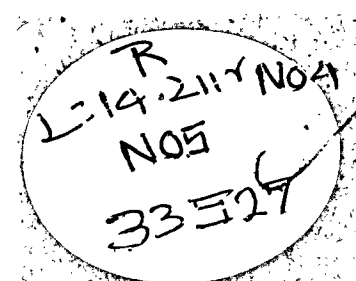
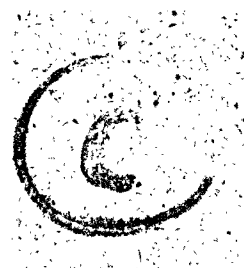

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith a report on the working of the civil medical institutions in the Presidency for the triennial period ending the 31st December 1904. The statements incorporated in the report have been revised in accordance with G.O., No. 699, Public, dated 15th August 1904, which however was received too late to permit of the differentiation of the sexes among children being carried out, as up to the date of the receipt of the order the "sex" of children admitted into the hospital was not noted.

2. *Public Health.*—The statistics of some of the leading causes of mortality as detailed in the following table show that, while cholera and small-pox decreased during the period under review, plague doubled its victims and the two groups of "Dysentery and diarrhoea" and "Respiratory diseases" also gave an increased mortality:—

It will also be seen that the total deaths have risen in all the districts, while there was a decline in the City of Madras during the triennial period.

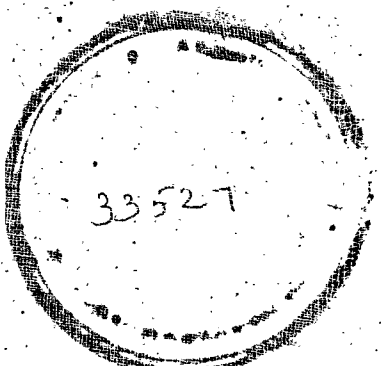
In the City of Madras the number of deaths from fever has steadily decreased, whilst in the districts it has varied during the triennial period. The cause of this decrease in the City of Madras is at present obscure, but in all probability the investigation at present being conducted will throw some light upon this point.

3. *Epidemics.*—(a) *Small-pox.*—At the commencement of the triennial period, this disease was prevalent in a severe form in the districts of South Canara, Malabar and Bellary, whereas in 1903 it was present in a sporadic form only, in all the districts of the Presidency, Malabar being the district most affected. In 1904 the disease was prevalent in a very mild form in the districts of Coimbatore, Tanjore, Madura, Tinnevely and Malabar.

The Presidency town of Madras was only slightly affected by this disease during the triennium.

(b) *Cholera*.—The disease was severe in 1902, while in 1903 it was less prevalent. During 1904 it was markedly prevalent in the districts of Nellore, Cuddapah, Chingleput, Salem, Coimbatore, Trichinopoly, Tanjore, Madura and Tinnevely.

(c) *Plague*.—There was a distinct increase in the fatality of plague during the triennium, and the area over which its ravages occurred also widened to some extent. In the seven districts affected in 1902, 10,785 deaths were ascribed to plague, increasing to 13,287 in 1903 and affecting an additional district (the Nilgiris), while in 1904 the number of deaths rose to 20,117 and Cuddapah was added to the previously infected area.

(d) *Dengue*.—To some extent this disease was noted in the first half of the period under review, but was more noticeable among European Military Residents than in the general civil population.

(e) *Inspection of Vessels*.—Three hundred and twenty-seven outgoing vessels with crews aggregating 33,600 persons and 44,347 Madras passengers were inspected during 1904.

Besides these, 224 vessels from plague-infected ports (those that arrived here within ten days of their departure from such ports) with crews numbering 19,063 persons and 27,657 passengers for Madras, were also inspected.

4. (a) *Number and Class of Institutions*.—There were 479 civil medical institutions and 121 Police, Railway and private non-aided institutions or 600 institutions of all classes at work in the year 1902, during which year 8 were opened and 2 closed. Twelve more were opened in 1903 and 29 in 1904 and deducting those closed in the two years, namely, 11 and 4 respectively, there are shown at the end of 1904—632 medical institutions for the whole Presidency—and this number will compare favourably with those of other Provinces.

(b) The 251 hospitals and 381 dispensaries in the Presidency are divided into six classes. Class I "State", "Public"—20 in number are entirely supported by Government. Class II "State", "Special" 48 in number, including 44 Police hospitals and 4 other institutions, set apart for special departments, namely, dispensaries for Assistant Collectors in the hilly districts of Ganjam and Gódvári, and one dispensary for the Salt and Abkari Department in the Javadi Hills, are also entirely supported by Government.

Class III, 449 in number, are mainly supported by Local or Municipal Funds. Class IV, 24 in number "private aided", are chiefly supported by private subscriptions, but also aided by either State, Local or Municipal funds. In classes V and VI there are 34 private non-aided and 57 Railway Institutions maintained under the management either of private associations or of Railway Companies.

(c) The number of hospitals and dispensaries set apart for the exclusive treatment of women and children and in charge of Female Medical practitioners increased from 20 in 1902 to 22 in 1903 and another two additions in 1904 brought up the total to 24 at the end of the triennium.

(d) Compared with the Presidential area and population there is now one medical institution to every 226 square miles of country and every 60,510 inhabitants.

(e) The institutions referred to in the returns are distributed in the districts as follows:—

Ganjam (29), Vizagapatam (39), Gódvári (39), Kistna (15), Guntur (18), Nellore (27), Kurnool (20), Bellary (19), Anantapur (16), Cuddapah (17), North Arcot (30), Chingleput (22), South Arcot (27), Salem (32), Coimbatore (32), Trichinopoly (28), Tanjore (42), Madura (48), Tinnevely (36), Nilgiris (8), Malabar (43), South Canara (26) and Madras City (18 including 4 Railway Dispensaries) and Trivandrum State hospital (1).

(f) In 1902 eight dispensaries were opened at the following places. Berhampur (Ganjam), Coonaveram (Gódvári), Sullurpet (Nellore), Perundurái

(Coimbatore), Ávadaiyarkóvil (Tanjore), Palamcottah (Tinnevely), Mappadi and Palghat (Malabar).

In 1903 nine dispensaries and 3 hospitals were opened at the following places:—Berhampur (Ganjam), Durgarazpatnam (Nellore), Conjeeveram (Chingleput), Salem Town (Salem), Annur (Coimbatore), Tirupundi, Enangudi and Muttupet (Tanjore), Pykara (Nilgiris); and a hospital for women and children at Chicacole (Ganjam) and two hospitals, one for leprosy and the other for general medical work at Rámachandrapuram (Gódvári).

In 1904, twenty-six dispensaries and 3 hospitals were opened at the following places:—Padwa (Vizagapatam), Achanta and Nedadavolu (Gódvári), Guntur Town (Guntur), Holungundy (Bellary), Vainpalli (Cuddapah), Javadi (North Arcot), Ilyangudi (Madura), Kulasekarapatnam (Tinnevely), Alanthorai, Quilandi and Kothaparamba (Malabar) and two hospitals at Bellary and Calicut. Two dispensaries and one hospital in Vizagapatam, one dispensary in Gódvári, one in Chingleput and one in Coimbatore under private non-aided; and nine constructive Railway institutions along the Madras Railway line.

As per G.O., No. 560, Public, dated 29th June 1904, in the redistribution of the districts of Gódvári, Kistna and Nellore, 18 institutions were transferred from one district to another and a reclassification of 6 dispensaries was also rendered necessary.

(g) For various reasons seventeen medical institutions were closed during the triennium, none of them being of special importance.

5. *Accommodation*.—(a) In 1904, there were 4,792 beds available in the civil medical institutions and 827 in the Police, Railway and private non-aided institutions, making a total of 5,619 (males 3,323, females 2,296) as compared with 5,527 (males 3,314, females 2,213) in 1903, and 5,383 (males 3,205, females 2,178) in 1902.

(b) The increase in the number of beds during the year 1904, as compared with the two preceding years, was due to the opening of new hospitals for women and children in Bellary and Calicut, to provision being made for extra wards for males and females in the hospitals at Ganjam, Chingleput and Tinnevely; to the opening of new wards for surgical operation cases in Wenlock hospital and to the opening of a lying-in ward in the Women and Children's hospital at Mangalore; and the erection of additional wards for both males and females in the Leper Asylum, Madras, and the provision of a few additional beds in the Maternity hospital at Madras.

(c) The average number of beds occupied daily in important hospitals where larger provisions were made for accommodation during the triennium was as follows:—

Twenty-eight beds were added to the Leper hospital, and four beds to the Maternity hospital in 1904. In no case in the above table with the exception of Calicut in 1902 was overcrowding reported, but the above statement but indifferently represents the "run" on the male native beds that certainly exists in almost all the above hospitals.

6. *Total treated*.—(a) In 1902, 13.84 per cent. of the population were admitted into the medical institutions of the Presidency, increasing to 13.97 per cent. in the

following year and to 14.71 in 1904, that is, 5,624,226 patients were attended to in the last year.

(b) Excluding the patients treated in the "State Special", "Railway" and "Private non-aided" institutions as full returns are not available for the 412,885 patients treated therein, the attendance in all the other institutions showed a nearly stationary number of in-patients and a decided increase among the out-patients, the figures being—

(c) Of the in-door patients in 1904, there were 37,367 males, 20,004 females and 3,078 children as compared with 37,547 males, 19,922 females, 2,913 children in 1903; and 38,301 males, 20,093 females, 3,198 children in 1902 or a percentage of 61.82 males, 33.09 females, 5.09 children in 1904, as compared with 62.18, 32.99, 4.83 and 62.19, 32.62 and 5.19 in the years 1903 and 1902, respectively.

The increase under females and children was chiefly due to the opening in 1904 of two hospitals for the separate treatment of women and children.

The daily average number of sick among in-door patients was 2,856.87 in 1904 as compared with 2,766.02 in 1903 and 2,814.51 in 1902.

The percentage of cures and discharges to total treated was 89.71 in 1904, 90.32 in 1903 and 89.32 in 1902; the percentage of mortality was 5.90, 6.25 and 7.02 in the three years, respectively, showing a greater number of deaths at the beginning of the triennial period.

(d) One hundred and four septic cases were treated during 1904, of which 22 were acquired in hospitals—9 in Maternity hospital, 2 in General hospital, 2 in Victoria Caste and Gosha hospital, in Madras; one in Vizagapatam, 5 in Tanjore, 3 in Madura districts, whereas there were 142 septic cases in 1903 with 19 acquired in hospitals, and 116 in 1902 with 8 in hospitals. The increase in the number of these cases shown in the Maternity hospital during the year 1904, was due to the free handling of complex cases by midwives before admission into the hospital. The steps taken to prevent their spread were satisfactory.

(e) Of the out-door patients in 1904 there were 2,623,353 males, 1,101,477 females and 1,426,062 children or a percentage of 50.93 males, 21.35 females and 27.69 children, as compared with 51.28 males, 21.77 females, 26.95 children in 1903, and 49.50, 21.45 and 29.05 in 1902. The decrease among children was mainly due to the non-prevalence of sore eyes in 1904 and 1903.

The average daily strength among out-door patients was 31,282.88 in 1904, as compared with 29,829.99 in 1903 and 29,912.55 in 1902.

(f) Attendance by proxies was practically the same during the three years of the triennium, the proportion being 6.66 per cent. in 1902 and 6.65 in 1903 and 1904. Instructions have been issued to discourage this sort of treatment.

(g) The marked decrease in the total treated in the General hospital is ascribed to an improvement in the general healthiness of the City of Madras.

(h) The decrease in the districts of Coimbatore and Salem was due to the fact that plague had a marked effect on the attendance. (With these exceptions there has been a marked increase in all the other districts.)

(i) The number of patients who obtained relief in the "State Special" institutions in 1904 was 16,507 as compared with 17,773 in 1903 and 17,492 in 1902, whereas in the "Railway" institutions, it was 127,930, 99,131, 75,871 in the three years, respectively, and in the "Private non-aided" institutions, it was 268,443, 250,139 and 206,863 in the triennial period.

7. *Classes.*—Of the total number of patients treated, the proportion of Europeans and Eurasians was 1.65 per cent. in 1902, 1.57 in 1903 and 1.46 in 1904, of Hindus 72.45, 72.45 and 72.15; and of Muhammadans 12.48, 12.33 and 12.96, respectively, showing no great variation during the triennial period. Among "all other classes" too, the difference was slight being 13.43, 13.64 and 13.42, respectively in the three years.

8. *Diseases treated.*—(a) The diseases among in- and out- patients are classified and compared as follows:—

(b) Though on the whole no marked variations are observable, yet in some of the individual district hospitals, considerable variation in the numbers of cases due to malarial fevers is noticeable during 1904.

At the General Hospital, Madras, malarial fevers have shown a steady and marked decrease during the triennial period. In 1902 the total treated was 8,213 as compared with 4,211 in 1904 or a fall of 51 per cent. in the latter year. The cause of this marked fall is not obvious on the surface, and it is hoped that the investigation into the prevalence of malaria in Madras now being undertaken will clear up this and many other points with reference to "Fever" in the City. During 1904, 344 cases of "Piroplasmiasis", which were formerly classed as "Malaria" were entered under "Diseases of the spleen". These cases were formerly known as "Malarial Cachexia" and their differentiation from Malaria and its Plasmodium we owe to the excellent work of Major Donovan, I.M.S., in the wards of the Second Physician at the General Hospital, Madras.

There was also a noticeable diminution in malarial fevers in Coimbatore, Chingleput, Tanjore, Trichinopoly, Tinnevely and Madura whilst Bellary, Anantapur and Cuddapah recorded an unusual increase during 1904, there being 12,251 cases in 1902, 12,626 in 1903 and 21,799 in 1904 in Bellary; 7,861, 8,421 and 17,694 in Anantapur; and 12,902, 15,912 and 27,227 in Cuddapah.

The decrease in the former case was ascribed by the reporting Medical officers to the general healthiness of the districts concerned, while in the latter the increase was due to the unusually heavy rains in the latter end of the year 1903 which filled up all the tanks and reservoirs, keeping the fields more or less continuously under water throughout 1904.

9. *Operations.*—(a) The number of operations performed during the triennial period was 163,941 in 1902; 157,737 in 1903; and 161,836 in 1904; or a percentage of 3.28; 3.17; and 3.11 to total cases treated in the three years respectively.

(b) One hundred and sixty-two thousand two hundred and seventy-five persons were operated on in 1902, as compared with 156,858 in 1903 and 160,073 in 1904. The ratio percentage of results of cases surgically treated is compared below for the triennial period:—

Thus, the number of patients operated on during 1904 was somewhat lower than in 1902, but greater than in 1903.

(c) Of the operations performed during the triennium, there was a greater number of removals of "tumours" and "cysts" in 1904 than in the two preceding years; namely 2,600 in 1902; 2,815 in 1903; and 3,525 in 1904. Although the number of amputations for injury and disease showed an increase, 587 having been performed in 1902, as compared with 653 in 1903, and 607 in 1904, there was a marked decrease in the mortality from 5.79 to 3.98 and 3.13 in the respective years. This satisfactory result probably points to the success of the generalised efforts that have been made towards improvements in the operating rooms and the 'matériel' thereof of the various hospitals in the Presidency.

One thousand four hundred and ninety-five cases of "Extraction of lens" were performed in 1902, as compared with 1,420 in 1903, and 1,356 in 1904, showing a gradual decrease during the period.

Abdominal section (for other diseases than those peculiar to women) was performed on 55 persons in 1902, 47 in 1903 and 44 in 1904, resulting in 27; 18; and 19 deaths respectively.

Two cases of removal of enlarged spleen were performed during 1904, one of which resulted in cure. Lithotomy was performed 56 times in 1902 with 3 deaths, as compared with 59 in 1903 and 1 death; and 39 in 1904 and 4 deaths; lithotripsy was performed 5 times in 1902 twice in 1903 and once in 1904.

Abdominal section for uterine or ovarian trouble was performed 91 times in 1902 with 7 deaths, as compared with 77 cases in 1903 with 14 deaths; and 80 cases in 1904 with 11 deaths.

A noteworthy result was effected during the last year in the complete and rapid cure of two cases of infective granuloma by means of the exposure to the X rays for a daily period of ten minutes. Should further experience in the General Hospital confirm this result, a distinct advance in the treatment of this hitherto intractable disease will have been attained.

10. *Dentistry*.—A large number of patients were relieved in the special dental department attached to the General Hospital, Madras, and in addition, many thousands of extractions of teeth were made in other institutions, the largest numbers being shown in Ganjam, Vizagapatam, Gódvári, North Arcot, South Arcot, Salem, Madura, Malabar and South Canara. Chloroform was administered in 22, and ethyle chloride in 5 cases during the year 1904.

11. *Training of Medical Students*.—The all-important work of the clinical instruction, i.e., bedside teaching, of all our medical students—studying both for the higher grades of the profession at the Medical College as well as for the lower grade of hospital assistant at the Medical Schools—was efficiently carried out at the various hospitals of the Presidency City and also at the hospitals of Vizagapatam and Tanjore. The Medical College sent 159 students for clinical work in 1902 and the number rose to 190 in 1903 and to 193 in 1904. The figures of the hospital assistant classes at the Medical schools were 203, 237, 241 for the three years respectively.

12. *Training of Nurses and Midwives*.—(a) The working of this department at the General Hospital, Madras, has been satisfactory. The class of persons applying for training continues to improve, and there has been no lack of candidates.

Eighty-four applications were received during the year 1904, from women desirous of joining the class for "Nurse Probationers" and "Special Proba-

tioners". There were no applications for training in the "Lady Probationer Class".

There were 13 "Nurse Probationers" and 4 "Special Probationers" (who pay for their board) in the class during the year 1904; eleven of the former were qualified and promoted to the nursing staff, and 2 of the latter, were qualified and left the school.

Fourteen were newly entertained (6 nurse probationers and 8 special probationers) in the year 1904 as compared with 13 in 1902 and 11 in 1903.

(b) In the Government Maternity Hospital 19 European and Eurasian and 22 Native nurses received diplomas as midwives in 1904. Of the latter, 4 were stipended by the Countess of Dufferin Fund and 1 by the District Board, South Canara.

In 1903, twelve European and Eurasian and 24 Native nurses received diplomas. Of the latter nurses, 4 were stipended by the Countess of Dufferin Fund and 1 by the Mangalore Municipality.

In 1902, sixteen European and Eurasian and 12 Native nurses received diplomas. Of the latter nurses, 5 were stipended by the Countess of Dufferin Fund and 1 by the Salem Municipality. The rest were stipended by Government.

(c) In the Rajah Sir Ramasawmy Mudaliar's Maternity Hospital, 5 European and Eurasian (private) and 26 Native nurses received diplomas as midwives during the triennium. Of these Native nurses, 2 were private, 13 were stipended by the Countess of Dufferin Fund, 11 by different District Boards and Municipalities. The outturn of trained midwives continues to be a very satisfactory feature of the work at the Maternity Hospitals in Madras.

13. *Finance*.—(a) *Income*.—The total income of hospitals and dispensaries under the control of Government during 1904 exclusive of the cash balance in hand at the commencement of the year (Rs. 14,091) amounted to Rs. 18,26,610 as compared with Rs. 16,29,699 in 1903 and Rs. 15,30,612 in 1902.

(1) Of this total income, the sum of Rs. 5,58,646 including the grant of Rs. 20,000 made by the Madras Municipality towards the upkeep of the five State hospitals in the Presidency Town was contributed by Government in 1904 as compared with Rs. 5,31,147 in 1903 and Rs. 4,40,730 in 1902. The increase during 1904 falls chiefly under the heads "Establishment, Buildings and Medicines."

(2) Contributions from Local Funds and Municipalities amounted to Rs. 7,69,334 and Rs. 3,59,369, respectively, in 1904 as compared with Rs. 6,79,227 and Rs. 2,70,269 in 1903 and Rs. 7,01,761 and Rs. 2,65,711 in 1902.

(3) Receipts from interest on investments in 1904 amounted to Rs. 23,236 as compared with Rs. 23,569 in 1903 and Rs. 22,235 in 1902. The decrease in 1904 was due to the withdrawal of deposits from the funded capital on account of construction of hospitals.

(4) Subscriptions from Natives amounted to Rs. 29,424 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 21,864 in 1903 and Rs. 20,823 in 1902 showing a steady increase, whilst there was but slight variation in European subscriptions, the figures being Rs. 23,194 in 1904, Rs. 25,336 in 1903 and Rs. 23,300 in 1902.

(5) Miscellaneous receipts have steadily risen being Rs. 63,407 in 1904, compared with Rs. 51,941 in 1903 and Rs. 49,534 in 1902.

(b) *Expenditure*.—The total expenditure of hospitals and dispensaries amounted to Rs. 18,24,967 in 1904, Rs. 16,32,532 in 1903 and Rs. 15,32,532 in 1902. The increase during the year 1904 was chiefly due to the increased outlay on buildings, establishments and medicines.

(1) *Establishment*.—The expenditure under the head of salaries of medical officers and subordinates amounted to Rs. 8,53,353 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 8,13,250 in 1903 and Rs. 8,36,463 in 1902, showing an increase of Rs. 40,103 in 1904 over the preceding year. This increase was due to the promotion of Medical officers and subordinates to higher grades, appointment of Military

Assistant Surgeons to certain charges in place of Civil Assistant Surgeons and Civil Apothecaries, reorganization of subordinate medical department in accordance with G.O., No. 644, Public, dated 1st August 1904, opening of new hospitals and dispensaries in the districts and to the inclusion of contribution paid by Local Boards and Municipalities to certain private institutions.

(2) *Buildings*.—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 2,81,496 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 1,84,916 in 1903 and Rs. 91,310 in 1902, showing a marked increase in the years 1903 and 1904, chiefly due to the fitting up of the electric plant in the General Hospital and construction of new buildings both in the city hospitals and in the districts.

(3) *European and Bazaar Medicines*.—The expenditure under "European Medicines" amounted to Rs. 2,75,770 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 2,21,492 in 1903 and Rs. 1,97,641 in 1902. The increase during the years 1903 and 1904 was due to the supply of European medicines and surgical appliances to the new hospitals and dispensaries opened during these years. The cost of bazaar medicines amounted to Rs. 18,274 in 1904, Rs. 19,079 in 1903 and Rs. 20,468 in 1902.

(4) *Diet*.—The amount spent under this heading amounted to Rs. 1,78,196 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 1,67,499 in 1903 and Rs. 1,75,870 in 1902. The increase during the year 1904 was due to higher rates paid for food-grains and to some extent to the more liberal use of "extras" in serious cases.

(5) *Miscellaneous Receipts*.—The charges under this head amounted to Rs. 63,407 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 51,941 in 1903 and Rs. 40,585 in 1902. The increase during the years 1903 and 1904 was due to the purchase of bedding and clothing, furniture and other requisites of hospitals and dispensaries.

(6) *Cost per Patient*.—The average cost per patient was As. 4-9 during the year 1904 compared with As. 4-2 in 1903 and As. 4-7 in 1902.

(7) *Invested Capital*.—In the year 1904 the total amount of invested capital was Rs. 5,79,538-4-7, or Rs. 5,73,509-7-9 cash balance and Rs. 6,028-12-10 invested during the year. Out of the total capital Rs. 61,042-0-9 was withdrawn during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 5,18,496-3-10 at the close of the year as compared with Rs. 5,73,235-13-4 in 1903 and Rs. 5,79,397-5-10 in 1902.

14. *Construction of Buildings*.—The most important new works carried out during the last three years were as follows:—

(a) *In the Presidency Town of Madras*.—At the General Hospital, the installation of electric plant for lighting, pumping water and pulling punkahs was commenced during 1903 and completed in 1904 at a cost of Rs. 1,02,800. In the matter of the lighting especially this constituted a very great improvement on the pre-existing system of bad illumination by kerosine oil.

The erection of quarters for a Second Resident Medical Officer, the construction of a dark room for X ray and other work and a chemical laboratory, which were commenced in the previous triennial period were completed in 1904 at a cost of Rs. 17,600.

At the Maternity Hospital a new operating theatre, hot-water apparatus and new quarters for the Resident Medical Officer were constructed at a cost of Rs. 8,000.

At the Leper Hospital the erection of a new female ward with an upper storey was completed at a cost of Rs. 16,000.

(b) *In the mofussil districts*.—Very marked improvements in a number of hospitals were undertaken in the triennial period under report and in the last year thereof a very liberal and welcome grant of over a lakh and-a-half of rupees was made by Government for the following purposes:—

To constructing new Municipal Hospitals at Coimbatore and Bellary Rs. 60,000 and Rs. 50,000 respectively; for a new women and children's hospital at Dindigul Rs. 16,000; for repairs and extensions of the Nellore Hospital

Rs. 20,000; for addition to the Nandyal Hospital Rs. 6,500. In Madura the sum of Rs. 45,900 was spent in 1904 towards the construction on the pavilion system of a hospital of eighty beds. Similarly in Bezwada a new hospital on the standard plan replaced the dilapidated buildings that were a disgrace to this rapidly growing centre of railway and canal traffic.

In Srivilliputtur a new hospital was built and the dispensary at Chatrapur was converted into a hospital by the erection of wards for in-patients.

In Calicut and Bellary new hospitals solely for women and children were erected, while Lying-in wards were added to the hospitals at Chingleput, Mangalore, Gúdalur and Tuticorin. Wards were also added to the hospitals at Cochin and Ootacamund, Vizagapatam, Chódavaram and Párvatipuram. Dispensary buildings were constructed in Padwa, Répalle, Gurzala, Guntúr, Puttúr, Madurántakam, Titagudi, Vetekerampudur, Papanasam, Nelakotai, Kanniwadi, Andipatti, Udipi, Ponnáni and Kulitalai. Marked attention has been paid by Medical Officers generally to the perfecting—as far as the means at their disposal would allow—both of the surgical equipment and of the operation rooms of the hospitals under their charges and I am glad to note that in not a few of the District Head-quarter Hospitals it is now possible for operative procedures to be carried out on the recognized lines of modern Aseptic Surgery. Attention has also been paid to such structural alterations in the buildings as will permit of the due separation of the sexes during the attendance of the patients at the hospitals.

I have much pleasure in putting on record my appreciation of the philanthropic efforts made by many private donors to increase the utility of the hospitals by their generous gifts of both time and money and in this connection the hospitals at Ootacamund and Coonoor have been specially fortunate in the help afforded them by their Ladies' Committees. Cochin hospital has also been fortunate in obtaining extra wards and equipment from gifts made by liberal residents in that district. It is pleasant also to note that in many places "Jubilee", "Coronation" and "Victoria Memorial" Funds were utilised towards the upkeep of hospitals or dispensaries.

15. *Establishment*.—With reference to G.O., No. 633, Public, dated 28th July 1904, four 3rd-grade Hospital Assistants at Repalli (Guntúr), Kangayam and Vetekerampudur (Coimbatore) and Teruvattur (North Arcot) were replaced by men of higher grades during the three months ending 31st December 1904.

16. *Quinine*.—14,478 packets of quinine were sold to the public by the Postal authorities in 1902 as compared with 18,405 in 1903 and 20,532 in 1904, realising the sum of Rs. 14,171-15-2, Rs. 18,092-15-0 and Rs. 20,110-6-0 in the three years respectively and showing a marked increase in the sale during the triennium.

17. *Inspections*.—I inspected all the medical institutions in the City of Madras and the hospitals and dispensaries at the head-quarters of the districts of Ganjam, Vizagapatam, Gódavari, Kistna, Guntúr, Nellore, Kurnool, Bellary, Anantapur, Coimbatore, Tanjore, Malabar and Nilgiris: as also the hospitals at Chatrapur, Cocanada, Bezwada, Nandyal, Cumbum, Ongole, Cannanore, Telli-cherry, Cochin, Palghat, Calicut and Coonoor.

18. *Stock and Service Registers*.—The inventories of valuable stock have been checked and found correct, the service registers have all been duly verified.

General Remarks.—It is gratifying to note that there continued to be a large amount of excellent operative work performed at the chief hospitals in Madras; at the Government Maternity Hospital 67 abdominal sections including 18 ovariectomies were performed by Lieutenant-Colonel A. J. Sturmer, I.M.S., and 647 extraction of lens and 123 iridectomies by Major R. H. Elliot, I.M.S., at the Ophthalmic Hospital. In the Government General Hospital 637 operations were performed by Major G. G. Giffard, I.M.S., and 768 by Captain W. J. Niblock, I.M.S.; while in the mofussil a large number of operations was done by Lieutenant-Colonel W. F. Thomas, I.M.S., at Trichinopoly; by Lieutenant-Colonel H. M. Hakim, I.M.S., at Tanjore; by Major C. L. Williams, I.M.S., at Coimbatore; by Major

W. C. Vickers, I.M.S., at Vizagapatam; and Captain C. B. Harrison, I.M.S., at Madura.

During the triennium a Bacteriological section was organized, and investigating Laboratories and a dark room fully equipped with X ray apparatus were constructed in the General Hospital, Madras, and there is promise of satisfactory results accruing from the investigations now possible.

CLASSES I AND II.—These include all institutions maintained by provincial funds and under Government management. The fact that an institution possesses endowments or receives contributions from local funds or private subscriptions should not be regarded as a reason for not classing it as 'State' so long as provincial and imperial funds are practically responsible for all the charges connected with it. Class I—'Public' are State dispensaries which are open to the poorer classes of the public. Class II are State dispensaries which serve only a special section of the public as indicated in the sub-classification attached.

CLASS III.—Local fund dispensaries include all institutions which are vested in local Boards or municipalities or guaranteed or maintained by local or municipal funds. The fact that such an institution is aided by private subscriptions, or receives assistance from Government in the shape of part of the salary of the medical officer, grants of medicine, or otherwise, should not be regarded as a reason for not classing it as a local fund dispensary so long as its existence is practically dependent upon local funds.

CLASS IV.—Comprises institutions supported by private subscriptions or guarantee, but receiving aid from Government or local funds.

CLASS V.—Comprises institutions maintained entirely at the cost of private individuals or associations. The fact that Government supplies superior inspection or registers should not be regarded as a reason for not treating it as a private non-aided dispensary.

CLASS VI.—Comprises all railway dispensaries whether maintained by State railways or others.

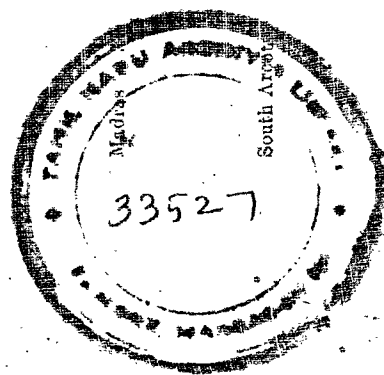

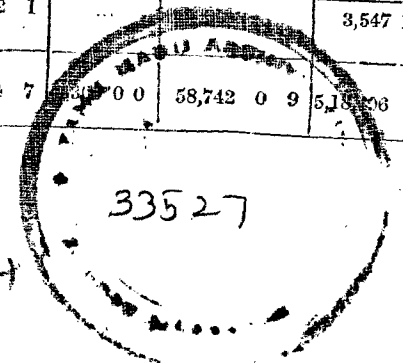

The Surgeon-General submits the report on the working of the Civil Medical Institutions in the Presidency of Madras for the triennial period ending 31st December 1904. The statements incorporated in the report have been revised in accordance with the instructions issued by the Government of India in their resolution N 678-86, dated 16th July 1904, with the exception that it has not been possible to carry out in this report the differentiation of the sexes among children.

2. Public health in the districts, judged by mortality, was not satisfactory during the triennium. There was a general and large increase in deaths in 1904 compared with 1902 and but little abatement thereof in 1904 throughout the districts. In the city of Madras the number of deaths from fever steadily decreased. The cause of the decrease is at present obscure, but it is anticipated that the investigation into the causation of malaria in the town and suburbs of Madras now being undertaken may throw some light on the matter.

3. There was a distinct increase in the fatality of plague and the area over which it spread. Cholera and small-pox have both diminished in severity during the triennium, the latter disease to a very material extent.

4. At the beginning of the year 1902, there were in the Presidency 479 Civil Medical hospitals and 121 Police, Railway and private non-aided institutions, in all 600, with accommodation of 5,383 beds. At the close of 1904 there were 600 medical institutions with 5,619 beds, totals which compare favourably with those of other provinces. During the triennium considerable improvements and additions were made in the hospital accommodation in some of the most important municipalities. The expenditure under buildings having been in 1902, Rs. 91,310, in 1903, Rs. 1,84,916, and in 1904 as much as Rs. 2,84,496.

Of the total number of medical institutions, 251 are hospitals and 381 dispensaries, in all divided into six classes. Classes I and II, 20 and 48 in number respectively, are entirely supported by Government. Forty-four of class II are sub-stations of Police hospitals. Class III, 449 in number, are mainly supported by Local Municipal funds. Class IV, 24 in number, are chiefly supported by private subscriptions, but are also aided by either State, Local or Municipal funds. In classes V and VI there are 34 private non-aided and 57 Railway institutions maintained under the management either of private associations or of Railway Companies. There is not therefore, in the Presidency one medical institution to every 224 square miles of country and to every 60,510 inhabitants. With this increase there was a correspondingly gratifying increase in the number of patients treated during the triennium.

In 1902, 13.34 per cent. of the population were admitted into the medical institutions of the Presidency, increasing to 13.97 per cent. in 1903 and to 14.71 per cent. in 1904, i.e., 5,624,226 patients were treated in 1904.

Of this latter number 60,449 were in-patients and 5,150,892 out-patients excluding the 412,885 cases treated in the hospitals and dispensaries of classes II, V and VI of which full particulars are not available.

A noticeable feature in the returns is the fall in the percentage of mortality amongst cases treated in 1902, the mortality being 7.02 per cent. in 1903, 6.25 per cent. in 1904. The corresponding percentages of cures and discharges were 83.32, 90.32 and 89.71.

5. The Government observe with pleasure that the clinical instruction of medical students in the Presidency studying both for the higher grades of the profession at the Medical College as well as for the lower grade of hospital assistant at the medical schools continued to be efficiently carried out at the various hospitals of the Presidency city and at the hospitals in Vizagapatam and Tanjore.

Such work must constitute the groundwork of the knowledge of students and such is of the first importance.

6. The Surgeon-General reports that the class of persons applying for training as nurses at the General Hospital, Madras, continues to improve, and there is no lack of candidates. The Government believe that even with the increased number of 190

is a large outside demand for skilled nurses which the present somewhat only does not adequately meet. Steps will probably be taken to increase the number both of the nursing staff and of the paid probationers. The outturn of trained midwives continues to be a satisfactory feature of the work of the Government Maternity Hospital, Madras.

The Government note with satisfaction that in many of the district head-quarters hospitals operations can now be performed under the recognised necessity of modern aseptic surgery: the attention of District Medical and Sanitary Officers generally having been devoted in a marked degree to the perfecting as far as possible of the surgical equipment and operation rooms of the hospitals under their charge.

An improvement is especially desirable in a country where the conditions and the people are for the most part insanitary.

There was a considerable increase in the sales of quinine during the triennial period, the figures being in 1902, 14,478 packets, value Rs. 11,171, in 1903, 18,405, value Rs. 18,092, and in 1904, 20,532, value Rs. 20,110.

The total income of hospitals and dispensaries under the control of Government for 1904 exclusive of the cash balance (Rs. 14,901) in hand at the beginning of the year was Rs. 18,26,610 as compared with Rs. 16,29,669 in 1903 and Rs. 15,30,612 in 1902.

The corresponding expenditure was Rs. 18,24,967 in 1904, Rs. 16,32,532 in 1903, and Rs. 15,32,532 in 1902.

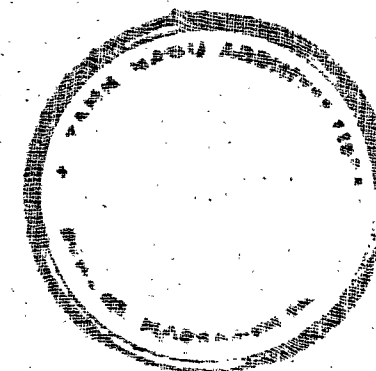
Subscriptions from natives amounted to Rs. 29,424 in 1904 as compared with Rs. 26,444 in 1903 and Rs. 20,823 in 1902.

The increase, though the total subscriptions are still much smaller than could be desired, seems to indicate a growing friendliness of attitude towards the medical services on the part of the people. Taken in conjunction with the increased efficiency during the triennium under review, Government consider that the utility of the medical institutions is yearly growing, a fact due no doubt chiefly to the gradually spreading knowledge of their utility amongst the lower classes.

The Government are glad to note the large amount of inspection work done by the Surgeon-General during the year, and the good operative work done by the officers mentioned by him.
