PREFACE.

THE Lawrence Asylum at Ootacamund was founded during 1858 in honour of the memory of Sir Henry Lawrence, K.C.B., by whom the establishment at some Hill Station, within the Madras Presidency, of an Institution similar to the Lawrence Asylum at Sanawar, had been suggested.

The Asylum at Ootacamund was managed by a Committee of gentlemen residing at that place, and was supported by donations and subscriptions from the general public; but as these proved inadequate to its maintenance, it was adopted by Government in 1860, and allowed a Grant-in-Aid.

The Madras Military Male Orphan Asylum and the Madras Female Orphan Asylum were amalgamated with the Lawrence Asylum, the former on the 1st September 1871, and the latter on the 1st October 1904, the united Asylums being designated the Ootacamund Lawrence Asylum.

The Lawrence Asylum is situated at Lovedale, 3 miles from Ootacamund, on the summit and centre of the Nilgiri Hills in the South of India, within the Presidency of Madras. It lies between the 11th and 12th degrees of North Latitude, and the 76th and 77th degrees of East Longitude, on the confines of the Provinces of Coimbatore and Malabar, at an elevation of 7,330 feet above the mean level of the sea, being 3,312 feet below Dodabetta, and 103 feet above the lake at Ootacamund, and 1,470 feet above the Barracks at Wellington. The mean annual temperature of the air at Lovedale is 58°; the mean maximum is 68°; the mean minimum is 48°; the mean annual range 16°. On or near the ground, however, water freezes nearly every night for three months in the year.

The school buildings and grounds cover 730.76 acres.

6. Changes in the staff.—The death of Mr. A. C. D'Rozario, on the 1st of August last, caused a vacancy in the teaching staff. The teachers below him having been promoted the vacancy for a teacher for the last class in the Upper Primary Department has been filled by Miss Murray who has passed the Higher Examination for Women.

Junior Sergeants Newman and Fenner having left, their places have been filled by Sergeants Lines and Light on the Pension Establishment.

7. Telegraph Class.—The Examination will take place in next March.

The Instructor Mr. S. Atkinson resigned his appointment in November last and the Director-General of Telegraphs has been addressed to nominate a successor to him.

8. The Sixth Form opened in 1904 with four boys. Three entered the Government Telegraph Department during the year and one appeared for the Upper Secondary Examination last December.

10. Examinations—

Lower Secondary.—Seventeen boys appeared for the Complete test of whom thirteen passed; five were sent up for the Compulsory Subjects only and two passed; and the three who were sent up for two optional subjects passed.

Typewriting, Elementary.—Six appeared and three passed.

Shorthand, Elementary.—Three appeared but none passed.

Drawing, Elementary.—Eleven appeared and eight passed with one in the First Class.

Drawing, Intermediate.—

Geometrical.—Two appeared and one passed.

Free-Hand Outline.—One appeared and passed.

11. Library and Museum.—There were 410 volumes in the Library at the beginning of the year, since then 63 volumes and 30 pamphlets were added making in all 503 at the close of the year.

12. Volunteers.—The Cadet Corps numbered 170 at the close of the year.

13. The Medical Officer's report is annexed and shows an average daily sick of 8.22 against 8.21 in last year.

14. The Plunge Bath and Lavatories were completed during the year. The Public Works Department carries out, as usual, the annual color and white washing and petty repairs. It was pointed out in last Annual Report that the allowance of Rs. 100 a month for the work was insufficient and it is again urged that the amount should be doubled.

The net result is Rs. 1,05,577-4-8 which divided by 294, the average number for the year, gives Rs. 359-1-8 as the average cost.

*Annual Medical Report of the Boys' School, Ootacamund
Lawrence Asylum, for the year ending the
31st December, 1904.*

The average strength of the boys in the school during the year was 294. The year under report has been a fairly healthy one. There were 701 in and out-door patients treated giving an average daily sick of 8-22. There were no deaths.

Epidemics.—There was a slight outbreak of influenza in the month of May from which there were 63 admissions. There were no complications and all made a speedy recovery.

Sanitation—Water-supply.—Ample and good.

Lavatories and Plunge Bath.—The arrangements are good and meet all demands.

Latrines.—These are kept clean. It is in contemplation to improve the building and to replace the seats with buckets by sanitary commodes. A latrine in each of the servants' lines is much needed.

Washing.—This is carried out by contract and has been very satisfactory. The dhoby lines are regularly inspected.

Dietary.—Sufficient and good. The food is cooked in a variety of ways to suit the tastes of the children.

Gymnastics and Exercise.—These are regularly attended to under competent supervision and contribute much to the health and general physique of the boys. There are about 170 cadets using the carbine.

Hospital.—This is repaired annually by the P. W. D. and oftener when necessary. The furniture and fittings are ample. An infectious ward is much needed. Mrs. Forkgen who had been the matron for the past three and a half years and given every satisfaction, took over the new hospital for the girls on the 1st October and Mrs. Brotherstone was appointed in her place. The latter has also given every satisfaction during the short time she has been here.

Vaccination.—47 boys were re-vaccinated during the year with lanoline paste, 39 were successful and 8 unsuccessful.

Annual Medical Report of the Girls' School, Ootacamund Lawrence Asylum, for the year ending the 31st December, 1904.

The average strength of the girls during the year was 84. On the 1st October the Military Female Orphan Asylum, Madras, was amalgamated with the Ootacamund Lawrence Asylum and the strength of the Girls' School which was 65 in previous years was increased to 135. The year under report has been a healthy one, there were 27 admissions into hospital giving an average daily sick of 2.25. The majority of sick being from the new arrivals. There were no deaths.

Sanitation—Water supply.—Ample and good.

Lavatories.—The whole place has been re-built and greatly enlarged to afford bathing accommodation to the increased number of girls, which is very satisfactory.

Latrines.—The seats with buckets have been replaced by enamelled sanitary commodes which is a great improvement.

Dietary.—Sufficient and good.

Exercise.—Various forms of light exercise are practised under competent supervision.

Vaccination.—17 girls were re-vaccinated during the year, 14 were successful and 3 unsuccessful.

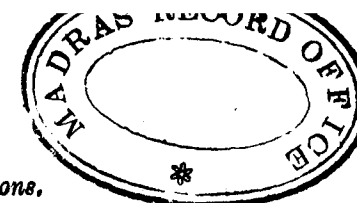

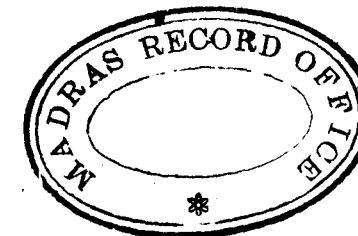

Rules regulating the Constitution and Working of the Lawrence Asylum, Ootacamund.

Fort St. George, December 22, 1900.

No. 4—1. The following code of rules relating to the constitution and working of the Lawrence Asylum, Ootacamund, has been sanctioned by Government, and shall have effect from 1st January 1901.

In these rules the term "Eurasian" shall be restricted to the children of European fathers by Eurasian or native mothers, and of Eurasian fathers and mothers of whom both are the children of Europeans.

OBJECT.

2. The object of the institution, which shall consist of a male and a female branch, is to secure for European and Eurasian children of the classes specified in rule 39 a healthy and invigorating climate, to remove them from objectionable surroundings, to afford them secular and religious education, and to train them to earn a livelihood.

CONTROL.

3. The management of the asylum shall be vested in a committee, consisting of the Brigadier-General Commanding the southern district as *ex-officio* chairman, the Collector of the Nilgiris as *ex-officio* vice-chairman, the Assistant Adjutant-General, the Assistant Quartermaster-General, the senior medical officer at Ootacamund, and the Commandant of the dépôt at Wellington, as official members, and three non-official members resident at Ootacamund and elected by the committee. The committee shall be directly responsible to Government for the administration of the asylum, and shall carry out all the orders of Government relating thereto. The Principal shall ordinarily be the secretary to the committee; but if the Principal be not a clergyman of the Church of England, a clergyman of that Church shall be appointed as chaplain, and the committee may empower the latter to perform the duties of secretary, and, with the sanction of Government, fix his remuneration as chaplain and secretary and define his duties in relation to those of the Principal.

4. A meeting of the committee shall be held every month for the transaction of business. Three members shall form a quorum. In the absence of the chairman and the vice-chairman, the committee shall elect its own chairman.

5. Any three members shall have the power of convening an extraordinary meeting on giving the chairman, or, in his absence, the vice-chairman, through the secretary, one week's notice.

6. A non-official member may at any time resign by giving notice, in writing, to the chairman, or, in his absence, the vice-chairman, through the secretary. He shall also be held to have vacated his appointment if he ceases for a period of three consecutive months to reside at Ootacamund, or if he fails to attend three consecutive meetings of the committee. The committee shall supply any vacancy which occurs and report the appointment to Government.

7. The chairman, or, in his absence, the vice-chairman, shall have power to defer declaring a resolution to have been carried, until he shall have obtained in writing the opinion, on the point at issue, of members who may have been absent from the meeting.

8. All letters to Government shall be passed by the committee and shall be signed by the chairman or the vice-chairman, or, during the absence of both from head-quarters, by the secretary for the chairman, and shall be submitted through the Director of Public Instruction.

9. The committee shall, at each monthly meeting, appoint two of their members to visit the institution during the ensuing month. These shall record any remarks they may have to make in a book provided for that purpose. The book shall be laid on the table at each monthly meeting.

10. The committee shall elect six ladies resident in Ootacamund as visitors, two of whom shall be appointed at each monthly meeting to visit the female branch during the ensuing month. These shall record any remarks they may have to make in a book provided for that purpose. This book shall be laid on the table at each monthly meeting.

STAFF.

11. The Principal shall be appointed by Government on the nomination of the committee, to which he shall be directly responsible and subordinate. All other appointments shall be made by the Principal, subject to the confirmation of the committee. The approval of the inspector or the inspectress, as the case may be, shall be obtained before the appointments of teachers are confirmed.

12. The Principal, besides possessing suitable educational and administrative qualifications, shall be a member of the Church of England and a clergyman. If, however, at any time, a duly qualified clergyman is not available, a military officer, who is a member of the Church of England, may be appointed.

13. Government may dispense with the services of the Principal at any time on giving him six months' notice or six months' salary in lieu of notice. Before resigning his appointment, the Principal shall give six months' notice, unless a shorter notice be accepted by Government.

14. The Principal shall perform such duties as may be enjoined on him by the committee. He shall be responsible for the moral and intellectual

training of the pupils. If a clergyman, he shall have pastoral charge of the institution. He shall be the executive officer of the committee and shall be held responsible for the accounts; and he shall make all necessary disbursements, subject to the provisions of rule 62. He shall communicate with the chairman, or, in his absence, with the vice-chairman, either directly or through the secretary, if there be a separate secretary, on all important matters which cannot be conveniently postponed to the next meeting of the committee and shall generally be immediately subordinate to the chairman or vice-chairman as representing the committee.

15. The Principal or the chaplain specially appointed by the committee under rule 3 shall, besides performing all such religious services as he may be required to perform by the committee with the sanction of Government, give religious catechetical instruction to all the pupils, except such as are exempted by these rules.

16. The headmaster shall superintend the tuition in the male branch, and take such part in the teaching as the Principal may direct.

17. The headmistress shall superintend the tuition in the female branch, and take such part in the teaching as the Principal may direct. She shall also be responsible for the moral and intellectual training of the girls, who shall be subject to her control, both in and out of school.

18. The assistant teachers in the male branch shall be under the immediate direction of the headmaster, subject to the general authority of the Principal.

19. The assistant teachers in the female branch shall be under the immediate direction of the headmistress, and shall assist her both in and out of school, subject to the general authority of the Principal.

20. The domestic arrangements of the male branch shall be under the control of the Principal. Those of the female branch shall, subject to the approval of the Principal, be carried out by a matron subordinate to the headmistress. The matron shall instruct the girls in the duties of housewifery and be present at their meals. In her absence, the headmistress or one of the assistant mistresses shall be present at meals.

ACCOMMODATION, FURNITURE AND APPLIANCES.

21. The institution shall be provided with such accommodation, furniture and appliances as the committee may consider necessary and as are prescribed by the Madras educational rules to be necessary for efficient instruction. The advice of the senior medical officer shall be obtained in medical and sanitary matters.

COURSES OF INSTRUCTION.

22. *Instruction in literary subjects.*—The courses of instruction prescribed in the educational rules shall be followed. In the male branch

instruction shall be given up to the standard of the upper secondary, and in the female branch up to that of the lower secondary, examination. All boys shall be taught up to the lower secondary standard and shall receive manual training by means of wood-work, or metal or other work, in accordance with a scheme to be approved of by the Director of Public Instruction. On passing the lower secondary examination, such of the boys of good and approved character as are bright and possess literary tastes shall be taken on the upper secondary course.

23. *Instruction in technical subjects.*—In the male branch instruction shall be given in drawing, in music, in commercial correspondence and in shorthand or type-writing up to the standard of the intermediate technical examination, and in telegraphy up to the standard required for the telegraph department. Boys who are selected to enter on the upper secondary course, shall be taught, in addition to drawing, two other optional subjects, in lieu of a second language as prescribed for the upper secondary examination. Other boys, after passing the lower secondary examination, will be taught telegraphy or music, or be prepared for the civil and military medical entrance examinations or for the examination of Inspectors' assistants for the Madras and other railways.

24. *Instruction in religion.*—The work of the day shall commence with religious teaching. The authorized version of the Bible shall be used, and the main truths of Christianity shall be taught without allusion to controverted points of faith and practice. The children of the Roman Catholic faith shall not be compelled to receive religious instruction from other than a clergyman or layman of their own faith. At the time when religious instruction is given in school, clergymen of the Church of Rome, or ministers of the Church of Scotland or other Presbyterian church or of a nonconformist body, may, on giving previous notice to the Principal, attend and give instruction to the children of their respective communions in a place set apart for that purpose.

DIVINE SERVICE.

25. Divine service, in accordance with the rites of the Church of England, shall be performed twice on each Sunday.

26. On the application of a clergyman of the Church of Rome, or a minister of the Church of Scotland, or other Presbyterian church or nonconformist body, requesting permission to perform divine service on a Sunday, with such of the pupils or officers of the institution as are members of his communion, a place shall be set apart for the purpose. Such applications, however, shall be made to the Principal on or before the previous Saturday. The children of the Roman Catholic faith shall not be compelled to attend divine service conducted otherwise than in accordance with the rites of the Church of Rome.

27. The pupils shall be assembled daily, morning and evening, when the sanctioned form of prayer shall be read by the Principal or by such officer as he may appoint, subject to the condition in the preceding rule.

28. Clergymen of the Church of Rome, and ministers of the Church of Scotland or other Presbyterian church, or of a nonconformist body, shall have free access to the sick of their respective communions in the hospital on giving notice to the Principal.

STANDARDS AND CLASSES.

29. *General education and technical classes.*—The scheme of standards or classes shall correspond with that prescribed in the educational rules and the Government technical examination notification.

30. *Telegraph class.*—The telegraph class shall contain pupils preparing for the test examination of the telegraph department.

31. *Special class.*—Special classes may be held for pupils preparing for the medical and railway examinations.

STRENGTH.

32. The maximum strength, exclusive of day scholars, of the male branch, shall be 300, and of the female branch, 65. There shall be no limits to the strength of any particular class, except such as are laid down in chapter III of the educational rules.

ADMISSIONS AND WITHDRAWALS.

33. Applications for admission shall be made through officers commanding regiments, or the heads of the departments to which the parents or guardians belong; and, in the case of pensioners, through their paymasters or employers. In other cases applications shall be made through any person of known respectability. All applications shall be addressed to the secretary, who shall furnish printed forms of application and descriptive rolls to be filled up. The baptismal certificate of the candidate shall also be required, with the last-pay certificate, if he is in receipt of a Government allowance; also a leaving certificate if the candidate had attended a recognized school. Application forms shall contain a provision to the effect that, on withdrawing a pupil, the parent or guardian shall state his reason for doing so.

34. No candidate shall be admitted under five, nor above twelve, years of age, except in special cases to be decided by the committee.

35. The secretary, in announcing to the parent or guardian the election of a candidate, shall fix a reasonable time for the candidate to join. If the candidate does not join within the period fixed, the fact shall be reported to the committee.

36. On any boy attaining the age of sixteen (or eighteen in the case of boys allowed to enter on their upper secondary course) or any girl that of eighteen, the Principal shall report the circumstances to the committee, and the committee shall call upon the parent or guardian to remove the pupil. In the event of such pupil having neither parent nor guardian, the committee shall take such measures as may seem best for the pupil's settlement in life. This rule, however, shall not prevent the committee from accepting any suitable situation for a girl who shall have attained the age of sixteen years.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR ADMISSION.

37. The legitimate children of Europeans and Eurasians, being officers or soldiers of Her Majesty's British and Indian military and marine services, or persons employed in the military and civil medical services, or effective volunteers, or civilians whether connected with the public service or not, shall be eligible for admission. The cases of illegitimate orphan children shall be dealt with specially by the committee.

38. Children labouring under any form of disease, mental or physical, which is likely to incapacitate them for the ordinary duties of life, and, except with the special sanction of the committee, the children of soldiers who have been dismissed the service by sentence of court-martial, shall not be admitted.

SELECTION OF PUPILS.

39. The following is the order in which claims for admission shall be considered :—

- (1) The orphan children of fathers who have been killed in action, or have died on service, preference being given to children of pure European parentage.
- (2) Orphan children of European commissioned officers and of civil medical officers, if left destitute.
- (3) Orphan children of European officers and soldiers, and of Europeans in the marine and medical services, preference being given to those who have lost both parents.
- (4) Orphan children of Eurasian officers and soldiers, and of Eurasians in the medical service, preference being given to those who have lost both parents.
- (5) Children of any of the above whose fathers are living, preference being given to children of European fathers.
- (6) Children of European or Eurasian officers and soldiers, and of Europeans or Eurasians in the medical service, transferred to the invalid or pension establishments, preference being given to the children of European fathers.
- (7) Orphan children of volunteers, who at the time of their death were borne on the rolls.

- (8) Orphan children of civilians, connected or unconnected with the public service, one of whose parents is or was of pure European descent, and who are destitute.
- (9) Children of volunteers who are living and who have had seven years' effective service.
- (10) Children of civilians, not being orphans and destitute.
40. Donors of Rs. 300, or subscribers of Rs. 50 per annum for four years, shall have the right to nominate one pupil, who shall take precedence over the other candidates belonging to the same class.

FEES.

41. The children of soldiers of the rank of corporal or private, or of pensioners who are drawing only the pay of those ranks, shall be admitted free of charge.
42. Children whose fathers or step-fathers are above the rank of corporal shall be charged for according to the following scale, except under extraordinary circumstances, when the power of exemption from or reduction of payment shall be exercised by the committee:—

43. Children of Europeans and Eurasians in the marine and medical services and of volunteers shall be admitted on payment of fees according to the above scale in proportion to the salary drawn by the father or step-father.

44. The children of civilians, not being orphan and destitute, may be admitted on payment of Rs. 20 per mensem for a child under 12 years of age, and Rs. 25 per mensem for a child above 12 years of age: Provided that such children shall only be admitted if vacancies exist, which no eligible children belonging to the classes specified in rule 39 are available to fill.

45. The children of members of the Staff and Establishment shall be admitted to the classes as Day scholars without payment of any fee.

REGISTERS.

60. In addition to a time-table and a log-book, the following registers shall be kept in accordance with the educational rules:—

- (1) A register of admissions and withdrawals for each class.
- (2) A monthly register of attendance and fees.
- (3) An acquittance roll.
- (4) A library catalogue and register.
- (5) A register of drill and gymnastics.
- (6) A register of corporal punishments.
- (7) A register of scholarships.
- (8) A history of former pupils.

ACCOUNTS.

61. The committee shall, not later than the 15th February in each year, submit in print, for the sanction of the Governor in Council, a budget for the ensuing official year. Such budget shall be drawn up in the form prescribed by Government.

62. The committee shall see that the expenditure of the year is in accordance with the budget as sanctioned by Government. When any important variations in the allotments are necessary, the committee shall obtain the sanction of Government for such change. The committee shall appoint a finance sub-committee of two members to scrutinize the accounts and to pass, pending the sanction of Government, such charges as are urgent and unforeseen and for which no allotment has been made in the budget.

63. All moneys belonging to the institution shall be lodged with the Bank of Madras in the names of the chairman and vice-chairman, one of whom, or, in the absence of both of them, the Assistant Adjutant-General Madras Command, shall countersign all drafts thereon which are signed by the Principal. The committee shall invest all surplus income, after providing a sufficient cash balance, in Government securities or in the Post Office in the names of the trustees appointed by Government, viz., the Director of Public Instruction and the Collector of the Nilgiris.

64. The accounts shall be audited each year by a superior officer of the account department.

ANNUAL REPORT.

65. The committee shall, not later than the 31st August of each year, submit to Government, through the Director of Public Instruction, a report upon the condition and progress of the asylum during the preceding official year, the following documents forming appendices thereto:—

- (a) A statement of accounts, in which the actual expenditure under each head shall be compared with the budget provision.

- (b) Extracts from the reports of inspecting officers and special examiners.
- (c) A statement showing the history of former pupils.

MISCELLANEOUS.

66. The Lieutenant-General Commanding the Forces in Madras and the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Madras shall be *ex-officio* patrons of the institution, and shall be at liberty to visit the asylum at any time and to refer to the committee, or to the Government, any matter they may consider demanding attention.

67. The senior medical officer at Ootacamund shall be in medical charge of the asylum, and shall visit the institution at least once a week and whenever it is necessary.

68. This code, with such alterations as may have been made during the preceding twelve months, shall be published annually in the Lawrence Asylum Press Almanac, and copies of it shall be sent to the Commanding Officers of the regiments and batteries serving in the Madras Presidency.

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
