

ADMINISTRATION REPORT
OF THE
BANGANAPALLE STATE
FOR THE YEAR 1911-1912.

The Banganapalle State is situated in the south of the Kurnool district. It has an area of 275 square miles with a population of about forty thousand, distributed among 60 villages. The chief town—Banganapalle—having a population of 5,731 is centrally situated and it is 17 miles from Panem, a station on the Guntakal-Bezawada section of the Southern Mahratta Railway. The gross annual revenue of the State including all heads is nearly three lakhs of rupees.

2. Its ruler Nawab Mir Ghulam-i-Ali Khan Bahadur is 37 years of age and he is a Muhammadan of the Shiah sect. He administers the State assisted by the officers shown in Appendix XXIII.

3. The important event of the year was the Coronation of THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES, KING GEORGE V AND QUEEN MARY, both in London and at Delhi.

4. The 22nd June 1911 was a public holiday by order of the Nawab and it was observed as a day of general rejoicing throughout the State. In the town of Banganapalle all officials and the principal inhabitants assembled at the public offices where the Nawab explained to the people the benefits of British rule and British protection. The assembly dispersed after witnessing sports, illuminations and fire works.

5. In the month of December 1911, in honour of the arrival and Coronation at Delhi of THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES, the Nawab had ordered from 7th to 12th December 1911, both days inclusive, to be observed as holidays throughout the State. To commemorate the celebration of the Imperial Durbar, held at Delhi on the 12th December 1911, one hundred nickel medallions were distributed among school boys of the State. The sentences of several prisoners were reduced and one short term prisoner was released. For the celebration of the Durbar festivities five centres were selected in the State. The Royal Proclamation was read in each centre in the open air at noon in central public places. It was made known by beat of tom-tom in the town and rural tracts that THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES would hold an Imperial Durbar at Delhi on 12th December 1911 and that the occasion would be celebrated both in Banganapalle town and the villages in a befitting manner. The people of all villages celebrated the day by illuminating their houses, display of fire works, etc. Special services were held for offering prayers in all the places of worship throughout the State. The poor were fed and clothed. Owing to the absence of the Nawab and the Dewan at Delhi, the Tahsildar presided over the proceedings.

6. *Nawab's visit to Delhi.*—The occasion of the Coronation of THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES at Delhi, at which the Nawab had the honour of being invited and of taking part in almost all the functions, was of course the most unparalleled event. The mighty concentration of Military forces and of the various services displaying the greatness of the British power in India and the assemblage of the Indian princes with their picturesque camps and retinues, eager to do homage to their suzerain and above all the feelings of affectionate regard for their Indian subjects which prompted THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES to undertake the voyage at great personal inconvenience have stirred the loyalty and affection of the princes and people of India towards their sovereign.

7. At Delhi the Nawab pitched his own camp No. 339 on the Princes Road and was the recipient of a Coronation Medal and a Portrait of THEIR MAJESTIES. Two of the old State officials viz., the Dewan and the Chief Medical Officer were each awarded a Coronation silver medal.

8. There were no changes in the personnel of the officials during the year. The Political Agent Mr. E. S. Lloyd with Mrs. Lloyd visited Banganapalle in July 1911 and on the 12th of that month he held a Durbar to confer the Sanad of "Khan Bahadur" on Nawab's brother, Mir Asad Ali Khan Bahadur, now living in Madras. Speaking on the occasion Mr. Lloyd, with regard to the administration of the State, said, that the State of Banganapalle, though small in area, was of great interest as being the only Muhammadan State in Southern India, and Government watched its affairs with great solicitude and attention. Banganapalle had not been without its trials, but its evil days were past and the State, they all trusted, was entering on an era of contentment and prosperity. This fortunate state of affairs was due in large measures to the efforts of an officer whose name would, he felt sure, be ever treasured in Banganapalle not only with respect but with the deepest affection. He referred of course to Mr. Molony. Mr. Molony had carried out a difficult task with exemplary skill and patience and had done his work in such a way as to endear to him the hearts of all with whom he came in contact. The work of Mr. Molony would, however, have been fruitless had it not been carried on and developed by the Nawab. The Nawab had shown during the last three years that he had the good of his people at heart. He had devoted himself to the dry details of administration with laudable zeal, and aided by the strenuous efforts of his capable Dewan Khaja Akbar Hussain Sahib, had been able to secure most satisfactory results. A perusal of the last Administration Report showed that the balances of the State were increasing year by year, that numerous works of public utility had been undertaken and brought to completion, that affairs were managed with attention to economy and that neither undue parsimony nor wasteful extravagance were allowed to prevail.

9. Mr. Molony visited Banganapalle where he halted from the 27th February up to the 2nd March 1912. He continues to take so much interest in the affairs of Banganapalle which was the field of his strenuous labours for four years from February 1905 to December 1908, that he went round several villages of the State during his stay and his impressions as regards the Nawab's administration of the State are given below in his own words spoken on the occasion of laying the foundation stone of a club building which is named after him and Mrs. Molony to commemorate their services to the State.

"But there is something in the State which is a source of much greater pleasure to me than the mere naming of a building after me. That might be but a vague compliment; although in this case the old friendship between the Nawab and myself makes me sure of the genuine kindness which prompted the act. But what pleases me most is to see the prosperity of the State and the progress that it is making under its present ruler and his Dewan. Here I may claim to speak with knowledge. I know Banganapalle intimately, and few things have struck me more than the improvements effected since I was here. In the town itself the old lanes and alleys, through which a man could hardly squeeze his way, have been swept away, and replaced by broad streets, through many of which a motor can now pass. Most encouraging of all it is to hear that the inhabitants have now begun to appreciate these reforms, and that the stupid old prejudices against light and air have well nigh vanished. I went with the Nawab this morning to Sanjamala. There I found a ginning factory, which employs about 100 men, in work. The owners pointed out to me with satisfaction a State work, the bridging of the Paleru, which they told me, had an extraordinarily beneficial effect on their business, by rendering easy the passage of heavily laden carts, which in the old days frequently stuck fast in the miry bed of the river, and had there to be unloaded, and reloaded when the passage was at last effected, and the following is a solid fact: this ginning factory cost about Rs. 1,50,000 to start, the money was put up by the merchants of Sanjamala; and these people will not risk what is for them an enormous sum, unless satisfied of the stability and justice of the State administration.

Gentlemen, in newspapers, and in the talk of the outside world, one seldom sees or hears the name of the Nawab Sahib. That is, I think, his most striking testimonial. He has stayed with the people, over whom fate has called him to rule, and has devoted himself to their welfare. As we passed along the road to-day, he occasionally stopped people, and enquired from what other part of the country they came. His acquaintance with his own people was such that at the first glance he could tell a stranger. If he lacks the idle notoriety or recognition of the outside world, I think he has won the solid esteem of those who admire a man who does his duty. In this connection, I think, I might mention the name of the Nawab's brother, Khan Bahadur Mir Asad Ali Khan. Instead of living in false and idle dignity as a dependent on his brother's bounty he has essayed to make a place for himself in the business of Madras, and has set an example which may be commended to all."

The net decrease in the year's collections as compared with last year's figures is Rs. 7,350.

12. *Explanations for the decrease.*—Decrease under Land Revenue, Jodi, Quitrent, Miscellaneous and Road Cess is due to poor collections on account of unfavourable character of the season. Besides, the collections of the year under report under Land Revenue, Jodi, Quitrent, Miscellaneous and Road Cess include an outstanding arrear balance of Rs. 1,958, whereas those of the previous year included an arrear balance of Rs. 8,302.

The decrease under "stamps" is due to its being a fluctuating item.

The decrease under "Law and Justice" is due to two bail bonds valued at Rs 900 having been forfeited last year, whereas no such case occurred during the year and there has also been decrease in the sale of unclaimed cattle by Rs. 176 over last year's figures.

The decrease under "Total gain on purchase or sale of securities" may be attributed to the purchase of Promissory Notes at less premium during the year under report.

13. *Explanations for the increase.*—The increase under "Forest" is due to bumper crop of tamarind, Tangedu bark sale and other Minor sources of income.

The increase under "Registration" as compared with last year's figures is trifling and it calls for no remarks.

Sale of last year's accumulated stock of cloths and the resuming of garden cultivation which was suspended last year—the well being in need of repairs—account for the increase under Jail manufactures.

The amount invested in Government Promissory notes up to last year was Rs. 1,52,430. During the year under report a sum of Rs. 50,000 was invested. The interest on this amount proportionately increased.

The increase under "Cattle Breeding" is due to the arrears of sale proceeds, remaining uncollected last year, having been collected.

The receipts on account of Technical School account for the increase under "Miscellaneous". A sum of Rs. 741 was realized against Rs. 297 of last year.

The net increase in the expenditure as compared with last year's figures is Rs. 58,404.

16. *Explanations for the increase.*—Establishment of the Public offices of the State:—The increase under this head is due to the following causes:—

1. The organization of the Forest Department and the additional expenditure incurred on account of leave, etc., allowances.

2. Appointment of a clerk to the office of the Supervisor of Schools, of a first assistant teacher to the Secondary school, also the appointment of teachers in several village schools.

Village Sanitation.—The increase under this head is due to the construction of three Katwas at a cost of Rs. 1,300 and sinking and construction of two new wells at a cost of Rupees 1,600.

Public works.—Increased expenditure is due to the progress of two tanks—Nallacheruvu and Racheru and a big Koneru at Mudgedu.

Stationery and printing.—The increase is due to the purchase of periodicals and volumes of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Civil list.—The amount of allotment under this head is Rs. 54,000. Last year Rs. 3,189 were left undrawn. This amount was drawn during 1911-1912. Hence increase.

Service pensions, etc.—The addition of orphan pensioners and cripples to the list was the cause of increase under this head.

Religious institutions.—Last year a sum of Rs. 20 was left undrawn under this head. During the year under report a sum of Rs. 100 was sanctioned to "Peer Dastagir Endowment." These two items that were drawn in excess account for the increase.

Delhi Coronation Durbar and expenditure on abstraction and compilation of census statistics.—These two were unexpected items. No amounts were allotted in the Budget towards these expenditures. Hence increase.

17. The balance at the close of the year is Rs. 3,48,131 viz, Rs. 1,44,231 in cash and Rs. 2,03,900 (Face value) in Government Promissory Notes against Rs. 3,74,602 showing a decrease of Rs. 26,471. The unexpected expenditure incurred during the year under report tended to decrease the balance but the Durbar charges cannot be considered to have been a

waste, because, besides the great honour and distinction conferred on the Nawab and the State property worth about Rs. 30,000 in the shape of a grand looking Landau, first class tents, four horses and a motor car have been secured for use on State occasions.

GENERAL REMARKS ON THE YEAR'S WORK.

18. *Crops*—There was failure of crops in almost all villages in Northern and Central Firkas of the State. The Tahsildar made a thorough inspection of crops in such villages and dry remission was granted in most deserving cases by the Durbar after inspection by the Dewan and the Nawab. In some cases postponement of the collection of revenue at Rs. 0-4-0 in the rupee was also sanctioned. The amounts remitted and postponed being Rs. 4,499 and Rs. 1,517 respectively.

19. *Weights and Measures*.—592 seers and 1,032 weights were stamped during the year. These weights and measures are being used by the public from 16th February 1912. The work of stamping weights and measures is still in progress.

20. *Village works and village sanitation*.—Much useful work was executed during the year under this head. Two village gates at Sankalapuram and Yerrazudi were constructed adding much to the good appearance of these villages; two Chavidies at Ghulam-Ali-Abad and Fatehnagar were newly constructed, several village chavidies and cattle-pounds were repaired. Owing to the scanty rain-fall nine village wells had to be deepened and several kuntas were repaired. 123 avenue trees in villages were newly planted and the old trees 2250 in number were maintained. Four katwas across the Zurreru were constructed at a cost of Rs. 1,300 for irrigation purposes. This large item of expenditure accounts for the increase under the head of "Village sanitation," the total expenditure being Rs. 5,746.

21. *Public Works*.—The large Chief Police Station in Banganapalle and the huge Koneru at Mudgedu were completed during the year. The village of Mudgedu situated in the south of the State has a population of 613 souls and the only source of water supply is a kunta which depends on rain for its supply. Brackish water unfit for any use is obtained from wells and it was therefore proposed to impound sufficient quantity of rain water in the kunta to last for a year. A Koneru was constructed in the bed of the kunta, but the surrounding soil being loose, it was found necessary to provide for a substantial building with bond stones at an interval of every two feet. It was completed this year. Excluding establishment Rs. 50,370 were spent on Public Works detailed in Appendix XVI.

22. *Educational department*.—Rs. 8,493 were spent on education exclusive of the amount spent on school buildings which is charged to the D. P. W. The improvement in this department is maintained except that the results of the annual examinations were slightly poorer than last year owing to the prevalence of fevers during four or five months in the year. Appendix XXI gives particulars of the work done in this department. During the current year it has been proposed to increase the number of village school masters by three, as Sanjamala Telugu and Urdu schools and the Nandavaram Telugu school each require an Assistant Master.

23. During the year under report, 1,069 pupils were under instruction including 74 girls in the schools maintained by the State. Of this number, 617 were Hindu boys and 47 Hindu girls; 374 Muhammadan boys and 27 Muhammadan girls and 4 were Christian boys. In the 8 Mission and one private schools, there were 105 pupils under instruction. Of this number, there were 61 Christian boys and 18 Christian girls, 21 Hindu and 5 Muhammadan boys. The total number of pupils in the State as well as in the aided Schools therefore was 1,174.

24. The State Scholarship of Rs. 10 a month continues to be held by Syed Hussain Khadri who studies in the Kurnool Municipal High School. It is expected that one more Scholarship will have to be awarded this year. Hence the provision in the Budget.

25. *Forest department*.—The Forest department was organized during the year under report with an experienced graduate at its head who is also a D. D. R. of the Imperial Forest College. He is assisted by a small establishment of Guards, Watchmen and Peons and as necessity arises, more hands as recommended in the Forest scheme approved by Government will be entertained.

26. *Settlement and demarcation of blocks proposed for reservation*.—During the year the settlement of certain blocks was undertaken and the three blocks viz., Giddalore, Krishnagiri and Ramathirtam out of the five blocks proposed for reservation, have been demarcated with permanent field marks. The settlement of the remaining two blocks viz., Ghulam-Ali-Abad and Sunkesula will be taken up in due course. In fixing the boundaries of the three blocks, care has been taken to safeguard the interests of the people by excluding all occupied and

cultivated lands as far as possible. In Giddalore block sufficient margin in the main block has been allowed to the ryots to utilize fire wood, small timber and other Forest produce for agricultural purposes. All cart tracks and foot paths in the reserved areas were admitted.

27. *System of Management*.—During the year the Forests were worked on permit system, and this system will be continued till all the blocks proposed for reservation are permanently demarcated and subjected to a definite system of working. All the blocks after demarcation will be rigidly closed to cutting and goat browsing.

28. *Forest offences*.—The Forest offences are at present tried by the Tahsildar. In future only those cases which are not compounded will be reported to the Magistrate for prosecution.

29. *Fire protection*.—At present the most valuable forest in the State is the Palmyra tope. The Palmyra trees are used as timber for buildings both in the State and in the surrounding British Villages and it is very popular. The tope is the only forest which needs protection against forest fires. Happily there have been no fires during the year but arrangements are being made for the demarcation and settlement of the tope as well as for its protection against fire.

30. *Division of blocks into compartments and coupes*.—This will be undertaken as soon as the demarcation of the block is finished.

31. *Sylvicultural operations*.—Natural regeneration of palmyra was noticed in abundance in the palmyra tope at Ghulam-i-Ali Abad. Every attempt will be made to extend its growth by clearing of all the existing useless forest growth. Bamboos are found growing luxuriantly in certain favoured spots and prompt steps will be taken to introduce these species on a large scale. Certain fertile and well drained areas in the palmyra tope will be cleared of all forest growth and planted up with teak, mahogany and other useful exotics in the current year.

As suitable localities are available only in Giddalore and Ghulam-i-Ali Abad blocks, useful plantations will be started there in the current year. Especially in Giddalore block a very beautiful spot near Thathanna well, has been selected for raising a fruit garden. The well is within easy reach and the water can be led on to this area without much cost.

32. *Privileges to ryots*.—The privileges allowed to ryots such as free grazing of all plough cattle and free removal of head loads of dry fuel and other forest produce for agricultural purposes were continued during the year and restrictions will be introduced gradually.

33. *Finance*.—The present financial position is good and is sure to improve considerably in the near future under the present system of workings, but the object, the State holds in view, in working these forests is not to secure an immediate increase in net revenue but to improve the future condition of the forests.

34. *Loans*.—To relieve the ryots from chronic indebtedness, attempts were being made in the previous years by the Durbar to help the ryots. During the current year, two ryots were granted a loan of Rs. 2,800 with interest at 0-6-0 per cent. as an experimental measure. A sum of Rs. 3,800 was paid to eight ryots to construct katwas and wells and to purchase fodder and bulls.

To relieve the ryots of distress caused on account of failure of crops during the current year the Durbar was pleased to sanction a sum of Rs. 10,000 in the month of March 1912 to grant additional Takavi loans in most deserving cases. Applications are being registered and they will be disposed of as they are received.

35. *Trade*.—Trade and manufacture continued this year as in last year. There are no circumstances worth noting here this year. The ginning mill at Sanjamala is turning out good work and is rapidly improving, the quantity of cotton cleared during the year being 1,36,000 maunds.

36. *Rain-fall*.—Appendix XIV gives particulars of rain-fall in the rain-registering centres of the State. There was 14.43 inches of rain at Banganapalle against 35.30 inches in the previous year. The rain-fall in the other four centres of the State is given in the Appendix. Rains were both insufficient and untimely during the year. Red soil villages and also villages of regar lands in the Central and Northern Firkas of the State suffered much for want of rain so much so the ryots were driven to the necessity of importing "Choppah" for their cattle from British villages of the Pattikonda taluk. The Zurreru, however, continued its supply during the year. The Katwas constructed in Banganapalle across the river gave full supply to the betel leaf gardens and paddy fields raised during the year. The betel leaf gardens are in a flourishing state.

37. Appendix XV gives particulars of prices of staple food grains. The rise in prices is unsatisfactory on account of unfavourable character of the season, but the labouring classes get ample work and their condition is good.

39. The year commenced with an arrear balance of Rs. 2,407, of which a sum of Rs. 7 shown in column 8 was written off the accounts as irrecoverable. Arrear collection shown in column 5 includes an excess collection of Rs. 558 which has since been either adjusted to accounts or refunded in cash.

In the current collections shown under Miscellaneous in column 6 of the statement a sum of Rs. 48 on account of Nawab's Seri lands is included.

40. The figures shown in column 7 of this statement against Land Revenue, Quit-rent, Miscellaneous and Road Cess differ from those shown as actual receipts in column 2 of Financial statement of receipts. The difference is due to the fact that the figures in this statement include a sum of Rs. 368 being the excess collections of previous faslies adjusted to accounts this year while it was not shown in the Financial statement as it is not a cash transaction.

41. The balance at the close of the year is Rs. 6,190 against Rs. 2,406 of the previous year. Demand notice No. 1 was issued in the case of 263 defaulters involving Rs. 2,051 against 952 defaulters involving Rs. 8,192 in the previous year. The number of defaulters against whom Demand notice No. 2 was issued was 13 involving Rs. 140. With all the adverse season, the collections made are satisfactory and speak well of the attention bestowed by the Tahsildar in the performance of his duties.

42. The current demand under Land Revenue, Quit-rent, Miscellaneous and Road Cess for the year under report was Rs. 2,03,384 against Rs. 2,05,883 in the previous year showing a net decrease of Rs. 2,499. The decrease is due to the following causes:—

- Lands fetching an annual rental of Rs. 79 were relinquished by the ryots.
- On account of partial failure of crops dry remissions amounting to Rs. 4,499 were granted in most deserving cases.
- Jwalapuram tank received no supply and there was no wet cultivation, the result being the decrease in water rate.
- In Pasapula village the Masjid inam was attached and incorporated with Circar and fully assessed as the service was not being regularly rendered and the Mosque left in a ruined state. During the year the Masjid was restored by the Inamdar and service rendered regularly. This land had again to be transferred to Inam.
- In Banganapalle town Survey No. 150 was acquired by the Municipality for Muhammadan burial ground. The land was therefore transferred to Poramboke.
- For arrears of Revenue one of the artizan inams of Ghulam-i-Ali Abad was sold in public auction and purchased on behalf of the State last year and it was left waste this year.
- In Giddalore certain Begari and Barber Service Inam lands are damaged by floods in the adjoining vagu. A portion of the quit-rent on such lands was remitted to the party and the amount excluded from the demand.

43. *Mining Rent.*—The Mining Syndicate owed in 1911, Rs. 2,000 of which Rs. 1,000 have been collected and Rs. 1,000 of December 1911 will be received in June next. Rs. 2,000 out of the Rs. 4,000 shown in column 4 of the Budget, will fall due at the end of June and December 1912.

44. *Agricultural Stock.*—For particulars of agricultural Stock please vide Appendix XVII enclosed. The number of bullocks is 6731 against 7132 of last year. The decrease is due to the unfavourable character of the season, several ryots having moved their bullocks to foreign lands for pasture. It may be said that agricultural operations were also dull to some extent. The increase in the number of riding conveyances as compared with last year's figures shows that trade was not retarded in spite of the adverse season. 15 cows were boarded out to ryots out of the herd of Nellore cows that was maintained in 1907. Of this number one cow died. The number now remaining with the ryots is 14 and last year these cows had given birth to 14 calves to three during the year under report making a total of 17 calves. All the cows and calves are in good condition.

45. The condition of cattle was generally good. Foot and mouth disease and rinderpest prevailed to some extent in some villages.

46. *Vital Statistics.*—The Registration of Vital Statistics is attended by the Municipal department in the Banganapalle town and by the Karnams in rural tracts. Full particulars are given in Appendix XX enclosed. Fever was prevalent in all villages of the State during the year. There were also many deaths from fever. There was no prevalence of Epidemic diseases. Full attention is continued to be paid as to the accurate registry of these statistics.

47. *Labour and Wages.*—During the year there was much demand for labourers as several Public Works were started in the town and rural tracts by the State. It may be said that the supply of labourers was not equal to the demand.

48. *Prices.*—There was rise in the prices of all grains namely :—Rice, Cholan and Korra. Appendix XV enclosed gives particulars of prices that prevailed during the year. The rise in the price of food grain is due to unfavourable character of the season.

49. *Extradition.*—During the year the British Courts made two applications for extradition through the Political Agent and the number of accused surrendered is two. The Durbar made no application for extradition.

50. *Registration of Assurances.*—Particulars as to the documents registered during the year are given in the Appendices XII and XIII enclosed. As compared with last year's figures, there is decrease in the number and the value of documents. The difference is trifling and calls for no remarks.

51. *The Nawab.*—The Nawab continues to take keen interest in every branch of the administration. He visited all the affected parts and conducted the Jamabandi of 38 villages. In March 1912 he went on a Motor tour to Madras and thence to Bangalore, Mysore and Kolar visiting the Gold fields and the Cauvery electrical works. He returned to Banganapalle via Gooty on Motor. For Nawab's trip to Delhi please vide para 6.

52. *Post and Telegraph office.*—The Postal management of the State is under the Imperial Department under certain conditions. The guaranteed telegraph line mentioned in the report for the past year was opened during the year (i. e., from 18th October 1911) and the Banganapalle Post office is now a Combined Post and Telegraph office which was a much needed improvement. The number of messages transmitted so far is more than what was expected.

53. *Abkari.*—The Abkari administration of the State was leased out to the Government for a period of eight years in consideration of Rs. 27,760 in addition to Rs. 6,060 paid as compensation for the suppression of Salt manufacture and cultivation of Ganja. The term of the lease will expire about October 1914.

54. *Police.*—There was an increase in the number of cases reported and the detection was poor. The percentage of the property recovered being 8.1 against 39.55 last year. The Durbar is taking necessary steps to remedy this defect.

55. The discipline and tone of the force continued to be good and the training of Constables and Head Constables by batches in the Kurnool Police Training School was continued. Appendices II, III and IV give full particulars as to the working, cost of maintaining, etc., of the Police force. During the year under report 13 Constables were fined and 2 were punished by suspension for a short period.

56. *Industries.*—The Carpentry School which was started two years ago is working satisfactorily. Hitherto the expenditure incurred under this head was charged to the Public Works Department, but from the current year separate provision has been made as it is proposed to start chunam making on a small scale. The Banganapalle chunam is famous and it is even exported into the neighbouring British villages. The burning of the lime stone is now carried on, on primitive methods and it is impossible to persuade the chunam makers to deviate from the ways of their ancestors. It is therefore proposed to construct a perpetual Kiln to burn chunam and to teach the people to effect some improvement in that line. Provision has therefore been made in the Budget.

57. *Old Records in the Fort.*—The Old Records in the Fort are lying in a neglected condition and their arrangement and preservation is necessary as there are some papers of Historical interest to the State among them. Provision for a small establishment at a cost of Rs. 450 per annum has been made in the Budget.

58. *Jail Department.*—There were four convicts in Jail during the year, two of them being professional weavers are given that work. The total number of admissions during the year was 15 and of releases was 11.

59. Three Civil prisoners were admitted, and the average period of detention was 14 days. This is not shown in the Appendix. The discipline in Jail was very satisfactory. Only one prisoner was punished by reduction of diet for a minor offence. Prisoners' labour consists of gardening, weaving and tinning. The total income from Jail labour was as follows :—

The cause of this increase is already explained under financial review.

The total expenditure of the Jail was Rs. 1,278 against Rs. 1,274 last year.

60. The Jail is administered by the Chief Medical Officer who is ex-officio Superintendent assisted by a Warder, and it is guarded by a detachment of the Police force.

61. *Vaccination.*—The staff consists of one Inspector and two Vaccinators, the Inspector being the Assistant Medical Officer. The State is divided into two firkas for vaccination purposes, having one vaccinator for each. The total number of cases vaccinated during the year was 2,089 against 1,940 in the previous year. The percentage of unsuccessful cases fell down to 6.22 against 14.38 in the previous year. The Inspector of Vaccination during his tours attends to the sanitation of the villages and the preservation of drinking water wells from contamination and pollution with the help of the Tahsildar and the Revenue Inspectors. It is satisfactory to note that much good was done in this direction and those villages in which innumerable cases of guinea-worms, etc., were noticed have made considerable improvement. Many medical and surgical cases are treated by the Inspector of Vaccination and the villagers have begun to appreciate this gratuitous relief afforded to them.

62. Vaccine paste from Guindy is obtained and it continues to give satisfaction. Lymph sufficient for 40 cases per week is being obtained. The total cost of maintaining the Department for the year was Rs. 658. Appendix XXII shows the work of the Department in detail.

63. *Medical Department.*—There has been no change in the Hospital staff, except that the Mid-wife attached to the Hospital was dismissed for continued neglect of duty and disobedience to orders. A competent Mid-wife will be entertained as soon as one can be procured.

64. The average daily number of out-door patients during the year was 1276.1, making this a record year since the Hospital was established. This is due not only to a large increase in the number of fever cases admitted during the year, but also to the increasing popularity of the Hospital to which a large number of serious cases from the adjoining British territories are brought.

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66. *Government Securities.*—Owing to the unusual drain on the Treasury during the year under report it is feared that no Government paper can be purchased during the current year.

67. *Audit.*—The periodical audit of both the State and the Municipal accounts continued to be carried on, satisfactorily.

68. *Municipality.*—The work of the Municipality during the year under report was satisfactory as will be found from the report annexed. The removal of congestion by the widening of several lanes has afforded much facility to the work of Sanitation.

69. The attention of the Chairman has been drawn to the poor collections and it is hoped that they will be satisfactory during the current year.

70. As there was no change either in personnel or constitution of any other branch of the State Administration, no remarks need be offered. The Appendices will give full information regarding the working of the departments not dealt with in the report.

Constitution of the Council.

During the year under review, there were no changes in the Council. M. R. Ry. G. Srirama Sastri Garu has been renominated as Chairman, his tenure of office having expired by the 26th October 1911.

The following Councillors were renominated during the year:—

During the year under report, the Council held 23 meetings, as in the previous year, of which 5 had to be adjourned for want of quorum.

The most important event of the year under report was the Coronation of THEIR IMPERIAL MAJESTIES at Delhi. His Highness the Nawab was kind enough to take the Chairman to Delhi, and he begs to thank His Highness the Nawab, for it afforded opportunities of studying questions Municipal.

The 12th of December last was celebrated with great eclat and enthusiasm by the Municipality within the town of Banganapalle. The Nawab generously contributed towards the expenditure in addition to the allotment made by the Council.

Three Kitson lights were purchased during the year and they were lighted for the first time on that occasion.

Receipts.

Statements showing the receipts and charges as compared with Budget Estimates are enclosed.

Tax on Arts.—167 persons were assessed to this tax and Rs. 186 were realized during the year against the demand of Rs. 362-8-0. There remained at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 176-8-0. Of the arrear demand of Rs. 194, the amount of Rs. 107-8-0 was collected, Rs. 23-8-0 written off and thus the official year closed with a balance of Rs. 63.

Tax on buildings.—The demand of this tax was Rs. 1,686-13-8, deducting Rs. 1,153-11-3 collected, Rs. 69-1-0 written off and Rs. 2-11-2 remitted on appeal, there remained a balance of Rs. 461-6-3. Out of demand in arrears of Rs. 546-4-2, a sum of Rs. 269-15-5 was collected and Rs. 18-1-2 were written off. At the end of the official year, a balance of Rs. 258-3-7 was remaining.

Tax on Lands.—Out of a demand of Rs. 333-7-2, the sum of Rs. 124-13-2 was collected and at the end there remained a balance of Rs. 208-10-0.

Out of demand in arrears of Rs. 176-14-6, a sum of Rs. 93-14-11 was collected, Rs. 6-14-10 were written off, the year closing with a balance of Rs. 76-0-9.

Coercive Process.—No warrants were issued for the collection of above taxes during the year.

Tolls, Market and Slaughter House.—The amounts for which these were sold have been collected during the year.

Contribution.—In addition to the amount spent under town improvement scheme for widening three congested streets, the State has also contributed Rs. 5,000 in aid of the Municipal fund as usual.

Incidence of Taxation.—The incidence of taxation per head of the population with reference to the collection comes to Rs. 0-6-5.

Expenditure.

The following works were executed during the year at a cost of Rs. 2,937-9-9:—

1. Construction of a culvert of 5 vents near Veerappa Mattam.
2. Laying of a new road at Kondapet.
3. Laying of a new road at Khaziwada and at Muhammad Hyath Sahib's lane.
4. Repairs to the Municipal Office.
5. Repairs to the platforms of the new Market.
6. Construction of 2 slab drains on new roads, one at Malik Naick Katta and the other at Muhammad Hyath Sahib's lane.
7. Repairs to the Gooty road.
8. Repairs to the diversion road near Malik Naick Katta.
9. Repairs to a step well at Fort.
10. Repairs to the drains of Mansoorpet.
11. Repairs to the Zurreru dam.
12. Construction of a slab drain on Panyam road near Veerappa Mattam.
13. Repairs to town roads.
14. Providing parapets to the well on Lawley Market road, and
15. Construction of parapets to the diversion road near Kondapet school.

These works were designed, estimated and supervised by the full time Overseer and they were checked by the Councillors. All the roads, new and old of the Municipality, are well maintained and they are in good condition.

The Municipality thanks the Councillor D. P. W. Overseer for his valuable assistance in checking all the Municipal estimates.

Vital Statistics.—259 births and 211 deaths were registered during the year against 265 and 143 respectively in the previous year.

Sanitation and water supply.—Particular attention was devoted to the sanitation of the town and the Durbar takes keen interest in the matter. A sum of Rs. 324 was spent for the repairs of two old wells, one in Fort and the other in Mansoorpet.

Avenue trees.—The Municipality has been maintaining about 400 avenue trees within its limits and for its management it is spending about Rs. 400 yearly.

Private scavenging system.—This system has been working very satisfactorily. Almost all the Badros have been removed. The Durbar devoted its best attention to the upkeep of this system.

The Municipal Council is very grateful to His Highness the Nawab for the munificent grant of Rs. 5,000 every year and thanks His Highness for the personal attention bestowed on the work of the Municipality in inspecting many congested localities of the town and taking much interest in their improvement. The thanks of the Municipality are also due to our popular Dewan for the warm interest he takes in all the Municipal matters and for his ready help.

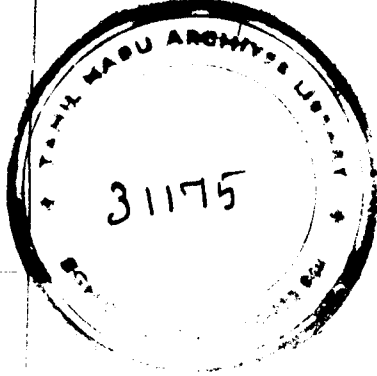

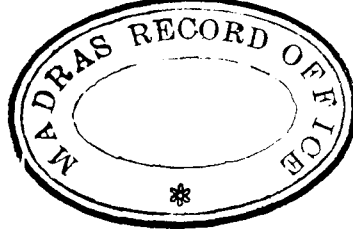

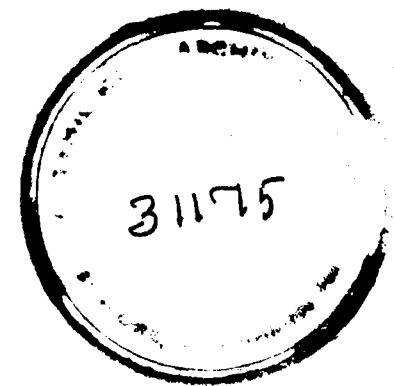
