, Mailiapooram, Ootacamund and Tellicherry, the average number of patients treated at each dispensary, has been 5,259. In the last column of the following tabular view, the expense incurred for each dispensary during the year is entered, from which it will be seen, that the cost of the whole has been Rupees(62,990-15-2) sixty two thousand nine hundred and ninety, annas fifteen and pice two, an increase of Rupees 10,341-11-10 above the expenditure of the previous year; the average cost for each patient has been 5 annas and 6 pice.

7. It may be interesting to exhibit here another view of the working of the Dispensaries,—bearing upon the relative proportion of female to male applicants for medical aid amongst the various classes of the population, Europeans, Eurasians, Hindoos and Mahomedans. The female population of many hindoo castes, but especially those of the mahomedan creed, live peculiarly secluded, and might have been expected scarcely to appear amongst the applicants for relief at the dispensaries; yet it will be observed that even as in-patients the ratio of mahomedan female to male patients is not less than 47 per cent, and as out-patients, the ratio of female patients is nearly 34 per cent. Amongst the hindoo population, the per centage of female to male sick, is nearly 46 as in-patients, and 37, as out-patients; while the general total of in and out patients, gives a ratio of fully 38 per cent of female applicants for hospital relief, so that in this respect, the prejudice even of the female part of the population against European medicine is generally subsiding.

8. After carefully reviewing the working of the various dispensaries it gives the Board much satisfaction to have to report in the most favorable terms as to the faithful manner in which the important duties of one and all have been conducted during the year by the medical officers in charge; the Board would especially bring those marginally named

to notice. The medical subordinates attached to these institutions, with scarcely an exception have fulfilled their duties to the entire satisfaction of their immediate superiors; several deserve to be especially noticed, not only for the punctual and assiduous discharge

of duty but for the marked improvement in professional attainments they have evinced. 2nd Dresser Nery No. 118 attached to the Calicut dispensary, and now promoted to

1st Dresser, and seven others. These subordinates and others have not only given valuable assistance in the treatment of

disease, but have occasionally performed successfully, some of the more important and capital operations in surgery.

9. The most prevalent forms of disease treated in the dispensaries have been fevers, bowel complaints, rheumatism, abscesses and ulcers, venereal complaints and cutaneous diseases, and the most fatal, diseases of the bowels, dropsies, and eruptive fevers. The ratio of mortality in the latter has been $32\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and in dropsies, nearly 24. Of the total deaths from small pox 112, no fewer than 106 are recorded to have occurred in the dispensary at Cochin, at which place, this disease was prevalent for a considerable portion of the year. The daily number of sick under treatment in all the Dispensaries during the year has averaged 3,132, viz. 692 in-patients and 2,440 out-patients.

10. Amongst the civil institutions at the Presidency, there is not much of importance to bring specially to the notice of Government. Considering the high price of food, the Presidency has been comparatively healthy, and more free from epidemic disease than could have been expected. The railway and other public works have given employment to the labouring poor to a much greater extent than usual, and in this way, the evils attendant upon scarcity of food and high price of provisions have been greatly alleviated. In a few localities only has disease

of an epidemic nature prevailed. Cholera existed in some parts of Black Town and in Royapooram, in New Town and other crowded parts at the back of Vepery and also in Triplicane, but to no great extent.

General Hospital.

In the General Hospital, the admissions have been somewhat above those of the previous year, but the mortality has been less by nearly 4 per cent as noted marginally.

Leper Hospital.

11. In the Leper hospital, the oil of the choulmogree or *nuride mootoo*, and the nut itself have been extensively employed internally and as an external application in the treatment of the disease, without the slightest benefit; perfect cleanliness and good food have been as heretofore more beneficial than any particular course of medicine, for of all the medicines hitherto employed, not one has been found to be possessed of any specific curative properties in this disease. In the fatal cases 29 in number, diarrhoea, atrophy and dropsy were the immediate causes of death; in one an attack of cholera supervened and ended fatally.

The Native Infirmary has afforded much relief to the sick poor of Black Town, the number treated has been nearly the same as in the preceding year. vide margin, and of the casualties, 284 the surgeon in charge observes, not less than 211 resulted from diarrhoea, atrophy, dropsies and old age—45 admissions appear under the head cholera of which 34 died, or 75½ per cent.

13. In the Idiot asylum attached to the Native infirmary there remained at the close of 1854 forty men and twenty-two women, many of the fresh admissions were in a greatly reduced state of bodily health, and this will account for the great mortality which has occurred in the institution, no fewer than 41 of the number transferred sick having died, the immediate cause of death in most instances was either atrophy or diarrhoea, or both combined.

14. Surgeon Porteous the medical officer in charge observes, that "great credit is due to the Superintendent for the high state of cleanliness in which this establishment is kept, and for the order and regularity that prevails."

House of Industry.

15. In the House of Industry, with the exception of a few cases of cholera, no other disease of importance would appear to have occurred; the actual number of inmates during the year was 253, from which number 166 were admitted to the sick ward, and 7 died, 4 of the latter from cholera; the ratio of sick to strength has been 65.5, and of death 2.7 per cent. and exclusive of cholera 1.1 per cent.

Male Asylum.

16. Compared with the preceding year, the returns of the Male Asylum for 1855 exhibit a limited amount of sickness; the admissions being less by 465; only 280 admissions have been recorded, while in the four previous years, the annual average number admitted was 649. Surgeon Sanderson the medical officer in charge observes, that even to the casual observer, a decidedly improved state of health is apparent amongst the boys generally, and this is attributed to the able superintendence and management that now exists, and by a continuance of the same a still greater development of constitutional tone will result. Only 2 deaths have occurred from an average strength of 245, or 0.8 per cent. One of the casualties resulted from cholera, a solitary case; febrile disease and bowel complaints have abated considerably. In the preceding year, there were 160 admissions from fever and measles, and 41 of bowel complaints, while 95 of the former, and only 30 of the latter appear in the present returns. The admissions from ophthalmic disease have greatly abated, the number under this head being 80, scarcely a fifth part of the admissions in the previous year—viz. 410; moreover the affection in almost every instance has been of a milder form and more readily amenable to treatment; and the medical officer in charge observes, that in no case has any permanent bad effect been sustained by the organ; average duration of treatment in the 80 cases only 4 days; relapses also have been much less frequent than formerly, 10 were admitted twice, 3 three times and 1 four times.

Female Asylum.

17. In the Female Asylum, sickness has prevailed to an unusual extent, no fewer than 517 admissions into hospital having been recorded during the year, from an average strength of 218, the casualties however

have been few, only 2; the daily sick has averaged 20, more than double the amount of sickness in the Male Asylum, the average daily sick in which was only 8. Surgeon Kellic the medical officer in charge observes, that fever prevailed to a considerable extent; the admissions under this head being 109 (last year only 70) two of which proved fatal. The great increase however in the sick list has been chiefly occasioned by cutaneous diseases; psora which had almost disappeared from the Asylum broke out with great virulence in January, and extended itself amongst the inmates, no fewer than 293 having been admitted with this complaint.

18. This unusual circumstance the medical officer observes, seemed to depend mainly upon change in diet of the girls which had been made a short time before, and whereby their constitutions had become considerably impaired; for, on the dietary of the institution being improved, the disease rapidly disappeared. It is further added, "the general health and appearance of the girls, which from the cause alluded to had fallen off, have now much improved, but it required the free use of fish liver oil, steel and tannic acid in addition to generous diet, to restore them to their former state of health." The diet now is stated to be unexceptionable, and great attention is paid to the exercise and recreation of the girls, and every thing is done by the Superintendent of the institution to secure health and check incipient disease.

These numbers shew an increase of 52 out patients; the year was a healthy one contrasted with the two former. The applicants from Cowle Bazaar are few, as they have always been, owing to the distance; a branch hospital is needed there, but although the inhabitants memorialized for one in 1854. I am not aware that they offered to aid in its establishment as now required by Government."

"The number that ceased to attend was 77.4 per cent of patients. Last year 82.4 per cent; in this respect there is much improvement, for in 1851 there ceased to attend 148.15 per cent of patients."

"There have been 18 operations performed (A Table appended) not reckoning many minor ones--9 were done by the medical subordinates. There is nothing particular to notice in reference to them. Among the polypus nasi, there was one of great size descending into the left posterior nares, where it was with much difficulty secured and the only instrument of size and strength to twist it off was a bullet forceps."

"The decrease in the year's registration arises from the general healthiness of the season; 2nd, the families of the warrant officers of the ordnance and commissariat departments who were attended, and received their medicines from the dispensary being transferred to the medical charge of the assistant garrison surgeon; these numbered 3 or 4 daily which would give an annual decrease of 1640; 3rd, the admissions into the choultry have also decreased by 15,901 diets in the course of the year which also would have an influence on the dispensary."

"1st Dresser Vencatachellum No. 57 attached, has had most extensive practical experience, and is a very praiseworthy, and valuable subordinate evincing the greatest interest in his duty."

"The surgical operations as must invariably be the case among out-patients, have been of a minor nature, still not the less conducive to their comfort and health."

"I am happy to be able to report favorably of the working of this institution and to call attention to the accompanying returns as one proof of the estimation in which this charity is held by the inhabitants of the town and district. Last year I had to report a decrease of 158 as compared with the previous year, I have now to report a large increase viz. of 1,655 out-patients admitted during 1855, over the preceding year. The average daily attendance during the year has been 95½."

"Amongst the applicants for relief as out-patients many of the better caste people may be daily seen, as well as many of the respectable and wealthier classes, who are in no ways deterred from coming for relief, because they have to wait their turn with their poorer brethren to be attended to."

"The commissariat charges have been large during the past year, viz. Rupees 305-13-7 in excess of the previous one. No extra articles of diet have been ordered during the year, but purdahs, screens and weights have been supplied by the commissariat and many patients required full diet while the price of rice has been for a great part of the twelve months higher than last year."

"There is a class of diseases, viz. of the eye which will be observed as having been very prevalent last year—405 cases having been admitted, whereas there were only 19 in 1854. The cases chiefly prevailed amongst the mookwals (or fishermen) and a few amongst the moplas, and are I think fairly to be attributed to the filthy state in which these people

live, almost never washing themselves; amongst the fishermen (who are proverbially dirty) other exciting causes of ophthalmia exist, viz. the constant exposure to the reflection of the sun's rays from the water, and the spray of salt water never washed off. There were no less than 259 cases of ophthalmia chiefly in a chronic state complicated with ulcers on the cornea, nebulae, granular lids; chronic cornetitis with entropion was a very common form which presented; many cases of cataract; a few cases cured brought out nearly half the fishing village, and the extent of diseases of the eye amongst them was very great indeed, scarcely one that had not lost the vision of one eye was to be observed.

"For very many cases nothing could be done, disease having been neglected and allowed to take its course, total disorganization had ensued, but 256 were cured, 102 relieved and 17 remain under treatment. A cataract case of instruments having been received, several who have cataract in one or both eyes will be operated upon.

"As I remarked in my last annual report wounding is now not nearly so common as in former years, but there is one case requiring a remark being a casualty under the head vulnus incisum; a Tier aged 32; was admitted 16th April 1855, with a wound of the thorax; he was stabbed with a knife on the left side, the point of the weapon had struck the 8th rib about the centre and glancing downwards and inwards penetrated the cavity of the thorax, a great deal of blood was said to have been lost; the lung was collapsed, breathing labored and every symptom of the admission of air into the cavity but nothing more, the wound could not be got to close; two days before he died a large quantity of a yellow and peculiarly fetid fluid mixed with flakes of yellow lymph made its escape at the wound, the day before he died grains of rice were found at its orifice; he sunk and died May 2d. On examination, the wound was discovered to have penetrated the cavity of the thorax, diaphragm and stomach near its cardiac extremity and a large quantity of the contents of the stomach, rice &c. was found lying upon the left lung and pericardium. Under such circumstances the wonder is how he existed so long as 16 days after the infliction of the wound."

Several cases of more or less interest have been treated during the year under report amongst which I may mention that of a young man brought to hospital from the distance of 14 miles on the evening of the 14th March last having two days previously while shooting pigs had the misfortune to shatter the left hand by the bursting of his fowling piece; the whole hand was blown to pieces, the thumb only remaining hanging by its tendons, the wrist joint was opened and the ends of the bones ex-

posed. He was put perfectly under the effects of chloroform by one drachm and 40 drops of the drug; the limb was removed two inches above the joint by 2d Dresser Nery and the patient discharged well on the 26th April 1855.

I think I have nothing further to say of much interest or worthy of remark here, but would in conclusion as in former years, respectfully bring to the favorable notice of the Medical Board the estimation in which I hold the services of my subordinate at this institution, 2d Dresser C. D. R. Nery No. 118; very much of the credit which this charity has now obtained amongst the natives here, I have no hesitation in stating is due to the kindness shewn them on all occasions by the Dresser as well as to his close and unremitting attention to all classes of them in their hour of need. His professional capabilities are already well known to the Board and I have implicit confidence in him."

"The only epidemic that has prevailed in this town during the past year has been cholera, which remained from the previous year, and continued in a mild degree until March, when it disappeared; in the end of September the disease again broke out in a neighbouring village, having been brought by pilgrims, who were on their way through from Jugger-naut to the south; on the last occasion the disease was not very severe, and soon subsided, only a few isolated cases occurring here and there at intervals in the adjoining villages; there was no reason to suppose it was influenced either in its origin or progress by atmospheric changes."

"Small pox is reported to have existed more or less in the talooks of Wadadah, Tekelly and Kimeddy up to July last, but no case came under my notice, and I am not aware of any case having occurred in this town during the past year."

"Diarrhoea of a choleraic character prevailed to some extent in the beginning of the year, during the existence of cholera, and after its subsidence, which generally yielded to cretaceous mixture with soda sesquicarb: and astringents, or to dilute sulphuric acid and laudanum."

"During the past year the civil dispensary here has undergone thorough repair. A new female ward has been built, and the centre room in the old building, as well as the surgery have been enlarged; in the surgery, and the receiving room, glass windows have been put in, which were much needed."

"The continued progress of this charitable institution is gratifying and shews that the population appreciate the benevolent intentions of Government of which they gladly avail themselves. That European treatment combined with the kind and skilful attention of the Dresser in charge and a suitable and liberal diet, are advantages practically felt to be a blessing by the poor people—their continued and increasing resort to the institution, in slight, as well as in emergent and even hopeless cases, is the best guarantee."

It is also to be remarked that many of the higher native civil servants attached to the court, avail themselves of the benefits afforded by this establishment, either personally or for their families frequently and very naturally applying to the dresser, when from any feeling of delicacy, or a fear of operative means, they do not wish to consult me."

"It is my pleasing duty again to speak favorably of the praiseworthy exertions of 2d Dresser Namasevoven, who continues to give me every satisfaction, and is so far as I am able to judge gaining the esteem of the native population. Impressed as I am, that much of the practical work

ing of these institutions is dependent upon the kindness, affability, and skill of the Dressers, and their endeavour to conciliate and meet the wishes of the poor and often very ignorant though trusting people, who confide their lives and limbs to our care. I conceive it just to avail myself of these yearly opportunities for encouragement to continued and increased exertion. While every thing that would shock the prejudices of caste or otherwise of the poor people who resort to us is carefully avoided, I afford them the full benefit of the liberal dietary allowance of Government and when judged requisite from any peculiarity of constitution, ailment, or caste, the further indulgence of suitable extras, or a separate diet. I have had many opportunities of judging how much these poor people appreciate such little attentions in respect to meeting their wishes as to diet, especially in the case of brahmins and rajpoots and it is satisfactory to perceive that while doing so I have kept within the bounds of the ordinary daily Government allowance of 2 annas. The average total for the year being daily for each patient 1 Anna 10 Pice.

"The returns compared with last year shew an increase of 82 on the general total treated. There has been a diminution of the in-patients but a more than counterbalancing increase in those who have availed themselves of relief as out-patients. Many especially those who reside or have relatives in the village, prefer to come thus daily morning and evening to be treated, even in somewhat severe cases, and I endeavour always to meet their wishes in this respect, as far as practicable and with the further advantage of lessening the expences of the institution, without in any way affecting its usefulness. I believe in this, I am happily carrying out the views of Government, while conciliating the wishes of the people. Hence the greater number of our in-patients are accidents, travellers, persons coming from the neighbouring villages to seek relief, or as occasionally happens, from a greater distance."

Amongst a number of cases more especially deserving of notice, I may mention, that of a poor cooly woman admitted in December, brought from a distance of 7 miles, seriously hurt from a wall having fallen upon her. She was found to have sustained a fracture of both thighs and a compound fracture of both bones of the left leg, the tibia to the extent of two inches projecting through a lacerated wound on the fore and middle part of the leg an inch of the bone remaining denuded of its periosteum, and a small splinter attached to its upper fracture. The bone of the middle finger of the left hand was exposed to the extent of one inch, but without fracture, her face swollen, and she was much bruised. The

bones were placed in apposition, the more seriously injured limb appropriately bandaged, being laid upon a well padded double inclined plane, the bandages being so adapted as to permit of the wound being dressed without disturbing the limb. The right thigh was secured to a Liston's straight splint. The case on admission certainly looked very unpromising,—but I am happy to say the poor woman is now in a fair way of recovery."

"The admissions or number of applicants during the past year has exceeded that of the previous year by 1,734."

"As the Natives of all classes and castes, are evincing an increased confidence in European practice, it has latterly been deemed unnecessary positively to encourage while nothing has been done to discourage them from seeking for medical advice and assistance. Those who were labouring under severe illness are brought to the dispensary by their relatives from respectable distances; and those too poor to provide a conveyance to attend were allowed medicines and treated at their own houses."

"It often occurs, that as soon as a patient is relieved, he either becomes indifferent and irregular in attendance, or ceases to attend altogether; this renders the practice of the dispensary unsatisfactory. It is worth observing that natives at remote villages from the Presidency frequently present themselves at this institution for relief."

"The duties of the dispensary are divided into surgical and medical, a portion of the subordinate medical establishment is allotted to each; the duties commence soon after 6 every morning, and as the patients present themselves each are attended to in succession by the apothecary, reserving particular cases for the inspection of the superintending medical officer."

"For the purpose of affording the medical apprentices and pupils doing duty at the dispensary an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the diseases and the treatment of each, one is placed on duty daily, whose business it is to receive the new applicants for treatment, and under the superintendence of the apothecary they are allowed to prescribe. By this plan they are enabled to acquire much practical knowledge."

"A reference to the admissions of the year 1854 will show that in the past year there has been a considerable diminution in the number both of in and out patients at the dispensary. Of in patients 57 of out patients 907; amongst the In patients under the head of fevers 33 fewer have been admitted, and this is partially owing, I think, to the disease not prevailing so extensively, but principally to the smaller number of pilgrims and brinjarees who passed through the town, from which classes the principal admissions have been in both years under this head, and amongst the out patients under the head of obstipatio 581 fewer are entered. I do not think myself that there has been less willingness to attend, for my impression is that the patients have been generally speaking more regular in attendance. The number of children that were brought for treatment, much exceeds any previous years since I had charge of the dispensary."

"A case of amputation of the arm for gangrene succeeding fracture of lower end of the humerus, deserves notice. When brought to the dispensary the forearm was almost separated from the arm, and the lower portion of the arm sloughing, the girl was weak and the amputa-

tion on this account delayed. It was taken off about the upper third, before the arm healed a small portion of the end of the bone exfoliated."

"The new dispensary which was occupied in 1854 during the past year has been well attended. The selection of the site has been judicious and the building for the present is sufficiently commodious. The want of a ward for Europeans or persons of a better class continues to be experienced; but a ward for contagious and epidemic diseases which was also much required, has been erected by subscription in Cochin and the building will be ready for the admission of patients within a few weeks."

"The health of Cochin has been satisfactory. The increased number of persons treated has not been occasioned by unusual sickness. In 1854 cholera and variola; were epidemic, the latter throughout the year, and the former for 9 or 10 months; in 1855 one case of cholera is entered and although variola has prevailed throughout the year, the cases have been neither so numerous nor so fatal."

I have the pleasure of reporting that though there has been no epidemic and the year by no means unhealthy, still the Coimbatore dispensary has during the last twelve months continued in all respects to fulfil the benevolent intentions of Government, the number of cases applying for aid has steadily increased, and the mortality among those treated has been remarkably small. Patients from all parts of the district and from other districts, have resorted to the hospital and several instances have occurred of patients coming for aid after finding that native doctors could do them no good.

"The number of out-patients during the past year has been 4,218 being an increase of 910 over the previous year; among the in-patients there is a decrease in actual numbers as shown by the return, but in reality the difference chiefly arises from the children brought from any distance for vaccination having been dieted and included among the in-patients during 1854 while they have not been so during the past year. As regards the in-patients, I think I am correct in stating, that had all who applied been admitted, the return would have shown double the number it now does, but I have found it absolutely necessary to be most particular, so many apply for admittance for the sake of the diet alone, and exaggerate their symptoms with that view; always bearing in mind that where a doubt exists it should be given in the applicant's favour, I have endeavoured to discriminate between such as really require the treatment they seek, and those who wish to convert the hospital into a poor house, or choultry, such individuals have frequently refused to take medicine prescribed when told that they could not be admitted and acknowledged that it was food not medicine they wished for."

"It is not only the poor and destitute or those of low castes who apply for aid. The following table shows that the increase has been greater among the brahmins than the pariahs in the ratio of nearly 2 to 1.

Hydrocephalus. "Under this head two patients were admitted, both children, in one the disease was acute and well marked, it happily yielded to treatment. In the other it was chronic, there was immense accumulation of fluid in the head. The child was 3 years old and the disease of two years standing. The head was enormously enlarged, the fontanelles expanded and tense, the bones of the cranium thinned and widely separated from each other, the space between them being of course occupied by membrane. In such a case very little benefit could be expected from internal treatment only. I therefore thought fit to perform paracentesis capitis. On the 4th July I performed the operation with an exploring trocar and drew off six ounces of clear fluid, closed the wound and applied uniform pressure by carefully bandaging the

head. Half a grain of calomel was ordered to be given morning and evening. Previous to the tapping the pupils were in a state of extreme dilatation, but as soon as this small portion of the fluid was taken away, not only did the dilatation cease, but the child was roused from its lethargic state. On the 8th July the head was found to be nearly an inch smaller; this was proved by measurement. On this day I drew off eight ounces of fluid the calomel had not affected the gums in the slightest degree it was therefore ordered to be continued as before."

"On the 15th July, the head was found very considerably reduced in size and the child was in every respect better, the mercury had just begun to affect the gums, this day I drew off sixteen ounces of fluid. As the case had hitherto progressed so favourably, I entertained hopes of very materially relieving the little sufferer, but unluckily for him, his parents were in a great hurry to return to their village and wanted to get the child cured in a few days, and when it was explained to them that, it would in all probability take some months before any great relief could be obtained, they positively refused to keep him any longer in hospital. I thus lost sight of this highly interesting case."

Calculus Vesicae. "Two patients were admitted into hospital with stone in the bladder, in both, the operation of lithotomy was performed successfully."

Hydrocele. "Fifty seven patients were treated for this affection; eight of them had the disease on both sides, making in all sixty five hydroceles. The accumulation of fluid varied in the different cases from three or four ounces, to as many pints. In three patients the hour glass contraction was extremely well marked."

"With the exception of two cases all were cured by the radical operation. Sixty-two hydroceles by tapping and injection, and one case (both sides) by incision. The injection consisted of two drachms of the undiluted tincture of iodine which was thrown into the tunica vaginalis after the evacuation of the fluid and allowed to remain there permanently. In one case the hydrocele suppurated, the matter was discharged by incision and permanent cure followed."

Wounds. "A Hindoo girl aged seven years was admitted into the hospital on the 30th January 1855 with an extensive lacerated wound of the right calf extending from immediately below the flexure of the knee to within four inches of the heel. On examination a large lacerated flap, consisting of the whole of the calf was found hanging from the limb; the belly of the gastrocnemius was completely divided, the

soleus torn from its fibular attachment and the tendon of the plantaris hanging out of the wound. The injury was said to have been caused by the falling of a heap of bricks from a height whilst the child was in a lying posture. It is a curious fact and difficult to understand, how such a wound could have been produced by such direct violence without fracturing the bones of the leg. When she was brought to the hospital there was only a slight oozing of blood and the wound was filled with earth and brick fragments. The cleaning of the wound was a very difficult and painful process and as soon as its bottom was cleared, smart arterial bleeding ensued, the finger was immediately placed on the spot from whence the bleeding proceeded, and from its position it was evident that, the source of hæmorrhage was the peroneal artery—pressure was directed to be made on the femoral artery, the wound was carefully examined, the artery exposed and its divided ends tied."

"The limb had sustained so extensive an injury that, it became a question whether it could be saved and if an attempt at saving were made whether the constitution of the child would stand the very extensive suppuration which must necessarily follow such extensive injury. On the other hand, the girl was robust and in excellent health, and recollecting that, the power of repairing severe injuries in young subjects is very vigorous, I determined to attempt saving the limb; the wound was put up in the best way it could be managed; extensive sloughing and suppuration followed, the constitution was supported with generous diet, portwine, quinine and bark. After a great deal of anxiety and care the wound healed. The calf of the injured limb was much diminished in size and there was a deep depression in its centre; the child could walk with the aid of a stick; she was discharged cured on the 18th April 1855."

"I have since ascertained that she has completely regained the use of the limb and is in excellent health."

"I have much pleasure in being able to report that, the number of patients admitted during the past year, is far greater, than that in any preceding year since the establishment of the dispensary."

"In 1854 there were 350 in-patients admitted; in 1855, 371 giving an increase of 21. Amongst the out-patients, the admissions of 1854 were 2,914; in 1855—3845 shewing an increase of 931. The number of deaths were fifteen."

"The patients both In and Out, were of all castes, most of them inhabitants of this and other towns of the district. I may also add that, a great number of surgical patients were either sent or came from other districts chiefly for the purpose of undergoing surgical operations."

"The benevolent intentions of Government, the advantages of the institution and the superiority of European medicine and surgery are felt and acknowledged by all classes of natives of this district."

"Since the establishment of the dispensary in 1843, up to the 31st December 1854, as far as I am able to make out from its historical register, one hundred and twenty four surgical operations (not including the reduction of fractures and dislocations) have been performed; of these six were capital ones. From the operation list accompanying this report, it will be observed that, no less than one hundred and eighty-six operations were performed during the past year. A great many of these were capital ones, and some rare and of formidable nature; a glance at the list will show the nature and results of these operations. This very remarkable increase enables me to conclude that, the natives have entire confidence in European operative surgery."

The hospital is visited daily morning and evening. There are no fixed days for operations. I generally perform them at 11 A. M.

"The dispensary as a building is now in good condition, the repairs that I pointed out as being necessary having been fully and completely effected. I still continue to consider the site as the most favorable that could have been selected."

"As in former years, the most numerous and important diseases have been bowel complaints and skin diseases, lepra, psoriasis and ulcers constituting the bulk of the latter, the rheumatic affections are generally little else than the sequels of venereal affections or the abuse of mercury by native doctors."

With regard to out-patients, I am happy to be able to report an increase of 2,877."

"The fish oil still proves useful in ulcers."

"The applicants for aid, during the period of time under review, have been somewhat more numerous than in either of the two preceding years, but the number is probably still below what may fairly be considered the average which might be looked for in such a locality. Every care and attention is paid to all such cases as come under my observation and it is believed are duly appreciated by those who receive relief from their sufferings.

"In the way of general remarks I may observe on the much more extensive and general prevalence of scrophulous disease in its multifarious varieties than would be expected by one having no personal experience with disease in the country. Phthisis and caries of the bones of the extremities, and ulcers of the soft parts are more common than the mere enlargement of lymphatic glands. Several attempts have been made to treat "caries" by fish liver oil but, the progress being slow and there being a natural tendency in natives to value European treatment mainly in proportion to the quickness and corresponding apparent brilliancy of the treatment, they have either desisted from attendance at the dispensary, deserted the hospital or pressed for mutilating operations, as affording them a more speedy means of returning to their usual habits of locomotion. The class of cases usually placed under the head of atrophica deserve some passing notice. The most marked and prominent signs are usually those of anæmia, all my efforts to trace this condition to any determined organic visceral complication have signally failed, and no less so than my endeavours by treatment to restore a normal and healthy condition of the circulating fluid. Simple hydarthrus uncomplicated by active signs of inflammation is a comparatively common ailment and is mostly found to affect the knee joint. It is generally found to yield readily to due quiet with the limb supported and the application of a blister or succession of blisters with iodide of potassium internally. In a few cases which do not yield so readily, much benefit is derived by the substitution of support by adhesive straps and bandaging the limb."

I am sorry to state that the new dispensary spoken of in last report has not yet been built. The sum of Rupees 1,500 subscribed by the European residents and natives has now been paid into the treasury, and the civil engineer informs me that he will commence the building in April next, and I hope that in a few months it will be completed. A piece of ground has been selected near the chief bazar with the concurrence of the acting collector, Mr. Newill, which both in point of situation, the vicinity of water &c., is in every way to be preferred for the site of a civil dispensary."

The dispensary has afforded medical aid during the year to 316 in patients, and to 3,813 out patients being an increase respectively of 50 and 227 over the admissions of the preceding year."

Amputation.—6 amputations were performed viz. 1 of left arm, 1 of left fore-arm, 2 of the right and 2 of the left leg.

"A boy aged 14 was admitted 5th September with compound fracture of left humerus a little below its middle. On removing the bamboo splints and bandages which had been applied by a native hakeem the fore-arm was found to be completely mortified. The accident occurred 14 days before by a fall from a tree; under chloroform, amputation of the arm was performed, troublesome ulceration attacked a portion of the stump which retarded the cure, but he ultimately did well and was discharged cured 31st October."

"With reference to the numbers of patients admitted under treatment, I have the pleasure to report a very large increase both of intern and extern patients at this dispensary. This is to be esteemed as a proof beyond all doubt of the increased and still increasing estimation in which this institution is held. As will be seen by the usual return forwarded herewith the patients of the dispensary have within these numbers comprised persons of the three principal castes and of native christians. These latter are chiefly either the Portuguese inhabitants of Honore or the natives who have become converted."

"It is worthy of observation here that people from considerable distances come in to be treated and even send in for medicines when they themselves are unable to come. The small villages in the neighbourhood and the most distant places even Butcul, Coompta, Byndoor, Malamaney, Moodashvara participate equally with Honore in the advantages of the dispensary."

"With reference to all the foregoing cases I may beg to bring to the notice of the Medical Board the unwearied diligence, strict regularity of conduct and professional acquirements of 2d Dresser S. Veerawgoo attached to this dispensary."

"I need scarcely allude to how far dispensaries are dependent on the conduct of the subordinates for being rendered attractive to the great mass of the lower orders. In the present instance I think most of the popularity of the dispensary at Honore is due to the kindness of manner and patient skill of the 2d Dresser whom I beg to bring to the most favorable notice of the Medical Board. He has in my presence several times performed such minor operations of surgery as passing the catheter, opening abscesses, &c. and in a serious case of malposition at birth performed the operation of version with complete success."

"I have succeeded in obtaining a considerable amount of subscriptions for the present year which do not appear upon this account."

"I may mention that at the end of 1855, I circulated a copy of the account now forwarded—for the satisfaction of the subscribers and that I purpose during the year entirely defraying the expence of all extra articles of diet for in and out patients at the dispensary."

"I shall moreover keep a sufficiently large sum untouched to allow of my making the arrangements contemplated in my proposal to increase the accomodation afforded by the civil dispensary at Honore."

"Of the number treated during the past year 421, there were 31 deaths from different complaints, some of the patients applied for relief in the last stage of disease and others were sent to the hospital by the peons in a dying state; there is considerable decrease in the number of admissions this year, in consequence of the death of the Rajah of Nagpore who was in the habit of relieving the wants of pilgrims proceeding to Benares from Jugganaud but these now go by the direct route which is not through Nagpore."

"Of out-patients 1831 were treated, of these 1703 were cured, 83 relieved and 6 received no benefit; no deaths among the out-patients, because most of them when they are dangerously ill are admitted as in-door patients."

"There is a decrease of 76 admissions on the last report, this owing to the climate being generally healthy and absence of epidemic disease."

"During the past year, 9692 persons have received medical assistance at the dispensary of Kurnool, being an increase of 1059 over last year. This increase has been however amongst the out-patients."

"The ratio of mortality amongst the in-patients has been about 10 per cent, whilst only 2 deaths are recorded amongst the numerous out-patients. This is owing to the circumstance that many of these persons disappear from observation and cannot be traced; while others again have been transferred to the list of in-patients. There can be no doubt from the grave nature of many of their maladies that a good many deaths must have occurred amongst them."

"It is satisfactory to notice that the patients attend, generally speaking, regularly, and those who once experienced the benefit of Eu-

ropean treatment commonly return again when sick, while many persons come from considerable distances, from Rachoor, and other places in the Nizam's territory for treatment at the dispensary. The numerous list of admissions shews that the institution is highly popular."

"Out of 11 cases of 'ulcus grave, 10 required amputation below the knee and one above it, all presenting the characteristics of the disease "Madura foot." The pathology of which is still most obscure; a brahmin was admitted November 13th with a large phagedenic ulcer at the lower and back part of the left forearm, horribly offensive, the ulna quite denuded and the adjacent parts hanging loose by their attachments; his general health was bad, the ulceration occurred two years previously, having commenced in the shape of a small boil, which owing to the constant application of noxious herbs, had assumed the above condition. The arm was amputated the following day and he was discharged, cured on the 25th December."

"Under the head fractura occur two sad cases of mal-practice by hakeems, and which were partly rescued from further torture and death by the humanity of a missionary who brought them to me. A female child about 7 years of age was admitted June 14th with the left foot and leg as high as the middle in a horrible state of ulceration, tibia and fibula fractured and the adjacent muscles were mortified. It appeared that 20 days previously the child was injured by a bullock, a native doctor having been summoned, he bandaged the leg so tightly that gangrene ensued; the limb was amputated shortly after admission, and the little patient cured by the 24th August."

"A boy æt. 6 was admitted June 8th, with the right leg and foot completely destroyed as far as the middle, fibula and tibia protruding; about a fortnight previously he fell down and broke his leg; a native doctor applied splints so tightly that the parts readily mortified, the remaining portion of the limb was amputated on admission, and he was discharged cured on the 24th August."

" The attendance of people has been regular and the benefits of the institution are appreciated."

" One case of wounding the abdomen self-inflicted through which the omentum protruded; the wound was inflicted five days before admission into the dispensary, the patient was an elderly man and did not appear to be suffering from any constitutional symptoms; the protruded

portion of omentum was black and offensive, I therefore considered it advisable not to return it into the abdomen; a strong ligature was tied around it as close as possible to the wound through which it protruded; tying the ligature did not give very much pain. A few doses of calomel and opium were given; in a few days the protruded portion sloughed off, the patient was soon after discharged perfectly well."

Amputation of the arm.—A man was brought from the Laccadive islands to the dispensary with a frightful ulceration of the left forearm; the man would in a short time have sunk from previous disease, the elbow joint was immovable, the present ulceration had existed for three years; the patient immediately consented to have the arm removed; he was placed under chloroform and the limb amputated two inches above the elbow joint, by an anterior and posterior flap; three arteries required ligature; the patient was not more than two minutes under the influence of chloroform, when he awoke up and said, he had not felt the operation in the least and he was discharged soon afterwards quite well.

Amputation of the shoulder joint.—An elderly man was brought to the dispensary with the right arm from the hand to within an inch of the shoulder joint in a state of mortification, the limb was enormously swollen, and the stench was unbearable. It appears he fell from a coconut tree 15 days before, and when picked up, his friends only thought the bones of the forearm were fractured near the wrist, the limb was very tightly bound up; swelling and mortification set in and he came to the dispensary to have the limb amputated; it was now discovered that the humerus was also frightfully fractured close to the head of the bone the patient's sufferings must have been intense. In consultation with, assistant surgeon Jowett, 16th regiment N. I. it was decided that the only chance there was of saving the patient's life was amputation; from the state the parts were in, only one very small flap could be made just sufficient to cover the glenoid cavity, and that the great portion of the wound must heal by granulation; the patient was easily put under the influence of chloroform, the handle of a tourniquet was well padded, and the sub clavian artery soon pressed by assistant surgeon Jowett; so effectually was this performed, that not more than a few drops of blood came from the axillary artery which required to be cut high up, so as to prevent the incision being made in gangrenous parts; the operation took a little longer than usual in consequence of there being but a small portion of the bone left attached to the head of the humerus, and I could not get the necessary assistance in dislocating the bone; 4

arteries required to be ligatured. The patient did not feel the operation in the least, he was put to bed, and every care was taken of and attention paid to him, but he expired five days afterwards.

"The monthly subscriptions from the European and native community still continue and average between rupees 30 and 40 per month."

"Of the cases treated since I have been in charge none of them require any particular notice. It will be observed there are very few surgical cases, by far the greater number being those of fever, treated as in-patients, and diseases of the abdominal organs, such as diarrhoea and dysentery.

There was only one surgical case of any great interest. It was that of a mallee who shattered his right hand and wrist by the bursting of his gun, the charge passed through the palm of his hand, and injured the metacarpal bones very extensively; notwithstanding I succeeded in saving his hand, but I fear he will never recover the use of his fingers."

"The total number treated within the last year ending 31st December 1855, amounts both in, and out, patients, to 2,515, and I am sanguine that my next annual report will prove more satisfactory, as I am convinced the prejudice amongst the natives against European treatment is gradually giving way."

"During the year 1855, no material increase has taken place in the number of sick treated. The in patient list shews the small increase as relates to admissions of 25 over that of the previous year; while the out patient list remains at much the same standard, the admissions being 945 and the total number treated 1018."

"During the prevalence of cholera in the town, many individuals applied for medicine who were not entered in the books as out patients, that term being strictly applicable to persons in more or less regular attendance at the hospital."

"In the last report the prospect of the speedy erection of a new hospital was confidently stated. The building was commenced on the 20th January 1855 and on the 6th of October was pronounced sufficiently complete for occupation. The patients were consequently removed from the old building in the town. At that period the hospital only was ready, the out houses and well being unfinished; but it was considered advisable to take advantage of such accommodation as was available,

the old building having fallen very much out of repair. The out houses are now all finished. The well is still unfinished, but good water is procurable from a bowry in the immediate neighbourhood."

"The hospital itself is a pukka building comprising a central terraced portion and two wings, is erected on one of the most elevated sites on a capacious area of waste land to the eastward of the town."

"The central terraced portion contains 3 rooms viz. a consulting room and dispensary (both of these being lighted from the roof and the consulting room by windows in addition) and a sick ward, each wing comprises two wards and a bath room and the whole building affords accommodation for 30 patients."

Many of the ulcer cases were of the most unpromising character—involving large segments of the body and open for years—but unless associated with disease of the subjacent bones or with a thoroughly broken down constitution or organic visceral disease were readily induced to put on healthy action under appropriate treatment; some cases were lost and sunk terminated either in diarrhœa or dropsy or both, and were associated with organic disease of kidneys, heart or liver, or of all combined; marked illustration of that universal degeneracy which is too often induced by drunkenness, debauchery and want."

"The most intractable and some of the fatal cases of diarrhœa and chronic dysentery were also associated with dropsy dependent upon organic renal disease and exhibited the same series of pathological changes as are usually observed in Bright's disease."

"The Civil hospital at Rancepett was opened for the use of the public on the 1st March 1855, and during the ten months it has been in operation, medical treatment has been afforded to 121 in patients and 1083 out patients."

"One half of the old Dragoon hospital has been given as a temporary measure for the dispensary, it is very lofty and well ventilated, the situation very convenient to the inhabitants of the place, being in a central position for the two bazars."

"The Government dispensary is in good repair and efficiency; it gives me much pleasure in being able again to report the satisfactory progress the institution has made, the number of patients who have applied for relief having been greater than during the preceding year, apparently showing the greater confidence possessed by the native population in the institution as well as the removal of (to a certain extent) prejudices which previously existed."

"Being desirous to ascertain, how it was that many were induced to come so far I asked them when they presented themselves before me, and the answer has invariably been, that those who had been before treated at the dispensary and derived benefit, had informed them where they had been and what aid they had received, so that I have no doubt we shall see year by year native prejudices overcome and European treatment preferred."

"The subordinate attached to the dispensary 2nd Dresser Narrain sawmy, No. 233, has given me satisfaction. He is intelligent and active and has gained the confidence of the east Indians, and natives here who often apply to him for advice."

"I lecture once a week to the subordinates attached to the stations 3 in number, alternately on anatomy and surgery, and also examine once a week giving always previous notice what the subject of examination is to be."

There were 57 in patients under treatment when I assumed charge viz. from 31st May to 26th November 1855, 528 have been admitted since. The daily average of patients has been 74: the operations 29, and the casualties 20. The out patients have amounted to 3,657. These numbers, large as they are might have been increased, but care has been taken to admit only those whose circumstances (sickness and poverty) render fit objects for the charity. Some few have been admitted into the house for treatment, who have dieted themselves."

"Cases of disease and accidents from the crowded city and distant parts of the country render this institution peculiarly fitted for the culture and diffusion of the science of medicine and surgery."

"I beg to bring to the notice of the Medical Board the continued useful services of 2nd Dresser M. Iyasawmy No. 296, by his skill, and kind and gentle manner, he has gained the confidence of the patients, and he is constantly at his post. I would also bring the 2nd Class vaccinator to the Board's notice, his zeal and attention render him deserving of promotion to the next grade."

By Surgeon White.

"In continuation of the above report I beg to state that during the short period I have held the medical charge of this hospital it is

gratifying to be able to speak favorably of the steady progress of this institution; within the short time of its existence, it has become a most useful institution, highly appreciated by the native community of this station; people flock to it for medical aid from all parts without the least prejudice of caste. The greatest difficulty experienced is to determine who shall be excluded from being admitted as in-door patients, for many resort to this hospital whose cases are hopeless of recovery, and by their lengthened continuance under treatment and diet, entails a heavy expence to Government; yet it seems hard to send such away. During the past year owing to the wide spread of venereal disease amongst the European soldiery, the police have sent vast numbers of prostitutes, to be examined as to their condition, and from these no less than 151 women have been admitted for treatment from gonorrhœa and syphilis. These have all been dieted and detained in hospital till perfect recovery; it is to be hoped these measures will diminish the vast amount of venereal disorders amongst the European soldiery."

"The case of a boy aged 16 admitted with mortification of all the parts below the middle of the fore arm, both bones of which had sustained a compound fracture, afforded a melancholy instance of the ignorance of the natives in treating surgical injuries, the parts separated without a bad symptom leaving a tolerable stump."

One other case is deserving of comment as I fancy it is not a very common one. A woman aged about 40 presented herself at the dispensary with an enormous tumor attached to the scalp, its base commenced at the inner extremity of the left eye brow, extended across the

head a little to the left of, and parallel to the mesian line to an inch below the occipital protuberance; the tumor, such was its size and weight almost reached to the left shoulder, the woman would not submit to undergo an operation for its removal."

During the 12 months under report, 802 in patients and 11,214 out patients, or in all 12,016 persons have received medical aid and advice. In the aggregate number of patients, large as this has been, there is a decrease in 1855, as compared with 1854, of 1,553; but in

the latter year the number of admissions from the prevailing scarcity of provisions and other causes was unusually large. I attribute the falling off in 1855 to two causes (among the in patients) to the closing of part of the building during several months for repairs, and (among the out patients) to the comparative cheapness of provisions and absence of epidemic diseases."

"Though prices were very high during 1855, the native population did not suffer from the same urgent distress as in the preceding year, when from long continued drought, they were brought almost to the verge of famine."

In a dense population like that of Triplicane there is always much to engender disease, and there is also constant emigration from the provinces of wandering faqueers and mendicants who trust to theft or charity for subsistence. A year of scarcity like 1854, under such circumstances, greatly swells the number of admissions into Hospital. The

marginal abstract shows the decrease in 1855, in diseases more or less influenced by deficient nutrition. But though the

total number of admissions is smaller, the average daily attendance is steadier and greater in 1855 than in 1854. The number of admissions is large, though comparatively smaller than in 1854; and the great regularity of attendance, will I trust be held to shew that the people have every confidence in European treatment, and freely resort to it when necessary."

Sanitary improvements.—During the year under review, a great advance has been made in sanitary improvements, to which, as being in contemplation, allusion was briefly made in my previous report."

1. "The opening of the "Lodge road," extending from the south beach to the cathedral, and the clearing away of several dirty

hamlets, adjoining the horticultural gardens, has been accomplished, and the sea breeze now permeates a large portion of Royapettah and Tanampettah, which (the latter particularly) have hitherto suffered from cholera periodically in an epidemic form."

2. "Another broad road intermediate between Chepauk palace and the Ice house has been completed, this leads into the centre of Triplicane, where there is at all times a densely crowded thoroughfare—What has already been done is of the greatest importance. The extension of this line through the Jam bazar to the back of the Club, would be of immense advantage in a sanitary point of view, the admission of fresh and wholesome air being peculiarly needed in such a locality."

3. "The removal, by a private individual, of a dense plantation of palmyra and cocoanut palms in the vicinity of the Adyar bridge, will doubtless be conducive to the salubrity of that part of the district, as that very spot was severely visited by cholera two years ago."

4. "It is desirable that the planting of cocoanut trees between the road and the sea, as at the Adyar point, should be prevented if possible. It is not so much the full grown trees, as the thick undergrowth of young palms, filling up the interstices, which impede the free circulation of air, and act most perniciously on the health of the people."

5. I regret to observe in various parts of the district, that the prickly pear (*Opuntia dillenii*) has been allowed to overrun several waste places to a very great extent, excluding the air, and harbouring venomous reptiles. I beg to suggest its being speedily cleared away as the growth of this plant in other places has been found decidedly injurious to health."

6. Improvements such as these must exercise a marked influence on the public health, and require only time to develop their utility. In the past year, there has been a sensible diminution or almost absence of epidemic disease, which might reasonably be ascribed, in part at least to them."

7. *Coroner's Inquests*, within the district have been 26 in number. Seven deaths arose from drowning, and five from suffocation in a crowd where alms were given after the death of the Nabob. Casualties from drowning are to be expected, where so many open tanks, pot wells and gravel-pits exist, which are very dangerous to life especially during the rains. It would be impossible by any amount of precaution to prevent all such casualties, yet by the timely erection of fences or railings, many serious accidents might be prevented.

Epidemic diseases.—"There has been a singular immunity from epidemic diseases during the year, and the maladies treated are merely those incidental to the labouring poor of the district. In 1854 measles and chickenpox prevailed to a great extent. In the present year, there has been no measles, and out of 23 cases of variola 2 proved fatal. It is satisfactory to observe the very small number of cases of cholera as

per margin, compared with the previous year; and the entire absence of this pestilence during 5 months."

Hospital.—"The building which has been rented for the last two years, has become the property of Government. Repairs befitting its present application have been executed. An additional female ward to keep separate diseased women with privy and bathing rooms, and also a surgery for dispensing medicines have been approved and the estimate sanctioned. The situation of the dispensary is good, being central, well known, and the vicinity comparatively healthy. I have endeavoured as far as possible to carry out the benefits of the institution by visiting at their own houses, such as were prevented from attending in person at the dispensary."

"The return for the year 1855 bears ample testimony I think, to the satisfactory working of the Vellore civil dispensary which was first opened about 18 months ago. During the past year 246 in patients and 6,606 out patients have come under medical treatment, and amongst the latter have been some of the most respectable native inhabitants of the station, and others have come from their villages varying from 10 to 40 miles distant from Vellore.

Most of these latter from the southward and westward. There have been 22 deaths amongst the in patients a large number, but easily accounted for by the hopeless state to which most of the patients were reduced by disease neglected and by want of the commonest necessities of life previous to admission."

"One amputation of the arm performed in my presence by assistant apothecary George Davis, aided by assistant apothecary C. W. White, and numerous minor surgical operations such as operations for hydrocele, phymosis, caula and opening abscesses and most of which were performed in my presence, well and carefully by 2nd Dresser V. Venkettaputhy No. 206, to whose attention and professional skill, I have great pleasure in bearing testimony. I beg to add that 2nd Dresser Venkettaputhy has been zealous and successful in the department of vaccination, having vaccinated (at the dispensary) no fewer than 774 persons (mostly native children) during the past year, of which number 562 proved successful."

Dispensary.—"I am able to report most favorably of this institution the number of patients who have received medical aid from it during the past year amounts to 9,238, being an increase of nearly 1,000 on the preceding year. This progressive increase, while indicating the amount of disease which prevails amongst the inhabitants of Vepery, bears valuable testimony to the confidence with which the poor of the district apply for assistance in times of sickness."

"The diseases which have prevailed most during the past year have been cholera, fever and dysentery."

Cholera.—"In September and October cholera appeared in an epidemic form but not to any serious extent, and it confined its attacks to the inhabitants of the more densely populated and unclean localities; 45 were admitted into hospital, out of which only 21 were saved; but while in September 3 out of 4 attacked were lost, the result in October was very different as 3 out of every 4 admitted into hospital recovered although in all cases the same treatment was pursued. This peculiarity in cholera has been before remarked and confirms the opinion of its increased virulence at the period of its first outbreak and of the comparatively mild character it assumes as time advances."

During the year 5,536 out patients and 228 in patients have been treated; of the latter 31 have dieted themselves and 180 have been fed at the expense of Government. There is a large increase of out patients over preceding years, upwards of 1000, and this number does not include many applicants who receive purgatives, emetics, and plaster &c. whose names are not entered in the register. I have no doubt for many years the number of patients will steadily increase, and more especially when

"the new civil dispensary is built, which will afford so much more accommodation, and be located in a central situation and thus be more generally known and frequented."

"I see daily many indications of increasing confidence on the part of the native population in the European method of treatment when attacked with disease, they more readily apply for treatment, and in no case worth mentioning have I noticed the least objection to submit to any measures recommended to them, and I am very certain that the general appreciation, of the many benefits received at this institution is very high indeed."

"The classes of diseases have not differed from former years, except that no cholera patients have been treated."

cants for relief at many of the dispensaries during the last four years.

Civil Dispensaries established throughout the Madras presidency, during the year 1855, show a total increase of 22,855 over the number treated in the preceding year. It is, moreover, gratifying to Government to learn, that this increase has not, in the opinion of the Medical Board, been owing to the prevalence of any unusual or epidemic disease, of which indeed there appears to have been but little; but solely to the enhanced appreciation by the native community of the benefits to be derived from these institutions. This seems, moreover, obvious from the progressive increase in the number of appli-

2. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council fully appreciates the services of the medical officers in charge, to whose active exertions and, he may add, successful treatment, in several instances, of cases almost hopeless, must in great measure be ascribed the apparently

high estimation in which these institutions are held by the natives; and His Lordship in Council notices with pleasure, the very favorable mention made by the Board, of the officers whose names are annexed, and also of the medical subordinates at the stations described in the margin.

It is remarked that the number of surgical operations is only given in four dispensaries. In future a return should be furnished showing the number of operations in each dispensary and distinguishing capital from trivial cases.

3. Considering the scarcity of food which prevailed during the past year, the presidency has, as appears from the present report, been less unhealthy than might have been expected; disease of an epidemic nature having been confined only to a few localities, and it prevailed there to no great extent.

4. Though the admissions into the General hospital were 116 above those of the year 1854, the mortality, it is observed, was less by nearly 4 per cent. The report, as regards the House of industry, is equally favorable.

5. In the Native infirmary and Idiot asylum attached thereto, however, the casualties have been more numerous.

6. Adverting to the desertions from the Idiot asylum noticed in the margin to para 13, the Governor in Council desires to know whether any and what precautions are taken to prevent such occurrences.

7. With regard to the Male asylum, it appears that the admissions into hospital during 1855 were only 280, while in the four preceding years, the average annual number admitted was 649. This diminution

is a gratifying indication of the improved state of health in the institution which the medical officer in charge appears to ascribe to the improved system of management recently introduced.

8. Sickness appears to have prevailed to a great extent in the Female asylum during 1855, but, it is observed, that the general health of the inmates has since much improved by change of diet and other auxiliary means.

9. Believing that the extension of the road alluded to in para 2 of Dr. Cleghorn's report under the head "Sanitary improvements" would materially conduce to the healthiness of the populous town of Triplicane; the Governor in Council desires that the Superintendent of Police, to whom that para will be communicated, will report at what cost the work can be effected, including the purchase of ground and buildings in that direction.

10. Colonel Boulderson will also give his attention to the subject of paras 4 and 5 under the same head, and state how far the suggestion offered under the head "Coroner's Inquests" can be carried out as a measure of precaution against fatal accidents.

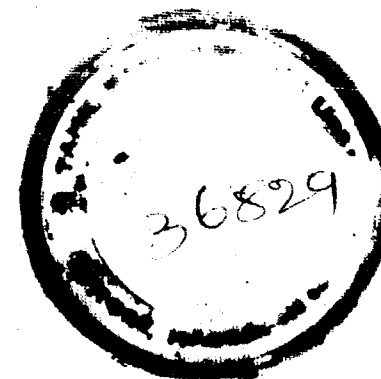
