**REPORT ON THE RAIL AND RIVER-BORNE TRADE OF THE
PROVINCE OF SIND AND BRITISH BALUCHISTAN
FOR THE YEAR 1913-14.**

1. There were no changes in the classification of the articles which enter into the Rail and River-borne Trade of India during the year under review.

The quarterly trade figures of the Dibru Sadiya Railway, which were being submitted for incorporation in the consolidated return from 1st April 1912 by the Assam Railway and Trading Company, Dibrugarh, are now being furnished by the Chief Examiner of Accounts, Eastern Bengal State Railway, Calcutta, with effect from the quarter ending 31st March 1914.

The arrangement of blocks and the system of registration of trade remained unchanged.

GENERAL REMARKS.

2. There was an increase in mileage on the North-Western Railway of 269·23 miles during the year under review due to the opening for traffic of the undermentioned lines:—

Under the latter, the trade carried on with each other by the two blocks (1) Karachi and (2) Sind (excluding Karachi) and British Baluchistan is exhibited.

6. The total trade (both External and Internal) declined from maunds 92,932,815 and Rs. 52,45,99,182 in 1912-13 to maunds 78,181,483 and Rs. 49,50,98,449 during the year under comment, exhibiting a falling off of maunds 147 lakhs or 15 per cent. in quantity and 295 lakhs of rupees or 5 per cent. in value.

The figures are, however, larger than any of the years preceding 1912-13, when a very large trade was carried on in Barley and Wheat, owing to better crops in the Punjab and a strong demand from Europe.

It will be noticed from the above figures that the Imports into Karachi during the year under report fell from maunds 69,096,363 in 1912-13 to maunds 52,424,664, showing a contraction of maunds 16,671,699 or 24 per cent. due to smaller receipts of Grains and Seeds owing to poorer Rabi crops in the Punjab during 1912-13.

Exports, on the other hand, showed an advance of maunds 1,909,381 or 10 per cent., having risen from maunds 18,532,036 in 1912-13 to maunds 20,441,417 during the year under comment. Nearly the whole of the increase was made up by the large exports of Coal and Coke for railway purposes and Sugar. The figures are, however, below those of the year 1907-08 and 1908-09. The rainfall in Sind was considerably above the average and helped to a great extent to neutralize the bad effects of the sudden fluctuations in the levels of the inundation canals. However, in a few low-lying districts damage was caused by floods, but in others the rain saved the situation as plants were withering. The inundation may therefore be called on the whole a fair one, and the area put under cultivation was larger. In the Punjab the early cessation of the 1913 rains did not harm the winter crops but affected adversely the Rabi crops, especially Rape and Wheat, and will affect next year's figures. The inundations in the Punjab were on the whole favourable.

7. Imports from the External blocks showed a deficit of maunds 20,721,216⁶/₁₀ or 32 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 4,14,14,340 or 15 per cent. in value, having declined from maunds 64,538,007⁵/₁₀ and Rs. 26,90,58,310 in 1912-13 to maunds 43,816,791⁵/₁₀ and Rs. 22,76,47,747 in 1913-14. Comparing with the quinquennial average, there was a drop of maunds 2,919,219 or 6 per cent. in quantity and a rise of Rs. 1,79,69,758 or 8 per cent. in value.

The rise in values was due to the high prices of Hides Raw, Skins Raw Ghi and Wool during the year under comment.

8. Exports to the External blocks again showed an advance of maunds 15 lakhs or 11 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 57 lakhs or 4 per cent. in value, having risen from maunds 12,629,438 and Rs. 13,59,98,154 in 1912-13 to maunds 14,193,846 and Rs. 14,17,73,818 in 1913-14. The volume of exports during the year under notice was smaller in quantity than the year 1905-06 and 1907-08 to 1909-10, but the value is the highest yet recorded.

9. The total of the Internal trade of the Province of Sind and British Baluchistan with Karachi in 1913-14 again exhibited an increase of maunds 44 lakhs or 28 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 61 lakhs or 5 per cent. in value as compared with the figures of the year 1912-13. The imports into Karachi from Sind and British Baluchistan rose from maunds 8,409,869 and Rs. 6,55,19,649 in the last year to maunds 11,731,141³/₁₀ and Rs. 6,79,80,100 during the year under report, exhibiting an increase of maunds 33 lakhs or 39 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 24 lakhs or 3 per cent. in value. The large difference in the percentage is chiefly due to the fact that stone, a cheap article, was imported in much larger quantities. Exports also showed an advance of

11 lakhs or 15 per cent. in quantity and 37 lakhs or 6 per cent. in value as compared with the previous year. The principal articles of increase under Imports were Jowar and Bajra, Rice, Wheat, Wheat-flour, Rape and Mustard seed, and Til or Jinjili seed, with a setback in Cotton Raw, Hides and Skins Raw, Cotton seed and Wool Raw; and under Exports, Iron and Steel, Wrought, Bars, Sheets, Girders and other commercial forms of Iron and Steel, Kerosine oil, Railway plant and Rolling stock and Sugar, with a falling off in Coal and Coke, Cotton Piece-goods, Indian and Dried Fruits and Nuts.

An explanation of the causes of fluctuation in the principal commodities is given below in paras. 16, 22 and 23.

EXTERNAL TRADE.

IMPORTS.

10. The imports from the *Punjab* showed a decrease of maunds 113 lakhs or 24 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 147 lakhs or 7 per cent. in value as compared with the last year. The decrease occurred chiefly under Gram and Pulse (—605,877 maunds), Jowar and Bajra (—45,977 maunds), Wheat (—8,798,199 maunds), Wheat flour (—121,153 maunds), Gram and Pulse others (—3,924,906 maunds), Hides of Cattle Raw (—25,619 maunds), Linseed (—66445 maunds), Railway Materials others (—219,386 maunds), and Timber Unwrought (—117,485 maunds). On the other hand, there were increases under Cotton Raw (+446,773 maunds), Rice in the husk (+51,919 maunds), Rice not in the husk (+98,194 maunds), Skins Raw (+28,918 maunds), Rape and Mustard seeds (+1,995,574 maunds), and Sugar unrefined, Gur, etc., (+45,981 maunds).

11. The Imports from the *United Provinces of Agra and Oudh* also exhibited a falling off of maunds 95 lakhs or 58 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 258 lakhs or 48 per cent. in value as compared with the previous year. The decrease is chiefly noticeable under Gram and Pulse (—429,408 maunds), Jowar and Bajra (—147,312 maunds), Wheat (—5,995,501 maunds), Grain and Pulse, others (—3,348,801 maunds), Til or Jinjili (—53,621 maunds) and Oilseeds others (—27,460 maunds), with a rise in Cotton Raw (+17,242 maunds), and Rape and Mustard seeds (+546,776 maunds).

12. The Imports from *Bombay*, including the chief sea-port town, rose in quantity from maunds 55,146 to maunds 56,608 but declined in value from Rs. 14,90,723 to Rs. 11,24,422. The rise in quantity and fall in value was chiefly due to larger receipts of Grain and Pulse and Tobacco Unmanufactured and smaller imports of higher priced commodities such as Cotton Piece-goods Indian and Ghi.

13. Comparing with the year 1912-13 the imports from *Bengal*, including the Chief sea-port Calcutta, showed an improvement in quantity of maunds 25,452 but a decrease in value of Rs. 67,531 during the year under review principally due to larger imports of Coal and Coke.

14. The Import trade with *Rajputana and Central India* showed a decline of maunds 2½ lakhs or 36 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 8 lakhs or 21 per cent. in value. Gram and Pulse (—32,110 maunds), Jowar and Bajra (—6,671 maunds), Wheat (—6,884 maunds), Grain and Pulse, others (—178,791 maunds), and Ghi (—4,179 maunds) were chiefly responsible for the decline.

15. The Import trade with other blocks is too insignificant to require special mention.

16. The principal variations are explained below:—

Cotton Raw (+462,855 maunds or 17,003 tons). The increase was due to a very large area having been put under cultivation during the year under review, *viz.*, 2,052,900 acres against 1,575,201 acres. The outturn was 60 per cent. higher than in the previous year and exceeded the quinquennial and decennial averages by 82 and 89 per cent. respectively.

Gram and Pulse (—1,060,875 maunds or 39,235 tons). Demand from European countries only occurs when there is scarcity of Fodder Grain there, and as Maize and low quantity of Oats were in plentiful supply from Argentine, Russia and the Plate, the demand fell off during the year.

Jowar and Bajra (—201,242 maunds or 7,393 tons). Better crops of Jowar in Sind restricted imports.

Wheat (—14,802,024 maunds or 543,748 tons). The area put under cultivation in the Punjab was 9,289,100 acres in 1912-13 against 11,018,479 acres in 1911-12, and the outturn was accordingly less by 819,157 tons. European crops in the United States of America and Canada restricted exports to Europe from this country and hence less imports from the Punjab. Besides a large quantity was exported from the Punjab to the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh where scarcity of grain prevailed.

Grain and Pulse, others (—7,459,337 maunds or 274,016 tons). The heading chiefly consists of Barley and Maize. As regards Maize the remarks against Gram and Pulse also apply to this article. In the case of Barley, the low rates in Europe brought about the decrease.

Hides Raw (—25,734 maunds or 945 tons). The decrease was due to the fact that the year was not one of drought and Fodder was plentiful. The demand throughout the year was greater than the supply in spite of a higher range of prices.

Skins Raw (+33,661 maunds or 1,238 tons). There was a pronounced scarcity in the world's supply of raw materials and the ever-increasing demand for the finished article caused prices to rise and all available supplies were shipped to Europe and America, hence the increase in imports.

Linseed (—119,228 maunds or 4,380 tons). This seed mostly comes from the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, where a small area was put under cultivation owing to want of rain.

Rape and Mustard seed (+2,557,910 maunds or 93,965 tons). The Rabi area was smaller. The year began with a fairly even level of rates for the Rabi crop, with a tendency to rise, and the season closed with rates fairly high. The Toria crop was an excellent one, and accounts for the increase.

Til seed (—79,725 maunds or 2,929 tons). The decrease was brought about by a somewhat smaller area being put under this seed in the Punjab, *viz.*, 143,551 against 156,813 acres, Cotton having displaced it.

Ghi (—28,438 maunds or 1,045 tons). The decrease was due to plentiful local supply and also large receipts by sea from coast-ports.

Silk Raw, Indian (—4,030 maunds or 148 tons). The drop was wholly due to a fire which occurred in the Kashmir State Silk Filature Factory in August 1913. The factory was practically demolished and a large stock of cocoons and raw silk was destroyed.

Sugar Unrefined, Gur, Bab, &c. (+27,912 maunds or 1,025 tons). The rise was due to a better crop in the Punjab where a large area was put under sugarcane cultivation owing to the favourable conditions at sowing time.

Wool Raw (—3,527 maunds or 130 tons). The decrease was due to smaller receipts into Sind, while the Punjab sent a somewhat larger quantity. Although there was a demand for good Wool in Europe, prices were high and manufacturers were only buying what was necessary for immediate requirements.

EXPORTS.

17. The Export trade with the *Punjab* exhibited an advance to the extent of 1,388,984 maunds or nearly 11 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 51,06,341 or 4 per cent. in value. The increase is chiefly noticeable under

Coal and Coke (+1,232,060 maunds), Cotton Twist and Yarn Indian (+25,183 maunds), Cotton Piece-goods, European (+53,084 maunds), Other Manufactures including Hardware and Cutlery (+13,860 maunds), Marble and Stone (+654,980 maunds), Kerosene oil (+66,292 maunds), Sugar, Unrefined Gur, &c. (+15,571 maunds), and Sugar Refined (+231,493 maunds). There was, however, a decrease under Cotton Piece-goods Indian (—20,427 maunds), Dyes, others (—13,550 maunds), Rice not in the husk (—93,289 maunds), Gunny Bags and Cloth (—22,750 maunds), Iron and Steel, Wrought, Bars, Sheets, Girders, &c. (—31,968 maunds), Machinery and Millwork (—15,992 maunds), Steel Rails and Fishplates (—293,614 maunds), Sleepers and Keys of Iron and Steel (—210,858 maunds), Railway Materials, others (—77,883 maunds), and Timber, Unwrought (—117,817 maunds).

18. Exports to the *United Provinces of Agra and Oudh* again rose from maunds 624,202 and Rs. 68,93,584 in the previous year to maunds 788,754 and Rs. 72,01,071 during the year under report, showing an increase of maunds $1\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs or 26 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 3 lakhs or 4 per cent. in value. The increases were chiefly under Coal and Coke (+4,626 maunds), Jowar and Bajra (+3,179 maunds), Wheat (+5,070 maunds), Rice not in the husk (+4,274 maunds), Gram and Pulse, others (+18,528 maunds), Iron and Steel Wrought, Bars, Sheets, Girders, &c. (+43,525 maunds), Other Manufactures including Hardware and Cutlery (+4,016 maunds), Railway Materials, Steel, Rails and Fishplates (+8,094 maunds), Sugar Refined (+103,996 maunds), with a setback under Cotton Piece-goods Foreign (—6,461 maunds), Kerosene oil (—14,143 maunds), Railway Materials, others (—5,341 maunds).

19. Exports to *Bombay*, including the chief seaport town of Bombay, increased in quantity by maunds 16,697 or 7 per cent. and decreased in value by Rs. 1,27,209 or 8 per cent. during the year under report as compared with the previous year. This decrease in value was due to larger despatches of cheaper grain, Jowar and Bajra to that block (+82,672 maunds). Rice not in the husk, a dearer grain, however, showed a decline of 59,964 maunds.

20. Exports to *Rajputana and Central India* showed a falling off of 52,606 maunds or 9 per cent. in quantity and Rs. 55,771 or 1 per cent. in value. The decrease was specially noticeable under Coal and Coke (—64,371 maunds), Cotton seed (—15,961 maunds), Carriage Trucks and parts thereof (—8,959 maunds), Steel Rails and Fishplates (—91,222 maunds), and Railway Materials, others (—60,561 maunds). On the other hand, there were increases under Jowar and Bajra (+110,662 maunds). Rice not in the husk (+12,324 maunds), Gram and Pulse others (+26,126 maunds), Iron and Steel wrought Bars, Sheets, Girders, etc. (+10,713 maunds), Kerosene oil (+9,970 maunds), Locomotive Engines, and parts thereof (+8,504 maunds), Sugar Refined (+9,877 maunds), and Timber Unwrought (+1,736 maunds).

21. The Export trade with the remaining blocks is too small to call for special mention.

22. The causes of the principal variations are explained below :—

Coal and Coke for Railway purposes (+1,190,773 maunds or 43,743 tons). The increase was due to some 124,487 tons more of Coal, Coke and Patent fuel having been imported by Railway from the United Kingdom and Africa, as it was found to compete favourably with Indian during the prevalence of high rates in the early part of the year. The increase was wholly absorbed by the Punjab.

Cotton Twist and Yarn Foreign (—1,656 maunds or 61 tons) and *Twist and Yarn Indian* (+25,254 maunds or 928 tons). Foreign twist and yarn is gradually on the decline since 1908-09, being replaced by Indian. Last year Indian twist and yarn showed a decline, the figures for the previous year being the largest yet recorded. In the year under review, however, the exports to External blocks exceeded even those of the year 1911-12 and are record ones.

Cotton Piece-goods Foreign (+46,948 maunds or 1,725 tons). Trade has been fairly healthy throughout the year, though latterly the failures of several Indian banks curtailed credit and affected it. There is not much doubt that business has been overdone in certain lines, particularly in Mulls and in a lesser degree in Nainsooks.

Cotton Piece-goods Indian (—20,861 maunds or 766 tons). The fall was brought about by the smaller imports of Indian Piece-goods from Bombay by sea due to less demand from the Punjab owing to the prevalence of plague and during the latter half of the year owing to financial stringency brought about by the failure of several Swadeshi banks.

Iron and Steel wrought, Bars, Sheets, Girders and other Commercial forms of Iron and Steel (+19,884 maunds or 730 tons). The increase was due to large importations from Europe by sea owing to favourable prices and a greater demand for building and construction works.

Kerosene oil (+63,552 maunds or 2,335 tons). The increase is ascribed to larger receipts by sea of cheaper low grade oil during the year under notice.

Dried Fruits and Nuts (—10,526 maunds or 387 tons). The drop was due to a partial failure of the date crop, tightness of the money market and the disturbed state of Oman Territory whence dates are largely exported.

Sugar Refined (+351,253 maunds or 12,903 tons). The increase was due to the fact that the average prices for the year were lowest since 1907 owing to large beet crops in Europe and sugarcane crop in Java from where larger supplies were received during the year. The Indian crop in the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh (the province that grows the largest quantity of sugarcane) was smaller, namely, about two-thirds of the normal. This also helped to increase the demand for Foreign sugar.

II.—INTERNAL OR LOCAL TRADE.

23. The chief variations and their causes are given below.

IMPORTS INTO KARACHI.

Cotton Raw (—7,370 maunds or 271 tons). The area put under cultivation during the year under review was 331,642 acres against 396,375 acres and the outturn was 132,214 bales of 400 lbs. each against 123,152 bales during the previous year. Although the crop was a large one, it was held over for distant delivery, the stock in Karachi on 31st March 1914 being over and above the previous years.

Jowar and Bajra (+799,363 maunds or 29,364 tons). The jowar crop was a large one and being a cheap grain very large exports were made to Aden and Turkey Asiatic, Red Sea ports where it is reported the crops were failures. A large quantity was also exported to the United Kingdom for the first time.

Rice not in the husk (+383,762 maunds or 14,281 tons). Although the crops were about half the normal in the Hyderabad district and two-thirds elsewhere, there was an increase in imports owing to a larger demand from Ceylon, Aden and Gulf ports.

Wheat (+1,078,531 maunds or 39,620 tons). The area put under this article in Sind was some 470,873 acres in 1912-13 against 391,264 acres in 1911-12, and the outturn was 126,801 tons against 97,171 tons. The yield was 70/85 per cent. of the normal, hence the increase.

Wheat flour (+96,861 maunds or 3,558 tons). The increase was due to a greater demand from Persia and Gulf ports.

Hides Raw (—27,644 maunds or 1,015 tons). The causes mentioned in para. 16 apply here also.

Skins Raw (—12,111 maunds or 445 tons). The decrease under this head is ascribed to less mortality among the cattle owing to fodder being in plentiful supply.

Cotton seed (—480,617 maunds or 17,655 tons). There was a good cotton crop and plenty of seed available for export, but prices for local consumption were higher than the equivalent rates in England, hence the smaller imports.

Rape and Mustard seed (+22,292 maunds or 819 tons). The increase was due to good toria crop and a demand from European countries.

Tilseed (+85,018 maunds or 3,123 tons). The increase was due to better crops in Sind.

Wool Raw (—51,003 maunds or 1,874 tons). This wool is so dirty and mixed that there is little demand for it, shippers having found that it does not pay to ship to England.

EXPORTS FROM KARACHI.

Coal and Coke (—965,379 maunds or 35,463 tons). The decrease was due to the fact that the Railway obtains as little Bengal coal as possible by sea through Karachi, as it apparently finds it more profitable to get it by rail, especially for stations at a distance from Karachi.

Cotton Piece-goods Indian (—17,499 maunds or 643 tons.)

Iron and Steel wrought, Bars, Sheets, Girders, &c. (+192,690 maunds or 7,078 tons).

Kerosine oil (+37,605 maunds or 1,381 tons).
Dried Fruits and Nuts (—3,344 maunds or 123 tons).

Sugar Refined (+79,525 maunds or 2,921 tons.)

The causes assigned to these articles in para. 22 above apply here also.

Railway Carriages and Trucks (+2,466 maunds or 91 tons).

Locomotive Engines and Tenders (+51,359 maunds or 1,887 tons).

Steel Rails and Fishplates (+150,416 maunds or 5,525 tons).

Railway Materials, others (+435,504 maunds or 15,998 tons).

The increases are due to varying requirements of the railway and double line works.

III.—OTHER IMPORTANT FEATURES OF THE TRADE.

24. The trade of the sea-port town of Karachi during 1913-14 was as usual larger than that of the rest of Sind.

25. A statement showing the trade between the Punjab and Sind and British Baluchistan by the River Indus for the year 1913-14 is attached.

The total imports from the Punjab by river amounted to maunds 1,835,490 during the year under review against maunds 1,601,960 in the previous year. Out of the above, the total quantity which took the rail at Sukkur and Kotri was maunds 968,309 against maunds 421,195. The total quantity exported to the Punjab by river was maunds 248,560 during the year under comment. Of these, maunds 166,796 were sent from Karachi, and the rest, *viz.*, maunds 81,764 from Sind and British Baluchistan, against maunds 246,890 during 1912-13, out of which Karachi claimed maunds 150,896 and Sind and British Baluchistan maunds 95,994.

26. A statement showing the value rates adopted for each article for each quarter is attached as Appendix A.

NOTE.

For the purpose of the inland trade statistics, the whole of India is divided into 17 blocks, *viz.*, nine blocks representing the British Provinces—(1) Madras, (2) Bombay, (3) Sind and British Baluchistan, (4) Bengal, (5) Bihar and Orissa, (6) United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, (7) Punjab, (8) Central Provinces and Berar, and (9) Assam; four representing the Native States—(1) Rajputana and Central India, (2) Kashmir, (3) the Nizam's Territory and (4) Mysore; and four representing the chief seaport towns—(1) Madras, (2) Bombay, (3) Karachi, and (4) Calcutta. The trade of Native States which lie within the external boundaries of a British Province is included in the trade of that province. Under this arrangement of blocks, the trade exhibited under Sind and British Baluchistan represents the trade of the Province of Sind and British Baluchistan, including the Native State of Khairpur, but excluding the seaport town of Karachi, the trade of which is shown separately. Similarly the trade shown against Madras, Bombay and Bengal represents the trade of those provinces, exclusive of the seaport towns of Madras, Bombay and Calcutta respectively. The work of registering the trade is performed by the principal railway audit offices.

The required information is collected from railway invoices which show the description of goods, the places from which they are sent and at which they are delivered and their gross actual weights. The weight recorded in the tables represents net weight, which is obtained by deducting a certain percentage (which is fixed at different rates for the several classes of goods, for packing materials) from gross actual weight.

Information in respect of the import trade by rail is supplied every quarter to this office for compilation by the Examiner of Accounts, North-Western Railway, Lahore, and the Auditor, Jodhpur-Bikanir Railway, Jodhpur.

The figures of the Export trade are furnished by :—

- (1) The Examiner of Accounts, North-Western Railway, Lahore.
- (2) The Government Examiner of Accounts, Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway, Bombay.
- (3) The Examiner of Accounts, Oudh and Rohilkhand Railway, Lucknow.
- (4) The Examiner of Accounts, Eastern Bengal State Railway, Calcutta.
- (5) The Chief Auditor, East Indian Railway, Calcutta.
- (6) The Chief Auditor, Bengal North-Western Railway, Gorakhpur.
- (7) The Auditor, Bengal Nagpur Railway, Calcutta.
- (8) The Chief Auditor, Great Indian Peninsula Railway, Bombay (Indian Midland Railway Section).
- (9) The Auditor of Bengal Provincial Railway Company, Limited, Magra.
- (10) The Auditor of Accounts, Rohilkhand and Kumaon Railway, Bareilly.

The river-borne trade represents the trade carried by country boats plying on the Indus between the Panjab and Sind and is registered at Sukkur and Kotri by clerks who collect the information from boatmen and the statistics are furnished to this office by the Deputy Conservator and Registrar, River Indus, Sukkur. The river traffic is adjusted in the return according to the following rules laid down in Government of India letter No. 518/57-3 Statistics, dated the 5th June 1890:—

- I. When the imports by river from the Panjab exceed the imports by rail from Sukkur and Kotri into Karachi, the latter is classed as imports from the Panjab into Karachi and the difference as imports from the Panjab into Sind and British Baluchistan.
- II. When the imports by rail from Sukkur and Kotri into Karachi exceed the imports by river from the Panjab, the latter is classed as imports from the Panjab into Karachi and the difference plus the imports from other stations in Sind and British Baluchistan to Karachi as trade between Sind and British Baluchistan and Karachi
- III. When the exports by rail from Karachi to Sukkur and Kotri exceed the exports by river to the Panjab, the latter is classed as exports from Karachi to the Panjab, and the difference plus the exports from Karachi to Sind (excluding Sukkur and Kotri) as trade between Sind and British Baluchistan and Karachi.
- IV. When the exports by river to the Panjab exceed the exports by rail from Karachi to Sukkur and Kotri, the latter is classed as exports from Karachi to the Panjab and the difference as exports from Sind and British Baluchistan to the Panjab.

The quarterly returns received from the several registering officers are compiled in this office and a consolidated return showing quantities, but no values, is sent every quarter to the Director of Statistics with the Government of India, Calcutta.

The registering officers give only the weight of the goods in maunds of 82½ lbs. Lists of value rates are supplied by each province quarterly and the values of the trade of each quarter are worked out separately in this office and then added together for the annual returns. The Native States furnish no returns, the trade registered is the trade which comes into and goes out of each block by rail; and the value rates of Sind are adopted in calculating the value of the trade.

Appendix A shows the value rates for Sind and British Baluchistan adopted in each of the four quarters of the year 1911-12 at which the values of the articles in which the trade was carried on are calculated.

(a) The rates of articles marked A (in the appendix) which represent the value rates of foreign merchandise are based on the values declared by the importers in their bills-of-entry at the time of passing the goods out of the Customs House, and may therefore be regarded as approximately accurate.

(b) The rates for articles marked B, which represent articles of Indian Merchandise, are supplied by the Director of Agriculture, Bombay, who obtains them from the monthly returns furnished to him by the Huzur Deputy Collectors of Karachi, Hyderabad and Sukkur which are published by him in the Gazette. They represent the average of the monthly prices ruling on the 20th of each month and may be regarded as reliable.

(c) The rates of articles marked C in the appendix are obtained by the Director of Agriculture by local inquiry from wholesale dealers in Bombay. In respect of Railway plant, inquiry is made of the B. B. and C. I. and G. I. P. Railway workshops, and in respect of twist and yarn and piece-goods (Indian), the rates are worked out from quotations furnished by the Mill-owners' Association to the Chamber of Commerce. These rates may be regarded as approximately correct.

(d) The rates of articles marked D are the rates fixed once for all in consultation with the Director of Statistics with the Government of India, Calcutta, and are therefore merely conventional.

(e) The rates of articles marked E, which represent Indian liquors, are supplied by the Abkari Inspector, Karachi.

Table I shows the rail and river-borne trade of the blocks—(1) Karachi and (2) Sind and British Baluchistan with each other as well as with each of the other blocks into which India is divided. In this table the trade of any Province under any head which does not exceed Rs. 10,000 in value against either imports or exports has been lumped up and shown against "other places," the Province to which such trade appertains not being specifically shown. A statement showing the river-borne trade separately is also appended and marked I-A.

Table II shows the traffic between Sind and British Baluchistan and Karachi. The whole of this trade is carried by rail, as there is no direct communication with Karachi by river.

The articles shown in the above tables are arranged in alphabetical order. The classification corresponds in the main with that employed in the Sea-borne trade accounts, but is less detailed.
