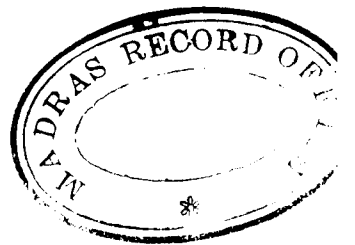
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ADMINISTRATION REPORT
OF THE
BANGANAPALLE STATE
FOR THE OFFICIAL YEAR 1915-1916.



GENERAL.

Banganapalle State is situated in the British District of Kurnool and has an extent of 275 Sq. miles with a population of 40,000 according to the Census of 1911.

2. Its Ruler, Nawab Mir Ghulam Ali Khan Bahadur is descended from the Royal House of Persia, whose ancestors emigrated into India in the days of the ascendancy of the Kingdoms of Bejapoor and Golcondah. They distinguished themselves as soldiers and Administrators and took part with the Nizam in many battles of Historical fame in South India. Extensive Jaghires are still held in Hyderabad by some members of the Banganapalle Ruling family. The Governorships of Adoni and Sidhout were held by the members of the Ruling family of Banganapalle before the Districts of Cuddapah, Kurnool, Bellary and Anantapur were ceded to the East India Company.

3. The Nawab is 45 years of age and he takes keen interest in the details of Administration. He visits villages personally enquiring about the grievances of his subjects and admission to his presence of all classes of people is unrestricted.

4. *The year 1915-1916:*—The most important event of the year is the honour done to the State by a visit of His Excellency, the Right Honourable Lord Pentland, G. C. S. I., K. C. M. G., Governor of Madras with his staff consisting of Mr. H. G. Stokes, C. I. E., I. O. S., Private Secretary, Captain W. S. E. Money Military Secretary, Mr. W. D. F. Liston A. D. C. and Mr. L. Withinshaw, District Superintendent of Police Mr. H. A. B. Vernon I. C. S., also accompanied His Excellency as Political Agent.

5. His Excellency arrived at Banganapalle at 5 P. M., on the 26th and left at about the same time on the 27th July 1915.

At the request of the Nawab His Excellency laid the foundation stone of the new Hospital and he inspected the Sericultural operations and Weaving Factory with much interest and greatly appreciated them.

6. There was a change in the personnel of the Political Agent Mr. H. G. Stokes, C. I. E., I. O. S., having relieved Mr. H. A. B. Vernon I. C. S.

7. The Molony Club building was opened by Mr. and Mrs. Molony on the 6th November 1915. All Banganapalle was greatly rejoiced at the visit of Mr and Mrs. Molony and during their stay of a week villagers thronged in batches to see them once more showing that they had not forgotten their kindness. The New Municipal office building was opened by Mrs. Molony on the 9th November 1915 and the foundation stone of Room Nala Bridge was laid by Mr. Molony on the 10th idem.

Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Bardswell and Mr. T. G. Rutherford I. C. S., visited Banganapally and were present at the opening ceremony of the club at the invitation of the Nawab.

8. Among the recipients of New year's Honours was the Dewan of the State on whom the Title of Khan Bahadur was graciously conferred by Government.

9. Sahebzada Mir Fazle Ali Khan Bahadur the Nawab's eldest son was admitted in the Mayo College Ajmere in September 1915.

C. W. Waddington, Esquire, C. I. E., M. V. O., Principal, Mayo College, Ajmer, in his letter No. 734/25 dated 10th May 1916 to the Nawab writes about the progress of the Sahibzada as follows:—

"He has done remarkably well during the short time he has been at College, stands 2nd in the annual examination and wins three prizes. His behaviour is excellent and he shows great promise."

The Nawab accompanied him to Ajmer and returned to Banganapalle on the 30th September 1915.

10. Professor N. D. Daru of the Presidency College, Madras, visited the State with a batch of students of Geology. They stayed at Banganapally from the 7th to the 9th October 1915 visiting places of geological interest.

11. Mr. H. G. Stokes, C. I. E., I. C. S., Political Agent arrived on 14th and left on the 15th December 1915 on a visit to the Nawab.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

12. The year was fairly prosperous. Rain was timely but excessive in some parts. The heavy rains of October and November damaged cholum and cotton crops to some extent but all other crops, specially ground nuts, were bumper. There were 23.44 inches against 27.27 in the previous year.

The Jolapuram tank received full and the Cherupalle tank received only a partial supply. Paddy fields irrigated by these two tanks are in a flourishing condition likely to yield good outturn. The minor springs—Madduleti, Yaganti, Pasapula and Ramathirtnam irrigated the usual area with a fair outturn.

13. After a period of about 15 years the Indigo Industry was revived and more than a dozen vats were at work throughout the State.

The prices of staple food grains were stationary throughout the year. This combined with the facility in getting labour both on Public and Private works rendered the condition of the poor and the labouring classes happy. The State Industrial Department afforded relief to several poor families in the town of Banganapalle by giving them work.

The revival of Indigo Industry and high prices and large demand for ground nuts afforded facilities for the circulation of money and the ryot paid his dues without difficulty. Large areas were sown with ground nuts and in a majority of cases the money realized by the sale of this one commodity fully meets the demand on an ordinary ryot. The collections therefore came in without the use of coercive processes and a large portion of the small balance now remaining to be collected is from the Payakari ryots who reside in the surrounding British villages and hold the State lands on patta.

14. *Education*:—The highest education imparted in the State is up to the Lower Secondary standard. There were 28 State schools opened in suitable centres, and of this number two girl's schools in which 108 girls are under instruction not only in the three R's but also in sewing and Elementary music are opened in Banganapalle. In all the 28 State schools 1248 boys and 235 girls are given free instruction besides giving one scholarship of Rs. 20 to a College student and three other scholarships of Rs. 10 each for studying in the high school classes of Kur-nool to deserving poor students whose parents cannot afford the expenditure.

The State aids 7 Mission Elementary schools opened by the London Mission Society for the Panchamas and the number of students in them was 47 boys and 12 girls in all. There were also four private schools aided by the State containing 50 boys and 42 girls.

The Kasba Lower Secondary school which imparts free education up to the III Form has a strength of 200 and its feeder the Elementary school at Kondapet has a strength of 176. Many applications for admission had to be refused for want of accommodation. The results of the annual examination and daily attendance were more satisfactory than those of last year, which shows that the masses are beginning to appreciate the value of getting their children educated.

15. *Industries*:—Untiring efforts are being made to achieve success in the Industries already opened and to start new Industries. Attempts are being made to revive the Lacquer work and the Rungrez dyeing Industry which are dying out.

It is also under contemplation to develop and start Palmyrah Fibre Industry as a means of support to such of the poor men and women who cannot or rather are not accustomed to suffer the indignities of a cooly's life. The extensive Palmyrah Tope of the State affords a large field for such an Industry and Banganapalle Palmyrah Fibre is said to be one of the best of its kind in India.

CARPENTRY SCHOOL.

16. The high class carpentry work such as the manufacture of chairs, benches, almirahs, etc., was done in the carpentry school which gives instruction to young boys. There were six apprentices during the year whose progress was satisfactory.

17. *Public Security and Crime*:—The work of the Police Force both preventive and detective was very satisfactory during the year. The percentage of recoveries of stolen property was 17.18 against 5.61 in the previous year which is highly satisfactory. Two rewards were given during the year for honest detective work.

One constable was dismissed, one was suspended and five were fined during the year. The efficiency of the force was maintained.

18. *Public Health and Sanitation*:—Much useful work was done in the Hospital. Free treatment and the popularity of the Hospital were continued. 16954 out-door and 163 in-door patients were treated against 15476 out-door and 131 in-door patients in the previous year.

Much attention was paid to sanitation both in the town and villages. Four step wells were converted into draw wells and it has been seen by experience that the removal of steps renders the water healthy and removes all danger of guinea worms and other skin diseases.

There was an increase of 120 among the successful cases of Vaccination over last year. No epidemic diseases prevailed in the State during the year and the death rate per 1000 of population decreased from 25.24 of the last year to 17.28 in the present year.

19. *Public Works*:—Many useful works were executed during the year. The two bridges on the Panyem road—one near Nandivergam and the other between Pandlapuram and Nandavaram have removed a great inconvenience both for foot passengers and vehicular traffic. These streams used to be flooded at times during rainy season and the passage of wheeled traffic was a difficult matter affording opportunities for the cruelly disposed bandyman to ill-treat his animals. The 3rd bridge across the stream between Kaifa and Appalapuram on the Gooty road is also a very useful work.

The repairs to the Jolapuram tank bund—the only important tank in the State and the repairs and extension to the distributory channels of the same tank were among the important works of the year.

Besides the Municipal works a liberal outlay was spent on town improvement during the year. Streets in two congested localities were widened and a few works of ornamental nature were undertaken and completed.

20. *Trade*:—Trade continued to be flourishing.

The price of cotton was fluctuating according to demand which was very uncertain. Ground nuts Indigo and skins fetched good prices. The Ginning Factory at Sanjamala cleaned 47,700 maunds of cotton and 10,548 maunds of ground nuts during the year. It employed many people not only from Sanjamala but from the surrounding villages also.

Of late, three villages viz Sanjamala Kothapetta and Nandivergam have improved considerably both commercially and materially. All the three villages contain branch post offices. Foremost among these is Sanjamala which is likely to expand in every respect.

21. *Contribution*—The contribution of Rs. 350 a month for the maintenance of the Hospital ship "Madras" was paid throughout the year.

22. *Municipality*—The Municipal Report is appended. The Sanitation of the Town of Banganapalle was in a satisfactory condition and the collection of arrears was done with some zeal but more activity could have been shown in this direction.

DECREASE.

24. *Stamps and Registration*—These are fluctuating items.

Jail manufactures—The jail well having been out of order the garden produce was scanty.

Cattle Pound—This is a fluctuating item.

Miscellaneous—The decrease under this head was due to decrease in the receipts of the Technical school, Carpentry and Raw silk being far below the budgeted amount.

INCREASE.

25. 1. Land Revenue, Quitrent etc. } This was due to prompt collections.
2. Road Cess }

3. *Forest*—Grazing fees and Amaroy. These are fluctuating items.

4. *Law and Justice*—These are fluctuating items.

5. *Interest on investments*—The increase was due to adding the interest of Rs. 10,000 in Government paper (face value) which was forfeited to the State on account of deposit of the Mining Syndicate.

6. *Sale of calves and cows*—Increase was due to the sale proceeds of a State cow having been added to the amount of the sale proceeds of the calves.

Total expenditure including debt heads is Rs. 2,74,394-4-7, the expenditure under Service heads being Rs. 2,74,056-4-2 and the amount under debt heads being Rs. 338-0-5.

INCREASE

27. 1. *Jail Department*:—The increase was due to the acting arrangements in consequence of the Warder going on leave.

2. *Educational Department*:—The difference was trifling.

3. *Sawars*:—This was due to the purchase of newhorses and also to the increase in the salary of the new Sawar.

4. *Religious institutions*:—An excess of Rs. 14 is due to a special charge of repairing a shrine at Sunkesula village.

5. *Forest Department*:—Increase is due to the purchase of a valuable fruit garden at Ghulam-Ali-abad and certain patta lands at Pasapula for plantation purposes.

6. *Education of the Nawab's eldest son*:—The difference is trifling.

7. *Miscellaneous*:—The increase which was large was due to town improvement charges as many decorative works were completed and to the Nawab's trip to Hyderabad.

8. *War contribution*:—(*Madras Hospital Ship*:—In the budget allotment was made only for nine months, while the amount was actually paid for twelve months. Hence the increase.

The deposit of Promissary Notes of Rs. 10,000 of the mining Syndicate which was forfeited to the State has not been credited to the accounts but has been added to the closing balance.

28. *Weights and Measures*:—There being no demand for work under this head the same was not taken in hand during the year under report.

29. *Village works and village Sanitation*:—An amount of Rs. 5,981-6-8 was spent during the year under this head. One village road, one gate and one cattle pound were newly constructed; necessary repairs were rendered to two cart tracks; two chavadies, one cattle pound; one kunta, one spring and one channel.

Sanitary arrangements in several villages during the annual festivals were also made.

35. *Vital statistics*:—As usual the Registration of Births and Deaths in the Banganapalle town and rural tracts is done by the Municipality and village officers respectively. In villages the work is checked by the Revenue Inspectors and Tahsildar during their tours.

36. *Registration of assurances*:—Please vide statements Nos. XIII and XIV appended.

654 documents were presented of which 653 with a value of Rs. 1,58,766-1-5 were registered during the year against 789 documents with a value of Rs. 2,38,727-14-6 of previous year.

DEPARTMENTS.

37. *Medical Department*:—There were no changes in the Hospital staff except that diplomaed Mid-wife Chandramah developed symptoms of mania and left the station without leave. She was dismissed with effect from the 1st March 1916.

His Excellency the Governor of Madras during his visit to Banganapalle laid the foundation stone of the new Hospital on the 27th July 1915.

Mid-wifery Operations:—Four operations were performed during the year of which 2 recovered and 2 died, the last 2 cases were brought to the Hospital in bad condition.

The Mid-wife attached to the Hospital attended upon 56 cases of labour.

Minor surgical operations:—140 Minor surgical operations were performed during the year, all of which recovered.

38. *Jail Department*:—29 convicts were admitted during the year and 9 remained from last year, making a total of 38. Out of this number 33 were discharged and one escaped and 4 remained on the 31st March 1916. The escaped prisoner was re-arrested in the British territory and is now in charge of the British Police. A requisition for his extradition has been made to the Political Agent.

No prisoners were punished during the year for misconduct. The discipline was satisfactorily maintained.

There were two civil prisoners admitted into the Jail each remained for one month and discharged for non-payment of batta by the decree holder.

The prisoners were employed during the year in extramural work chiefly agricultural.

The total income from jail garden, &c., was Rs. 150 as against Rs. 200 in the year previous. The garden well is in a dilapidated state.

The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 1848-7-1; that for the past year being Rs. 1594-3-0. The increase was due to the purchase of a pair of buls for irrigation of jail garden.

39. *State Forest*:—The forests cover more than 39 per cent of the whole area of the State and major portions of these are dry barren hills covered with huge boulders and trap rocks where there is little or no useful vegetation. The more valuable forests are found in Ramatirani, Gulam-ali-abad and Krishnagiri villages forming the western arm of the State and in Giddalore and Sunkesula in the southern corner of the State. These areas are capable of yielding timber of the inferior classes as well as firewood. Vepa is the only timber tree of any importance and there is a dense growth of these trees in the Giddalore forests. As there was reason to believe that the vepa was over felled in the area, action was taken to prohibit the felling of green and immature trees of these species as their removal was not unlikely to bring about their extinction; the dead and defective trees alone will be auctioned in future.

There are lot of porambakes in the State villages containing a fair growth of babul trees. The sales of these babul trees bring in a very appreciable amount of revenue every year. It is the acacia arabica which would most benefit the land as it grows most easily or even spontaneously. The plantation of these species in all the available porambakes will be undertaken on a large scale to meet the growing demand from the public.

The valuable fruit garden which was acquired by the State last year has been vastly improved. The casuarina, divi-divi, mango and cocoanut plantations in the State have been maintained satisfactorily. The valuable stone quarries found throughout the State are almost inexhaustible and capable of further development.

40. *System of management*:—The working scheme already sanctioned was generally followed during the year. A major portion of the palmyra tope in Gulam-ali-abad has been subjected to clear felling of all useless trees and shrubs with the exception of certain fruit trees and all palmyra trees. About 750 acres of forest are covered by palmyra trees. In certain parts of the tope several palmyra trees are both young and middle aged have died apparently due to drought. At present the tope is worked on permit system and it is proposed to put a stop to this practice and to bring the area under a definite system of working with a view to make it uniform in density. Palmyra trees purchased in this tope have been taken to distant places such as Dhoni and Kurnool. The average annual demand made on this tope has been about 400 trees per annum and as the tope contains very valuable trees rich in dark vascular bundles an average price of Rs. 5 to Rs. 6 can be easily realised and this may be taken as a basis for calculating the revenue from trees to be cut and sold either departmentally or on contract. The tope may be treated as one block and divided into 3 working compartments. The growth of palmyra is dense along the banks of lothu vagu and is very sparse in other places. Therefore it would be safe to put down 2 trees per acre or in all 1500 trees as being removed in 3 years' rotation from the tope, i.e. 500 trees per annum. The number of trees to be cut and removed per year will be begun with 400 and increased by 10 annually until the maximum is reached. All the trees removed will be hampered marked. As the whole area of the tope is not easily accessible to carts it is proposed to lay out roads in the tope.

The babul tope at Nandivergam has been subjected to clear felling on a rotation of 3 years.

41. *Forest Offences*:—During the year all the cases were disposed of departmentally and a sum of Rs. 83-12-0 was realised as compensation.

42. *Fire protection*:—About 20 acres of forest in the palmyra tope was affected by fire during the year but the damage done was not serious; only a few fire-wood stacks of the green wood contractor were consumed by these fires. The dead leaves of palmyra trees do not drop from the stems of young trees for several years and these mixed with the branches of climbers form such dangerous towers of burning matter that an accidental fire generally caused by the pilgrims who go to Madduleti shrine easily spread over the entire area causing considerable damage. Smoking in the tope in dry season and charcoal and lime burning in the vicinity of the tope are strictly forbidden. The Forest subordinates and the Police are constantly on the watch against fires during the dangerous season.

43. *Method of treatment*:—The hill blocks were given complete rest as heretofore. To start with it is proposed to cut a median line about two thirds of the way down the escarpment of the hill in Gulam-ali-abad reserved block and the forest above the median line will be completely reserved.

During the year the right to cut and remove palmyra fibre, leaves, fruits and twigs has been leased out. The removal of forest produce from the forests by contractors is encouraged as far as possible, as such a system of working gives ample scope for the Departmental staff to pay better attention to the protection and improvement of the forest. The fibre industry has been supporting a very large number of labourers. As the work of making fibre from the leaf stalks requires no great skill or physical strain it is chiefly done by the poor women.

44. *Sylvicultural operations*:—The year was generally favourable for artificial reproduction and the work done during the year towards the improvement of the growing stock in almost all the plantations was very satisfactory. Different varieties of mango grafts and a large number of cocoanuts planted at Pasupala are in a vigorous state of growth. Almost all the exotic trees planted in the nursery at Ghulam-ali-abad are doing well. Much useful work was done in the nursery during the year. The clearing of scrub jungle and palmyra stumps of the old trees, the alignment of walks and the laying out of channels for irrigating the nursery were the chief improvements made in the nursery. As the nursery is now ready different varieties of imported and local fruit, flower and vegetable trees and shrubs will be cultivated on an extensive scale. The collection of plantains was extended and now consists of different rare varieties, viz, Chakrakeli, Red monz, green, Mauritius dwarf plantains, and etc. The cultivation of mulberry plants in Ghulam-ali-abad along the Madduleti vagu has been very successful but a large number of these plants were burnt by forest fires. Additions were made to the existing mango plantations and several new varieties of mango grafts imported from Panyam were introduced during the year and all of them are growing satisfactorily. The department has purchased about 12 acres of valuable patta land for experimental cultivation of grafted varieties of mangoes and oranges. The land along the Madduleti channel is admirably suited to the growth of the cocoanut trees, as the soil is very fertile made up of a peculiar mixture of sand and black mud brought down by the Madduleti river. It is proposed to extend the plantation of cocoanuts in this area on a large scale.

Healthy plants have been raised from imported seeds of silver oak, Teak, Sandalwood, Harphalevidi and other valuable species in the nursery beds.

45. *Privileges to ryots*:—As in previous years all the State forests with the exception of plantations and areas under cultural operations were made available for the grazing of all cattle except goats. All the plough cattle were permitted to graze freely in the forests as usual and free removal of forest produce has been restricted to the actual domestic and agricultural requirements of the villagers.

Receipts and expenditure:—The gross revenue amounted to Rs. 9,751-10-8 or Rs. 2,210-4-2 more than the previous year. The expenditure also rose from Rs. 6,976-4-5 to Rs. 11,449-7-9. The large increase in expenditure is mainly due to the acquirement of the valuable fruit garden at Gulam-ali-abad and certain patta lands at Pasupala for plantation purposes. Out of Rs. 7,646 spent under plantations a sum of Rs. 2,100 was spent towards the purchase of lands, Rs. 3,788-9-1 towards works done in the Office garden and Rs. 1,757-6-11 on establishment.

46. *Horticultural garden and museum*:—All the flower, fruit and economic plants planted in the garden are coming up satisfactorily. The carriage roads were fully re-aligned and thoroughly consolidated during the year. It is proposed to complete the fernery and to construct rockeries at the entrances of the fernery. It is to be seen if such an undertaking will succeed and survive the hot weather.

A large number of specimens of diamondiferous and other rocks and samples of ores were collected and kept in the museum.

47. *Minor forest industries*:—Charcoal and lime burning were the two auxiliary forest industries conducted during the year. It is proposed to extend the lime industry to meet the growing demand for lime.

DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIES.

Weaving Section.

48. *Premises*:—The weaving Factory was extended this year by the addition of a thatched verandah and a small dye house. The floor of the factory was paved with stone slabs. The building being an old private house may require good many repairs after the coming rains.

49. *Strength of working men*:—At the end of the year there were 33 persons engaged in different works. Under weaving 19, sizing 3, bobbin winding 3, warping 2, dyeing 2 and under pirn-winding 4. Of these, 7 were destitute female weavers working in their own houses. According to sexes there were 16 males, 11 females and 6 boys. The average attendance of workmen per day was calculated to be 33.54.

50. *Looms*:—The factory is equipped with 23 hand looms out of which 14 are being regularly worked. Seven looms are working in private houses lent to the destitute.

51. *Carpet Market*:—The carpets of this factory are getting popular and famous. The well-known firm of Messrs. J. Murray and Company, Limited, formerly the Ind-orient Agency of Calcutta may well be cited for their valuable opinion. They said, "Durries are of excellent quality. Our traveller is endeavouring to place your durries on a higher standard than those of Japan, Patna, and Agra durries." But for the evil effects of War the carpet market would have been in a fairly flourishing condition.

52. *Visitors*:—The institution was uniquely fortunate in getting the most distinguished and illustrious visitor His Excellency the Lord Pentland, Governor of Madras, on the 27th July 1915. Encouraging and inspiring were His Excellency's valuable remarks when he said, "I gladly record my admiration and good wishes for this undertaking which while meeting local wants finds also a market in places far distant for some of its products and gives timely employment and opportunities of industrial training. I trust that it may long be successful in providing these benefits and that they may be truly appreciated by the people of Banganapalle." The institution was honoured by other visitors as Mrs. Molony, Messrs. T. G. Rutherford, I.C.S. H. C. Wilson, T. Clear M.A., R. J. Fletcher, H. A. B. Vernon, and L. Withinshaw.

53. *Enquiries*:—Enquiries were received from many quarters to train people in the art of weaving and dyeing and they were all attended to. The institution is not intended purely for the benefit of the Banganapallians. Its object is to extend its privileges to outsiders equally well.

54. *Improvements in equipment*:—With a view to develop the factory a double cylinder jacquard of 400 needles from Messrs. Mc. Mard and Company was imported. It could not be fitted up during the year as it was received with its frame broken. 12 spindle Pirn winding machine, a Hattersley Domestic Loom of 50 inches reed space, one domestic Dyeing and sizing machine were also added. A Country Durry Loom to weave a carpet of 24 feet wide at a stretch was introduced.

55. *Criminal Reclamation*:—4 long term prisoners having secured remission by their approved conduct were released from the State Jail on condition that they should work in the factory and get wages according to the out-turn and they work satisfactorily.

56. *Proposals in the way of Economic Development*:—There are two things which are very badly required in a Weaving Factory:—Perfect sizing and an easy beaming suitable for a hand loom factory. Attempts so far made to introduce methods other than indigenous methods of sizing have not been attended with satisfactory results. It has been found that the indigenous method of sizing is the only best of all for all kinds of yarns. Until sizing methods can be improved, the need to introduce the beaming is not felt. Any skilful contrivance is sure to economise labour and to help the industry substantially. Apart from this, the introduction of half a dozen automatic hand looms will repay what is spent in the training of laymen as weavers.

57. *Financial results of the working of the weaving Factory*:—The total outlay for the year under report was Rs. 11,533 distributed among three main heads as explained in the accompanying tabular statement. That is to say, that a sum of Rs. 1,295 had to be expended on special charges having no direct bearing on the working of the Factory proper:—A further sum of Rs. 2,650 was spent on the purchase of appliances whose charges are non-recurring. Leaving aside these two items of expenditure "Special charges" and "Non-recurring charges", a sum of Rs. 7,588 was used exclusively for the weaving and dyeing operations only with the result that a sum of Rs. 1,732 was realized from the sale of manufactures and there is a stock of manufactured articles and raw materials of the value of Rs. 6,316 showing thereby a gain of Rs. 460 on the direct transactions against a loss of Rs. 415 during the previous year.

58. *Dyeing section*:—The prices of the synthetic dyes went up fabulously high. In consequence of which recourse had often to be had to vegetable dyeing. The undermentioned natural products are being used. Indigo, bark of the roots of Indian Maddar, Kirvinji seeds and Kapela Powder. Experiments are being made to find out more of the vegetable dyes. Mr. T. Clear, M. A., Deputy Conservator of Forests, after inspecting the dyeing operations said, "The utilization of natural dye stuffs at the present juncture is of great importance and I hope the experiments in this direction will be completely successful."

SERICULTURE.

59. *Object of the operations*:—The silk operations are now carried out more on a model form of system and a training institution than a business concern. The usefulness of the institution can very well be explained in the words of a European visitor Mr. R. F. Fletcher. "I have learnt the life cycle of the worms in a far more interesting way than ever a subject was taught to me at school. It is a pleasant surprise to find such an industry flourishing in the Madras Presidency, equipped with a microscope, etc., for the better investigation of the subject on a scientific basis. The demonstration of the cultivation of the silkworm under both domesticated and natural conditions is also very apt and highly instructive." Mr. T. G. Rutherford I. C. S. made a useful suggestion as under:— x x x had a most interesting exposition of silk manufacture in all its stages. The industry including growing the mulberry might well be tried at Nandyal among the gardens and also at Mahanandi where sufficient water is available."

60. *Plantation*:—The plantation of mulberry to a small extent was taken up by the Forest Department and they tried it at Ghulam-ali-abad within the limits of the palmyrah forest. Their growth was luxurious and healthy but accidental fire to the dry palmyrah twigs and leaves caused damage to the tender plants but all attempts possible are made to revive them. The plantation at Naebagh was abandoned during the year confining the operations to Molonypet Farm only.

61. *Silk*:—There was a balance of 12 lbs. of silk in hand from last year and this year about 9 lbs. of silk was manufactured. 15 lbs. of this was sold for Rs. 91-10-0. About 6 lbs. were sent out in small skeins to several indentors for samples.

62. *Peculiarity of Banganapalle Silk*:—The majority of the silkworms reared during the year was the Mysore variety. The Mysore varieties are plain white in colour and they are strongly in contrast with the yellow varieties of the Banganapalle State, although to the lay observer the white variety of Banganapalle and the Mysore variety look very much alike.

63. *Enquiries*:—Eggs of Eri silkworm and mulberry silk-worm were supplied to enquirers in Central India and other Northern parts and the necessary instructions were also issued to them in its rearing and culture.

64. *Visitors*:—His Excellency Lord Pentland, Governor of Madras, paid a visit to this farm in July last. The process of obtaining silk from silk-worms and the reeling of it was explained. His Excellency expressed his high appreciation of the work thus:—"I am glad to have had the privilege of visiting this silk-worm farm and factory which seem to me a most useful and promising undertaking and I beg to offer to it my hearty good wishes." Rev. Mr. H. W. Whyte, Mr. N. D. Daru, Mr. H. C. Wilson and Mr. T. Clear were among the other visitors.

EXHIBITIONS

65. Several articles were sent to the Industrial, Agricultural and the Educational Exhibition of Pudukkottai in which a silver medal was awarded for the silk. Oriental Arts exhibition of Madras also exhibited some of the manufactures of this Industrial Department. The Principal of the school of Arts arranged to exhibit several of the articles of this Department in the Madras Exhibition. In the Exhibition last named 10 per cent. of the sale proceeds were contributed to the War Fund. Permanent full sized samples of 25 different varieties were furnished to the Commercial Museum, Calcutta, to serve the purpose of a permanent advertisement.

66. *Literary Contribution*:—Articles on silk Industry and cotton cultivation were contributed to the Indian Industrial Conference and the Pudukkottai Exhibition.

OTHER INDUSTRIES.

67. *Lac cultivation*:—It is very difficult to procure seed lac and especially Ber brood lac. 100 sticks of Ber brood lac were received from the Central Provinces in the early part of June. Six days, transit and the heat of the season almost killed the brood. A hopeless attempt was made with the damaged sticks and about a dozen twigs were successfully inoculated; but a sudden change in the weather, gales and rains washed away most of the unsettled larvae, putting an end to the June crop. An attempt was made to try the second crop in October but no brood could be procured. Arrangements have since been made in advance to get the brood-lac in time for the future experiments. It is hoped to have a successful crop in June next. Enquiries regarding lac-cultivation and dyeing were received from different places of the Madras Presidency and they were attended to. Some crude-lac was supplied to Mr. K. T. B. Tresler, Director of Industries, Madras to try its value in varnishing purposes.

68. *Fisheries*:—An attempt is being made to introduce rearing of fishes in the State and Mr. H. C. Wilson of the Fisheries Department of the Government of Madras, during his visit, kindly inspected several water ponds, wells and streams in order to study their suitability of water for the different varieties of fish. The spring referred to is at Yaganti and it runs throughout the year. Its water was chemically analysed to find out if it can be classed as thermal Medical spring. The result of the analysis is given in the table appended below.

Murrel, a commercial variety of fish and a few Larvicidal ones will be reared experimentally during the ensuing year, the latter class especially to kill out the brood of malaria producing mosquitoes.

69. *Minor Industries*:—It is under consideration of the Darbar to revive the country calico printing and the well known lacquer work. Mr. W. S. Hadaway, Superintendent of the school of Arts, on examining a lacquer fan and a tray, observed, "The lacquer work was of excellent quality good colour and carefully done."

Palmyrah fibre of a very superior quality is extracted from the State Palmyrah Forest. It deserves special mention being a material which suggests the possibility of a profitable industry. It is under contemplation to carry on some experimental operations during the year.

70. *Conclusion*:—All Officers worked with a sense of devotion to duty and the good result of the year's work is due to that fact.

Constitution of the Council.

71. With a view to associate the people of Banganapalle Town largely in the administration of local affairs the Darbar had constituted this Municipal Council in the year 1907.

During the year under report there were no changes in the membership of the Council, M.R. Ry. G. Sriramasastri Garu continuing to be the Chairman.

There were 27 meetings against 18 in the previous year. The attendance of the members on the whole was satisfactory.

The most memorable event of the year under report was the visit of His Excellency the Lord Pentland, G. C. M. G., Governor of Madras to the Town of Banganapalle in the month of July 1915.

In the month of November Mr. and Mrs. Molony visited and performed the opening ceremony of the new Municipal Office building. They also opened the Molony Club. Among the distinguished visitors to the town during the year were Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Molony, Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Bardswell and Mr. Rutherford I. C. S.

The Political Agent visited the town twice during the year under report.

Receipts.

72. Statement showing the receipts and charges as compared with the budget estimates are enclosed.

Tax on A. ts:—128 persons were assessed to this tax and Rs. 176-12-0 against the demand of Rs. 306 were realized and Rs. 37-12-0 were written off. There remained at the end of the year a balance of Rs. 91-8-0.

Of the arrear demand of Rs. 287-8-0 the amount of Rs. 74 was collected and Rs. 38-8-0 written off as irrecoverable. At the end of the Official year there remained a balance of Rs. 175.

Tax on Buildings:—The demand under this head was Rs. 1,735-12-4 of this Rs. 830-13-5 were collected and Rs. 374-10-5 written off. There remained at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 530-4-6.

Out of a demand of Rs. 728-9-10 in arrears a sum of Rs. 134-15-8 was collected and Rs. 150-6-1 written off. At the end of the Official year a balance of Rs. 442-4-1 stood uncollected.

Tax on lands:—Out of a demand of Rs. 249-3-6 a sum of Rs. 112-15-2 was collected and Rs. 33-14-3 written off and at the end of the Official year there remained a balance of Rs. 102-5-10.

Of the arrear demand of Rs. 175-0-1 a sum of Rs. 44-1-11 was collected and Rs. 25-1-0 were written off. The year closed with a balance of Rs. 105-8-1. Necessary steps have been taken for the collection of arrears.

Coercive process:—For the collection of the above taxes 18 warrants were issued during the year and in six cases distraint was made.

Tolls, Market and Slaughter Houses:—The amounts for which these were leased out have been collected during the year.

Contribution:—In addition to the amount spent under Town Improvement scheme the State had contributed Rs. 5,000 in aid of the Municipal funds as usual.

Incidence of taxation:—The incidence of taxation per head of the population with reference to the collection comes to Rs. 0-5-11.

Expenditure.

73. The following works were executed during the year at a cost of Rs. 4,385-13-7.

1. Digging side drains on road sides at Kondapet.
2. Laying a new road through Yarka's' huts at Kondapet.
3. Repairing Havaldar street.
4. Repairing sheep slaughter house.
5. Constructing a slab drain over Hyderikangh nala.
6. Repairing cement drains.
7. Constructing a latrine in the new Municipal Office.
8. Constructing retaining walls to the Lawly road.
9. Repairing Kondapet High road.
10. Repairing Casta High road.
11. Constructing a platform near Veerappamattam.
12. Widening of Syed Imdad Ali Saheb's street.
13. Constructing a latrine in the fort.
14. Constructing slab drains on Gooty road.
15. Laying a new road behind Sericulture farm.
16. Constructing a two vents culvert behind Sericulture farm.
17. Diverting the rain water to the culvert constructed behind Sericulture farm.
18. Repairing Moula Ali Hillock road.
19. Repairing the step well at Moula Ali Hillock.
20. Repairing the Market stalls.
21. Constructing a slab drain in Hajam Wadi.
22. Constructing steps in front of Jakka Enganna's house on river bed.

All the above works were designed and estimated by the full timed Overseer and they were checked by the State Public Works Department, Overseer and supervised by the Councillors.

74. *Vital Statistics*:—243 Births and 123 Deaths were registered during the year under report, against 212 Births and 203 Deaths in the previous year. The public health on the whole was satisfactory during the year and no epidemics prevailed.

75. *Sanitation and water supply*:—The Medical Officer is to be congratulated on the marked improvement in the Sanitary administration of this town. The Municipality hired 2 double bullock carts for the removal of street refuse and the work was carried on satisfactorily.

76. *Private scavenging system*:—This system is working satisfactorily. Two more latrines were constructed and one more scavenger was appointed in the Fort.

All the roads within the Municipality have been well maintained and they are in very good order.

77. *Avenue trees*:—The Municipality is maintaining more than 1200 trees within the Municipal limits at a cost of Rs. 800 a year.

In the removal of congestion within the town much useful work was done by the aid of the State. One more lane called Yerramala lane was widened during the year under report.

The thanks of this Council are due to the Nawab and the Dewan for their real solicitude in all Municipal matters in general and for their personal inspection of all the works and sympathetic advice and kind encouragement in particular.
