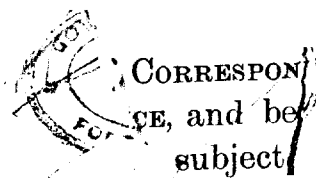

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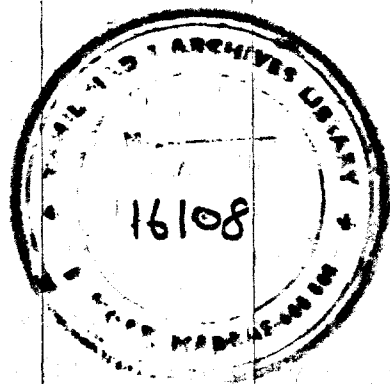

PRISON-MADE GOODS (INDIA).

COPY OF CORRESPONDENCE between the BOARD OF TRADE and the INDIA OFFICE, and between the INDIA OFFICE and the INDIAN GOVERNMENT, on the subject of PRISON-MADE GOODS.

BOARD OF TRADE to INDIA OFFICE.

Sir, February 26, 1896.
I AM directed by the Board of Trade to forward to you, to be laid before the Secretary of State for India, the accompanying report, as extracted from the "Times" newspaper, of the questions which were addressed to the President of this Department in the House of Commons on the 17th instant on the subject of "prison-made goods," and of the replies made by Mr. Ritchie to those questions.
In forwarding this extract I am to request that Lord George Hamilton's attention may be particularly directed to the questions put by Mr. Lough with regard to the manufacture of carpets in Indian prisons and their distribution in foreign countries, and to the statement by Mr. Ritchie to the effect that he would ascertain whether any objection existed to the presentation to Parliament in due course of such correspondence as had passed between the Home and Indian Governments on this subject. In pursuance of this promise I am to ask you to be good enough to move the Secretary of State to cause Mr. Ritchie to be informed whether there would be any objection on the part of the India Office to this Board being furnished with a copy of the despatch which it is understood was addressed to the Government of India by his direction in September 1895, and also with a copy of the reply to that despatch when received. Mr. Ritchie would also be glad to know whether there would be any difficulty in the way of these documents being presented to Parliament by this Department and made public in the usual course.

PRISON-MADE GOODS.

[After questions relating to foreign prison made goods had been put to the President of the Board of Trade and answered].

Mr. LOUGH asked whether a report from the Indian Government had been received with regard to the carpets manufactured in Indian prisons and their distribution in foreign countries. He would also like to know what action he (the President of the Board of Trade) proposed to take in that matter.

Mr. RITCHIE.—I may say in reply to the honourable member for Islington that we have received a reply from the Indian Government, and the effect of the reply is that they see no objection to the proposed legislation.

Mr. LOUGH.—Will those papers be published with the others?

Mr. RITCHIE.—I will enquire.

We presume prohibition will not apply to such goods when they are not intended for sale.

Calcutta, February 12, 1896.

We have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's Judicial Despatch, No. 36, dated the 19th September 1895, with which you forwarded copies of a question asked by Mr. Lough, M.P., in the House of Commons on the 26th August last, and of the reply thereto, on the subject of the manufacture in Indian gaols of carpets and other articles for export to European countries.

2. In reply, we beg to forward, for your Lordship's information, a copy of the replies received from the Local Governments and Administrations, who were asked to supply the required information, together with a tabular statement showing the quantity and value of such articles exported from India to the United Kingdom and foreign countries. The Government of the Punjab, which furnished figures later than the other Governments, has furnished them for the three years ending with 1895, but we suppose that these will be equally useful for the desired purpose.

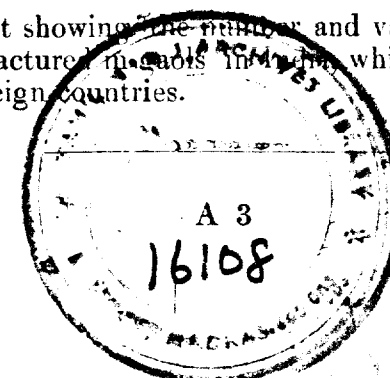

3. I would beg to explain with reference to the figures appearing in the above statement that prisons do not, except on very rare occasions, directly export prison manufactures to other countries, and that the figures now furnished chiefly represent articles that have been manufactured for firms and individuals who it is assumed have sent such articles out of the country. On the other hand, some articles which may have found their way out of India are not included in the statement. No regular export trade is carried on in connexion with gaol manufactures, and the development of such (i.e., export trade) is not encouraged.

4. Of these carpets and rugs exported to foreign countries, the greater number, it is believed, found their way to America, and the passing of the McKinley Tariff Bill appears to have checked the demand from that direction.

With reference to the memorandum from the Home Department, No. 9-Gaols—475, dated the 28th October 1895, and its annexures, I am directed to report, for the information of the Government of India, that no carpets or other articles have been manufactured in the gaols of the Lower Provinces for export during the last 10 years.

Your 9-Gaols—477, dated 28th October last. Value of mats and carpets manufactured in Punjab Gaols, exclusive of Delhi Gaol, and exported during past three years is, exported to United Kingdom R. 13,853, exported to foreign countries R. 4,921. No other articles are manufactured in Punjab Gaols for export. Figures for Delhi Gaol follow.

Continuation telegram 25th instant. Delhi Gaol exported carpets and mats valued R. 3,436 to United Kingdom and R. 982 to foreign countries during past three years.

VII. From the OFFICIATING CHIEF SECRETARY to the CHIEF COMMISSIONER, Central Provinces, to the SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA, HOME DEPARTMENT.

Nagpur, December 12, 1895.

I AM directed to acknowledge the receipt of Home Department endorsement No. 9-Gaols—478, dated the 28th October last, forwarding a copy of a Despatch from the Secretary of State for India, No. 36 (Judicial), dated the 19th September 1895, and of its enclosure, being a letter from Mr. T. Lough, M.P., dated the 29th August 1895, requesting to be furnished with information as to the number and annual value of mats or carpets or any other articles manufactured in Gaols and exported to the United Kingdom and foreign countries.

2. In reply I am to say that no carpets have been manufactured in the Gaols in the Central Provinces for many years, nor is there any foreign export from the industries as there are in the Central Provinces Gaols are purely local.

VIII. From the OFFICIATING SECRETARY TO THE CHIEF COMMISSIONER, Burma, to the SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA, HOME DEPARTMENT.

Rangoon, December 16, 1895.

With reference to your endorsement No. 9-G. 479, dated the 28th October 1895, I am directed to say that none of the articles manufactured in the Gaols of this Province are exported by the Gaol Department to the United Kingdom or to foreign countries direct. In this connection I am to submit, for the information of the Government of India, copy of letter No. 6744—105-G., dated the 7th December 1895, from the Inspector-General of Gaols, which is his reply to an enquiry made on the subject.

From the INSPECTOR-GENERAL OF GAOLS, BURMA, to the SECRETARY TO THE CHIEF COMMISSIONER, BURMA.

December 7, 1895.

In reply to your Judicial Department endorsement No. 233—16 G. 58, dated 11th November 1895, I have the honour to state that none of the articles manufactured by convict labour in this Province are exported by this Department to the United Kingdom or foreign countries. Occasionally articles purchased from the Gaols are, at the request of the purchaser, forwarded to some European destination, but no attempt is made to supply European markets with Gaol manufactured products.

It may perhaps, be as well to mention that at some of the gaols dunnage mats and ventilators are made and sold to local firms of stevedores and dubashes who employ them in the loading of homeward-bound vessels.

IX. From the OFFICIATING SECRETARY TO THE CHIEF COMMISSIONER OF ASSAM to the SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA, HOME DEPARTMENT.

Shillong, November 30, 1895.

With reference to Mr. Hill's memorandum No. 9-Gaols—480 G., dated the 28th October 1895, and its enclosure, asking for certain information regarding the manufacture in gaols of carpets and other articles for export, I am directed to say that no carpets or other articles are manufactured for export in the gaols of this province.

X. From the SECRETARY TO THE CHIEF COMMISSIONER OF COORG to the SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA, HOME DEPARTMENT.

Bangalore, December 4, 1895.

In reply to your endorsement No. 9-Gaols—481, of the 28th October 1895, I am directed to report that no mats or carpets or any other articles are manufactured in the Mercara Gaol for export either to the United Kingdom or to foreign countries.

XI. From the SECRETARY FOR BERAR to the RESIDENT, Hyderabad, to the SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA, HOME DEPARTMENT.

Hyderabad Residency, December 16, 1895.

I AM directed to acknowledge the receipt of your endorsement No. 9-Gaols—482, dated the 28th October 1895, from the Government of India in the Home Department, calling for certain information regarding mats and carpets and other articles manufactured in gaols and exported to the United Kingdom and foreign countries.

2. In reply I am to say that no articles manufactured in gaols under this Administration are so exported.
