FOR THE OFFICIAL YEAR 1916-1917.

For situation, extent, population and short history of the Ruling family please see previous reports.

2. The most important event of the year under report was the devastation to the town of Banganapalle caused by the floods of the 31st October 1916.

3. The river Zurreru which runs from the West to the East of the State and joins the Konderu, divides the town of Banganapalle in two parts viz., Khasba and Kondapet. This stream irrigates along its banks a considerable area not only fields producing paddy and other food grains and vegetables but also mango and betel leaf gardens. There were innumerable bunds along its course from Pasapula to Kothapet a distance of nearly 20 miles diverting water for irrigation. Ordinarily it is a peaceful stream always fordable except for a few hours in rainy season when there are heavy rains higher up. On rare occasions water rose about 6 feet over the Dam which connects the two parts of the town. In 1893 there were high floods when a portion of the part of the Kasba close to the river and chiefly inhabited by the Rungrez (Dyers) people was washed off and since then people enjoyed immunity from abnormal floods.

4. *Floods of 31st October 1916.*—The rainfall during the year under report was unprecedentedly heavy. There were 8.26 inches in August and 7.72 inches in September 1916 and from the 21st September to the 14th October there was no rain. But from the 15th of that month to the 31st, 19.49 inches were registered of which 9.50 inches fell during the night of the 30th idem.

On the 24th October 1916 the Zurreru began to rise from the small hours of the morning and by 6 A.M. the floods rose to the highest known level cutting off all communication between Kasba and Kondapet. From 8 A.M. water began to recede; but the heavy and incessant rain and the extraordinary rise in the river had caused much damage to the houses of the poor people—also to the irrigation bunds along the Zurreru and to the fields in the area covered by the floods.

5. *Jolapuram Tank.*—To the West of the town of Banganapalle 7 miles a way is the village of Jolapuram and it has a tank which when full irrigates four villages viz:—Kristnagiri, Jolapuram, Pathapad and Yagantipalle. Its bund is $1\frac{1}{2}$ furlongs in length and 60 feet in height and its wasting channel which is cut across a rock is 30 feet wide at the mouth. The bund has two supports at its back and it joins two hills on either side.

There is nothing to show when the bund was constructed but the village gossip was to the effect that there were two huge masonry walls below the earthen bund making it impossible to breach. The tank scarcely received full supply. It was filled in 1912 and ever since it received half supply and even less. During the administration of the late Nawab which extended over a period of nearly 30 years the tank had received full supply only twice. The bund is so strong that to all outward appearance no possibility of any damage to its stability could be apprehended. The only fear was that in the event of an extraordinary flood if the supply channel worked abnormally the tank would overflow the bund; because the widening of the surplus weir was out of question as it is cut across a solid rock.

6. On the 24th October 1916 the Maistry in-charge and the Village officers of Jolapuram reported that the tank was quite full and the waves touched the top of the bund. The officer in-charge of the Public Works Department and the Dewan went to the bund and the following day the Nawab also inspected it. By noon on the 25th, water went down 5 feet and every fear of the over flow was removed. A maistry, two neerkuts and a gang of coolies were permanently kept

there and on the 28th night it was repaired and there was no flow from the wasting weir.

7. The heavy rains of the week ending the 30th October the extraordinary downpour of the 30th night (9.50 inches) caused floods in the river Zurreru and from 1 A.M. on the 31st October all communication between Kasba and Kondapet was cut off and the Zurreru began to rise slowly and at 5.30 A.M. the floods had reached the point attained the previous week. The supply channel of the Jolapuram tank also worked from about the same time viz., 1 A.M. and at about 6 A.M. a huge and very old Banyan tree standing on the lower bund was uprooted carrying with it one very old Tamarind and two mogosa trees. This unfortunate incident tended to loosen and to weaken that portion of the bund to a considerable extent, and within a few minutes the abnormal flow of the supply channel succeeded in making a passage through the weakened part of the bund breaching a portion 700 feet wide.

8. The flow from the breach of the tank rushed through paddy fields into the river Zurreru which was already in high floods. Jolapuram village which is situated on a higher level about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile to the North of the tank bund escaped damage, but Pathapad and its hamlet Madaspalle suffered to some extent.

9. The floods reached Banganapalle at 6.30 A.M. and lasted only 25 minutes. Immediately after, the river also resumed its normal flow. 742 houses in the town of Banganapalle and 212 houses in Naepet and Kapulapalle and 29 houses in three other villages along the bank of the river were totally washed off with all property in them.

17 lives mostly of women and children were lost in Kondapet. Indiscreet rush into the stream with a view to cross over to the adjoining hill and in some cases neglect to leave their houses and property at the first warning by the Police caused all the deaths.

10. The Police under Syed Ali Naqhi Sahib did remarkably well throughout the week. Strict watch was kept by the police and timely warnings were given regarding the rise in the river and in many cases forcible removal of those who clung to their falling houses was made during the previous night. All Rungrezpet and the adjoining locality, was vacated before the day dawned other wise the loss of life would have been much greater.

11. The Nawab threw open all the apartments of his palace for the poor and even his sitting room was occupied by scores of men, women, and children. About two thousand five hundred people had taken shelter in the Palace and the Nawab fed them all including many houseless poor outside for five days and supplied cloths, blankets, and bedding materials to many people. All public buildings were thrown open for the poor and all the out houses of the Palace are still occupied by those whose houses were lost by the floods.

12. Mr. H. G. Stokes C. I. E., I. C. S. visited Banganapalle after the floods to express sympathy with the Nawab and the people of Banganapalle. He inspected the flooded area and has since recommended to Government for the free grant of building materials to the poor people of the state. The supply is shortly expected.

13. The Nawab's brother, the Honourable Meer Asad Ali Khan Bahadur, started a Relief Fund to which H. H. the Nizam G. C. I. E., generously sanctioned Rs. 10,000. An amount of Rs. 12,000 in all was collected and distributed among the deserving poor by means of a committee presided over by the Honourable Meer Asad Ali Khan Bahadur whose practical sympathy and timely help did much to alleviate the sufferings of the poor. The thanks of the Durbar are due to His Excellency Lord Pentland and His Highness the Nizam for their generous contributions to the Relief Fund, to the Honourable Gentleman for the trouble he has taken in that direction and to all the subscribers for their liberal help.

14. The damages by the floods both to the Public and private property including land, gardens, and other moveable and immoveable property is roughly estimated at Rs. 6,92,427.

The year on the whole was fairly good. After part much sickness prevailed in the town as well as in villages. The malarial fever was prevalent to a considerable extent throughout the year. It is not a believer in the purity of drinking water. Though much was done by the Darbar in the matter of cleaning wells and as far as possible in supplying pure water for drinking but the villagers preferred stagnant water from vags and vankahs and resorted to step wells for their supply.

16. During the last five months of the year—November to March all public works of importance were suspended partly owing to the dearth of labour after the floods and partly with a view to economise. Only emergent repairs to roads, bridges, culverts, Dams and to public buildings were carried on.

17. Town:—A portion of the flooded area along the Northern Bank of the stream was prohibited for house building being too close to the river. A special survey establishment was entertained under Town improvement scheme, and an area of about 15 acres adjoining the old Town has been planned and divided into blocks for construction of houses with spacious and healthy roads. The old town affected by the floods has also been surveyed and planned with broad and spacious roads in place of narrow lanes. The latter half of the year was devoted entirely to the clearing of carcasses of animals from the houses ruined by floods, in clearing and shaping newly aligned roads and in making side channels and temporary culverts. Many ornamental works to the town which were done during a course of 9 years were carried away by the floods.

18. The Banganapalle—Sanjamala Road, The Nandavaram—Cherupalle road and the Bellum road suffered greatly on account of heavy rains and floods. The Nandavaram—Cherupalle road was almost completed and had become very useful because the whole locality was rocky and very difficult of access for vehicular traffic and for foot passengers.

19. The huge masonry katwa across the river Zurreru near Pathapad which was constructed at a cost of nearly Rs. 7,000 spread over four years, was practically wiped out. This katwa was of the greatest use to the people of Pathapad who raised garden crops under it.

20. These and other damages caused by the floods have to be repaired in course of a few years. It is under the serious contemplation of the Nawab to restore the Jolapuram tank. Expert opinion has to be taken in the matter of the reconstruction of the bund as the safety of the capital town depends to a considerable extent on its stability.

21. Education:—It will be observed from particulars given in Appendix XXI that there was a slight fall in the number of pupils and the average daily attendance. This was due to fevers prevailing in all villages. But there are very clear signs of popularity of education among the masses. The attendance and the applications for admission in the two girls schools in the town are very satisfactory. The Inspecting staff worked satisfactorily in maintaining efficiency throughout.

22. The Sahibzada:—The Nawab's eldest son, Meer Fazle Ali Khan Bahadur continues to make most satisfactory progress in the Mayo College Ajmere. The Principal, Mr. C. W. Waddington, C. I. E., M. V. O. in his report regarding his progress says:—"Has done extremely well, stands first in the annual examination, gains prizes for English, History, and Geography, Mathematics, Persian, Urdu, Religion, Aggregate, and extra marks."

22(a). The state continued the grant of Rs. 350 per month for the Hospital Ship "Madras."

23. Rainfall:—The rainfall of the year under report was inches 161.72 cents against inches 91.27 cents of previous year and average for the past five years of 77.88 inches. The rain was very excessive in all parts. The heavy rains of July to October and of February damaged choleam, cotton, ground-nuts and indigo crops. Many cultivated lands were left waste as the ryots could not plough them on account of heavy rains. The mango crop was an entire failure.

INCREASE.

Huzur office.—The difference is trifling.

*Tahsildar-Magistrate's office:—*The difference is trifling.

Medical Department:—To the rise of price of drugs on account of War.

Police Department:—Annual increment drawn by the Inspector and entertainment of a new Head Constable and six Constables account for the increase.

Stationery and Printing:—The cost of stationery, etc., increased on account of War.

Education of the Nawab's eldest son:—Increase is due partly to the enhancement of railway fares and partly to the trip to Delhi,

*Telegraph compensation:—*The difference is trifling.

Cattle Pound charges:—The difference is trifling.

*Refunds:—*The increase is due to collection of Assessment on Nawab's Serai lands.

31. *Village works*.—An amount of Rs. 4,847-9-10 was spent during the year under this head. The Nandavaram—Cherupalle Road a distance of over two miles was completed during the year and proved very useful; but this road was much damaged by the floods of October last. One village gate, four cattle pounds, one well, one Katva, one spring, one channel and two Kuntas were repaired. Sanitary arrangements in several festivals were also made. The malas and madigas of Pasapula who suffered by the floods have been given relief for food and cloths.

32. The following table shows the particulars of avenues in villages planted during the year and those already in existence.

42. *Agricultural stock*:—Appendix XVIII enclosed gives particulars of Agricultural stock.

43. *Vital statistics*:—As usual the Registration of Births and Deaths in the Banganapalle town and rural tracts is done by the Municipality and Village Officers respectively. In villages the work is checked by the Revenue Inspectors and Tahsildar during their tours. Particulars are given in Appendix I. There were 1025 deaths in villages during the year against 557 of previous year. Fever and dropsy were the main causes of deaths.

44. *Registration of Assurances*.—Please vide statements Nos. XIII and XIV appended.

613 documents were presented of which 611 with a value of Rs. 1,75,776-4-5 were registered during the year against 653 documents with a value of Rs. 1,58,766-1-5 of previous year.

DEPARTMENTS.

45. *Medical Department*:—Hospital staff continues to be the same as during the last year. The flood of the 31st of October 1916 did great damage to the Hospital. The in-patient building was totally dilapidated, the furniture wrecked and nearly three-fourths of the medicines in stock were spoiled as well as a number of hospital records.

The want of a place for keeping the in-patients is greatly felt.

The average daily number of out-patients treated during the year was 116-22 and in-door 8-37. The average for last year was 102-36 and 10-29 respectively.

There were no epidemic diseases during the year but there was a marked increase of patients under the head of ague, cough and cold.

46. *Midwifery Operations*:—One case of extraction of the fetus by forceps was admitted during the year, the patient recovered.

The mid-wife attached to the Hospital attended upon 51 cases of labour.

Minor Surgical Operations:—117 Minor Surgical Operations were performed during the year all of which recovered.

47. *Jail Department*:—19 convicts were admitted during the year and 4 remained from last year, making a total of 23. Out of this number 18 were discharged and 5 remained on the 31st March 1917.

No prisoners were punished during the year for misconduct. The discipline was satisfactorily maintained.

The total income from jail garden was Rs. 26 as against Rs. 150 in the previous year. The decrease is due to failure of plantain trees owing to want of water and also the failure of vegetable garden and Indigo crop from excessive rain.

The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 1,217-3-4 against Rs. 1,848-7-1 during the year previous. This decrease is due to less number of prisoners in jail during the year.

48. *Vaccination*:—All the records in connection with vaccination were washed away in the floods. Even the note books of the Vaccinators in pencil were in the boxes which were carried away. It is impossible now to give the number of cases vaccinated with their result, hence the return is nil.

After the floods not a single subject could be operated upon either in the town or in the villages from the homeless condition of the people in the former and prevalence of fever and cough in the latter localities. The supply of lymph therefore was temporarily discontinued.

The articles of furniture were also washed away with the records.

1st grade Vaccinator's services were dispensed with from the 1st October 1916. 2nd grade Vaccinator was promoted to 1st grade and an outsider was appointed as a Probationary Vaccinator from 1st November 1916.

49. *Police Department*:—The most satisfactory feature in the year under report is the marked drop in crime. There were 100 offences in the year under report as against 128 in 1915-1916. The amount of the stolen property was also comparatively less by about Rs. 748. The percentage of the recovery of stolen property was equally encouraging as it increased to about 2 per cent. This is a striking testimony of the efficiency of the Police both in the prevention and detection of crime. Six constables and one Head constable temporarily entertained after the floods have been retained as it has been found necessary to increase the strength of out stations.

50. *State Forests*:—The forest area is formed of a number of blocks occupying the slopes of Erramalais and Nallakonda hills along the western boundary of the State and the low hills in the south of the State. The total area of the forest is about 90 square miles, of which, about 16 square miles are reserved. The soil in all these hills is superficial and dry and not very favourable to tree growth. Epi trees are the prevailing species in the Erramalais and Nallakonda forests and they are of such limited height growth that the production of valuable timber is out of question. A marked difference is found between Erramalais and Nallakonda hills, the growth and reproduction being far more vigorous on the former than on the latter. The area producing Epi is about half the total area of the forest. The crop is irregular and every variation in density is to be met with. All other forests are mere scrub-jungles containing no timber trees of any value but they yield considerable quantities of fire-wood, green leaves for manuring purposes and other minor produce. The large Palmyrah tope at Gulamaliabad is a valuable asset to the State and it is the only forest which supplies useful timber. All the waste lands in the State and stream poramboke are under the control of the Forest Department. These lands are practically treated as reserved lands in so much that even the feeding of cattle, the removal of Tangedu bark, lime stones, grass and leaf manure are forbidden without express sanction. A portion of the valuable regu tope (ber-ban) along Knnakandla vagu has been set-apart for lac-industry. In addition to these, plantations consisting mainly of Casuarina and Divi-Divi trees and gardens containing Mango, Orange, Coconut and other fruit-bearing trees are under the management of the Forest Department. The valuable stone quarries which are worked on lease system were carefully conserved.

51. *System of management*:—All the trees in the babul tope at Nandivergam have been clear-felled and arrangements have been made to restock the felled area with fast-growing species which find favour in the soil. The Palmyrah tope at Gulam-Ali-Abad has been subjected to improvement fellings during the year. All other reserved blocks continued to be worked as in the previous years. The right to cut and remove palmyrah fibre and other minor produce in the tope has been leased out. Small timber, dead-wood, thatching grass and other minor produce in all the state forests with the exception of reserved blocks, are disposed of under license or permit system. This system will prevail in some form or other till the state forests become quite fit for departmental working on the recognised lines. During the year, existing boundary lines have been recleared and vastly improved. Arrangements have since been made for the demarcation of the frontier boundary with permanent field marks. During the annual verification of the frontier boundary

lines it was observed that there were encroachments near Ghulamaliabad and Malkapur village limits. As per existing survey map, the State Palmyrah tope will form a part of Bangapuram reserved forests. The State has been, from time immemorial, in the undisputed enjoyment of the whole palmyrah tope. All these frontier boundary disputes have not yet been finally disposed of.

52. *Forest offence*:—During the year all cases were disposed of departmentally.

53. *Fire-protection*:—Special arrangements have been made for the rigid protection of the palmyrah tope from fire as the damage done there is very great. During the year no serious damage by fire took place in any forest area.

54. *Method of treatment*:—The four reserved blocks namely Ghulamaliabad, Krishnagiri, Ramathirtham and Giddalore were not worked during the year as they require complete rest. A median line about two thirds of the way down the escarpment of the hill in the Ghulamaliabad reserved block has been cut departmentally and the portion of the forest above the median line has been completely closed against grazing, etc., as per provisions of the working scheme. The unreserved forests capable of yielding a large quantity of fire-wood were hitherto worked on permit system to supply small green wood and fuel for the neighbouring population. Under the strictest supervision a certain amount of damage to the forest is inevitable, hence the pernicious permit system will be abandoned for one that gives greater control to the establishment over the exploitation of the forest.

55. *Sylvicultural operations*:—The year was generally favourable for natural regeneration in the palmyrah tope. Additions were made to the existing plantations. On 31st October 1916 the Jurreru and Kundu rivers caused fearful floods and the damage caused by these to the plantations has been very serious. A large portion of the divi-divi plantation in Ghulamaliabad has been buried under sand and a casuarina plantation at Banganapalle has been completely washed away. The valuable casuarina plantation consisting of about 4000 trees at Narasapalle was seriously damaged. The Kundu river has brought down large quantities of sand and gravel and has destroyed more than 3000 casuarina trees in the plantation. Steps are being taken to restock the blanks. The forest growth along the rivers in the stream porambokes has been completely destroyed. Experimental cultivation of different kinds of exotic fruit trees in the nursery during the year has been very successful. The dwarf Indo-Chinese sapota grafts, seedless mammoth guavas, different kinds of pumelows, kubuli and other rare varieties of pomigranates and a large number of selected varieties of mango grafts viz.:—Selimabegam, Dophulla Te-pulla, Bhaduria and creeping mango plants which were imported from Calcutta gardens are thriving satisfactorily. Plantations of valuable trees were largely extended and maintained in a satisfactory condition. Mango grafts viz., Jahangir, Nurjahan, the Royal George seedless Orange grafts, the Australasian seedless grapes and blue vine were some of the rare and interesting novelties in fruit trees introduced in the state garden. In addition to these many assorted varieties of bamboos, a large number of valuable timber and ornamental avenue trees such as Mahogany, silver-oak, travellers-palm, sissoo, asoka, magnolia champaka and other exotic have been planted and all of them are in a vigorous state of growth. The recent floods in the Jurreru river have washed away almost all the valuable private mango gardens along the banks of the river. By far the greater number of mango trees in Banganapalle are grafts and as usual in such conditions the quality of the fruit is extremely varied and a great majority being most delicious fruits. The loss of such mango gardens in a severe blow at the pocket of Banganapalle fruit dealing ryot. The state garden contains select varieties of mango trees (grafts). It is proposed to graft a large number of mango plants for departmental use and public sale. All endeavours will be made to extend and improve the mango gardens which were affected by the floods.

56. *Privileges to ryots*:—The free grazing of all plough-cattle, free removal of head loads of dry fuel and other produce for bona-fide agricultural purposes and other privileges were continued to be enjoyed by the ryots. The terrible floods have washed away a greater portion of Banganapalle and Kondapet and made thousands of people homeless. Every reasonable concession was shown by the Nawab to those who lost their houses. Free permit for a large number of palmyrah trees, thatching grass and other produce have been issued.

57. *Horticultural garden*:—Some useful work was done towards the improvement of the garden. Different varieties of cocoanuts such as Ceylon-dwarf and Singapore, Leeches, Lakota, rose apples and other fruit trees and different varieties of roses which were introduced into the garden during the year are coming up satisfactorily. All those planted during the last year or two have also made good progress. During the year a beginning was made on a small scale of pot-culture experiments. A large number of valuable palms, ferns, crotons and foliage plants in the garden have been re-potted and vastly improved. Different varieties of bougainvillea, passiflora, antigonon and other valuable climbers which were planted during the year are thriving well. Better arrangements have been made for a good supply of water in the garden as a good supply of it is indispensable if success is to be attained.

58. *Minor forest industries*:—Charcoal making and lime burning were the only minor forest industries which were undertaken and worked on a large scale by the department during the year. The demand for lime is increasing and this industry is sure to undergo an enormous expansion in the state.

DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIES.

WEAVING AND DYEING SECTION.

59. *Looms*:—12 country carpet and Bed-sheet looms were purchased and added to the factory and they were given to poor and helpless widows for home labour. All of these were washed away by the floods.

A twisting machine and a Nakki lace loom were also purchased during the year. A trained man from Bangalore was engaged to fit up the Nakki loom and train the workmen in the factory for a period of three weeks. All these labours were undone by the floods the looms having been irreparably damaged.

60. *Jacquard machine*:—The frame of the machine received from Messrs Greave Cotton & Co last year was broken in transit and therefore a fresh frame was indented for. Though it was supplied for a second time at the cost of the Insurance Company it was again received in a broken condition. The frame was at last received later in the year and it could not be fitted up completely owing to the dislocation of business caused to the factory building by the floods of the 31st October 1916.

61. *Loss on account of floods*:—The factory suffered a great loss owing to the floods.

62. *Appointment*:—A temporary clerk was appointed to help the Superintendent of industries and to relieve the professional men of the staff from the clerical work which they were attending hither to.

63. *Training*:—Applications were received from various quarters for training in weaving and sizing and were attended to duly.

64. *Town improvement Scheme*:—Under the new Town planning scheme after the floods a road is aligned which runs through the factory, separating the store, dyeing and Chemical rooms from the main building. A verandah and a hall are also affected in this connection and the looms located in those places had to be adjusted in the main building. Two large portable looms had to be dismantled for want of room.

65. *Exhibitions*:—During the year exhibits from the factory were sent to the following exhibitions:—

Viz. (1) Lalgudi Trichinopoly District (2) Oachera of Travancore (3) Mysore (4) Rungpur in Bengal and (5) Baroda.

A silver medal and a certificate of merit for the carpets and collections grains were awarded by the Oachera exhibition authorities. A certificate of merit and a silver medal by the Lalgudi authorities. A certificate of honourable mention by the Mysore authorities. Owing to some delay caused by the Railway authorities the exhibits for Rungpur arrived at their destination too late and were therefore returned without being exhibited. The Superintendent of industries was invited by the President of the Lalgudi exhibition to preside as a judge for the Industrial section but the kind invitation had to be declined on account of pressure of work.

A certificate of merit was also awarded by the Lalgudi exhibition committee to one of the students of the state Secondary School for chalk drawing exhibited through this department.

Commercial Museum Calcutta—Some of the state manufactures were sent for permanent exhibition to this museum and some orders too were received from visitors of the museum which were complied with.

66. *Carpet market*—An order for the supply of carpets for the military department at Bangalore could not be executed completely owing to the temporary suspension of work caused by the floods. A large American order for carpets was also received and is being executed. The progress is very slow owing to the small number of workmen due to several of the weavers having lost their houses in the floods and taken to more lucrative occupations.

67. *War Relief*—Carpets costing about Rs. 21 were given to the national Indian association as a free gift. These carpets are intended for sale at the stalls of the Indian goods which were opened on the 8th and 9th December 1916 by the said association. The amount realised therefrom would go towards the funds to alleviate the sufferings of the wounded soldiers at the front.

68. *Visitors*—Mr. S. S. Nair of the Indian industrial conference, Revd. B. J. Rockwood, Miss String-fellow, Rev J. T. Todman, and Mr. G. W. Thompson were among the distinguished visitors to the factory during the year.

69. *Dyeing*—Owing to the rise in prices of synthetic dyes recourse had to be had to vegetable dyeing. The experiments so far conducted in this direction have been satisfactory.

70. *Financial results of the working of the weaving factory*—The total outlay for the year under report was Rs. 7,674-4-7 distributed among three main heads as explained in the accompanying tabular statement. That is to say that a sum of Rs. 1,170-7-5 had to be spent on special charges having no direct bearing on the working of the factory proper (Please vide tabular form No. 1). A further sum of Rs. 897-1-5 was spent on the purchase of appliances, etc., whose charges are non-recurring. Setting aside these two items of expenditure "special charges" and "Non-recurring charges" a sum of Rs. 5,612-2-9 was used exclusively for the weaving and dyeing operations with the result that a sum of Rs. 2,659-5-2 was realized from the sale of manufactures and there is a stock of manufactured articles and raw materials to the value of Rs. 6,182-15-7 plus Rs. 1,304-1-11 (vide item Nos. 1, 2 and 4 of tabular form II). Of this sum an amount of Rs. 6,316 has to be deducted being the cost of manufactures and raw materials lying as balance at the beginning of the year showing thereby a loss of Rs. 1781-12-1 on the direct transaction against a gain of Rs. 460 during the previous year. This is due indirectly to the floods and also partly to the rise in prices of raw materials and dyes. It is due to the floods for the following reasons.—Some of the manufactured articles damaged by the floods and heavy rains had to be sold at a reduced price. Previous to the floods several looms were given out to destitute widows and other persons from which source a large quantity of manufactured articles were being received; besides a large number of weavers were also attending the factory which compensated for the large establishment maintained. During the floods all these looms lent out to widows and to poor women, etc., were washed away together with their dwellings and belongings. The number of weavers who attended work decreased after the floods. The production of manufactures was thereby greatly reduced. The establishment for the maintenance of which

 to the distress. 1. Yet another cause was the high prices of raw materials and dyes and also the suspension of goods traffic over Railways necessitating the getting and despatching of raw materials and manufactured articles per Railway parcel paying high freight. To add to these, labour became scarce and expensive as most of the buildings in Banganapalle had been washed away or damaged and reconstruction was going on on all sides. The wages of the few weavers attending the factory had to be raised proportionately to keep up with the wages paid outside. On the other hand the prices of manufactured articles could not be raised further without making them unpopular. Please vide the two tabular forms attached.

71. During the floods on 31st October 1916, the Mulberry plantations, the building with all its equipment were washed away. The loss estimated at Rupees 3,350-8-0 as detailed below.

The rearing operations are carried out on a very small scale in a temporary shed. Until accommodation is ready the Industry cannot be renewed.

72. The Superintendent of industries was asked by the Mysore Government to communicate his views about the local sericulture which was complied with during the year.

Two Forest Range Officers of the Kurnool District were deputed by the District Forest Officer to receive instructions in Sericulture and to obtain practical knowledge of the various operations connected therewith. They were instructed in the rearing of silk worms and reeling of silk and also in Lac cultivation the brood of which was just inoculated on ziziphus jujuba.

OTHER INDUSTRIES.

73. Lac Cultivation:—Owing to floods in some places and great heat in other places, Ber Brood lac could not be procured in sufficient quantity.

100 Brood sticks were obtained with great difficulty with the result that immediately after the inoculation heavy rains of October last washed away the brood to a great extent.

A few left behind was completely destroyed by the heavy floods of 31st October 1916.

74. Fisheries:—A quantity of murrel fish [was bought from the fisheries and it was being reared in the local water reservoirs as per expert opinion of the late Mr Wilson, but the recent floods carried them all away.

75. Palm fibre:—Enquiries are being made in various places for a suitable decorticating machine for palm fibre; the available machines in the market not being perfect. On account of the disturbed condition of the people owing to floods the matter was not taken up actively.

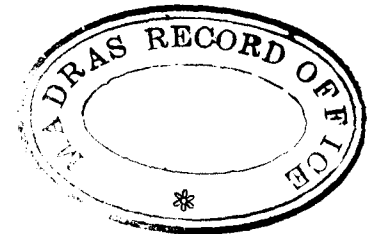

Constitution of the Council.

76. During the year under report there were no important changes in the Council, M. R. Ry. G. Sreerama Sastri continued as Chairman.

The Council held 19 meetings during the year of which two were postponed for want of a quorum as against 27 meetings held in the previous year. Owing to the dislocation of work caused by the floods there was decrease in the number of meetings.

Mention needs be made of a calamitous event that occurred during the year under review. The town was subjected to the destructive floods caused by the breach of the Jolapuram tank 8 miles off the town on the 31st October 1916. Several people were rendered homeless and foodless. The Nawab rose to the occasion by distributing food and clothing among the needy and the poor and by affording shelter to several homeless families in public buildings and schools. Elevated areas in the vicinity of the town were acquired and divided into blocks. These were granted free to those who lost their houses in the floods. To facilitate and encourage reconstruction of houses the Durbar reduced the seigniorage on Palmyrah trees generally and in special deserving cases they were given free to the poor.

Special survey Establishment was organized by the Durbar to replace a new town on the ruins of the old—so that a well ventilated and healthy town may spring up in course of time. House building on the northern bank of the Zurreru South of Lawley road was prohibited by the Durbar as that area is always subject to floods.

Receipts.

77. Statement showing the Receipts and Charges as compared with the Budget Estimates are enclosed.

Tax on Arts:—131 persons were assessed to this tax and Rs. 82-8-0 against the demand of Rupees 302-8-0 were realised and Rs. 93-0-0 were written off. There remained at the end of the year a balance of Rs. 127. Of the arrear demand of Rs. 243-8-0 the amount of Rs. 49-0-0 was collected and Rs. 134—written off as irrecoverable. At the end of the official year there remained a balance of Rs. 60-8-0.

Tax on Buildings:—The demand under this head was Rs. 1,741-12-1 of which Rs. 374-10-11 were collected and Rs. 1,047-13-1 written off. There remained at the end of the year a balance of Rs. 326-4-1.

Out of a demand of Rs. 921-5-4 in arrears a sum of Rs. 130-13-7 was collected and Rs. 378-12-6 written off and at the end of the Official year there remained a balance of Rs. 311-11-3.

Tax on Lands:—Out of a demand of Rs. 249-3-6 a sum of Rs. 39-14-3 was collected and Rupees 66 5-9 were written off, the year closed with a balance of Rs. 142-15-6.

Of the arrear demand of Rs. 208-9-8 a sum of Rs. 50-15-4 was collected and Rs. 69-3-9 written off. There remained at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 88-6-7.

Coercive Process:—No warrants were issued during the year.

Tolls, Markets, and Slaughter House:—The amounts for which they were leased out have been collected during the year.

Contribution:—The state had contributed a sum of Rs. 3,500 in aid of the Municipal funds in addition to the amount spent under town improvement scheme as usual. The usual annual contribution was Rs. 5,000. The balance was withheld because the Durbar had to spend much on town works after the floods.

Incidence of taxation:—The incidence of taxation per head of the population with reference to the collection comes to Re. 0-6-1.

78. The following works were executed during cost of Rs. 3,383-5-6.

1. Repairing the compound wall &c.
2. Repairing the parapet wall of Malik Naik Katta.
3. Laying a new road behind Sericulture farm.
4. Repairing the road of Syed Imdad Ali Sahib.
5. Repairing Moula Ali shrine road.
6. Repairing Navipet road.
7. Widening Yerramala street.
8. Constructing a two vents culvert on gosai mattam road.
9. Repairing a draw well in the compound of guest house.
10. Providing wings to the culvert of gosai mattam road.
11. Constructing a culvert of single vent on Yarkalavadi road.
12. Repairing the latrine of Kondapet.
13. Providing revetment to the Lawley road near Municipal Overseer's house.

All the above works were designed and estimated by the full timed Overseer, and they were checked by the State Public Works Department Overseer and supervised by the Councillors.

79. *Vital Statistics*:—220 Births and 232 Deaths were registered during the year under report against 243 Births and 123 Deaths in the previous year. The increased mortality is due to the prevalence of fever and other diseases after the floods.

80. *Sanitation and Water supply*:—The Municipality engaged two double bullock carts for the removal of street refuse as usual, and the work was carried out most satisfactorily. The thanks of the Council are due for the keen interest taken by the Chief Medical and Sanitary Officer of the State in the Sanitary administration of the town.

81. *Private scavenging system*:—This system is working satisfactorily.

All the roads within the Municipal limits have been damaged by floods.

82. *Avenue trees*:—The avenues under the supervision of the Municipality are in good condition.

In the matter of removal of congestion in the town, the widening of streets and house planning and the opening of new roads much useful work was done by the Darbar.

83. The loss sustained this year by the Municipality was about Rs. 25,000. The highest flood level in the Municipal office which is situated on the right bank of the river was 9 feet. Much damage was done to Municipal Records. The Darbar was pleased to remit all the taxes of those houses which were washed away for the second half of the year.

84. The Political Agent visited and inspected the town after the floods.

The Municipal Council takes this opportunity to thank the Nawab for his kindness in protecting the poor at such a terrible crisis and every day by his personal inspection to each and every house affected and assisting them in all possible ways.

The Council thanks the Darbar again for sympathetic advice and kind encouragement in all Municipal matters.

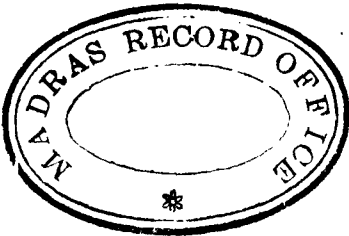

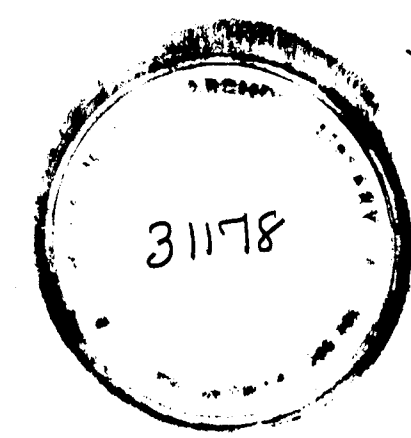

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ADMINISTRATION REPORT

OF THE

BANGANAPALLE STATE

FOR THE YEAR 1908-1909.

CHAPTER 1.

General and Political:—The Banganapalle State consists of three isolated blocks of country situated in the south of the Kurnool District. The main block with the capital of the State contains 55 villages and four hamlets while the second block has four villages, namely, Sunkesula, Singavaram, Belloom and Mirzapuram and the third block has only one village—Govindapalle—with 102 survey fields and a population of 215.

2. The extent of the whole State including hills, village sites, cultivated lands and porambokes is 275 sq. miles and the population is 32,000, averaging 116 per sq. mile. Hindus form the majority of the population and the Muhammadans come next. There are only a few Christians among the Panchama class in a few villages under the patronage of the London Missionary Society. The total revenue of the State including all sources and excluding debt heads is Rs. 2,63,166 according to the settlement brought into force during the official year under report. The State pays no tribute.

3. Banganapalle does not possess any valuable forests or large irrigation works. The range of hills extending from the southern extremity of the town of Banganapalle to the extreme west of the State contains diamond deposits; and an area of 18 square miles has been leased out to Khan Bahadur Walji Laulji Sait Sahib for a period of 20 years commencing from 1st January 1906. The mines are worked by a Madras Syndicate connected with the Anglo-Indian Trading Company and the work has not yet reached a stage at which an idea regarding the future prospects can be formed.

4. *The town of Banganapalle:*—The town of Banganapalle is noted for its beautiful fruit gardens which are planted along the banks of the river Jurreru and the vagu called the “Room Nala” Mr. C. E. Moir in his settlement report describes the town of Banganapalle in the following terms:—“The banks of the Jurreru are wooded and the the topes with which they are lined give more variety to the scenery round Banganapalle town which, with its picturesque fort, its wide bazaars and orchards and the view of the Pasupula hills stands out in pleasing contrast to the unredeemed ugliness of the ordinary Kurnool town or village”. But the beautiful gardens of Banganapalle have been considerably damaged on account of the continued deficiency of rain prevailing for the last 9 or 10 years. The Jurreru which was once a perennial stream and which did not diminish its supply even in the famine of 1877-78 is totally dry except during a couple of months in the rainy season.

5. *Political History*:—Banganapalle was originally under the territorial limits of Chola and after that the Vizianagar Kingdoms. Subsequently, it fell under the conquest of the Kings of Bijapore, whose general, Siddi Sumbul, had Banganapalle conferred on him as Jaghir. This Siddi Sumbul is buried in Banganapalle. On the overthrow of the Deccan Kingdoms by Aurangzebe in 1636 A. D., Muhammad Baig Khan was appointed Killadar of Banganapalle which was thenceforward subordinated to the Nizam of Hyderabad and remained so until 1800 A.D., when its control was transferred to the British Government. Muhammad Baig Khan was succeeded by his son-in-law, Ata Khan, who was succeeded by Muhammad Baig Khan's son, Fazle Ali Khan, in 1723 A.D. Fazle Ali Khan was succeeded by his son also named Fazle Ali Khan who ruled Banganapalle until 1769 A.D., when he was succeeded by his nephew, Hussain Ali Khan. This Hussain Ali Khan served in the armies of Hyder Ali of Mysore with great distinction and after the death of the latter he died on his way to Banganapalle from Mysore he had four sons all of whom were minors and Tippu hearing of their father's death summoned them to Mysore, but their mother refused to let them go and in the result Tippu confiscated Banganapalle and appointed his own man, Muhammad Eussuff, Killadar. The family of Hussain Ali Khan fled to Hyderabad with their uncle, Syed Asad Ali Khan, who gained great distinction in the Nizam's army. Shortly afterwards Asad Ali Khan regained Banganapalle defeating Tippu's officers, Muhammad Eussuff and Qutbud-din in the battle of Tamadapalle in 1791 A.D. He bestowed the Jaghir on one of his nephews, Syed Ghulam Ali Khan also known as Munsurud-Dowlah Auzam. Syed Ghulam Ali Khan was an absentee ruler and he always preferred to remain in Hyderabad and to meet the claims of his brothers and cousins he originated the Sub-Jaghir system which was abolished by the intervention of the British Government in July 1905 as it was found that the perpetual partition was detrimental to the existence of the State itself. Really if the Sub-Jaghir system had been allowed to continue for a few more generations the Nawab, ruler of the State, would have been master of only a portion of a village and ultimately a few fields and portions of fields till at last nothing remained to be partitioned. In 1822 Munsurud Dowlah was succeeded by his son, Syed Hussain Ali Khan, and during his administration the State having been hopelessly involved in debts was taken over by the British Government and was restored in 1848. Hussain Ali Khan died shortly after the restoration and was succeeded by his brother's son, Syed Ghulam Ali Khan who after ruling 18 years was succeeded by his nephew, Syed Fatah Ali Khan Bahadur c.s.t., who ruled 33 years but at the latter end of his administration the State was again involved in financial difficulties to such an extent as to render the interference of the paramount power inevitable. The administration was therefore assumed by the Madras Government on the 1st February 1905. Syed Fatah Ali Khan Bahadur died on the 22nd April 1905 and was succeeded by his eldest son, Syed Ghulam Ali Khan Bahadur who was formally installed on the 19th December 1908 by His Excellency Sir Arthur Lawley, Governor of Madras, the administration in the meanwhile having been under a Political Officer, Mr. J. C. Molony i.e.s., in the capacity of Assistant Political Agent.

6. The present Nawab is 35 years of age and he is a Muhammadan of Shiah sect. He is a widower; his Begam, daughter of his paternal uncle, died on the 25th September 1908, leaving three children, two sons and one daughter, the eldest of whom named Fazle Ali Khan, is about seven years of age.

7. Unlike any of his predecessors the present Nawab was carefully trained in the administration work by a European member of the Indian Civil Service Mr. Molony, who took the keenest interest in the well-being of the State and its ruler. His Excellency Sir Arthur Lawley in his Durbar speech at the installation of the Nawab referred to Mr. Molony's work in Banganapalle in the following terms:— "The four years during which Mr. Molony has been here he has shown himself capable of combining fidelity to the traditions of the Indian Civil Service together with absolute loyalty to the State of Banganapalle, and while solicitous at all times for the welfare of the ryot he has been zealous for the dignity, the prestige and the fair name of the Nawab. The task of restoring the State from the deplorable condition in which she found herself at the beginning of this century to the sound and solvent condition in which she finds herself to-day reflects the greatest possible credit on Mr. Molony's conduct of administration." With regard to the attainments

of the Nawab in State craft, Mr. Molony in his report for the past year (1907-1908) says:—"Throughout this report will be found indications of the personal interest taken by the Nawab in the Government of Banganapalle. Commencing with duties of Sub-Magistrate he has gradually taken over the general superintendence of practically all executive and judicial work throughout the State." Banganapalle is thus fortunate in having an enlightened ruler who after devoting himself with zeal and energy has acquired a thorough insight into the work of administration on the modern methods and who understands his duties to the State and to the people committed to his care.

8. The most notable events of the year were the sad death of the Begam which has been already referred to; the tour of the Nawab in Northern India during which he visited Calcutta, Allahabad, Benares, Aligarh, Ajmere and other important places including Bombay; the visit of His Excellency Sir Arthur Lawley K. C. M. C., and the formal installation of the Nawab on the Masnad of the State. Much importance was attached to H. E. Sir Arthur Lawley's visit as it was the first occasion on which Banganapalle had the good fortune of being visited by a Governor. After the installation of the Nawab the Political Agent Mr. J. H. Robertson visited Banganapalle at the close of the year. The Nawab toured throughout the State during the year.

9. The departure of Mr. and Mrs. Molony—the Political and social regenerators of Banganapalle—was also an important event in the history of the State. The first European family that ever resided in the State Mr. and Mrs. Molony had endeared themselves to all classes of people by their kind and amiable disposition and by their free and unreserved sociability, and so it was with a heavy heart that Banganapalle bade good-bye to them on the 30th December 1908.

2. The scheme for the settlement of Land Revenue alluded to in the report for the previous year has been brought into force during the year under report. The old assessment arising from Land Revenue, Jodi, etc., was Rs. 1,84,800 while the new assessment according to the Settlement is Rs. 1,99,800 in round figures which gives an increase of 8 per. cent. on the old rates. From Rs. 1,99,800 however an amount of Rs. 8,225 has to be deducted—Rs. 3,345 being assessment on the Nawab's seri lands which is not collected and Rs. 4,880 being half the revenue on the seri lands of the ex-Jaghirdars, to be remitted during the life time of the present enjoyers. The ex-Jaghirdar of Navipet sold some fields of his seri during the year and those fields were assessed fully. The amount of deductions therefore will always be a fluctuating item during the life time of the present holders.

3. The small increase in the new settlement rates is principally on inam lands which have hitherto enjoyed ridiculously low rates, specially, in some of the resumed Jaghir villages. The fixity of tenure and the equitable distribution of the burden of taxation, hitherto unknown in the state is a source of great satisfaction to the ryot and no difficulty whatever was experienced in the collection of revenue.

4. The coercive processes were two in number as in the previous year. Demand notice No. I is only a written notice demanding payment, while No. II authorises distraint in case of non-payment. 1208 notices No. I were issued during the year involving an amount of Rs. 7,881 against 1906 for Rs. 9,535 in the previous year; and 119 notices No. II for an amount of Rs. 644 were issued against 44 for Rs. 367 in the previous year. Thus showing a decrease in the number of notices No. I and an increase in that of No. II, but the amount realized by means of No. II being nearly double that of the last year, it is clear that only very small amounts were involved. The steady diminution in the number of demand notices shows that the ryots are beginning to understand their duties to the State. The defaulters in the majority of cases were the non-resident pattadars and inamdars who remove the harvests of their fields to their own villages in British India and think no more of discharging their dues till all procedure is exhausted, hence the increase in the issue of No. II notices.

5. The total area under cultivation was 1,08,123 acres against 1,05,534 acres in the previous year, or an increase of 2,579 acres which was due to the favourable nature of the season. 553 acres yielding a revenue of Rs. 320 were taken up on 78 Darkhasts while 121 acres yielding Rs. 60 were relinquished and 311 transfer applications involving 2,298 acres with a revenue of Rs. 4,759 were effected during the year.

6. Only road cess was collected during the year the proposals for its abolition having been given up. The village officers and village servants were paid in cash according to the scale provisionally drawn up and enforced in the past year. It will however be revised in the current official year in the light of the information afforded by the new settlement.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION.

Legislation.—The Civil and Criminal Courts of the state follow the laws in force in the Madras Presidency. During the year under report concise rules called the "Banganapalle Civil Service Regulations" have been brought into force from the 1st November 1908. It is too premature yet to pass any opinion on its working.

POLICE.

2. The total strength of the force consisted of one Inspector, 9 Head constables and 67 constables including the addition of one Head constable and 5 constables during the year as recommended by the District Superintendent of Police, Kurnool.

3. The improvement in the discipline and drill has been efficiently maintained. Drill and musketry practice are taught by the Inspector who is a retired commissioned Officer of the Indian army assisted by two Head constables who are also retired non-commissioned officers. A batch of 4 constables and 1 Head constable is sent to the Kurnool Police school for training in Police duties. The last batch was sent in March last. The period of training is fixed at six months.

4. The Police is armed with batons, and ten Martins Henry rifles .476 bore were supplied to them for use at the Jail and Treasury guards to which an addition of two was made during the year at the recommendation of the District Superintendent of Police, Kurnool. 37 men underwent training in Musketry and constable No. 48 Nabi Saib, won the State prize for the highest number of marks in shooting. Head Constable No. 70 Khasim Baig won the prize offered by the Nawab for a shooting competition between the Police Inspector and Head constables Khasim Baig and Mustafa Khan.

5. The conduct of the men has been generally satisfactory. Three constables were dismissed; one Head constable and one constable were reduced to the next lower grade for disobedience of orders and one constable was judicially punished for assaulting the Inspector. Eleven constables were entitled to approved service allowance at the close of the year and the increment of one rupee per month to their salaries has been sanctioned from the 1st of April 1909.

6. Police lines containing accommodation for three constables and one Head constable at Chinnarajupaliem were completed during the year where a pukka police station was built last year. The building of the Inspector's quarters at Banganapalle was completed and occupied at a monthly rental of Rs. 5 and lines for the accommodation of 12 constables are in the course of construction in the vicinity of the new cutcheries. With the exception of Kasba station which continues to be located in an old building all the mofussil stations are provided with pukka buildings. A new station for Kasba is in the course of construction.

7. The work of the Police during the year was satisfactory, much activity having been displayed by the Inspector in preventive work by checking night beats both at head quarters and at the Mofussil stations. Gangs of Donga Waddars and Yerikalas gave some trouble at the close of the year in the frontier villages. Several arrests were made which account for the increased number of arrests over the previous year shown in column 5 of appendix IV. A special high road night beat consisting of two constables was started from Banganapalle to meet a similar batch from the Nandiwaragam station half way on the Paniam road.

8. The village Police consisted of 60 paid Tallaries as in the previous year. This number with the regular police force gives a ratio of one police man to every 234 people and that to area 1 police man for every 2 square miles.

9. The cost of maintaining the force during the year was Rs. 11,565-13-5 against Rs. 9,540-10-0. The increase is due to the expenditure incurred on account of the following items:—

1. Scarcity allowance of one rupee to each constable.
2. Addition of 1 Head constable and 5 constables to the existing staff.

2. The rainfall of the year was generally satisfactory, being nearly $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches more than that of last year. The rain was amply sufficient and timely for crops and more or less general throughout the State. But it was certainly insufficient to restore old springs or to increase the water supply in wells. In the town of Banganapalle specially most of the drinking water wells had run dry long before the summer season commenced. The spring at Birvole from which there was a perennial supply of water which irrigated about 50 acres of garden crops, was totally dry in the middle of winter though it was deepened and repaired. The natural springs at Yagante, Rama Tirtam and Pasupula have a diminished supply.

3. The Jolapuram tank, the largest tank in the State, received only a scanty supply. This tank when full, has the capacity to irrigate four villages,—Jolapuram, Krishnagiri, Pauthapaud and Yagantapalli—in all about 450 acres. But, the supply this year was hardly sufficient to irrigate the wet fields of two of the nearest villages,—Jolapuram and Krishnagiri,—and had it not been for the small supply received during April, the wet crops sown under the tank would have suffered greatly.

4. The crops throughout the State yielded a very good harvest and the steady rise in prices consequent on the large exports of grain to other provinces combined with the introduction of the new settlement rates and decrease of assessment on patta lands has been of great advantage to the ryot who is quite contented and happy.

5. A sum of Rs. 2,575 was advanced to the ryots for sinking wells and Rs. 1,920 for constructing bunds in fields and for the purchase of agricultural implements and bulls. Ryots are beginning to realise the advantages of sinking wells.

6. Appendix XVIII gives particulars of agricultural stock. The number of bulls shown is 5757. But this number only represents the number of bulls actually with the resident ryots of the State but large extent of land is cultivated by ryots residing in the neighbouring British villages and their cattle are not accounted for in the State. During the ploughing and sowing season these ryots bring their bulls from their villages and take them back when the work is over.

7. The condition of cattle was generally good during the year. Rinderpest prevailed to some extent but there was no mortality except among buffaloes.

8. Of the thirty Nellore cows and 2 bulls purchased for breeding purposes in February 1907 at the Ongole show one bull calf and 2 cow calves were sold during the year making a total of 11 bull and 7 cow calves sold since the importation of the herd; 16 cows, 2 cow calves and one bull calf were boarded out on sharing terms with influential ryots. 9 cows and 18 calves and also 2 bulls were sold by auction during the year for an amount of Rs. 1,825 to be paid by instalments and on condition of not disposing of them until the whole amount is paid up.

LABOUR AND WAGES.

9. The wages of labour remained stationary. Agricultural labour is most popular in Banganapalle. The installation of the Nawab, the Municipality and the Department of Public Works afforded much work to the labourer. The Banganapalle labourer prefers low wage and light labour to high wage and hard labour which is due naturally to his laziness. The mining works pay annas four for day labour and annas five for night.

10. The prices of food grains rose very high as already noted. The staple food grain cholam was sold at 12 seers per rupee at a season when it was generally sold at nearly 30 seers—the Banganapalle seer being of 84 tolas. In consequence of the high price the scarcity allowance to public servants of Rs. 2 per mensem to those drawing less than Rs. 6 and of Re. 1 to those drawing Rs. 7 to Rs. 15, was continued throughout the year.

FORESTS.

11. The only valuable forest is the Palmyra tope in Chinnarajupaliem limits which supplies timber for buildings to the whole State and also to the surrounding British villages. The village of Giddalore in the extreme south of the main block

of the State has a very extensive toddy producing date tope. Besides, there is a fair growth of yalama, Neem (Margosa) and other species of trees on the hills forming boundary between Giddalore, Najibabad and Micknanpalle of the State and the Koilkuntla taluk of British India. The hills in the north and north-east of Rama Tirtam have a fair growth of trees on them. During the year under report Government were kind enough to lend the services of an experienced Forest Officer, Mr. F. A. Seager, who has made a thorough inspection of all the State with a view to report on the possibility of plantation in the new areas and the conservation of existing forests. His report is awaited. The cost of the inspection was Rs. 616 including Mr. Seager's pay, pensionary contribution, etc.

12. The income under forests was Rs. 4,829 against Rs. 6,125. The decrease is due to the Tangedu bark not having been auctioned during the year as it was thought necessary to give rest to the trees.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE.

13. Cotton, mangoes, skius, sweet limes, cholam, Bengal-gram and other grains also, stone slabs and chunam are exported from the State while kerosine oil, cloth, salt and rice are imported into it.

14. Banganapalle was once noted for its lacquer work but, that industry is dying out for want of demand. There are still some workmen who execute work on order.

PUBLIC WORKS.

15. The total outlay for the year was Rs. 58,448 including establishment which consists of one overseer, one sub-overseer, three permanent maistries, one clerk, two peons and one store-keeper. Of this amount Rs. 51,538 were spent on various works during the year. The decrease of about Rs. 7,000 is due to the outlay Rs. 4,500 on the new Hospital building not having been spent owing to the non-receipt of estimate from the Chief Engineer and also to the Kusba Police lines not having been completed during the year.

16. Full details of works done are given in appendix XVII. To explain the various heads Rs. 17,483 were spent on roads, Rs. 8,095 on irrigation, Rs. 5,894 on village works, (wells and kuntas for the supply of drinking water to men and cattle), Rs. 12,684 on buildings and Rs. 2,972 on general repairs.

17. The new roads at Belloom, Kothapeta and the one from the Gooty main road to Yaganteeswami temple were completed during the year. The Fathenagar ghat road is also complete; only a little blasting work has to be done at the head of the road towards the village to make the passage of carts easier. Two much needed dams were constructed across the Gooty and Paniem roads. The two main roads, viz., Paniem and Gooty roads which are 35 miles in length are in fairly good condition and arrangements are being made to give all roads a coating of gravel and to construct masonry dams where badly needed. The Mudged road is only $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles in extent and it connects Koilkuntla with Owk. It runs across rich black cotton soil. Rs. 511 were spent on its repairs during the year and about the same amount will be spent during the current official year. An attempt at avenue planting was successfully made during the year on the Paniem road and it is under contemplation to extend the plantation when the monsoon commences.

18. *Village works.*—Wells and kuntas. The people of Mudged have to depend for their water supply on their neighbouring British Village, Mukumalla except during a few months of the year when their kunta has some water. Sinking a well in this village is fruitless the water in the sub-soil being too brackish even for cattle. As it is, the kunta does not retain much water. It is therefore under contemplation to build a masonry pond within the kunta with capacity to retain a year's supply. But the work could not be taken on hand as the kunta had an unusual quantity of water this year, the supply having been replenished by the rain in April. It is however expected to finish the work in the current official year. Yennakandla is a village which is particularly unfortunate in the matter of its well on which much money was unsuccessfully spent last year. An old kunta was therefore repaired at

3. Increase of Rs. 5 per mensem to the salary of the Inspector which is progressive.
4. Approved service allowance paid to some of the constables.
5. Pay of dhoby entertained during the year at Rs. 8 per mensem.
6. Pay of three boy musicians at Rs. 8 per mensem.

10. No difficulty was experienced in the working of the arms Regulations, and licenses were issued for 34 guns and 9 revolvers.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

11. In the beginning of the year the Nawab was exercising combined first class and Sessions powers, and the Tahsildar that of a second class Magistrate, the Assistant Political Agent's being the highest criminal Court in the State. In the beginning of July the post of Stationary Sub-Magistrate was created relieving the Tahsildar of his magisterial work. After the restoration of the State and the abolition of the office of Assistant Political Agent in December 1908, the Dewan was invested with first class powers and the Nawab was the highest authority for all criminal matters. Appeals from the decisions of the Dewan and the Sub-Magistrate lie to the Nawab. The Tahsildar is ex-officio second class Magistrate, but he does not try cases unless any case is specially referred to him. Thus there were only three criminal courts in the State through the year.

12. There were no grave crimes such as murder or dacoity. There were two robbery cases both of which were detected and convicted. There was one case relating to coins. A Muhammadan beggar from the Nizam's Dominions attempted to pass off a false coin (one rupee made of lead) to a woman in the village of Tangatoor. He was arrested and searched and three more false rupees and a few small coins were found on his person but he had no apparatus in his possession. He pleaded that he had passed through Gompromandinne village of the Sirvel taluk in his begging errand and there he was given that money in charity. He was however convicted and sentenced to six months rigorous imprisonment for trying to pass a false coin as genuine.

13. There were only four appeals filed during the year, one before the Assistant Political Agent and three before the Nawab. The decisions of the lower courts were confirmed in all the four cases.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

14. In the beginning of the year under report there were three Civil Courts, the Munsiff exercising original Civil jurisdiction for suits involving Rs. 3,000 and below while the Assistant Political Agent's Court entertained all suits above Rs. 3,000. The Nawab exercised appellate jurisdiction over the Munsiff's decision. After the restoration of the State in December 1908 the Dewan's Court was made the appellate authority over the Munsiff's decisions as well as the highest court for all Civil matters while the Nawab exercised revisionary jurisdiction.

15. Only one original Civil suit was filed in the Sadar Court (Assistant Political Agent's Court) in 1907-1908 which was disposed of during the year under report. The Munsiff entertained 156 original cases of the value of Rs. 17,625 of which he disposed of 139 cases and also 113 small cause suits. The average pendency of each case in the Munsiff's Court was 70 days for a regular suit and 23 days for small cause suits. In many cases process had to be served on parties and witnesses residing in British India; hence the average duration is not unsatisfactory.

16. There were 28 appeals filed against the decisions of the Munsiff of which 19 were confirmed, two were reversed, one decision was amended, two cases were compromised and four are pending.

17. 216 applications for the execution of decrees were filed during the year and with the balance of 3 remaining from the past year the total number was 219 valued at Rs. 28,658. All the applications were disposed of with due promptitude.

EXTRADITION.

18. Three persons were arrested and surrendered to the Kurnool Police during the year of which two (one male and one female) were British subjects and one was the subject of the Nawab. The first two were concerned in a case under section 498 and 379 I. P. C. and the third was suspected of having had complicity in a case of murder committed within the limits of Sangapatnam village of the Koilkuntla taluk which is in close proximity to Singavaram—a state village—to which the deceased and the suspected man belonged. The State made no applications for surrender. The relations between the British and State Police continued to be friendly. All possible help was given to the British Police whenever they had occasion to carry on their investigation into the State and a similar help was rendered by the British Police to the members of the State Police in British India.

PRISONS.

19. There is only one Jail in the State and five lock-ups attached to each of the five Police stations.

20. The Jail consists of eight cells with a verandah of 16 feet in width. Two more separate cells are available one as a female ward and the other as Civil debtors' Jail, but these are scarcely in use as cases in which female or Civil debtor is sent to Jail are of very rare occurrence in Banganapalle.

21. The number of admissions into the State Jail was 42 against 38 and the daily average was 16.50 against 11.11 in the previous year. The cost of maintaining the Jail during the year was Rs. 1,525-14-1 against Rs. 972-1-9 in the previous year. The increase is due to the increased number of under-trial prisoners as well as convicts and also to the dearth of provisions.

22. The State Medical Officer is ex-officio Jail Superintendent and he is assisted by a Warder on a salary of Rs. 15 per month. The Jail is guarded by a detachment of police consisting of one Head constable and 13 constables.

23. The health of the prisoners was good and there was no mortality among them. There were neither escapes nor attempts at escape. Of the 15 convicts remaining in the Jail at the close of the year four are life convicts and five are sentenced to a term above five years and the remaining six are short term prisoners.

24. Two of the life convicts are employed in weaving and a third works as a tinker, the rest of the prisoners are employed in gardening. The net profit to the Jail from these three sources was Rs. 165 against Rs. 115 in the previous year.

25. The system of earning of periods of remission by good conduct introduced last year works well. Discipline in the Jail was well maintained and the conduct of the prisoners has been satisfactory.

REGISTRATION.

26. Registration continues to be steadily on the increase (*Vide* Appendices XIII and XIV). 842 documents valued at Rs. 1,82,823 were registered during the year against 794 documents valued at Rs. 1,33,449 in the previous year. The Head Accountant who is ex-officio Registrar of the State gets a salary of Rs. 55-2-65 for discharging both the duties. A clerk has been provided for Registration during the year under report.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

Rainfall—The rainfall of the year was 19.17 inches against 14.58 inches in the previous year. There is only one Rain-gauge maintained at the head quarter station of the State and it is under contemplation to supply four more gauges during the current year to be kept at Nandiwaragam in the north, Sanjemula in the south, Pasupula in the West and Tungatore in the east.

Yannakandla at a cost of Rs. 836 and it was very useful for cattle and men during a portion of the year. Five more kuntas in different villages were also repaired. 20 village wells were either sunk or repaired of which four were exclusively for Malas and Madigas.

19. *Buildings.*—The State Lower Secondary school and three village schools Nandavaram, Jolapuram and Sanjamala were completed during the year. Police lines for Kasba and Chinnarajupaliem and Inspector's quarters have been already referred to.

20. *Irrigation.*—The State does not boast of any large irrigation works. The old Jolapuram tank already referred to is the largest source of irrigation. The new tank at Pasupula which was completed during the year is expected to irrigate about 250 acres in two villages, viz., Pasupula and Chinnarajupaliem.

21. The Cherupalli tank irrigates about 200 acres while the Nallacheruvu which was taken on hand during the year under report and on which about Rs. 2,000 were spent by the close of the year is expected to irrigate about 225 acres. The old and ruined tanks at Rama Tirtam and Venkatapuram are being surveyed with a view to ascertain if their restoration would prove advantageous. Plan and estimate for the construction of Racheruvu tank near Banganapalle submitted to the Political Agent last year have not been received back.

22. Including D. P. W. establishment an allotment of Rs. 47,558 has been provided for in the Budget for expenditure during the current official year. Of this amount Rs. 12,000 being for communications Rs. 8,650 are proposed to be spent on original roads and Rs. 3,350 on surface repairs. A portion of the Paniem road stands in need of reconstruction and its cost is estimated at Rs. 1,500. An original road from Timmapuram to Ramatirtam is under contemplation at an approximate cost of Rs. 2,000. The extension of Navipet road is likely to cost Rs. 3,500 and a dam across the Paleru near Sanjamala is of great and urgent necessity and it is estimated to cost Rs. 1,500.

23. Out of the amount of Rs. 12,000 provided for under "buildings" a Court house for the sub-Magistrate at a cost of Rs. 2,800 has been sanctioned and also the chief Police Station at Banganapalle at a cost of about Rs. 4,000. The Kasba police station is not an ordinary police station but it is the chief head quarters police building in the State and it should have accommodation for the station house officer's office, the Inspector's office, accommodation for arms and accoutrements, store room, lock-ups, etc., and so it has been proposed to construct the building on a somewhat grander scale than a designed building, so that, it may meet all needs and at the same time be an ornament to the town. Rs. 3,000 are proposed to be spent on general repairs and provision has also been made for village schools, etc.

24. Of the amount of Rs. 10,000 provided for under irrigation Rs. 8,000 are for the Nallacheruvu tank and Rs. 1,000 are proposed to be spent on the repair of the bund of the recently completed Pasupula tank and Rs. 1,000 in the preliminaries of the proposed Rama Tirtam tank. If the estimate and plans of Racheruvu are received an additional allotment of Rs. 5,000 will be made under this head for expenditure during the year. Of the amount of Rs. 6,500 for wells and kuntas an estimate of Rs. 4,000 has been sanctioned for the Mudgedu Koneri and the work is in progress and the remaining amount will be spent in the repair, etc., of wells and kuntas in different villages. Rs. 1,000 have been provided for under water works, and as all implements have been obtained it is not likely that more than a thousand rupees will be required for the experiment.

POST OFFICE.

25. The post office of the State is under the control of the Imperial Postal Department.

CONSUMPTION OF LIQUOR, DRUGS, ETC.

26. The Abkari administration was leased out by the Nawab to the Government of Madras for a period of 3 years and 3 months from 1st July 1906, which period has now been extended by five years from September 1909. The Government pay the State Rs. 27,760 per annum besides Rs. 3,050 and 8,000 for the suppression of Ganja cultivation and earth salt manufacture respectively.

27. The number of shops maintained were as noted below:—

The cash balance at the close of the year under report was Rs. 2,45,635 excluding Rs. 72,000 deposited with the Accountant-General in Government Promissory notes. It has been proposed to invest Rs. 25,000 in the current year.

2. The year commenced with an arrear balance of Rs. 21,907-13-9 under land revenue, jodi, quit-rent and miscellaneous. Out of this amount Rs. 18,167-8-11 the collection of which was postponed last year on account of adverse season were written off the accounts and the balance of Rs. 3,740-4-10 was fully collected. The arrear collections of Rs. 4,907-6-4 shown in column 5 of the demand, collection balance statement include excess collections of Rs. 1,167-1-6. This large excess amount was collected from some of the ryots last year before the issue of orders regarding postponement. Adjustments have since been made as detailed below:—

3. In the amount of current collections shown in column 6 of the statement an amount of Rs. 3,761-0-10 is included, which is the rent on Nawab's seri lands collected by the State and subsequently refunded to him.

4. An amount of Rs. 23,935-12-0 was disbursed during the year on account of the late Nawab's debts. The total amount proposed to be paid in liquidation of the late Nawab's debts was Rs. 66,748. Of this Rs. 20,838 were paid in the past year and Rs. 23,935 in the year under report. The balance lapsed to the State as the Sowcars concerned did not apply for payment within the time finally fixed.

CHAPTER VI.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Births and Deaths:—The total number of births during the year was 848 against 1055 in the previous year while the deaths were 696 against 694. The registration of births and deaths is carried on by the Municipality in the town of Banganapalle and the Village officers keep these statistics in the villages and their work is scrutinized by the Revenue Inspector and the Tahsildar. All possible means are adopted to see that the registration is accurately done and the Municipality instituted four prosecutions during the year for failure to report within the time fixed. Fevers were responsible for the largest number of deaths during the year, and Cholera prevailed to some extent in a few villages. Prompt measures were adopted to prevent the epidemic from spreading into other villages and also for the treatment of Cholera patients. In most cases patients made use of the medicines given to them and acted up to the instructions given by the Medical authorities with regard to diet and sanitation of the houses and surroundings while some as usual resorted to the village *vythian*.

MEDICAL.

2. There is only one Hospital in the State and it is located in an old building. It is under contemplation to construct a new Hospital and plans and estimates have been submitted to the Political Agent. The matter has not yet been finally settled. Colonel Sarkies, I.M.S., visited Banganapalle during the year under report and his advice with regard to site, etc., has been noted.

3. The Hospital staff consists of one Medical officer and an Assistant, two compounders, one diplomaed midwife, one daffadar and two servants. Provision has been made for one dhoby and a toty for the current year. The question of appointing a cook is deferred as there is some difficulty in the selection of a servant in that capacity owing to the caste prejudices of the patients.

It is also under contemplation to open agricultural farms in the Kasba school to interest the boys at least the grown up section of them in gardening, but the want of a compound wall and a suitable well stand in the way of carrying out this project just at present, but it is hoped that these difficulties will be surmounted by the use of thorn fencing as a temporary measure and by repairing an old well which exists near the school building.

4. Provision for an elementary school for Mohammadan children in Kasba has been made in the budget for one teacher on Rs 10 per month and one for Sanjamala on Rs 8 per month. The school at Kasba will be opened in the heart of the town to enable such young boys and girls to attend who cannot go to the Lower Secondary school. Elementary religious instruction will also be given in the school in addition to secular. Next to Banganapalle Sanjamala contains the largest number of Muhammad in population and so at the repeated request of the people a Hindustani Branch is to be added to the elementary Telugu school in that village.

5. Except in six villages where new buildings have been erected all the remaining village schools are held in ill-ventilated rented buildings. It is hoped that every year two or three new buildings will be provided.

COW BREEDING.

6. The State cows having been disposed of as already mentioned in para 8 of chapter IV it has been proposed to purchase 20 country cows and two well bred Nellore bulls for breeding purposes as an experimental measure. The Nellore cows being delicate in constitution require more care and attention than the country cows and the cost of feeding them also is much more than that of feeding cows of the local breed. A provision of Rs. 760 has been made in the budget for 20 cows at Rs. 25 each and two bulls at Rs. 110 each and also for an establishment consisting of one supervisor and two watchers at Rs 6 and Rs. 5 each respectively per month with feeding charges of Rs. 240 for the year.

CATTLE SHOW.

7. With a view to create an interest among ryots to possess high class bulls it has been proposed to hold an annual cattle show and to offer prizes for well bred bulls and breeding cows, buffaloes etc., and in order to make a start a show on a small scale was held at Navipet on the 25th March last in connection with the Sowdeswari festival held in that village. The scale of prizes offered was as follows:—

Though only a short notice was given many bulls and cows of really good breed both local and foreign were registered and received prizes as adjusted by the committee appointed for the purpose. It is proposed to hold the show on a more elaborate scale in the current year and a provision of Rs. 350 has been made in the budget for that purpose.

4. Appendix XX shows the work done in the Hospital. 14,818 out-door patients were treated during the year against 14,946 in the previous year while there were 135 indoor patients against 88 in the previous year. The increase of Rs. 1,491-11-6 in the expenditure over last year was due to new surgical instruments bought for Rs. 641, drugs and appliances for sending the brain of rabid dogs to Coonoor, purchase of Hospital furniture, clothing of in-patients, repair of old instruments and trainage, etc., for a patient sent to the Ophthalmic Hospital, Madras, for treatment at State cost.

VACCINATION.

5. The vaccination work continued to be very satisfactory during the year. 2,041 children were vaccinated against 1,966 of which 1,868 were successful against 1,762 in the previous year. The work of the Vaccinators was systematically inspected by the Assistant Medical Officer who is ex-officio Inspector of vaccination. Detailed statement is appended. Lymph is obtained from the King Institute, Guindy.

SANITATION AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

6. The tour of the Assistant Medical officer in villages in his capacity as Inspector of vaccination is of considerable advantage not only for vaccination work but also in the matter of village sanitation and in the affording of medical and surgical relief to the villagers which they have now begun to appreciate.

7. Considerable improvement has been effected during the past three years in the sanitation and as far as possible removal of congestion in villages. The old village of Chinnarajpaliem was rebuilt on a spacious site by the road side with broad streets and some ryots are collecting materials for building houses on the site newly acquired in Sankalapuram where a new village is likely to be built under the name of "Ghulam Alipet." Several applications have been received for acquiring sites for the extension of Natlakuthur village where some Pykari ryots from the surrounding British villages propose to build houses and reside permanently. The consideration of this matter was postponed in order to see the results of the acquirement of sites at Chinnarajupalliem and Sankalapuram and as the ryots now seem to be in earnest, necessary action will be taken during the current year.

8. An amount of Rs. 3,063 was spent during the year against Rs. 3,990 in the previous year under the head of "Village Sanitation" and an allotment of Rs. 4,000 has been made for expenditure during the current official year. This amount was spent under the Agency of the Revenue Department. Streets in six villages were widened and constructed at a cost of Rs. 488. Four original village chavidies were widened and many old chavidies were repaired for Rs. 1,508. Cattle-pounds in four villages were repaired and one new pound was built at a cost of Rs. 96. Latrines were built in three villages and drinking water wells in eight villages were repaired at a total cost of Rs. 885. The minor head "other sanitary arrangements" under village sanitation is the expenditure incurred in maintaining sanitation on festival occasions, cost of maintaining coolies for drawing water for the Malas and Madigas where no separate wells are provided for this class of people and where these poor people have to entirely depend on the charitable disposition of caste men for their water specially in summer when all streams and sources of drinking water have no supply.

9. *Town improvement and Municipality*:—The Municipal administration of Banganapalle is in its infancy. It cannot be said that the people have realised its advantages. When the Councillors were called upon to express their free opinion with regard to the necessity or otherwise of the Municipal administration they voted in favour of their own dissolution on the 13th May 1908 and after the intervention of the Nawab and Government, the Council was reorganised on the 20th October 1908 with an elected Chairman—a local Pleader M.B.Ry., G. Srirama Sastri. During the interval the administration of Municipal affairs was carried on by the Assistant Political Agent, Mr. Molony without the aid of any Council. Practically the Municipality is maintained by grants from the State funds. In addition to an annual grant of Rs. 5,000 the State has accommodated the Council with a loan of Rs. 1,000 and a special grant of Rs. 1,000 during the year for the removal of congested areas. A few streets in the Northern part of the town were widened and formed and one more locality

stands in urgent need of attention. The Hussubhoy lane spoken of by Mr. Molony in the last year's report is the locality around Laul Masjid where congestion is so great and the lanes are so narrow that the conservancy carts cannot get to the place and during the prevalence of epidemics the locality is a menace to the health of the whole town. The Nawab having personally inspected the place it has been decided to widen three streets absorbing several by-lanes. The locality has been surveyed and mapped and the occupants of the houses and sites to be acquired have been given notice to quit on or before the 1st September next to give them ample time to rebuild houses. An amount of Rs. 3,500 has been provided for in the Budget under a separate head "Town improvements" which is the amount fixed for payment of compensation to the house owners and the Municipality will defray the cost of forming and constructing the new streets. Considering its finances it is vain to expect the Municipality to do this work in the near future. The Councillors and the tax-payers are to be taught by slow degrees the virtue of self-help and self-exertion in the matter of the town improvement. Of course they cannot always count upon the State aid. The question of effecting reduction in the Municipal establishment, where possible, without affecting efficiency as vacancies occur is under the consideration of the Durbar, but the increase in taxation is not possible for some time to come or rather it depends entirely on the increase of trade and general prosperity of the town which it is not possible to attain in the near future.

10. The Municipality does not contribute anything towards the cost of the maintenance of Hospital or School, such cost including vaccination in the town, is borne by State.

11. The important work connected with the water supply of the town is also undertaken by the State. The Sub-Overseer of the Public Works Department was specially deputed to learn boring operations in Madras under Mr. Chatterton. He has returned qualified and the necessary implements having been obtained the work has begun though it cannot at present be predicted how far this attempt will be successful.

12. The Municipal Chairman's report and budget are appended.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION.

This Department was reorganised during the year under report. A Supervisor on Rs. 35-5-50 was appointed who systematically inspected and examined the various schools both public and private. He takes real interest in his work and it is hoped that educational department will have a bright future before it. The number of schools remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 19, but there was an increase of one Mission school examined for grants-in-aid (5 against 4) But in the number of students there has been a decided increase. Grants-in-aid of Rs. 600 were disbursed during the year against Rs. 500 in the past year.

2. The new buildings for the Lower Secondary school at Banganapalle and three new village schools were completed and occupied during the year. The cost of these buildings is borne by the D. P. W. (*Vide* appendix XVII). The most satisfactory feature is that there are 43 girls on the rolls in the village schools which shows that the people are beginning to appreciate education.

3. One new class (III Form) has been added to the Kusba Lower Secondary School and an additional teacher on Rs. 30 per month and also one on Rs. 12 have been employed from 1st April 1909. An allotment of Rs. 1,700 has been made under contingencies for the supply of furniture at a cost of Rs. 568 and class books and maps, at a cost of Rs. 207 for the Kasba and Village Schools. The furniture now in use in the Kasba School is practically useless and there are only two black boards in good order among 8 classes. It has been proposed to supply leaning benches at least to the higher classes of the Kasba school. The first Assistant master of the Kasba school Mohammad Abdullah Khan Sahib takes much interest in the physical training of the boys and he has introduced foot-ball, cricket etc., games among the school boys during the year which has added considerably to the popularity of the Kasba school. It has been also proposed to supply the Kasba school with Gymnasium apparatus during the current year at a cost of Rs. 112.



ADMINISTRATION REPORT

OF THE

BANGANAPALLE MUNICIPALITY

FOR THE
OFFICIAL YEAR 1908-1909.

Constitution of the Council.

1. As in the previous year the council, consisted of 16 councillors with Mir Asad Ali Khan Bahadur as Chairman and Doctor Khaja Husain Sahib as vice Chairman and continued till the 13th day 1908 on which date it dissolved by a resolution of the Council. The Municipality was then placed under the management of the Chief Administrative officer of the state. On the recommendation of the Nawab who was in favour of the Municipality the Government in their G. O No. 347, dated 27th July 1908 ordered its reconstitution. It began its operations as usual. The Chairman, Nawab Mir Asad Ali Khan Bahadur having resigned, M. R. Ry., G. Seerama Sastri garu was elected chairman on 20th October 1908 by a majority of votes. The Council met only eleven times during the year, against 24 in the previous year. The decrease is due to the dissolution of the Council for about 5 months.

2. The most memorable event after the renovation of the Municipality was the visit of His Excellency the Governor of Madras to the town of Banganapalle to enthroned the Nawab on the 19th December 1908. Foundation stone of the proposed market which is under construction was laid by His Excellency and hence it is named the "Lawley Market".

Receipts.

3. Statements showing the receipts and charges as compared with the Budget estimate are enclosed.

4. *Tax on arts.*—150 persons were assessed to this tax. Rs. 337 were realised during the year against the demand of Rs. 360. Deducting Rs. 3 and Rs. 7 written off as irrecoverable there remained at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 13.

Of the arrear demand of Rs. 7, Rs. 4 were either collected or written off leaving a balance of Rs. 3.

5. *Tax on Buildings.*—The demand of this tax was Rs. 1,631. Deducting Rs. 1,411 collected and Rs. 66 written off, there remained a balance of Rs. 154. Rs. 49 have since been realized. There remained at the commencement of the year an arrear demand of Rs. 106 of which Rs. 91 were adjusted during the year leaving a balance of Rs. 15.

6. *Tax on lands.*—Out of the demand of Rs. 412 (both arrears and current) Rs. 321 were realised, Rs. 26 written off leaving a balance of Rs. 65. A sum of Rs. 9 has since been realised and steps will be taken to clear the balance.

7. *Coercive Process.*—For the collection of all the taxes 116 warrants were issued and in 42 cases property was distrained and in 19 of them it was sold in auction. As distraint was impracticable 6 prosecutions were instituted.

8. *Tolls, Market and Slaughter House.*—The amount for which these farms were sold have been realised during the year.

9. *Contributions.*—The State contributed Rs. 6,000 in aid of the Municipal fund. Out of this sum Rs. 2,500 were spent to relieve congestion existing in some portions of the town and for laying roads thereon.

10. *Incidence of taxation.* The incidence of taxation, with reference to the collection comes to Rs. 0.9-3.

Expenditure.

11. The following works were executed during the year at a cost of Rs. 9,384.

1. The construction of egg-shaped cement plastered drain in Havildar street.
2. The construction of a road leading to the new market.
3. The diversion of a road near Malick Naik Katta.
4. Removing congested portions and making road.
5. The construction of market.
6. Widening the narrow culvert near the old school.
7. The construction of Drains near the royal cemetery.
8. Putting up iron bars along the fort ditch to prevent accidents.
9. Repairs to the Municipal office building.

10. *Repairs to Panien Road and High Road.*—These works are supervised by a full time Overseer and check-measured by the Councillors. The main roads are in good order.

12. *Private scavenging system.*—Proposals are under consideration to introduce this system.

13. *Vital statistics.*—170 births and 133 deaths were registered during the year. The number of persons prosecuted for failure to report births and deaths was 4.

14. *Sanitation and water supply.*—6 sweepers with 3 double bull carts were engaged to remove street refuse. To clean the public latrines two scavengers were engaged. A sum of Rs. 509 was spent for deepening old wells and for constructing new ones. In connection with the permanent water supply to the town Mr. Chatterton who visited the town suggested to try boring operations. The state sent its Sub Overseer to acquaint himself with the same and he returned only recently. The operations have commenced.

15. The thanks of the Municipality are due to the Nawab who in addition to the munificent grant of Rs. 5,000 every year, made a gift of 2 buildings one for holding the Municipal Office and the other to be used as a Municipal Choultry.

His zeal for, and his active sympathy with the Municipality and its work is further evinced by his personal inspection of the many congested areas of the town and improving their condition by acquiring houses with state money, under the Town improvement Act.

General Remarks.—The eyes of the inhabitants are opened to the benefits which even a young Municipality could confer on them, and they see the great possibilities of healthy and organised development that lie in store for their town. But the great need of the people will be for some time to come, a permanent water supply. The efforts of the Municipality till now to meet water scarcity by sinking wells are hardly equal to the needs of the people.

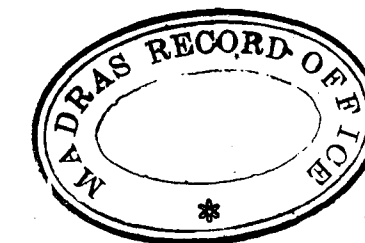

Feeding, etc., charges are estimated at Rs. 240 per annum as the cost of feeding country cows will be much cheaper than Nellore cows. Rs. 760 provided under contingencies are for the cost of bulls and cows as detailed above.
- i A cattle show on a small scale was held during the year under report. It has been proposed to hold a similar show during the current year to create in the minds of the ryots, an interest in the breeding and up keep of good breed cattle. Hence a provision in the budget.
