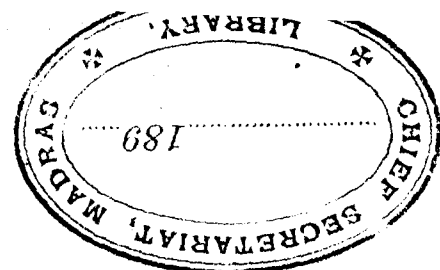

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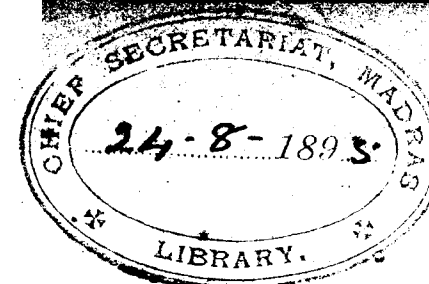

ON

THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE

IN THE

PRESIDENCY OF MADRAS

IN

1894.

I.—Introductory.

THE plan of the report is the same as in previous years, but some of the details hitherto given in the body of the report have been omitted in accordance with the suggestion of Government in its review on the report for 1893.

II.—Courts administering Criminal Justice.

2. In the mufassal 6,043 Village Magistrates' Courts, 685 regular Magistrates' Courts and 20 Courts of Session exercised jurisdiction during the year; and at the Presidency Town 2 Courts of the Presidency Magistrates, 1 Court of the Commissioner of Police and the High Court. Of the 685 regular Magistrates' Courts 123 were First Class, 460 Second Class and 102 Third Class Magistrates' Courts.

3. The number of Village Magistrates who tried cases during the year was 293 less than in 1893. The variation was largest in Madura (+159), Nellore (—119), Coimbatore (—136) and Kistna (—186).

4. Of the 685 regular Magistrates' Courts in the mufassal 54 were those of Honorary Benches as in the previous year.

The number of working days in these Courts varied from 222 in Conjeevaram in the Chingleput district to 3 in Kotagiri in the Nilgiris, the average being 73 as against 66 days in 1893.

5. Of the remaining 631 Magistrates 48 were Special Magistrates as in the preceding year. Of these, 5 exercised first class, 1 second class and 42 third class powers.

The average number of working days in these Courts was 48 as against 51 last year, the extremes being 269 days in Kalingapatnam in the Ganjam district and 5 days in Nadapuram in Malabar.

6. Of the 583 Magistrates remaining, 28 were 3rd Class Subordinate Magistrates, 435 2nd Class Subordinate Magistrates (of whom 18 appear from the returns

to be Tahsildar Magistrates who tried cases during the year under the authority conveyed in the 1st paragraph of G. O. dated 6th May 1893, No. 927, Judicial), 3 Cantonment Magistrates (two 3rd Class and one 1st Class), 96 Sub-Divisional Magistrates (1st Class) and 21 District Magistrates.

The number of working days in the Courts of District Magistrates varied from 158 in South Arcot to 3 in Coimbatore, Ganjam and Nellore, the average number of days per Court being 45.

7. In the Courts of Session the average number of working days was 75 and varied from 165 in Tinnevelly to 31 in North Malabar.

Presidency

8. The Courts of the Presidency Magistrates at Egmore and Black Town sat on 270 days in the year.

High Court.

9. In the High Court 137 Criminal Benches sat in the year, 28 for the disposal of Sessions and 109 for the disposal of Appellate and Revisional work. On the Original Side there were the usual four Criminal Sessions. On the Appellate Side 63 Benches sat on 62 days for the disposal of Criminal business alone and 46 Benches sat on 45 other days for the disposal of Criminal along with Civil work.

III.—The State of Crime.

Offences
reported.

10. There were 312,003 offences reported in the year as against 290,395 in the previous year, an increase of 21,608 mainly due to the number of cases prosecuted under the Towns Nuisances Act.

Cases dismissed under section 203, Code of Criminal Procedure, cases returned as true, and those brought to trial, as also the number of persons brought to trial increased, but cases struck off as false decreased as compared with 1893.

11. The total number of cases returned as true has continued to increase since 1886, the number so returned during the year being 297,221, or 8 per cent. more than in the previous year. This was the result of numerous prosecutions under the Special and Local Laws which rose from 162,067 to 183,536.

12. The number of offences under the Penal Code was practically the same as in 1893. Those affecting public health, safety &c., and hurt increased largely, while those of theft, criminal force and assault fell off considerably.

Cases of offences affecting life decreased from 791 in 1893 to 683, the difference being due to the small number of cases of attempted suicide in the year under report. Murder cases increased considerably as compared with 1893 in Anantapur (+11) and Tinnevelly (+9). Cases of culpable homicide not amounting to murder increased in the last named district (+9) and decreased in Malabar (—9), while in Bellary no such case occurred as against 9 cases in 1893. There was only one case of abetment of suicide in the whole Presidency.

Robberies and dacoities fell from 459 to 387 and from 357 to 297 respectively. Robbery cases diminished considerably in Kistna (—56), South Arcot (—19), Tinnevelly (—15) and Chingleput (—14), and dacoity in Madura and Coimbatore (—14 each), Tinnevelly (—12) and Trichinopoly (—10). There were no cases of dacoity in Madras, Nellore and the Nilgiris.

Cases of theft varied appreciably in Malabar (—232), Coimbatore (—231), Madras (—229), Chingleput (—177), Trichinopoly (—170), Kurnool (+142) and the Agency of Vizagapatam (+116).

There was also a diminution under the head of criminal trespass which was marked in North Arcot (—193), Godavari (—143), Kistna (—103), Coimbatore (—101) and South Arcot (—99).

The diminution above noticed was mainly due to the favourable character of the season.

Cases of forgery fell from 274 to 192, the variations being largest in Kistna (—26) and Coimbatore (—18).

Forgery.

Offences relating to coin and Government stamps have continued to decrease, falling from 167 in 1892 to 121 in 1893 and 104 in the year under report. The decrease occurred in South Canara, Kistna, North Arcot and Madura. In Vizagapatam (+11) and South Arcot (+6) there was an increase.

Offences against public tranquillity rose from 2,190 in 1893 to 2,406, and the number varied considerably in Godavari (+170), Coimbatore (+31), Madura (+80) and Tanjore (—70).

Offences affecting public health, safety and convenience advanced from 10,350 in 1893 to 14,722, the increase being large in South Arcot (+1,191), Tanjore (+1,183) and Madura (+797). There was a noticeable decline in Trichinopoly (—321), Cuddapah (—284) and Kistna (—253).

The increase in cases of hurt from 15,521 to 16,870 was chiefly contributed by Godavari (+472), Madras (+247), Nellore (+166), Ganjam (+152), Malabar (+112) and Bellary (+108).

Offences of criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance also increased from 5,094 to 5,685 and varied considerably in Cuddapah (+151), Godavari (+143), South Arcot (+80), Anantapur (+71) and Madras (—196).

Offences under the heading of criminal force and assault decreased chiefly in South Arcot (—479), Tanjore (—296), Coimbatore (—265), Madura (—234), Tinnevelly (—155), Ganjam (—154), Nellore (—112) and North Arcot (—106); the reverse was the case in Madras (+298), Kurnool (+282) and Anantapur (+208).

Cases of mischief declined from 7,134 to 6,170, the fall being marked in Tanjore (—121), Madura (—112) and Godavari (—102).

Mischief.

Offences under Special and Local Laws. 13. Offences under Special and Local Laws increased by 21,469, of which as many as 20,083 were under the Towns Nuisances Act, due to the vigour with which it was sought to enforce the Act.

Towns Nuisances Act. More than 75 per cent. of the increase under the Act was contributed by Tanjore (+6,516), Madura (+5,171), South Arcot (+1,984) and Bellary (+1,434). The increase in Tinnevely was due to the registration under this Act for the first time of offences previously shown under the Police Act.

Forest Act. Cases under the Forest Act increased by 1,406. The advance in South Canara (+758) is attributed to the exercise of greater vigilance in the detection of offences. Next came Salem (+289), Nellore (+139), Kurnool (+116) and Malabar (+105).

Salt Act. Cases under the Salt Act were 1,164 less than in last year, more than one-half of the decrease occurring in Chingleput (—777). The fall in Malabar (—547), Madura (—402) and South Arcot (—359) was also considerable. The increase in Tanjore and Trichinopoly (+ 903 and + 227 respectively) is attributed to the increased activity of the Department.

Abkari Act. Variations in the number of cases under the Abkari Act was greatest in South Canara (+ 749) and Godavari (—508).

Offences brought to trial. 14. 110,221 cases under the Indian Penal Code and 179,456 under Special and Local Laws or 97 and 97·8 per cent. of the cases referred to under the respective heads were brought to trial during the year, the percentage in the former being 1·2 more than in the previous year and the percentage in the latter nearly the same as in that year.

Offences proved on trial. 15. 462,003 persons were brought to trial during the year as against 448,441 in the preceding year; the percentages of convictions being 22·5 in the cases of offences under the Indian Penal Code and 82·9 in those under Special and Local Laws. The percentages were nearly the same as in 1893.

Percentage of convictions. 16. Referring to cases of compoundable nature, the percentage of convictions rose from 7·50 to 11·73 in cases of defamation and decreased from 9·31 to 8·98 per cent. in cases of criminal force and assault, and from 11·23 to 10·08 in cases of criminal intimidation.

As regards classes of offences in which the proportion of convictions is usually high, it is observable that in cases of offences affecting public health it was nearly the same as in 1893, but declined in offences relating to coin and Government stamps, in offences relating to weights and measures, in offences of contempts of lawful authority and in cases of receiving stolen property.

In cases of more heinous offences, the percentage of convictions rose slightly in offences affecting life, but there was a marked decline in rape, kidnapping, and causing miscarriage.

III.] THE STATE OF CRIME. 17. The following table compares the preventive and miscellaneous proceedings taken under the Code of Criminal Procedure in the last two years:—

The number of persons called upon to find security to keep the peace decreased considerably in Nellore (—53), South Arcot (—39), Coimbatore (—32), Tanjore (—28), and Kistna (—24) and rose in Malabar (+44) and Anantapur (+32). Malabar (68), Anantapur (40), Tinnevely (31) and Ganjam (22) alone contributed more than half the number of persons so called upon while no such proceedings were taken in Kistna and the Nilgiris.

None of the persons called upon to show cause in respect of the removal of local nuisances was punished for disobedience to orders made absolute.

The number of persons who were ordered to pay compensation for preferring false and vexatious complaints rose from 782 in 1892 and 1,125 in 1893 to 1,458 in 1894; and the average amount recovered rose from Rupees 13 to Rupees 14. Such cases were most numerous in Tanjore (187), North Arcot (163), and Malabar (132), and increased noticeably in Tanjore (+74), Vizagapatam (+54) and Ganjam (+51).

Cases of forfeiture of bail or bond considerably exceeded the figure of 1893 and rose appreciably in Madura (+243) and Salem (+136). By far the largest number of cases occurred in Madura.

18. 95 European British subjects concerned in 81 cases were under trial during the year. The cases of 94 persons were disposed of, 52 persons being convicted and 42 acquitted, 24 of the 52 being convicted of offences under Special and Local Laws.

19. To recapitulate; the only features of 1894 were:—
A decrease in the number of Village Magistrates and an increase in that of regular Magistrates who actually tried cases in the year; and
A very large increase in the number of cases under Special and Local Laws.

IV.—Business in the Courts.

1. All Courts together.

Original cases.

20. The total number of original cases before the Courts was 298,080 as against 277,941 in the previous year.

Those which came before the regular Courts increased from 266,178 in 1893 to 287,080, the Presidency Town contributing 44,705 and the Mufassal 242,375 to the total number.

Appeals.

21. 9,979 appeals or 714 more than in the previous year were instituted in the year.

Contributions by the several Courts.

22. The contributions of the various classes of Courts to the aggregate amount of criminal work are shown below:—

Of the total the largest percentages were contributed by the districts of Tanjore, Malabar and Madura and the smallest by Kurnool, Anantapur and the Nilgiris.

2.—Village Magistrates' Courts.

Institutions and disposals.

23. The number of cases in the Village Magistrates' Courts has steadily declined since 1885. The disposals in the year practically equalled the institutions. The arrears continued to be heavy in Tanjore.

The institutions declined considerably in North Arcot (—338) and as usual were most numerous in Tanjore (1,611), Madura (1,597), North Arcot (1,130) and Tinnevely (1,013).

Persons dealt with.

The number of persons for trial before these Courts was 17,012, of which 16,503 were dealt with during the year and of these 7,881 persons were convicted of 5,706 were simply imprisoned and 2,175 confined in stocks.

3. Regular Magistrates' Courts in the Mufassal.

A.—Original Jurisdiction.

Institutions.

24. The following is a comparative statement of the institutions in the regular mufassal Courts during the past three years:—

25. Institutions have steadily increased since 1887. In the year under report the rise was largest in the Courts of Bench Magistrates. All Courts together.

The increase in the aggregate work received was large in Tanjore (+7,816), Madura (+5,862), South Arcot (+2,389), Vizagapatam (+1,618), Salem (+1,344) and South Canara (+1,452), while the work diminished considerably in Kistna (—1,888). The rise in Tanjore, Madura, South Arcot, Vizagapatam and Salem is attributed to prosecutions under Special and Local Laws.

26. The rise (14,697 cases) in the files of Benches of Magistrates was contributed principally by Tanjore (+6,141), Madura (+5,434), Malabar (+1,660), Vizagapatam (+1,323), Salem (+1,263) and South Arcot (+1,132) and has been already explained, para. 13 *supra*. Bench Magistrates.

27. 4,032 more cases than in 1893 were instituted in the Courts of stipendiary subordinate Magistrates without Appellate powers. The variation in the districts of South Canara (+1,519), Tanjore (+1,511) and South Arcot (+1,445) was noticeable. Stipendiary subordinate Magistrates.

28. The number of cases filed in the Courts of Sub-Divisional Magistrates was 570 less than in the previous year, and declined in Coimbatore (—179), South Arcot and Malabar (—105 each). Sub-Divisional Magistrates.

29. The total files of District Magistrates fell from 105 cases in 1893 to 37 in 1894. The District Magistrate of Anantapur received the largest number (10). District Magistrates.

30. Including 2,764 * cases pending from last year and those received by transfer and excluding the cases transferred and those wherein the accused died or escaped, the number for disposal in the regular mufassal Magistrates' Courts was 244,259. Of these, 241,337 cases, or 22 less than the number instituted in the year, were disposed of and 2,922 were pending at the end of the year. The subjoined statement shows the distribution of work among the several classes of Courts during three years:— Disposals.

Benches of Magistrates and Subordinate Magistrates did more work than in 1893 and on the whole the current work of all classes of Magistrates was dealt with satisfactorily.

* The difference between this and the figure shown in the previous year's report is due to the removal of a case from the file of the Stationary Subordinate Magistrate of Chingleput the accused in which could not be found.

Average duration.

31. The average duration of the cases disposed of by all the Courts was 5 days as against 6 in the previous year. Taking all Courts together the best averages were 3 days in the districts of Chingleput, Nilgiris and Vizagapatam and 4 days in South Arcot, Ganjam, Godavari and Salem; while Kurnool (10 days) and Kistna (9 days) showed the highest averages.

Persons for trial, tried and pending.

32. The number of persons for trial was 411,435, of whom 404,540 were dealt with during the year, the corresponding figures for the previous year being 401,145 and 392,799.

Results.

33. Of the number dealt with during the year, 3,670 were committed or referred to superior Courts; the results as affecting the rest being that 220,771 were discharged and 123,746 were convicted on regular trial and 56,353 on summary trial as against 4,335, 223,223, 121,720 and 43,521 respectively in the previous year. The persons whose cases were finally disposed of are distributed below among the several classes of Magistrates who tried them arranged according to their powers:—

Percentage of convictions.

34. The percentage of convictions rose to 44.9, the highest figure for the past ten years. Chingleput (53.72), Tanjore (58.22) and Bellary (57.51) showed the highest percentages while Godavari (29.44) and Kurnool (28.55) yielded the lowest percentages as in last year.

Persons pending.

35. Of 6,895 persons pending trial at the close of the year 451 were in custody and 6,444 were on bail or otherwise at large. 155 persons had been under trial for more than 6 months, of whom nearly two-thirds were in Madura (44), Kurnool (34) and Tanjore (20). The cases of 33 of the number pending in Madura awaited production of records or attendance of witnesses. All the persons pending trial in Kurnool were concerned in the Pattikonda torture cases.

Punishments.

36. The proportion of sentences of imprisonment to total convictions decreased again considerably while those of fine largely increased, the reason being a considerable decline in the number of offences punishable with imprisonment and the large influx of nuisance cases during the year. Thus sentences of fine not exceeding Rupees 10 rose from 131,689 in the previous year to 148,475. The average fine inflicted was Rupees 4.5 as against Rupees 4.8 in the previous year. Of the sentences of imprisonment in the year nearly 90 per cent. were rigorous. 337 persons were sentenced to solitary confinement as against 384 in 1893. The largest number of such sentences was 77 in North Arcot.

Fines imposed and realized.

The amounts of fine imposed, realized, and paid in compensation are compared below for two years:—

Including Rupees 12,086 recovered on account of fines imposed in previous years, the total collections during the year were Rupees 5,90,796 as against Rupees 5,64,080 in 1893.

The total number of persons sentenced to whipping was smaller than in 1893, but not so small as in 1892. 622 of the number as against 593 in 1893 were juvenile offenders, 618 of these being whipped in lieu of, and 4 in addition to, other punishments as against 583 and 10 respectively in 1893. The diminished number of sentences of whipping is probably due to the fact that thefts were less numerous than in the previous year.

37. 147 persons were ordered to find security to keep the peace as against 191 in 1893. Security for peace.

97 persons were ordered to give security for good behaviour as against 117 last year, two of the number being dealt with under the Railways Act. 58 of the total number were imprisoned for default, 57 being sentenced to rigorous and 1 to simple imprisonment. Security for good behaviour.

38. 952 persons were dealt with under Special Acts and subjected to an order not involving fine or imprisonment as compared with 914 last year. The largest numbers were as in that year in the Nilgiris (286) and Kistna (168). Persons dealt with under special Acts.

39. Bench Magistrates disposed of 14,577 more cases than in the previous year and there remained only 124 cases pending at the close of 1894. Bench Magistrates. Disposals.

The average time taken for disposal of cases in these Courts was one day as against two days in the previous year. Average duration.

Of the persons dealt with by these Courts 13,558 were discharged, 280 convicted on regular trial and 55,444 on summary trial. Results.

The percentage of convictions rose from 77.1 in 1893 to 80.4 in 1894. Percentage of convictions.

40. In the Special Magistrates' Courts the disposals fell short of the institutions. Special Magistrates. Disposals.

The average duration of cases was 3 days as in 1893 and was 2 days less than in 1892. Average duration.

Of the number of persons dealt with by Special Magistrates 1,248 were discharged, 3,405 convicted, 3,325 of the latter being convicted on regular trial and 80 on summary trial. Results.

The percentage of convictions was 73.2 or nearly the same as in the previous year. Percentage of convictions.

41. Subordinate Magistrates without Appellate powers disposed of 3,933 more cases than in the preceding year, and the arrears at the end of the year increased but very slightly. They were heavy in the Nilgiris and consisted of cases under Act XIII of 1859 in which the accused persons had not been arrested. Arrears were considerably reduced in Tanjore, South Canara and South Arcot. The greatest number of cases was tried in Malabar. Subordinate Magistrates. Disposals.

Detention of witnesses.

46. The following statement shows the number of witnesses examined and the number detained beyond three days in the several classes of Courts during the year as compared with 1893:—

The reduction in the number of witnesses detained beyond three days was satisfactory. No witness was so detained in any Court in North Arcot, South Arcot, Salem and Vizagapatam and in the Agencies of Ganjam and Godavari; nor in the Courts of District Magistrates, Joint Magistrates and Special Magistrates. The number so detained by Bench Magistrates' Courts was only 14. By Subordinate Magistrates without Appellate powers 1,429 were detained for more than three days in Tanjore. It is satisfactory to note that no witness was detained for more than three days in this class of Courts in 6 districts and the number so detained was less than 10 in 4 others, the improvement being most noticeable in Coimbatore, Madura and South Canara.

Dieting of witnesses.

47. The amount paid to witnesses on account of diet and travelling expenses was Rupees 32,221 or Rupees 5,504 less than in 1893; the largest sums were paid in Malabar (Rs. 4,334) and Salem (Rs. 3,659).

B.—Appellate and Revisional Jurisdiction.

Appeals.

48. 8,186 appeals were presented in the year as against 7,454 in the previous year and the number was the largest on record. The largest number received in any district was 874 in Malabar or 264 more than in the previous year.

The number of appeals pending at the end of the year before Sub-Divisional Magistrates was largest in Madura (68) and Malabar (51).

Average duration.

The average duration of appeals before Sub-Divisional Magistrates was 25 days or the same as in the previous year and before District Magistrates 17 days or 3 days less than in that year.

Results.

The number of appellants concerned in cases received during the year was 16,401. Including those whose cases were pending at the beginning of the year and

excluding such as died or escaped, there were 17,232 persons for trial, of whom 16,142 were dealt with, the results being as follows:—

The proportion of wholly unsuccessful appellants was between 60 and 70 per cent. in 13 districts and less than 50 per cent. in Godavari and Vizagapatam.

49. 718 revision cases came before District Magistrates during the year; 541 of which were on the application of parties and the remainder were taken up by the Courts *suo motu*. The number for disposal was 756, of which 725 were disposed of.

The number of accused persons concerned in the cases before the Courts was 2,487, of whom 2,355 were dealt with during the year, the results being as follows:—

4.—Courts of Session.

A.—Original Jurisdiction.

50. The number of cases committed for trial before the Sessions Courts was 1,016, or 93 less than in 1893 and smallest since 1890. The largest difference was in Coimbatore and Trichinopoly, in each of which there was a fall of 40 cases. This was due in Coimbatore to fewer dacoity and murder cases and in Trichinopoly to transfers from Tanjore and the trial of old cases in which the accused had long evaded arrest. In Tinnevely 20 cases more than in 1893 were committed. This is attributed to the fact that the season was adverse in some portions of the district.

51. There were in all 1,042 cases involving 2,289 persons for trial, of which 1,020 cases concerning 2,240 persons were tried. The corresponding figures for 1893 were 1,135 cases and 2,696 persons for trial, 1,112 cases and 2,630 persons tried. The numbers for disposal and disposed of were largest in Tinnevely (99 and 97) and Coimbatore (93 and 91). Next came Bellary, Madura and Salem where all the 82, 74 and 71 cases for disposal were disposed of.

52. Of the 2,240 persons dealt with in the year, 883 were tried by Jury and 1,206 with Assessors. The Judges agreed with the Jury in the case of 852 persons

and with the Assessors in the case of 848. There was no disagreement between Judge and Jury in 12 districts. The number of persons in respect of whom the Judge differed from all the Assessors was large in Trichinopoly (16 out of 26 tried), Salem (36 out of 84) and Kurnool (21 out of 57). In the case of 99 of the persons tried, references were made under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Percentage
of convictions.

53. Of the remaining 2,141 persons 964 or 45.0 per cent. were convicted as against 41.2 last year. The percentage was above 30 per cent. in all the districts except Bellary, Kistna and Godavari, highest (66.67) in Nellore and lowest (21.62) in Godavari.

Punishments.

54. Though the total number of punishments imposed fell, the number of sentences of rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement has increased and was the largest on record. Sentences of fine imposed with and without other punishments were also more numerous than in the previous four years.

Fines imposed and realized.

The aggregate amount of fines imposed, viz. Rupees 27,839 is more than double the figure of the previous year. Towards this amount Tanjore alone contributed Rupees 17,955, of which Rupees 10,000 were imposed in a single case known as the Judgment forgery case. Of the fines imposed during the year Rupees 3,937 or 14.1 per cent. were realized and Rupees 48 were recovered out of the fines imposed in 41 previous years. Rupees 57 (Rupees 37 paid in Tinnevely and Rupees 20 in Kurnool) were paid to complainants as compensation.

Whipping.

20 persons were sentenced to whipping against 29 in 1893, 7 of them being juveniles.

Appeal test.

55. Of the 964 sentences passed by these Courts 937 were appealable and appeals were preferred against 847 of them. 780 appeals were decided in the year the sentences appealed against being confirmed in 600 of them. The percentage of appeals to appealable sentences was 90.4 or 1.3 per cent. more than in the previous year. The percentage of confirmation was 76.9, 4.3 per cent. lower than the figure of 1893, but greater than that of 1892.

Average duration.

56. The average duration of Sessions trials which is calculated from the date of committal was 28 days, a day less than in the previous year. It was highest in Tinnevely (55 days) and Madura (40). In Tinnevely the work was unusually heavy and the adjournment of 2 cases for very long periods raised the average in Madura. In Salem the duration was reduced from 52 to 27 days.

Detention of witnesses.

57. The number of witnesses examined in the Sessions Courts was 8,874 and was largest in Bellary (904), Coimbatore (853), Tinnevely (727) and Madura (708). 3,170 witnesses were detained beyond three days as against 5,695 in 1893, the number so detained being very large in Bellary (608) and Tinnevely (535). It was also large in Cuddapah (278). It should be stated that the number so detained in Madura (937) in 1893 as stated in the report of that year is reported to have been incorrect. There was in the year under report a marked improvement in Coimbatore, South Malabar, North Arcot and Trichinopoly and a falling off in Bellary and Tinnevely.

It is difficult for Sessions Judges to avoid detaining witnesses as it is so often impossible to foretell what length of time the trial of the various cases committed is likely to occupy.

58. The amount paid during the year as diet money to witnesses came to Rupees 37,818 as against Rupees 45,365 paid in the previous year. Of this sum more than half was paid in Bellary (Rupees 4,998), Tinnevely (Rupees 4,544), Kurnool (Rupees 2,968), Coimbatore (Rupees 2,512), Madura (Rupees 2,248), South Canara (Rupees 2,179) and Cuddapah (Rupees 2,157).

B.—Appellate Jurisdiction.

59. 1,149 appeals were instituted in the Sessions Courts. The number exceeded that of 1893 and was the highest ever reached. The district variations were considerable.

The number of disposals was satisfactory and only 65 appeals were pending at the close of the year. Two of those in Nellore had been pending more than 2 months.

The average duration of appeals fell from 40 to 28 days as compared with 1893. This was so far satisfactory but the figure was high in the Vizagapatam Agency (59 days), Kistna (53), South Canara (52) and Tanjore (46). The duration has decreased considerably in North Arcot, from 90 days in 1893 to 20 in the year under report. There was also a noticeable improvement in Madura and Godavari.

1,833 persons appealed to Sessions Courts during the year and the appeals of 125 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total number, 1,854 persons were dealt with in the year. The percentage of wholly unsuccessful appellants was highest in South Malabar (90.08), Kistna (82.61), Madura (81.57) and South Arcot (80.28) and lowest in Godavari (38.71) and Chingleput (45.59).

60. The number of revision cases received in the year was 428 or 34 less than in 1893. Of these 326 were on the application of parties and 102 were taken up by the Courts *suo motu*. Including 47 cases concerning 113 persons pending from last year, there were 475 cases concerning 1,376 persons for disposal and 457 cases concerning 1,337 persons were disposed of.

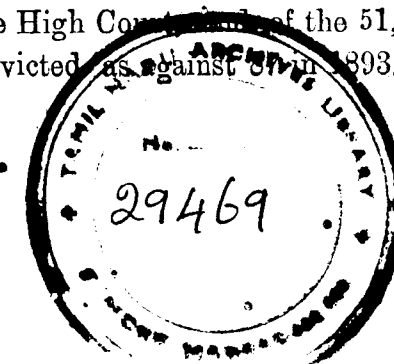
5.—Presidency Magistrates' Courts.

61. 44,650 cases were brought before the Presidency Magistrates' Courts during the year under report. This number exceeded last year's institutions by 2,657 cases and is larger than in any previous year except 1892. Of these, 22,672 were instituted in the Egmore Court and 21,978 in the Black Town Court.

The number of petty Police night cases increased in the former and decreased in the latter Court.

At the close of the year there were only 20 cases pending in these Courts.

61 persons were committed for trial to the High Court and of the 51,758 persons dealt with in the year, 86 per cent. were convicted as against 87 in 1893.



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Commissioner
of Police.

The Commissioner of Police in his magisterial capacity received and disposed of 2 cases affecting 2 persons.

Punishments.

62. The number of sentences of imprisonment passed in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts decreased owing to the smaller number of grave offences under Indian Penal Code and that of sentences of fine increased owing to the large number of petty cases under that Code and under the City Police Act. 20 sentences of rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement were passed in the year against 12 in 1893. This number is larger than in any year subsequent to 1884 when 37 sentences were passed. Sentences of whipping were fewer than in last year. Of 364 persons sentenced to whipping 204 were juveniles.

Fines imposed
and realized.

The total of fines imposed, *viz.* Rupees 43,156 fell short of the figure 1893 by Rupees 3,274, this being due to the decline in the number of sentences of imprisonment in excess of Rupees 10 imposed in the year, the result of the decrease of serious offences. Of the fines imposed, Rupees 38,014 or 88.11 per cent. were recovered as against 87 per cent. in 1893. Out of the total collections, Rupees 1,148 or 3 per cent. as against 2 per cent. last year were paid to complainants as compensation; and Rupees 6,400 levied in cases of cruelty to animals (17 per cent. of the total collections) was paid to the Society for the prevention of cruelty to animals as against 20 per cent. in 1893. The percentage of realization of fines slightly improved.

Appeal test.

63. The Presidency Magistrates passed appealable sentences on 76 persons during the year. 14 of the persons concerned in 12 cases appealed to the High Court. Including the case of 1 person pending from the previous year there were 13 cases for disposal, of which 10 cases concerning 12 persons were disposed of, the sentence being confirmed in the case of 11 persons and reversed in the case of one.

Detention of
witnesses.

64. 16,443 witnesses were examined in these Courts as against 15,907 last year and only 33 of them as against 62 in 1893 were detained for more than three days.

6—High Court.

A.—Original Jurisdiction.

(a).—Sessions Cases.

Disposals.

65. 55 cases came before the High Court for trial as against 46 in the previous year. Of these, 22 cases were received by commitment from the Egmore Magistrates' Court, 27 from the Black Town Court, and one case from the Court of District Magistrate of Anantapur in which a European British subject was charged with murder; and the remainder wherein a European British subject was charged with cheating were received from the Head Assistant Magistrate's Court in Kistna District under section 449 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Of the cases committed 21 were of theft and 11 of forgery. All the 55 cases were disposed of in the year, 5 being decided on the prisoner's plea, 38 on trial by common and 4 by special Jury and 8 on withdrawal. 34 cases including 4 out of the 5 cases received from Kistna resulted in the conviction of the accused, 10 including the case received

from Anantapur ended in the discharge or acquittal of the accused and in the remainder (3) affecting 8 persons, 5 persons were convicted and 3 discharged.

The percentage of convictions in all the cases taken together was 66.3 or one per cent. more than in the previous year. Percentage of convictions.

401 witnesses were examined as against 418 last year. The average duration of cases from date of commitment was 42 days against 34 in the previous year. This was due to a large number of cases committed too late for one session and postponed for trial at the next. Average duration.

(b).—Cases under section 307, Criminal Procedure Code.

66. Including 2 cases pending at the beginning of the year there were 10 cases submitted by Sessions Judges under section 307, Criminal Procedure Code, for disposal, of which 8 were disposed of during the year. In 3 the verdict of not guilty pronounced by the Jury was set aside and conviction was recorded; in 1 the verdict of guilty was upheld; in 3 cases concerning 9 persons it was set aside and the accused were acquitted and in the remaining case against 8 persons retrial was ordered. Results.

The verdict of the Jury was set aside in a far larger proportion of cases than in last year, *viz.* in 87.5 per cent. of the cases decided during the year as against 63 per cent. in 1893.

67. A majority of the Sessions Judges merely report that the working of the Jury system in the year under report was satisfactory. There are not so many complaints as in former years of the faulty preparation and revision of the jurors' lists.

It must be remarked that statistics do not convey a correct impression, for the cases submitted to the High Court under section 307 of the Criminal Procedure Code by no means comprise all those in which the verdict of the Jury is unsatisfactory. The system doubtless can stand the test of simple cases, but in difficult cases it is, under existing circumstances, very liable to break down.

(c).—Cases under section 374, Criminal Procedure Code.

68. Including 6 cases concerning 11 persons pending from last year, there were for disposal during the year 70 cases concerning 86 persons, submitted by Sessions Judges for confirmation of sentences of death. Of these, 65 cases against 79 persons were disposed of and 5 cases against 7 persons were pending at the end of the year. There were 65 cases against 83 persons for disposal in 1893 and 59 of them relating to 72 persons were decided in that year. Referred trials.

Of the 79 persons dealt with during the year, 18 persons or 22.8 per cent. were acquitted and 58 persons or 73.4 per cent. were convicted as against 20.8 and 79.2 last year; and in the case of the remaining 3 a new trial was ordered.

In the case of 43 of the 58 persons convicted, the sentence of death was confirmed. 13 were sentenced to transportation for life and 2 to rigorous imprisonment.

B.—Appellate and Revisional Jurisdiction.

Appeals for disposal.

69. There were 644 appeals received during the year as against 690 in 1893. 12 of these were from the Presidency Magistrates' decisions, 631 from those of Sessions Judges and one was against the decision of the District Magistrate of Kadur in the Mysore Province.

Disposals.

Of the total number of 644 appeals, 64 were appeals from sentences of death which were disposed of along with the referred trials, and 8 were cases submitted under section 307 of the Code of Criminal Procedure which were not appeals from any sentence actually passed.

Of the remaining 572 appeals, 543 were appeals from convicted persons and 29 from judgments of acquittal. These appeals involving 821 persons and 102 appeals involving 162 persons which were pending from last year made a total of 674 appeals involving 983 persons for disposal during the year. Of these, 563 appeals involving 822 persons were disposed of.

Average duration.

The average duration of appeals was 58 days as against 50 in 1893.

Revision cases.

70. The following table shows the revision work received in the year :—

72. 953 Calendars of Sessions trials and 73 of trials by District Magistrates, 1,001 of appeals heard by Sessions Judges and 132 of those heard by District Magistrates—in all 2,159 calendars were received during the year as against 2,411 in the previous year. Including those pending at the beginning of the year, there were 2,402 for perusal, of which 2,275 were perused during the year, 2,223 being recorded and records being called for from the Lower Courts in the remaining cases. Calendars.

73. To recapitulate; the salient features as regards the business done in the several Criminal Courts in the Presidency were :— Recapitulation.

A decrease in the quantity of work received and done by Village Magistrates, the work received being equal to the work done;

A large increase of work received and done in the Bench Magistrates' Courts and an increase in the number of cases received and disposed of by special Magistrates and Subordinate Magistrates without Appellate powers; a falling off in the quantity of original work, accompanied by an increase of appellate work received and done in the Courts of Sub-Divisional Magistrates with Appellate powers; a decline in the original as well as appellate work received and done in the District Magistrates' Courts; an increase in the percentage of convictions and of sentences of fine in the regular Magistrates' Courts, accompanied by a decrease of sentences of imprisonment and whipping; an improvement in the average duration of cases and period of detention of witnesses;

A diminution of original and a slight increase of appellate work received and done in the Sessions Courts ; and

An increase in the institutions and disposals in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts.

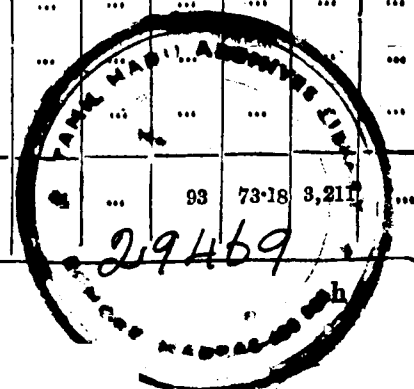

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

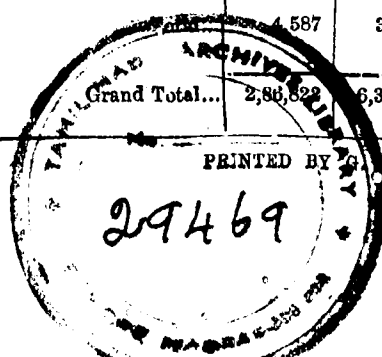
ORDER—dated 23rd September 1895, No. 1981, Judicial.

The report on the administration of Criminal Justice during 1894 reached Government upon the prescribed date, viz., the 15th August. It has been prepared in the usual form, with this exception that its length has been materially curtailed by the omission from the body of the report of a considerable amount of detailed information which can be gathered from the appended statements.

2. In paragraph 19 of the report the Hon'ble the Judges state that the only features of the year, as regarded from the standpoint of the criminal courts, were (1) a decrease in the number of Village Magistrates and an increase in that of regular Magistrates who tried cases, and (2) a very large increase in the number of cases under special and local laws. From the figures given in the Police report it appears, however, that an equally remarkable feature was the small amount of grave crime reported. The total number of cases reported during the year according to the statistics furnished by the High Court was 312,003 as against 290,395 in 1893, the increase being mainly due to the large number of nuisance cases. As in the previous year, these figures differ materially from those given by the Inspector-General of Police; the reason for the discrepancy is to be found in the different systems of ledgering upon which the police and the judicial returns are based. Thus, cases rejected by the magistracy under section 202, Criminal Procedure Code, do not appear in the police returns; similarly cases taken up by Magistrates *suo motu* and shown in the judicial statements as pending enter into the police returns of the following year.

3. *Village Magistrates' Courts.*—The number of Village Magistrates who actually tried cases during 1894 was 6,043 against 6,336 in 1893 and 6,690 in 1892. The number of cases instituted was 11,000 against an average of 11,780 during the preceding five years. Resort to these courts was as usual most frequent in the districts of Tanjore, Madura, North Arcot and Tinnevely. Arrears continued heavy in Tanjore in spite of the fact that special attention was drawn to the delays in that district in paragraph 4 of G.O., No. 2264, Judicial, dated 17th September 1894. The particular attention of the District Magistrate will again be called to this matter.

4. *Benches.*—There was no change in the number (54) of Benches of Magistrates during the year under review, but the total amount of work which came before them increased by 29.9 per cent. owing to the enormous advance in the number of nuisance cases prosecuted. The bulk of this increase took place in the districts of Tanjore and Madura which together contributed no less than 21,739 cases out of a total of 63,889 instituted in the whole Presidency. The average duration of cases improved, and the number pending at the close of this year was only 124 against 118 on the 31st December 1893. In only one district, Tanjore, were any witnesses detained beyond three days, and the number so detained, fourteen, was trifling. The general percentage of convictions in this class of courts rose from 77.14 in 1893 to 80.43, the proportion being highest in Madura, Salem and Tanjore, in the last of which districts,



if the returns are correct, an abnormally large number of defendants must have pleaded guilty; for only 1,796 witnesses are reported to have been examined in the 12,497 cases disposed of.

5. *Special Magistrates.*—The number of Special Magistrates was the same as in the previous year, viz., 48, of whom 38 were Sub-Registrars of Assurances. The number of institutions increased slightly—from 3,886 to 4,129—but only 3,211 witnesses were examined against 3,737 in 1893. The average duration of trials remained stationary being three days. The districts which gave the worst results in this respect were Chingleput, Gódvári and Ganjám, where the average duration of each case is stated to have been 24, 9 and 8 days respectively. The District Magistrates concerned will be requested to explain the excessive delay which appears to have taken place. The number of cases pending at the end of the year was unduly large in Chingleput and Nilgiris, a circumstance which requires explanation in the former district, where the amount of work seems to have been comparatively light. Including 36 cases pending at the close of 1893, the total number of cases for disposal during the year appears to have been 4,165, of which 4,029 were decided, but the number shown as pending is only 88 instead of 136. Similar discrepancies are to be found in the statements showing the work done by other courts; it is presumed that this is due to the exclusion from the column showing disposals of cases transferred to other classes of courts or terminating in consequence of the death of the defendant. The general percentage of convictions, 73.18, varied little from that of the previous year. In individual districts it is noticeable that the proportion was below 43 per cent. in South Arcot, Nilgiris and Gódvári, and above 81 per cent. in every other district. The Magistrates of the districts named will be requested to report whether any explanation for this striking difference is forthcoming.

6. *Stipendiary Subordinate Magistrates.*—There was but little variation in the number of Stipendiary Sub-Magistrates who actually tried cases during 1894. Out of 463, 435 exercised second class and 28 third class powers against 427 and 30 respectively in 1893. Eighteen of the second-class Sub-Magistrates were Tahsildars not ordinarily invested with power to take cognizance of offences under section 191 of the Criminal Procedure Code. The total number of cases instituted rose from 163,689 in 1893 to 167,497, the average file per court advancing from 358 to 362. According to statement C-4 appended to the report, 2,444 cases were pending at the close of the year, or 106 more than on the 31st December 1893. Of these no less than 534 cases—over 27 per cent. of the institutions in the district—are shown as pending in the Nilgiris; it is explained that these large arrears are due to the number of cases under Act XIII of 1859 in which it has been found impossible to secure the presence of the accused. The average duration of each case fell from seven to six days—an improvement which is probably in part due to the decrease of nearly 16,000 in the number of witnesses examined. If the figures can be relied upon there was a very satisfactory fall in the number of witnesses detained beyond three days. The only district in which the statistics relating to this matter call for adverse comment is Tanjore, where no less than 1,429 witnesses appear to have been so detained. Attention was drawn to a similar shortcoming in the review of the previous year's report; the apparent delay in the examination of witnesses was, however, accompanied by an improvement in the average duration of cases and a great reduction in the amount of arrears in spite of the fact that the total number of institutions increased by over 1,500. Delay in the disposal of cases was most marked in the Gódvári and Vizagapatam Agencies and in the districts of Kistna, Bellary and Kurnool, in the last of which there was a considerable increase in the number of cases pending at the end of the year. The percentage of convictions in this class of courts increased from 36.07 in 1893 to 36.83, the same figure as in 1892. There were, as usual, considerable variations in different districts, the percentage ranging from 53.76 in the Vizagapatam Agency and 50.78 in Malabar to 22.83 in Gódvári.

7. *Superior Magistrates in the Mufassal.*—(1) The number of First-class Sub-divisional Magistrates rose from 91 to 96, an increase which has not been explained, but is probably due to the enhancement of the powers of a few Second-class Magistrates holding sub-divisional charges.

(2) There was a considerable decrease in the number of institutions before Deputy Magistrates, viz., from 2,986 to 2,370, while the disposals fell from 3,225 to 2,713. The number of cases received by transfer and not included in the column showing institutions must apparently have been 341. The general decrease in the amount of work received may probably, as in the previous year, be attributed to the fall in grave crime. It is unsatisfactory to note that the fall in the amount of work for disposal was accompanied by an increase of three days in the average duration of cases (eighteen days). Arrears were heavy in Kurnool and South Arcot and there was great delay in disposal in the former district and in Salem. It is observed that column 5 of statement C-5 has not been filled up as regards the district of Malabar. The total number of witnesses reported to have been detained beyond three days was 164 against 279 in 1893 and 121 in 1892; these detentions took place in only six districts as in the previous year. The average percentage of convictions in the courts of Deputy Magistrates fell from 40.24 to 38.31, the highest rates being reached in Kistna (52.94), Nellore (52.59) and Nilgiris (50.94) and the lowest in Gódvári (29.15), Bellary (28.63) and North Arcot (23.5). In Malabar there was a striking variation—from 63.7 to 38 per cent.—in the rate of convictions during the two years 1893 and 1894 which has not been explained.

(3) Statement C-6 shows that Assistant and Head Assistant Magistrates disposed of 1,995 cases—or 346 more than in the previous year—while the number of institutions rose from 1,284 to 1,705. The increase in institutions was particularly marked in North Arcot (+ 172) Kistna (+ 99) and Malabar (+ 86). The average duration of cases in the courts of Assistant and Cantonment Magistrates improved from fourteen to twelve days and the number of pending cases fell from 103 to 96. There was excessive delay in the disposal of cases in Coimbatore where the average duration of a case was 53 days, in Gódvári Agency where it was 25 and in Madurá where it was 24. A further unsatisfactory feature in Coimbatore was the fact that 30 witnesses were detained beyond three days out of a total of 76 for the whole presidency.

The three Cantonment Magistrates disposed of 785 cases against 880 in the preceding year, the rate of convictions rising remarkably from 59.5 to 81 per cent.

(4) One thousand and forty-two cases were disposed of by Joint Magistrates or 80 less than in the preceding year. If the returns can be relied upon, not a single witness was detained beyond three days in any court. The average duration of cases, however, increased from fifteen to seventeen days and was altogether excessive in Chingleput (41 days) and in Tanjore (34 days); in the review of the report for 1893 a similar remark was made as regards the latter mentioned court. The percentage of convictions in these courts remained practically stationary (43.84).

(5) The number of cases disposed of by District Magistrates was fewer than ever. Six of these officers did no original work whatever and the rest decided only 27 cases as against 93 in the previous year. The number of references made by District Magistrates to the High Court under section 438 of the Criminal Procedure Code was about the same as in 1893, but the proportion of cases in which interference was refused rose from 25 to 30 per cent. Seven hundred and eighteen revision cases were received by District Magistrates and 725 disposed of as compared with 719 and 756, respectively, in the previous year.

The number of persons committed by Joint, Assistant and Deputy Magistrates was only 162 against 251 in 1893 and 329 in 1892; there has thus been a continuous decline which the Government fears must in part at least be attributed to the disinclination of Sub-Divisional Magistrates to take up cases, however serious, which can legally be dealt with by Sub-Magistrates. A similar cause perhaps accounts for the fall in the total number of cases disposed of by District, Joint and Deputy Magistrates. The Government regards with apprehension this apparently growing tendency to leave serious cases to Sub-Magistrates wherever possible, and desires to impress upon District Magistrates the necessity of requiring Sub-Divisional Magistrates themselves to deal with cases of more than ordinary importance, although they may be cognizable by a second-class Magistrate.

8. *Appeals*.—The increase in the number of appeals presented to first-class Magistrates, which was noticed in 1893, continued in the year under review. The following statement compares the institutions during the last five years :—

The rise in the number of appeals from the judgments of second and third class Magistrates appears to be due to the general increase in the amount of criminal work coming before them. The percentage of unsuccessful appeals in each district is shown in the following table :—

Judged by the appeal test the work of the subordinate magistracy appears to have been characterized by a marked improvement in the districts of Bellary, Ganjām, Nellore and Salem, while the percentage of successful appeals rose considerably in Nilgiris, Kistna Tanjore, Trichinopoly and Vizagapatam. The average duration of appeals decided by Sub-divisional Magistrates was, as in 1893, twenty-five days, and that of appeals heard by District Magistrates seventeen days—or three less than in 1893.

9. *Sessions Courts*.—Sessions Courts received by committal or on reference 1,016 cases against 1,109 in 1893 and disposed of 1,020, the arrears falling from 28 to 22 and the average duration of each case from 29 to 28 days. The duration of cases was apparently excessive in Madura (40 days) and Tinnevelly (55 days), but in both these courts the files were heavy and it is explained that in the former the adjournment of two cases for long periods contributed materially to the delay. The total number of witnesses examined was 8,874 against 10,384 in 1893 and of these 3,170 or 35.7 per cent. were detained beyond three days against 54.8 per cent. in 1893. Including the Agency courts, more than half the witnesses were detained for the period named above in eleven courts in 1893 as against four only in 1894, viz., Bellary, Cuddapah, Tinnevelly and Vizagapatam Agency. The improvement has been so marked in other cases that there appears to be no reason why a similar change for the better should not be effected in these courts; the matter will, no doubt, receive the attention of the High Court.

The percentage of convictions in Sessions Courts was 45.03 against 41.22 in 1893, being above 60 per cent. in the Agency courts, Nellore and North Malabar and below 30 in Bellary, Kistna and Górávari.

Judged by the appeal test the work of Sessions Courts was less satisfactory than in the previous year.

One thousand one hundred and forty-nine appeals presented by 1,833 persons from the decisions of first-class Magistrates—the highest figure on record—were received by Sessions Courts against 1,121 presented by 1,756 persons in 1893, an increase which is the more remarkable having regard to the fact that the number of appealable sentences passed declined from 3,023 to 2,870. The following table appears to indicate a growing tendency to more frequent resort to appeals from the decisions of first-class Magistrates :—

The figures in the last column apparently show an improvement in the work of first-class Magistrates, but this is discounted by the increased tendency to have recourse to appeals, and an equally probable explanation of the rise in the proportion of confirmations is the more frequent institution of appeals in cases where the probability of success is small; this theory is borne out by the fact that the percentages of interference with appealable sentences has fluctuated very little during the past quinquennium.

The average duration of appeals fell from 40 days in 1893 to 28 in 1894 and there was a slight reduction in the number of pending cases.

Only 428 revision cases were received in 1894 against 462 in 1893 and 479 in 1892, and a considerable reduction in arrears was consequently effected.

In 18 out of 54 cases referred by Sessions Courts the High Court declined to exercise its revisional powers; sentence of death was confirmed in the cases of 43 out of 79 persons.

10. *Presidency Magistrates' Courts*.—Forty-four thousand six hundred and fifty cases were brought before Presidency Magistrates' courts against 41,993 in 1893 and 45,133 in 1892, the latter being the highest recorded figure. Only 20 cases were pending at the close of the year, and no less than 86 per cent. of the persons dealt with were convicted.

11. *High Court*.—The sessions work of the High Court comprised 55 cases against 46 in the previous year, all of which were decided during the year, the average duration rising slightly owing to the commitment of a large number of cases too late for one sessions and their consequent postponement to the next. In eight cases against nineteen in the previous year Sessions Judges found it necessary to express disagreement with the verdict of juries; of the eight cases disposed of by the High Court, the verdict was reversed in six and upheld in one, retrial being ordered in the remaining case. There was a slight increase in the number of cases reported for confirmation of death sentences, a decrease in appellate work and a slight advance in revision cases; the average duration of appeals increased slightly and it is noticeable that the number of appeals against acquittals was 23 against 5 in 1893; of these only five were wholly unsuccessful.

12. *Punishments*.—The usual table comparing for a series of years the rate of advance in offences against the Penal Code and in the severer forms of punishment is subjoined :—

The decrease in the number of heavy sentences of imprisonment may be attributed to the fall in grave crime noticed in paragraph 2 *supra*. It is satisfactory to observe that though the total number of whippings has declined 622 juvenile offenders have received this description of punishment against 593 in 1893; 191 of these were sentenced under section 5 of the Whipping Act against 181 in 1893, 79 in 1892 and 40 in 1891.

● The increase in the amount of fines imposed is no doubt partly attributable to the marked advance in the number of nuisance cases. The continuance of the decline in the proportion of payments of compensation is probably due to the same cause.

13. The working of the criminal courts during 1894 appears on the whole to have been satisfactory, comparing favourably in many respects with the administration of the previous year, particularly as regards the duration of cases and the detention of witnesses. This improvement was moreover accompanied by an increase in receipts, coupled with a reduction in expenditure, the net cost of the criminal courts being Rs. 7,86,575 against Rs. 8,35,646 in 1893.
