3. The number of Central and District Jails, viz., 7 and 12 respectively, re-
Number of Jails. mained unchanged during the year. The number of sub-jails
was reduced from 306 to 304.

4. In the General Summary, the first statement annexed to the report, sta-
General Summary. tistics as to the number of all classes of prisoners admitted,
disposed of, and remaining are given. These figures include
admissions by transfer. A summary of the results for ten years is appended. A
considerable reduction in jail population will be observed, the causes of which
cannot be stated with any certainty, but which may be probably connected with the
downward tendency of food prices. The number of prisoners remaining at the end
of the year was much below the daily average for the year, and up to date there is
every indication of a further decline :—

5. Of the three classes of prisoners who are included in the General Summary, the details relating to convicts are noticed in subsequent portions of the report. An abstract of the statistics connected with Under-trial Prisoners for a period of ten years is appended. The percentage of convictions to the total number disposed of shows a further fall, viz., from 42.1 per cent. in 1892 and 32.8 per cent. in 1893 to 30.5 per cent. in the year under report:—

6. Under the head Civil Prisoners, the third main class included in the General Summary, are combined State Prisoners, Judgment-debtors, Revenue defaulters, and any other prisoner ordered by law to be confined in the Civil Jail. The number of these prisoners admitted into jails has increased each year since 1890, and is now larger than it was in 1887, the year prior to that in which the law regulating imprisonment for debt was revised. The whole increase in the number of admissions of Civil Prisoners during 1894 as compared with its predecessor is accounted for by the four districts of Tanjore, Madura, Tinnevely and Cuddapah:—

7. The next statement appended to this report is Judicial Statement No. I dealing with the admission and disposal of convicts. The same general features appear here as were noticed above in dealing with the total of all classes of prisoners, namely a decided fall in admissions, in daily average strength, and in the number remaining at the close of the year. Referring first to direct admissions, the following table shows that the principal reductions in the number of prisoners received occurred in the central and southern portions of the Presidency, in Madras City and in the districts of Chingleput, South Arcot, North Arcot, Salem, Trichinopoly, Tanjore, Coimbatore, Madura and Tinnevely. In the districts north of Madras, jail populations had been low in 1893 and naturally they show less tendency to decline in 1894, though the apparent increase in direct admissions into the Rajahmundry Central Jail and into the Bellary District Jail does not represent any growth of crime, but is due to the Guntur and Kurnool District Jails having been closed throughout the year. The cause of the increased admissions at the Cannanore Central Jail and at the Palamcottah District Jail was probably the abolition of the sub-jails at those stations as places of detention of convicts by G.O., No. 2471, 11th October 1894. The only unexplained increase of any importance occurred in the Parvatipuram Jail, and seems in that instance to be due to a real increase in convictions in the Agency tracts of Vizagapatam, the causes of which are not known. The Agent was asked for information on the subject, but he stated that it was not available in his office. The other fluctuations do not call for notice.

Contrary to the anticipation which was expressed in the last report, the number of convicts admitted by transfer shows an increase instead of a reduction, the number being 15,686 in 1894 against 15,116 in 1893 and 14,958 in 1892. The figures in column G-A of Statement No. I show clearly that this increase is not due to transfers between District and Central Jails, as the number of such transfers has diminished by just one-third during the year under report. The whole increase occurs under the head of prisoners admitted into sub-jails in transit to other jails and an examination of the figures returned by the several District Magistrates has shown that the whole increase occurred in the Malabar district, in which the number of admissions on transfer into sub-jails has risen from 2,591 in 1892 and 2,797 in 1893 to 4,425 in 1894. This is the more remarkable because the number of direct admissions into Sub-jails in this district shows a material decline, while the number of direct admissions into the Cannanore Central Jail has not materially varied during the last three years. The District Magistrate's attention was drawn to the subject, and he has stated in reply that the number of *en route* prisoners is very large in the Divisions of the Deputy Magistrate, Calicut, and of the Joint Magistrate, Tellicherry, and that he has called on these officers for information. There has not yet been time for this to be received. If it had not been for the increase in the Malabar district, the number of convicts admitted into sub-jails on transfer would have shown a reduction by over 1,000. The other figures in this statement, dealing with releases, escapes and deaths are more conveniently noticed in connection with subsequent statements. Executions nearly doubled during the year. Three convicts were conditionally released by Government on medical grounds as compared with 2 in 1893. Of the 12 convicts released by Government on other grounds, 2 were criminal lunatics who were made over to their friends under section 475 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 10 were convicts who were unconditionally released in exercise of the powers of pardon vested in Government by section 401 of the same Code.

9. The statistics of the religion of convicts admitted into jail, which are given in Statement No. II, call for little remark. As usual, the proportion to free population is slightly higher among Muhammadans than among other classes. The number of juvenile convicts received fell from 593 to 562, but the ratio to the total number of direct admissions was the same as in the previous year, viz., 1·8 per cent. Moreover, nearly 92 per cent. of all juveniles admitted to jail were sentenced to periods of three months and under, and were thus concerned in petty crime, while the vast majority, about 90 per cent. of the juveniles sentenced to imprisonment, were first offenders. It is evident that short sentences of imprisonment on boys not previously convicted are still too common. In certain cases, such as offences against the Salt and Abkari laws, the Forest Laws, &c., courts have no power to inflict corporal punishment on boys under 16, and it would be an advantage if this difficulty were removed. Details as to the terms of imprisonment to which juveniles were sentenced are given in the following table:—

10. Of the 30,498 convicts received by direct committal during the year, 9·5 per cent. were able to read and write and 3·7 per cent. were able to read only, while 86·8 per cent. were entirely illiterate. This is the first year in which complete figures on this subject are available, but as regards District and Central Jails it is observed that the percentage of illiterate convicts admitted has shown no marked advance or reduction in the last twenty years. When admissions are numerous and the number of criminals rises, there is an increased proportion of illiterate convicts, and the ratio of educated persons admitted to jails is highest in those years in which crime is low. Thus in 1875 the percentage of convicts unable to read or write who were admitted into Central and District Jails was 82·41, but in 1877 it rose as high as 90·27. In 1885 to 1888 there was again a reduction in the proportion of illiterates to an average of about 83 per cent., which rose in 1892 to 87·21. It may be presumed that, as increased crime in this Presidency is almost certainly dependent on food-scarcity and bad seasons, the recruits thus driven into the ranks of criminals are generally drawn from the poorest and most backward classes. Education in jails is now confined to juveniles, and the arrangements in this respect have not altered during the year.

11. The record of the previous occupations of convicts admitted continues to show improvement in accuracy as the further reduction in the proportion of persons whose employment was classed as miscellaneous proves. The fall in the proportion of widows admitted to jail is noticeable. No cause is known:—

12. In Judicial Statement No. III statistics are given as to the nature and length of the sentences under which convicts were admitted to jail during 1894. An abstract of the figures for that year in comparison with those of the previous five years is furnished by the following table. There was a tendency to pass slightly heavier sentences in 1894 than in previous years, the percentage of sentences not exceeding 30 days falling from 57.92 to 57.68. The reduction in sentences of transportation for a term may be ascribed to the influence of G.O., No. 2050, dated 24th August 1894.

13. The number of previously convicted convicts who were received into jail during the year is exhibited in Judicial Statement No. IV, and the ratio borne by these admissions to the total admission of the year is compared with that of the five previous years in the following table :—

14. It will be seen that recognitions both before and after conviction have increased. As regards the former class, Superintendents of Jails report that in 108 cases assistance was rendered by Jail officers, under-trial prisoners being brought to the jail for recognition. This practice is nearly confined to the Tanjore District and Madras City, and it will apparently cease under the operation of Government Order, No. 256, dated 7th February 1895. As regards recognition after conviction, that is by Jail Officers in jail, an increase has occurred in the majority of District and Central Jails, especially in the Penitentiary, Madras, in which it was found that of late years the cases of recognition returned by the Superintendent had been confined to persons sentenced under Chapters XII and XVII of the Indian Penal Code. The headings of the columns in Judicial Statement No. IV require no such restriction. The following table shows details for each District and Central Jail. It will be noticed that the figures agree with those in Judicial Statement No. IV, subsidiary jails only being excluded.

15. During the year under report the working of the Bertillon system was undertaken by the Police Department, and the records of measurements which had been collected in this office have been made over to the Inspector-General of Police, in whose hands the working of the system will in future rest. The descriptions of prisoners admitted into District and Central Jails will still be recorded in accordance with the Bertillon methods, for to revert to the old unscientific and generally useless methods of description would be a serious retrogression; but the maintenance of a central bureau of measurements and the duty of recognizing prisoners through the means of the measurements there recorded will no longer appertain to the Jail Department.

16. In Judicial Statement No. V, information is given as to escapes and recaptures of convicts during the year. The total number of such escapes was 23 against 32 in 1893 and 51 in the previous year. The following table shows details for ten years:—

17. There were no escapes from inside Central Jails during the year. No less than three organized attempts were, however, discovered and frustrated, in each of which a number of convicts were concerned. They were duly punished.

18. The number of escapes from inside District Jails (including under this category, for the sake of convenience, the Criminal Leper Ward) was two. Of these, one occurred at the Russellkonda Hill Jail, where a convict jumped over the wall in the day time, owing to the carelessness of a convict officer. The wall is only 6 feet high. It was reported in this office letter No. 847, dated 12th February 1894, that this jail is unsafe and that the wall should be raised, but the Government negatived the proposal at the time, on financial grounds. It would be advantageous if the work could now be sanctioned. The convict officer was prosecuted and sentenced to two weeks' simple imprisonment. The other escape occurred from the Criminal Leper Ward. A leper convict, who was on the sick-list, being left in one of the wards by a temporary warder, who was in charge, effected his escape. The ward is enclosed by a low iron railing, which is not safe against escape. The warder was dismissed.

19. Two escapes occurred from outside Central Jails and two escapes from outside District Jails. In three out of these four cases the convict, being employed on the Jail lands, managed to slink away unobserved. In the fourth case, that at the Berhampur District Jail, he suddenly bolted, but was run down and caught. All four convicts were recaptured. In consequence of the continuance of these escapes from out-gangs, orders were given in June 1894 that all convicts employed extramurally should wear light fetters, and this measure has been so far successful that since its adoption no escape from any out-gang has up to date occurred. In only one case out of the four was it considered desirable to prosecute the warders concerned. In that case, which occurred at the Rajahmundry Central Jail, two warders were convicted and sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 6 or in default to undergo seven days' simple imprisonment.

20. Seventeen escapes occurred from Subsidiary Jails, two from inside the jail and 15 from outside the jail. They were distributed among ten districts, namely, Vizagapatam, Gólavati, Nellore, Kurnool, Anantapur, Salem, Chingleput, South Arcot, Madura and Tinnevely. The guarding of Subsidiary Jails is entirely conducted by the Police, and is not under my control.

21. The next statement, Judicial Statement No. VI, which deals with offences and punishments, requires somewhat detailed remark. In the first place, as the Prisons' Act 1894 came into force only on the 1st July 1894, the figures included in this statement relate partly to offences and punishments under the new Act and partly to those dealt with under Madras Act V of 1869, the provisions of which on this subject differed in various respects from those in force since July 1894. In the second place, the rules contemplated by section 59-2 of Act IX of 1894 for the classification of prison offences and punishments into 'serious' and 'minor' have not yet been framed by the Government of India, and, in the absence of authoritative guidance, the classification proposed by the Jail Conference of 1892 has been followed. This classification was not properly applicable to the punishments imposed prior to the 1st July 1894, and the division of punishments into Major and Minor is not yet on a satisfactory basis. Lastly, it will be obvious that no close comparison between the figures given in Statement No. VI for 1892 and 1893, as printed in the last report, and those now submitted, is practicable, as the two earlier years referred entirely to offences and punishments under the now repealed Prisons' Act of Madras.

22. The following table gives an abstract of the number of offences and punishments recorded in jails during each of the last five years:—

23. The most marked features presented by this table are a further increase equal to 26 per cent. in the total number of offences and punishments recorded, a decline equivalent to 17 per cent. in the resort to penal diet (with or without solitary confinement), an increase by 30 per cent. in the number of whippings, and an increase equal to nearly 57 per cent. in 'Other Punishments.' As regards the methods of punishment resorted to, it is thus evident that there was a greatly increased use of such minor forms of punishments as warnings, fines of marks and loss of other privileges under the remission system. The increase in these minor punishments, which are classed together in the table, was 2,589, which is larger than the total increase (2,116) in all offences taken together. The growth in the number of warnings from 1,378 in 1893 to 2,366 in the year under report accounts for nearly half of the entire increase in the number of punishments imposed during the year. The increase in corporal punishment, though large relatively to the figure in the previous year, is absolutely small; the ratio between whippings and all punishments other than whipping has only varied by .04 per cent., and the proportion of convicts whipped to daily average population, which was 1 in 46 or 2.2 per cent. throughout all the provinces of India in 1893, was only 1 in 77 or 1.3 per cent. in Madras in 1894. 24. Referring to the increase in recorded jail offences, it is, as has been stated in previous reports, a necessary result of the greater attention paid to the enforcement of tasks and to the detection of prohibited articles. The theory which was set forth in the Jail Reports of this Presidency ten years ago, that the conduct of convicts was proved to be good by the number of detected or recorded offences being small, may be demonstrated to be false both by *a priori* argument and by the evidence of experience. On the one hand, it is impossible to believe that a large number of criminals, whose commission of crime is frequently due to dislike of honest labour, would voluntarily assume habits of diligence immediately on admission to jail. On the other hand, the absence of all offences and punishments in Subsidiary Jails does not mean that there are no prohibited articles in those jails or that hard labour is uniformly enforced, for the contrary is known to be the case. The differences between different jails in the ratio of offences to population, as shown in column 12 of Statement No. VI, are not susceptible of complete explanation. There must always be inequalities in the number of punishments for offences relating to work; in a jail like the Coimbatore Central Jail, in which there is a single large industry, a convict having learnt his work finds little difficulty in doing it, whereas in other jails the transfer of a prisoner from one class of work to another, even from weaving one class of cloth to weaving a closely allied one, furnishes an excuse for idleness. The number of recorded offences relating to prohibited articles mainly depends on the amount of trouble that is devoted to searches. The small

number of recorded offences of both classes and the reduced proportion of punishments to population in the Cannanore Central Jail must be regarded as evidence of inefficient administration. Of the 51 cases returned in column 5 (c) of Statement No. VI against the Rajahmundry Central Jail, 46 are reported by the Superintendent to have been of a trivial character. The Superintendent of the Cannanore Central Jail similarly reports that the 39 cases returned in the same sub-column against his jail were of a trivial nature. The larger number of such cases recorded in these two jails is probably due to a difference in classification.

25. The next Statement, viz., No. VII, deals with the employment of convicts as prison officers. In accordance with the directions contained in paragraph 5 of Home Department Resolution No. 10, Jails—668-79, dated 13th December 1894, the numbering of this, and of all subsequent statements has been altered from that which was followed in previous reports. Great care has been exercised by Superintendents of Central Jails in reducing the number of convict officers employed and in no case has the 10 per cent. limit been exceeded, in spite of a smaller jail population and of the number of convict warder guards being fixed. The classification of convict officers for the purposes of this statement in this and other provinces is under examination and, if necessary, the Government will be addressed. The proportion of convict officers punished or reduced is high in the Salem Central Jail, as in the previous year, but the Superintendent explains that, when he took charge in 1892, the convict officers were a very indifferent lot and that it has been necessary to weed them out. He considers that the number of punishments will now show a reduction, as more careful selection has produced a better class of convict officer. The proportion of convict officers punished or reduced in the Cannanore Central Jail is, as was noticed of the total punishments in connection with Statement VI, unduly low. The usual table exhibiting the percentage of convict officers' employment in Central Jails during each of the last ten years is annexed:—

26. Statement No. VIII exhibits the diet scales in use during the year. No change in the ordinary diet scales was introduced during 1894. The punishment diets were revised on the coming into force of the Prisons' Act IX of 1894 and a scale of diet was framed and prescribed for State prisoners confined in jails.

PART II.—FINANCIAL.

27. The gross expenditure of the Jail Department during 1894 is compared in the following table with that of the four preceding years. The total amount, viz., Rs. 10,34,227-14-0 differs by Rs. 19-3-8 from the amount recorded in the Accountant-General's registers, owing to certain errors in the latter, which will be duly pointed out.

28. The general result of the year's expenditure was a decrease of Rs. 18,593, composed of decreased outlay under rations, hospital charges, clothing, contingencies and petty construction and repair and of increased expenditure under establishment and manufactures. The increased charges under establishment are due mainly to the compensation for exchange allowance having been drawn throughout the year and at higher rates than in 1893. One jail, moreover, Vellore, drew pay for thirteen months within the year, the

salaries due for December 1893 being drawn after, and those due for December 1894 before, the Christmas holidays. The larger drawings under manufactures were due to larger operations. Under rations, the saving of Rs. 24,763 was caused partly by there being a smaller jail population and partly by an actual reduction in cost in central and district jails. The saving of Rs. 3,235 under clothing and of Rs. 6,430 under contingencies was produced by a similar cause. The small reduction of Rs. 378 under hospital charges requires no explanation.

29. Financial Statement No. IX shows the expenditure incurred in guarding and maintaining prisoners in jail during 1894, and Financial Statement No. X compares the average cost per head in the year under report with that of the three previous years. In the following table an abstract of the results appearing in Statement IX is compared with those of 1893:—

30. The general result of the year is an increase of As. 14-9 in the rate per head, which is more than accounted for by the higher cost under establishment, consequent partly on the payment of higher salaries through the compensation for exchange allowance, as already explained, and partly on the smaller jail population among which the fixed charges

for establishment have to be divided. The latter is the more important cause, for it will be observed that the actual increase under establishment is only Rs. 4,779, while the decreases under other heads shown in Statement IX aggregate Rs. 31,806. There is a reduction in the rate per head under each head of expenditure which is susceptible of control from this office, viz., rations, clothing and contingencies.

31. The best result among the several classes of jails is shown by central jails in which the average cost per head is only 8 pice in excess of that of 1893, in spite of an increase equal to Rs. 2-2-5 per head on account of establishment charges. Among district jails, a similar, though somewhat less favourable result appears; economies under rations and contingencies have reduced a rise of Rs. 2-2-5 per head for establishment and hospital charges to a net increase of As. 7 a head. The Civil Jail, Madras, shows a large rise in the rate per head under establishment, partly due to a smaller population and partly to pay for a certain deceased officer which accrued in 1893 being drawn in 1894. There is a small increase under contingencies, owing to purchase of a stock of kerosine oil. In the Criminal Leper Ward there is a rise under rations, but a corresponding decrease under hospital charges, and this change merely means that certain leper convicts received raggi diet instead of rice. The only remaining class of jails is subsidiary jails, and here the results are eminently unsatisfactory, but they will be noticed more particularly in the subsequent part of this report dealing with this class of jails and are, therefore, not further referred to here.

32. The average cost of rations per head in all classes of jails other than subsidiary jails was Rs. 26-11-3, which is the lowest figure yet recorded in this presidency, the next lowest rate having been Rs. 26-14-5 in 1891. It should be added that a considerable increase has been made to the cost of the dietary since that year, and that the stocks of grain in hand at the end of 1894 were worth just Rs. 10,000 more than those in hand at the beginning, several Superintendents having laid in supplies at the beginning of the year in accordance with the population then in jail, which considerably diminished as the year advanced. If this sum of Rs. 10,000 were excluded from the accounts, as it should be in order to obtain any real estimate of the cost of the year, the average charge for rations would be only Rs. 25-8-5, and the increase in total cost, which is referred to in paragraph 30 *supra*, would disappear. The actual value of ration stocks at the beginning and end of the year was as follows:—

The average price of raggi fell 19 per cent., that of cholam 20 per cent. and that of rice 11 per cent., as compared with the previous year. Assuming that five-sixths of the grain used in jails are raggi or cholam and one-sixth rice, the average reduction in the price of the grains consumed in jails was equal to about 18 per cent. The reduction in rations under all classes of jails other than sub-jails, as shown in Statement No. IX, is Rs. 1-4-2 per head, equal to 4.5 per cent. on the figures of 1893, but the real reduction, allowing for increase in the stock of grain, is Rs. 2-7-9, from which it will be seen that the reduction in cost of rations did not altogether keep pace with the fall in grain prices. There are other articles in the dietary, especially mutton, dal, oil and condiments which would account for this result. The following table is, as usual, derived from the weekly price lists published by the Board of Revenue:—

34. In the year under report the true cost of rations in individual jails is so much affected by the value of the stocks of rations which were in hand at the end of the year that it is necessary to allow for this factor before attempting to make a comparison

of the cost incurred. Accordingly a table is given below in which the cost per head of rations as shown in Statement No. IX is compared as regards each central and district jail with the cost per head after allowance is made for the value of the opening and closing ration stocks. In the case of those jails in which the value of the stock at the end of the year was greater than the value at the beginning, a deduction equal to the difference has been made from the nominal outlay under rations, and in those cases in which the value of the stock of rations was diminished during the year, a corresponding addition has been made to the cost per head shown in Statement No. IX. It will be observed that the true cost per head of rations, as shown in column 3 of this table, differs materially from that shown in column 2.

35. The highest cost per head of rations in any central or district jail is shown by the Cuddapah District Jail, and has not been at all explained by the Superintendent. From the total amount, a deduction of Rs. 290, equal to about Rs. 1½ per head, has to be made for charges of 1893 adjusted in 1894. For the rest, the only apparent cause was the purchase of raggi and other rations at very dear rates throughout the year. The Jailor of this jail is the same officer who was employed at the Cuddalore District Jail in 1890, 1891, 1892 and 1893, when that jail usually headed the list. If the Cuddapah District Jail is not closed, steps to prevent the

recurrence of this state of affairs will be taken. The next highest rate per head is shown by the Penitentiary. In explanation, the Superintendent points out that his jail has to bear the cost of dieting European prisoners, that it has no lands on which cereals can be grown or sheep kept as in other central jails, and that its facilities for buying articles of rations at cheap rates in the villages are much smaller than those of mofussil jails. There is undoubtedly force in these arguments, but comparing the figures of 1894 with those of 1890 and 1891, I do not think that the high rate of the year under report is sufficiently accounted for. The increased dietary now allowed to short-term prisoners may have affected the Penitentiary more than other jails. The exact effect of this cause is being investigated. The third highest rate is that of the Trichinopoly Central Jail. The Superintendent states that the cost of rations in his jail was unfavourably influenced by a large purchase of raggi being made early in the year; if the laying in of stock had been made two months later, better rates would have been secured, as prices fell considerably in April. This could not have been foreseen, and the Superintendent's explanation, so far as it goes, is correct. But this does not account for more than Rs. 1-2-0 per head of the rations charges, and leaves the jail fully Rs. 2-0-0 per head above the average rate of the other six central jails. This excess the Superintendent attributes to the high price paid for mutton and oil, but he has not explained why a higher price had to be paid for these articles, and further information has been called for.

36. In the Vizagapatam District Jail, which shows the next highest cost per head under rations, the rate was also prejudiced by an unfavourable purchase of raggi made through a Tahsildar in the district. In the preceding year this plan had proved successful. The Madura and Bellary District Jails stand next. No explanation of the high cost per head is forthcoming. In the case of the Madura Jail, it may be ascribed to an inefficient or dishonest jailor, who is now dead; in that of the Bellary District Jail to constant changes in the office of Superintendent. The position of this jail during 1894 will be more specially noticed in the vital portion of the report. It is hoped that in both cases an improvement has now been effected. As in preceding years the lowest cost per head under rations is shown by the Mangalore District Jail.

37. The cause of the higher cost per head under establishment has already been explained, and the differences between individual jails do not call for much notice, as they are mostly dependent on the number of convicts among whom the charges have to be divided. Hence it is that Salem, which is now the smallest of central jails, shows the highest rate per head under establishment. Similarly the marked reduction in the Rajahmundry Central Jail is due to the rise in average population, which has been effected by the closing of the Guntur District Jail. Among district jails, increments drawn by jailors and assistant jailors, and the grade of jailor employed, necessarily affect the rate per head under establishment. Jailors belonging to the first grade were, during the whole or part of the year, employed at the district jails of Russellkonda, Berhampur, Nellore and Parvatipuram. The high cost per head at Mangalore is due to the smallness of the jail population.

38. In the new form of Statement No. IX, which has been prescribed in Home Department Resolution, No. 10 Jails—668—79, dated 13th December 1894, and which will be adopted in future reports, hospital charges have, in accordance with a suggestion from this presidency, been sub-divided into several heads, of which the most important are (1) cost of food, whether regular diet or extras, of patients actually in hospital, (2) cost of all extra or substituted articles of food issued on medical recommendation to persons not in hospital, (3) cost of medicines, and other hospital necessities for all classes of patients. It is evident that unless the charges, which are at present lumped together under hospital charges in Statement No. IX, are thus sub-divided, no comparison of any value can be drawn between different jails. The information necessary for this classification of hospital charges has been collected during the year under report and is now presented in the following table, which, in future years, will be incorporated in Statement No. IX itself:—

39. Referring first to the cost of dieting the actual sick in hospital, it will be seen that the highest cost per head is shown by the Coimbatore Central Jail. No cause for this is known and the Medical officer will be asked to explain. The second highest rate appears in the Tanjore District Jail, but in this case it is known that there were several longstanding and serious cases in hospital, for whom expensive extras may have been necessary. The same cause is believed to have been in operation at the Cannanore Central Jail and the Penitentiary, but further enquiries will be made. No cause is apparent for the high cost shown at the Bellary District Jail, and the attention of the Medical officer will be drawn to the matter. The second subdivision of hospital charges shows the extent to which the extra food has been issued to prisoners not in hospital on medical recommendation. The highest rates are shown by the Palamcottah, Cuddalore, Bellary and Párvatipuram District Jails, and in each of these jails it is probable that there has been an undue tendency to issue rice diets for long periods to sickly men. In three out of these four jails the health has not been all that could be desired, and there is a danger lest resort to rice diet should be used to bolster up the health of a jail where the ordinary food is not properly looked after. The third head of hospital charges includes medicines and hospital supplies of all kinds other than food. The Medical officers of the Penitentiary and of the Rajahmundry Central Jail will be asked to explain the high rates appearing against those jails. It should be added that none of the Medical officers concerned have yet been given an opportunity of explaining the figures in this table, as its compilation has only just been completed.

40. The cost of clothing supplied to prisoners in central and district jails during 1894 amounted to Rs. 2 4 0 ahead as against Rs. 2 6 6 in the previous year. The variations between the several central jails are not very great. At the Penitentiary the expense of providing clothing for European prisoners and transportation convicts raises the rate per head. The issues of clothing in the Coimbatore Central Jail were very small in 1893 and this produced a higher rate in the year under report. The average of the two years is

only Rs. 2-3-6. The cost of clothing in the Rajahmundry Central Jail shows a considerable reduction, but was still above the average owing to a special issue of canvas to make cloaks for outgangs during the wet months. Among district jails, the comparatively high cost of clothing at Cuddalore was mainly due to the bedding having been destroyed by white-ants, which attack the blankets even while the prisoners are sleeping on them. On this account sheeting has lately been issued instead. The next highest rate is shown by the Berhampur and Vizagapatam District Jails. The Superintendent of the first-named jail has not offered any explanation of the comparatively large expenditure recorded against his jail, and he will now be called upon to do so. In the Vizagapatam District Jail extra outlay was caused by the adjustment of a large issue of cumbles. It will be remembered that in the report for 1893, it was explained that variations between the cost of clothing in jails was due to different manufacturing jails charging different prices for their articles. This accounted for the high rate charged against the Rajahmundry and Berhampur Jails in 1893. Since then a uniform scale of prices for articles of jail supply has been fixed. District jails show a lower average cost under 'Clothing' than central jails owing to short-term convicts in the former class of jails receiving only one suit. The rules contained in Chapter XXIV of the Jail Code, directing the issue of clothing to be made 'according to requirements' (Rule 463), have not worked well and are condemned by almost all Superintendents. They were based on Drs. Walker and Lethbridge's recommendations (Report 1889, Chapter XV, para. 3), but it will probably be necessary to revert to a modified system of fixed issues. The matter will be submitted for the orders of Government in a separate communication.

41. The last head of account is contingencies, and this also, as in the case of hospital charges, will in future be sub-divided under several sub-heads, which will give much additional information as to the real causes of discrepancies between jails. In the following table the total amounts of the several sub-heads maintained by the Accountant-General are exhibited in comparison with the corresponding figures for the three previous years:—

42. The first item included in this account, viz., Transfer of Prisoners, shows an increase of Rs. 2,476. Of this increase, Rs. 950 relates to sub-jails and is the result of increases in several districts, especially Vizagapatam, Kistna, Kurnool, North Arcot, Trichinopoly, Madura and Tinnevely. The remaining Rs. 1,500 is connected with central and district jails, and is due partly to the larger number of Burmese convicts who were re-transferred to the Rangoon Central Jail during the year. The cost of re-transferring 38 additional Burman convicts to Rangoon would be Rs. 817 for the sea-passage alone. The balance, which would not be large, was presumably

due to the transfers made being for longer distances than in 1893. The reduction under the second item included in the table is the result of a smaller jail population. As was explained in the report for 1893, the transportation charges in that year were unduly swelled by adjustment of sums relating to 1892; hence the small amount spent in 1894. The saving under uniform and charges admissible without detailed audit is the result of economy, while that under Ordnance supplies is due to the absence of extraordinary charges for arms or other equipment, and the fall in travelling allowance may be ascribed to the abolition of the affiliation system which was described in paragraph 108 of the last report. An increased outlay under Purchase of land was produced by the acquisition of the cholera camping-ground for the Rajahmundry Central Jail. It will be observed that the total average cost per head under contingencies in all jails other than sub-jails decreased by 8.3 per cent. as compared with 1893, by 25.4 per cent. as compared with 1892, and by 40 per cent. as compared with 1891.

43. In future reports, as has already been observed, the outlay under contingencies will be sub-divided among various sub-heads. Unless the expenditure is thus classified and analysed, no comparison of any value can be made between individual jails. On the present occasion, although no change has been made in Statement No. IX, the figures have been sub-divided among the several sub-heads at present maintained by the Accountant-General, and in the following table an analysis of the outlay in each central and district jail, the Criminal Leper Ward, and the Civil Jail, Madras, is presented. This table, while it will be useful for purposes of comparison next year, will convey much fuller information as to the real nature of the outlay under contingencies than has ever been given before.

44. With the details shown in this table available, comparatively little further explanation of the variations of expenditure between individual jails is called for. One noteworthy point is the comparatively small proportion of the contingent expenditure which

can be efficiently controlled by Superintendents of Jails. Thus, the cost of transfer of prisoners depends in the case of the district jails on the number of long-term prisoners received or on the relation of accommodation to population. Batta to discharged prisoners is strictly determined by the number of prisoners discharged and the distances they have to travel to their homes. Transportation charges are fixed by the number of prisoners sentenced to be transported. Cost of uniform by the strength of the Warder Establishment. Rent, rates and taxes by orders of Government or the assessment of local authorities. It is only under charges admissible without detailed audit, charges for postage, telegrams and freight, and in a less degree, under Ordnance supplies and travelling allowances that Superintendents can exercise any effective control over the expenditure.

45. Among central jails the highest rate per head under contingencies is shown by the Penitentiary, in which the outlay is increased by several special items, especially Rs. 2,459 for house rent to the Superintendent and Warders, Rs. 2,258 for municipal taxation, and Rs. 360 for Superintendent's carriage allowance. The cost of service postage is also heavy in this jail, owing to the despatch of forms and registers being made from Madras. As, however, the figures show a large outlay under charges admissible without detailed audit, this item will be further examined, as well as the causes of the large outlay on transfer of prisoners which are not understood. The next largest expenditure under contingencies occurs against the Rajahmundry and Cannanore Central Jails. In the case of the first-named jail the high rate per head and the increase over the figure of 1893 is principally due to the special item of Rs. 900 for the cholera camping-ground. At the Cannanore Central Jail the outlay under charges admissible without detailed audit is high, and the Superintendent's explanation that this was caused by the provision of new food trays and to other repairs does not seem to deal with the matter adequately. Further explanation will be called for.

46. As in the case of establishment, the rate per head under contingencies in the smaller district jails is greatly influenced by the jail population, among which the fixed items of expenditure, such as those for lighting, have to be divided. Hence the high rates per head shown by the Nellore, Russellkonda, Berhampur, and Mangalore District Jails. In the Bellary District Jail, the expenditure on transfer of prisoners on account of overcrowding, batta to discharged prisoners, and transportation charges account for much of the high rate apparent, but there seems to have been want of economy also under charges admissible without detailed audit, and the Superintendent's attention will be drawn to the matter. The cause of the high rate per head under contingencies shown by the Cuddapah District Jail is evidently the exorbitant municipal taxation. In the case of the Cuddalore District Jail, the cost of transfers necessary to relieve overcrowding explains the heaviness of the charges, and in the Madura District Jail, the municipal taxes for two years were paid within the year under report. The Trichinopoly Central Jail and the Tanjore District Jail show, on the whole, the most economical administration under this head of charge.

47. As over 40 per cent. of the amount included in total cost is on account of establishment, the outlay on which is entirely beyond the control of Superintendents, and as the rate resulting thereupon is almost completely dependent on the population of the jail, the relative total cost of the several jails cannot, for the most part, be profitably compared. This is evident from the fact that the Madura District Jail shows the lowest total cost per head of any central or district jail, its rate per head under establishment being exceptionally small, owing to a large convict population. The Tanjore District Jail and the Vellore Central Jail stand next and in these cases, while part of the result is due to a large convict population, much of it must be ascribed to careful and economical superintendence. It appears unnecessary to refer to differences in total cost amongst other jails, as these depend on causes that have already been examined in detail above.

48. No reference has been made to the figures relating to subsidiary jails in the foregoing paragraphs, because this class of jails is under entirely different conditions from central and district jails; its connection with this office subsists merely for statistical and financial purposes,

and practically the entire control is vested in the magistracy. The following table gives, in the usual form, the number of subsidiary jails in each district, the average population, and the average cost per head under each head of account :—

49. The average cost per head under Rations in subsidiary jails was Rs. 40-1-4, an increase of Rs. 3-1-6 per head over the cost of the previous year. Considering the facts that grain prices are shown to have fallen about 18 per cent. in the year, and that the cost of rations in central and district jails was decreased by 45 per cent. in spite of increased rations' stocks, the results in subsidiary jails appear to be decidedly unsatisfactory. It has, however, to be remembered that the revision of the diet scale in sub-jails which, in consequence of the orders of the Government of

India, was sanctioned in G.O., No. 1012, Judicial, dated 16th May 1893, considerably increased the expensiveness of the dietary. The average cost recorded in 1894 is almost exactly equal to a daily rate of As. 1-9 per head. The districts showing the heaviest cost are Nilgiris, Chingleput, Coimbatore, Madura, Anantapur and Malabar. It is very doubtful whether there is any good reason (except in regard to the Nilgiris) why the cost of dieting sub-jail prisoners in these districts should exceed the cost exhibited in neighbouring districts, such as North Arcot, South Arcot, Tanjore, Tinnevely and South Canara. The statements of dieting charges which are furnished quarterly to this office by District Magistrates under G.O., 10th April 1894, No. 860, Judicial, have been duly scrutinized, and numerous references have been made to District Magistrates regarding the figures shown in them. It was, however, impossible in any case to do more than invite attention to excessively high rates, and little result has been produced.

50. The total outlay on sub-jail establishment is greater by Rs. 435 than in 1893. It has increased by Rs. 1,509 equal to 13 per cent. in the last five years, and will show a further advance during the current year. The cost per head was As. 13-3 per head higher in 1894 than in the preceding year, the increased rate being mainly due to a smaller sub-jail population. The districts showing the chief increases are Ganjam, Vizagapatam, Kistna and Madura.

51. No large supplies of clothing or bedding were made to the subsidiary jails of any district during the year, and hence there was a reduction by more than one-half in the outlay under this head. As clothing and bedding is now mostly obtained on indent on this office, it has been kept down as much as possible. The highest rate per head is shown by the North Arcot, Kistna, Anantapur and Gódvári districts. Of these the three last-named incurred no expenditure on clothing in 1893.

52. The items of sub-jail expenditure, which are included under the head 'Other charges' are classified in the next table as far as the details maintained in the Accountant-General's registers allow. In my letter, No. 6469, dated 7th November 1894, I explained in detail the causes which have hitherto produced such widely different rates in different districts. The instructions which were then circulated seem to have had some effect in reducing anomalies and to this cause is probably to be attributed the increase of Rs. 950 under 'Conveyance of Prisoners'. Under 'Rent rates and taxes' the Municipal taxes on the Calicut Sub-jail were evidently not paid during the year. The chief increases in 'Charges admissible without detailed audit' occurred in the Vizagapatam, Kurnool, Salem, Chingleput, Madura and South Canara districts :—

53. Statements IX and X, dealing with the regular expenditure of the department, being thus concluded, the next statement appended to the report is No. XI, which shows the employment of convicts in jails during the year. Great pains have been taken to improve the accuracy of this return by the more careful maintenance of the Labour Register in jails, and, by the orders of the Government of India conveyed in Home Department Letter, No. 346, dated 23rd June 1894, the doubtful points as to its compilation have been settled and various difficulties removed. The following table shows in the usual form the chief results of Statement No. XI for 1894 and five previous years :—

54. The chief features presented by this table are a decrease in the proportion of the convict labouring population employed as convict officers and convict servants; a similar decrease in the number employed in preparing articles for jail use and in alterations and additions to jail. On the other hand, there is a large increase in the number and proportion employed on manufactures, and in the proportion employed on gardening and jail repairs. As these changes indicate that the jails, as a whole, were worked with greater economy of convict labour on unproductive services, thus setting free more convicts for remunerative employment on manufactures, gardening and farmwork, they call for no remark. In the Cuddalore District Jail, an average number of 3.34 convicts is shown as hired out to Municipalities, private individuals or departments other than the Public Works Department. This entry represents a gang of convicts which annually repairs the last half mile of road leading to the jail at the cost of the District Board, an arrangement which received the sanction of Government in G.O., 19th May 1892, No. 939. At the Berhampur District Jail, an average number of 1.15 convicts is entered in the same column of Statement No. XI, and represents the employment of one and occasionally two convicts to look after the calves of the District Board's vaccine depot in a shed just outside the jail. This was reported in paragraph 68 of the Report for 1893.

55. Among central jails, Cannanore is the only one which shows more than 10 per cent. of the labouring population employed as convict servants. The Superintendent has been requested to effect a reduction during the current year. The highest proportion of convict servants employed in district jails is shown by the Cuddalore District Jail, and the Superintendent explains that this is due partly to the number of orderlies required for the sick and partly to the distance to which excreta have to be carried by the scavenger gang. In the Madura District Jail, the Superintendent promises to effect a reduction in the proportion of convict servants, and orders to the same effect have been issued to the Bellary and Cuddalore District Jails. In the small jails of Russellkonda, Nellore and Mangalore, the proportion of convict servants cannot always be kept down to 10 per cent. Gardening is an important item in this statement, as the return derived from cultivating the jail lands with cereals and vegetables is considerable. The figures call for no remark, except as regards the Parvatipuram Hill Jail. From the explanation submitted by the Superintendent of that jail, of the large number of convicts shown as employed in gardening, it appears that some of the entries relate to the scavenger gang and should have been placed in column 8 C. Jail repairs is a somewhat indefinite head, and the number of convicts so employed varies with the number of works of petty repair in progress. Under manufactures, the smallest ratios of convicts thus employed are shown by the Parvatipuram and Nellore District Jails. In the case of the first-named jail, manufactures were much interfered with by the epidemic of sickness which occurred during the second half of the year. The only cause apparent at the Nellore District Jail is the omission of the Superintendent and Jailor to develop the manufacturing operations of the Jail. On the whole the ratio of convicts employed on manufactures was the highest on record, the next highest figure being 35.84 per cent. in 1882.

56. The next Statement No. XII is concerned with manufactures, and shows the drawings from and payments into the treasury on this account, together with the profits derived from the same. Under all the three heads the figures are considerably larger than in the previous year. If the comparison is carried further back, it appears that the manufacturing operations of 1894 are by far the largest on record in this presidency, as the following figures for fifteen years show. Prior to the year 1879 the value of articles supplied to the Jail Department and valued on no known principle was included in the manufacturing accounts, and hence no comparison of the figures can be made.

In the early years of this series, it must be remembered that the Police Department paid a much higher price for its cloth than it now does, which accounts for the profits then made. 57. The figures which appear from this table, and from Statement No. XII, on which it is based, are much more favourable than in 1893. But, as was pointed out in the report for that year, the results shown by Statement No. XII, considered by themselves are

entirely unreliable, and may easily become fallacious and misleading. In order to form any estimate of the real working of the manufacturing department in jails, it is absolutely necessary to take into account outstandings and stocks, and, as the form of statement prescribed by the Government of India omits to do this, a supplementary statement has been framed and is printed as Statement XII-A, in which the necessary additional data are given. In the following remarks, no further reference will be made to Statement XII, which is clearly incomplete and unreliable, and attention will be directed to Statement XII-A. This has been drawn up in the form recommended by the Accountant-General in his Letter No. L.B.A. 8., dated 31st January 1895.

58. The true manufacturing profits of the year 1894 amount, as will be seen, to Rs. 1,19,833-5-3. This result is made up of the following increases and decreases :—

Excluding the increase due to plant and machinery, which is hardly a legitimate item to be taken credit for in forming a reliable estimate of the working of the manufacturing departments, the net profits were Rs. 1,16,465-8-10, about Rs. 2,744 more than is shown in Statement No. XII. It will be seen that there has been a reduction in the stock of manufactured articles, showing that the larger profits are not due to the accumulation of unsaleable goods, and that the value of no raw materials, which were unpaid for at the end of the year, has been taken credit for. The profits are, thus, clearly genuine, and their distribution between the several jails is far more equable and reliable than that shown in Statement No. XII.

59. The first place in manufacturing profits is occupied by the Vellore Central Jail, in which the transactions of the year realized a true profit of Rs. 25,269. This result is less favourable than that shown in Statement XII, because the latter does not allow for the reduction in the stock of raw materials and in bills due to the jail which occurred. Still the figure in Statement XII-A is very creditable to the jail. The next largest profits are shown by the Penitentiary. The bulk of these was earned by the labour of convicts employed in the Press, and the earnings of the manufacturing department proper were small. The special attention of the Superintendent has been drawn to this matter. The Coimbatore Central Jail stands third with Rs. 14,262. In Statement XII, the profits of this jail are small, no allowance being made for the large increase in the stock of manufactured articles, especially police drill, of which at the end of 1894, the jail had 95,000 yards in stock after supplying the police demand in full. As it is clear that this reserve is excessive, it will be reduced to 50,000 yards during the current year.

60. The next place in manufacturing profits is occupied by the Tanjore District Jail, where the results are again very favourable to the jail, even to a larger extent than is shown by Statement XII. The Rajahmundry Central Jail shows earnings of Rs. 8,162, which is a creditable result when it is remembered that half way through 1893 the manufacturing department was Rs. 3,180 in debt. (See this office Letter, No. 4443, dated 27th September 1893.) There is reason to think that a considerable extension of the manufacturing operations and profits of this jail may be possible in future, consequent on the opening and extension of the East Coast Railway. The Trichinopoly Central Jail shows a profit of Rs. 7,894, a result which will, it is hoped, be improved upon during the current

year. The Palamcottah District Jail has done well, earning Rs. 7,534, nearly the same amount as is shown in Statement XII.

61. The Cannanore Central Jail, which according to Statement XII was worked at a loss, earned a sum of Rs. 6,439, but a deduction of some Rs. 779 must be made from this as representing merely an increase in plant. The chief reason why the Cannanore Central Jail failed to show any cash earnings within the year 1894 was the Superintendent's omission to complete and deliver his allotment of police boots, which was due on the 1st December, by the prescribed date. The Salem Central Jail, being the smallest, stands last among central jails; it will be seen that the profits of this jail as shown in Statement XII are greatly exaggerated, or rather that the figure there exhibited, Rs. 12,079, really represents the profits of 1893 and 1894. Considering its size and opportunities, the results are fairly favourable. The last of the larger manufacturing jails, that of Bellary, shows a much less satisfactory result in Statement XII-A than in Statement XII, and ought undoubtedly to have done better.

62. Among the small district jails, the jails at Madara and Vizagapatam stand first, while the worst results are shown by Nellore and Párvatipuram. The remarks which were made in paragraph 55 *supra* regarding the proportion of convicts employed on manufactures in these jails are again applicable here. The great progress made in manufactures in the Russellkonda Jail is noticeable, and may be ascribed to the substitution of a young and energetic jailor in place of Mr. Reay, and to the interest taken in the jail by recent Special Assistant Agents, Messrs. Oldfield and Moore.

63. The manufacturing receipts of sub-jails increased from Rs. 541 in 1893 to Rs. 1,138 in the year under report. Of the latter figure, Rs. 473 were contributed by the Malabar district, Rs. 290 by the Kistna district, Rs. 88 by the Tanjore district and Rs. 51 by the Trichinopoly district. In all other districts the amounts were below Rs. 50. In Vizagapatam, Bellary and Anantapur there were no receipts, while in Madara, Nilgiris, Salem, Cuddapah, Nellore and Gódvári they ranged from a few annas to under six rupees. No reason for these differences is known.

64. The last of the Financial Statements, No. XIII, shows the net cost of the prisoners in jail during the year, *i.e.*, the average cost of maintenance per head less the cash earnings or manufacturing profits as shown in Statement No. XII. The increased profits of the year more than counterbalance the small enhancement in cost of maintenance, which, as has been shown, is only nominal, and the net cost per head is, therefore, Rs. 52-1-0, which is the lowest on record in this presidency. The figures for the last ten years are as follow:—

65. The total value of articles of jail manufacture, which were supplied for the use of jails during the year and which are consequently not included in Statements XII and XIII, was Rs. 31,473 against Rs. 32,566 in the previous year. The value of vegetables grown by jail labour and supplied for jail consumption was Rs. 16,803 as compared with Rs. 11,629 in 1893. The increased allowance of vegetables in the jail dietary has thrown a considerably heavier task on jail gardens than existed before. The supply of vegetables thus made was equal to an average saving of Rs. 2 0-6 per head in central jails and of Rs. 1-14-7 per head in district jails.

PART III.—VITAL.

Vital Statement No. XIV
—General results.

66. The main results of the year in respect to sickness and mortality are exhibited in Vital Statement No. XIV, and are compared in the following table with those of the previous ten years:—

It will be observed that, judged by the ratio of sick to population, the year under report was a less healthy one than its immediate predecessor, but that in spite of this circumstance, there was a further improvement in mortality, which was the lowest since 1886. If deaths from cholera are excluded, the death-rate of 1894 was only 18.2 per mille, which is practically equal with the lowest ratio ever recorded in this Presidency, namely, 18.2 and 18.0 in 1885 and 1886, respectively.

67. The results of 1894 in regard to classes of jails are compared in the following table with those of the previous five years. The mortality in central jails is lower than in any other year included in the period; that in district jails is higher than in any year except 1889, but this unfavourable feature is entirely due to a single jail—Párvatipuram. If that jail were excluded, the death-rate in district jails would be only 21.6 per mille. The ratio of deaths to population at the Criminal Leper Ward is high, but as all the inmates are admitted suffering from leprosy, perhaps this is inevitable:—

68. The usual table showing the sickness and mortality in individual jails for a period of eight years follows. The cases requiring special notice are those shown by the Párvatipuram, Cuddapah, Mangalore and Bellary District Jails:—

Berhampur District Jail and the continuance of a low death-rate in the Vizagapatam District Jail are also noticeable. If it had not been for the unfortunate and partially unexplained outbreak at Parvatipuram, the year 1894 would have established a record.

74. Departing from the usual practice and from the order of the statements, it seems convenient at this point to notice the condition of prisoners as evidenced by their weight on discharge. The following table furnishes a comparison between the results of 1894 and those of the four previous years in each central and district jail :—

75. The figures herein contained supply some instructive information bearing on the vital statistics of the year. It will be observed, as regards the Parvatipuram Jail, that the percentage of prisoners who were found on discharge to have lost weight in jail, though higher than in 1893, was still small. If the weighments are correctly taken, this seems to negative any theory that the sickness and mortality was due to deficient food-supply. On the other hand, in the case of the Cuddapah District Jail, the percentage of prisoners who lost weight in jail was large, and there can be little doubt that, if the medical administration of the jail had not, during the greater part of the year, been careful and efficient, the mortality would have been much larger than it was. The prevalence of ague in this jail sufficiently accounts for the loss of weight. The deterioration in health which occurred in the Bellary District Jail is clearly brought out by the weighments. The improvement in weighments in most of the central jails during the last two years, as compared with 1890 and 1891, is very marked. The exception furnished by the Cannanore Central Jail is due to the closing of the Calicut District Jail in 1892 and to the consequent receipt of large numbers of short-term prisoners at Cannanore. It is a well-known fact that short-term prisoners more often lose weight in jail than those who, during a lengthy term, have become used to jail diet and discipline. The explanation of the increased proportion of prisoners who lost weight during imprisonment at Berhampur in 1894 is probably to be found in the comparatively large number of small losses under 5 lbs. each occurring among short-term prisoners. Other variations do not appear to call for detailed notice.

76. The general results in regard to the condition of prisoners on discharge during the year under report as compared with previous years are shown in the following table. The proportion of prisoners

who gained weight in jail is the highest since 1886, just as the death-rate was above noticed to be the lowest since that year :—

77. Vital Statement No. XV, which stands next, deals with the diseases causing sickness and mortality during the year. Several of the headings included in this statement require revision, for they are not in accordance with present nomenclature of disease and are liable to become absolutely misleading. The Surgeon-General's opinion has been sought, and the Government will be addressed in due course. The following table shows the ratios of admissions and deaths from the chief classes of disease during 1894 and each of the five previous years :—

78. The most remarkable feature in these figures is the great reduction in the cases of and mortality from the diseases hitherto classed as dysentery and diarrhoea which have for years been the chief cause of death in Madras Jails. It is to be hoped that this reduction will be maintained and there seems reason to believe that, with a population properly fed and showing a fair standard of general health, the liability to these forms of disease will be found to be diminished. The increase in respiratory disorders, notably pneumonia, is, on the other hand, an unsatisfactory feature of the last two years, but the figures relating to individual jails fluctuate so much from year to year that it is difficult to draw any certain conclusions as to the causes of the increase. In this class of disease the admission rate is likely to be more important than the death-rate, as the recovery or death of the patients may depend on causes independent of those inducing the attack. The Cannanore Central Jail and Cuddapah District Jail show, as might be expected, a large number of cases, but the reasons for the high rate at Salem Central Jail and the Penitentiary are not apparent. It is not impossible that the classification of diseases in compiling this statement is faulty, and before the next report is written, endeavours will be made to obtain clear directions for the preparation of the statement as well as a revision of its headings.

79. The next statement appended to this report is that newly prescribed in Home Department Resolution No. 697—796—16, Jails, dated 21st December 1893, and shows mortality among convicts according to length of their original sentences. Although the Government of India in its letter, No. 346, dated 23rd June 1894 has explained the purpose which this statement is supposed to serve, its practical utility has not yet been understood, and it appears to call for no remark. It would be an advantage if this statement were abolished and one illustrating seasonal sickness and mortality were prescribed instead.

80. Statement No. XVII which follows, contains information of a somewhat more useful character, namely the proportionate mortality among convicts according to the time passed in jail. The figures presented in this statement have been obtained by means of a monthly census in the manner prescribed in the Home Department Resolution last referred to, and are now fairly correct. The usual summary of the results for 1894 and five previous years is appended. There is a reduction in the death-rate in all periods except the last, and as regards this the number of deaths is too few to be of guidance and the figures in previous years were probably incorrect :—

81. With reference to Home Department Letter, No. 2 Sanitary—53, dated 21st February 1895, I beg to state that the great advantage of prompt removal into camp on the occurrence of epidemic disease is fully admitted and recognized in this Presidency. The rules on this subject in Chapter XLII of the Jail Code were recently revised, so as to ensure immediate encampment on the appearance of epidemics, such as cholera, and the question of a camping-ground for each jail has been carefully examined during the last three years and is now in most cases satisfactorily settled. The only outbreak of cholera during 1894 occurred in the Vellore Central Jail, and though the epidemic was slight and did not necessitate the evacuation of the jail, tents were at once procured from Madras and each barrack in which a case occurred was emptied and disinfected. These measures were successful and the disease disappeared. There were in all 17 cases and 8 deaths. The first case occurred on the 30th December 1893 and the last on the 16th January 1894. It is to be regretted that it was not possible to remove part of the population of the Párvatipuram Jail into camp during the months of August and September, but the Superintendent reported that the weather was too wet for the course to be advisable.

PART IV.—MISCELLANEOUS.

82. The first of the miscellaneous statements annexed to the report is that which exhibits the nature and amount of accommodation for each class of prisoner in each Central and District Jail. The following table is an abstract of the results in comparison with the average population. The slight decrease in total accommodation is due to the closing of the Kurnool and Guntur District Jails :—

83. The total accommodation in Central Jails has increased from 7,427 in 1889 to 7,638 in 1893 and 7,702 in 1894. A quarantine block was completed at the Penitentiary during the year under report, and certain other additions to the accommodation of that jail were made. A close Prison and Civil Debtors' yard were under construction at the Salem Central Jail, and a Civil Debtors' yard is also being built at the Rajahmundry Central Jail. Under-trial prisoners are not received in the Vellore and Trichinopoly Central Jails, Civil prisoners (except State prisoners) are not received at the Penitentiary, and female prisoners are not received in the Central Jails at Trichinopoly and Salem. The arrangements for State prisoners in the Penitentiary are not satisfactory, and an under-trial yard is required at the Rajahmundry and Cannanore Central Jails. With these exceptions, the accommodation in Central Jails is generally adequate.

84. The total accommodation in District Jails has diminished from 3,866 in 1889 to 3,631 in 1893 and 3,494 in 1894, the decrease in the year under report being due to the closing of the Kurnool and Guntur Jails in 1893. Additional buildings were completed at Bellary, and were in progress at the Berhampur and Párvatipuram Jails. The plans and estimates for the new Jail at Cuddalore were sanctioned during the year, and work has now been commenced. The accommodation provided in District Jails is deficient in several instances. There is no separate yard for civil debtors at Nellore and Cuddalore, nor for under-trial prisoners at Russellkonda and Cuddalore. The accommodation for under-trial prisoners at the Palamcottah District Jail is frequently found insufficient. There was some overcrowding at Párvatipuram, Bellary, Cuddalore, Tanjore and Palamcottah, but in the case of the three jails first mentioned this will be relieved by the buildings newly erected or now in progress. Relief was afforded to the Tanjore and Palamcottah District Jails by transfers.

85. The accommodation at the Civil Jail, Madras, is ample. That at the Criminal Leper Ward is usually sufficient; the iron railing enclosing it is not a sufficient safeguard against escape.

86. Adverting to the letter of the Government of India, in the Home Department, No. 4, Jails, 213, dated 24th April 1894, regarding the policy of providing separate cubicles or separate compartments for each prisoner to sleep in, I beg to state that a scheme for converting three blocks at the Coimbatore Central Jail into cells and for providing wire-netting cubicles in the association wards of the Trichinopoly Central Jail was approved in G.O., 19th January 1895, No. 124, and that the necessary plans and estimates are under preparation in the Public Works Department. The new District Jail, which is about to be built at Cuddalore, is on the cellular system, and the recent additions to the convict accommodation of the Bellary, Salem and

Rajahmundry Jails have comprised cells. The provision of cubicles in already-existing association wards is a difficult matter and must be undertaken cautiously, lest the health of the inmates should suffer. In this connection, I observe that Sir John Tyler, the well-known Inspector-General of Prisons in the North-West Provinces, at the end of his report for 1893, instituted a comparison between the amount of cellular accommodation in this Presidency and in the North-West Provinces, and stated that there were only 1,265 cells in the former as compared with 3,475 in the latter. He omitted, however, to add that the total accommodation in the jails of the North-West Provinces is 33,772, while in Madras it is only 11,299. As the number of cells and cubicles in this Presidency is now 1,421, it will be seen that while $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of all the jail accommodation in Madras is cellular, the proportion in the North-West Provinces is only just over 10 per cent.

87. The next statement, which deals with weighments, has already been noticed. Statement C—Remission. Statement C, which follows, shows the working of the mark system during the year. A considerable change has been produced in the statistics of 1894 as compared with those of previous years by the extension of the mark system to convicts sentenced to one year and less than two years, who had not previously been eligible for remission. Through this cause alone the number of convicts released under the remission rules was increased by 942 or 125 per cent., thus more than doubling the work in connection with these rules. Small increases are also apparent under other periods, due to the heavy committals of preceding years. The following table shows the total number of prisoners released under the remission rules during 1894 and the five previous years:—

88. There was no cause to be dissatisfied with the working of the rules during the year. In the longer periods of sentence, uniform results as to remission earned are neither to be expected, nor desired, as they would point to a mechanical and unintelligent award of marks. It is probable that a lower average amount of remission earned at the Vellore Central Jail and the larger average amount at the Penitentiary are due to the differing personalities of the Superintendents, and no rules can prevent such divergences from arising. The exceedingly small average amount of remission earned by short-term prisoners in the Bellary, Palancessath and Russellkonah Jails is due to fines of marks being freely inflicted in these jails. In the Bellary District Jail, the system of finding marks was probably worked injudiciously. The small number of remission-earning convicts released from the Cuddalore and Nellore District Jails during the year was due to convicts sentenced to one year and upwards being transferred to Central Jails.

89. Statement D shows the nature of the crimes for which convicts were imprisoned during 1894. A further increase is apparent in the proportion borne by 'Offences against other laws' to crimes under the Penal Code, the former category having increased from 1,223 or

90. Statement E deals with fetters and shows the number of cases in which, and the length of time for which, fetters were imposed on convicts during the year. Fetters were in no case imposed as a punishment during the year, but in consequence of extramural gangs having been fettered during the second half of 1894, the number of cases in which fetters were imposed for purposes of safe custody has greatly increased. The fetters used for this purpose are light chains, suspended by a leather-belt from the waist, and attached to the ankle-rings. They prevent rapid movement, but are very little encumbrance to a man walking. The chief objection to their use is the liability of the rings to rub the leg and to produce sores, but such cases receive early attention, and no bad result has in any case occurred. The effect of the use of these fetters in reducing escapes from out-gangs has already been noticed.

91. The last statement deals with sub-jails and shows their number, the total number of convicts admitted during the year and the average duration of confinement. The only noteworthy features in these figures have been referred to in previous paragraphs of this report.

92. The following table, which deals with Burmese convicts confined in Madras Jails, shows a continuance of the rapid decline in their numbers noticed in previous reports. That this decrease is not due to mortality is proved by the fact that there were only 6 deaths in a daily average population of 573.25 showing a death-rate of under 10.5 per mille. The number re-transferred to Rangoon was 92. The conduct of the Burmese prisoners continued to be good:—

93. The general features of Jail administration in the year 1894 may be thus summarized :—

- (1) A continuance in the fall of jail population.
- (2) A rise in the number of previously convicted prisoners recognized in jail.
- (3) A reduction in escapes from Central and District Jails.
- (4) A further increase in recorded offences and punishments showing improved registration.
- (5) A small increase in total gross cost per head, but a decrease under all headings susceptible of control, the rates in Central and District Jails under rations, clothing and contingencies being the lowest on record.
- (6) A large increase in manufacturing transactions which are the largest on record, and a considerable increase in profits.
- (7) A further reduction in the death-rate which, excluding cholera, is practically equal to the lowest rate on record.

During the course of the year, a Manual of Jail Gardening, compiled by Mr. Gadsden, Superintendent of the Coimbatore Central Jail, was published and supplied to all jails. The new Prisons' Act No. IX of 1894 came into force on the 1st July 1894, and the preparation of the required rules under it is now under the consideration of Government. The Bengal system of ward-guarding by night was extended

to the Rajahmundry Central Jail during 1894, and was favourably reported on. It is now being introduced into other Central Jails. Some progress was made with the work of improving the locking arrangements of cells, so as to place the lock out of the reach of the inmate, but a good deal remains to be done. The provision of cholera sheds outside each jail, to which any case of cholera or suspicious diarrhoea can be at once removed instead of being taken to hospital, was commenced during the year, and at several jails the sheds were completed. No important administrative change was introduced.

94. The general results of the year are best at the Vellore Central Jail, the Superintendent of which, Mr. E. L. F. Cavendish, deserves great credit for all round good work. He is supported by a very efficient Jailor in Mr. S. W. Upshon. The administration of the Tanjore District Jail by Mr. Cloney was almost equally successful. Most other officers of the Department worked well. The great care which has been bestowed on the medical work of jails by the Medical Officers of the Department, notably, Brigade-Surgeon-Lieutenant-Colonel Hazlett, Surgeon-Lieutenant-Colonel Leapingwell, and Surgeon-Lieutenant-Colonel Hackett-Wilkins, is proved by the results.

95. All Central and District Jails were inspected during the year, except the District Jails of Russellkonda and Berhampur. I proposed to visit the Ganjam District in January 1895, but was prevented from doing so. The Penitentiary was inspected twice, as also the Criminal Leper Ward and the Civil Jail, Madras. I also visited the Lunatic Asylums at Madras, Calicut and Waltair, and the Reformatory School at Chingleput. The following sub-jails were inspected, namely, Tiruváthir, Chingleput, Arkonam, Tirupati, Vellore, Cuddalore, Palamcottah, Salem, Métruppidiyam, Coonoor, Wellington, Ootacamund, Calicut, Quilandi, Badagura, Tellicherry, Cannanore, Hosdurg, Kussaragod, Bezwada, Rajahmundry, Vizianagram, Gajipatinagarum, Bobbili and Puvati-

For Portuguese and such East Indian prisoners for whom the Medical Officer considers the above diets not suitable, a dietary similar to that prescribed for foreign convicts may be issued with the addition of 1 pint of coffee a day (made with $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. coffee and $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. sugar a week, with four hoppers to weigh 2 oz. each when cooked.

But, from the 1st July 1894, this diet was limited to four days, and was not to be repeated except for a fresh offence nor until after an interval of one week.

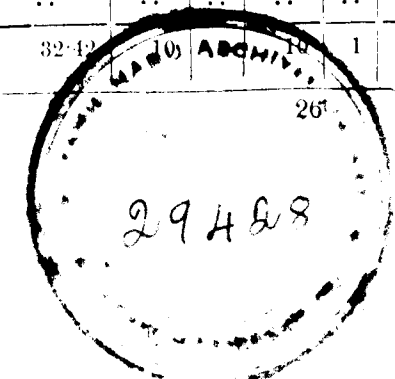

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

READ—the following paper:—

From the Inspector-General of Prisons, dated 20th March 1895, A.

ORDER—dated 29th May 1895, No. 1165, Judicial. .

The report on the administration of the Jail Department during 1894 is clear and full and calls for but few remarks.

2. *Admissions.*—Excluding transfers, the total number of prisoners admitted during 1894 was 49,507, of whom 30,498 were convicts, 17,426 under-trial prisoners and 1,583 civil prisoners, the corresponding figures in the preceding year being 56,357, 33,535, 21,362 and 1,460. There was thus a considerable decrease in the number of direct admissions of convicts and under-trial prisoners, while as in the four previous years the number of civil prisoners admitted increased slightly. The general reduction in jail population, as the Inspector-General remarks, may probably be connected with the downward tendency of food prices. The Agent to the Governor in Vizagapatam should explain the large increase in the number of admissions to the Pārvatipuram Jail. The number of convicts admitted by transfer rose from 15,116 to 15,686—a result the reverse of what was anticipated in the review of the report for 1893. The Inspector-General, however, points out that the increase is to be attributed entirely to the large number of prisoners in the Malabar district admitted into sub-jails in transit to other jails, which exceeded the figure of the previous year by 1,628. The explanation of this large increase will be awaited. The number of juvenile convicts admitted direct fell from 593 to 562. There is, however, little doubt that neglect of the orders of Government regarding the treatment of juvenile criminals continues to exist, and the attention of District Magistrates will again be drawn to the importance of inculcating upon the subordinate magistracy the desirability of imposing upon juveniles sentences of whipping wherever possible, in preference to exposing them to the contamination of life in jail. The Inspector-General might with advantage bring cases where imprisonment has been awarded to juvenile offenders, although whipping might apparently have been inflicted, to the notice of the District Magistrates concerned; and a foot-note should be appended to Statement II showing the number of cases in which juveniles have been sentenced to imprisonment for offences which cannot legally be punished with whipping. Information of this nature would place Government in a better position to decide whether legislation is required to empower the courts to impose sentences of whipping for other offences than at present. It is satisfactory to note a continuance of the improvement in the classification of the previous occupation of convicts, which was noticed in the review of last year's report.

3. *Identification.*—The figures relating to the identification of habitual offenders show an improvement, 14.6 per cent. of the number of convicts admitted into district and central jails having been recognized as old offenders. This percentage is

higher than in any of the four preceding years. The recognitions after conviction appear particularly good, the number being 370 as against 153 in 1893 when the total number of admissions was greater. In paragraph 14 of the report, however, it is stated that of late years the cases of identification shown in the Penitentiary returns have been confined to persons sentenced under chapters XII and XVII of the Indian Penal Code and a reference to the detailed figures shows that, as a consequence presumably of the rectification of this mistake, the number of recognitions after conviction in the Penitentiary has risen from 5 to 181. If the Penitentiary returns be excluded, the percentage of identifications in jail falls from 2.5 to 1.5—a figure which, though better than in the preceding two years, is still not high. There was a further marked increase in the number of old offenders who were admitted into subsidiary jails, the total number being 986, of whom no less than 115 had two convictions against them while 52 had been previously convicted more than twice. As was remarked in the previous year's review, these figures appear to indicate undue leniency towards habitual criminals on the part of the magistracy. The Government notes with approval that the descriptions of prisoners admitted into district and central jails will in future be recorded in accordance with the Bertillon method, though the general working of the system has been entrusted to the police.

4. *Escapes*.—The number of escapes from central and district jails six was lower than in any year during the past decade except 1887. Mr. Cardew's anticipation that escapes from the Russellkonda District Jail would be frequent has not been fulfilled, and in view of this fact the Government is not prepared to incur the expenditure involved in raising the outer wall of the jail. The advisability of substituting a more effectual safeguard for the iron railing which encloses the Criminal Leper Ward should form the subject of a separate communication. There was an increase in the number of escapes from subsidiary jails, but the figure was not unusually high.

5. *Conduct of Convicts*.—As was anticipated in the review of the previous year's report, there was a further increase in the number of punishments recorded. Nearly the whole of this occurred under the head of minor punishments, but, as the Inspector-General remarks, the introduction in the middle of the year of the Prisons Act, 1894, has disturbed the classification of offences, and detailed comparison with the statistics relating to prison offences in previous years is therefore impossible. A rough comparison with the figures relating to other provinces, however, appears to show that punishments are not unduly frequent in Madras:—

The ratio of punishments to average population was far lower in Cannanore (50.7 per cent.) than in any other jail; the Inspector-General attributes this to inefficient administration. The Superintendent responsible for this has retired. The number of punishments in the Tanjore District Jail was again far above the average—a circumstance which is not explained in the report; the majority of the offences recorded relate to work, and it is possible that the explanation is, as suggested by the Inspector-General, that the number of industries is large and that the convicts being frequently

transferred from one class of work to another, the change furnishes an excuse for idleness; Mr. Cardew will no doubt, during the current year, look into this matter more closely.

6. *Employment of Convict Officers*.—Fewer convict officers were employed in the year under review, but the infliction of punishment upon them was more frequent, no fewer than 38 per cent. of the total number being reduced or receiving punishment in some other form. The proportion of convict officers reduced or otherwise punished in the Salem Central Jail was again particularly high, but the explanation of this is apparently to be found in the fact that the convict officers appointed in and prior to 1892 were a very indifferent body of men and that it has been necessary to weed them out; it is to be hoped that an improvement will be noticed in the current year. Among district jails the ratio of reductions and other punishments was highest in Palamcottah (87.5), while in Berhampur and Nellore no punishments were inflicted. No reasons have been assigned for the very high rate of punishments in the first of these jails or for the total absence of them in the other two.

7. *Diet Scales*.—The year was marked by a revision of the punishment diets owing to the introduction of the Prisons Act IX of 1894.

8. *Financial*.—The gross expenditure of the year was Rs. 10,34,228 against Rs. 10,52,821 in 1893; these figures, however, exclude outlays of Rs. 1,16,859 and 1,28,017 incurred on jail buildings by the Public Works Department in 1893 and 1894 respectively. The cost per head of average population exhibits a slight increase, which, as the Inspector-General points out, is more than accounted for by the higher cost of establishment, arising partly from an increase in the rate of exchange compensation allowance, partly from the fact that the fixed establishment charges were distributed among a smaller jail population. The expenditure upon rations, establishment, hospital charges, clothing and bedding and contingencies is compared below for a period of five years:—

These rates compare favourably with the statistics relating to the year 1893 in the majority of other provinces as the marginally-noted figures show. The details of the various items of expenditure require but few remarks. The reasons which have led to the general increased cost of establishment have been mentioned above but they do not furnish an adequate explanation in the case of one particular jail, viz., Palamcottah, in which the establishment charges rose from Rs. 8,156 to Rs. 10,560—an increase which requires further explanation. The prices of food-

grains having fallen, it was to be expected that the expenditure on rations would be

proportionately lower than in 1893, but this expectation has not been fully realized, for the statistics given in paragraph 33 of the report show that, whereas the average reduction in the prices of the staple articles of food was 18 per cent., the decrease in the average cost of rations in central and district jails was under 9 per cent., even though allowance be made for the increase in the stock of grain at the end, as compared with the beginning, of the year. Paragraphs 35 and 36 of the report assign special reasons for the high rates prevailing in the Penitentiary, the central jail at Trichinopoly and the district jails of Cuddapah, Vizagapatam, Madura and Bellary, but even if these be excluded from consideration the results are not up to what might fairly have been expected, for the average cost of rations in the remaining district and central jails was Rs. 24-15-0 or only some 11 per cent. less than the general average cost for 1893. In the case of Cuddapah, the increased cost appears particularly unsatisfactory. Full particulars should be reported with the explanation of the officer who appears to be responsible. The new tables analysing the expenditure on hospital charges and contingencies, which are to be found in paragraphs 38 and 43 of the report, form a useful addition. The outlay on rations in subsidiary jails was particularly unsatisfactory, the average cost *per head* increasing from Rs. 36-15-10 to Rs. 40-1-4 in spite of the marked fall in prices. The highest rates prevailed in the Nilgiris, Chingleput, Coimbatore, Madura, Anantapur and Malabar. The circumstances of the Nilgiris are peculiar, but in the other districts mentioned there seems no reason why the cost of rations should be so high and the attention of the District Magistrates concerned will be drawn to the matter with the remark that Government expects them to give their personal attention to it. The reduction in the cost of clothing and bedding in sub-jails is satisfactory, but the increase in the expenditure on "Other charges" is the reverse and should be carefully looked into by District Magistrates and the Inspector-General, as there seems but little doubt from the figures under this head that appreciable economies are possible in several districts.

9. *Manufactures*.—It is satisfactory to observe an absolute increase of 269 in the average number of convicts employed on manufactures in spite of the decrease from 9,226 to 8,731 in the average number of prisoners under sentence of labour. Salem was the only central jail in which there was a decrease in the proportion of convicts so employed, and among district jails there was a decided improvement in Russellkonda, Berhampur, Nellore and Cuddapah, the poor development of manufacturing operations in which attracted unfavourable notice in last year's review; Nellore was, however, still very backward in this respect. Párvatipuram, on the other hand, showed a further retrogression, which is, however, largely attributable to the epidemic of sickness which prevailed in the latter half of the year. The statistics relating to cash earnings are particularly encouraging, the profit shown in Statement XII being Rs. 1,14,859 against Rs. 45,566 in the previous year. These figures do not, however, take account of outstandings and unsold stock, including which the net profits work out to Rs. 1,16,466. The new Statement XII-A, which is a much more reliable index of the results in particular jails, shows that Vellore occupies the first place among central jails with a true profit of Rs. 25,269, the Penitentiary coming next with Rs. 21,814, followed by Coimbatore with Rs. 14,262. In district jails by far the highest profit was realized in Tanjore—Rs. 12,901—and among the smaller jails a marked improvement is noticeable in Russellkonda. The manufacturing receipts in sub-jails were as usual trifling. Statement XIII shows the *net cost per head* to be Rs. 52-1-0—the lowest figure on record in this Presidency, and a striking contrast to the average of the three years 1885 to 1887, viz., Rs. 85-7-4. The value of articles manufactured for jail use was Rs. 31,473 against Rs. 32,566 in 1893, while there was a marked increase in the supply of vegetables grown by jail labour, the value of which rose from Rs. 11,629 to Rs. 16,803.

10. *Health*.—Judged by the daily average sick-rate, the general health of the year was less favourable than in 1893, but this rate varies very little from year to year and is probably a less reliable indication of health than the death-rate, which in the past year was only 19.9—lower than in any year since 1886. In central jails the mortality was 15.9 *per mille* as against 30.9 in district jails where the high rate was due to the heavy mortality in Párvatipuram. There was an improvement in the

health of the three jails which attracted special mention in last year's review, viz., Trichinopoly (20.36), Cannanore (26.04), and Cuddapah (42.40). The daily average sick-rate was, however, higher in Cuddapah than in any other jail, while the death-rate at this jail was only exceeded in Párvatipuram and in the Criminal Leper Ward, in which a high mortality is to be expected. The town of Cuddapah is so persistently unhealthy that it has been decided to close the jail, at any rate until the effect of the new drainage scheme has become apparent. In the Párvatipuram District Jail the death-rate reached the very large figure of 135.2 *per mille*, owing to an epidemic of diarrhoea and dysentery which commenced in the month of August. A detailed report on the subject was submitted through the Surgeon-General which showed that no defect in the quality of the water or food supplied to the convicts and no failure of management existed to an extent which would at all account for the outbreak and led to the conclusion that it had its origin almost entirely from the overcrowded state of the jail buildings. It is to be hoped that the throwing back of the main wall, which is now being undertaken, will have a beneficial effect on the health of the inmates. The Sanitary Commissioner will be requested to take an opportunity of visiting this jail towards the close of the year and to report to Government the result. Mangalore (32.81) and Bellary (31.10) are the only other district jails in which the death-rate exceeded 30 *per mille*; the population of the former is, however, so small that one additional death raises the ratio by 10 *per mille*. In Bellary, which is usually healthy, the high death-rate may have been partly due to the constant changes in the office of Superintendent and Medical officer, referred to by the Inspector-General, but it is observed that 44 per cent. of the deaths arose from causes which the best of jail management could not have prevented. The weight statistics are satisfactory, 62.2 per cent. of the total number of prisoners discharged having gained weight—a higher proportion than in any year since 1886.

11. *Miscellaneous*.—The total accommodation available was largely in excess of the average jail-population in spite of the abolition of the Kurnool and Guntur district jails. The average population in particular jails was, however, in excess of the ordinary accommodation—notably in Párvatipuram, Salem, Bellary, Cuddalore and Palamcottah. New buildings are under construction in the three first-named of these, which will increase the accommodation, but it is a question whether more frequent resort to transfers should not be had in order to prevent overcrowding, the effect of which on the health of the convict inmates may be very prejudicial. In accordance with the policy enunciated by the Government of India in Home Department letter, No. 4-Jails—213, dated 24th April 1894, steps are being taken to provide separate cubicles in portions of the Coimbatore and Trichinopoly central jails and the new district jail at Cuddalore is to be built entirely on the cellular system. It is to be remarked, however, that progress in this direction must necessarily be limited by financial considerations, the cost of providing cellular accommodation in existing jails being almost prohibitive.

The number of convicts released during the year who earned remission under the mark-system was more than double that of the previous year owing to its extension to the case of convicts sentenced to imprisonment for one year and less than two years—a change to which may also be attributed the increase in the number of convicts who failed to gain any remission. The use of fetters for purposes only of safe custody increased with the result that escapes from extra-mural gangs decreased appreciably. The duty of inspection was performed more satisfactorily by non-official visitors, but was entirely neglected by the Sessions Judges of North Arcot and Madura; the neglect was the more open to remark in the latter case inasmuch as special attention was drawn to a similar shortcoming in the review of the previous year's report.

The general features of the year's administration are summarized in paragraph 93 of the report. Matters of special note are the increase in manufacturing transactions and profits, the reduction in the number of escapes, and the low death-rate. The year has been marked by progress in almost every direction and the Government

has once more to express its satisfaction with the administration of Mr. Cardew and his subordinates, more particularly those officers whose names are mentioned in paragraph 94 of the report.
