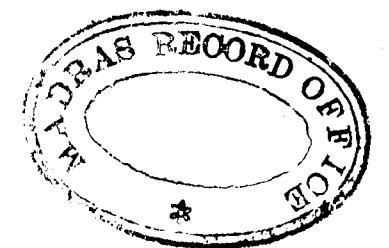

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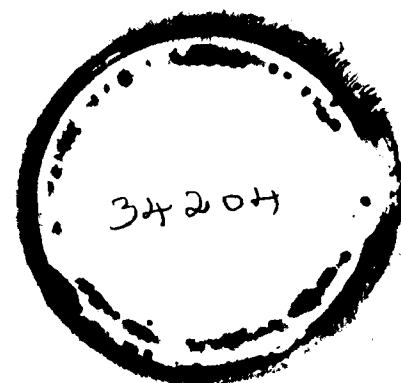

With its Proceedings read above the Board of Revenue submits the report on
the land revenue settlement of the
Presidency for fasli 1322, the agricultural
year ending with 30th June 1913.

Miscellaneous.

2. Both the south-west and the north-east monsoons were on the whole favourable for agriculture though in the Northern Circars the latter was much below the average. Prices continued high and the staple food-grains were dearer than in the preceding year, the average retail prices exceeding the normal rates in all districts.

3. The total extent of ryotwari holdings in the Presidency amounted to 25·17 million acres and showed an increase of about 157,000 acres over the previous year. Out of the occupied extent, 20,539,384 acres, or 81·62 per cent., were cropped against 19,868,835 acres or 79·49 per cent. in the previous year.

4. The following statement exhibits under the principal heads the land revenue and cesses which accrued in the year under review and in the previous year:—

5. The settled assessment on ryotwari holdings amounted to Rs. 508·9 lakhs against Rs. 506·9 lakhs in the previous year. The excess was partly due to the character of the season and the increase in the extent under occupation but also to the introduction of resettlement rates in two taluks and a part of a third taluk of the Coimbatore district. The revenue derived from water-rates on dry lands and from the charge for second crop on wet lands amounted to Rs. 34·31 lakhs against Rs. 30·77 lakhs in the preceding year. The increase occurred under both heads and was large in the districts of Kistna, Nellore, Anantapur and Madura, where it is

attributed generally to the favourable character of the season. There was a large decrease in South Arcot under fasaljasti which was due to seasonal causes. Season remissions in fasli 1322 amounted to Rs. 3.27 lakhs against Rs. 10.60 lakhs in the preceding year—an indication of marked improvement in the rainfall.

6. The extent of poramboke land occupied during the year was 105,166 acres or 15,854 acres less than in the previous year, but it appears that, owing to neglect of orders in four districts, the above area includes a certain amount of unassessed waste land. On about 68.0 per cent of the occupied poramboke assessment was levied at the ordinary rates; on the remaining extent of 33,249 acres enhanced assessment amounting to about Rs. 3½ lakhs was levied, the average rate of the enhanced charge being Rs. 11 an acre against Rs. 13 in the previous year in which however only 29,163 acres were subjected to penalty. In North Arcot, Coimbatore and Tanjore the area on which enhanced assessment was levied was disproportionately small but in the last of these districts a large number of orders for eviction was issued.

7. *Collections.*—The collection work was satisfactory, Rs. 7,42,69,845 or 98.8 per cent. of the gross current demand were collected within the fasli against 98.7 per cent. in the previous year. The arrear balance at the beginning of the fasli was Rs. 12,72,691. Of this amount a sum of Rs. 11,52,523 or 90.5 per cent. was collected within the fasli and Rs. 14,767 or 1.16 per cent. were written off the accounts. The total balance, arrears and current, outstanding at the end of the fasli was Rs. 9,49,722. The Board will be requested to enquire into the cause of the delay in effecting adjustment in the case of these seven districts referred to at the end of paragraph 22 of the report as showing accounts unadjusted from before fasli 1321.

8. *Coercion.*—The Government are glad to note a continuance of the progressive decrease in the total number of coercive processes issued in connection with the collection of land revenue which has been observable for several years. The total number issued in the year under report was 1,259,236 against 1,448,613 in the preceding year. The decrease occurred in every class of coercive process. Demand notices which are really reminders and not true coercive processes formed about 88.4 per cent. of the total number of processes and numbered 1,113,240 against 1,193,222 in the previous year. The percentage of distraints and attachments to the total number of demand notices was 6.89 in the case of personal property and 1.59 in the case of real property against 11.07 and 2.09, respectively, in the previous year. About 48 per cent. of the defaulters whose property was attached paid the arrears before sale notices were issued. Actual sale of property was resorted to in only 1,973 cases out of 49,527 cases of attachment. The number of defaulters whose property was attached for arrears of revenue formed 0.05 per cent. of the total number of pattas and the extent of the land sold, 7,829 acres, amounted to 0.03 per cent. of the total extent of holdings in the Presidency. 2,509 acres, or nearly 0.01 per cent. of the total holdings in the Presidency, were bought in by Government for want of bidders against 6,391 acres or 0.03 per cent. of the holdings in the preceding year. The immoveable property sold realized more than twice the amount of the arrears for the recovery of which sale was effected. Such excess was particularly noticeable in Madura where, for arrears amounting to Rs. 2,605, land valued at Rs. 17,605 was brought to sale and realized Rs. 14,553. In this district, and perhaps elsewhere, it would seem that sufficient attention was not paid to section 44 of the Revenue Recovery Act. A closer approximation between the amount of the arrears and the value of the land brought to sale should be aimed at.

9. *Transfer of registry.*—The total number of applications for transfers of registry to be dealt with in the fasli under report including the number brought forward for disposal from the previous year was 126,801, of which 111,389 were disposed of during the fasli, leaving a balance of 15,051. The number of applications pending disposal is large in South Arcot, Tanjore and Trichinopoly. In G.O. No. 2305, Revenue, dated 1st August 1913, the Government have ordered the amendment of the rules relating to the transfer of registry with a view to bring registry into closer accordance with facts.

10. *Loans.*—The amounts advanced under both the Loans Acts increased from Rs. 6.76 lakhs in fasli 1321 to Rs. 7.70 lakhs. The amounts advanced for outlay upon wells aggregated over Rs. 2 lakhs, and 954 wells were sunk or repaired against

899 in the previous year by means of money advanced by Government. A sum of Rs. 26,850 was devoted to the purchase and installation of oil-engines and pumps. There was a marked increase in loans in the districts of Bellary, Chingleput, Chittoor, Coimbatore, Trichinopoly, North Arcot and Tinnevely. This was partly due to the employment of special establishments in the last two districts.

The statement given in paragraph 43 of the Board's report shows a considerable gain to the Local Government from the transactions in loans. The figures depend, however, upon an arbitrary calculation of the value of the work done by revenue establishments in connection with the grant and recovery of loans and the resulting profit is certainly not of the dimensions given in the statement. In view, nevertheless, of the possibility that some profit is at present made, the Government have been considering whether the rules relating to loans may not be relaxed in some respects at the risk of an increase in the number of bad debts and it is expected that orders will soon be issued on the subject.

Resolution—No. 1, dated 6th January 1914.

The Board submits its report on the settlement of land revenue in this Presidency for fasli 1322 (1912-13) together with the prescribed statements. The usual extracts from the district reports are appended. There was considerable delay in the receipt of the reports or returns from some districts. The reports from Chingleput and Chittoor were received on the 29th November and 12th December 1913, respectively, after repeated reminders. The Collector of Chingleput has not offered any explanation for the delay, while the Collector of Chittoor ascribes the delay to resettlement in consequence of which the jamabandi of the Vayalpad taluk was completed only in September.

2. *Season, rainfall and prices.*—The south-west monsoon was on the whole favourable, the total rainfall being above the average in the majority of districts. With the exception of the Circars, the total rainfall was above the average everywhere during the north-east monsoon which was also, on the whole, favourable. The rainfall in the dry weather was below the average in all the districts and the hot weather rains were also generally slightly in defect. The average annual retail prices of the staple food-grains were generally higher than in the preceding year and everywhere dearer than the normal rates. The price of rice and cholam was even dearer than the warning rates in eight districts, that of ragi in five districts and that of cumbu in nine districts. The warning rates here referred to are those fixed by Government in G.O. No. 1977, Revenue, dated 3rd July 1912.

3. *Cropped area.*—The total cropped area of the year under report (39,120,000 acres) exceeded the normal area (36,686,000 acres) by 2,434,000 acres. Cholam, gingelly, castor and indigo showed a decrease and the other crops an increase. As compared with the previous year, the cultivation under paddy, cholam, cumbu, ragi, ground-nut and tobacco showed an increase while that under castor, sugarcane, cotton and indigo showed a decrease. In no case is the outturn reported to have exceeded the normal. Paddy, indigo and sugarcane yielded a normal outturn in Coimbatore, and the yield of paddy is reported to have ranged from 67 to 92 per cent. of the normal in the remaining districts. The yield of cholam in the Nilgiris, of cumbu in Malabar, of bengalgram in Ganjām, of horsegram in Anantapur, of indigo in Madura, of other oil-seeds in Vizagapatam, Nellore, North Arcot and Rāmnād and of "all other crops including topes" in South Arcot is reported to have been below 50 per cent. of the normal. In the remaining districts the yield of crops is generally said to have ranged from 50 to 92 per cent. The Board has no doubt the outturns reported are understatements of the realities.

4. *Condition of cattle.*—The total number of deaths from disease among horned

Note.—The figures in this paragraph relate to cattle showed a decrease of 1,246 as compared with the previous year, the total for the year being 50,108. Rinderpest

showed a considerable decrease as compared with the previous year, while there was an increase in malignant sore-throat.

5. *Number of villages.*—In the year under report there was a nett decrease of 120

villages. There was an increase in Chingleput (1), North Arcot (3) and Tinnevely (5). The increase in Chingleput was due to certain minor inams having been resumed, surveyed and settled as a separate village; that in North Arcot, to the resumption of one inam and two jaghir villages; and that in Tinnevely, to the sub-division of villages. The decrease occurred in Cuddapah (12), Trichinopoly (29), Rāmnād (10) and Coimbatore (78). The decrease in Cuddapah was due to the exclusion of 12 shrotriern villages of the Pulivendla taluk which were wrongly included under raiyatwari in fasli 1321; that in Trichinopoly to the exclusion, for the same reason, of four inam villages of the Karūr taluk and to the reconstitution of the 94 villages of the Nāmakkal taluk into 69; that in Rāmnād, to the clubbing of villages at the resettlement; and that in Coimbatore, to the amalgamation and regrouping of villages in the Gōbichettipālaiyam and Pollachi taluks.

6. The land revenue of the Presidency is derived from the undermentioned sources :—

- Peishcush or revenue from permanently-settled estates.
- Shrotriern jodi or quit-rent levied on inam villages.
- Assessment including water-rate on lands held under the raiyatwari system.
- Miscellaneous revenue.
- Proprietary estates village service.

7. *Peishcush or revenue from permanently-settled estates.*—The total amount of peishcush payable during the fasli was Rs. 49,85,345 against Rs. 49,90,568 in the preceding year. The decrease of Rs. 5,223 is the nett result of—

8. *Shrotriern jodi.*—The quit-rent payable to Government on villages held on shrotriern or favourable tenure was Rs. 7,52,019 or Rs. 1,007 less than in the previous fasli. The following are the reasons for the difference :—

9. *Holdings.*—The total extent of the raiyatwari holdings during the year was 25.16 million acres and exceeded that of the previous year by about 157,000 acres. The increase was contributed by all the districts except Kistna and Tanjore which together showed a decrease of 3,056 acres. The decrease in Kistna was due to the extent of land relinquished during the year having been larger than that taken up on darkhast, while that in Tanjore, was chiefly due to the transfer of patta land to poramboke in the Mannārgudi taluk in connection with the acquisition of lands for the Tanjore District Board Railway extensions. The increase was marked in the districts of Guntūr, Anantapur, Bellary, Kurnool and North Arcot and it was generally due to the expansion of cultivation owing to the favourable character of the season.

10. *Assessment.*—The total assessment on holdings was Rs. 508.91 lakhs against Rs. 506.94 lakhs in the previous year. More than half the increase occurred in North Arcot (Rs. 18,570) and Coimbatore (Rs. 91,679); in the former district, it was mainly due to the favourable character of the season and in the latter it was mostly due to the introduction of the resettlement rates in Pollachi, Udamalet and in three firkas of the Kollegal taluk.

11. *Cultivation.*—Compared with the previous year, the area cropped on raiyatwari holdings showed an increase of 670,549 acres, a result of the generally favourable character of the season. There was a decrease of 418,964 acres under waste charged. The increase of cultivation was marked in the districts of Cuddapah, Anantapur, Bellary, Kurnool, Chittoor, Trichinopoly, Madura, Tinnevely, Salem and Coimbatore. Including the area under miscellaneous cultivation, the total area cropped amounted to 21.86 million acres against 21.04 million acres in the previous year.

12. *Water-rate and second-crop charge.*—The revenue from these sources amounted to Rs. 34.31 lakhs against Rs. 30.77 lakhs, or nearly Rs. 3,54,000 more than in the preceding year. This increase was made up of about Rs. 1,75,000 under "water-rate on dry lands" and of about Rs. 1,79,000 under "second-crop charge." There were large increases in the districts of Kistna (Rs. 47,957), Nellore (Rs. 59,111), Anantapur (Rs. 83,483) and Madura (Rs. 38,954), but there was a large decrease in South Arcot (Rs. 22,685). The increase, where it occurred, was generally due to the favourable character of the season; in Kistna it

was also due to unauthorized irrigation being charged with heavier penalties. The decrease in South Arcot occurred under fasaljasti and was due to late rains and the scanty rainfall after November.

13. *Remissions*.—As compared with the previous year, there was a nett decrease of Rs. 7.92 lakhs, “season” and “fixed” remissions showing a decrease and “beriz” deductions an increase.

Statement No. 6.

(i) *Season remissions*.—The remission under this head showed a nett decrease of Rs. 7.33 lakhs. The decrease occurred under all the sub-heads except “land injured by water” and “second-crop charge”.

(a) *Waste remitted*.—The remission under this head amounted to Rs. 1.11 lakhs or Rs. 3.76 lakhs less than that remitted in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 30 was remitted on 11 acres of dry land in Kistna under G.O. No. 626, Revenue, dated 25th July 1901. The rest of the remission related to 25,096 acres of wet land. Wet remissions were granted in almost all the districts, the largest amounts being in the districts of Cuddapah, Anantapur, Kurnool and Chittoor. These districts were responsible for more than half the remission granted under this head.

(b) *Shavi or short crop*.—The total amount remitted under this head was Rs. 59,599 against Rs. 1,02,263 in the previous year showing a nett decrease of Rs. 1,22,664, the bulk of the decrease (Rs. 1,00,943) being in Ganjam, Vizagapatam, Kurnool and Madura; of the total shavi remissions, Rs. 58,468 related to wet lands and Rs. 1,131 to dry lands. A sum of Rs. 565 was granted under “short crop” during the year under report.

(c) *Injury by floods*.—The amount remitted under this head was Rs. 11,979 against Rs. 7,017 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 4,962, Ganjam, Guntur, and Chingleput alone contributing Rs. 4,906 towards the increase. In Ganjam, crops on certain areas in the Berhampur and Chicacole taluks were submerged. In Guntur, damage was caused by the floods in the Kistna river, while in Chingleput submergence was caused by the heavy rainfall during the north-east monsoon.

(d) *Tirvakammi remission* (i.e., remission of the difference between wet and dry assessment on wet land cultivated with dry crops owing to insufficiency or failure of the water-supply) amounted to Rs. 1,25,677 against Rs. 3,67,015 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 2,41,338. The decrease was large in the districts of Cuddapah, Anantapur, Kurnool, Chittoor and Salem; these districts together account for Rs. 1,62,815 or about 70 per cent. of the total decrease under this head.

(e) *Other remissions*.—A sum of Rs. 943 was granted under this head, of which Rs. 918 related to reclamation of land in Nellore.

(ii) *Fixed remissions*—(or abatements of the demand granted for reasons unconnected with the season) amounted to Rs. 2.44 lakhs or 0.63 lakh less than in the previous year. The decrease occurred under all the sub-heads except “dasabandam remissions” “cowle remissions” and “other items.” “*Increment remissions*” amounted to Rs. 1,26,121. These remissions are allowed on the introduction of settlement or resettlement in cases where the increase over the old assessment is in excess of 25 per cent., the rule being that such increase should be imposed in instalments increasing every year in amount. Such remissions were granted in Ganjam, Guntur, Nellore, Cuddapah, Bellary, Kurnool, Chingleput, North Arcot, Trichinopoly, Rāmnād, Tinnevelly, Coimbatore, Salem, South Canara and Malabar. In the last two districts the amounts granted aggregated to as much as Rs. 0.98 lakh.

(iii) *Beriz deductions* (deductions made from village collections in favour of inamdars and religious institutions) amounted to Rs. 8.79 lakhs against Rs. 8.76 lakhs in the previous year showing a small increase of Rs. 3,418. There was, however, a large decrease in Tanjore (Rs. 11,302) mainly due to the arrear payments of Rs. 11,062 due to Sri Sankarachariar's Mutt made during the previous year.

14. *Miscellaneous revenue*.—The revenue under this head amounted to Rs. 92.16 lakhs or Rs. 1.56 lakhs more than in the previous year. This increase is the nett result of large increases in the districts of Kistna (Rs. 76,981), Guntur (Rs. 40,994),

Cuddapah (Rs. 21,320), Tinnevelly (Rs. 59,192) and Salem (Rs. 24,065) and of large decreases in the districts of Ganjam (Rs. 21,388), Gōdāvari (Rs. 68,551) and Tanjore (Rs. 19,809). The decreases under item 1—“Jodi and quit-rent on minor inams” (Rs. 2,445), item 7—“Revenue derived from tree pattas” (Rs. 7,022), item 8—“Commission on estates under Court of Wards' Management” (Rs. 6,000), item 9—“Revenue from process-service fees” (Rs. 272), item 11—“Rent of lankas” (Rs. 9,260) and item 13—“Other items” (Rs. 3,438) and the increases under item 3—“Charge for water in zamindari and inam villages” (Rs. 6,777) and item 10—“Sale-proceeds of land sold” (Rs. 2,266) were small and call for no remarks. Item 2—“Water-rate on minor inams in raiyatwari villages,” item 5—“Occupation (with or without application of assessed and unassessed lands” and item 12—“Quit-rent and ground-rent,” showed large increases, while item 4—“Enhanced water-rate on lands irregularly irrigated” and item 6—“Occupation of poramboke land” showed large decreases. These items will be dealt with below:—

Item (2).—The water-rate on minor inams in raiyatwari villages amounted to Rs. 15.38 lakhs showing a nett increase of Rs. 1.24 lakhs over the revenue under this head in the previous year. Gōdāvari and Kistna alone contributed an increase of Rs. 0.84 lakh.

Item (4).—The enhanced water-rate on lands irregularly irrigated amounted to Rs. 4.07 lakhs or Rs. 0.28 lakh less than in the previous year. Madura and Tinnevelly together showed a decrease of Rs. 0.30 lakh: the decrease in Madura was due to the decrease in the number of cases of irregular irrigation during the fasli as the result of imposition of heavy penalties in the previous fasli and that, in Tinnevelly, was due to remission during the fasli of a major portion of the prescribed enhanced rates in consideration of the more favourable character of the season.

Enhanced water-cess for irregular irrigation.—In G.O. No. 684, Revenue, dated 7th March 1913, Government directed that a system should be tried in each district whereby previous notice should be given to the raiyats concerned that they have been reported to have used Government water irregularly and that they have thereby rendered themselves liable to the imposition of enhanced water-cess. The experiment was not introduced in most of the districts in the year under report as the details of the system best suited for each district could not be settled till very late in the year. In Cuddapah and Kurnool, the system though introduced in the fasli was not given sufficient trial. The Collector of South Arcot reports that 650 objection petitions were received in response to special notices, but only in one case was the original order found to require modification. The system will be given a more extended trial in the current fasli.

Item (5).—*Land occupied with or without application*.—The revenue under this head amounted to Rs. 8.64 lakhs or Rs. 1.22 lakhs more than in the previous year due evidently to the favourable character of the season.

Item (6).—*Poramboke occupation*.—The revenue under this head amounted to Rs. 5.11 lakhs, but it includes the revenue on “unassessed waste” in a few districts. Particulars relating to “poramboke” and “unassessed waste” were not supplied separately in the returns for fasli 1321 for the districts of Anantapur, Bellary, North Arcot, South Arcot, Rāmnād, Tinnevelly and Salem, and in spite of a special direction to this matter last year, it is observed that the returns furnished by the Collectors of Anantapur, Bellary, Rāmnād and Salem have not been prepared according to the instructions conveyed in G.O. No. 1681, Revenue, dated 6th June 1912. The attention of the Collectors will again be drawn to this matter. Owing to this defective information, no comparison can be made between the poramboke cultivation of

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the year under report and that of the preceding year. The total extent occupied measured 105,466 acres. Of the revenue of Rs. 5.11 lakhs, Rs. 3.59 lakhs represent enhanced charges levied on 33,249 acres of land giving an average rate of Rs. 11 per acre. Tanjore, Rāmnād and South Canara show the highest average

rates, viz., 34, 36 and 52 respectively. The heavy incidence in these districts has not been explained. In Tanjore, the encroachers were ordered to be evicted in 1,474 cases against 2,249 in the previous year.

Item (12).—The revenue from quit-rent and ground-rent amounted to Rs. 1.59 lakhs or Rs. 0.20 lakh more than in the previous year. Bellary and Tinnevely together accounted for an increase of Rs. 0.18 lakh; the increase, in the former district, was mainly due to the collection of 20 years' quit-rent for conversion into freehold of shrotriem Bannihatti village of the Hospet taluk and to the rent collected from the South Indian Manganese Company, and that in the latter was chiefly due to the revision of the ground-rent rates in Tuticorin.

15. The nett raiyatwari demand, excluding remissions but including water-rate, second-crop charge and miscellaneous revenue amounted to Rs. 620.88 lakhs against Rs. 605.89 lakhs in the previous year. The details for this increase of Rs. 14.99 lakhs are given below:—

The decrease under item 1 is very large in Chittoor and North Arcot. The Collector of Chittoor explains it to be due to the fact that cesses were calculated on the rental of fasli 1321 which was not a favourable year. The decrease in North Arcot is attributed to the fact that in G.O. No. 261, Revenue, dated 28th January 1913, Government ordered that the peishcush on Arni Jaghir should be collected in the month of July. The increase under item 3 follows the increase in the revenue.

18. *Demand and collection of land revenue and cesses (current).*—The current demand under land revenue and cesses was Rs. 7,51,04,192; Rs. 7,42,60,845 or 98.8 per cent. was collected within the fasli and a sum of Rs. 904 was written off the accounts.

19. *Demand and collection of arrears.*—The total arrear demand under all heads was Rs. 12,72,691; Rs. 11,52,523 or 90.5 per cent. was collected within the fasli and Rs. 14,767 or 1.16 per cent. was written off the accounts.

20. *Total balance of land revenue and cesses.*—The balance outstanding at the end of the fasli including both arrears and current was Rs. 9,47,841. Including the revenue from the Kurnool-Cuddapah canal which is dealt with in the monthly demand, collection and balance statements the balance on 1st July 1913 was Rs. 9,49,722. Up to the end of October 1913, Rs. 7,26,285 or 76.5 per cent. have been collected. Rs. 18,377 have been written off the accounts and Rs. 3,658 are considered to be irrecoverable. The nett recoverable balance on 1st November 1913 was Rs. 2,01,402. Steps have been taken to collect this amount.

21. *Reconciliation of differences between the collections of land revenue and cesses as shown in the Jamabandi and the Accountant-General's statements and over payments.*—Information on these points has not yet been received from eleven Collectors. The subject will be dealt with in a separate report.

22. *Distribution of collections between land revenue and cesses.*—Land revenue and cesses are not collected separately and no attempt is made to exhibit the collections separately under these heads in the village accounts. The total collections are distributed between land revenue and the several cesses in the Collector's office. The process consists of two stages, of which the first or the provisional distribution is effected by crediting to each head month by month, such portion of the lump collections as will bear the same proportion to the demand under the head as the total collection bears to the total demand under all the heads. The second stage is the final adjustment which consists in correcting the provisional credit by transfer from one head to another, where necessary, after the entire demand for the year under all the heads has been collected or written off.

The statements of distribution for fasli 1322, received from Collectors, show that, except in the districts of Ganjam, Nellore, Gōdāvari, Anantapur, Chittoor, Chingleput, South Arcot, Tanjore and Madura, the variations between the amounts due to the cesses in fasli 1322 and the amounts actually credited were inconsiderable. The accounts of fasli 1318 remained unadjusted in one district, those of 1319 in three, those of 1320 in three and those of 1321 in eleven.

23. *Charges debitable to land revenue.*—The charges of district administration including salaries, etc., of Revenue Inspectors, but excluding those of village establishment were Rs. 58,23,400 or 7.7 per cent. of the land revenue and cesses realised against 7.6 per cent. in the preceding fasli. The village service charges including proprietary estates during the fasli were Rs. 67,02,004. Including this sum which is met from Provincial funds, the total charges were Rs. 1,25,25,404 or 16.6 per cent. of the collections of land revenue and cesses.

24. *Processes under Act II of 1864.*—Statement No. 12 shows the particulars of the coercive processes issued for the realization of Government dues under Act II of 1864. The following abstract compares the number of processes of each kind issued during the year with the figures for the three preceding faslis:—

There has been a progressive decrease in recent years in the total number of processes issued and the number in the year under report shows a further decline.

25. *Demand notices.*—The instruction that these notices should only be issued when absolutely necessary has been kept in view. The number decreased in 16 districts especially in the districts of Kistna, Cuddapah, Bellary, Kurnool, Chingleput, North Arcot, Tanjore, Tinnevely and the Nilgiris. On the other hand, there was a marked increase in the districts noted in the margin. The Collector of Chittoor states that the increase

in his district is chiefly due to the growing tendency among the raiyats to defer payment of kist till demands are actually brought to their doors. The Collector of South Arcot reports that the increase in his district is observed chiefly in the Cuddalore taluk and that the Tahsildar has been called upon to state the cause. The Collector of Trichinopoly states that the increase in his district was due to the season being not wholly favourable.

26. *Distrainment or attachment.*—The number of processes under this head was 94,496 in the year under report against 157,710 in fasli 1321 and 164,313 in fasli 1320. There was a decrease in 17 districts.

27. There was a decrease in the percentage borne by the number of distraints and attachments to that of demand notices as compared with the previous fasli. The number of defaulters, whose immovable property was attached in the year, was 17,755 against 25,096 in fasli 1321. The large disproportion noticed in the Madura district in previous years between the number of defaulters whose personal property was distrained (373) and the number of those whose real property was

attached (4,452) is again noticeable and is due, as stated in previous reports, to the large number of absentee pattadars in the area irrigated by the Periyar.

28. *Sale notices.*—Out of 94,496 defaulters whose property was attached, 44,969 or 47.58 per cent. paid the arrears before sale notices were issued. The percentage was 43.45 in fasli 1321, 47.8 in fasli 1320 and 54.1 in fasli 1319.

29. *Sales.*—The number of defaulters whose property was sold was less than in fasli 1321. The percentage of actual sales to sale notices was 3.93 against 3.91 in fasli 1321 and that of the number of defaulters whose property was actually sold to the total number of pattas was .05 against .09 in the previous fasli. The subjoined statement compares the particulars of sales in fasli 1322 with the figures for the three previous faslis:—

Value of lands sold.—Immoveable property of the estimated value of Rs. 90,776 was sold for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rs. 23,577 and realized Rs. 51,204. The price fetched by lands sold to private individuals was on the average 6 times the assessment in the case of dry lands and 5.8 times the assessment in the case of wet lands. In fasli 1321, immoveable property of the estimated value of Rs. 92,844 was sold for arrears amounting to Rs. 36,088 and the average prices fetched by lands sold to private individuals were 4.8 times the assessment in the case of dry lands and 4.5 times the assessment in the case of wet lands.

Extent of land sold.—The extent of land sold during the year was 6,169 acres under dry and 1,660 acres under wet against 10,158 acres under dry and 3,685 acres under wet in fasli 1321. The corresponding figures for fasli 1320 were 8,333 acres under dry and 1,980 acres under wet.

Lands bought in by Government.—The total area of lands bought in by Government for want of bidders was 1,931 acres of dry and 573 acres of wet against 4,617 acres of dry and 1,774 acres of wet in fasli 1321. More than one-half of the total area bought in was in Kistna, Cuddapah, Bellary and Madura.

30. *Process service establishments.*—Statement No. 13 gives the particulars of processes served by the ordinary village agency or by special establishment and the fees realized during the year. The total number of processes served was 1,207,58 or 161,619 less than in fasli 1321. The number of processes served by the special agency (53,152) was also less than in the previous fasli (56,415).

The special establishment was employed in the same districts as in fasli 1321. Its cost was covered by the fees realized except in Kistna where there was a small deficit.

31. *Costs in civil suits.*—Rupees 17,232 were awarded to Government as costs during the year. Including Rs. 12,226 the revised opening balance, the total demand was Rs. 29,457 of which Rs. 14,281 were collected, Rs. 221 were written off the accounts and Rs. 796 were reported to be irrecoverable. The nett recoverable balance at the end of the year was Rs. 14,159 made up as follows:—

32. *Interest on arrears of land revenue (Statement No. 14).*—The total demand on account of interest on arrears of land revenue, including the balance at the beginning of the fasli, was Rs. 33,482, of which Rs. 19,708 were collected, and Rs. 579 remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 13,195 against Rs. 22,592 (revised figure) at the end of the previous fasli. More than half the arrears at the end of the fasli relates to Chittoor. The only other districts in which the arrears under this head are large are Ganjam and Chingleput. Steps are being taken for recovery.

33. *Sale of land under Standing Orders Nos. 15, 16, 20, 21, 45 and 90.*—Under the rules for the sale of occupancy rights in assessed waste lands (Standing Order No. 15), 2,138 acres, assessed at Rs. 3,056, were sold for Rs. 1,35,939; 125 acres of tank-bed lands, assessed at Rs. 161, were sold for Rs. 4,484 under Standing Order No. 16; 268 acres of waste lands in the Nilgiris and other special tracts, assessed at Rs. 229, were sold for Rs. 2,787 under Standing Order No. 20; 23 acres of house-sites in towns were sold for Rs. 13,488 under Standing Order No. 21; 627 acres, assessed at Rs. 667, which had been bought in by Government at sales for arrears of revenue, were re-sold under Board's Standing Order No. 45 for Rs. 3,642; 61 acres, assessed at Rs. 104, which had been acquired for public purposes and subsequently relinquished, were sold under Standing Order No. 90 for Rs. 3,114.

34. *Sub-division of quit-rent.*—No applications were received during the year under Standing Order No. 53 for the sub-division of the joint liability of shareholders in whole inam villages or minor inams in any of the districts in the Presidency.

35. *Transfer of registration of holdings (Statement No. 15).*—Transfers of revenue registration fall under one or other of the following three heads:—

- (1) Transfers applied for through Registration officers.
- (2) Transfers applied for direct to Revenue officers.
- (3) Transfers proposed by Revenue officers *suo motu*.

(1) Under the first head, 53,810 applications were received during the fasli against 55,422 (revised figure excluding cases dealt with by the special staff) in the previous fasli. The variation is small and calls for no remark.

(2) The number of applications presented direct to the Revenue officers was 40,968 as against 41,194 (revised figure excluding cases dealt with by special staff) in fasli 1321—a decrease of 2,526 or 7.9 per cent. The bulk of the decrease was in Kistna (475), Chittoor (328), Tanjore (773), Madura (752) and Tinnevely (3,102).

(3) The number of cases, which Revenue officers dealt with on their own initiative under paragraphs 5 and 7 of Board's Standing Order No. 31, rose from 13,676 in fasli 1321 to 16,605 in fasli 1322. The largest increase was in Tanjore (2,014).

The total number of cases of all kinds to be dealt with in the fasli under report including the number pending disposal at its beginning was 126,801; of these 111,389 were disposed of during the fasli, leaving a balance of 15,412 pending at the close of the fasli, of which 1,768 have since been disposed of.

36. *Ruined tanks.*—No tanks were handed over to private individuals for repair under Board's Standing Order No. 8 anywhere except in Tinnevely where a single tank was so assigned and repaired at a cost of Rs. 2,300. The ayakat of 42.31 acres is subject to the payment of assessment at a special rate of Rs. 3 per acre.

37. *Settlement by Collectors.*—The rule laid down in paragraph 2 of Board's Standing Order No. 12 that the settlement of each taluk should be conducted by the Collector himself once in five years, was complied with except as regards Polavaram and Nugur in Gōdāvari, Kaikalur in Kistna, Kamalapuram in Cuddapah, Madanapalle in Chittoor, Tiruvannāmalai in North Arcot, Papanasam in Tanjore and Tiruchengode in Salem. The Collectors of North Arcot and Salem intend to take up, in the current year, the settlement of the taluks not settled by them. The Collectors of Gōdāvari, Kistna, Cuddapah, Chittoor and Tanjore are requested to adopt the same course in respect of the taluks not settled by them within five years.

38. *Loans and Advances.*—The advances made under the Land Improvement Loans Act during fasli 1322 amounted to Rs. 7.11 lakhs and those under the Agriculturists' Loans Act to Rs. 4.59 lakhs. The aggregate amount advanced under both the Acts was thus Rs. 7.70 lakhs as against Rs. 6.76 lakhs in the preceding fasli. The increase is the nett result of a decrease in nine districts and of an increase in the remaining districts in which advances were made. The increase occurred chiefly in the districts of Bellary, Chingleput, North Arcot, Chittoor, Coimbatore, Trichinopoly and Tinnevely, while the decrease was large in the district of Madura. The increase in North Arcot and Tinnevely was due to the efforts of the Special Deputy Collector who was employed in these districts to popularize State loans.

39. *Objects to which loans were applied.*—In regard to the amounts advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act, Rs. 1,45,477 or about 47 per cent. were for sinking new wells, the bulk of the disbursements having been made in Coimbatore, Tinnevely, Madura, Trichinopoly and Chingleput; Rs. 62,370 were for repairing old wells, mostly in Coimbatore, Madura, Trichinopoly and Tinnevely and Rs. 32,847 for the reclamation of land, the bulk of which was expended in Madura, Bellary and Kurnool. The loans granted for other purposes amounted to Rs. 70,091. Under the Agriculturists' Loans Act, a sum of Rs. 4,06,503 or 88 per cent. was advanced for the purchase of cattle, chiefly in the districts of Chingleput, Trichinopoly, Madura, Bellary, Anantapur, North Arcot, Chittoor, Tanjore, Kurnool, Salem and South Arcot; Rs. 33,553 were lent for the purchase of fodder, a large portion of the amount having been spent in Bellary, Cuddapah and Kurnool; Rs. 3,007 were lent for the purchase of seed-grain and Rs. 16,348 for other purposes.

40. *Recoveries.*—Of the sums of Rs. 3.33 lakhs and Rs. 3.35 lakhs repayable during the year under the Land Improvement and the Agriculturists' Loans Acts respectively on account of principal, Rs. 3.03 lakhs or 91 per cent. under the former Act and Rs. 3.0 lakhs or 90 per cent. under the latter were collected. Advances amounting to Rs. 31,348 under the former Act and Rs. 12,444 under the latter Act were repaid by borrowers on account of loans the repayment of which had not fallen due, while sums amounting to Rs. 506 under the former Act and Rs. 2,682 under the latter Act were written off the accounts as irrecoverable.

41. *Coercive processes.*—The aggregate amount of principal and interest repayable during the year under both the Acts was Rs. 9,46,775; of which a sum of Rs. 2,69,267 or about 28 per cent. was collected without resort to coercive processes and a sum of Rs. 5,60,923 or 59 per cent. after the issue of demands; a sum of Rs. 28,302 was realized after attachment but before sale, a sum of Rs. 767 by the sale of moveable property and a sum of Rs. 2,459 by the sale of immoveable property. The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 85,057, the arrear being heaviest in Madura (Rs. 15,257), Trichinopoly (Rs. 14,819), Bellary (Rs. 11,422), Anantapur (Rs. 10,300) and Chingleput (Rs. 7,788).

44. With the aid of loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 631 wells capable of irrigating 2,348 acres of land were constructed during the fasli at an aggregate cost of Rs. 1,45,345 and 323 wells designed to benefit 1,261 acres were repaired at a cost of Rs. 56,948; Rs. 18,960 were spent on the reclamation of 1,132 acres of land; Rs. 26,850 on the purchase and installation of oil engines and pumps in the districts of Anantapur, Chingleput, South Arcot and Coimbatore; and Rupees 41,399 on other improvements benefiting about 2,220 acres of land. The Madura district shows the largest number of wells constructed and repaired (327) and it is followed by Chingleput (124) and Coimbatore (123). Under the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 6,300 head of cattle were purchased at an aggregate cost of Rs. 3,54,473 and 18 houses were rebuilt at a cost of Rs. 3,000. Seed-grain was purchased to the amount of Rs. 2,235 and Rs. 1,275 were expended on sugarcane mills. A sum of Rs. 21,884 was spent for other purposes.

45. * *Survey advances.*—The advances made during the year under "Revenue survey advances—Collectors" amounted to Rs. 78,595. Of this sum—

The total amount which had to be accounted for during the year was Rupees 3,92,133 of which a sum of Rs. 62,155 was credited to "Revenue survey advances—Collectors", leaving a balance of Rs. 3,29,978.

The sum to the debit of "Cost of survey marks—Collectors" was Rs. 36,298, and of this amount Rs. 30,630 were recovered during the year from the concerned raiyats or municipalities.

Land-holders' bills to the amount of Rs. 2,08,176 were received from survey officers during the year in the districts of Vizagapatam, Kistna, Anantapur, Cuddapah, Nellore, Chingleput, North Arcot, Chittoor, Coimbatore, Trichinopoly, Rāmnād and Tinnevely. The arrears outstanding at the beginning of the year being Rs. 2,24,543 the total amount recoverable during the year was Rs. 4,32,719. Of this a sum of Rs. 2,76,054, was collected during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,56,665.

46. *Junior Civilians—Knowledge of vernaculars.*—The reports of the Collectors generally show that, with a few exceptions, their Civilian Assistants have a fair knowledge of the vernaculars and are able to dispose of vernacular papers without abstracts.

47. *The relations between the landlords and tenants in larger zamindaris.*—These relations were, with a few exceptions, fairly satisfactory. In Mandasā, Biridi and Patur estates of the Ganjām district where there had been friction before, there was some change for the better during the fasli. In the Kistna district, there was continual litigation between many tenants and their landlords, and this state of things is likely to continue for some years to come. In the zamindaris of North Vallur and Chellapalli the relations are decidedly strained. In the Chittoor district their relations were not altogether amicable. Large numbers of summary suits were filed and the Collector considers that the situation is not likely to be improved so long as the main estates are being bought up by petty landholders who are not looked up to by the raiyats with the same regard as their hereditary zamindar. Friction continues between the Zamindar of Udaiyarpalayam and his tenants in the Trichinopoly district. Under the Estates Land Act the Zamindar has been claiming rent on uncultivated occupied lands which were hitherto exempt from such payment and in consequence there have been numerous suits. In the Kannivadi zamindari in the Dindigul taluk of Madura, the relation was anything but cordial, but there was less strain during this fasli than in the previous one. The friction that existed between the zamindars and the tenants in the Periyakulam taluk of the same district owing to irregularity in the issue of pattas and to the levy of enhanced charges for garden crops raised on dry lands with the aid of private wells did not abate. The relationship continued to be strained in the Settur Zamindari of the Rāmnād district. The feelings between the Raja of Rāmnād and his raiyats were strained because the Raja wished to charge rents on waste land and on palmyras that were not actually tapped. The dispute had been simmering for some time. In the Sivaganga zamindari of the same district, the relations between the European leasees and their tenants were generally cordial though there was an important point in dispute in some of the villages bordering on the Vaigai in regard to the correct charge on Vanpayir lands, i.e., wet lands cultivated with garden crops. In the zamindari of Tudur in the Tinnevely district the landlord and the tenants were not friendly.

48. *Growth of subletting in raiyatwari tracts.*—Subletting is chiefly resorted to by those engaged in professions other than agriculture and by large landholders. It is reported to be on the increase in Ganjām, the delta taluks of Guntūr, the delta tracts of Nellore and the Thruppattur taluk of North Arcot, while, in Tinnevely, subletting is described as the general practice. In parts of Bellary on the other hand, there appears to be a tendency on the part of landholders to prefer to cultivate lands themselves owing to the tempting prices of food-grains and cotton.

49. *Effect of recent legislation on the people.*—In the year under report, there was no legislation affecting the people generally. The Madras Estates Land Act, 1908, has largely increased the work of Revenue officers in some districts. Its provisions are becoming better known to the people, and the Act appears to be working smoothly on the whole. The Limited Proprietors Act, 1911, is said to be finding favour with the managers and mortgagees of estates in the Nellore district.

50. *Co-operative Societies.*—During the year under report 106 societies were registered under the Co-operative Societies Act, of which, two were central, 12 non-agricultural and 92 agricultural. The total number of societies established in 25 districts of the Presidency was 1,078 at the end of the year 1912–13.

51. *Tank-bed cultivation.*—There was not much demand for tank-bed cultivation in most districts apparently owing to the favourable character of the season. Such cultivation existed to a small extent in seven districts only, North Arcot, Trichinopoly, Madura, Tinnevely, Kurnool, Salem and Coimbatore. In the first named district, permission was accorded by the Collector in respect of three tanks in the Cheyyar taluk. There was, however, unauthorized cultivation in one tank in the Walaja taluk and in one other in the Tiruvannāmalai taluk. In these two cases the crop was either destroyed by village officers or the cultivation was penalized. In Trichinopoly, there were five applications for such cultivation. Two of them were rejected for the reason that cultivation had preceded sanction. In Madura, permission was given in three cases involving the cultivation of 10.81 acres with cucumber. In Tinnevely, permission was granted in a single case where 33.45 acres were cultivated by 131 persons with cucumber and *pagal* (bitter gourd). Before the crops yielded, supply was received in the tank and the yield was consequently poor. In none of the above cases were the tanks found to be injuriously affected.

In the districts of Kurnool, Salem and Coimbatore unauthorized cultivation was resorted to. In the first two districts it was penalized while, in Coimbatore, the crops were ordered to be removed on pain of destruction. An experiment was however tried in Coimbatore with cucumber on 4.26 acres in three tanks with the beneficial result that weeds and obnoxious vegetation were removed to a certain extent.

EXTRACTS FROM THE DISTRICT REPORTS.

1. GANJAM.

(N. MACMICHAEL, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

17. CORRECTIVE PROCESS AND SALE FOR ARREARS OF REVENUE.—In the number of demand and sale notices issued there was a decrease of 251 and 338 respectively. There was an increase of 212 in the case of distraint notices. The decrease in the demand and sale notices was due to the favourable character of the season. The slight increase in distraint notices was due to prompt action on the part of the taluk officers in the collection of revenue. Though distraint had to be made in the case of 1,316 defaulters for an arrear of Rs. 32,159 no personal property was sold during the year. Real property of 11 defaulters was sold for an arrear of Rs. 1,190, the extent involved being 53 acres dry and 26 acres wet. Of the area sold, acres 4, 10, 21 and 1, of wet land, and acres 1, 16, 32 and 4, of dry land belong to Berhampur, Chatrapur, Chicacole and Goomsur taluks respectively. No lands were bought in by Government for want of bidders.

26. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE ASSISTANT AND SUB-COLLECTOR OFFICES.—Messrs. Bhole, Rutherford and Graham knew Telugu and Uriya well. Vernacular petitions presented in person are read over to them and orders are usually passed then and there. Endorsements on petitions are generally given in the language of the petition. The Sub-Collector, Berhampur, has been insisting on Uriya being used to a greater extent than it was before. The Assistant Collector Mr. Arndt appeared in July for the Telugu lower standard examination and the results have not yet been announced.

32. (a) RELATION OF LANDLORD AND TENANT IN LARGE ZAMINDARIES.—The relations between the zamindars and tenants are on the whole satisfactory except in Mandasa, Biridi, and Palur. Even in these three estates the relations are not so strained as before and there has been some change for the better during the fasli.

(b) SELLING OF OCCUPANCY RIGHT TO NON-CULTIVATING CLASSES.—No general tendency has been noticed on the part of the ryots to sell their occupancy rights to non-cultivating classes but there is a tendency for those who have made their money in trade to invest it in land. In the Berhampur, Chicacole and Chatrapur taluks, in very few cases, occupancy rights were purchased by capitalists but these alienations are not proceeding on any considerable scale.

33. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—Sub-letting is chiefly resorted to by the non-agricultural classes, by those engaged in professions other than agriculture, and by the owners of large landed property. It is reported to be on the increase.

34. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION.—There was no special legislation during the year that affected the people generally. The Madras Land Encroachment Act (Act III of 1905) and the Madras Estates Land Act (Act I of 1908) worked smoothly during the year. No special difficulties of any kind have been reported.

2. VIZAGAPATAM.

(L. T. HARRIS, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

17. PROCESSES UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—Jamabandi statement No. 8-A gives details of the coercive processes employed in the realization of the Government dues under Act II of 1864. The following table compares the processes of each kind issued during the fasli with those of the previous fasli:—

The increase under demand notices is comparatively slight and calls for no remarks. The decrease in the distraint or attachment notices is due to favourable character of the year.

18. SALE NOTICES.—The number of sale notices issued during the year was 103 against 111 in the previous year. The decrease was very small.

27. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE ASSISTANT AND HEAD ASSISTANT COLLECTORS' OFFICES.—Messrs. F. W. R. Robertson, R. F. B. L. Guppy, J. I. Smith, A. C. Duff and D. G. Bles worked in the district during the year. All of them disposed of their office work in a competent manner and have a fair knowledge of the vernaculars.

34. RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT.—The relations between landholders and ryots were satisfactory.

35. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—Sub-letting is generally resorted to by non-agricultural pattadars. The practice is not on the increase.

37. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—During the year there was no special legislation that affected the people generally. The Madras Land Encroachment Act and the Estates Land Act are better understood by the people and are working smoothly.

3. GODAVARI.

(E. B. ELWIN, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

3. The river Godavari began to rise on the 1st July 1912 and the highest flood was 14·2 feet over the crest of the anikat on the 9th August 1912. This was higher than that of previous year which was 12·5 feet on 27th September 1911 and was about 2·5 feet below the maximum flood level of 17 feet over the anikat crest on 2nd October 1891.

19. COERCIVE PROCESS.—The processes of all kinds issued numbered 229 against 275 of the previous year. The attachments and sales of moveable and immoveable property under Act II of 1864 during the current and previous faslis are compared below :—

There was no land bought in by Government as there were no land sales for arrears of revenue during the fasli. There is a slight improvement in the number of processes issued. The major portion of this number was contributed by the Tahsildar of Amalapur whose attention has been drawn to the necessity of issuing notices only in those cases where it is absolutely necessary.

27. VERNACULAR KNOWLEDGE OF CIVILIAN ASSISTANTS.—Mr. E. A. Harvey was in charge of Bhadrachalam division during the whole of the fasli under report. He passed the higher standard in Telugu in July 1911 and has an adequate knowledge of the language. Mr. F. G. Butler was Assistant to the Collector until 23rd April 1913, the date on which he proceeded on leave. He passed the lower standard in Telugu in January 1913 and had acquired a fair knowledge of the language. Mr. H. S. Shield was in charge of Rajahmundry division from 24th June 1912 to 21st October 1912. He passed the higher standard in Telugu in July 1912.

33. The additional information called for in Board's Proceedings No. 321, dated 24th August 1904, is given below :—

(a) THE RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IN LARGE ZAMINDARI AREAS.—In this district, the large zamindaris are Pittapur, Kottam, Bhadrachalam, and Gopalpur. The relations existing between the landlords and tenants continued to be satisfactory on the whole. The proprietor of Bhadrachalam did not visit his estate which is regrettable. The superior proprietor of Nugur also continued to be an absentee landlord. Landlords do not generally resort to coercive processes and most of the suits filed by them are for the recovery of arrears of rent.

(b) GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—The growth of sub-letting continues to be steady and is resorted to by non-agricultural landowners such as Brahmans, Vaisyas, absentee landowners and landowners engaged in professions other than agriculture, whose interest in the land is confined to leasing it out to suitable tenants. The agricultural classes, viz., Kshatriyas and Sudras, cultivate their own lands.

(c) THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—In the year under report there was no new legislation affecting the people generally.

4. KISTNA.

(J. M. TURING, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

15. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—The number of coercive processes of each kind issued during the year under report is shown below :—

The large decrease is due to prompter steps having been taken to collect the revenue without unnecessarily issuing processes and in part no doubt to a favourable season. Out of an extent of 1,434 acres sold for arrears of revenue an extent of 440 acres was purchased by Government for want of bidders and the rest was purchased by private individuals.

25. RELATIONS BETWEEN THE LANDLORDS AND TENANTS.—I do not regard these relations as fully satisfactory at present. Act I of 1908 has destroyed the subservience of the tenants to their landlords, an inevitable result and one by no means to be deplored. Temporarily, however, there is continual litigation between a certain percentage of tenants and their landlords and this condition of things is likely to continue for some years to come. In the zamindaris of North Vallur and Challapalli, I believe, the relations between landlord and tenant to be decidedly strained.

27. THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There was no special legislation during the year that affected the people generally. The Estates Land Act of 1908 is working fairly satisfactorily but it will be several years before the many doubtful points arising out of it are satisfactorily settled.

28. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—It is believed that there is no marked increase in sub-letting.

30. VERNACULAR KNOWLEDGE OF CIVILIAN ASSISTANTS.—All the Sub-Collectors who worked in the district during the fasli had an adequate knowledge of Telugu. Mr. F. H. Senneek, Assistant Collector, joined the district only in January 1913 and he has not yet passed the vernacular test.

5. GUNTUR.

(J. N. ROY, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

23. PARTICULARS OF COERCIVE PROCESSES EMPLOYED IN THE REALIZATION OF GOVERNMENT DEMAND UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—The subjoined statement shows the number of processes of each kind issued during the fasli under report and the previous fasli :—

There has been a progressive decrease in recent years in the total number of processes issued and the number in the year under report shows a further decline.

36. VERNACULAR KNOWLEDGE OF THE CIVILIANS.—Mr. Gharpurey can talk fairly fluently in Telugu.

37. THE RELATION BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS.—There are no zamindari estates in the district except a portion of the Venkatagiri estate situated in the Ongole division. The relation between the zamindar and his tenants in these villages continues satisfactory.

38. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI VILLAGES.—The practice of sub-letting seems to be on the increase in the delta taluks. It does not prevail to the same extent in the upland taluks.

40. EFFECTS OF RECENT LEGISLATION.—Act III of 1905 is working smoothly and there have been no other recent enactments calling for notice.

6. NELLORE.

(Rao Bahadur T. BAGHAVIAH, Esq., B.A., Collector.)

20. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—The number of demand notices followed by sales was 170 against 281 in the previous year. The fall is due to greater ease in collection which is the result of the high prices fetched by agricultural produce which in this district consists mostly of food-grains. Further details are furnished in the enclosed statements (M) and (N).

30. THE RELATION BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT IN THE LARGER ZAMINDARIS.—The management of the Venkatagiri estate continued to be on the whole efficient and the relations between the Maharaja and his tenants were not less cordial than in the previous years. A Government official was appointed Tahsildar of the Pamur estate now under the management of the Raja Narasingarji of Hyderabad, and the administration of the estate is improving. The relation between the landlords and tenants in that estate is reported to be amicable. Chundi is under the management of an Estate Collector and Muthyalapad is being managed well.

31. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI VILLAGES.—The petty landholders among the agricultural classes continue to cultivate their lands themselves but the larger ones among them have of necessity to sub-let portions of their holdings. This tendency is perceptibly growing in the delta tracts of Nellore and Kovur taluks where tenants are not wanting. Non-agricultural landholders continue to sub-let their holdings. In the upland taluks, many landholders of the latter class are forced to cultivate their lands themselves for want of tenants or to finance farm servants and share the produce with them. Sub-letting is not in the increase except in the delta tracts.

33. THE EFFECT OF THE RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—The provisions of the Madras Estates Land Act which alone of the recent Acts affects the masses, are being understood more and more. The Limited Proprietors' Act of 1911 finds favour with managers and mortgagees of estates. With the recent legislation of a political character such as the Seditious Meetings Act, the Explosives Act and the Press Act, the masses in this district do not concern themselves. No prosecutions under the Press Act were instituted during the year.

34. VERNACULAR LANGUAGE OF CIVILIANS.—The only Civilian division in the district is Gudur. It was presided over by a Civilian Officer during the second half of the year. He passed the prescribed test in Telugu and was able to converse with the ryots in that language.

7. CUDDAPAH.

(J. F. BRYANT, Esq., M.A., I.C.S., Collector.)

13. PROCESSES UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—Statement No. 8 shows the particulars of coercive processes issued. The following abstract compares the number of processes of each kind issued during the years 1321 and 1322:—

There was appreciable decrease under all heads during the year under report. Out of 4,497 defaulters whose property was attached, 2,554 or 57 per cent. paid the arrears before sale notices were issued. The percentage in fasli 1321 was 60. The number of persons whose personal property was sold was 60 against 63 in the previous year, while those whose real property was sold fell from 345 in the previous year to 260 in the current year, a noticeable decrease occurring in Rayachoti taluk on account of the favourable season. Immoveable property of the estimated value of Rs. 5,491 was sold for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rs. 1,863 against Rs. 10,864 and 3,555 respectively in the preceding year. Dry lands purchased by private individuals fetched on an average Rs. 2-11-0 per acre while the wet ones fetched Rs. 13-4-0 against Rs. 14 and Rs. 16 respectively of last year. One thousand three hundred and thirty acres of dry and 130 acres of wet lands were sold during the year against 2,203 and 183 respectively in the preceding fasli. Out of 1,330 acres of dry land, 443 acres were bought in by Government for want of bidders. The greater part of the area relates to Pullampet, Jammalamadugu and Rayachoti where there is a large area of land for which there is no demand on account of the poverty of the soil. Of the land sold and bought in by Government in this and in the previous years, 145 acres were resold and fetched Rs. 70.

17. VERNACULAR KNOWLEDGE OF CIVILIAN DIVISIONAL OFFICERS.—There was no Civilian Divisional Officer in the district during the year.

18. RELATIONS BETWEEN THE LANDLORDS AND TENANTS.—Call for no special remarks.

19. SUB-LETTING.—The practice is not on the increase.

20. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION.—There is nothing to be mentioned in particular in this connection.

The Estates Land Act is not extensively applied in this district. The Land Encroachment Act is being worked without hardship. The rules relating to "Irregular Irrigation" are being worked with moderation.

8. ANANTAPUR.

(I. MACIVER, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

17. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE SUB-COLLECTOR'S OFFICE.—Mr. R. H. Courtenay, who is in charge of the Penukonda division, is well acquainted with Telugu, and Telugu petitions were read aloud to him. The correspondence to and from the taluk offices continues to be carried on in English.

23. RELATION OF LANDLORD AND TENANT IN THE LARGER ZAMINDARIS.—There are no such zamindaris in this district.

24. THE GROWTH OF THE SUB-LETTING IN THE RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—This practice is not on the increase in this district.

25. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE AND THE RELATIONS OF THE PEOPLE TO GOVERNMENT.—No enactment passed during the year under report had any marked effect on the people of the district.

9. BELLARY.

(A. F. G. MOSCARDI, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

11. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—Enclosure A to statement No. 8 exhibits the particulars of processes issued. There was a decrease in the number of defaulters whose personal property was attached and sold while the number of defaulters whose real property had to be sold rose from 81 to 143. The increase was mainly in Hospet taluk and the Tahsildar has been called upon to explain this.

21. EXTENT TO WHICH ASSISTANT AND SUB-COLLECTORS PASSED ORDERS ON ENGLISH ABSTRACTS PREPARED BY CLERKS.—The Civilian's division was mostly in charge of Mr. T. J. Tasker. Mr. G. H. Jackson was in charge of the head-quarters division for sometime and passed the lower standard in Telugu. He has since passed the higher standard in the same language.

23. RELATION OF LANDLORD AND TENANT.—There are no zamindaris in this district. The relations between landlord and tenants in whole inam villages were quite harmonious except that the ryots of shrotriem Kodihalli village in Harpanahalli taluk complained to the Revenue officers that the shrotriemdar has not been respecting their rights and allowing them to enjoy their lands according to well-established usage. They want their lands to be surveyed. The matter is awaiting the organization of a party for surveying shrotriem villages—vide B.P. No. 135, dated 30th March 1911. But final orders have not yet been received.

24. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI VILLAGES.—There was no noticeable increase in sub-letting. The Divisional officers of Bellary and Adoni report that landholders prefer to cultivate the lands themselves in view of the increased income on account of the rise in the price of food-grains and cotton. But where the system still continues the rentals have risen.

27. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There were no special legislative measures during the year except that Government in their order No. 684, Revenue, dated 7th March 1913, communicated with B.P. No. 71, dated 17th March 1913, ordered that the question of the feasibility or necessity of giving previous intimation of the intention to levy enhanced water-cess for the irregular use of Government water to ryots should be given a practical trial.

10. KURNOOL.

(E. S. LLOYD, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

27. PROCESS UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—Statement No. 8 gives the particulars of the coercive processes issued under Act II of 1864.

44. RELATION BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT.—There is no tension between landlord and tenants.

45. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI VILLAGES.—As usual this is resorted to by non-agricultural classes, viz., Brahmans, Komities, traders and absentee landowners. No marked variation as compared with the previous years is apparent.

47. THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There was no special legislation during the year that affected the people in general. The Criminal Tribes Act has been extended to three classes of criminal tribes in the district, viz., Donga Waddars, Donga Erikalas and Donga Dasaries, and this has relieved the people of much anxiety. No new rural societies have been registered during the year under Co-operative Societies Act.

11. MADRAS.

(R. F. AUSTIN, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

7. COERCIVE PROCESSES AND SALES FOR ARREARS OF REVENUE.—The number of distraint warrants issued was 26,537 against 25,419 in the previous fasli. Personal property was distrained in 43 cases for arrears amounting to Rs. 394 as against 71 cases for an arrear of Rs. 1,007 in the previous fasli. Distrained property was sold in four cases only for an arrear of Rs. 27. Lands were attached in 50 cases against 13 in the previous fasli, but in all except one the arrears due were paid before the property was brought to sale.

12. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There has not been during the fasli under report any important legislation affecting the population of the district.

12. CHINGLEPUT.

(S. P. RICE, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

18. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—The following abstract compares the processes issued during the year under report with those of the previous year:—

The decrease in the number of processes issued is due to the greater scrutiny exercised over the lists of defaulters prepared by the village officers and to the adoption of coercion only in such cases in which difficulties were anticipated in the matter of collection.

29. JUNIOR CIVILIANS.—KNOWLEDGE OF VERNACULARS.—Mr. F. W. Stewart was in the district until December 1912. Mr. Todhunter reported on his progress up to 30th June 1912. As I have never seen this officer I regret I can give no opinion of his attainments.

30. THE RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IN LARGER ZAMINDARIES.—There has been no material change in the relations between landlords and tenants during the year under report. Under the Madras Estates Land Act I of 1908, 939 suits were instituted during the year under report against 927 in the previous year.

13. CHITTOOR.

(A. FOTHERINGHAM, Esq., I.C.S., Acting Collector.)

8. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—The figures showing the number of processes issued during the fasli are compared below with those relating to the preceding fasli:—

The increase in the number of processes issued is chiefly due to the growing tendency among the ryots to defer payments of kist till demands are actually brought to their doors. The issue of processes was limited, as far as possible, to cases where, without them, collection was considered difficult. 13. KNOWLEDGE OF VERNACULAR BY CIVILIANS.—Mr. Souter, Acting Sub-Collector of Madanapalle sub-division, reports that he is able to dispose of the vernacular correspondence himself. Chandragiri division was in charge of an officer of the Provincial service since Mr. Leach's transfer to the Settlement Party at Madanapalle.

17. LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IN ZAMINDARIES.—That the relation between the landlords and tenants in zamindaries is not altogether amicable, may be seen from the large number of summary suits filed, and it is not likely to be improved so long as the main estates are being bought up by petty landholders who are not looked up to by the ryots as their hereditary zamindar. It cannot be said, however, that the mortgagees are more favourably regarded. During the year under report, one village of the Kalahasti estate was sold for realization of arrears of peshkash.

18. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—There was no noticeable change in this direction.

19. ACT III OF 1905.—The provisions of the Act were enforced as occasion arose. As yet there has only been one suit filed against eviction, and this was dismissed.

14. ARCOT, NORTH.

(N. E. MARJORIBANKS, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

13. KNOWLEDGE OF VERNACULAR BY CIVILIANS.—Mr. Sykes continued in the district throughout the year and in charge of Tirupattūr division. He reports that every petitioner is required when he presents his petition to state his request orally and that the contents of the petition are verified with the oral statement by a clerk if one is at hand or by himself if none is present. If an order can be passed at once it is done and communicated to the petitioner before he leaves and if the petition is unimportant it is lodged. If, however, the petition is important or if a reference to previous papers is required, it is sent into the office with an order or with an office-note by the Divisional officer written on it.

18. RELATION BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT.—Kangundi and Arni are the only considerable estates in the district: the former continued under the management of the Court of Wards. Besides these there are some mittas in Tirupattūr and Arkonam taluks. The relations between landlord and tenants in these estates call for no special notice.

19. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACTS.—Sub-letting is as usual confined to non-agricultural classes such as Brahmans and Vaisyas and absentee land-owners, most of whom are merchants, vakils or officials. Large landholders also sub-let portions of their holdings in some cases and the tendency is said to be on the increase particularly in Tirupattūr taluk. As observed in the report of last year, investments in land are steadily increasing of late tending to a gradual rise in the value of agricultural land.

20. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION.—There has been nothing noteworthy in the administration of Act I of 1908 (the Madras Estates Land Act). The general circulars issued last year pointing out the necessity of confining notice and action under Act III of 1905 (the Madras Land Encroachment Act) to real encroachments established with reference to the survey record of measurements are being followed by the subordinate revenue officers and the practice of acceptance as encroachments whatever the karuams reported as such is gradually disappearing as is evident from the large reduction both in the extent and the amount of penal charge levied for such occupation during the year.

15. ARCOT, SOUTH.

(M. AZIZ-UD-DIN SAHIB BAHADUR, Khan Bahadur, I.S.O., Collector.)

13. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—Total number of processes of each kind issued in faslis 1321 and 1322 is given below. There was decrease both under attachment and sales; but the increase under No. 1 demand notices is rather large. The increase is observed chiefly in the Cuddalore taluk. I have called on the Tahsildar to explain the increase and will report the result on receipt.

22. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE OF COVENANTED DIVISIONAL OFFICERS.—The Covenanted Civilian who worked in this district was Mr. Alexander Fotheringham. He was in charge of the Tindivanam sub-division from 22nd October 1912 to 3rd February 1913. He was able to speak Tamil fairly well and could read Tamil petitions written legibly.

29. RELATION OF LANDLORD AND TENANT IN LARGE ZAMINDARI AREAS.—There are no large zamindaris in this district. The relation between landlord and tenants in other estates continued to be satisfactory.

30. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWARI TRACT.—The sub-letting continued to be resorted to by absentee owners as usual. Resident ryots who own large extent of lands find it necessary to sub-let portions of their lands owing to the prohibitive cost of labour.

31. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—No remarks.

16. TANJORE.

(R. B. WOOD, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

16. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—Statement 8-A shows the particulars of coercive processes employed for the realisation of the Government revenue during the fasli 1322. The following extract shows the total number of processes issued under each head:—

There has been a decrease in all the taluks except Nannilam, Mannargudi and Pattukkottai. The increase in these taluks is explained to be due to the general inclination on the part of the ryots to postpone payment till the date of the second remittance of each kist month. But I do not accept this explanation, as this tendency is not peculiar to these three taluks. As a matter of fact, the increase in Pattukkottai and Nannilam is very moderate. The large increase in Mannargudi is probably due to the new Tahsildar who has been away from revenue work for some years. His attention is being called to the point.

17. DISTRAINT OR ATTACHMENT.—The annexed statement shows the number of defaulters whose property was attached in fasli 1322 and the number of cases in which it was found necessary to issue sale notices as compared with the previous fasli:—

Land of an aggregate estimated value of Rs. 219 was sold for arrears of Rs. 141, the amount realised being Rs. 288. The sale-proceeds represent thirty times the taram assessment in the case of "dry" and eight times in respect of "wet" lands.

25. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE HEAD ASSISTANT AND THE ASSISTANT COLLECTORS' OFFICES.—There is no vernacular official correspondence and during most of the year there were no European Divisional officers. Messrs. C. G. Austin and G. T. Boag and B. C. Smith were at Kumakōnam and Negapatam for parts of the fasli and Mr. T. Austin was Assistant Collector all the fasli. Petitions were as a rule read to the officers when presented in person. Petitions received by post, if not read in original by the addressee, are submitted with an English abstract prepared in the office.

28. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT IN LARGE ZAMINDARIS.—Generally good. There has been no noticeable feature of any strained relationship between them.

29. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR TRACTS.—Sub-letting is widely resorted to in this district by absentee pattadars and large landholders who are tending to prefer residence in the large towns, instead of living on their own lands in their villages. Even so, many of them continue to cultivate their lands by their farm agents, though it is probable that the renting of lands is increasing.

30. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATURE ON THE PEOPLE.—The Madras Estates' Land Act has been in force from fasli 1314. Landlords and tenants seem to understand the provisions fairly well.

17. TRICHINOPOLY.

(L. E. BUCKLEY, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

14. COERCIVE PROCESSES AND SALES FOR ARREARS OF REVENUE.—There was a considerable increase in the number of demand notices issued, though there was an appreciable decrease in the other kinds of notices issued during the year. The figures of the last three faslis are compared below :—

The increase in the number of demand notices is large in Ariyalur and Trichinopoly divisions. This is due to the fact that, owing to the season, being not wholly favourable the ryots were not punctual in the payment of Government dues. The issue of a large number of notices has resulted in the reduction of arrears at the end of the fasli. The extent sold during the year for arrears of revenue was 72 acres of dry land assessed at Rs. 61. The number of defaulters whose personal and real property was attached was 1,494 and 122, respectively. Personal property was sold in six cases and real property in 12 cases.

18. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE OF THE ASSISTANT COLLECTOR.—Mr. A. J. King was Assistant Collector of the district during the fasli. He has since been transferred from this district. He has passed the lower standard in Tamil and has a fair knowledge of that language. He was placed in charge of the Trichinopoly division in January last.

19. RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDHOLDERS AND TENANTS IN LARGE ZAMINDARIS.—The Zamindar of Marungapuri is assisted by a manager whose services have been lent to him with the sanction of Government. He and his tenants are generally on good terms. The relationship between landlord and tenant in Udaiyarpalaiyam is very strained. Under the Estates Land Act, the Zamindar is claiming rent on uncultivated occupied lands on which payment has not hitherto been paid; in consequence there have been innumerable suits. The Kadavur Zamindar continues under the management of the Court of Wards. It is a very heavily encumbered estate. The relationship between the Court of Wards and the tenants is on the whole satisfactory.

20. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR TRACT.—Sub-letting is as usual chiefly resorted to by the non-agricultural classes, by those engaged in professions other than agriculture and by the owners of large landed property.

21. THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION.—There was no legislation during the year that affected the people generally. There is much litigation under the Estates Land Act in Udaiyarpalaiyam.

18. MADURA.

(A. R. KNAPP, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

14. PROCESSES UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—Statement No. 8-A shows the particulars of coercive processes issued for the realization of Government dues under Act II of 1864. The following abstract compares the number of processes of each kind issued during the fasli with the figures of the preceding fasli :—

Item (a).—No explanation of the increase in the number of demands is forthcoming. The point will be further investigated.

Item (b).—The number of attachment notices decreased from 5,631 to 4,826, but the number of defaulters (373), whose personal property was distrained, was not proportionate to the number of those (4,452), whose real property was attached. The disproportion is ascribed to the large number of non-resident pattadars chiefly in the tracts affected by the Periyar.

Item (c).—Of 4,452 defaulters whose real property was attached, 4,204 paid their arrears before sale. Of 532 acres (dry) and 149 acres (wet) sold for the recovery of arrears, 205 acres (dry) and 24 acres (wet) were purchased by Government for want of bidders. The amount realized by the sale of the real property was Rs. 14,553 and that by sale of personal property was Rs. 24. The number of defaulters whose property, personal and real, was sold, was 251 against 331 in the previous fasli. The percentage of actual sales to sale notices was 5.3 against 5.8 in fasli 1321 and that of the number of defaulters whose property was actually sold to the total number of pattas was 0.11 against 0.15 in the previous fasli. The percentage of the extent of lands bought in by Government to the extent of lands sold was 34 against 30.83 in the preceding fasli.

22. RELATIONSHIP OF LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IN LARGE ZAMINDARIS.—The relationship between landlords and tenants in the zamindaris in the district continued, on the whole, to be harmonious. The Divisional Officer, Usilampatti, states that the friction reported last year as existing between the zamindars and tenants in the zamindaris in the Periyakulam taluk on account of irregularity in the issue of pattas and of the levy of enhanced charge for garden crops raised on dry lands with the aid of water from private wells cannot be said to have subsided; the suits filed under the Estates Land Act have not been finally disposed of by the Appellate Courts. It is reported that the relationship between the proprietors and tenants in Kannivadi zamindari, Dindigul taluk, is anything but cordial, but that there was less friction between them during the fasli under report than in the previous fasli.

23. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR TRACTS.—Sub-letting is, chiefly, resorted to by vakils and traders who have invested money in the purchase of lands in the Periyar area and by the absentee landowners. No indications have been brought to notice of any increase of sub-letting in the year under report.

25. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—WORKING OF ACT I OF 1908.—The number of suits and applications received during the year under report was 2,134 and 10,104 against 1,886 and 4,138 respectively in the previous year.

32. JUNIOR CIVILIANS.—KNOWLEDGE OF VERNACULARS.—Mr. M. McGilligan, Assistant Collector, joined the district on 1st January 1913. He has passed the Lower Standard with Tamil as his first language, in July last.

19. RAMNAD.

(A. R. LOFTUS-TOTTENHAM, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

2. WORKING OF ACT I OF 1908.—There was a large increase in the number of suits and applications filed and disposed of during the fasli as compared with the previous fasli. The increase was mainly in the Ramnad division and it is attributed to the large number of suits under section 77 of the Act filed by the lessees of the Ramnad zamindari who have surrendered their leases to the Raja but retained the right to realise arrears of rent. The increase in the number of suits disposed of is due to the employment of a Special Deputy Collector from 5th December 1912. He had disposed of 2,745 suits up to 30th June 1913.

3. RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS.—The Divisional Officer, Ramnad reports that feelings are strained between the Raja of Ramnad and his ryots because the Raja wishes to charge rent on waste lands and on palmyrahs that are not actually tapped. This dispute has been simmering for some time. The Divisional Officer, Sattur, reports that the relations between the zamindars and their tenants in his division were not cordial. The Divisional Officer, Devakottai, is silent on the subject. From my personal experience I offer

the following remarks: "The relations between the European lessees of Sivaganga zamindari and their tenants are generally cordial though there is an important point in dispute in some of the villages bordering on the Vaigai in regard to the correct charge on Vanpayir lands, i.e., wet lands cultivated with garden crops."

16. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN THE RAIYATWAR TRACTS.—I have nothing new to report on this subject.

19. WORKING OF ACT III OF 1905.—I have inspected a large number of encroachments. Whether the working of the Act causes hardship to the ryots or not depends on the manner in which it is worked. In my opinion it is often worked with very little discrimination and on hard and fast red-tape principles. I think it was a great mistake to demarcate so many paths and odais passing through patta land which were only marked in the plan before. Neither streams nor bandies will keep to the demarcated course, and usually it does not matter a bit where the path or odai is within a chain or so.

20. TINNEVELLY.

(G. H. B. JACKSON, Esq., I.C.S., Collector.)

23. PROCESS UNDER MADRAS ACT II OF 1864.—(a) The table below compares the figures with those of the previous year:—

The variations are slight. No land was bought in by Government for want of bidders.

37. BOARD'S PROCEEDINGS NO. 321 (SETT.), DATED 24TH AUGUST 1904.—(1) No complaints against the working of the Estates Land Act have been brought to notice. The relation between landlords and tenants in the larger zamindaris continued to be harmonious. In the zamindari of Pudur, the Tahsildar reports, the landlord and the tenants are not friendly.

(2) GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR VILLAGES.—The general practice in the district is to sublet.

(4) THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—Act III of 1905 and Act I of 1908 continue to work satisfactorily.

28. VERNACULAR KNOWLEDGE OF THE CIVILIANS.—The Civilian officers in the district possess a fair knowledge of Tamil.

13. COERCIVE PROCESSES AND SALES FOR ARREARS OF REVENUE.—Full particulars of the coercive processes employed for the realization of the Government demand under Act II of 1864 are given in the enclosure to statement No. 8. The subjoined table compares the processes issued during the year under report with those of the preceding two faslis:—

As compared with the previous year, there is a decrease in the number of demand notices and an increase in the other two kinds of notices. There is however an increase in the number of processes of all kinds when compared with fasli 1320. The taluk of Kollegal accounts for a large number of attachment and sale notices. The percentage borne by the number of defaulters to that of pattadars is 0.03 against 0.01 in the previous year and 0.004 in fasli 1320. In 16 cases, personal property for an arrear of Rs. 164 was attached against eight for an arrear of Rs. 92 in the last fasli and 4 for an arrear of Rs. 72 in fasli 1320. The real property of 22 defaulters for an arrear of Rs. 221 was attached against 16 for an arrear of Rs. 150 in the last fasli and 9 for Rs. 62 in fasli 1320. In no case was the personal property sold, while the real property of 16 defaulters for an arrear of Rs. 66 was sold. The sale in one case has been cancelled. The other sales all occurred in Kollegal taluk. Out of the lands sold 14 acres in Kollegal were bought in by Government for want of bidders, the remaining extent of 59 acres having been purchased by private individuals.

6. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE REVENUE DIVISIONAL OFFICE.—Mr. H. H. Burkitt, I.C.S., was in charge of the Coonoor division during the fasli from 6th July 1912. He is not very conversant with Tamil, but the correspondence with the taluk officers continued to be carried on in English, as usual.

7. RELATIONS BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANT IN LARGER ZAMINDARIES.—There are no zamindari tracts in this district.

8. SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR AREAS.—The practice of sub-letting continues to prevail in the Gudalur taluk, and to a very limited extent in the Municipal towns of Ootacamund and Coonoor.

10. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There was no special legislation during the year which affected the people of the district. The Madras Land Encroachment Act III of 1905 worked smoothly. The provisions of the Madras Estates Land Act of 1908 were not resorted to.

During the year under report, two societies, as detailed in the margin, were registered under the Co-operative Societies' Act.

Processes were as usual served partly by a special agency in the Hōsūr taluk and by the village agency alone in the other taluks. The large increase in the demand notice is chiefly due to an abnormal increase in the Atur taluk from 405 to 13,472. The Tahsildar has been called on to explain this. On receipt of the reply a further report will be submitted. The number of processes served by the special agency was 375 against 367 in the preceding year. The extent of lands sold for arrears of revenue and bought in by Government was 86 acres against 182 acres in the previous year.

20. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN DIVISIONAL OFFICES.—During the year under report, Mr. S. Burn was in charge of the Hōsūr Division. He can read, write and speak Tamil, in which he has passed the Higher Standard, and he understands Telugu fairly well. Malayalam is his third language, but he reports that he has had no occasion to use it for the last four years.

24. EFFECTS OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—Madras Act III of 1905 and Act I of 1908 seem to be working satisfactorily. The recent enactments in regard to the extension of the elective franchise in the Legislative Council seem to be appreciated.

25. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IN LARGE ZAMINDARIES.—There are no large zamindaris in the district. In Palaiyams and Mittas, the relationship is, on the whole, satisfactory.

26. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR VILLAGES.—There is no marked tendency, one way or the other. The system is useful for large land owners, absentee pattadars and landholders with other professions.

13. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—There was a decrease under all kinds of coercive processes issued during the year. Less moveable property was sold in the year under report, but the extent of real property sold was greater. Real property was only sold when the defaulter possessed no moveable property to be proceeded against, or when they were absent from the district. The greater portion (58.20 acres) of the extent sold was purchased by Government as the lands were situated in a village at the foot of the Western Ghats and had lain fallow for some time.

20. VERNACULAR CORRESPONDENCE IN THE SUB-COLLECTOR'S OFFICE.—Sub-Collector Mr. G. W. Wells reports that he, as well as his predecessor M.R.Ry. S. Srinivasa Rao Pantulu Garu, generally disposed of petitions and other papers in vernacular on being read over, but that petitions received by post which contained intricate and important matters were put up with abstracts in English.

26. POINTS REFERRED TO IN PARAGRAPH 4 OF THE BOARD'S PROCEEDINGS No. 321, DATED 24TH AUGUST 1904.—The reports from the Tahsildars and Divisional Officers show that there has been no appreciable increase in sub-letting during the year under report, but the tendency is in the other direction.

There has been no recent legislation affecting the people of this district.

11. PROCESSES UNDER ACT II OF 1864.—Statement No. 8-A gives particulars of the processes issued. The increase of 493 in the number of processes issued during the year as compared with the previous year is less than 10 per cent. and calls for no special remarks.

15. RELATION BETWEEN LANDLORD AND TENANTS IN ZAMINDARI TRACTS.—There are no zamindaris in this district.

16. GROWTH OF SUB-LETTING IN RAIYATWAR TRACTS.—There is no change of any importance to report. A very large proportion of the cultivable lands in the district are owned by non-cultivating landlords.

19. THE EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATIONS.—There has been recently no legislation of importance to the agricultural population of this district.

25. VERNACULAR ATTAINMENTS OF PASSED ASSISTANTS, HEAD ASSISTANT COLLECTOR AND SUB-COLLECTOR.—Mr. V. P. Rao, the Sub-Collector, Tellicherry Division, is well acquainted with the vernacular and reads and disposes of vernacular petitions himself. Mr. Hall, the Sub-Collector of Palghat, is not, I think, fluent in talking. Petitions presented to him in Court are read out to him for orders. Those received by post are abstracted in English. The same practice is observed in the Malappuram Division, but Mr. Rajohns, the Sub-Collector, can understand and make himself understood in conversation.

15. VERNACULAR ATTAINMENTS.—The Assistant Collector Captain R. E. G. Berkeley, I.A., knows Tamil and Malayalam petitions are translated to him.

18. EFFECT OF RECENT LEGISLATION ON THE PEOPLE.—There were no special difficulties of any kind to be reported during the year.



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
