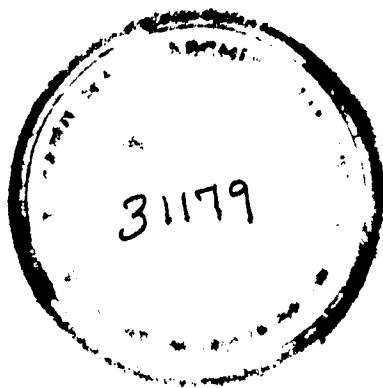

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

OF THE

BANGANAPALLE STATE

FOR THE OFFICIAL YEAR 1916-1917.

For situation, extent, population and short history of the Ruling family please see previous reports.

2. The most important event of the year under report was the devastation to the town of Banganapalle caused by the floods of the 31st October 1916.

3. The river Zurreru which runs from the West to the East of the State and joins the Konderu, divides the town of Banganapalle in two parts *viz.*, Khasba and Kondapet. This stream irrigates along its banks a considerable area not only fields producing paddy and other food grains and vegetables but also mango and betel leaf gardens. There were innumerable bunds along its course from Pasa-pula to Kothapet a distance of nearly 20 miles diverting water for irrigation. Ordinarily it is a peaceful stream always fordable except for a few hours in rainy season when there are heavy rains higher up. On rare occasions water rose about 6 feet over the Dam which connects the two parts of the town. In 1893 there were high floods when a portion of the part of the Kasba close to the river and chiefly inhabited by the Rungrez (Dyers) people was washed off and since then people enjoyed immunity from abnormal floods.

4. *Floods of 31st October 1916.*—The rainfall during the year under report was unprecedentedly heavy. There were 8.26 inches in August and 7.72 inches in September 1916 and from the 21st September to the 14th October there was no rain. But from the 15th of that month to the 31st, 19.49 inches were registered of which 9.50 inches fell during the night of the 30th idem.

On the 24th October 1916 the Zurreru began to rise from the small hours of the morning and by 6 A.M. the floods rose to the highest known level cutting off all communication between Kasba and Kondapet. From 8 A.M. water began to recede; but the heavy and incessant rain and the extraordinary rise in the river had caused much damage to the houses of the poor people—also to the irrigation bunds along the Zurreru and to the fields in the area covered by the floods.

5. *Jolapuram Tank.*—To the West of the town of Banganapalle 7 miles a way is the village of Jolapuram and it has a tank which when full irrigates four villages *viz.*:—Kristnagiri, Jolapuram, Pathaped and Yagantipalle. Its bund is 1½ furlongs in length and 60 feet in height and its wasting channel which is cut across a rock is 30 feet wide at the mouth. The bund has two supports at its back and it joins two hills on either side.

There is nothing to show when the bund was constructed but the village gossip was to the effect that there were two huge masonry walls below the earthen bund making it impossible to breach. The tank scarcely received full supply. It was filled in 1912 and ever since it received half supply and even less. During the administration of the late Nawab which extended over a period of nearly 30 years the tank had received full supply only twice. The bund is so strong that to all outward appearance no possibility of any damage to its stability could be apprehended. The only fear was that in the event of an extraordinary flood if the supply channel worked abnormally the tank would overflow the bund; because the widening of the surplus weir was out of question as it is cut across a solid rock.

6. On the 24th October 1916 the Maistry in-charge and the Village officers of Jolapuram reported that the tank was quite full and the waves touched the top of the bund. The officer in-charge of the Public Works Department and the Dewan went to the bund and the following day the Nawab also inspected it. By noon on the 25th, water went down 5 feet and every fear of the over flow was removed. A maistry, two neerkuts and a gang of coolies were permanently kept

there and on the 28th night it was reported that all surplus water was discharged and there was no flow from the wasting weir.

7. The heavy rains of the week ending the 30th October and the extraordinary downpour of the 30th night (9.50 inches) caused freshes in the river Zurreru and from 1 A.M. on the 31st October all communication between Kasba and Kondapet was cut off and the Zurreru began to rise slowly and at 5-30 A.M. the floods had reached the point attained the previous week. The supply channel of the Jolapuram tank also worked from about the same time viz., 1 A.M. and at about 6 A.M. a huge and very old Banyan tree standing on the lower bund was uprooted carrying with it one very old Tamarind and two morgosa trees. This unfortunate incident tended to loosen and to weaken that portion of the bund to a considerable extent, and within a few minutes the abnormal flow of the supply channel succeeded in making a passage through the weakened part of the bund breaching a portion 700 feet wide.

8. The flow from the breach of the tank rushed through paddy fields into the river Zurreru which was already in high floods. Jolapuram village which is situated on a higher level about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile to the North of the tank bund escaped damage, but Pathapad and its hamlet Madaspalle suffered to some extent.

9. The floods reached Banganapalle at 6-30 A.M. and lasted only 25 minutes. Immediately after, the river also resumed its normal flow. 742 houses in the town of Banganapalle and 212 houses in Naepet and Kapulapalle and 29 houses in three other villages along the bank of the river were totally washed off with all property in them.

17 lives mostly of women and children were lost in Kondapet. Indiscreet rush into the stream with a view to cross over to the adjoining hill and in some cases neglect to leave their houses and property at the first warning by the Police caused all the deaths.

10. The Police under Syed Ali Naqhi Sahib did remarkably well throughout the week. Strict watch was kept by the police and timely warnings were given regarding the rise in the river and in many cases forcible removal of those who clung to their falling houses was made during the previous night. All Kungrezpet and the adjoining locality, was vacated before the day dawned other wise the loss of life would have been much greater.

11. The Nawab threw open all the apartments of his palace for the poor and even his sitting room was occupied by scores of men, women, and children. About two thousand five hundred people had taken shelter in the Palace and the Nawab fed them all including many houseless poor outside for five days and supplied cloths, blankets, and bedding materials to many people. All public buildings were thrown open for the poor and all the out houses of the Palace are still occupied by those whose houses were lost by the floods.

12. Mr. H. G. Stokes C. I. E., I. C. S. visited Banganapalle after the floods to express sympathy with the Nawab and the people of Banganapalle. He inspected the flooded area and has since recommended to Government for the free grant of building materials to the poor people of the state. The supply is shortly expected.

13. The Nawab's brother, the Honourable Meer Asad Ali Khan Bahadur, started a Relief Fund to which H. H. the Nizam G. C. I. E., generously sanctioned Rs. 10,000. An amount of Rs. 12,000 in all was collected and distributed among the deserving poor by means of a committee presided over by the Honourable Meer Asad Ali Khan Bahadur whose practical sympathy and timely help did much to alleviate the sufferings of the poor. The thanks of the Durbar are due to His Excellency Lord Pentland and His Highness the Nizam for their generous contributions to the Relief Fund, to the Honourable Gentleman for the trouble he has taken in that direction and to all the subscribers for their liberal help.

14. The damages by the floods both to the Public and private property including land, gardens, and other moveable and immoveable property is roughly estimated at Rs. 6,92,427.

15. *Summary of the year's work*:—The year on the whole was fairly good but at the latter part much sickness prevailed in the town as well as in villages. Fever and Guinea worm were prevalent to a considerable extent throughout the state. The ryot is not a believer in the purity of drinking water. Though much was done by the Darbar in the matter of cleaning wells and as far as possible in supplying pure water for drinking but the villagers preferred stagnant water from vagus and vankahs and resorted to step wells for their supply.

16. During the last five months of the year—November to March all public works of importance were suspended partly owing to the dearth of labour after the floods and partly with a view to economise. Only emergent repairs to roads, bridges, culverts, Dams and to public buildings were carried on.

17. *Town*:—A portion of the flooded area along the Northern Bank of the stream was prohibited for house building being too close to the river. A special survey establishment was entertained under Town improvement scheme, and an area of about 15 acres adjoining the old Town has been planned and divided into blocks for construction of houses with spacious and healthy roads. The old town affected by the floods has also been surveyed and planned with broad and spacious roads in place of narrow lanes. The latter half of the year was devoted entirely to the clearing of carcasses of animals from the houses ruined by floods, in clearing and shaping newly aligned roads and in making side channels and temporary culverts. Many ornamental works to the town which were done during a course of 9 years were carried away by the floods.

18. The Banganapalle—Sanjamala Road, The Nandavaram—Cherupalle road and the Bellum road suffered greatly on account of heavy rains and floods. The Nandavaram—Cherupalle road was almost completed and had become very useful because the whole locality was rocky and very difficult of access for vehicular traffic and for foot passengers.

19. The huge masonry katwa across the river Zurreru near Pathapad which was constructed at a cost of nearly Rs. 7,000 spread over four years, was practically wiped out. This katwa was of the greatest use to the people of Pathapad who raised garden crops under it.

20. These and other damages caused by the floods have to be repaired in course of a few years. It is under the serious contemplation of the Nawab to restore the Jolapuram tank. Expert opinion has to be taken in the matter of the reconstruction of the bund as the safety of the capital town depends to a considerable extent on its stability.

21. *Education*:—It will be observed from particulars given in Appendix XXI that there was a slight fall in the number of pupils and the average daily attendance. This was due to fevers prevailing in all villages. But there are very clear signs of popularity of education among the masses. The attendance and the applications for admission in the two girls schools in the town are very satisfactory. The Inspecting staff worked satisfactorily in maintaining efficiency throughout.

22. *The Sahibzada*:—The Nawab's eldest son, Meer Fazle Ali Khan Bahadur continues to make most satisfactory progress in the Mayo College Ajmere. The Principal, Mr. C. W. Waddington, C. I. E., M. V. O. in his report regarding his progress says:—"Has done extremely well, stands first in the annual examination, gains prizes for English, History, and Geography, Mathematics, Persian, Urdu, Religion, Aggregate, and extra marks."

22(a). The state continued the grant of Rs. 350 per month for the Hospital Ship "Madras."

23. *Rainfall*:—The rainfall of the year under report was inches 161.72 cents against inches 91.27 cents of previous year and average for the past five years of 77.88 inches. The rain was very excessive in all parts. The heavy rains of July to October and of February damaged choleam, cotton, ground-nuts and indigo crops. Many cultivated lands were left waste as the ryots could not plough them on account of heavy rains. The mango crop was an entire failure.

24. *Price of staple food grains*:—The prices of staple food grains were stationary throughout the year. Appendix XVI explains particulars of prices of staple food grains.

25. *Trade*:—Trade continued to be flourishing. The Ginning Factory at Sanjamala worked 5994 maunds of cotton during the year.

27. VARIATIONS EXPLAINED.

DECREASE.

Land Revenue and Cesses:—Decrease is due to less collections on account of fall in the price of several articles of produce owing to unusual rains of this year.

Forest:—The decrease was due to less collection under grazing fees and forest produce owing to floods.

Stamps:—This is a fluctuating item.

Jail manufactures:—The jail garden well having collapsed the supply of water has been rendered deficient. Hence less receipts.

Sale of Calves and Cows:—This is a fluctuating item.

Miscellaneous:—The decrease under this head was due to decrease in the receipts of the Technical School, Carpentry and Raw Silk being far below the budgeted amount.

28. INCREASE.

Registration, other items of Law and Justice and Cattle Pound. } These are fluctuating items.

Interest on investments:—The interest on Government Promissory Notes deposited by the Mineral Syndicate since forfeited to the State was credited this Head, hence increase.

Huzur office.—The difference is trifling.

Tahsildar-Magistrate's office:—The difference is trifling.

Medical Department:—To the rise of price of drugs on account of War.

Police Department:—Annual increment drawn by the Inspector and entertainment of a new Head Constable and six Constables account for the increase.

Stationery and Printing:—The cost of stationery, etc., increased on account of War.

*Education of the Nawab's eldest son:—*Increase is due partly to the enhancement of railway fares and partly to the trip to Delhi,

*Telegraph compensation:—*The difference is trifling.

Cattle Pound charges:—The difference is trifling.

Refunds:—The increase is due to collection of Assessment on Nawab's Seri lands.

31. *Village works*.—An amount of Rs. 4,847-9-10 was spent during the year under this head. The Nandavaram—Cherupalle Road a distance of over two miles was completed during the year and proved very useful; but this road was much damaged by the floods of October last. One village gate, four cattle pounds, one well, one Katva, one spring, one channel and two Kuntas were repaired. Sanitary arrangements in several festivals were also made. The malas and madigas of Pasapula who suffered by the floods have been given relief for food and cloths.

43. *Vital statistics*:—As usual the Registration of Births and Deaths in the Banganapalle town and rural tracts is done by the Municipality and Village Officers respectively. In villages the work is checked by the Revenue Inspectors and Tahsildar during their tours. Particulars are given in Appendix I. There were 1025 deaths in villages during the year against 557 of previous year. Fever and dropsy were the main causes of deaths.

44. *Registration of Assurances*.—Please *vide* statements Nos. XIII and XIV appended.

613 documents were presented of which 611 with a value of Rs. 1,75,776-4-5 were registered during the year against 653 documents with a value of Rs. 1,58,766-1-5 of previous year.

DEPARTMENTS.

45. *Medical Department*:—Hospital staff continues to be the same as during the last year. The flood of the 31st of October 1916 did great damage to the Hospital. The in-patient building was totally dilapidated, the furniture wrecked and nearly three-fourths of the medicines in stock were spoiled as well as a number of hospital records.

The want of a place for keeping the in-patients is greatly felt.

The average daily number of out-patients treated during the year was 116.22 and in-door 8.37. The average for last year was 102.36 and 10.29 respectively.

There were no epidemic diseases during the year but there was a marked increase of patients under the head of *ague*, cough and cold.

46. *Midwifery Operations*:—One case of extraction of the *fœtus* by forceps was admitted during the year, the patient recovered.

The mid-wife attached to the Hospital attended upon 51 cases of labour.

Minor Surgical Operations:—117 Minor Surgical Operations were performed during the year all of which recovered.

47. *Jail Department*:—19 convicts were admitted during the year and 4 remained from last year, making a total of 23. Out of this number 18 were discharged and 5 remained on the 31st March 1917.

No prisoners were punished during the year for misconduct. The discipline was satisfactorily maintained.

The total income from jail garden was Rs. 26 as against Rs. 150 in the previous year. The decrease is due to failure of plantain trees owing to want of water and also the failure of vegetable garden and Indigo crop from excessive rain.

The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 1,217-3-4 against Rs. 1,848-7-1 during the year previous. This decrease is due to less number of prisoners in jail during the year.

48. *Vaccination Department*:—All the records in connection with vaccination were washed away in the floods. Even the note books of the Vaccinators in pencil were in the boxes which were carried away. It is impossible now to give the number of cases vaccinated with their result, hence the return is nil.

After the floods not a single subject could be operated upon either in the town or in the villages from the homeless condition of the people in the former and prevalence of fever and cough in the latter localities. The supply of lymph therefore was temporarily discontinued.

The articles of furniture were also washed away with the records.

1st grade Vaccinator's services were dispensed with from the 1st October 1916. 2nd grade Vaccinator was promoted to 1st grade and an outsider was appointed as a Probationary Vaccinator from 1st November 1916.

49. *Police Department*:—The most satisfactory feature in the year under report is the marked drop in crime. There were 100 offences in the year under report as against 128 in 1915-1916. The amount of the stolen property was also comparatively less by about Rs. 748. The percentage of the recovery of stolen property was equally encouraging as it increased to about 2 per cent. This is a striking testimony of the efficiency of the Police both in the prevention and detection of crime. Six constables and one Head constable temporarily entertained after the floods have been retained as it has been found necessary to increase the strength of out stations.

50. *State Forests*:—The forest area is formed of a number of blocks occupying the slopes of Erramalais and Nallakonda hills along the western boundary of the State and the low hills in the south of the State. The total area of the forest is about 90 square miles, of which, about 16 square miles are reserved. The soil in all these hills is superficial and dry and not very favourable to tree growth. Epi trees are the prevailing species in the Erramalais and Nallakonda forests and they are of such limited height growth that the production of valuable timber is out of question. A marked difference is found between Erramalais and Nallakonda hills, the growth and reproduction being far more vigorous on the former than on the latter. The area producing Epi is about half the total area of the forest. The crop is irregular and every variation in density is to be met with. All other forests are mere scrub-jungles containing no timber trees of any value but they yield considerable quantities of fire-wood, green leaves for manuring purposes and other minor produce. The large Palmyrah tope at Gulamaliabad is a valuable asset to the State and it is the only forest which supplies useful timber. All the waste lands in the State and stream porambokes are under the control of the Forest Department. These lands are practically treated as reserved lands in so much that even the feeding of cattle, the removal of Tangedu bark, lime stones, grass and leaf manure are forbidden without express sanction. A portion of the valuable regu tope (ber-ban) along Ennakandla vagu has been set apart for lac-industry. In addition to these, plantations consisting mainly of Casuarina and Divi-Divi trees and gardens containing Mango, Orange, Cocosnut and other fruit-bearing trees are under the management of the Forest Department. The valuable stone quarries which are worked on lease system were carefully conserved.

51. *System of management*:—All the trees in the babul tope at Nandivergam have been clear-felled and arrangements have been made to restock the felled area with fast-growing species which find favour in the soil. The Palmyrah tope at Gulam-Ali-Abad has been subjected to improvement fellings during the year. All other reserved blocks continued to be worked as in the previous years. The right to cut and remove palmyrah fibre and other minor produce in the tope has been leased out. Small timber, dead-wood, thatching grass and other minor produce in all the state forests with the exception of reserved blocks, are disposed of under license or permit system. This system will prevail in some form or other till the state forests become quite fit for departmental working on the recognised lines. During the year, existing boundary lines have been rechecked and vastly improved. Arrangements have since been made for the demarcation of the frontier boundary with field marks. During the annual verification of the frontier boundary

lines it was observed that there were encroachments near Erragudi, Ghulamaliabad and Malkapur village limits. As per existing survey marks a portion of state Palmyrah tope will form a part of Rangapuram reserved forest. The State has been, from time immemorial, in the undisputed enjoyment of the whole palmyrah tope. All these frontier boundary disputes have not yet been finally disposed of.

52. *Forest offence*:—During the year all cases were disposed of departmentally.

53. *Fire-protection*:—Special arrangements have been made for the rigid protection of the palmyrah tope from fire as the damage done there is very great. During the year no serious damage by fire took place in any forest area.

54. *Method of treatment*:—The four reserved blocks namely Ghulamaliabad, Krishnagiri, Ramathirtham and Giddalore were not worked during the year as they require complete rest. A median line about two thirds of the way down the escarpment of the hill in the Ghulamaliabad reserved block has been cut departmentally and the portion of the forest above the median line has been completely closed against grazing, etc., as per provisions of the working scheme. The unreserved forests capable of yielding a large quantity of fire-wood were hitherto worked on permit system to supply small green wood and fuel for the neighbouring population. Under the strictest supervision a certain amount of damage to the forest is inevitable, hence the pernicious permit system will be abandoned for one that gives greater control to the establishment over the exploitation of the forest.

55. *Sylvicultural operations*:—The year was generally favourable for natural regeneration in the palmyrah tope. Additions were made to the existing plantations. On 31st October 1916 the Jurreru and kundu rivers caused fearful floods and the damage caused by these to the plantations has been very serious. A large portion of the divi-divi plantation in Ghulamaliabad has been buried under sand and a casuarina plantation at Banganapalle has been completely washed away. The valuable casuarina plantation consisting of about 4000 trees at Narasapalle was seriously damaged. The Kundu river has brought down large quantities of sand and gravel and has destroyed more than 3000 casuarina trees in the plantation. Steps are being taken to restock the blanks. The forest growth along the rivers in the stream porambokes has been completely destroyed. Experimental cultivation of different kinds of exotic fruit trees in the nursery during the year has been very successful. The dwarf Indo-Chinese sapota grafts, seedless mammoth guavas, different kinds of pumelows, kubuli and other rare varieties of pomigranates and a large number of selected varieties of mango grafts viz.:—Selimabegam, Dophulla Te-pulla, Bhaduria and creeping mango plants which were imported from Calcutta gardens are thriving satisfactorily. Plantations of valuable trees were largely extended and maintained in a satisfactory condition. Mango grafts viz., Jahangir, Nurjahan, the Royal George seedless Orange grafts, the Australasian seedless grapes and blue vine were some of the rare and interesting novelties in fruit trees introduced in the state garden. In addition to these many assorted varieties of bamboos, a large number of valuable timber and ornamental avenue trees such as Mahogany, silver-oak, travellers-palm, sissoo, asoka, magnolia champaka and other exotic have been planted and all of them are in a vigorous state of growth. The recent floods in the Jurreru river have washed away almost all the valuable private mango gardens along the banks of the river. By far the greater number of mango trees in Banganapalle are grafts and as usual in such conditions the quality of the fruit is extremely varied and a great majority being most delicious fruits. The loss of such mango gardens in a severe blow at the pocket of Banganapalle fruit dealing ryot. The state garden contains select varieties of mango trees (grafts). It is proposed to graft a large number of mango plants for departmental use and public sale. All endeavours will be made to extend and improve the mango gardens which were affected by the floods.

56. *Privileges to ryots*:—The free grazing of all plough-cattle, free removal of head loads of dry fuel and other produce for bona-fide agricultural purposes and other privileges were continued to be enjoyed by the ryots. The terrible floods have washed away a greater portion of Banganapalle and Kor and made thousands of people homeless. Every reasonable concession was made by the Nawab to those who lost their houses. Free permit for a large number of trees, thatching grass and other produce have been issued.

57. *Horticultural garden*:—Some useful work was done towards the improvement of the garden. Different varieties of cocoanuts such as Ceylon-dwarf and Singapore, Leecher, Lakota, rose apples and other fruit trees and different varieties of roses which were introduced into the garden during the year are coming up satisfactorily. All those planted during the last year or two have also made good progress. During the year a beginning was made on a small scale of pot-culture experiments. A large number of valuable palms, ferns, crotons and foliage plants in the garden have been re-potted and vastly improved. Different varieties of bougainvillea, passiflora, antigonon and other valuable climbers which were planted during the year are thriving well. Better arrangements have been made for a good supply of water in the garden as a good supply of it is indispensable if success is to be attained.

58. *Minor forest industries*:—Charcoal making and lime burning were the only minor forest industries which were undertaken and worked on a large scale by the department during the year. The demand for lime is increasing and this industry is sure to undergo an enormous expansion in the state.

DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIES.

WEAVING AND DYEING SECTION.

59. *Looms*:—12 country carpet and Bed-sheet looms were purchased and added to the factory and they were given to poor and helpless widows for home labour. All of these were washed away by the floods.

A twisting machine and a Nakki lace loom were also purchased during the year. A trained man from Bangalore was engaged to fit up the Nakki loom and train the workmen in the factory for a period of three weeks. All these labours were undone by the floods the looms having been irreparably damaged.

60. *Jacquard machine*:—The frame of the machine received from Messrs Greave Cotton & Co last year was broken in transit and therefore a fresh frame was indented for. Though it was supplied for a second time at the cost of the Insurance Company it was again received in a broken condition. The frame was at last received later in the year and it could not be fitted up completely owing to the dislocation of business caused to the factory building by the floods of the 31st October 1916.

61. *Loss on account of floods*:—The factory suffered a great loss owing to the floods.

62. *Appointment*:—A temporary clerk was appointed to help the Superintendent of industries and to relieve the professional men of the staff from the clerical work which they were attending hither to.

63. *Training*:—Applications were received from various quarters for training in weaving and sizing and were attended to duly.

64. *Town improvement Scheme*:—Under the new Town planning scheme after the floods a road is aligned which runs through the factory, separating the store, dyeing and Chemical rooms from the main building. A verandah and a hall are also affected in this connection and the looms located in those places had to be adjusted in the main building. Two large portable looms had to be dismantled for want of room.

65. *Exhibitions*:—During the year exhibits from the factory were sent to the following exhibitions:—

Viz. (1) Erragudi Trichinopoly District (2) Oachera of Travancore (3) Mysore (4) Bangalore and (5) Baroda.

A silver medal and a certificate of merit for the carpets and collections of grains were awarded by the Oachera exhibition authorities. A certificate of merit and a silver medal by the Lalgudi authorities. A certificate of honourable mention by the Mysore authorities. Owing to some delay caused by the Railway authorities the exhibits for Rungpur arrived at their destination too late and were therefore returned without being exhibited. The Superintendent of industries was invited by the President of the Lalgudi exhibition to preside as a judge for the Industrial section but the kind invitation had to be declined on account of pressure of work.

A certificate of merit was also awarded by the Lalgudi exhibition committee to one of the students of the state Secondary School for chalk drawing exhibited through this department.

Commercial Museum Calcutta—Some of the state manufactures were sent for permanent exhibition to this museum and some orders too were received from visitors of the museum which were complied with.

66. *Carpet market*—An order for the supply of carpets for the military department at Bangalore could not be executed completely owing to the temporary suspension of work caused by the floods. A large American order for carpets was also received and is being executed. The progress is very slow owing to the small number of workmen due to several of the weavers having lost their houses in the floods and taken to more lucrative occupations.

67. *War Relief*—Carpets costing about Rs. 21 were given to the national Indian association as a free gift. These carpets are intended for sale at the stalls of the Indian goods which were opened on the 8th and 9th December 1916 by the said association. The amount realised therefrom would go towards the funds to alleviate the sufferings of the wounded soldiers at the front.

68. *Visitors*—Mr. S. S. Nair of the Indian industrial conference, Revd. B. J. Rockwood, Miss String-fellow, Rev J. T. Todman, and Mr G. W. Thompson were among the distinguished visitors to the factory during the year.

69. *Dyeing*—Owing to the rise in prices of synthetic dyes recourse had to be had to vegetable dyeing. The experiments so far conducted in this direction have been satisfactory.

70. *Financial results of the working of the weaving factory*—The total outlay for the year under report was Rs. 7,679-4-7 distributed among three main heads as explained in the accompanying tabular statement. That is to say that a sum of Rs. 1,170-7-5 had to be spent on special charges having no direct bearing on the working of the factory proper (Please vide tabular form No. 1). A further sum of Rs. 897-1-5 was spent on the purchase of appliances, etc., whose charges are non-recurring. Setting aside these two items of expenditure "special charges" and "Non-recurring charges" a sum of Rs. 5,612-2-9 was used exclusively for the weaving and dyeing operations with the result that a sum of Rs. 2,659-5-2 was realized from the sale of manufactures and there is a stock of manufactured articles and raw materials to the value of Rs. 6,182-15-7 plus Rs. 1,304-1-11 (vide item Nos. 1, 2 and 4 of tabular form II). Of this sum an amount of Rs. 6,316 has to be deducted being the cost of manufactures and raw materials lying as balance at the beginning of the year showing thereby a loss of Rs. 1781-12-1 on the direct transaction against a gain of Rs. 460 during the previous year. This is due indirectly to the floods and also partly to the rise in prices of raw materials and dyes. It is due to the floods for the following reasons. Some of the manufactured articles damaged by the floods and heavy rains had to be sold at a reduced price. Previous to the floods several looms were given out to destitute widows and other persons from which source a large quantity of manufactured articles were being received; besides a large number of weavers were also attending the factory which compensated for the large establishment maintained. During the floods all these looms lent out to widows and to poor women, etc., were washed away together with their dwellings and belongings. The number of weavers who attended work decreased after the floods. The production of manufactures was thereby greatly reduced. The establishment for the year of which

a large sum of money was being spent (vide item (1) under direct charges of tabular form I appended hereto) could not be reduced at such a time of distress as the object of the state was just at that moment to render as much help as possible to give relief to the distressed. Yet another cause was the high prices of raw materials and dyes and also the suspension of goods traffic over Railways necessitating the getting and despatching of raw materials and manufactured articles per Railway parcel paying high freight. To add to these, labour became scarce and expensive as most of the buildings in Banganapalle had been washed away or damaged and reconstruction was going on on all sides. The wages of the few weavers attending the factory had to be raised proportionately to keep up with the wages paid outside. On the other hand the prices of manufactured articles could not be raised further without making them unpopular. Please vide the two tabular forms attached.

SERICULTURAL SECTION.

71. During the floods on 31st October 1916, the Mulberry plantations, the building with all its equipment were washed away. The loss estimated at Rupees 3,350-8-0 as detailed below.

The rearing operations are carried out on a very small scale in a temporary shed. Until accommodation is ready the Industry cannot be renewed.

72. The Superintendent of industries was asked by the Mysore Government to communicate his views about the local sericulture which was complied with during the year.

Two Forest Range Officers of the Kurnool District were deputed by the District Forest Officer to receive instructions in Sericulture and to obtain practical knowledge of the various operations connected therewith. They were instructed in the rearing of silk worms and reeling of silk and also in Lac cultivation the brood of which was just inoculated on ziziphus jujuba.

OTHER INDUSTRIES.

73. *Lac Cultivation*:—Owing to floods in some places and great heat in other places, Brood lac could not be procured in sufficient quantity.

100 Brood sticks were obtained with great difficulty with the result that immediately after the inoculation heavy rains of October last washed away the brood to a great extent.

A few left behind was completely destroyed by the heavy floods of 31st October 1916.

74. *Fisheries*:—A quantity of murrel fish [was bought from the fisheries and it was being reared in the local water reservoirs as per expert opinion of the late Mr Wilson, but the recent floods carried them all away.

75. *Palm fibre*:—Enquiries are being made in various places for a suitable decorticating machine for palm fibre; the available machines in the market not being perfect. On account of the disturbed condition of the people owing to the floods, the matter was not taken up actively.

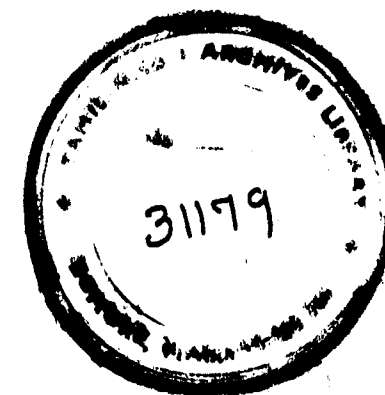

ADMINISTRATION REPORT
OF THE
BANGANAPALLE MUNICIPALITY
FOR THE
OFFICIAL YEAR 1916-1917.

Constitution of the Council.

76. During the year under report there were no important changes in the Council, M. R. Ry. G. Sreerama Sastri continued as Chairman.

The Council held 19 meetings during the year of which two were postponed for want of a quorum as against 27 meetings held in the previous year. Owing to the dislocation of work caused by the floods there was decrease in the number of meetings.

Mention needs be made of a calamitous event that occurred during the year under review. The town was subjected to the destructive floods caused by the breach of the Jolapuram tank 8 miles off the town on the 31st October 1916. Several people were rendered homeless and foodless. The Nawab rose to the occasion by distributing food and clothing among the needy and the poor and by affording shelter to several homeless families in public buildings and schools. Elevated areas in the vicinity of the town were acquired and divided into blocks. These were granted free to those who lost their houses in the floods. To facilitate and encourage reconstruction of houses the Darbar reduced the seigniorage on Palmyrah trees generally and in special deserving cases they were given free to the poor.

Special survey Establishment was organized by the Darbar to replace a new town on the ruins of the old—so that a well ventilated and healthy town may spring up in course of time. House building on the northern bank of the Zurreru South of Lawley road was prohibited by the Darbar as that area is always subject to floods.

Receipts.

77. Statement showing the Receipts and Charges as compared with the Budget Estimates are enclosed.

Tax on Arts:—131 persons were assessed to this tax and Rs. 82-8-0 against the demand of Rupees 302-8-0 were realised and Rs. 93-0-0 were written off. There remained at the end of the year a balance of Rs. 127. Of the arrear demand of Rs. 243-8-0 the amount of Rs. 49-0-0 was collected and Rs. 134—written off as irrecoverable. At the end of the official year there remained a balance of Rs. 60-8-0.

Tax on Buildings:—The demand under this head was Rs. 1,741-12-1 of which Rs. 374-10-11 were collected and Rs. 1,042-13-1 written off. There remained at the end of the year a balance of Rs. 326-4-1.

Out of a demand of Rs. 921-5-4 in arrears a sum of Rs. 130-13-7 was collected and Rs. 378-12-6 written off and at the end of the Official year there remained a balance of Rs. 311-11-3.

Tax on Lands:—Out of a demand of Rs. 249-3-6 a sum of Rs. 39-14-3 was collected and Rupees 66 5-9 were written off, the year closed with a balance of Rs. 142-15-6.

Of the arrear demand of Rs. 208-9-8 a sum of Rs. 50-15-4 was collected and Rs. 69-3-9 written off. There remained at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 88-6-7.

Coercive Process:—No warrants were issued during the year.

Tolls, Markets, and Slaughter House:—The amounts for which they were leased out have been collected during the year.

Contribution:—The state had contributed a sum of Rs. 3,500 in aid of the Municipal funds in addition to the amount spent under town improvement scheme as usual. The usual annual contribution was Rs. 5,000. The balance was withheld because the Darbar had to spend much on town works after the floods.

Incidence of taxation:—The incidence of taxation per head of the population with reference to the collection comes to Re. 0-6-1.

Expenditure.

78. The following works were executed during the year at a cost of Rs. 3,383-5-6.

1. Repairing the compound wall of Alli Bagh.
2. Repairing the parapet wall of Malik Naik Katta.
3. Laying a new road behind Sericulture farm.
4. Repairing the road of Syed Imdad Ali Sahib.
5. Repairing Moula Ali shrine road.
6. Repairing Navipet road.
7. Widening Yeramala street.
8. Constructing a two vents culvert on gosai mattam road.
9. Repairing a draw well in the compound of guest house.
10. Providing wings to the culvert of gosai mattam road.
11. Constructing a culvert of single vent on Yarkalavadi road.
12. Repairing the latrine of Kondapet.
13. Providing revetment to the Lawley road near Municipal Overseer's house.

All the above works were designed and estimated by the full time Overseer, and they were checked by the State Public Works Department Overseer and supervised by the Councillors.

79. *Vital Statistics*:—220 Births and 232 Deaths were registered during the year under report against 243 Births and 123 Deaths in the previous year. The increased mortality is due to the prevalence of fever and other diseases after the floods.

80. *Sanitation and Water supply*:—The Municipality engaged two double bullock carts for the removal of street refuse as usual, and the work was carried out most satisfactorily. The thanks of the Council are due for the keen interest taken by the Chief Medical and Sanitary Officer of the State in the Sanitary administration of the town.

81. *Private scavenging system*:—This system is working satisfactorily.

All the roads within the Municipal limits have been damaged by floods.

82. *Avenue trees*:—The avenues under the supervision of the Municipality are in good condition.

In the matter of removal of congestion in the town, the widening of streets and house planning and the opening of new roads much useful work was done by the Darbar.

83. The loss sustained this year by the Municipality was about Rs. 25,000. The highest flood level in the Municipal office which is situated on the right bank of the river was 9 feet. Much damage was done to Municipal Records. The Darbar was pleased to remit all the taxes of those houses which were washed away for the second half of the year.

84. The Political Agent visited and inspected the town after the floods.

The Municipal Council takes this opportunity to thank the Nawab for his kindness in protecting the poor at such a terrible crisis and every day by his personal inspection to each and every house affected and assisting them in all possible ways.

The Council thanks the Darbar again for sympathetic advice and kind encouragement in all Municipal matters.
