CHAPTER I.—CONSTITUTION OF STATE FORESTS

1. ALTERATION IN AREA.

Reserved forests.—The alterations are :—About 66 square miles were transferred from reserved lands, 441 acres excluded by recomputation and about fourteen square miles disafforested. The net area in the Circle at the close of the year was 4,658 square miles.

Reserved lands.—About 66 square miles were transferred to reserved forests; 31 acres to the Salt Department and 212 acres excluded at Settlement. The area at the close of the year was 421 square miles of which two are leased forests and about one square mile has been notified under section 26 of the Forest Act and will not be constituted reserved forest.

Reservation of forests in Rampa in the Godavari Agency.—This question has practically stood still since 1915-16. Twenty-one blocks were originally proposed for reservation. The District Forest Officer inspected and perambulated seventeen blocks in 1914-15 and 1915-16, and in 1917-18 two blocks and a portion of a third. The different stages at which these blocks stood were :—Four blocks were surveyed and outline maps prepared for them by the Madras Survey Department; six blocks were surveyed and field books prepared for five of them; the field books were defective and errors had to be rectified by resurvey and the sixth block also had to be resurveyed; the boundaries of four more blocks were cleared and demarcated pending survey; five blocks had to be demarcated and surveyed; two more blocks had to be inspected, perambulated and demarcated before survey. The services of a special establishment from the Madras Survey Department have been applied for to carry on the survey.

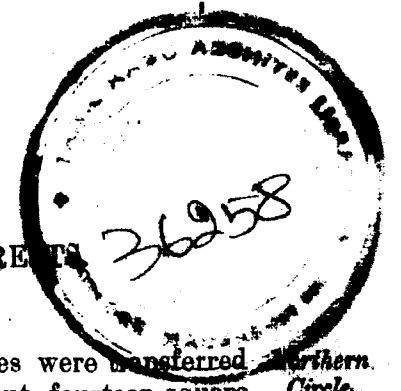
2. *Reserved forest.*—The area at the end of the year was 5,722 square miles, against 5,729 at the beginning as detailed in Form 65. Three hundred and eighty-three acres were transferred from reserved lands, 323 acres added by resurvey. Forty-three thousand seven hundred and six acres were transferred from North Cuddapah to West Cuddapah owing to a revision of the boundary. Three thousand six hundred and thirty-two acres were disafforested and 1,655 acres were found deficit by resurvey.

Reserved lands.—The area increased from 68 to 73 square miles. The details are given in Form 65.

3. *Reserved forests.*—Two thousand six hundred and eighty-one acres were added by transfer from reserved lands and 12,365 acres disafforested.

Reserved lands.—Four thousand eight hundred and twenty-six acres were notified as reserved lands of which 949 acres comprising Mulakad block are proposed to be handed over to the Tuticorin Port Authorities for management after reservation, the object of this reservation being to prevent the silting up of the port. The total area of reserved forests and reserved lands at the close of the year was 4,393 square miles against 4,406 square miles of the previous year.

4. *Reserved forests.*—The area of reserved forests at the end of the year remained the same as that at the commencement, viz., 4,133 square miles, though there were minor alterations as follows :—Five small areas covering 121 acres were transferred from reserved lands and four aggregating 410 acres were disafforested; four acres in South Malabar were transferred to the Fisheries Department.

Reserve lands.—Four hundred and twenty acres consisting of poramboke and unreserved lands were added and 121 acres were transferred, to reserved forests. The area at the close of the year was 106 square miles, of which 96 are leased forests in South Malabar and the Nilgiris and 4.5 "Todapatta lands" in the latter division.

2. FOREST SETTLEMENT.

Northern Circle. 5. Three blocks covering 418 square miles (two in *Upper* and one in the *Lower Gōdāvari*) were pending settlement. The two blocks in *Gōdāvari Upper* were once settled, but the settlement was found faulty. The resettlement of one of them was completed at the close of the year and the submission of the final notification was pending expiry of appeal time on the Forest Settlement Officer's decisions. The Coringa Extension in *Gōdāvari Lower* had to be surveyed before the preparation of the notification under Section 16 of the Forest Act. This has now been done. The question of supply of fuel to the Port Conservancy Board from the Hope Island which forms part of the above extension was pending orders of the Government.

Central Circle. 6. Three blocks in *Anantapur*, one in *West Cuddapah* and five in *Nellore* were finally settled, 22 blocks are pending final settlement and 17 are undergoing settlement as detailed in Form 66. The total cost of settlement is Rs. 7,638.

Southern Circle. 7. Settlement is complete in all districts except North and South Salem. *North Salem.*—Final reports for three out of the four blocks comprising *Udaidurgam* reserve which were forwarded to the Board have been returned for further particulars and are pending with the Forest Settlement Officer.

South Salem.—The appeal on settlement of the *Jarugumalai* block is pending with the Collector and the appeal filed in the District Court by the claimants of *Arana* and *Thirthagiri* blocks is still pending. The settlement of the *Pallipatti* extension block is pending with the Revenue Divisional Officer, *Dharmapuri*.

Western Circle. 8. Eleven blocks of 375 square miles remained to be settled at the commencement of the year, to which one block (62 square mile) in *North Malabar* and one in the *Nilgiris* (0.1 square mile), were added during the year. Of these, five blocks aggregating 186 square miles were finally settled and transferred to reserved forests. One block of 16 square mile in *North Coimbatore* was also notified but the reservation takes effect only after the close of the year. The balance under settlement was seven blocks of 4.07 square miles; but the settlement of six of these was practically completed.

3. DEMARCATION.

Northern Circle. 9. One and a half miles of district boundary between *Kurnool South* and *West divisions* were newly cut free of cost in return for the growth standing on the line. *Old boundaries.*—Four thousand eight hundred and three miles are reported to have been cleared during the year by subordinates free of cost. The growth on about a mile of the boundary of *Rekapalli Hill* Reserved forest in *Gōdāvari Upper* was uprooted at the heavy cost of Rs. 115. Twenty-six miles of boundaries in *Kistna* were surveyed as a preliminary to rectifying the demarcation and 39 miles in *Kurnool West* were rectified and repaired; the expenditure incurred was Rs. 23 and Rs. 352-8-0 respectively. In *Kurnool East*, 570 miles of lines are reported cleared by the subordinates free of cost. The work done on the other 93 miles maintained is not specified the only expenditure shown being under whitewash and cairn repairs, on which a sum of Rs. 9.4 has been spent mostly in the three *Kurnools*.

The total length of finally notified boundaries at the close of the year was 6,413 miles; of which, 5,921 miles were demarcated and 486 miles do not require artificial demarcation. In *Gōdāvari Upper*, Rs. 426 was spent in maintaining lines between zamindari and unreserved lands to a length of 424 miles.

Central Circle. 10. Twenty-nine miles were newly demarcated in *Bellary* at a cost of Rs. 1,283. Rupees 2,859 were spent on repairing and improving 97 miles of the existing boundaries already demarcated and for permanently demarcating 56 miles with solid stone pillars surrounded by well-packed cairns of stones and with a lockspit or a two

11. Final demarcation was carried out in *Madura* over a length of 21 miles. In *North Vellore*, 16 miles of compartment lines were demarcated with cleared lines and stone slabs at a cost of Rs. 533. The demarcation of five enclosures in the *Javadi* of *Ambur* range (390 acres) was completed by the departmental surveyor. The work of demarcation of enclosures in the *Javadi* of *South Vellore* is being carried on gradually, a certain number of enclosures being taken up each year; Rs. 107 was spent during the year. In *West Vellore*, 9½ miles of boundary line between the Government and mita forests on the *Yelagiris* was recleared at a cost of Rs. 14-8-0. In *South Arcot*, the rectification of the demarcation of certain class II forests was completed at a cost of Rs. 166. In *North Salem*, Rs. 212 was spent on the verification and rectification of reserve boundaries and enclosures. Rupees 1,285 were spent from Political funds in reclearing the *Madura-Travancore* boundary to a length of 46 miles.

Out of the total length of about 7,212 miles of old boundaries repaired during the year, 5,949 miles are reported to have been cleared or repaired free of cost by subordinates.

12. *New boundaries.*—Seven miles in *North Malabar* and two miles of district boundary in *The Nilgiris* were newly demarcated at a total cost of Rs. 883. The average cost per mile of fresh demarcation increased from Rs. 80-8-0 to Rs. 98-1-9. The increase occurred in the *Nilgiris*, but no explanation has been furnished.

Old boundaries.—One thousand one hundred and seven miles of old boundaries were repaired during the year. Of this, 577 miles were cleared by subordinates free of cost in *North Malabar*, *North*, *Central* and *South Coimbatore*. The subordinates continued to clear and maintain the boundaries in the other divisions also (except in *South Malabar* where it is not necessary), though no records are kept of the exact length cleared by them. In the *Nilgiris* 156 miles which included 32½ miles of the district boundary, were verified and permanently demarcated, and in *Mangalore* *North* 75 miles were either stone-lined or lockspitted. The average cost per mile of repairs is Rs. 37-15-5 against Rs. 45-15-0 in the previous year.

The total length of boundaries at the close of the year was 8,030 miles of which 6,763 miles were demarcated, and 906 miles do not require artificial demarcation. Thus at the close of the year there remained 361 miles still to be demarcated, of which 222 miles were in *Kollegal*.

4. FOREST SURVEYS.

(a) By the Survey of India Party.

13. The Survey of India did no work during the year on account of the war. *Northern Circle.*

(b) Local Surveys.

All coupes and 136 miles of block lines in the *Sāl* forests of *Ganjām*, the alignment of cart-tracks, bridle-paths, and fire-lines in *Kurnool East*, 37½ miles of fire-lines in *Kurnool South*, a cart-track and the areas under improvement fellings in *Kurnool West* and the verification of three reserved forests in *Kistna* were surveyed departmentally. The surveyor employed by the department in *Gōdāvari Lower* surveyed and took levels for repairing a tank in *Rajavommangi* reserved forest besides surveying the areas covered by the preliminary working plans for *Peddapur* and *Gokavaram* Ranges.

(c) Maps.

Reference maps under Section 80 of the Madras Forest Code.—Except in *Ganjām* which has not furnished information on this point, these maps are reported to have been maintained and posted with the exception of the range reference maps in *Kistna*.

Special District Reference maps.—None of the maps prepared by Mr. Descubes, the late Forest Map officer, have yet been printed and published. The Forest Map office at *Dehra Dun* could not proceed with the printing of the maps owing to paucity of officers on account of the war. The proofs of the maps for *Kurnool East* and *South* were prepared and are being checked. The proof for the map of *Ganjām* was under preparation.

(a) By the Survey of India.

Central Circle. 14. The party continued its operations in Nellore district and completed the survey. 44,848 square miles were surveyed on the 4" scale and 133,993 square miles on the 2" scale. The party also worked in South Cuddapah district and surveyed 30,190 square miles on the 2" scale.

By the Madras Survey Party.

No survey work was undertaken.

(b) By Departmental Surveys.

Survey of coupes, verification and rectification of boundaries, alignment of roads and the preparation of coupe, working-plan and fire maps were as usual done by the departmental staff.

(c) Maps.

The reference maps referred to in Section 80 of the Forest Code are reported to have been maintained and posted in all districts.

(a) By the Survey of India Party.

Southern Circle. 15. No surveys were undertaken except in Tinnevely where the Survey of India Party surveyed the boundary line between Singampatti and Travancore and a portion of the line between Singampatti and Kalakad forests.

(b) The Madras Survey Party.

The revision survey operations by the Madras Survey Party continued in South Arcot, South Arcot, and Madura and the Forest discrepancy sketches have been returned verified.

(c) By Departmental Survey.

All coupes were surveyed by ordinary staff except in North Salem where certain coupes were surveyed by surveyors and in Madura where similar work was done by a supervisor. The surveyor in South Salem was employed in checking the plans and notifications of the proposed blocks on the Pachamalais.

A variety of survey works such as verification of reserve boundaries and surveying and aligning of roads was done by existing staff and departmental surveyors.

(d) Maps.

Reference maps referred to in section 80 of the Forest Code.—These are reported to have been maintained in all districts except Trichinopoly.

(a) By the Survey of India Party.

Western Circle. 16. The special surveyor deputed by the Survey of India completed the final (planetable) survey on 8"=1 mile scale of eight plantations covering 3,252 acres in two ranges in South Malabar at a total cost of Rs. 2,009.

(b) Local Surveys.

The survey of timber, fuel and bamboo coupes in the two Mangalores and Central Coimbatore, 60 acres of Ponam cultivation in North Malabar, area for the extension of teak plantations in South Malabar; four roads to a distance of 12 miles, sandal and fuel coupes, and one settlement of 112 acres in Kollegal; fuel coupes, and verification and rectification of boundaries and road alignments in North Coimbatore; fuel coupes and one road in South Coimbatore, were carried out departmentally. The head surveyor of the Madras Survey Party deputed to survey the estates on the Anamalais in South Coimbatore completed the survey of 14 blocks from December 1917 to February 1918.

(c) Maps.

Reference maps under section 80 of the Madras Forest Code.—These are reported to have been maintained and posted up to the end of the year.

Special district reference maps.—The map of South Malabar division was printed and published by the Forest Map Office, Dehra Dun, while that of North Malabar will shortly be printed.

CHAPTER II.—MANAGEMENT OF STATE FORESTS.

I. REGULATION OF MANAGEMENT.

(a) Preparation and control of regular working-plans.

7. **Preparation—Ganjām.**—Mr. Minchin with the help of a small special party continued to collect data and statistics for the preparation of a regular plan for the forests. The reconnaissance report was prepared and approved and the final plan is under preparation. **Kistna.**—A working plan for the forests of Bandar Range prepared and sent up for sanction after the close of the year.

As shown in Form 69, working-plans for 2,630 square miles have been prepared and approved by the Board. Of these, regular working-plans cover only 786 square miles and the rest are preliminary and tentative working-plans sanctioned for short periods during which data might be collected for the framing of more elaborate plans.

18. **Revision.**—The revision of the working-plan for Coringa in Godāvari Lower awaiting the survey of the forest. Those for the forests in the Ellore and Andhra ranges in Kistna are being revised.

19. **Control.**—The working-plan for Peddapalli reserved forest in Visagapatam was not worked of which was far behind and the period of rotation insufficient. In Kistna, three timber and fuel coupes were not worked for want of labour. In Kurnool West, the stone walling round fuel coupes on the Yerramalais not taken up on account of financial stringency.

20. (b) **Preliminary working-plan Reports—Godāvari Upper.**—The tentative working-plan sanctioned for Marrigudem range prescribes working only in unreserved forests. **Ganjām.**—The roads and buildings and sinking of a well at Budoguda prescribed in the interim plan for the forests of Goomsur and Pondakhol were postponed for want of labour. Kepati fuel and Kumsoro bamboo coupes were not worked for want of labour. Two fuel, one bamboo and three charcoal coupes not provided in the plan worked to meet the local demand. **Visagapatam.**—A scheme for the systematized working of bamboos in Palakonda Range on a five-year rotation was prepared. **Godāvari Lower.**—Preliminary working-plans for Rajahmundry and Polavaram ranges rising an area of 108 square miles were prepared, but had to be revised. None of the fuel coupes and one bamboo coupe in Peddapur range were sold for want of labour. **Kurnool East.**—The collection of minor produce which is not provided in the plan for Gudem range was undertaken to provide labour for the Chenchus. **Kurnool South.**—The preliminary plans for the Chelama and Sirvel working circles in Biddalur range were generally adhered to. Six fuel coupes aggregating an area of 240 acres in the 'grazing' area of the Sirvel working circle were opened and 1; this is not prescribed in the plan.

21. **Preparation.**—In Bellary, a simple working-plan for a part of Somalapuram reserved (1,220 acres) in Kudligi range was tentatively approved by the Conservator. That for Daroji tank bed area was returned for revision. The working-plan for the leased forests submitted to the Board last year was not sanctioned as the leased forests were handed over to the Sandur State at the close of the year. In Guntūr, working schemes are under preparation. In North Cuddapah, a preliminary working-plan for fuel and bamboo working circles in Lankamalai was returned for revision. In West Cuddapah, the working-plan for Idupulapaya palmyra plantation was tentatively approved. In Nellore, a working scheme for Appasamudram was approved and a revised working-plan for Nellore range including Ipur and Momidi reserved forests was returned to the District Forest Officer for revision. In Chingleput, a working-plan for the reserves of Tiruvallur range was tentatively approved by the Board in Board's Reference No. 1503, dated 28th August 1917, and that for Guindy reserved forest sanctioned in B.P. Forest No. 207, dated 10th September 1910, was cancelled. P. Forest Mis. No. 20, dated 19th January 1918. In Chittoor, a tentative working-plan for Santhapet reserve was approved.

The working-plan in Anantapur needs revision and those cancelled in Bellary, Cuddapah and Chittoor require renewal.

As represented last year no satisfactory progress in the proper preparation of working-plans is possible with the present hopelessly inadequate staff.

22. *Control - Bellary.*—Three coupes in the Adōni working-plan and 13 coupes the Harpanahalli working-plan were sold, some of the latter were not sold for want of demand.

Harpanahalli working-plan—All the second class forests were divided into three working circles and the limits of the protection working circle were clearly defined by artificial demarcation. *Anantapur.*—Compartments I to III of Kasba working circle of Kalyandrug range which were closed to grazing were thrown open to grazing as per orders in B.P. Forest No. 92, dated 18th November 1917. *untūr.*—Two coupes in Tadepalle and Takkellapad were sold. The prescriptions of the working-plans of Kolakalur and Lam reserves were not carried out as their reafforestation has been ordered by the Board in B.P. Forest No. 369, dated 14th December 1917, and 1, Rout., dated 3rd January 1918, and that for Kuragalla is under correspondence—Board's Reference No. 1578/Gl.18-1, dated 18th July 1918.

North Cuddapah.—During the year the Board has sanctioned in B.P. Forest No. 128, dated 6th April 1918, the revised tabular statement of fellings in respect of the working-plans sanctioned in B.P. Forest Nos. 140, dated 27th July 1908, and 50, dated 1st August 1908. The Board has also sanctioned an amendment to B.P. Forest No. 150, dated 1st August 1908, in respect of marking standards in the working-plans. Two coupes which remained unfelled were sold. The Kalasapad working-plan was adhered to. Improvement coupes in Lankamalais and one out of the three improvement coupes in Nallamalais were leased out. *South Cuddapah.*—Out of 28 coupes, 24 were worked and the remaining coupes were not sold for want of demand. *West Cuddapah.*—The prescriptions were generally adhered to in red sanders area of Sidhout Palakondas and fuel area of Kanamalopalle and Konarajupalle reserved forest and Idupulapaya palmyra plantation. *Nellore.*—Coupes 1 and 2 of langam and Rajavolu working circles were not sold for want of demand. *Ohingleput.*—Ten coupes were not leased out for want of demand. *Chittoor.*—Coupe 1 of Santhapet working circle, coupe IV of Mamandur and coupes 3 and 4 of Thumburukona felling series were worked. Coupe 4 of Inaparallamitta and Gudipenta working circles remained unfelled for want of demand owing to lack of railway transport.

23. *Preparation.*—Some progress was made in the preparation and revision of working-plans, but the total outturn was only a small fraction of the work required.

The Special working-plans Officer was working in Tinnevely but was constantly being taken off the work to attend to Military duty. The Reconnaissance report for the revision of the Kuttalam working-plans was approved of in May and the plan is under preparation.

During the year, working-plans for the Tirukkoyilur forests in *South Arcot*, for the Talanayar and Kodiakadu forests in *Tanjore* were sanctioned, but the most important plan drawn up was that for the sandalwood areas in *South Salem*.

The bamboo working-plan for the Javadis lying in North, South and West Vellore was taken up for revision and stock-mapping was completed in *South Vellore*, and about half done in *West Vellore*. The progress made in *North Vellore* has not been reported. In *Madura* a small scheme for bamboo working was approved by the Conservator.

24. *Control.*—The only plans in the circle which can be brought under complete control are the Modern Sandalwood Plans for the Javadis of South and West Vellore, the Chitteris, Shevaroyes, Kolroyens, Pachamalais and Kollimalais of South Salem and the Uplands of North Salem. In all these areas work was regularly controlled but on the Javadis work in coupe III of all series had to be postponed as the work of collection of trees uprooted by the cyclone of November 1916, provided full work for the year.

The *Madura Fuel working-plan* sanctioned in B.P. Forest No. 136, dated 31st August 1916, was also completely controlled and here also a necessary change was sanctioned. In eight series coupes prescribed for the year could not be worked owing to the railway being unable to carry away the material to the required destination. In their place seven coupes within carting distance of *Madura* were selected for

felling. In *Tinnevely* the working-plans which have been under successful working for twenty years have run out. As it is desirable to prolong the rotation, extra areas of forest have been selected to add to the various series and these are being worked in the interim whilst the plans are being revised.

25. *Preparation.*—The special working-plans staff under the direct charge of Mr. H. F. A. Wood, who was also the District Forest Officer, *South Coimbatore*, completed the working plan for the Tekkadi leased forests and the Mount Stuart ghaut forests. This has since been submitted to the Board for orders. After its completion the special staff was transferred to *North Malabar*. A working-plan for the Parappa reserve was prepared by Mr. J. H. Longrigg, District Forest Officer, *South Mangalore*, but it was held back with the Board's approval until some definite and workable plan for the principal operation—Hopea sowing—can be incorporated in it. In *North Coimbatore* a working-plan for four fuel working circles (23 square miles) was prepared by Mr. C. M. Hodgson, District Forest Officer, and sanctioned by the Board.

26. *Revision.*—The revision of the working-plan for Begur forests in *North Malabar* has been taken up by the special working-plan staff under the supervision of the District Forest Officer Mr. G. S. Lasrado, assisted by Mr. M. C. Chandu, Extra Assistant Conservator, and the work is in progress. In *South Malabar* the preparation of a revised working-plan for the teak plantations and the adjoining natural forests, taken up last year by Mr. R. Bourne, District Forest Officer, is in hand and is expected to be completed by the end of 1918. *North Coimbatore.*—The Gōbichettipālaiyam working-plan referred to in the last year's report was further revised by the addition of one more fuel working circle (one square mile). The revision of the working-plan for Erode range could not be undertaken by the District Forest Officer, *Central Coimbatore*, for want of time. *South Coimbatore.*—The working-plans for the Mount Stuart Ghaut forests and the Varigali valley have been revised, the areas thereof having been included in the newly prepared working-plan for the Tekkadi leased forests.

27. *Control.*—The provisions of the existing working-plans were adhered to with the following important deviations:—*Mangalore North.*—Owing to lack of demand, many of the fuel coupes in Udipi range, set apart for the supply of sandal stills, were not worked during the year. *Mangalore South.*—Kadambilla coupe X of the Shirady timber working circle was worked departmentally. The area of Muliya coupe IV, being found to be too large, was divided into three strips and sold separately. A few bamboo coupes remained unsold in the previous year were sold standing; and a sample plot of 10 acres in one of the coupes of the Puthur Town fuel working circle which was closed in 1916 for want of demand, was worked departmentally, the fuel being brought to Mangalore for sale. *South Malabar.*—Certain prescriptions of the revised working plan under preparation, viz., commencement of final fellings, etc., were anticipated and carried out during the year. *The Nilgiris.*—A further portion of Compartment 3, Block VI, Governorshola Working Circle was worked in the year to supplement the supply of firewood in Ootacamund range. Compartment 22, Block I of Acacia working circle and Compartment 7, Block I of Eucalyptus Working Circle, Coonoor, were not worked, the age of the growth in the former being found to be too young, and there was want of labour to work the latter. *Kollegal.*—Coupe IX of Aralpalayam Fuel working circle which ought to have been worked in 1914-15 was sold standing during the year. The sandalwood working-plans in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore* have been held in abeyance owing to the spread of 'spike' disease and the work in those areas was confined to the extraction of all dead, dying and spiked sandal trees. *Central Coimbatore.*—The Bolampatti working-plans (except for Chinnar and Walayar working circles) remained unworkable. *South Coimbatore.*—Special squared timbers were cut for supply to the military department from the Mount Stuart and Tekkadi forests.

28. *Preliminary Working-Plan Reports.*—Three Working Circles in *Kollegal*, two fuel and two bamboo coupes in *Central Coimbatore*, 15 fuel, 11 bamboo and 11 sandalwood coupes in *North Coimbatore*, and the Tekkadi leased forests in *South Coimbatore*, continued to be worked systematically under the preliminary working scheme.

(b) Annual plan of operations.

Northern
Circle.

29. Owing to financial stringency certain roads and buildings, sinking wells, repairs to tanks, bunding of streams in reserved forests and widening boundary lines of forests were postponed. Four fuel and two bamboo coupes in *Ganjām* and one timber and two fuel coupes in *Kurnool South* and improvement fellings in two coupes and coppice felling in one coupe in *Kurnool West* were not worked for want of demand. The selection felling in the unreserved lands of Bhadrachalam taluk other than in the Marrigudem Range, *Gōdāvari Upper*, was not carried out as the working was not systematized. The demarcation of *Nugur*, *Peddamidiseru* and *Cherla* blocks in the same district was not taken up as the settlement was not completed.

30. The sanctioned annual plans of operations were not generally adhered to owing to financial stress.

Southern
Circle.

31. The chief deviations in the annual plan of operations were the postponement of certain roads and buildings due to various causes such as the financial situation, difficulty of obtaining labour, illness of subordinates, etc. The more work is concentrated on the hills the more difficult it is becoming to get labour for the forest roads and buildings. A few Malayalees are now taking to road work but it is becoming more and more imperative that these hill men should be trained as skilled labourers.

32. Besides the deviations mentioned in paragraph 27, the only other important deviations were:—*Mangalore North*.—The extension of Gundaberu road and two other roads and the Guards' sheds at Nellikar and Bantwal, were not taken up for want of funds. The inspection bungalows at Keryashe and Aldangady were given up in favour of other urgent works. *Mangalore South*.—The improvement fellings in Kidu and Niddle were not done, a few road works and subordinates' lines in three places had to be deferred for want of funds; inspection bungalow at Charmady ghauf given up; and stone-lining in the Parappa and Mandekole reserves, postponed. *North Malabar*.—Instead of the inspection bungalow at Tirunelli an old forest guard's shed was converted into a rest-house. Forest guards' quarters in seven places were given up for want of funds. *South Malabar*.—Improvements to District Forest Officer's bungalow, guards' quarters in two places, and demarcation of Edacode, etc., plantations, were deferred for want of funds. River training works in the Chaliar river were not undertaken by the Public Works Department. Final fellings in three old plantations and the formation of new plantations in those felled areas; felling trees in the natural forests and final demarcation of Walluvasheri plantation, which were not provided for in the plan, were carried out in the year. *The Nilgiris*.—Improvement fellings in Mudumalai compartment 4 were only partly carried out. Thinning in the Newman plantation for charcoal manufacture was postponed pending disposal of the existing stock. A road along the Nilgiri-Mysore boundary was given up for want of funds. Erection of a store room at Kargudi and the transfer of District Forest Officer's and Range Officer's serambies at Mudumalai to a more healthy site, were deferred as they were not of urgent necessity. *Kollegal*.—Construction of Gundal Valley road and two other roads, rest-houses at Adamalnatham and Doddasampagai, Deputy Rangers' quarters at Dinnahalli, permanent demarcation of Yederhalli, Ponnachi, Chengadi and Madeswaranmalai enclosures, stone-ridging the Haur Reserve, were not undertaken for want of funds. Eradication of lantana and prickly-pear in Bailur Sandal Working Circle, not provided for in the plan, was begun during the year. *North Coimbatore*.—Haasanur-Hulikarai, Kakkarai-Hosahatti and Tamarakarai-Koilnatham roads were not taken up pending final orders of the Board; and metalling Kadambur road for want of early rains. Subordinates' lines at Michaelpalayam rest-house and out-houses and subordinates' lines at Ullurthanda and outhouse at Bedarballi, demarcation of enclosures in certain reserves and the improvement of water-supply in some of the reserves, had to be postponed chiefly for want of funds. *Central Coimbatore*.—Timber fellings in Jakkannarai and Kallar working circles were not fully carried out; in lieu of the extraction of dead timber provided for, the felling of *Grevia* timber to the Director of Industries and of *Grewia thibet-folia* for war purposes was undertaken. Owing to the difficulty of extraction no bamboo coupe in Narasapuram and Kalladikode forests was sold. Several of the

roads and building works, and stone lining along certain reserves, were deferred for want of funds. The completion of the construction of elephant kraal and the demarcation of a section of Chenat Nayar reserve, were taken up though not provided for in the plan. *South Coimbatore*.—Felling of timber in Compartment XXVIII was not taken up owing to the large stock of old timber on the ground and on account of the revision of the working-plan. New Mount Stuart ghaut road and two other roads were given up not being necessary. Construction of a bungalow in coupe III, Puna-ohi range, and the subordinates' lines at Ulandi and Dhalli, was deferred for want of funds. Felling timber for military purposes and purchase of tramway materials were carried out though not provided for in the plan.

2. COMMUNICATIONS AND BUILDINGS.

(a) Roads and bridges.

33. About 37½ miles of new cart-roads and bridle-paths were added and 294½ miles were repaired. The total expenditure incurred was Rs. 21,970 against Rs. 32,031 in the previous year; a sum of Rs. 17,585 was spent on repairs against Rs. 19,083 in 1916-17. The important new works of the year were the construction of 2 miles of cart-road in the Pondakhol Agency in *Ganjām*, 2 miles of the Kondasantha-Tadeparti road in *Vizagapatam*, 7 miles of bridle-path from the Mantrala ghaut road to the Dornal-Peddachama road and 6 miles of the Ragumanipenta-Nuthadikala road in *Kurnool East*.

35. The chief works are—In *Bellary*, re-construction of the very old road in the leased forests for 4 miles. In *Anantapur*, repairs to existing roads to a length of 9 miles. In *Guntūr*, repairs to Anupalem-Mogalutla road (7 miles) were completed. In *North Cuddapah*, repairs to Nallamalais road (9 miles) were completed and the construction of a cart-track from the western boundary of Lankamalais to Kothabbavi and bridle-path from Narasimha bhavi to Lankamalais extension (2 miles) are in progress. In *South Cuddapah*, construction of a cart-track from Balapalle to Mogilipenta via Kangamadugu (6 miles) was completed and the construction of a cart-track to join Kodur Range boundary with the Arimanipenta cart-track (distance 2 miles), and formation of a cart-track from Arimanipenta to Bodithula bhavi for 3 miles are in progress. In *West Cuddapah*, Guvvalacheruvu-Korthimadugu road and Kondagorlapenta bridle-path were completed and the cart-track from Palakondas reserve boundary to Sundramanipenta for 3 miles and repairs to Cuddapah-Korthimadugu road for 7 miles are in progress. In *Nellore*, the formation of a bridle-path at the foot of the Udayagiri-Yerrakondas and conversion of compartment lines into branch bridle-paths in Rapur Veligondas were undertaken during the year (distance 25 miles). In *Chingleput*, construction of a road in Sattiyavedu reserved forest (3 miles) and construction of four culverts in Guindy Park and laying two branch roads in Ambakkam for 2 miles and repairs to road in Guindy Park were completed. In *Chittoor*, construction of a road from the well to Parakalatippa for 1 mile, repairs to Samireddipalle-Gudiyattam road (5 miles), Mamandur-Puliutla road (9 miles), Mamandur-chatram road (4 miles), Pallikuppam-Naniyal road (5 miles) and Horsleykonda bridle-path (3 miles) were completed, and the Puliutla Chatram road (2 miles), Nagapatla Bhakarapet and Nagapatla-Pulibone road (1 mile) are in progress.

36. *Tramways*.—The laying of temporary tram lines in connexion with the transport of fuel in Sriharikota forest and in the Coast Casuarina plantation was continued and the use of the lines and tram trucks is granted to contractors on hire. Four thousand one hundred and five tons were transported over the Sriharikota tram line and none over the Nellore line against 3,765 and 1,045 respectively in the previous year. The reason in the latter case is due to failure of the contractor to transport fuel.

37. The total expenditure on new works amounted to Rs. 59,470 and on repairs to Rs. 16,910 as compared with Rs. 56,240 and Rs. 16,184 in the previous year. The bulk of this expenditure was incurred by the Forest Engineer who spent Rs. 47,000 on the construction of 8 miles 5 furlongs of the Alangayam-Komattiyeri Ghaut road and another Rs. 2,000 on the investigation of the Komattiyeri-Patrakad and the Melpat-Paramanandal roads.

The chief new construction carried out by District Forest officers was—
in North Vellore (1) The Pinnathurai-Amerdi road first section, four miles at a cost of Rs. 810.

(2) Two miles of the Thottalam-Naickaneri road at a cost of Rs. 599.

(3) the metalling of the Amerdi road $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles at a cost of Rs. 412.
in Trichinopoly, the Kalpatti-Pillayarnatham road $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles at a cost of Rs. 2,378.

in Madura (a) The lower section of the Sattiyar Valley road.

(b) The Sirumalai-Nattam-Dindigul road.

(c) The bridle-path from Neutral Saddle to Gangavarodai.

(d) The conversion of Alagar Hill bridle-path into a cart-track.

38. The expenditure on new works amounted to Rs. 17,927 and repairs to Rs. 21,664, as compared with Rs. 19,880 and Rs. 24,579 respectively in the previous year. Important new works of the year—Mangalore North. Completion of the Hale-someshwar road—Mangalore South. An approach road to Kollamogaru inspection bungalow. North Malabar.—A road trace through Kottiyur reserve. South Malabar.—Five and three quarter miles of road and eight and three quarter miles of bridle-path. The Nilgiris.—The construction of a road between Newman and Rallia, a road in Snowden Working Circle, commencement of the College main road; construction of a bridle-path between Blocks II and III in Mudumalai working circle, and two bridges on the Thorappalli road. Kollegal.—Extension of Hosur-Ponnachi bridle-path (6 miles). North Coimbatore.—Metalling Kadambur and Bargur ghaut roads to a length of $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Central Coimbatore.—Preparation of traces for Aniarkandi-Muthikulam, Punnapara-Eliwal and Thadagam-Anaikatti roads. South Coimbatore.—Extension of tram line and completion of a foot-bridge.

Tramways.—The tramway in Tekkadi leased forests was further extended for four furlongs. The tramming was solely done by Government bulls the outturn of work during the year under report was 9,584 $\frac{1}{2}$, against 11,433 $\frac{1}{2}$ ton-miles of the previous year and the working charges increased from Rs. 14-9 to Rs. 1-4-5 per ton-mile, the increase being due to charges incurred for tramway materials. The working of the year showed a net profit of Rs. 6,234 against Rs. 11,192 in the previous year.

The work of the Forest Engineer.—Mr. F. J. Marshall, Engineer in charge of all the Forest Engineering Works in Southern and Western Circles, completed the investigation work for the Tekkadi Tramway $21\frac{1}{2}$ miles, at a cost of Rs. 814. An estimate amounting to Rs. 6,45,000 was received after the close of the year, and this includes the cost of construction of permanent-way, rolling-stock, buildings, wells, acquisition of land, etc. The Board's sanction was obtained for the construction of quarters for overseers and sub-overseers who will be in charge of the construction works of the Tekkadi tramway, and the lands required for these quarters are being acquired. The construction of the Mount Stuart Ghaut road was held in abeyance indefinitely as a result of a conference held by the Forest Commissioner.

(b) Buildings.

Northern
Circle.

39. The expenditure on new buildings amounted to Rs. 8,388 and on repairs and maintenance to Rs. 14,831; the figures for the previous year were Rs. 9,222 and Rs. 15,529 respectively. The following were the principal items of new works. The quarters of the ranger at Russellkonda in Ganjam were completed. Kurnool East.—Deputy ranger's quarters at Chintala and the out-houses to the range quarters at Cherlopalli were commenced and the inspection shed at Regutikunta was completed. Kurnool South.—The rest-house at Aleabad was completed and that at Utlia was commenced. The Range office and quarters at Racherla commenced last year were in progress. The inspection bungalow at Prema in Kurnool West for the common

use of the Forest and Fisheries departments was completed, the cost having been shared equally.

40. In Guntur, the inspection shed at Mutukur was completed and the construction of an inspection shed at Venkatayapalem is in progress. In North Cuddapah, construction of a Range office and quarters at Vonipenta was completed and rest-houses and out-houses at Vothimadugu and Kothabhavi are in progress. In South Cuddapah construction of Racheppalle forest guards' shed was completed.

The following works are in progress—

Rest-house at Kodivengammabhavi and Bodithulabhavi and subordinates' quarters at Papanasanam. In West Cuddapah, construction of subordinates' quarters at Sanipaya, combined range office and quarters at Sanipaya, Poluthula inspection shed with kitchen and subordinates' quarters and rest-house with out-houses at Gadikota, are in progress. In Nellore, forest guards' shed in the Kollurpad plantations was completed and the out-houses and latrines to range quarters at Kanigiri, are in progress. In Chingleput, construction of out-houses to Kambakkam hill bungalow was completed. In Chittoor, construction of a motor shed at Panapakkam was completed and construction of range office and quarters and subordinates' quarters at Mamandur, is in progress.

41. During the year, the total expenditure on new buildings and on repairs amounted to Rs. 29,732 and Rs. 9,867 respectively against Rs. 21,240 and Rs. 10,321 in the previous year. The following work was done in—

North Vellore.—The completion of Thongamalai rest-house and part construction of subordinates' quarters at Rangampet.

South Vellore.—The part construction of subordinates' quarters at Bargur and Thongamalai.

West Vellore.—The construction of Naickaneri rest-house by the Forest Engineer and also the construction of the Kuttathur rest-house and deputy ranger's quarters. It is most regrettable that very little progress was made on the important Puthur rest-house.

North Salem.—The completion of the sandalwood godowns at Anchetti, Ayyur and Jowlagiri.

South Salem.—The construction of Range office and Range officer's quarters at Kottapatti, and part construction of rest-house and out-houses at Mayambadi.

Trichinopoly.—Very little work was done on two important buildings, the subordinates' quarters at Nadukombai and the rest house at Valappur.

Madura.—Very good progress was made and over Rs. 11,000 were spent on very important works. The Range offices at Palni and Andipatti were completed and that at Ayyalur well advanced, whilst the range quarters at that place were completed. Subordinates' quarters were completed at Malaipatti, Karandamalai and Surilipatti and commenced at Naranathevanpatti.

The rest-house at Kalluthu also was partly built.

Tinnevely.—The construction of the Kodamadi rest-house and out-houses.

42. The amount spent under this head was Rs. 24,984 against Rs. 23,893 in the previous year. Of the former a sum of Rs. 15,259 was spent on new works and the balance on repairs. Rupees 20,448 and Rs. 8,445, respectively, were the figures for the previous year. The following were the principal items of new works:—Mangalore North.—Deputy rangers' quarters at Sitanadi. Mangalore South.—Completion of the inspection bungalow and deputy ranger's quarters at Kollamogaru; construction of an inspection bungalow at Bandihole and the commencement of forest guards' line at Kollamogaru. North Malabar.—Construction of double quarters for forester and guard at Nedumpoyil, a guard's shed at Tirunelli and subordinates' lines at Kottiyur. South Malabar.—Completion of the rangers' quarters at Nedungayam. Kollegal.—Construction of a rest-house at Lingamankarai and out-houses at Ponnachi. North Coimbatore.—Commencement of the construction of a rest-house and out-houses at Bedarhalli and subordinates' lines at Ullurthanda, and completion of the rest-house and out-houses at Koilnathan and the rest-house at Jeergahalli and subordinates' lines at Chikhalil. Central Coimbatore.—Range clerk's quarters at Iruttupallam, completion of the rest-house at Kunjapanai; and extension to the range office buildings at Iruttupallam. South Coimbatore.—Construction of the subordinates' lines at Kaliapuram.

(c) Miscellaneous works.

43. The total expenditure incurred was Rs. 3,421 against Rs. 3,562 in the previous year. The chief new works were the sinking of one well in *Ganjām* and two wells in each of *Gōdāvari Lower* and *Kurnool West*.—The damming of streams on the Nallamalais undertaken in the first half of the year to provide labour for *Chenchus* was given up as they were employed otherwise on bamboo operations and collection of minor produce.

44. In *Guntūr*, repairs to Alisi channel were completed. In *North Cuddapah*, two new wells were sunk and eight wells were repaired. In *South Cuddapah*, one well is in progress. In *Nellore*, construction and repair of wells and improvement of ponds in the grazing blocks were done. In *Chingleput*, wells were repaired. In *Chittoor*, well near Parakalatippa was completed and trial shaft for a well at Puliutla is in progress.

Southern

45. Four new wells were sunk and the existing wells were repaired or deepened. In *South Vellore* Rs. 612 was spent during the year on boring operations at Komattiyeri (almost completed) and Mandaparai (still in progress). In *West Vellore* a sum of Rs. 840 was spent on further deepening the well at Kottur, the construction of a tube well at Naickaneri and fencing round the compound of the London Mission bungalow at Tiruppattur. In *South Arcot* Rs. 105 were spent in converting a step well into a draw well at Sankarapuram.

46. The total expenditure incurred was Rs. 1,481 against Rs. 2,041 in the previous year. The chief works carried out during the year were sinking two trial wells and stone-lining one well in *South Mangalore*, construction of a timber boom in *South Malabar* and the sinking of a well in *North Coimbatore*.

Telephone.—The telephone service in *South Coimbatore* is reported to have worked on the whole satisfactorily.

3. PROTECTION OF FORESTS

(a) General protection.

47. The following statement shows the number and classification of forest offences reported during the year as compared with those of the previous year and the average of the three years ending with 1916-17.

The total number of offences increased by about five per cent over that of the previous year and was less than the average of the three preceding years by 1.7 per cent. Compared with the offences of the previous year, there was an increase under *injury by fire* and *other offences*; and a decrease under the other two classes. The increase under *injury by fire* was due to the cases of incendiarism having been treated as undetected offences unlike in the previous year, while that under *other offences* to which all the divisions except *Kurnool East* have contributed, is attributed to better and closer supervision. The decrease under *unauthorized felling* was chiefly in *Gōdāvari Lower* where the fall was in unreserved lands and has not been explained and in *Kurnool, South* and *West*, due to provision of labour for the neighbouring villages on felling coupes, collection of hay and other operations which kept them otherwise employed. The reduction under *unauthorized grazing* which kept them *Kurnool East* and is credited to the patrol system.

Of the cases disposed of by the Courts, about 89 per cent ended in conviction against 88 in the previous year. Forty-three cases were compounded and 11 withdrawn after they were taken on the Magistrates' file. The punishments inflicted by the Magistrates were generally satisfactory.

Compounded offences.—The number of cases compounded and the amount of fees realized were 2,150 and Rs. 24,548 respectively against 2,277 and Rs. 22,286. The increase in the amount of fees in spite of a fall in the number of offences was due to heavier fees levied chiefly in *Ganjām*, *Kurnool East* and *South*. The rules for compounding grazing offences were generally observed.

Undetected offences.—The number of undetected cases compared with those of the previous year increased by 25 per cent. Sixty-eight per cent of such cases was under *injury by fire* due to all fire occurrences except those caused in fire-tracing having been treated as offences.

Holding adjacent villagers responsible for commission of offences in particular forests.—The notifications of warning to villagers on the subject were published in *Vizagapatam*, *Gōdāvari Upper*, *Kurnool East* and *South*. No action was taken in *Ganjām*, *Gōdāvari Lower* and *Kistna*. Some of the villagers in *Kurnool West* were warned that the concession of free removal of grass from the Nallamalais and Yerramalais would be withdrawn if they continued remiss in helping to extinguish fires. A portion of the Nallamalai block II in *Kurnool East* was closed to grazing and free removal of grass for a portion of the year to some of the adjacent villagers as they were suspected of setting fire to the forest and failed to assist in putting out fires.

Rewards.—In *Kurnool East*, a sum of Rs. 159 was granted as rewards to the subordinates and private individuals for successful detection of offences. A guard in *Kurnool West* was given a reward of Rs. 25 for having caught hold of one of a large gang of fibre thieves at considerable personal risk.

49. The following statement shows the number of offences detected during the year compared with the previous year:—

50. There was decrease under all heads except other offences due mainly to extension of the kancha system in *Nellore* and to the introduction of the same system in *Chingleput* and to better protection in general.

Two thousand and two hundred and seventy-one cases were taken into court and 2,111 ended in conviction and 160 were acquitted and the percentage of failure fell to 7 per cent from 7.4 of the previous year.

Five thousand and seven hundred and fifteen cases were compounded for Rs. 64,019 against 6,124 cases for Rs. 65,203.

Rupees 2,149 were levied as fines on kanchadars for neglecting protection of kanchas.

During the year general instructions for the guidance of Forest subordinates in the prosecution of forest offences were issued in B.P. Forest No. 103, dated 17th December 1917, and B. P. Forest No. 24, dated 19th July 1918.

The punishments awarded by magistrates are reported to be generally adequate. In some cases the inadequacy of the penalties imposed by Magistrates is very marked, and this has been particularly noticeable in *Chittoor* in past years. The Collector of that district remarks as follows:—

"*Criminal cases*.—I have issued a new Standing Order defining the procedure and am now insisting on Subdivisional magistrates trying cases. In spite of the recommendation that they should do so made years ago by the Forest Committee, they have systematically neglected to do so. This should have the effect of improving the work of the magistracy. Some of the Sub-Magistrates—I have two particularly bad examples in mind—showed the most extraordinary want of sense

during the year in dealing with forest cases; they perversely misconstrued the Forest Act, discharged against all the evidence or inflicted absurdly low fines. The Deputy Magistrate, Chittoor, has, since he started trying forest cases, made a new departure by inflicting imprisonment without the option of a fine in some cases. I propose to commend his example to other magistrates. The sub-magistrates regard these cases only from the fiscal point of view and do not understand that what they have to consider is the damage done to forests rather than the value of property stolen and that the object of punishment is to deter rather than to recover the value of property."

The Conservator trusts that all magistrates when trying forest cases will bear the above words in mind.

51. During the year, in addition to rewards granted for detecting forest offences, the system of grant of rewards to the kanchadars of *Nellore* district in appreciation of good protection was introduced for the first time.

The important cases of rewards are mentioned below :—

In *South Cuddapah*, Rs 33 were disbursed in a big case of removal of red sanders timber marked with a counterfeit hammer. The accused were sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 500 and in default to suffer imprisonment for six months. The seized timbers were sold in auction for Rs. 282. In *Nellore* Rs. 127 were granted to the subordinates for detecting grazing cases. Rupees 2,383 and a few medals were granted to the kanchadars in appreciation of good protection to the kanchas. In *Chittoor*, Rs. 40 were paid to the subordinates who detected a case of browsing 200 goats.

52. The rules for the guidance of Forest officers in compounding forest offences in G.O. No. 1990, dated 13th June 1910, and the rules prohibiting District Forest officers passing orders to confiscate the seized property when compounding an offence were observed generally throughout the Circle.

54. There is nothing remarkable in these figures except the large number of undetected fire cases.

Out of 11,515 cases, 3,375 relate to unreserves of which the great majority are unauthorized felling cases.

In *South Arcot*, the number of cases is still larger than it should be, totaling 2,260, but of these only 1,050 are in reserves and 1,210 in unreserves. In *Trichinopoly* also the number of cases in unreserves is greater than that in the reserves.

As compared with the previous year, there was decrease in the cases brought to trial in all the districts except in *North Vellore* and the decrease is very marked in *Madura*, *Trichinopoly* and *North Salem*.

In fixing the amount of compensation attention was generally paid to the orders contained in G.O. No. 1090, dated 13th June 1910.

55. In *South Vellore*, an important case relating to mischief by fire of six sandalwood trees standing on patta lands of the *Ooran Rama Kavandan* of *Tekamarathur* village ended in the conviction of the accused.

In *West Vellore*, a case of theft of sandalwood from *Pulianur Ar* of the *Tirupattur Javadis* for the distillation of oil has been charged under section 379 of the Indian Penal Code and the Sandalwood Transit rules and is pending with the Magistrate.

In *South Arcot*, the important case of sandalwood smuggling from *South Salem* forests by the *Kalroyen jaghir* contractors of *South Arcot* district referred to in the previous year's report ended in the acquittal of the accused.

In *South Salem*, out of nine cases of sandalwood thefts, one was compounded, two were acquitted, three were convicted and three are pending inquiry.

56. Small rewards amounting to Rs. 425 were given for successful detection of goat browsing and sandalwood cases in *South* and *West Vellore*, *South Arcot* and *North* and *South Salem*.

57. The offences reported during the year are classified and compared in the *West* subjoined statement with those of the previous year and with the average of the three *Circle* years ending with 1916-17 :—

58. The total number of offences decreased by about 17 per cent from that of the previous year and by 11 per cent from that of the average of the three preceding years. The decrease was mainly under 'unauthorized fellings' in *Mangalore North* and *North* and *Central Coimbatore* divisions, probably due to the infliction of deterrent punishments. There was a small increase under 'injury to forests by fire' mainly due to *North Coimbatore*. The decrease under 'other offences' was mainly in *Central* and *South Coimbatore* though it was partly counterbalanced by an increase in *South Malabar* due to the inclusion of offences under Timber Transit rules.

Out of the 640 cases taken to court, 511 were disposed of, 129 remained pending disposal at the close of the year. The result of the disposed of cases was 466 convictions and 45 acquittals, the percentage of conviction being 91 against 92 in the previous year. The punishments inflicted by the magistrates are reported to be generally satisfactory, except in *The Nilgiris*. The matter is said to be receiving the Collector's attention.

Illicit timber fellings are reported to have been rampant in *South Coimbatore* where the prosecution of two such offences ended in the conviction of all the accused concerned, to four and six months' rigorous imprisonment.

Compounded offences.—The number of cases compounded and the amount of fees realized were 1,979 and Rs. 30,016 respectively against 2,673 and Rs. 31,272 in the previous year. The decrease in the number of offences is due to fewer offences reported from the unreserves in *Kollegal* and to the fact that the offences of 1915-16 from the unreserved lands of *Central Coimbatore* had been included in the statement for 1916-17. The fee realized was large in proportion to the number of offences compounded and this was chiefly in *North Coimbatore* due to severe punishments inflicted owing to the persistent theft by gangs of habitual thieves; in *South Mangalore* to a larger amount collected by the Revenue Department; and in *South Malabar* to the large fee levied in a case of illicit felling. Two hundred and seventeen cases were withdrawn during the year against 185 in the previous year. The rules for compounding grazing offences were followed in all districts and worked satisfactorily.

Undetected offences.—There was an increase by 25 per cent in the number of undetected cases over that of the last year and it was entirely under 'injury to forests by fire' due presumably to the fact that reports are insisted on wherever a fire occurs and that all fire occurrences except those caused in fire tracing, have been treated as offences.

Holding adjacent villagers responsible for commission of offences in particular forests.—Notices warning the villagers of their responsibility and of the punitive measures for commission of offences in the adjoining forests were published in *North Mangalore* and the four divisions of *Coimbatore*. No special steps were taken in *South Mangalore* and this system is not required in the two *Malabars*. In *The Nilgiris* the resident Chettis in *Mudumalai* were refused free permits for grazing and for timber and fuel for domestic consumption owing to their failure to assist the department in fire protection. As a result of large fires in the *Moyar* valley of the *North Coimbatore* division penning was prohibited there.

59. Rewards.—For detection of sandalwood cases in *Mangalore North* a sum of Rs. 85 was granted as reward. *Mangalore South*.—For detecting two shooting cases, three cases of fire occurrence and one of illicit felling of a teak tree, a sum of Rs. 25 was paid to the subordinates concerned. *North Malabar*.—Rupees 60 were paid to the hill tribes in two ranges for successful fire protection. *The Nilgiris*.—In two cases rewards to the extent of Rs. 9 were paid. The Game Association paid Rs. 67-8-0 as rewards to the forest subordinates for detecting cases of poaching. In *South Coimbatore* a reward of Rs. 15 was sanctioned and disbursed to the subordinates concerned in detecting a case of illicit felling.

(b) Protection from fire.

Northern Circle.

60. Special protection.—The usual methods of protection were followed. The *Khonds* in *Ganjam* and the *Koyas* and *Reddis* in the *Gōdāvarī* helped mostly in fire protection operations and were granted rewards for their services. In *Gōdāvarī Upper*, lump sum payments were made for line-clearing and protection in addition to granting rewards. The area attempted to be protected was 2,360 square miles against 2,545 in the previous year. The decrease was mainly in *Vizagapatam*, *Gōdāvarī Lower*, *Kistna* and *Kurnool West* due to transfers to 'general protection.' The season was dry and unfavourable. The percentage of successful protection was 86 against 90 in the previous year and 74 in 1915-16. The cost per square mile successfully protected was Rs. 23-6-9 against Rs. 22-13-0. Seventy-nine per cent of the total area burnt was in the *Kurnools*. Compared with the previous year's results, the area burnt decreased in the *East* and increased in the *South* and *West* divisions. The increase in the *South* was due to the inefficiency and indifference of the ranger in charge of *Gundlakamma* range where timber worth Rs. 500 was also burnt. The District Forest Officer considers that one of the *Military Grass Farm* contractors connived at the incendiarism in *Chelama* range with a view to secure an increased outturn of hay for the following year. In the *West*, the *Chenchus* were the cause of most of the fires which occurred near their settlements. They systematically set fire to the forests in order to facilitate their moving about freely, especially for the collection of minor produce, the crop of tamarind during the year having been abnormally heavy. A good instance of their sense of responsibility is afforded by

the case of the *Chenchu* boy of *Pangidi* who lost an arrow shooting squirrels and burned a coupe including cut timber and fuel to the value of over Rs. 500 to clear the grass.

61. General protection.—The area attempted to be protected was 2,293 against 2,064 square miles in the previous year and the percentage of failure rose from 6.5 to 9.1. Eighty-one per cent of the failure was in *Kurnool West* for the reason mentioned under 'special protection'.

62. The number and origin of fires during the year are given in Appendix A. The total number of fires was 342 against 318 in the previous year and the area burnt increased by about 40 per cent.

63. There was no change in the system of fire protection. The area of forest tracts protected is shown in Form No. 72. Central Circle.

The area attempted to be protected during the year was 2,346 square miles against 2,218 square miles of last year and the area burnt was 276 square miles against 574 square miles of previous year.

In *Bellary*, all the felled coupes in the district and the plantations of the *Adoni* range were as usual fire-traced. Six fires of 8,326 acres occurred in *Bandri* reserve and one of 700 acres in *Kupgal* plantation. The whole of north-east block and *Donimalai* blocks were burnt. The increase is chiefly due to the unfavourable season of the year. In *Amantapur*, there were 95 fires burning in all 30,839 acres against 207 fires of 91,683 acres of previous year. Eight reserves were closed to grazing and free removal of grass as a punishment for incendiarism, and free removal of grass was prohibited in seven more reserves. This is reported to have had the desired effect on the villagers and accounted for the reduction in the number of fires during the year. In *Guntur*, no areas were specially fire-protected during the year. Twenty-one fires occurred covering an extent of 3,307 acres and they were caused more or less by the carelessness of the wayfarers. Parcels Nos. 32 and 33 of *Gangalapenta* of 5,660 acres burnt in 1916-17 were closed to grazing for two months from 1st July 1917. In *North Cuddapah*, the smaller area burnt during the year is due to timely fire-tracing operations and to the constant and vigilant patrol of the subordinates. There were two cases of malicious firing. The villagers were punished with the enhancement of grazing fees to four times the ordinary rate and withdrawal of the privilege of free removal of grass—vide B.P. Forest No. 1245, Routine, dated 11th September 1917. In *Nellore*, along the foot of the *Veligondas* of *Udayagiri*, *Kanigiri* and *Rapur* ranges, the ryots failed to assist in putting out fire in spite of warnings and they were punished with the withdrawal of the free removal of grass.

64. The origin of fires is given in Appendix A.

65. Special protection.—There was no change in the system of fire protection during the year except in *South Vellore* where an additional fire line called the *Gangavaram* fire line of 16 miles and 2 furlongs was cut in the *Polur* range with a view to help the *Malayalis* in preventing the possibility of any fire from the plains getting beyond the median line. The area attempted to be protected was 1,433 square miles against 1,382 square miles in the previous year. Southern Circle.

The area burnt during the year was 42.13 square miles against 19.25 square miles in the previous year and the percentage of area successfully protected during the year is 97.05 against 98.61 in the previous year. The cost per square mile of successfully protected area rose from Rs. 12-3-10 to Rs. 13-1-10. The season was much less favourable to fire protection than that which preceded it.

66. General protection.—The percentage of failure rose from 1.23 to 2.39.

67. The number and origin of fires are given in Appendix A. There were 599 fires burning 68,280 acres against 449 fires burning 34,072 acres in the previous year and 697 fires burning 117 and 299 acres in 1915-16.

68. Special protection.—The usual methods of fire protection were followed. The area attempted to be protected was 1,014 square miles against 1,068 square miles in the previous year, chiefly due to transfers from special to general protection. The decrease was in *Mangalore North*, *Nilgiris* and *North Coimbatore*, which was partly counterbalanced by an increase in *Central Coimbatore* due to extension of protection Western Circle.

to an additional block. The area burnt was 49 square miles giving 95.16 per cent of success compared with 98.3 in 1916-17 and 89.3 in 1915-16, the failure being chiefly in *The Nilgiris*, *Kollegal*, *North Coimbatore*, *North Malabar* and *South Mangalore* owing to the very unfavourable season. An area of 18 square miles, i.e., 37 per cent of the total area, was burnt in *The Nilgiris*. In *North Coimbatore* the entire *Hardwickia* experimental block in Bargur and 75 per cent of the Minchiguli rosewood block were burnt. The assistance of the hill tribes in *South Coimbatore* was enlisted as usual on fire protection on the reward system. The cost of protection per square mile of area attempted was Rs. 26-3-5 against Rs. 28-13-10 in the previous year.

69. *General protection*.—The area over which protection was attempted during the year was 2,605 square miles against 2,556 in the previous year. The percentage of failure rose from 2.4 to 14.05 and *North Coimbatore* and *Kollegal* mainly contributed for this increase, the percentage of failure in those divisions being 60 and 37 respectively. It is reported that there is a regular custom in normal years in *North Coimbatore* to burn the whole forest every second year to get young grass and only small areas in the intervening years.

The reporting of fire occurrences in these areas continued to be unsatisfactory especially in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore*.

70. The number and origin of fires during the year are given in *Appendix A*. The total number of fires was 563 against 455 in the previous year and the area burnt was considerably more, the average per fire having risen from 115 to 474.

(c) *Protection from cattle.*

Northern Circle.

71. Goats were not allowed into the forests. 73.5 per cent of the total area of reserved forests and reserved lands was open to other animals and 26.3 per cent was closed for the whole year and 0.2 per cent for part of the year. There was an increase of 45 square miles in the area closed for the whole year. The increase was chiefly in *Gōdāvari Lower* and *Kistna* due to closure of coupes worked and under working and in *Kurnool West* where it is not explained.

72. *Incidence of grazing*.—Owing to low demand, the question of grazing is not a difficult problem in *Ganjām*. In *Vizagapatam*, most intensive grazing continued in *Sarvasiddhi* range and steps have yet to be taken to reduce the incidence. In *Gōdāvari Upper*, there was an increase in the number of cattle grazed by the *Koyas* and *Reddis* under the privileges conferred on them and the District Forest Officer believes that foreign cattle must have been passed as belonging to them; this matter needs investigation. In *Kurnool West*, the grazing incidence in the *Dhone* range is too heavy; goat browsing on the *Yerramalais* is reported to be decreasing. In the other divisions, the incidence was within the possibility.

73. *Introduction of the forest village system*.—The conditions in *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam*, the *Gōdāvaris* and *Kistna* are not suited to the introduction of the system. It is reported that statistics have been collected in *Kurnool East* and *South* to introduce it.

74. The number of cattle impounded was 16,737 against 25,254 in the previous year and 23,826, the average for three years ending 1917-18. Compared with the figures of the previous year, there was a marked decrease in *Kurnool East* and *West* due to a reduction in the number of grazing offences. It is to be noted that there had not been a corresponding increase in the grazing revenue.

Central Circle.

75. The area closed and open to grazing is exhibited in Form 73. The total number of animals grazed on payment amounted to 915,360 as per Form 74 against 1,021,881 and the general decrease is due to closure of several reserves to grazing in *Bellary* and *Anantapur* and to enhancement of grazing fees to four times in *North Cuddapah* and to an appreciably less number of sheep licensed during the year, being 487,688 sheep against 621,194 of the previous year. In *Nellore*, in the case of many of the kanchas, felled coupes or unsold kanchas were added to the adjacent kanchas for protection by the kanchadars. The protection is reported to have been good on the whole while only 73 kanchadars were fined Rs. 2,149 for bad protection and breach of the terms of agreement.

Thirty-three silver medals were awarded to selected kanchadars for good protection and cash reward ranging from 5 to 10 per cent of the kancha lease amount was paid to 136 lessees of the year 1916-17.

There were 370 kancha leases with an area of 256,379 acres open to grazing and 5,627 acres of closed area given for protection to the kanchadars. In *Chingleput*, the kancha system was introduced during the year and the system is reported to be working satisfactorily.

Semi-wild cattle.—As a result of the Forest Commissioner's inspection the acquisition of the enclosures in the *Sriharikota* reserve has been abandoned in Board's Proceedings, Forest Mis. No. 299 (Confdl. 7), dated 7th June 1918, and the question of the enhancement of grazing fees is under consideration.

Wild cattle.—Inquiries were made of professional cow-catchers in *Sriharikota* with a view to bring them to *Ipur* to catch the wild cattle there, but owing to their demanding excessive rates the proposal was dropped.

76. *Incidence of grazing*.—In *Bellary*, the question of general enhancement of fees was dropped by the Board in Board's Proceedings, Forest Mis. No. 185, dated 16th May 1918, on the ground that the district is too backward to admit of any change. Particular areas wherever the incidence appears to be excessive will be dealt with on their own merits in due course. In *Anantapur*, the incidence of grazing is one cow unit per 0.94 acre as against 1.08 acres of last year. With a view to the introduction of the forest village system, enhancement of grazing fees to As. 8 per cow was ordered in Board's Proceedings, Forest No. 580, Routine, dated 30th April 1918, and the results are being watched. The Collector remarks as follow:—

"I understand that 3 acres of well-protected area is the proper cow unit. If so, I do not expect that the enhancement of the grazing fee to As. 8 per cow unit will reduce the grazing incidence to the desirable limit. We might, however, wait and watch the result of the present enhancement for a year."

In *Guntur*, the incidence of grazing is one cow unit for 3.42 acres against 3.48 of last year. Though it is slightly heavier than that of last year, it must be considered normal and no special steps need be taken to reduce grazing any further at least till working-plans are prepared for the main reserves. In *North Cuddapah*, the incidence is 6.2 acres per cow unit, in *South Cuddapah* 6.52 acres per cow unit, and in *West Cuddapah* 5.9 acres per cow unit. As a safeguard against excessive grazing in all the three divisions it has been ordered that all cattle of the villages lying beyond 5 miles of reserved forests should be considered as foreign and charged at Rs. 1 per cow unit in accordance with the Board's Proceedings, Forest No. 273, Routine, dated 21st February 1918. In *Chingleput*, the incidence of grazing was one cow unit for 2 acres generally except in a few cases in the *Tiruvallur* range where the incidence was fixed at one cow unit for four acres and for one acre according to the nature of the growth of grass. In *Chittoor*, as reported in last year, the incidence is still very heavy.

Southern Circle.

77. An analysis of cattle impounded is given in *Appendix B*.

78. About 76 per cent of the total area of reserved forests and lands was opened to grazing of cattle but closed against goats. The incidence of grazing in the several districts of the circle is given below:—

The number of cattle grazed shows a reduction on last year but there is no appreciable reduction in the incidence of grazing except in *North Vellore* where the reduction was due to the enhancement of grazing fees from As. 3 to As. 8 per cow unit preparatory to the introduction of the forest village system. Steps have,

however, been taken in several districts to get grazing schemes sanctioned which it is hoped will, after a time, reduce this very heavy incidence. An analysis of the cattle impounded during the year with the average of three years is given in Appendix B.

Western
Circle.

79. Goats are not allowed to browse in any of the reserved forests and lands. 76.3 per cent of the total area of the reserved forests and lands were open to other animals, 10.1 per cent to all animals except sheep and goats and 13.5 per cent was closed to all animals for the whole year and .1 per cent for part of the year.

80. *Incidence of grazing.*—This has not exceeded the possibility in *Mangalore South* and *North Malabar*. The forests are closed to grazing in *South Malabar*. In *North Malabar* no limit is imposed upon the number of animals permitted in any given area, consistent with its possibility. It is not possible to gauge precisely the incidence of grazing in *The Nilgiris* on account of the innumerable shola forests that contain no grazing and the steep ghaut slopes which are not grazed upon.

81. *Introduction of the forest village system.*—The scheme was sanctioned for the *Udumalpet* range of *South Coimbatore* and for the *Thadagam* reserve and *Mettupalaiyam* range of the *Central Coimbatore* division. A scheme for the *Bolampatti* range in *Central Coimbatore* has been submitted to the Board. Another for the *Pollachi* taluk of the former division is under preparation. Proposals for the introduction of the system in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore* and the two divisions of *Mangalore* have been called for. The introduction of this system in *Malabar* is not necessary as the question of grazing is insignificant and in *The Nilgiris* which has its own peculiar conditions.

82. The number of cattle impounded decreased from 7,784 to 7,351 and the average for the three years ending 1917-18 was 8,371. The decrease was chiefly in *The Nilgiris* and *Kollegal* due to a larger number of cattle being licensed in the year, but it was partly counterbalanced by an increase in *South Malabar* and *South Coimbatore* due to better supervision.

(d) *Protection against injuries from natural causes.*

Northern
Circle.

83. *Deer* generally seem to have done a good deal of damage to coppice especially in the small *Shorea* sample areas in *Ganjām* and the gray *langur* specially attacked some *Gmelina* seedlings put out near the *Russellkonda* reservoir. *Prickly-pear* is gradually spreading in *Kurnool East* and measures will have to be taken to eradicate it.

Creepers generally have been cut back in *Ganjām* (14,080 acres) and *Gōdivari Lower* (the area dealt with is not noted).

The 'thicket' fungus of *sāl* was found in *Ganjām* on *Grewia tiliaefolia*, *Terminalia tomentosa* and one or two other species. Specimens were sent to *Dehra*. The District Forest Officer, *Ganjām*, has since intimated that sporophores have been found and it is possible that something may be done when its life history has been further studied.

'*Spike*' is common on *Zizyphus anopla* in most parts of the circle, but has not attacked the sandal wood which except perhaps on the *Nallamalais* seems to be of recent introduction.

The attack on teak in *Godavari Upper* noted last year as having been due to 'jassid' was caused by some other insect not identified.

Central
Circle.

84. In *Bellary*, the *Adoni* range creeper cutting was done by the subordinates. In *Guntur*, the insect attack to *casuarina* growth in *Nayanipalli* plantations continued owing to unhealthy growth of *casuarina* trees owing to poor soil and the lower strata of water level. No injury was done to tree growth in other places by natural causes. In *North Cuddapah*, *Anogeissus latifolia* trees in the *Nallamalais* were attacked by caterpillars which defoliated trees. This was about the beginning of June but with the rains in July, the caterpillars disappeared and the damage to the trees minimized. The tender coppice shoots of red sanders were also, in some cases, attacked by a defoliating caterpillar about the same time. In *Nellore*, the chief pests are (1) *loranthus* on some *grewia* and other inferior species, (2) prickly-pear in coupes, (3) a weevil borer attacking both the wood and leaves of *anogeissus* trees. No special steps were taken to remove these pests. In *Chingleput*, climbers and creepers in the felled coupes

have been cut. *Euphorbia* from all coupes under working was cut by the contractors. Prickly-pear was, to a certain extent, removed from the felled portions of No. 2 coupes of the six special grazing working circles and the work is in progress. In *Chittoor*, an experimental eradication of *lantana* over an area of one acre in *Horsleykonda* was made as a basis for calculating the cost of operations to clear the whole reserve of the pest. One of the densest and oldest areas was selected and all the *lantana* was cut and then the roots grubbed out and removed from the area. The cost was about Rs. 16; but this can be reduced and the average cost, of course, will be far smaller. A detailed scheme to eradicate this pest from the reserve was submitted just after the close of the year and further instructions have been issued to the District Forest Officer by the Conservator after the latter's inspection of the same.

Great care will have to be exercised over *lantana* eradication if money is not to be thrown away without obtaining any satisfactory result.

85. *Prickly-pear.*—No real attempt has as yet been made to get rid of this pest. In *North Vellore*, a sum of Rs. 356 was spent in clearing about 39 acres of the *Palar* plantations and in the *Pichanur* tope and *Aravattla* bungalow compound. In *South Arcot*, Rs. 128 was spent in clearing prickly-pear over an area of 116 acres. In *South Salem*, Rs. 171 was spent in the eradication of prickly-pear in the reserves and enclosures of the sandal working circle, *Chitteri* range, and the work was entrusted to the *Malayalis* for execution. Fifty acres in *Morappur* coupe XV were cleared of prickly-pear at a cost of Rs. 75. In *Madura*, eradication of this pest was carried out in 17 fuel coupes in *Sholavandan*, *Nattam* and *Ayyalur* ranges over an area of 410 acres at a cost of Rs. 1,833.

Pyrausta machaeralis.—The teak leaf defoliators *Pyrausta machaeralis* and *Hyblaea puera* noticed last year in the *Banavaram* reserve have been again at work this year. The attack however is not serious.

Lantana.—It is very regrettable that the destruction of *lantana* has not been properly undertaken in the *West Vellore* division with the result that it has been allowed to spread and there are now 3,505 acres in and around *Kuttathur*, 90 acres in *Govindapuram* and 352 acres in *Pungulam* reserve. Only Rs. 200 were spent in clearing 1,047 acres. More energetic work is urgently called for.

In *North Salem* also only a small area, 286 acres in *Thalli* reserve, was dealt with and the pest is spreading.

In *Tinnevely*, 57 acres in the *Koilteri* working circle and 35 acres in *Kannikatti* were cleared at a cost of Rs. 207.

Spike.—This subject is treated in detail under research work. The spiked area is undoubtedly increasing in *North Salem* and *Trichinopoly* districts.

Creeper cutting.—In *Tinnevely*, Rs. 666 were spent in creeper cutting and girdling in the sandal area in *Alagarkoil* valley, in coupes I and II of *Kalakad* working circle and in coupe I of *Vadagarai-Melpidagai* reserve. About Rs. 238 were spent in creeper cutting and girdling in the *Hopea* and *Balanocarpus* areas in *Kodamadi* and *Kannikatti*.

86. *Spike disease.*—With reference to the remarks in the last report on the failure to maintain the measures prescribed in *Kollegal* for the isolation of this disease, the Conservator has inspected the locality and issued fresh orders which are now being carried out. In *North Coimbatore* the disease is spreading. A scheme for working the area has lately been amended and approved by the Conservator.

Lantana is being eradicated in areas under working-plans in *North Malabar* and *North, Central* and *South Coimbatore* and good progress has been made.

Prickly-pear.—Regular clearing schemes are working in the coupes under working-plans. Considerable advance has been made in *Central Coimbatore*, which is due to the energetic inspection of the District Forest Officer as well as to a new system of eradication that he has instituted by which the expenditure is limited to the actual amount of work done.

Teak defoliators.—No very bad attacks occurred during the year in *South Malabar* which is ascribed to the very heavy rains in October 1917.

4. SYLVICULTURE.

(a) Natural reproduction.

Northern Circle.

87. In the case both of coppice and seedlings, natural reproduction is reported to have been satisfactory specially in the case of *Shorea robusta* though in the Kussellkonda and Mojjagoda ranges in *Ganjām* a severe storm in May brought down about half the crop of seed before it was ripe. *Hardwickia binata* has also seeded well this year on the Yerramalais in *Kurnool* and in other localities; though not strictly a part of the history of 1917-18, it should be noted that those trees which did not seed in about April 1918 were flowering in July and August and should thus give practically two crops in 1918. *Dendrocalamus strictus* has seeded largely in the Dharakonda reserve in *Vizagapatam* district and also in some parts of *Gōdāvari* Lower. A single specimen of *Bambusa arundinacea* was found in flower in the Sanivaram reserve in *Vizagapatam* in May (and one was also seen on the Nungambakam High Road in Madras). The red sanders (*Pterocarpus santalinus*) at Chatrapur, *Ganjām*, is reproducing itself nicely and the species is thriving in spite of the change from a hill climate and rocky soil to the plains on a sandy soil. *Avicennia* has done well in most of the delta reserves in *Kistna* except Upputeru where *Lumnitzera racemosa* has come on well. Sandal reproduction is coming on at Diguvametta in *Kurnool* South and in the bungalow plantation at Waltair, the headquarters of the circle. *Kurnool* South reports an abnormal flowering of teak in April on the Yerramalais, the usual date being in July after the south-west monsoon has broken.

Central Circle.

88. In Bellary, natural regeneration of *Hardwickia binata* in Jittinakatta and north-west sides of Sogi, and of *Dolichandrone crispata*, *Soyimida febrifuga*, *Acacia Sundra* in Hyarada 3 and C blocks, Sogi and Jittinakatta reserves is successful. *Santalum album* in one of the nallas of Jajikalgutta reserve and in Jittinakatta is doing well. In Adōni range, the natural reproduction of *Dalbergia latifolia*, *Casnia fistula*, *Melia indica*, and *Acacia Sundra* is fairly good. *Hardwickia binata* reproduces itself fairly well in Kuppagal reserve under parent trees. A large number of seedlings of *Hardwickia binata* was observed in the old worked coupes of Chiribi reserve. Young and healthy seedlings of *Acacia Sundra* were seen in Gundu reserve, and *Hardwickia binata* was seen to reproduce itself very well especially in the protected coupes of Gundu and Bandri reserves. Regeneration of *Hardwickia binata* in the Yepi block of Bellary range is good, and 93 seedlings were counted on an average plot of one chain square. The reproduction of Babul is fair in Daroji and Moka A and B blocks. Sissoo is doing well in the Moka plantation B block. In *Anantapur*, the sandal-wood trees which had established themselves in the Penukonda, Gundumala, Amagondapalaiyam, Yerracherla and Kadiri reserves are confined to favourable localities and natural regeneration is observed in Penukonda, Gundumala and Amagondapalaiyam reserves. Natural regeneration of *Acacia sundra*, *Dolichandrone crispata* and *Hardwickia binata* were observed in reserves throughout the district. Coppice reproduction in the felled coupes of Illur reserved forest continued to be satisfactory, but not so in Panidi where they practically all died out. The species coppiced is purely Babul. In *Guntūr*, the reproduction of mada (*Avicennia officinalis*) by seed and the regeneration of Thilla (*Eccocaria agallocha*) and Kalinga (*Sonneratia Apetula*) by coppice are successful in Bapatla range. The regeneration of Nallaregu (*Albizia Amara*) by coppice in felled coupes of Tadepalli reserve is also satisfactory. The regeneration of Yepi (*Hardwickia binata*) in the upland ranges is not satisfactory as the seed yielded this year was not profuse. The reproduction of billudu (*Chloroxylon swietenia*), *Anogeissus*, etc., is fair in the felled coupes and in places not open to grazing. In *North Cuddapah*, coppice reproduction in the felled coupes has been satisfactory especially that of *Pterocarpus santalinus* and *Anogeissus latifolia*. The natural regeneration from seed suffered and mostly burnt away by the fires of 1918. In *South Cuddapah*, reproduction of red sanders and billu by seed is on the whole fair, but was as usual hampered by weeds, drought, fire and cattle. Reproduction by seed of *Shorea Tumbuggaia* in the highest slopes of the Veligondas in Chitvel range is reported to be good. Regeneration from coppice shoots in the felled areas is excellent especially in the case of red sanders. In the Kodur and Upparapalli plantations the reproduction of sandal-wood by seed is good. In *West Cuddapah*, in all the fuel and improvement coupes,

the natural reproduction of red sanders, yelama and satin wood is fair to good and the reproduction of coppice growth of red sanders, billu, neruddi, yelama is also good. In Vontimitta range, the red sanders was found to have special peculiarity of developing healthy shoots although the mother stump is hollow, deceased and unsound. In Vempalli range, the natural reproduction in Idupulapaya palmyra plantation is excellent and in some places the regeneration is prolific and thick and the reproduction of billu, Yelama and red sanders in other places is not satisfactory. Coppice shoots in felled coupes are growing vigorously. In *Nellore*, natural seedlings in the case of *Chloroxylon swietenia* under parent trees in many parts of the Veligondas are said to come up well. Seedlings of *Hardwickia binata* are reported to spring up profusely in Rapur Yerragondas and Marlapudi reserves of Rapur range. They die out in the hot season but spring up again with the rains. Coppice reproduction from *Grewia latifolia*, *Zizyphus xylophyra*, *Bauhinia racemosa* is exceedingly good in many old felled areas. Species which coppice well in the Sriharikota reserve and elsewhere on the coast are *Eugenia jambolana*, *Memeylon aungustifolium* and *Glycosmis pentaphylla*. In *Chingleput*, coppice reproduction in all the felled coupes was very good. In most of the plain forests of Chingleput range natural reproduction by seed was satisfactory. This was specially the case with reference to *Melia Indica*. In the Sathiavedu reserve of Tiruvallur range, the reproduction of *Eugenia jambolana* and in the Kambakkam reserve of *Shorea Tumbuggaia* was also good. In *Chittoor*, reproduction from seed of the better species in the Mamandur timber working circles is not satisfactory. This is probably due to too dense a cover of grass and weeds. An accidental fire in the Chittoor reserve which removed the cover of grass and *Dodonea viscosa* seems to support this view as far as *Pterocarpus santalinus* is concerned, for, though in the above ground shoots of this species were burnt back, new shoots sprung up after rain and in the absence of the cover made rapid progress, whereas in the unburnt parts alongside, the plants remained small or seeds did not germinate freely. Experiments are being carried out to test this further. The following species were observed to seed abundantly during the year. *Pterocarpus santalinus*, *Santalum album*, *Anogeissus latifolia*, *Terminalia tomentosa*, *Terminalia Arjuna*, *Cassia marginata*, *Chukrassia tabularis*, *Hardwickia binata*, *Chloroxylon swietenia*. Coppice reproduction was generally satisfactory.

89. Sandal.—The natural reproduction of sandal is reported to be good in *North Southern* and *South Salem* and *Trichinopoly* and particularly in the Chitteris, Pachamalais Circle. and Kollimalais and parts of Shevaroy. It was rather disappointing in the Javadis owing to a prolonged hot weather, but the fencing round sandal mother trees, the creeper cutting and the general tending operations had good effects in the natural reproduction of sandal and they would have shown excellent results but for unseasonable rains followed by a prolonged hot weather. The dying of *Strobilanthes* on the Chitteris has benefited sandal seedlings.

Outside the regularly recognized sandal area, there is no doubt of the spread of sandal in the Mordana reserve and in the Virinjipuram and Chenur plantations of North Vellore, in Thagarai, Parigam, Kanai, Puttai and Rengappanur reserves of South Arcot and in Unjalnachi and Ulkombai forests of the Sirumalai hills of Madura.

In *North Vellore*, natural regeneration has been improved by clearing the ground under seed bearers of *Pterocarpus marsupium* and is noticeable in Rangampet North working circle, whilst *Hardwickia binata* seedlings in Ammanur and teak seedlings in the Satghur and the Pichanur tope have been raised in large quantities by similar methods. In *South Vellore*, the reproduction of *Hardwickia binata* in the Pavunjipattu reserve, of *Chloroxylon swietenia* in the Karnatighur reserve and of *Tectona grandis*, *Pterocarpus marsupium* and *Dalbergia latifolia* in the Virappanur and Patrakad reserves was satisfactory. In *West Vellore*, scattered seedlings of *Pterocarpus marsupium*, *Dalbergia latifolia*, *Anogeissus latifolia* and *Tectona grandis* are found in localities where the species are fairly represented, but all of them suffered from the prolonged hot weather. In *South Arcot*, natural reproduction of *Chloroxylon swietenia*, *Albizia Amara* and *Acacia sundra* is good. In *North Salem*, the natural regeneration by seedlings of species other than sandal was fair and that of *Hardwickia binata* especially in Dharnapuri range was good. In *South Salem*, seedlings of *Albizia Amara*, *Chloroxylon swietenia* and *Acacia sundra* were found

in the coupes closed to grazing in Flavambadi, Kallavi and Pudur Pungani reserves whilst in parts of the hill reserves seedlings of *Pterocarpus marsupium*, *Dalbergia latifolia* and *Hardwickia binata* and other timber trees are noticeable. In *Trichinopoly*, the natural reproduction of *Dalbergia latifolia*, *Pterocarpus marsupium*, *Anogeisens latifolia* and *Albizia odoratissima* is not very satisfactory in the Pachamalais for want of timely rains. In *Madura*, the natural reproduction of teak in Waguthumalai is good. In *Tinnevely*, this was a bad seed year for *Hopea parviflora*, but a very good seed year for *Balanocarpus utilis* and *Gluta Travancorica*. *Hopea* regeneration under about fifteen years old is very bad whereas the regeneration of *Balanocarpus* under almost every seed bearer is excellent. Coppice reproduction in felled coupes on the whole was good.

BAMBOOS.

In *North Vellore*, some bamboos (*Dendrocalamus strictus*) flowered sporadically in Mordana and its extension. Palamadi, Thellai, Karuthamalai, Arasampet and Ambur reserves. But the flowering was confined to few clumps only.

In *West Vellore*, bamboo (both species) has flowered sporadically here and there and is not of much consequence.

In *South Salem*, big bamboos have commenced to flower in patches on the Pachamalais and the Chitteris.

90. In *North Mangalore* the flowering of bamboos has continued in the north of the division. In *South Mangalore*, sporadic flowering is reported throughout the division. The *Hopea* seed crop was a complete failure except in Puttur range and in consequence the intended sowings could not be carried out. In *South Malabar* sporadic seeding of bamboo has continued in the forests below ghats. Seedling reproduction of the secondary timber species is reported good in *North Malabar* and the *Nilgiris*, and regeneration from coppice in the *Eucalyptus* plantations in Ootacamund and Coonoor ranges, is reported to be good except in some of the older plantations coming now under felling. Natural regeneration from seed in *Kollegal* is reported to have been destroyed by fires. There is nothing special to report in the other divisions.

(b) Artificial reproduction.

91. *Regular plantations*.—There has been no extension of the teak plantations in the Nallamalais (*Kurnool East* and *West*). They were started originally to try and reclaim the *Chenchus* for whom other work has now been found. The mulberries for silk worm breeding in *Kurnool West* have been given up, the work needing far more attention than the *Chenchus* would give it; there was also trouble with disease in the silk worms.

92. *Cultural operations*.—Sandal seed has been put out in *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam*, *Kurnool South* and *West*. Twenty acres being sown in the last district but with poor result as the seed was mostly unsound. In *Ganjām*, it seems as if results would be satisfactory; here, in addition to the seed put out in the Gulleri reserve and in the Russellkonda reservoir area, sowings were made in five of the rest-house compounds in Pondakhol range and also in non-sal areas in that range. It has, sometimes, not been realized that sandal does not grow into a tall tree and that it is therefore no good putting in seed in fairly dense high forest where it cannot get its head free. A few *Red Sanders* have been put out in *Ganjām* in the Russellkonda reservoir area by the Vernacular Training school; they are said to be doing well at Othumalugu in *Kurnool South*. Some seed was also put out in coupe XII of Sudam felling series in *Kurnool West*.

Lumnitzera sowings in the Upputeru reserve (locality not specified) in *Kistna* were a failure owing to heavy floods.

Cassia auriculata has been sown in 3 acres in *Ganjām* (Napier Park reserve) at a cost of Rs. 3-11-8 per acre; and in 16 acres in *Vizagapatam* (Kallagandi reserve); a sum of Rs. 39 spent in *Kurnool East* on this work; *Kistna*, *South* and *West Kurnool* and the *Gōdāvarī* do not mention this item but, it is believed, a fairly large area is being dealt with in the two *Kurnools* in the Giddalur and Sivapuram ranges; in the

Gōdāvarī suitable areas are not available. Teak, rosewood, *Pterocarpus marsupium* and *Terminalia tomentosa* seed were also put out in coupe VI of the Gundlabrahmeswaram working circle in *Kurnool West* but had yet to germinate; the result of similar work in the past should have been noted.

93. Form No. 75 shows the area under artificial reproduction.

94. *Regular plantations*.—There were no new plantations added but 752 acres were sold and excluded in *Guntūr* and *Nellore*. In *Bellary*, the moka plantation which consists chiefly of casuarina, sissoo, *Albizia lebbek*, tamarind, *Ingadaleis* and *Melia indica* have attained a height of 15 to 35 feet and the girth ranges from 1 to 5½ feet. In *South Cuddapah*, 500 red-sanders seedlings were planted in the re-cleared area of Kodur red sanders plantation. Of these 500 seedlings 300 are surviving and the remaining 200 died and were replaced.

95. *Cultural operations*.—In *Bellary*, the experimental sowings of tangedu, *Pterocarpus santalinus* and *Hardwickia binata* over sample plots were carried out. In *Anantapur*, cultural operations for the spread of sandal were carried out in Kadiri and Amagondapalayam reserves on a small scale and at a cost of Rs. 10-2-0. Similar sowings in Katagalla and Dokkalakonda reserves conducted last year have been a complete failure. In *Guntūr*, 350 cashew seeds were sown in Madhalapalli and Nayandupalli reserved forests and they all germinated. Twenty-six thousand palmyra seeds were also sown in Ippurpalem, Vedullapalli, Dindi, Amudalapalli, Adavuladivi parra bit II, 1,000 kunkudu (*Sapindus emarginata*) seeds were sown but they have not come out successfully owing to the saline nature of the soil. In 1916-17 coupe of Tadepalli reserve, seeds of vepa (*Melia indica*), tamarind (*Tamarindus indica*), dirisinam (*Albizia lebbek*) and simachinta (*Pithecolobium dulce*) were sown. About 20 per cent of them have germinated and survived after the summer season. Only those that were dibbled in bushes of scrub growth have survived. During the year 640 acres were selected in Muthayapalem and Kondavid reserved forests for sowing tangedu seeds and the operations will be undertaken during 1918-19. In *North Cuddapah*, 5,000 palmyra seeds were sown in Rāmeswaram reserve forest free of cost by the beat subordinates during the year. It is reported that their germination is fairly successful. Twenty-five per cent of the seeds have germinated. Of the seeds sown during 1916-17, 10 per cent of the seedlings are surviving and their height varies from 3 to 5 inches. Some eight measures of tangedu seeds were collected and sown in Vonipenta and Porumamilla ranges over an area of 12 acres and 3½ acres respectively. In the former the seeds germinated during the close of the north-east monsoon but appear to have died during the last summer. In Porumamilla range the germination was not very successful. The few seedlings that came up are still existing. About 295 acres were selected for sowing the tangedu seeds during the coming season. Indigenous species, such as, *Melia indica*, *Pongamia glabra*, mangoes, red-sanders, yepi, etc., trees were sown in range office and bungalow compounds and the results have to be watched after the rains. Sandal seeds were obtained from District Forest Officers, North Salem and Vellore, and they could not be sown for want of timely rains. In *South Cuddapah*, in Chitvel range, 3 acres of the Chitvel reserve forest were sown with 8½ seers of Tangedu seeds. In *West Cuddapah*, the collection and sowing of tangedu seeds have also been sanctioned and seeds collected. Lands have also been made ready. The seeds will be sown as soon as monsoon sets in. Several of the panchayatdars have been instructed to sow tangedu seeds in the panchayat areas for green manure leaf and also for tangedu bark. In *Nellore*, sandalwood seeds were dibbled in selected localities in all the ranges but the results have not been satisfactory so far. In *Chingleput*, 25 measures of sandal seeds in the Kambakkam plateau and 10 measures in Guindy Park reserved forest were dibbled in August 1917. This operation cannot be called a failure. In Kambakkam, there are several seedlings with an average height of about 6 inches and they are in a healthy condition. In Guindy Park, there are about 345 seedlings in a healthy condition. With a view to planting trees in the six special grazing working circles of Chingleput range in accordance with paragraph 10 of the working plan, about one thousand seedlings of different species, such as *Bassia latifolia*, *Mangifera indica*, *Pterocarpus marsupium*, *Polyalthia longifolia*, etc., have been raised free of cost and kept basketted and they will be transplanted in the respective

localities, as soon as the monsoon sets in. In *Chittoor*, over about 120 acres in five ranges, *Cassia auriculata* seeds were sown after ploughing. Unfortunately, seeds were not available in time and the sowings were not made till September and up to November. In January, the whole experiment seemed to be a failure, but the fact was that there had been insufficient rain to germinate the seeds in quantities. More seeds germinated after the rains in May, so that in some places fair results appear. Red sanders seeds were dibbled over an area of 40 acres in the Chittoor reserve and sandal seeds were dibbled over an area of about 1,400 acres in all ranges. The seeds were mostly dibbled in previously felled coupes which are fenced and closed to grazing. The practice adopted was to sow three seeds close together in thumb holes at intervals of about 20 feet, under the shelter of bushy growth. These sowings were made in May and June, but no germinations had been reported by the close of the year. This is probably due to want of rain since seeds sown in a bungalow compound and watered germinated well. Some seeds of *Hopea parviflora* were obtained from South Kanara and dibbled in the evergreen portion of the Thumburukona worked coupes. It is too soon to expect results.

96. *Regular plantations*.—The only districts in which there are regular plantations are North Vellore, Madura and Tinnevely.

In *North Vellore*, five acres were planted at a cost of Rs. 41 and 10 acres cleared at a cost of Rs. 104 in the Amerdi plantation for planting with teak, rosewood, red sanders and sissoo. Red sanders and *Hardwickia binata* were dibbled in coupes III and IV of Chenur working circle and planting of red sanders and *Hardwickia binata* was done in coupe XIII of Kilminnal working circle and coupes XIV of Virinjipuram and Thiruvallam working circles.

In *Madura* no addition was made to the plantations. In the two small teak plantations of Velankombai and Vannathiparai the teak is healthy and the height growth is good. Both plantations want thinning badly and growth is very uneven. The blue gum trees in Gundan Shola plantation are doing well. Growth in the older Pine plantations at Kodaikanal is very dense and they will soon want thinning.

In *Tinnevely* Rs. 934 were spent in the 32 acres of Kodamadi teak plantation. In Valliyur, 120 bamboo cuttings were put in but only 38 are reported to be alive. Thirty-six thousand palmyra nuts were sown in the blanks in compartments of the Teri reserve which were inadequately stocked at a cost of Rs. 26 but most of the work was done by subordinates.

97. *Taungya—North Vellore*.—The taungya plantation attempted was a failure in Amerdi owing to the lack of interest of the villagers.

South Arcot.—The number of teak plants that survived in the two acres in the Pakkam reserve is 1,292 of 3' to 7' in height.

Another 2 acres adjoining the last year's area has been selected, cleared and burnt. The sowing has not yet been done for want of rains. In Siruvadi reserve at the foot of the Durgamalai, a small area of about five acres was selected and sown with $\frac{3}{4}$ measure of sandal seeds, $1\frac{1}{2}$ measures of red sanders and $1\frac{1}{2}$ measures of teak. It is reported that the seeds germinated and the seedlings died in the hot weather. Similarly in Muttakadu reserve a small area of about ten acres on the eastern side of Ettumalai were sown with two measures of teak, two of red sanders and one of sandal seeds in November 1917. The results were the same, as the proper season for sowing was missed and the rains ceased after sowing.

98. *Cultural operations—South and West Vellore*.—Cultural operations as prescribed in the working-plans were carried out and sandal seeds dibbled in the species tending areas. The soil under healthy sandal mother trees was scratched and tree fenced in coupes I and II of the several series. The germination was reported to be fair after the rains but most of these were killed out in the ensuing hot weather.

North Salem.—Eleven Madras measures of sandal seeds were sown along a strip of about 880 yards long by 110 yards wide in the specially protected area on Sanniyasimalai reserve. The seeds were sown by making pits with small spades and dibbling 2 or 3 sandal seeds in each pit under bushes and shade. They were at first thriving well but owing to want of timely rain, they have since to a large extent failed.

One hundred and twenty Kanna plants (*Eleocarpus oblongus*) were replanted in compartment IV of Sanniyasimalai reserve. An area of $47\frac{1}{2}$ acres in compartment 3 of Sanniyasimalai was weeded.

South Salem.—Cultural operations were undertaken in coupes II of compartments 1 and 2 of the Chitteri sandal working circle according to the provisions of the working plan. The operations consisted of the sowing of sandal seeds in an area of 113.94 acres. Fifty per cent of the seed sown germinated.

Sandal seeds were sown in 50.40 acres in the Thumbal extension reserve, in the Ponakaded area (43.20 acres) in the Periasola block, in the Harur specially protected block (101.50 acres) and in an area of $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres in Pallipatti reserve. The results are far from satisfactory. Sandal and teak seeds were sown in Mallapuram reserve, Kouramalai East and West working circles and in Bothakad and Mallapuram Ghat extension reserves. Teak seeds have not germinated but sandal seedlings were found.

Trichinopoly.—In the Sholamatti reserved forest of the Perambalur range, 39 Madras measures of sandal seeds were sown in June and the results are awaited. In the Kollimalais blank areas to an extent of 120 acres were selected in the Shelur and the newly formed Ariyur shola blocks and sown with sandal. The percentage of success was small.

Tinnevely.—During November and December about 700 Madras measures of *Balanocarpus* seeds were dibbled or sown broadcast around Kannikatti and Ullar over an area of about 35 acres at a cost of Rs. 46. Similarly about 300 acres were sown or dibbled around Kodamadi and Usipothai. But the results were poor owing to the seed being eaten by pig and mouse deer. About two measures of Gluta seeds were dibbled over an area of about 20 acres at Kannikatti at a cost of Rs. 56. The number of healthy seedlings at the end of the hot weather was large. About nine measures of sandal seeds were sown along the Mill channel in Ambasamudram range and it is reported that there are 180 seedlings.

99. *Regular plantations*.—During the year 17 acres of the older plantations in *West Nilambur* were clear-felled and new plantations were formed at a cost of Rs. 1,411. In the 27 acres clear-felled last year regeneration was completed. The standing stock on $46\frac{1}{2}$ acres of natural forests was sold for clear-felling and replanting with teak but owing to the very early monsoons, only 10 acres were ready for planting. Out of the 41 acres regenerated last year about 22 acres dibbled at stake were a failure. This year it has been planted up with teak, terminalias and other species. The regeneration of the remaining 19 acres was completed successfully at a cost of Rs. 384. In *The Nilgiris*, the experimental Eucalyptus plantations were maintained but no new planting was done. The growth of the nine species tried varies very much. In some it is excellent and thinning is already required. In the other Eucalyptus plantations blanks were filled up.

100. *Taungyas*.—In *South Mangalore* owing to persistent neglect and failure on the part of the Mahratti hill tribes, taungyas have for the present been abolished. In *North Malabar* 64 acres were planted in several ranges with teak and some vengai, and on the whole with fair success. In *The Nilgiris*, the 13 acres opened last year were a failure. In the current year this area has been planted over again.

101. *Cultural operations*.—In *North Mangalore* the sowing of sandal seed was done on a large scale in the Hosabetta, Thodar and Anambur reserves and has germinated satisfactorily. The *Hopea* sowings of the previous year are doing well. In *South Mangalore* sandal and *Hopea* seeds were dibbled in pits in few hundreds in several reserves. In *North Malabar*, what is known as 'patch' regeneration of teak was carried out in coupes XIX and XX of Begur, in coupe X of Chedeth, in sub-coupe c to f of coupe II of Chedeth and is reported to be thriving satisfactorily. In *South Malabar*, *Terminalia* and *Hopea* seeds were collected and sown in certain plantations in the Nilambur and Amarampalem ranges. In *Kollegal* Rs. 90 was spent in dibbling 60 seers of sandal seeds in coupe XIV of Hanur. In *South Coimbatore* two regeneration plots of 5 acres of each were opened in coupes XI and XIII of Punachi and the old regeneration areas at Mount Stuart and Punachi were weeded.

In addition to the above, large estimates for the sowing of avaram seeds in reserves of *North Coimbatore* and *Kollegal* were sanctioned. The operations will commence with the present monsoon.

(c) *Operations for improvement of the growing stock.*

102. Creepers were cut in all districts except *Gōdāvari Upper*, *Kurnool East* and *South*. In *Ganjām*, the subordinates worked over 14,080 acres of Sal forest free of cost—a very satisfactory bit of work. In other districts the areas dealt with are not reported; *Kurnool West* reports an expenditure of Rs. 225.

In *Kurnool West*, growth detrimental to sandal plants was cut on an area of 600 acres in *Pecheruva* range.

103. *Timber improvement fellings.*—In *North Cuddapah*, 2,214 acres; *South Cuddapah*, 1,740 acres; *West Cuddapah*, 1,509 acres; and in *Chittoor*, 135 acres were felled over in accordance with the working plans. *Coppice felling* continued to be carried out in all districts of the circle for supply of firewood. *Fencing*—of felled coupes was as usual carried out by contractors. In *Nellore* and *Chingleput*, felled coupes were fenced with trench and mound departmentally the latter being planted with aloes, where the outer coupe boundaries coincided with the reserve boundary itself. *Cutting of creepers and climbers* was carried out in all the district except *Bellary*, *Chingleput* and *Chittoor*. *Stone-walking* was done in *Anantapur*, *North Cuddapah*, and in *South Cuddapah* at a cost of Rs. 7,139. *Bunding of streams.*—The attention of all District Forest Officers was specially drawn to the necessity of bunding streams in accordance with the Board's Forest Reference No. 1266/18—dated 30th May 1918.

104. The cutting of creepers affecting standards and other useful trees was carried out by subordinates in most districts and felled coupes were fenced. In *South Salem*, tending operations were undertaken in coupe II (2,200 acres) of compartment 1 and 2 of *Chitteri* sandalwood working-circle at a cost of Rs. 206.

105. *Light improvement fellings* in favour of *Hopea* and sandal, were carried out in 1,050 acres in *North Mangalore*, and over 2,062 acres in *South Mangalore*. Thinnings in teak plantations in *North Malabar* realized nearly Rs. 600; weedings patch regeneration of teak were carried out in last year's coupes. In *South Malabar*, all the teak plantations were thinned according to plan. Parasites were removed over 248 acres. Improvement fellings were carried out over 1,080 acres in compartments VII, Mudumalai. A working scheme for creeper cutting and tending of sandal in the *North Coimbatore* forests has lately been sanctioned. Cleanings and weeding in favour of teak, rosewood and vengai were carried out over 743 acres in several compartments of *Punachi* working circle of *South Coimbatore*.

5. EXPLOITATION.

(a) *System of management.*

(i) *MAJOR FOREST PRODUCTS.*

106. The total area of reserved forests covered by working plans was 2,680 square miles. The various sylvicultural systems in force over this area are shown below:—

(1) *Clear or regeneration fellings.*

107. Thirty-eight acres of compartment 8 of *Kandikuppa* plantation in *Gōdāvari Lower*, 1,230 acres in *Upputeru* reserved forest in *Kistna*, *Katakanapalli* tank (area not reported) in *Kurnool East*, and 209 acres consisting of fire lines in *Chelama* and *Giddalur* ranges in *Kurnool South* were clear felled.

(2) *Selection fellings.*

108. *Ganjām.*—Twenty sāl trees of over 7½ feet in girth in *Rambha* and 101 trees in *Chandragiri* reserved forests were felled. *Gōdāvari Upper.*—776 trees over 3 feet in girth were extracted from the unreserved lands of *Marrigudem* range. *Kurnool East.*—200 palmyras from *Chinaganapalli* reserved forest were removed. *Kurnool South.*—215 palmyras were removed in *Owk* and *Giddalur* ranges. *Kurnool West.*—Dead and fallen trees which yielded 1,653 cubic feet were removed from the hill forests. The area dealt with is not noted.

(3) *Simple coppice.*

109. Sixteen coupes were worked in *Ganjām* covering 11,187 acres, 11 coupes with an extent of 2,710 acres in *Gōdāvari Lower* and seven coupes of 846 acres in *Kistna*.

(4) *Coppice with standards.*

110. Sixteen fuel coupes covering 450 acres in *Vizagapatam*, five in each of *Gōdāvari Lower* and *Kistna* (1,212 and 710 acres respectively), one in *Kurnool East* (area not reported) and three (294 acres) in *Kurnool West* were coppiced.

(5) *Improvement fellings.*

111. *Ganjām.*—One thousand eight hundred and eighty-one sāl and 722 trees of other species were removed. *Vizagapatam.*—The wind-fallen and top-broken sāl trees were extracted from three reserved forests. *Gōdāvari Lower.*—Dead wood which yielded 5,562 cubic feet of fuel was collected from compartments 9 to 14 of *Kandikuppa* plantation; compartment 9 was also thinned. *Kurnool South.*—Overmature trees were felled from the timber coupes covering an area of 7,337 acres and the grazing areas (2,022 acres) were 'thinned to improve the grazing possibility.' *Kurnool West.*—757 acres in the timber coupes of *Gundlabrahmeswaram*, *Nallamalai Terai* and *Pattikonda* working circles were worked over. In *Kurnool East*, dead, dying and unsound trees were removed in four ranges.

(6) *Unregulated fellings.*

112. These fellings were confined to the unreserved lands in all divisions including the *Rampa* forests, except in the case of *Coringa* extension in *Gōdāvari Lower* for supply of fuel required by the *Coanada Port Conservancy Board*, and the removal of bamboos from the reserved forests of *Bhadrāchalam* and *Nugur* taluks in *Gōdāvari Upper*, and of palmyra trees in *Kurnool West*.

113. The total extent under working plan was 1,100 square miles and the various sylvicultural systems in force are shown below:—

(1) Clear or regeneration fellings and (2) Simple coppice.

115. The growth in 11 square miles of reserves was clear felled in South Arcot and in 7 square miles in Trichinopoly. Seven fuel coupes in South Vellore and 14 in South Salem were worked under simple coppice. In Madura, the simple coppice system was enforced in Sholavandan, Nattam and Ayyalur ranges as per prescriptions of the working-plan and also in Kodaikānal and Palni ranges.

(3) Selection fellings.

116. The area shown under this head relates chiefly to bamboos. Selected sandalwood trees dead and dying on the Pachamalais and Kollimalais of Trichinopoly district were enumerated and felled under this system.

(4) and (5) Improvement and Coppice fellings.

117. *Improvement fellings*.—Twenty-nine sandal coupes in South Vellore, 31 sandal coupes in West Vellore, 7 sandal coupes in South Salem, and coupe 1 in each of the felling series under the Hosur sandalwood working-plan were worked under this system. Three coupes of the Palar riverside plantations were also worked under a system of improvement fellings.

Coppice under standard system.—The following coupes were worked under coppice with standards:—

- 9 fuel coupes of 1,006 acres in North Vellore,
- 18 fuel coupes of 1,316 acres in South Vellore,
- 13 fuel coupes of 667 acres in West Vellore,
- 4 fuel coupes of 253.70 acres in South Arcot,
- Coupes in 8 felling series of 1,690 acres in North Salem,
- 2 fuel coupes of 312 acres in South Salem,
- 5 fuel coupes of 265 acres in Trichinopoly,
- 5 fuel coupes of 241 acres in Madura, and
- 13 ghat forest coupes, 3 plain forest coupes and 14 tank-bed coupes in Tinnevely.

(6) Unregulated fellings.

118. Unregulated fellings under the permit system were confined to unreserves under the management of the Revenue Department. In Cumbum and Palni ranges of Madura district, selected marked timber trees were cut and removed on permits from reserves on payment of seigniorage fees for domestic requirements.

(1) Clear or regeneration fellings.

120. In *South Malabar* 46.50 acres in the new Amampalam reserve were clear felled for the formation of teak plantation; the amount realized was Rs. 4,024. Three teak plantations in Nilambur (70 acres) were clear-felled departmentally at a cost of Rs. 2,458.

(2) Selection fellings.

121. *Mangalore North*.—An area of 91.50 acres in coupe II of Madibare Timber Working Circle was felled. *Mangalore South*.—In Kadambilla coupe X over an area of 827 acres, 10,751 c.ft. of timber were extracted. The extraction of overmature trees in compartment I of Jalsur east block continued and 11,922 c.ft. of timber valued Rs. 2,363 were worked during the year. A strip of 40 acres in Nerankimale coupe III was thinned as high forest departmentally, the outturn being over 450 chowks of fuel and about 2,800 c.ft. of timber. *North Malabar*.—356 acres in coupe II of Chedleth and 305 acres in coupe XX of Begur, were felled. *South Malabar*.—At the close of the year the fellings over an area of 280 acres in the natural forests of Karimpoya reserve, were commenced in anticipation of the new working plan, to meet urgent demands. *Kollegal*.—‘Spiked’ and dead sandal trees were removed from Bailur coupes I, II and X and Madeswaramalai coupes VII to IX and the total yield was about 80 tons. *North Coimbatore*.—From three coupes of Talamalai and five of Bargur, 19,941 sandal trees yielding 289 tons of rough sandalwood were extracted. *South Coimbatore*.—Selection felling in coupe XI of Punachi Working Circle was sold to a contractor. From the Tekkadi leased forests 10,720 cubic feet of timber were felled to meet an urgent demand from the Military Department.

(3) Simple coppice.

122. *Mangalore North*.—An experimental coupe of 2½ acres was opened and worked for fuel. *South Malabar*.—In Karimpoya teak plantations, 1910 and 1911, 2,850 saplings damaged by wild elephants had to be coppiced. In *The Nilgiris* about 73 acres of eucalyptus and acacia plantations were felled for the supply of firewood.

(4) Coppice with standards.

123. An area of 568 acres in *Mangalore North* and two sample plots of 16 acres in Narimogar and Kalanjimale reserves in *South Mangalore*, were coppiced; Muliya coupe IV in the latter division was sold in three strips to a contractor. Five coupes (574 acres) in *Kollegal*, four coupes (282 acres) in *North Coimbatore*, twenty coupes (1,882 acres) in *Central Coimbatore* and seven coupes (322 acres) in *South Coimbatore*, were worked during the year.

(5) Improvement fellings.

124. *Mangalore North*.—Coupe I of Pilarkan and the Kiralbogi area in Jarvattu (total 126 acres) were worked for fuel. *Mangalore South*.—667 logs of 8,740 c.ft. of timber were felled from Parappa reserve. *South Malabar*.—Thinnings were carried out in the teak plantations of two ranges and 67,848 teak logs and saplings and 2,174 miscellaneous species were extracted. *The Nilgiris*.—Fifty acres in compartment 4 and the whole of compartment 7 (1,080 acres) of Mudumalai working circles were worked over, total yield being 23,957 c.ft. of teak and 9,834 c.ft. of other species. Six acres in compartment 3 of Muthinad, the unworked portion of compartment 1 in Newman, were worked and the yield was 47,900 c.ft., of which 8,200 c.ft. were used for charcoal manufacture. Seven acres of Benne teak plantation were marked for thinning and the yield was 500 poles. *Central Coimbatore*.—Felling in Jakkanari coupes 1-a and b (640 acres) was commenced but not completed during the year.

(6) Unregulated fellings

125. *Mangalore North*.—Firewood required for 110 cinnamon oil stills and for manufacturing 15 tons of catechu, was removed from unreserved lands. Timber also was removed from the unreserves on payment of seigniorage, only for domestic and agricultural purposes. *Mangalore South*.—Dead and windblown trees (about 3,200 c.ft.) were sold from reserves in the closed working circle. *South Malabar*.—Three irul (*Xylia*) and 21 karimarudu (*Terminalia*), trees yielding 865 c.ft. were sold from the natural forests for Rs. 856. *The Nilgiris*.—About 2 acres in the Nilgiri Eastern slopes reserve were worked for firewood for a special supply. Four and a half tons of sandalwood were extracted from the unreserved lands in Sigur.

In *North Vellore*, the produce in Synagunta and Mordana reserves was departmentally collected to ensure protection of the reserves for sylvicultural reasons and the collection of manure leaf was permitted under the Conservator's advice by head loads only and it was confined to creepers, shrubs and weeds in all reserves except where the average removal was less than 100 cart-loads.

In *West Vellore*, permits were issued for the removal of manure leaves in the Chengam range for about five months, after which the removal of the produce was stopped with reference to the Board's orders.

(2) *Collection of tan stuffs.*

137. As per orders of the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, the leases for collecting avaram bark were closed one month earlier and fresh leases given till 30th June 1919 to the same contractors in some cases at two-thirds of the annual rental paid by them in the previous year. In cases in which the work of the old contractors was unsatisfactory, the leases were given to approved contractors on the conditions imposed by the Controller.

In *North Vellore*, an area of 500 acres in the Karuthamalai reserve has been set apart for exploitation of *Anogeissus latifolia* (bark and leaves).

In *South Vellore*, departmental collection of the undermentioned tan stuffs was made during the year and supplied to the various firms at Madras and elsewhere:—

In *West Vellore*, a departmental collection of 1,090 quarters of *Anogeissus* bark was made at a cost of Rs. 112.

The collection of avaram seeds was undertaken in all the districts of the circle and nearly 20,000 Madras measures were in stock at the end of the year.

(3) *Extraction of fodder.*

138. Free removal of grass was allowed in North and South Vellore and South Arcot. In North Salem, the grass in 26 closed coupes and one specially protected block was sold for Rs. 213-8-0. In West Vellore, South Salem and Trichinopoly, free removal of grass was not permitted. In Madura, the removal of hariali grass from Bryant Park reserve in Kodaikanal range was allowed as usual on permits. In Tinnevely, grass was included in the minor forest produce lease.

(4) *Hay-making.*

139. In North Vellore, grass was leased out to the Military Department on payment of a royalty of Rs. 2 per ton of hay removed and Rs. 971 was realized as against Rs. 741 in the previous year.

The departmental collection of hay was undertaken in North and South Salem for supply to the Military Department. The quantity collected in North Salem (15,326 cubic feet) was sold to the Hosur Remount Depot while that collected in South Salem (310 tons) was supplied to the Military grass farms, Bangalore.

(5) *Grazing.*

140. The revenue derived from grazing was Rs. 1,94,541 against Rs. 1,68,563 in the previous year.

(1) *Bamboos.*

141. Seven bamboo coupes covering an area of 265 acres in *Mangalore North*, six coupes (area not reported) in *Mangalore South*, thirteen coupes of 28,452 acres in *North Coimbatore*, twelve coupes of 1,808 acres in *Central Coimbatore* and ten coupes (4,476 acres) in *South Coimbatore* were leased out. Removals on permits were allowed in *Mangalore North*, *North* and *South Malabar* and the *Nilgiris* to meet local demands. Bamboos were also extracted departmentally in both the divisions of *Mangalore* and *Malabar* for rafting and floating timber.

(2) *Miscellaneous produce.*

142. Minor produce of importance was generally leased out on lump sum contracts except in Mudumalai and Tunacadavu ranges of the *Nilgiris* and *South Coimbatore* divisions respectively. Manufacture of catechu in *Mangalore North* was done departmentally. The *Nilgiris* and *Kollegal*—Collection of konnai (*Cassia fistula*) bark was leased out; besides this produce, avaram (*Cassia auriculata*) and gallnuts were also leased out in *South Coimbatore* to meet urgent demand for tanning materials.

(3) *Extraction of fodder grass.*

143. Fodder grass was removed on permits in *Kollegal*, *North* and *South Coimbatore* and in certain parts of the *Nilgiris*. The removal of grass from three ranges in *Central Coimbatore* and from Ketu plantation of the *Nilgiris* was leased out during the year. Free removal of thatch grass was allowed from the reserves in the *Mangalore* divisions and by the Todas in the *Nilgiris*.

(4) *Hay-making.*

144. Hay operations on an extensive scale were carried out in both the *Mangalore* divisions to meet urgent demands from the Military Department; and 598 tons of baled hay was despatched to the Bangalore grass farms. There was much wastage due to early rains and to the shortage of railway wagons.

(5) *Grazing.*

145. Grazing was as usual regulated by issue of permits except in *South Malabar* where the forest is closed to grazing and in the areas handed over to the management of forest panchayats. Goat browsing was entirely prohibited. There was an increase in the number of cattle licensed to grazing in *North Coimbatore*, due to the adoption of the normal rate during the year instead of the double rates levied in the previous year. But there was a great fall in *Central Coimbatore* and *North Malabar*; the reason for this in the former being that most of the Thadagam cattle were taken for grazing in the Malabar forests as soon as the villagers heard of the introduction of the higher grazing rates; and in the latter to the limiting of the issue of permits to the possibility fixed in each case.

The revenue derived from grazing and fodder grass was Rs. 87,019 against Rs. 1,00,575 in the previous year.

(b) *Agency of exploitation.*

(i) DEPARTMENTAL AGENCY.

146. Major produce.—Only 4 per cent of the total outturn was exploited by this agency. The important works carried out were:—*Ganjām*.—Selection fellings and supply of sleepers to the Munitions Board. *Vizagapatam*.—Extraction of dead sal trees. *Gōdāvari Upper*.—Felling of trees from unreserved lands in Marrigudem range and supply of fuel to the Public Works Department for steam launches. *Gōdāvari Lower*.—Clear felling, thinning and removal of dead wood in Kandikuppa plantation. *Kurnool East*.—Removal of dead and overmature timber by the *Chenchus*. *Kurnool West*.—Improvement fellings in Honkaram coupe IX and in Pangidi coupe XII and selection fellings in Gundlabrahmeswaram working circle.

Minor produce.—The particulars are detailed in paragraphs 126 and 127.

147. Disposal of produce at the edge of the forests.—The outturn of fuel from Kandikuppa plantation in *Gōdāvari Lower* was sold in the plantation and the timber and fuel collected departmentally in *Kurnool West* were auctioned in convenient lots. In *Kurnool South*, timber and fuel were disposed of in coupes except in cases where there was no local demand.

(ii) BY PURCHASERS.

148. Major produce.—The sal and other miscellaneous trees under improvement fellings in *Ganjām* were sold standing. Five timber coupes in *Kurnool South*, sixteen fuel coupes in each of *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam* and *Gōdāvari Lower*, twelve in *Kistna*, one in *Kurnool East*, three in *Kurnool West* and the thinning of grazing areas and clear felling of 209 acres of fire lines in *Kurnool South* were worked through the agency of contractors.

Minor produce.—The extraction of bamboos and collection of minor produce is detailed in paragraphs 126 to 130.

(iii) & (iv) BY RIGHT HOLDERS, AND UNDER PRIVILEGES AND FREE GRANT.

149. The quantity and estimated value of produce removed by right holders and free grantees are given in the following abstract.

The rights are exercised in *Ganjām* and *Kurnool West* and the value of produce enjoyed by right holders increased from Rs. 35,662 to Rs. 36,766. The free grants made were chiefly for re-building houses destroyed by fire or floods and free grazing was also allowed to the hill tribes in *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam* and the *Gōdāvaris*. The estimated value of grants was Rs. 24,926 against Rs. 29,221 in the previous year.

(i) DEPARTMENTAL AGENCY.

150. Except hay-making and collection of *Anogeissus* bark no other departmental operation was undertaken. Eightyfive *Hardwickia binata* billets weighing 1 ton 110 lb. were cut in *Guntūr* and 60 red sanders billets weighing $\frac{1}{2}$ a ton in *South Cuddapah* and they were supplied to Deputy Controller of Timber Supplies, Bombay.

The increase under timber is chiefly due to large quantity of timber obtained in cutting the common boundary line between Kudligi and Hospet ranges in *Bellary*, and to collection of timber from dismantled Suryalanka bungalow in *Guntūr*, and to timbers felled for departmental buildings.

Fuel was got by cutting coupe strip lines and kuncha lines. The increase under bamboos was due to a larger quantity collected for departmental buildings. The increase under minor produce was due mainly to supply of hay to the Military Department.

(ii) BY PURCHASERS.

151. *Timber.*—The increase is due to larger number of trees sold on darkhast lands in *Guntūr*, *North Cuddapah*, *Nellore* and *Chingleput* and to the fact that the contractors of 1916–17 who were not able to exploit the coupes in that year were allowed to continue their operations during the year in *South Cuddapah*.

Fuel.—The increase is due to increased number of coupes sold and to the increased outturn in *Bellary*, *Guntūr* and *Chingleput* and to coupe contractors of 1916–17 having been allowed to exploit the balance area during the year in *South Cuddapah* and to better results in working the *Sriharikōta* coupe.

Bamboos.—The fall is chiefly in *Chittoor* due to several coupes remaining unsold and to some not being fully worked.

Minor produce including grazing.—The fall is due to less amount realized on the sale of *Rela* bark in *Anantapur*.

(iii) RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES.

152. Free removal of grass appears in paragraph 133 supra.

In *North Cuddapah*, under B. P. Forest Mis. No. 744, dated 1st December 1914, the villagers of Chennupalli and Gopavarampalli were allowed the privileges of grazing 150 cows and bulls and 400 sheep at one anna and six pies respectively. The Collector, taking into consideration their poverty, has allowed the Muhammadan wood-cutters of *Cuddapah* and *Sidhout* ranges the privilege of grazing 188 bulls at As. 1–6 per head.

The concession of free grazing of 190 buffaloes, 45 cows and 850 sheep of *Jangalapalli* and *Velugapalli* villages over an area of 810 acres in *Lankamalais* reserved forest was allowed during the year. In *South Cuddapah*, free grazing of 765 cows and bulls was allowed to the ryots of *Settigunta* and its hamlets according to the terms of the Forest Settlement. In *West Cuddapah*, the privilege of grazing 200 cows at As. 1–6 per cow was allowed in *Sidhout-Palakondas* as per B.P. Forest No. 376, dated 22nd June 1895.

(iv) FREE GRANTS.

153. The statement appended below shows the details of free grants which were made chiefly for rebuilding houses destroyed by fire and flood. In *Nellore*, grants were made for building huts in criminal settlement. Road materials were removed in *Chittoor* by public bodies for public works. The instructions issued in B.P. Forest Nos. 65, dated 25th May 1917 and 105, dated 28th November 1917, are strictly observed.

(i) DEPARTMENTAL AGENCY.

154. The work done by departmental agency was chiefly confined to extraction of sandalwood, and represents only 1.1 per cent of the total outturn.

(ii) BY PURCHASERS.

155. There has been an increase in the removal of fuel and minor produce and decrease in that of timber and bamboos.

Timber (— 40,000 cubic feet).—This is always a variable head depending chiefly on the revenue derived from the sale of trees on darkhast lands.

Firewood (+ 856,000 cubic feet).—The increase is due to the sale of lands and growth in the *South Arcot* and *Trichinopoly* districts.

Bamboos (— 6,293).—The decrease is more a matter of adjustment of lease amounts than an actual deficit.

Grazing and minor produce (+ 80,996).—The increase was chiefly due to the enhancement of grazing fees, and to the sale of *avaram* and *konnai* bark.

(iii) RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES.

156. In *North Vellore*, grazing at the ordinary rates was allowed to the *Malayalis* in anticipation of the introduction of the forest village system. In the *Javadis* of *South* and *West Vellore*, the system of free grazing and fire rewards to the *Malayalis* in return for the protection of forests assigned to them for grazing has been enforced and has been working satisfactorily. The following rights admitted at settlement in *Trichinopoly* are reported to have been enjoyed, but the outturn corresponding to them has not been brought to account in *Forins* Nos. 74 and 77.

(1) Free grazing in respect of 23 pattas at the rate of 3 cattle per acre and free removal of thatch grass in respect of 40 pattas at the rate of 40 heads each annually in *Palamalai* and *V. Kanapadi* extensions in *Musiri* range.

(2) Free grazing and free removal of dead wood by the *Malayalis* of *Gundūr* nad of *Nāmakkal* range.

(iv) FREE GRANTS.

157. The estimated value of free grants was Rs. 4,884 against Rs. 19,383 in the previous year. In the previous year, there were unusually large applications for timber in *South Arcot* for rebuilding houses and huts damaged and destroyed by cyclone.

In Madura, 58 cart-loads of rough stone were taken from the reserves and 29,974 cart-loads from the unreserves free of charge by the Local Fund Board.

(i) DEPARTMENTAL AGENCY.

158. *Major produce—Mangalore North.*—Felling one timber and one fuel coupes for want of contractors; light improvement fellings also. *Mangalore South.*—Selection fellings in Kadambilla coupe X; improvement fellings in Parappa compartment II and Nerankimale coupe III and the felling of two sample plots in Narimogar and Kalinjimale reserves. *North Malabar.*—Felling 79,962 cubic feet of timber in sub-coupes D, E and F of coupe II, Chedleth. *South Malabar.*—Clear felling and thinning in teak plantations, and rafting and floating logs and saplings to sale depot; also conversion of teak top-ends into spokes and fellows. *The Nilgiris.*—Felling and carting of fuel in Ootacamund and Coonoor ranges, sandalwood extraction in Sigur and improvement felling. *Kollegal and North Coimbatore.*—Sandal extraction, felling of small timber, Dindiga and Acha poles, bamboos, drag poles, and agricultural implements. *Central Coimbatore.*—Felling timber for supply to the Director of Industries and Buckingham Mills, clearing boundary lines of fuel coupes, and rectification of contractors' faults in some fuel coupes. *South Coimbatore.*—Selection fellings in coupe IX of Punachi Working Circle and a few fellings in the Tekkadi leased forests to meet urgent demand from the Military authorities.

Minor produce.—The details are mentioned in paragraphs 141 and 142 supra.

(ii) BY PURCHASERS.

159. *Major produce.*—Thirteen fuel coupes (531 acres) in three ranges of *Mangalore North* were sold during the year. *Mangalore South.*—Three hundred and fifty-two logs of 11,922 cubic feet were removed by contractor from Jalsur East coupe I. One fuel coupe was sold standing. *North Malabar.*—Twenty-nine thousand two hundred and fourteen cubic feet of timber were sold standing from sub-coupe C of coupe II, Chedleth and from Kannothe forests. *The Nilgiris.*—One thousand four hundred and forty-eight cubic feet of timber from reserved forests and leased forests were removed by purchasers. Five fuel coupes in *Kollegal*, 13 fuel coupes in *North Coimbatore*, 20 fuel coupes (1,891 acres) in *Central Coimbatore* and all fuel coupes in *South Coimbatore* were sold to contractors.

160. *Disposal of produce at the edge of the forests—North Mangalore.*—Fuel obtained from improvement fellings in Pilarkan and Jarvattu, and that from the sample coupe in Mosabettu, were sold at the edge of the forest. *South Mangalore.*—Twenty-two thousand four hundred and eighty-nine cubic feet of timber from Kadambilla coupes X and IX were sold, at the road side forest depots and 5,123 cubic feet of timber from Parappa compartment II, at a riverside depot. Fuel (88½ chowks) from Nerankimale reserve also sold at the riverside and roadside depots. *South Malabar.*—Teak logs and saplings obtained from the trees felled in sample plots of certain teak plantations were sold at stump site. *North Coimbatore.*—Agricultural implements were retailed in the forest depots. *Central Coimbatore.*—Small fuel in head loads and agricultural implements are retailed from the coupes by contractors.

(iii) AND (iv) BY RIGHT-HOLDERS AND UNDER PRIVILEGES AND FREE GRANTS.
161. The following statement shows the quantity and the estimated value of produce removed by right-holders and free-grantees :—

The value of timber enjoyed by right-holders has decreased from Rs. 17,896 to Rs. 11,410. These removals were effected entirely from the two *Mangalores* and the decrease has not been explained. The estimated value of produce removed by free-grantees rose from Rs. 2,630 to Rs. 3,080. Free grants were made in *Mangalore North*, *The Nilgiris* and *North*, *Central* and *South Coimbatore* chiefly for the construction of houses burnt by fire, and for the quarrying of metal and gravel by the Local Fund. Toda buffaloes were as usual licensed to graze free and the estimated value of such grazing was Rs. 927. Free removal of thatch grass was allowed to the Todas to repair their munds.

162. (c) *Outturn and sources of produce*—The outturn of produce collected by *Northern* different agencies is compared with that of the previous year in the following abstract.

By Government Agency—Major produce.—The decrease under *timber* was chiefly in *Kurnool South* owing to sale of coupes standing and in *Kurnool West* to the restriction of fellings for want of demand, while that under *fuel* was in the latter district for the same reason, and in *Gōdāvari Lower* owing to smaller area felled in Kandikuppa plantation. *Minor produce.*—The increase was principally in *Kurnool West* where the collection of bamboos and minor produce was undertaken departmentally to provide employment for the *Chenchus* and the crop of tamarind was abnormally heavy.

By purchasers—Major produce.—The decrease under *timber* was chiefly due to lack of demand for timber from the Rampa forests in *Gōdāvari Lower* and under *fuel* to a special demand in 1916-17 for tent pegs for the Army in *Gōdāvari Lower*, and to a fall in the number of applications for darkhast lands in *Kistna* and in the removals from unreserved lands in *Kurnool South*. *Minor produce—Bamboos.*—The decrease was chiefly in the *Gōdāvaris* due to low prices realized for coupes in the *Upper* and to absence of demand for bamboos from Rampa forests in the *Lower*. The increase under *other produce* was due mainly to better prices offered for tanning barks. *Grazing.*—The number of cattle licensed to grazing on payment was 488,442 against 588,324 in the previous year.

By right-holders.—The increase in the quantity of timber removed was in *Ganjam* due to grant of concessions to a large number of the *Khonds*. *By free grantees.*—The decrease under *timber* was due to the fact that in the previous year, large grants were made for relieving distress caused by floods in *Kurnool South* and *West*.

By Departmental Agency—Major produce.—The increase under timber was chiefly in *South Malabar* due to the clear-felling of 70 acres of old teak plantations and to increased thinnings in the other plantations; in *South Mangalore* to a larger outturn of the improvement fellings in Parappa reserve, in the *Nilgiris* to a larger area worked under improvement fellings in the Mudumalai working circle in *North Coimbatore* to larger extraction of sandalwood and in *South Coimbatore* to felling of timber for military supply.

Fuel.—The increase was chiefly in the *Nilgiris* due to arrear clear fellings and to increased demand; in the two *Mangalores* to the exploitation of larger areas. **Minor produce—Bamboos.**—The large increase was due to a larger number of bamboos used in *South Malabar* and *South Mangalore* for rafting and floating timber. **Other**

produce.—The abnormal increase under this head was chiefly in both the *Mangalores* due to the value of hay supplied to the Military Department having been taken into account; to the sale in *Central Coimbatore* of elephant tusks collected in all the divisions of the circle.

By purchasers—Major produce.—The decrease under timber was chiefly in *Mangalore North* due to a less number of darkhast assignment; while the increase under fuel was mainly in *Central Coimbatore* due to better realization by the Revenue Department and owing to inaccurate yield figures furnished by coupe purchasers. **Minor produce—Bamboos.**—The decrease was chiefly in *North Coimbatore* due to a smaller area leased out and in *South Coimbatore* to non-sale of bamboo coupes within the year. **Other produce.**—There was a great fall in grazing revenue in *North Coimbatore* due to the levy of fees at normal rates unlike double rates in the previous year.

CHAPTER III.—FINANCIAL RESULTS.

166. The following statement compares the results of the year with those of 1916-17 and with the average of the past five years :—

The surplus was the highest on record in this circle. Compared with the results of the last year, there was a fall in the revenue due to causes explained below; this was far more than counterbalanced by decreased expenditure chiefly by the necessity for economy on account of the war, but there seems a danger of enough funds not being available under 'A. Conservancy and Works.' Twenty-eight per cent of the revenue was derived from major produce, 13 per cent from grass and grazing, 52 per cent from minor produce and the balance 7 per cent from miscellaneous sources. Of the expenditure 14 per cent was incurred on the exploitation of forests, 29 per cent on their upkeep and improvement and 57 per cent on miscellaneous items. The estimated value of produce at sale depots at the end of the year was Rs. 11,083, against Rs. 8,343 at its commencement. The revenue outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 1,52,176 against Rs. 2,41,689 in the previous year; of the former, Rs. 26,367 fell due within the year.

The important variations between the actuals of the year and those of the previous year are explained below.

RECEIPTS.

(i) By departmental agency.

Timber.—Rs. 5,321.—The decrease occurred chiefly in the *Kurnool* divisions due to non-felling of certain coupes in the *East* the system of felling not having been settled, to the leasing of some of the coupes in the *South* and to the stoppage of felling timber in the *West* for want of local demand.

Fuel.—Rs. 3,281.—Due to a smaller outturn from Kandikuppa plantation in *Cōdāvari Lower* and to the want of local demand in *Kurnool West*.

Bamboos.—Rs. 6,629 and **Minor produce**—Rs. 8,461.—Due to the starting of departmental operations in *Kurnool East* and *West* to provide labour for the *Chenchus* and to a very heavy crop of tamarind and gallnuts in the latter division.

(ii) *By purchasers.*

Timber. + Rs. 7,555.—Due chiefly to the increased receipts from unreserved lands in *Ganjum* and to the leasing out of coupes hitherto worked departmentally in *Kurnool South*. The increase would have been greater but for a large decrease in *Gōdāvari Lower* due to lack of demand for timber from the Rampa Agency for want of railway and transport facilities.

Fuel.—Rs. 1,10,596. The revenue was abnormal last year on account of the sale of an area in *Gōdāvari Lower* for the supply of tent pegs to the Military department and of the disafforested casuarina plantations in *Kistna*.

Bamboos. — Rs. 7,488.—The absence of demand for bamboos in the Rampa Agency in *Gōdāvari Lower* and the low prices realized for coupes in *Kurnool South* are the chief causes of the decrease.

Grazing and fodder grass.—Rs. 11,187.—Heavy rains of the previous year caused a good deal of mortality in consequence of which fewer delta cattle resorted to the Agency tracts in *Gōdāvari Lower* and the heavy mortality is also reported in *Kistna*, *Kurnool East* and *West* on account of rinderpest and floods.

Minor produce. + Rs. 1,04,169.—The sale of *cassia fistula* bark in *Gōdāvari Lower* and the considerable increase in the prices realized for tanning barks during the year accounted for the increase.

(iii) *Miscellaneous (including confiscated drift and waif-wood).*

— Rs. 969.—Calls for no remarks.

EXPENDITURE.

A. *Conservancy and Works.*

— Rs. 16,735. Due mainly to the stoppage of felling timber and fuel, for want of demand, and of planting operations, and to the reduced expenditure on fire protection operations in *Kurnool West*. In *Kurnool South*, some coupes were sold standing instead of being worked departmentally. The general curtailment of expenditure on account of the war also contributed to the decrease.

B. *Establishments.*

—Rs. 19,975.—The decrease was chiefly under 'Salaries' and 'Contingencies' and was due to some of the district charges having been held by Provincial officers and to fewer junior officers being attached to divisions and to general observance of economy.

The net results show a surplus of Rs. 7,10,823 against one of Rs. 8,27,609 in the previous year and Rs. 5,23,896 the quinquennial average.

The reason recorded in the last report regarding surplus, holds good this year also.

The decrease in surplus is due to—

(1) Decrease of Rs. 1,22,877 under V (b) on account of a very large amount realized under V (b) in 1916-17 by the sale of forest lands with tree growth.

(2) Non-adjustment of portion of value of hay supplied to the Military Department.

(3) Balance of stock of 1,870 tons of hay on hand at the close of the operations for the collection of which expenditure has been incurred and adjusted.

The revenue decreased by Rs. 15,516 and the expenditure increased by Rs. 1,01,270. Of the receipts 18 per cent were realized from major produce, 50 per cent from minor produce, 24 per cent from grass and grazing and 8 per cent from miscellaneous items.

Of the expenditure in the whole circle about 68 per cent was devoted to the upkeep and improvement of the forests and 32 per cent to exploitation, etc. The outstanding revenue at the close of the year was Rs. 3,40,574.

The estimated value of timber and other produce at sale depots at the close of the year was Rs. 403 against Rs. 3,745 at the beginning of the year. The important variations between the actuals of the year and those of the previous year are explained below:—

RECEIPTS.

(i) *By departmental agency.*

The variations under all heads except minor forest produce are small. Under minor forest produce the increase was due to the realization of revenue from hay operations departmentally undertaken as a war measure in the districts of *Anantapur*, *Guntūr*, *North Cuddapah*, *South Cuddapah*, *West Cuddapah* and *Chittoor*, and to the realization by sale of *nux vomica* belonging to the previous year credited during the year in *Nellore* district.

(ii) *B_u purchasers.*

Grazing + Rs. 34,361.—Due to special fees charged for grazing in January and February 1918 at Rs. 4 per cow unit in *Guntūr*, to the realizations and adjustment of one-fourth lease amounts of 1918-19 kanchas before the end of the forest year and partly to better prices fetched for the kanchas in *Nellore* and to the introduction of the kancha system of grazing in *Chingleput* which brought a larger revenue.

Minor forest produce, + Rs. 26,516.—Due chiefly to the adjustment of Rupees 62,000 to mica from Civil Court deposits and to the better prices realized for tanning barks in *Guntūr* and *Chittoor* and larger realization of tree-tapping fees in *Bellary*.

(iii) *Miscellaneous (including confiscated drift and waif wood).*

— Rs. 1,21,732.—The decrease is due to the non-sale of forest lands in *Guntūr* and *Chingleput* which accounted for the large increase under this head last year.

EXPENDITURE.

A. *Conservancy and Works.*

+ Rs. 1,03,819.—Due chiefly to departmental hay operations in *Anantapur*, *Guntūr*, in the three divisions of *Cuddapah* district and in *Chittoor*.

B. Establishment.

— Rs. 2,549.—Due to the abolition of the nine temporary forest clerks in each taluk office in *Nellore* district during the year and to the non-entertainment of the temporary assistant to the Forest Commissioner during the latter half of the year and to the abolition of working-plan office in *Bellary* which was in existence in 1916–1917.

168. The financial position of the year under report is compared with that of the previous year and the average of the preceding five years in the following abstract:—

The revenue and expenditure increased by Rs. 2,87,244 and Rs. 71,586 respectively when compared with the previous year. The net surplus increased from Rs. 7,66,327 in the previous year to Rs. 9,81,985 during the year under report, the highest on record. Much of this revenue comes from the capital value of forests sold in *South Arcot* and *Trichinopoly* and from the extraction of sandalwood trees blown down by the cyclone.

Towards receipts, the major produce contributed 62.6 per cent minor produce 32.1 per cent and miscellaneous sources 5.3 per cent. 7.0 per cent of the expenditure was directed towards exploitation, 45.1 per cent to the upkeep and improvement of the forests and 47.9 per cent to miscellaneous items. The proportion of net to gross revenue increased from 54.5 per cent to 57.9 per cent. The outstanding revenue at the close of the year was Rs. 2,02,537 of which Rs. 14,730 fell due within the year. The estimated value of timber and other produce at the sale depots at the close of the year was Rs. 1,68,982 against Rs. 1,69,461 at the beginning of the year.

RECEIPTS.

The important variations between the actuals of the year under report and those of the previous year are explained below:—

(i) *By departmental agency.*

Sandalwood, + Rs. 84,382 due to high prices obtained for sandalwood.

Grass and other minor produce, + Rs. 4,885 due to departmental supply of hay to the Military Department in *North* and *South Salem* divisions.

(ii) *By purchasers.*

Timber, — Rs. 24,358.—This is a fluctuating item.

Fuel, + Rs. 1,62,763 due to the disposal of provisional class IV and class VI forests in *South Arcot* and *Trichinopoly*.

Bamboos, + Rs. 5,386 due chiefly to the collection during the year of five instalments in *South Vellore*.

Grazing, + Rs. 25,978 due to enhancement of grazing fees in *North Vellore*, *South Arcot*, *South Salem*, *Madura* and *Tinnevely*.

Minor produce, + Rs. 3,543.—The increase is small and calls for no remarks.

(iii) *Miscellaneous (including confiscated drift and waif wood)*.

+ Rs. 5,693.—Due chiefly to the crediting to V (b) the contribution received from Local Funds for the maintenance of roads in *Madura*.

EXPENDITURE.

A. Conservancy and Works.

The expenditure during the year under report increased Rs. 48,003 over that of the previous year. The increase was appreciable under refunds due to the refund of full grazing fees to the Malayalis in the *Javadis*, under I (e) due to hay-making operations, under A-VI (c) due to purchase of new tents, under VII (b) due to heavy expenditure under buildings in *Madura*, as per working-plan and under VIII (g) to the expenditure on special operation for stopping the spread of spike in *West Vellore* and to the purchase of iron materials for the improvement of the water-supply on the *Javadis*.

B. Establishment.

The expenditure on establishment increased by Rs. 23,583 when compared with the previous year and this was due chiefly to the formation of the new *West Vellore* division, to the appointment of working-plans party and to the employment of additional Deputy Rangers, Foresters and Guards for the additional ranges in *Madura* and *South Salem* divisions.

CHAPTER III.—FINANCIAL RESULTS.

169. The financial results of the year are compared with those of the last year and the average of the preceding five years in the following abstract:—

The surplus was a record for the circle; 67 per cent of the receipts was realised from major produce, 9 per cent from minor produce, 6 per cent from grass and grazing and the balance from miscellaneous sources. Of the expenditure, 38 per cent was devoted to the exploitation of forest, 28 per cent to their upkeep and improvement and 34 per cent to miscellaneous items. The revenue outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 1,34,225 of which Rs. 37,972 fell due within the year. The estimated value of the produce in sale depots was Rs. 5,83,388 against Rs. 1,52,419; the major portion consisted of the unsold stock of sandalwood at the *Satyamangalam* depot.

The important variations between the actuals of this and the preceding year are explained below:—

RECEIPTS.

(i) *By departmental agency.*

Timber + Rs. 2,73,520.—The increase was mostly in *South Malabar* due to a larger outturn obtained from the first final fellings and the outturn from heavier thinnings in the plantations. The realization of the previous year's outstandings in *North Malabar*, the sale of the previous year's stock of timber *North* and *South Mangalore* and the *Nilgiris* and the sale of timber to the Munitions Board and the recovery of Ulandi coupe I revenue, from the last year's defaulting contractor in *South Coimbatore*, also contributed to the increase.

Fuel, + Rs. 17,018.—Due chiefly to increased rates of sale and increased supplies to the Military Establishments in the *Nilgiris*, and to a larger quantity of fuel felled and sold in *South Mangalore*.

Bamboos, + Rs. 4,260.—Due to sale of a larger number of bamboos used for floating in *South Malabar*.

Sandalwood, — Rs. 48,849.—Due to non-sale of the stock at the Satyamangalam depot on account of failure of market demand.

Minor produce, + Rs. 9,453.—Due to sale of previous year's stock of Catechu in *North Mangalore*.

(ii) *By purchasers.*

Timber, + Rs. 5,452.—Due to realization of previous year's outstandings and to increased yield from sub-coupe C of Chedleth coupe II in *North Malabar* and to increased revenue from sale of standing stock in *South Malabar* and *South Coimbatore*. The increase would have been greater but for the delay in the disposal of darkhast applications in *North* and *South Mangalore*: the rangers concerned having been engaged on urgent hay operations for military supply.

Fuel, + Rs. 52,592.—Due mainly to fancy prices obtained for coupes in *Central Coimbatore*.—The opening of additional fuel coupes in *North Coimbatore*, and higher rates realized for coupes in *North* and *South Coimbatore* also contributed to the increase.

Bamboos, — Rs. 3,983.—The fall was mainly in *North* and *South Coimbatore* due to want of transport facilities, and was partly counter-balanced by sale of a greater number of coupes in *Central Coimbatore*.

Grazing, — Rs. 13,554.—The reversion to ordinary rates in 1917-18 after the punitive rates of 1916-17, mainly accounted for the decrease.

Minor produce.

+ Rs. 19,210.—Due to increased amounts realized for minor produce, leases in *North*, *Central* and *South Coimbatore* and the sale of Konnai bark in *Kollegal*.

(iii) *Miscellaneous (including confiscated drift and waij-wood)*.
+ Rs. 62,454.—Due to increased revenue realized by sale of elephants, and to the realization of the sale-proceeds of two disafforested reserves in *Mangalore North* and the balance of purchase-money and arrear rents due on estates in *South Coimbatore*.

EXPENDITURE.

A. *Conservancy and Works.*

+ Rs. 31,122.—The increased expenditure was chiefly incurred on the following items. Increased felling of timber, fuel and bamboos which contributed to the increased revenue aforesaid, extensive sandal fellings in *North Coimbatore*, the hay operations in *North* and *South Mangalore* to meet the military demand, increase in the number of elephants captured, the purchase of a greater number of bullocks and buffaloes, and the increased cost of maintaining the live-stock in *South Malabar* and *South Coimbatore*, the formation of new plantations, the extension of the old ones and heavier thinnings carried out in *South Malabar*, the prickly-pear clearings in *North* and *Central Coimbatore* and the expenditure incurred by the temporary assistant to the Forest Commissioner on initiative works in *North Malabar* forests.

B. *Establishment.*

— Rs. 13,454.—The decrease was chiefly due to the non-posting of officers whose pay was provided in the budget and to less expenditure on uniforms.

CHAPTER IV.—RESEARCH AND EXPERIMENTS.

170. *Cask staves*.—The *Shorea robusta* staves mentioned last year were made up at Nellikuppam (East India Distilleries and Sugar Factories Company, Limited) and were reported to be too porous for spirit and also brittle. The conclusion is not understood as the timber has been tried in Northern India and found satisfactory.

Lac.—The attempt repeated in 1917-18 to introduce the lac (*Tachardia lacca*) on to *Butea frondosa* in *Kurnool West* proved a failure. The insects which had duly swarmed were destroyed by ants. We are trying again.

Destruction of creepers by painting.—This has again proved a failure except at Pecheruvu in *Kurnool West* perhaps owing to heavy showers before the materials had time to take effect. At Pecheruvu, the creepers dealt with were *Bauhinia vahlii*,

Combretum ovalifolium, *Pterolobium indicum*, *Zizyophus cenoplia*, *Jasminum* species, *Capparis sepiaria*. Of 75 cut flush with the ground, 36 died in three months and of 75 cut between one and two feet above ground, 52 were 'showing signs of death.' Experiments are now in progress in *Ganjām* and *Kurnool West* only and will be concluded in 1918-19.

Sal regeneration.—It was found in *Ganjām* that the removal of fallen leaves gave a larger number of seedlings than where the leaf-fall was left.

Much experimental work in connexion with *Shorea robusta* to test the effect (1) of ploughing, etc., on *sal* regeneration, (2) of various degrees of thinning, (3) of weeding, (4) of reducing the number of stems per stool and so on has been carried out in *Ganjām* and the results will be noted in the working plan for the *sal* forests which is under preparation.

Pouteri suavis.—The unsatisfactory results recorded in the last administration report were due to browsing. The plants were doing very well in November 1917 when the Conservator saw them and there seems every chance of the tree succeeding.

Edible dates in *Gōdāvari Upper* are reported to be 'thriving, but they do not appear to be healthy and vigorous.' It is possible that they do not fruit because there are few of them and by an accident they are all of one sex. The plant is dioecious.

Sandal.—This has already been referred to under cultural experiments in paragraph 92. It appears to thrive everywhere and there is no sign of "spike."

Divi Divi (*Caesalpinia coriaria*) seems to thrive in most localities. The difficulty is to find a market for the fruits possibly because only small quantities are available.

Red sanders (*Pterocarpus santalinus*) has been sown in small quantities in most districts. It is worth recording that in the Napier Park reserve in *Ganjām* one tree now 25 years old has a girth of 51½" at breast height and that trees here seem to have the normal quantity of heart wood.

171. *Research*.—No research work was undertaken. The want of local research institute with the necessary staff of specialists is very greatly felt in this Presidency. Until the department obtains one it is very unlikely that much useful research work can be accomplished. The establishment of a research institute in connexion with the Madras Forest College is, therefore, very strongly urged as a real necessity for this Presidency. Central Circle

172. *Experiments*.—It has been decided to endeavour to extend the area of *Cassia auriculata* growth owing to its great value for tannin. In this circle as much as 42,547 lb. of the seed have been collected up to the end of June 1918, and this amount of seed is almost entirely needed for distribution among the districts of the circle itself for cultivation of selected areas.

At the suggestion of Mr. J. A. Master, who was then District Forest Officer of Bellary, and after personal discussion with the Conservator, the following experiment was carried out in the closed area of "Matriki" reserve with a view to determine the best method of cultivation:—

Three plots of one acre each were laid out—

(1) In one of the plots the area was ploughed and seed was sown broadcast,

(2) in a second plot seed was sown in furrows,

(3) and in a third plot the seed was sown broad cast but no ploughing was done. It is reported that the germination in the ploughed and furrowed plots was quite successful, 75 per cent of the seed being reported to have come up; whereas there was no germination at all in the third plot which had neither been ploughed nor furrowed but only sown broad cast.

The result of this experiment goes towards proving that to throw seed broadcast over unprepared land is a waste of seed and labour. The natural opinion would of course be given that this must necessarily be so, but here we have a recorded fact after conducting an experiment. As Mr. Marsden, the Imperial Sylviculturist, has very rightly remarked in the annual progress report of the Imperial Forest Research

institute for 1916-17 mere opinion is of value *only as* affording a basis of experiment : it cannot be permitted to take the place of continuous observation and record on the spot.

Further in Bellary district arrangements for the experimental sowing of red sanders (*Pterocarpus santalinus*) and Yopi (*Hardwickia binata*) were made by sowing seed under three distinct and different methods, viz.—

(1) Sowing seed which had been soaked in water for 48 hours just before dibbling,

(2) sowing seed untreated in any way,

(3) sowing seed which had been previously treated in a pit by alternate layers of seed and manure covered up with earth and watered for about two weeks.

Seed of *Hardwickia binata* under the above three methods was sown in six plots, three square chains each in the Malpanaguddi-Yopi block as noted below :—

Plot (1) with ordinary seed simply dibbled in,

Plot (2) with ordinary seed simply dibbled in *pits*,

Plot (3) with seed soaked in water for 48 hours and then dibbled in,

Plot (4) with seed soaked in water for 48 hours and then dibbled in *pits*,

Plot (5) with seed previously treated in pits for two weeks as described above and dibbled in, and

Plot (6) with seed previously treated in pits. Of the above 25 per cent of seed sown in items (1) and (3) is reported to have germinated and 50 per cent in items (2) and (4), whereas in items (5) and (6) no germination took place at all.

A further experiment was also conducted by sowing seed treated under the three methods described above in 204 baskets and seedlings reared. It is reported that no less than 90 per cent of dry seed, as well as seed soaked for 48 hours before sowing germinated and 60 per cent of the seed treated under the pit method.

Similar experiments were conducted also in Gundu coupe No. 4 with the result that germination was successful under methods (1) and (2) whereas the seed sown under method (3) failed to germinate and was found to have rotted after fourteen days.

These experiments the Conservator views as exceedingly useful and desires to record his thanks to Mr. Master for having initiated and carried them out while in the Bellary district.

Chingleput.—The utility of the fruit of *Zizyphus xylopyra* as a tanning agent was tested. At first, samples of fruit collected in Guindy park reserve were experimented both by Messrs. Chambers and Company, Pallavaram, and Best and Company, Kodambakkam, who declared them useless. The Forest Economist, Dehra Dun, subsequently sent a copy of Mr. Pilgrim's report on his experiment with the fruits of *Zizyphus xylopyra*. Another consignment was sent to both the abovesaid companies enclosing a copy of Mr. Pilgrim's report, and at the same time a third consignment was sent to Dehra Dun. Messrs. Best and Company pronounced no opinion, but Messrs. Chambers and Company reported that they were able to discover that it contained a good quantity of tannin. The Forest Economist, Dehra Dun, communicated the result of his experiment to the effect that the fruit contained a small percentage of tannin and could be used only as an admixture with other tanning materials on account of its gelatinous liquor. The experiment will be renewed this year.

It has, however, to be remembered that as remarked by the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, the time for picking the fruit of *Zizyphus xylopyra* is so restricted that it is exceedingly difficult to deal with it.

The result of the experiment of Euphorbia wood called for in paragraph 33 of Board's Proceedings Forest No. 3, dated 29th January 1918, has been reported in C. No. 287/18, dated 5th March 1918.

Chittoor.—An area of two acres in the Inaparallamitta timber working circle in the Mamandur reserves was burnt over in the month of March in order to watch the effect on the re-production of red sanders; results cannot be expected until after the rains. In this as well as the other working circles in worked coupes small patches near red sanders trees have been cleared of weeds and the ground worked up. Here

too the advent of the rains must be awaited before results can be expected. Girth measurements of red sanders in the sample plot started by the Madras Forest College in the Chittoor reserve were taken and recorded.

Some seeds of *Hopea parviflora* were obtained from South Kanara and dibbled in the evergreen portion of the felled coupes of Thumburukoua Working Circle of the Napier reserve. It is too soon to judge of the results.

Sandalwood seed is being collected and distributed in most of the districts for dibbling in the forests, but care must be taken in these operations, as, if it is merely thrown broad cast on the ground, it will probably lead to little or no useful results. Such dibblings need to be effected under proper supervision in promising localities and those localities wherein they are conducted should be identifiable hereafter and regular records kept.

The results of the experiments initiated by Mr. Marsden, the Imperial Sylviculturist, referred to in last year's report to determine the girth increment and development of heavily thinned red sanders plantations and the conditions best suited for the natural regeneration of this species are still awaited.*

The discovery of the utility of the bark of *Anogeissus latifolia* as a tanning agent has led to a call for large quantities of this produce. The removal of the bark from large areas may not tend to do a great deal of harm where the tree is of crooked and stunted growth only, if the trees are cut flush with the ground. Where, however, the tree grows to a useful size as a timber tree, care will have to be taken to prevent too large inroads for the out-take of this produce, as otherwise a great deal of damage may result to the forest. In any case it has to be looked upon as an urgent war measure and the demand must be met as well as it is possible to do.

1. Sandal.

173. (a) *The effect of girdling*.—The experiments reported on in the last report *South Ch* are being continued, but no new facts have been elicited.

(b) Is Sandal an obligate root-parasite?

The experiments conducted in South Vellore seem to show that sandal is not an obligate parasite. The six trees trenched, one in February 1916 and five in August 1916, show little material alteration in condition and after being deprived of all nutriment taken up by the haustoria for a period of two years continue to grow apparently as vigorously as other trees.

Experiments are now being made with seedlings in the Komattiyeri bungalow compound which are similarly trenched and in this case, bamboo fences have been erected inside the trench. Many of the seedlings have died, but it is particularly noticeable that those near the fences are growing most vigorously, probably owing to the side shade.

(c) The Andiappanur experiments of West Vellore.

These were started on the 4th September 1916 to ascertain if anything like spike or stag headedness could be produced by cutting off the haustoria or by poisoning the roots with strong sulphuric acid.

Four trees were experimented on in various ways but, though subjected to similar maltreatment again in November 1917, none of the trees show any sign of deterioration up to date.

Sandal shows wonderful recuperative powers and, when a rootlet is severed, throws out new rootlets and haustoria from the severed portion.

(d) Rate of growth.

Experiments carried out in the Papireddipatti rest house in South Salem and at Komattiyeri in West Vellore show that the rate of growth of sandal in the early years is quicker than was suspected. In many cases well established plants of 2 to 3 feet high have been raised in a single year without water or tilling of the soil and in one case at Komattiyeri a plant has in a single year attained a height of 9 feet.

* Note.—A report on this matter has since been received from the District Forest Officer, South Cuddapah, and will be dealt with in a separate reference.

The measurements of trees in the special tending areas in South and West Vellore are being continued and should give reliable data in the course of a few years.

(e) *Production of root suckers.*

The trench system of producing root suckers has been largely extended and some wonderful regeneration has been secured by this method. It has been noticed that much better results are secured, if the trenching is done early in the year i.e., April to June than if deferred until October and November.

(f) *The age of production of scented wood.*

An area of 51 acres of sandalwood at Nellivasa had to be entirely cleared of all growth in an attempt to stop the spread of "spike." Incidentally this has furnished some useful statistics showing the amount of scented wood (rough cleaned) produced by each girth class.

(g) *Spike disease.*

Considerable progress has been made with the investigation of the disease during the year and a special report on this subject has been made to the Board of Revenue. This will shortly be published in the Indian Forester.

In North Salem, the points which have been chiefly observed relate to the spread of spike from tree to tree and the spread of spike in individual trees. Under the advice of Doctor Coleman, seed from spiked trees is being experimented with and the experiments with insects are being placed on a more scientific basis.

It has been observed that what was termed "lanky spike" in the last report appears to be a separate disease and not a precursor of true spike.

In West Vellore, a definite attempt to arrest spike has been made at Nellivasa. The area found attacked in June 1917 with a protective zone of 1 furlong was completely cleared of all sandal, *Zizyphus oenoplia*, *Dodonaea viscosa*, *Scutia indica* and *Cipadessa fruticosa*, shrubs and climbers most subject to similar disease. The work was completed on 4th January 1918. No spike has been observed up to date in the surrounding area.

An able article dealing with the Komattiyeri and Alangayam experiments, the clearing of trees from creeper growth and the uprooting of trees by the cyclone of November 1916 and their relation to the production of spike disease was published in the Indian Forester for July 1918.

No report has been made as to the spread of spike in the Kollimalais and the Pachamalais of the Trichinopoly district.

(2) *The thinning of Teak and Albizzia amara coppice.*

174. No report has been made with regard to the experiment with teak coppice at Mundanthorai in Tinnevely district. In Madura experiments were started two years ago with *Albizzia amara*. In the Karandamalais and Alagar Koil stumps cut flush with the ground but untrimmed with the bark left ragged have sent up as many shoots as well coppiced stools. In Rajadani a coating of lime was tried, but though no shoots were produced in some cases, yet in three cases over 60 shoots were produced. In Andipatti, the shoots were cut back in a six-year old coupe and fresh shoots were produced. In Senkurichi, the shoots left after thinning are more or less uniform but the dominant shoots on unthinned stools have attained a large girth. The District Forest Officer is doubtful if thinning improves the coppice.

(3) *The thinning of Bamboo clumps.*

175. This work is being carried out in Tinnevely, in Ambur and Pichanur of North Vellore and on a larger scale on the Javadis of South Vellore and the results are being observed.

In Belur of the South Salem district the thinned clumps flowered and died.

During the year there has been a sporadic flowering of both kinds of bamboos and this has been noticed in the districts of North, South and West Vellore, in North and South Salem and in South Arcot.

Though widely extended this is not a general flowering.

(4) *Hardwickia binata.*

176. The pruning of young plants in North Vellore is being continued with good results.

(5) *The regeneration of evergreen forests.*

177. The experiments are being continued but report has not been made concerning them in the District Report. The seed of *Gluta travancorica* is far less advanced this year, probably due to the shortage of rain.

(6) *The collection of tan stuffs.*

178. Apart from *Cassia auriculata*, the circle is rich in tan stuffs and during the year many of these have been analysed, thanks to the good offices of Mr. J. A. Pilgrim, Tanning Expert.

The Bark of *Rhus mysorensis* which grows so freely in Madura, North and South Salem, South Arcot and at the foot of the Javadis analysed 19.51 per cent and tanned a fine leather.

Experiments made in the Leather Trade School, Madras, show that the bark of *Anogeissus latifolia*, whether twig or stem bark, are full of tannin and this bark has been accepted by Indian tanners to supplement that of *Cassia auriculata*.

As a war measure, the *Anogeissus* tree is being sacrificed to the tanning trade in the districts of North, South and West Vellore, in North Salem and in Madura and coupes are being worked. After felling the leaves are collected and bagged and the bark is then taken off and the wood sold wherever marketable. The bark is taken to the various depots set up by the Controller of Tan Stuffs and the leaves are sent to Madras where they are being utilized by European firms. Over 100 tons of bark have been collected chiefly from West Vellore and several tons of leaves chiefly from South and West Vellore. No attempt is being made to make profit out of these collections, the chief object being to supplement the ordinary supply of tan stuffs and get these materials known in the market.

(7) *Outturn of green leaf for manure.*

179. An experiment was made in Charagal North reserve of North Vellore to ascertain how much green leaf was procurable from a given area. One hundred and eleven headloads were obtained from a five acre plot.

(8) *Prickly-pear mucilage.*

180. Fresh mucilage obtained from the unripe fruit of the prickly-pear was found to be a good adhesive, especially for mounting photographs. The tests applied at Dehra Dun showed that this was of little use as the adhesive properties were lost in drying.

RESEARCH AND EXPERIMENTS.

181. Six and a half maunds of *Hopea* bark were sent from South Mangalore to the tanning expert of the Government of India who reported that the experiments so far made were very promising. A further consignment of 35 maunds has since been despatched in response to an indent from that officer; In North Malabar *Pterocarpus*

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and *Terminalia* seeds were dibbled under shade in Begur range for the purpose of seeing to what extent the seed will germinate under such conditions. The results were satisfactory as 60 per cent of (*Pterocarpus*) and 40 per cent of the *Terminalia* were found to have germinated. Three hundred and six cubic feet of certain soft woods were supplied to the Buckingham and Carnatic mills and were reported to be favourable substitutes for European wood of that class. Three thousand two hundred and sixty-six cubic feet of the inferior hard woods have been despatched from the Kanoth forests awaiting shipment to Europe. In *South Malabar* mahogany (var.) *Macrophylla* continues to flourish; a 45 year old tree has attained the height of 99 feet and girth of 110 inches. A very large quantity of teak and other seeds were supplied to places all over India. In connexion with the new working plan, seeds of several miscellaneous trees were collected and sown in nurseries. Broadcast sowings of *Hopea* and *Terminalia* made last year were failures. Further analysis of Wattle bark supplied from the *Nilgiris* appear to show that all hope of making use of this bark must be abandoned. An experimental collection of 2,000 lbs of *anogeissus* bark was made and despatched to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs. The cost of collection and delivery at the Ootacamund Railway station was Rs. 21-8-0 per candy which places the utilization of the *anogeissus* in these forests out of the question. Two candies of *anogeissus* bark were sent to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs from *Kollegal*. But here again the cost of delivery owing to distance from the Rail is prohibitive. Ranger Miranda carried out an experiment with the destructive distillation of *Erythroxylum monogynum* which has been favourably reported on by the Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun. From *Central Coimbatore Anogeissus* bark was supplied to the Controller of Tanning stuffs and his opinion upon its value and the cost of collection is awaited. Very large estimates for the collection and supply of *Anogeissus* bark from *North Coimbatore* have been sanctioned with the approval of the Controller of Tanning Stuffs and the work is just about to commence.

CHAPTER V.—ADMINISTRATION.

Northern Circles. 182. *Circle charge.*—The circle was administered by Mr. H. A. Latham throughout the year.

183. *District charge.*—The proposal to form a fourth division in *Kurnool* was approved by the Board and a notification describing the limits of the new division called for. The formation of the third forest division in *Godavari*, though sanctioned, could not be brought into force owing to paucity of controlling officers.

184. *Range charge.*—There were no changes during the year.

Work and services.

185. *Controlling staff.*—The shortage of officers continues. Two Imperial officers, Messrs. B. F. Rigold and T. Clear, have joined the Indian Army Reserve of Officers. All officers have worked well. Messrs. Minchin, Madan and E. B. Ramachandra Rao—the last in a light charge—may be specially mentioned. Mr. Stracey has also done good work in *West Kurnool*.

186. *Executive establishment—Rangers.*—The work of rangers with a few exceptions is well reported on. *Punishments.*—Four rangers were placed under suspension pending inquiry into their conduct. One ranger who was under suspension during the previous year was dismissed. *Deputy Rangers.*—The applicants are numerous, but most of them are educationally below the standard fixed by the Forest College. The deputy rangers as a whole have done fair work. *Punishments.*—The probationary appointments of two deputy rangers were terminated; one deputy ranger was suspended, one removed from service and one dismissed.

187. *Protective establishment.*—The work and conduct of the establishments with a few exceptions among foresters continued to be inefficient. *Punishments—Foresters.*—Two were dismissed, the services of two were dispensed with, four were suspended and six reduced. *Guards.*—Dismissal 1, removals from service 22, suspensions 38, and reductions 7. One guard in *Vizagapatam* was convicted and sentenced to three years' rigorous imprisonment for forgery and illegal collection of grazing revenue. The total number of forest guards is 818.

188. *Ministerial establishment.—Circle office.*—The change of Managers, Mr. T. Ramanuja Ayyangar having been transferred to this circle, has been advantageous. He knows his work thoroughly.

Divisional and Range offices.—The office establishment is reported to have worked satisfactorily on the whole. The standard of efficiency is however lower than in the Southern and Western Circles.

Want of prospects and the heaviness of the work in forest offices do not attract the best men. It is difficult to arrange for a regular flow of promotion as on the revenue side; the fact that training as a revenue inspector for one year is compulsory for promotion to the senior grades and that the forest head clerks and accountants have to pass departmental tests in the Code, the incremental scale of pay existing in the forest branch are all obstacles. The Collector of Kurnool has evolved with much trouble a scheme for removing these disabilities which has been forwarded to the Board of Revenue for consideration. Unless some such system is introduced, and improved prospects held out, the complaint of inefficiency will continue.

The maximum pay of the range clerks is Rs. 20 and is as a rule reached in three or four years with the result that they have no prospects and their work deteriorates. If it were possible to bring these men on to the regular line also, the standard would doubtless improve.

Punishments.—Two clerks in the District Forest office, *Vizagapatam*, were suspended. One range clerk in *Godavari Lower* was reduced and the services of another were dispensed with.

189. *Health of the establishment and casualties.*—The health of the establishment continued to be bad as usual except in *Kistna* and *Vizagapatam*; in the latter division it was not so bad as in previous years. Several of the subordinates have had to be granted leave on account of malaria. There is, I think, no doubt that the forests in the Northern Circle are unhealthier than others. *Casualties.*—One deputy ranger in *Kurnool East* retired. One ranger died of gangrene. There were four deaths each in *Ganjām*, *Godavari Upper* and *Lower*, one in *Kistna*, three in *Kurnool South* and six in *Kurnool West*. One forester in *Kurnool West* was murdered; this apparently had nothing to do with his duties.

190. *Relations between Revenue and Forest officers.*—The relations of Forest with Revenue officers continued to be satisfactory in all divisions. The District Forest officers, *Godavari Upper* and *Kurnool East*, and the Range officers in the former division attended the Jamabandi, but no matters of any importance were dealt with. There was no such attendance in the other divisions; it was not the practice in some of them. In *Ganjām*, it is reported that constant touch was kept with the Revenue Department in matters of material interest.

191. *Service books.*—Maintained and verified up to date in *Vizagapatam* and up to the close of the calendar year in *Godavari Upper* and for the financial year in the remaining districts.

192. *Tours of the Forest Member.*—The Forest Member inspected the Sāl forests in *Ganjām* in connexion with the proposal to open a Saw mill at Russellkonda and visited *Kurnool* to discuss with the local officers regarding the allotment of lands for *Danga Wodder* Settlement near the Siddapuram tank and the question of providing employment for the *Chenchus*.

193. *Conservator's inspection.*—All the District Forest offices except *Godavari Upper* were inspected with fairly satisfactory results. The forests of *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam*, *Kistna* and *Kurnool South* were also inspected and notes of inspections recorded. The number of days spent in camp was 185.

194. *Touring of District Forest officers.*—With the exception of the District Forest officer, *Vizagapatam*, all the others spent in camp more than the minimum period of touring prescribed. The deficit in *Vizagapatam* was only five days.

195. *Audit of accounts of the District Forest offices.*—The accounts of all the offices were audited by the Local Fund Audit staff. The results are reported to be satisfactory.

196. *Inspection of Range offices.*—All the range offices except one in *Kurnool West* and all sale depots were inspected with generally satisfactory results.

197. *The Imperial Forest Research Institute and College.*—One nominee to the Provincial service who was undergoing training in *Ganjām* preliminary to going to the College resigned, a wise decision as his physique was not too good though he was very keen on his work. One probationer returned to this Circle after passing the course with honours.

198. *The Madras Forest College, Coimbatore.*—Three students of the 1916-18 course obtained the higher standard and one student the lower standard certificates. Seven deputy rangers were selected for the 1918-20 course.

199. *The Vernacular Training School.*—The 1918 session of the school was held in *Ganjām*. The school started with 32 students (7 Foresters and 25 Guards) deputed from all the divisions except *Gōdāvari Upper*. The conduct and health of the students was satisfactory. The Conservator visited the school a month before its termination, took the students out once and found them up to the mark. Four of the students did specially well. The District Forest Officer and Ranger P. Ramunni Menon, the Senior Instructor, deserve credit for the results.

200. Mr. H. B. Bryant was in charge of the Circle from 1st July 1917 to 2nd April 1918 when he went on privilege leave and again from 18th June 1918 to end of the year. Mr. H. F. A. Wood was in charge from 3rd April 1918 to 17th June 1918. During the year proposals for the formation of a fifth circle were called for and submitted to the Board by the Conservators but no final orders have yet been received on the proposal. In his letter No. 54, Revenue, dated India Office, London, the 3rd August 1917, the Secretary of State sanctioned an increase in the Controlling Staff of the Forest Department of this Presidency by the addition to the cadre of ten Imperial Officers including a Chief Conservator and of ten Provincial officers.

201. *District and range charges.*—There was a readjustment of boundary between the West and North Cuddapah Divisions during the year and sanction was accorded by the Government, in their Order No. 938, Revenue, dated 6th March 1918, to class the former division as a major charge and the latter as a minor one.

The *West Cuddapah* division was also further subdivided from four to six ranges under the sanction of Government, the two new ranges being named "Vontimitta" and "Ganganapalle". This subdivision was foreseen in the last circle report and is now an accomplished fact. Consequent on the cancellation of the lease of the Sandur forests in *Bellary* district on 1st July 1918 the present *Hospet* range has become light and proposals for amalgamating it partly with *Kudligi* and partly with *Bellary* Ranges are under consideration. Proposals for the formation of a third range in *Chingleput* district and a fifth range in *Guntur* district are also under consideration.

202. *Work of superior officers.*—The remarks of the Collectors are given below:—

Mr. T. Raghaviah (*Anantapur*).—I consider Mr. Myers' work distinctly good. In a poor forest district like *Anantapur* there is not much to show in the shape of results, but Mr. Myers does his best. He is a sound and experienced officer and has his subordinates well in hand.

Mr. H. G. Gharpurey (*North Cuddapah*).—As far as I have heard and seen, the administration of the forests at the hands of Mr. Saiyid Abdul Qadir Sahib Bahadur seems to have been satisfactory.

Mr. H. G. Gharpurey (*South Cuddapah*).—I also found that people had no complaints to make against the forest subordinates in the district as remarked by Mr. Dutt last year, which speaks a great deal for the administrative ability and tact of Mr. Bellappa who was in charge of the district throughout the year.

It is a pity that these good forests are not yet remunerative to any extent.

Mr. H. G. Gharpurey (*West Cuddapah*).—I took charge of the district only lately i.e., in the month of July; but was assured by my predecessor who had opportunities of watching the work of the District Forest Officer that he considered the work of Mr. E. V. Padmanabha Pillai who was in charge throughout the year as exceedingly satisfactory and commendable.

Mr. L. D. Swamikannu Pillai (*Nellore*).—The chief points where the Land Revenue administration touched questions of Forest Conservancy or where the Collector was specially consulted regarding forest questions have been mentioned in the report and I have no remarks to offer.

Mr. J. F. Bryant (*Chingleput*).—Mr. S. V. Devadasan was in charge of the district throughout the year. He worked honestly and spared no pains to show good results.

Other Collectors have not made any remarks.

203. *Conservator's remarks.*—All the District Forest Officers of the Circle have done their best. Very heavy extra work was thrown on the districts of *Anantapur*, *West Cuddapah*, as also *South Cuddapah*, and to a less degree only on *North Cuddapah*, *Chittoor* and *Guntur*. These operations (Hay) had to be hastily improvised as a war measure and the best that was possible was done and all officers concerned worked hard to try and make them successful.

Of course, as was expected, such operations on a large scale thrown suddenly on to the already inadequate and depleted forest organization of the Circle have certainly greatly interfered with the ordinary work of the department and in some localities seriously dislocated forest work. The Conservator fully recognizes the difficulties and the extra work with which the District Forest Officers concerned have had to cope in this connexion, and records his appreciation and thanks to them for their efforts.

In *Chingleput* district some very useful progress has been made in improving the forest administration and organization of the district and Mr. S. V. Devadasan the District Forest Officer is commended for his steady work. This district although small has its own importance and in a few years' time should really be brought to form a model minor forest charge if it continues to progress as it has done in the past couple of years. In such a district as this the District Forest Officer has not got more work than he can efficiently cope with and in this respect he is somewhat more fortunate than most of the other District Forest Officers in the Circle.

204. *Executive staff.*—The conduct and work of Rangers and Deputy Rangers is reported to be fairly satisfactory on the whole. It is not at all likely to improve much until the long hoped for but much belated reorganization of this branch of the staff is sanctioned and introduced.

205. *Protective staff.*—The work and conduct of this staff is not at all satisfactory and here too reorganization is urgently called for. Among the foresters 3 were dismissed, 15 suspended, 4 removed from service, 15 reduced and 1 resigned. Nineteen guards were dismissed, 57 suspended, 29 removed from service, 11 reduced and four resigned.

Mr. Fischer the District Forest Officer of *Chittoor* writes "The protective staff is extremely unsatisfactory. I do not remember any district where the foresters, guards and watchers as a whole were of so poor a quality. It would appear that one and all enter the department with the sole object of achieving prosperity by illicit methods as rapidly as possible and with no intention of doing any more honest work than he is compelled to by his Range Officer."

The Conservator fears that this is a state of affairs by no means peculiar only to the *Chittoor* district and the most crying need towards effecting a change is the introduction of a reorganization scheme which will give these classes of subordinates a decent living wage and a fair average day's work for each man to do. For years past the Conservator has pressed upon the authorities the essential necessity for such a reorganization if it is ever to be hoped that this branch of the staff will carry out its duties to any degree of honesty and efficiency. It is to be sincerely hoped that reorganization will not much longer be delayed.

206. *Ministerial establishment.*—The work is reported to be satisfactory on the whole. The Conservator considers that there is much room for improvement in *Bellary* and *Nellore*. During the year the control of the District Forest office establishment was re-transferred to that of Collector—vide B.P. Forest No. 107, dated 14th December 1917. The Conservator considers that before many years are passed it will be found essential to provide each Range officer with two clerks, and

also to raise the present pay. Efficient organization will never really be obtained without such an addition. As matters stand now each Range officer is provided with one Range clerk, often as not an utterly raw hand, whom the Range officer has to teach his work from the beginning, and then very often, as soon as the clerk learns something of the work, he resigns. Often a Range officer is left without any clerk at all and has to attend to all the clerical work himself. Under such circumstances how is it possible that a Range officer can attend to his field work properly? He cannot do so, and neither is it reasonable to expect him to do so under such circumstances. As a general rule two Range clerks are necessary in each range one of whom should look after the general correspondence side and the second one the "accounts". The practice of training men to be expert foresters and then forcing them to sit at the office desk for many hours of the day doing clerical work at the expense of their more important outdoor work in the forests is as expensive in the long run as it is unwise. A change is urgently called for in this connexion with the present state of affairs.

207. *Health of establishment and casualties.*—Health of establishment is reported to have been fairly satisfactory; one Deputy Ranger died of carbuncle, two Forest guards died of cholera, and one clerk died of fever. In Kadiri Range of Anantapur, one Forest guard, one watcher and one fire patrol were murdered by cattle graziers while out on inspection. The case was thrown out by the Sessions Judge for want of direct evidence. One watcher in South Cuddapah was murdered by a Policeman on account of some misunderstanding. The Policeman was sentenced to death by the Sessions Judge.

208. *Relations between Revenue and Forest officers.*—Continued to be cordial. It is hardly however to be expected that the lower revenue officials will ever learn to understand the objects of forest conservancy. Some generations hence perhaps things may be different but during the present generation there seems to be but little hope.

209. *Service books* were maintained and verified in all districts.

210. *Conservator's inspection.*—All the District Forest offices were inspected during the year. Some of the forests of Chingleput and of Balapalle range, South Cuddapah and of Chittoor were inspected and inspection notes were submitted for the former two.

The Conservator takes this opportunity of thanking Mr. H. F. Wood for having inspected eight of the District Forest Offices of the circle. This was of great assistance to the Conservator in a year of particularly heavy and strenuous work.

211. *Inspection of Range offices.*—All the range offices were inspected except Vontimitta range of West Cuddapah which was only however formed on 1st April 1918.

212. *Audit of accounts of District Forest offices.*—The accounts of all offices except North Cuddapah were inspected by the Assistant Inspector of Local Fund Accounts and the general result was satisfactory.

213. *Imperial Forest College, Dehra Dun.*—One provincial probationer was deputed from this circle during the year.

214. *The Madras Forest College, Coimbatore.*—Six Deputy Rangers were deputed during the year out of which two were sent back being unfit to cope with the College course. Three Rangers returned with Higher standard certificates and one with Lower standard certificate. It is becoming increasingly difficult to secure suitable candidates for recruiting the Ranger's grades under present conditions.

215. *Vernacular Training School.*—The school was held at West Cuddapah district. The school opened with 29 (8 foresters and 21 guards) but 27 actually underwent training two having been removed. The school was under the Instructor M.R. Ry. A. Ranganayakulu Nayudu and his assistant P. K. Kuttappan Pillai. The District Forest officer is of opinion that the students are of an average class.

216. During the year the headquarters of the circle were transferred from Trichinopoly to Salem, but the move was not actually made as suitable buildings could not be found in Salem.

217. *Circle charge.*—Mr. P. M. Lushington held charge of the circle throughout the year.

218. *Divisional charges.*—The boundary between the North and South Vellore divisions was altered with the previous sanction of Government. A separate working party was formed in this circle in September 1917 with Mr. G. C. Robinson at head.

Proposals for the redistribution of the present two Salem divisions, the South Arcot and Trichinopoly divisions were submitted to the Board.

It is too early to judge the result of the transfer of Land Revenue Administration the Tiruppattur Javadi Hill villages from the Land Revenue to the Forest Department.

An establishment consisting of one overseer and three maistris was entertained during the year in Madura for the supervision of the important road system which is to be maintained in spite of many of the roads being outside the reserves.

219. *Range charges.*—The Attur range in South Salem division was subdivided into Attur and Thammapatti ranges with effect from 1st October 1917. The Jollimalai reserves of the Attur range were transferred to the control of the District Forest officer, Trichinopoly, during the year.

220. *Work of superior officers.*—M.R. Ry. K. R. Venkataramana Ayyar was deputed for six weeks during the year to Northern India for ascertaining the condition of the market as regards sandalwood and sandalwood oil, and the Board has recently passed orders on his report. The Government have been pleased to confer the title of Rao Sahib on him in recognition of good and meritorious services rendered by him. The work of other officers has been good but considerable time has been spent by the European District Forest officers on Military work.

221. *Executive staff.*—The work and conduct of the executive establishment as on the whole good.

One Ranger and one Deputy Ranger were dismissed and one Ranger and three Deputy Rangers were placed under suspension.

222. *Protective staff.*—The work and conduct of the protective establishment as usual not been satisfactory. There were 135 removals or dismissals, 128 suspensions and 34 reductions in this class.

223. *Ministerial establishment.*—The work of the ministerial establishment is reported to be satisfactory in all districts except West Vellore.

224. *Health of the establishment.*—As work is being more and more concentrated in the hill ranges, it is noticeable that absence on leave becomes more frequent.

225. *Casualties.*—One ranger died of erysipelas and one deputy ranger, four forest guards and one watcher of malarial fever. One forester, one forest guard, eight watchers, two range peons and one accountant died of other causes.

226. *Relations between Revenue and Forest officers* were cordial throughout the circle.

227. *Service Books* were maintained and verified in all districts.

228. *Conservator's inspection.*—The Conservator spent 224 days in camp visiting all the districts in the Circle except South Arcot. Special inspection notes were written for West Vellore and Tinnevely and those for Madura are under preparation. He attended the two conferences of Conservators, one in Madras and the other in Coimbatore, the Tanning conference at Dehra Dun in August 1917 and the Spike Conference at Bangalore in October 1917.

229. *Touring of District Forest officers.*—All the District Forest officers spent more than the prescribed minimum period in camp except the District Forest Officer, North Salem, whose touring was short by five days owing to ill-health.

230. *Forest Commissioner's tour.*—The Forest Commissioner paid a short visit to the Javadis to see the working of the Malayali village system.

231. *Inspection of Range offices and sale depots.*—All the range offices except one in North Salem were inspected during the year by the respective District Forest officers. Sale depots were also inspected.

232. *Audit of accounts of the District Forest offices.*—The accounts of all District Forest offices except *North* and *South Vellore*, *South Arcot* and *Trichinopoly* were audited by the auditors from the Accountant-General's office and the general results were satisfactory.

233. *Imperial Forest College, Dehra Dun.*—One Provincial probationer, Mr. Amir Padsha Sahib, was deputed from this circle during the year.

234. *Madras Forest College, Coimbatore.*—Of five officers deputed to the College for training, four obtained the Higher and one the Lower standard certificate. Seven Deputy Rangers were deputed for the 1918-20 course.

235. *Vernacular Training school.*—The school was located this year in *South Vellore* division and did good work under the Instructor, Mr. B. R. Salisbury, and his Assistant Mr. A. P. McKoy. Only 22 students were actually trained of whom nine were granted first class, eleven second class and two attendance certificates.

236. The charge of the circle was held by Mr. C. D. McCarthy throughout the year.

District charges.—There were no alterations during the year. *Range charges.*—No changes except certain alterations in the territorial distribution of two ranges in *Central Coimbatore* division.

Establishment.—Four Deputy Rangers, two foresters and ten forest guards were sanctioned on the temporary establishment for the timber operation in *South Mangalore*, for the better protection and working of sandalwood areas in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore*.

237. *Superior officers.*—Messrs. Wood and Bourne had heavy working-plans on hand in addition to their divisional work. So had Mr. Lasrado for the latter half of the year. Mr. Sadasiva Ayyar in *North Mangalore* has been energetic in checking sandal thefts. Mr. Longrigg has made a good start in *South Mangalore* and Messrs. Hodgson and Littlewood have been especially energetic in touring. Mr. Narasimha Ayyangar working under Mr. Richmond, got through a good deal of special demarcation under difficult conditions.

238. *Executive establishment.*—The work of rangers with a few exceptions has generally been favourably reported on. *Rangers.*—A. Swamikutty, A. Nicholas and Saiyid Ibrahim Albiz are mentioned specially for good work. Three rangers were temporarily reduced and one suspended.

The work of deputy rangers was on the whole satisfactory. The services of one dispensed with, one was reduced, one dismissed, two reverted and one resigned. The probationary period of eight acting deputy rangers was terminated during the year.

239. *Protective staff.*—The work and conduct of the establishment with the exception of a few foresters were not satisfactory. *Punishments—Foresters.*—The services of four were dispensed with, three were reduced and two suspended. *Forest guards.*—The services of seven were dispensed with, 21 were suspended, five reduced and six dismissed.

240. *Ministerial Establishment—Circle office.*—M.R.By. T. Ramanuja Ayyangar, Manager, was transferred to Northern Circle; the manager of that office who took his place retired shortly after joining. The remainder of the clerical have worked with their usual industry and ability to the satisfaction of the Conservator.

Divisional and range offices.—The establishment of the divisional offices is reported to have worked on the whole satisfactorily. The head clerks of *North Mangalore* and *South Coimbatore* are specially mentioned for good work. The work of the range establishment has been fair except in the *Nilgiris* and in one of the range offices in each of *South Mangalore* and *South Malabar*, where it was bad.

Punishments.—Draughtsman of *Central Coimbatore* was dismissed from service.

241. *Health of the establishment and casualties.*—The general health of the establishment was fair in the two *Mangalores* except in the malarious parts near the ghaut, and bad, as usual, elsewhere except on the *Nilgiris* plateau. *Casualties.*—One ranger, one forester and two guards and one clerk retired; one ranger and two forest guards

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invalided; four forest guards died; one forester in *North Coimbatore* resigned owing to ill-health. Several subordinates suffered much as usual from fever and other ailments.

242. *Relations between Revenue and Forest officers.*—The relations were cordial. No complaints of any importance were brought to the notice of the jamabandi officers.

243. *Service books.*—They are reported to have been maintained for all subordinates on the permanent establishment and verified up to the close of the financial year.

244. *Tours of the Forest Member.*—The Hon'ble Mr. M. E. Couchman, Forest Commissioner, visited both the *Mangalore* divisions and *South Coimbatore*. The sandalwood areas of *North Mangalore* were inspected by him with both the District Forest Officers and a Conference, it is said, was held there regarding sandal transit rules.

245. *Conservator's inspection.*—All the District Forest offices were inspected with generally satisfactory results. The Conservator inspected some of the forests of *Mangalore South*, *North*, *Central* and *South Coimbatore* and the two *Malabars*; and also the *Araipalayam* and *Bailur* sandalwood working circles in *Kollegal*.

The total number of days spent in camp was 181.

246. *Touring of District Forest Officers.*—All the District Forest officers except *North Coimbatore* did more than the minimum period of touring prescribed. The short touring in *North Coimbatore* was owing to the District Forest Officer's illness towards the close of the year.

247. *Audit of accounts of District Forest offices.*—The accounts of all the offices except *North Malabar*, *North*, *Central* and *South Coimbatore* were audited by the Local Fund Audit department. The results are reported to be satisfactory.

248. *Inspection of Range offices.*—All range offices except one in *North Coimbatore* were inspected during the year. The results are reported to be generally satisfactory with five exceptions. The sale depots except those in *Coondapoor*, *Mysore* and *Nanjangode*, were inspected and they are said to be in good order. There was no stock of timber kept for sale either at *Mysore* or *Nanjangode*. The result of the inspections of the forest tram line depots in *South Coimbatore* showed serious shortages which have been reported to the Board.

249. *Madras Forest College.*—One ranger and one deputy ranger passed through the college course with honours and three other deputy rangers with higher standard certificates.

Five deputy rangers were deputed for the 1917-19 course, of whom two were sent back for incapacity.

250. *Imperial Forest Research Institute and College.*—One probationer for the Provincial Forest service was under preliminary training in the *Nilgiris* and deputed to the College.

251. *The Vernacular Training school.*—All the 11 students that remained at the close of the 1917 session in *South Coimbatore* were given certificates. One guard in *South Coimbatore* and one forester in *Kollegal* were placed in the first class. The 1918 session was held in the *Nilgiris* and subordinates from *North Malabar*, *North* and *Central Coimbatore* were also deputed for training. The strength of the school at the start was 25 of whom one died of cholera directly after joining.

CHAPTER VI—GENERAL.

252. *Realization of revenue from the usufruct of toddy-yielding trees, etc.*—The revenue realized from this source was Rs. 33,442 against Rs. 34,449 in the previous year. The difference calls for no special remarks.

253. *Supply of forest produce to meet the wants of people.*—In all divisions except *Gōdāvari Upper* and *Kurnool East*, timber, fuel and bamboo coupes were opened in several places and sold standing to contractors from whom people obtained their supplies at reasonable rates without complaints. The unreserved lands supply the wants in *Gōdāvari Upper*. In *Kurnool East*, timber agricultural implements, spokes and felloes, and bamboos were collected departmentally by employing *Ochenchu* labour and sold to the public in convenient lots. The villagers obtained fuel in sufficient

quantities from unreserved lands. Four bamboo coupes were also sold standing. In *Gōdāvari Lower*, fishermen were allowed to remove fuel from the mangrove forests of *Kandikuppa* and *Coringa* as usual at fixed rates.

Forest Committee's recommendations.

254. (a) *The formation and working of the forest panchayats.*—In *Ganjām*, the attempt to form a panchayat for *Sondosolia* reserved forest fell through as the neighbouring villagers regarded the scheme with indifference and apathy and did not desire to take up the responsibility. The proposal to form a panchayat for *Yerragondapalem* reserve with an area of 9,054 acres in *Kurnool East* was sanctioned and the forest was handed over to its management after the close of the year. In *Kurnool West*, the panchayat management for *Gundlakonda* reserved forest, 4,476 acres, was proposed, and sanctioned after the close of the year. In *Kurnool South*, the question of forming a panchayat for *Yadavada* reserved forest, 1,142 acres, was gone into, but the proposals have yet to be formulated. *Kistna*.—Four reserved forests covering an area of 5,589 acres were managed by 12 panchayats. The District Forest Officer inspected these areas during the year and three of the forests are reported to have been managed well. Nothing is mentioned about the working of the panchayats for *Velagalapalli* reserved forest and *Gunadala* reserved land (400 acres).

(b) *Opening of small coupes for rural supply wherever an effective demand exists or can be stimulated into existence.*—There was no necessity for opening such coupes in *Gōdāvari Upper* where there is a vast extent of unreserved lands which meet the requirements of the people. In *Kurnool South*, the opening of small coupes is a difficult matter as the *Nallamalai* forests, which form the main forest tract of the division, are remote from the centres of demand. It is hoped to remedy this soon. In the other divisions, coupes were opened and sold to contractors to meet the demand wherever it existed.

(c) *Measures adopted for improving the water-supply in Government grazing grounds and the facilities for grazing and pasturage.*—No special measures are required in *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam* and *Gōdāvari Upper* as there is sufficient supply of water near grazing grounds. Two tanks in each of *Gōdāvari Lower* and *Kurnool East* and one in *Kurnool South* were repaired and deepened. Nothing was done in *Kistna* and *Kurnool West* owing to the financial restrictions; in the former district, there was sufficient supply of water owing to heavy rains. In *Kurnool West*, two private parties repaired two tanks in forests with a charitable purpose, the permission for executing the repairs was granted on the express condition of their not claiming any right to the tanks repaired. This had induced some others also to come forward for undertaking similar repairs and the tendency is being encouraged.

(d) *System of patrol by a gang of subordinates.*—The system was in force in all divisions except *Gōdāvari Upper*, where it was not introduced. The system is now worked on two different lines in this circle. *Kurnool East* writes as follows of the first system (which is also in force in *Kurnool South*):—"Under the patrol system a number of the old beats have been clubbed together and placed in charge of one patrol officer. Consequently, the area which the patrols have to look after is so large that they cannot possibly return to their headquarters for more than two or three days in the week in consequence of which they have to buy food from the hotels [*etc.*]. Thus it will be observed that the greater part of the pay of a subordinate is spent on purchasing meals for himself. Besides, living apart from their families has made the guards and forest watchers more immoral, nay, a subordinate who happens to fall ill in a strange place has none to look after him. Under these circumstances, the posts of forest guards and forest watchers are not as attractive as they were once before." The results are however stated to be satisfactory.

Under the other system, the one recognized by the Forest Code, the forest guards and watchers are posted to beats three or four of which are under a deputy ranger or forester who when he wants a gang for any particular purpose takes the men with him. This system, an innovation, is in force in *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam*, *Kistna* and *Gōdāvari Lower* and to take *Ganjām* as an example, the gangs have cleared creepers over 14,000 odd acres of *sāl* forest.

Rules under the Forest Act.

255. (a) *Timber transit rules.*—The rules are reported to have worked satisfactorily in all divisions.

(b) *Rules under section 26 of the Forest Act.*—The rules are reported to have worked satisfactorily and the privileges conferred by them availed of without complaints except in *Goomsur taluk, Ganjām*, where people have still to learn that the felling of classified trees is prohibited. The unreserved lands were managed by the Forest department only in *Gōdāvari Upper* and the area of such lands was 427 square miles.

(c) *Other rules.*—The rules for the collection and disposal of drift timber in the *Gōdāvaris* and those under the Forest Act for the management of the *Vizianagram* and *Jeypore* estates and of the estates in *Kistna* are reported to have worked well. The rules for the timber transit on the river *Godavari* are found defective so far as they relate to the transport of timber from foreign territory to the destination within the period allowed and to the details regarding the checking of permits. They are under revision. Owing to the wrong interpretation of the rules regarding the authority competent for granting extension of time for transport of timber from foreign territory, one of the permit holders was fined heavily and the mistake has since been rectified.

256. *Hill tribes.*—In *Ganjām*, the assistance of the *Khonds* was, as usual, enlisted in the general and fire protection of forests and in return they were allowed to remove free materials for repairing their houses and fuel and minor produce for domestic consumption. Some of the *Khonds* were also rewarded by presents of rice and cloth in recognition of their good services. The hill tribes in *Vizagapatam* availed themselves of the privileges without abuse. The *Koyas* and *Reddis* in *Gōdāvari Upper* are reported to have done good work in clearing fire lines and protecting forests from fire and were paid wages for the labour and given money rewards on the results of protection. The same tribes in *Gōdāvari Lower* also were, as usual, employed in the general and fire protection of forests and on departmental works such as construction of roads and buildings and demarcation of forests. They are reported to take much interest in the protection of forests. *Chenchus of Kurnool.*—In the *East* division, the *Chenchu* labour was mostly engaged on exploitation and protection of forests and on construction of roads, demarcation of forests and the bunding of streams. Some of them were also entertained as guards and watchers. They are reported to have behaved satisfactorily with a few exceptions. The amount of wages earned by them during the year is reported to be Rs. 21,777. In the *South* division, they were employed mostly on fire protection. The Special *Chenchu* officer's work was mostly confined to the residents of the *West* division where there are nine gudems. With some exceptions, the *Chenchus* of these gudems are reported to have behaved fairly well. They were employed chiefly on the extraction of bamboos, collection of minor produce, cultural and fire protection operations and bunding of streams. The wages earned by them on forest works amounted to Rs. 21,325. Some of them were also engaged in agriculture under the supervision of the Special officer, but have much to learn. Their work on clearing fire lines is also reported to be very poor.

257. *Cultivation in reserved forests.*—In *Ganjām*, eight acres of land in *Kriamba* reserved forest were assigned to *Khonds* at the close of the year for dry cultivation after clearing bamboos and other inferior growth on condition of their restocking the area by planting red sanders and other valuable species within a prescribed time. This has been started as an experiment and if the results are successful, much of the non-*sal* areas which are at present stocked with inferior species can be regenerated. In *Kurnool East*, about 67 acres free of assessment and 115 acres on an annual assessment of two annas per acre were given to the *Chenchus* for cultivation in which they are reported to take much interest. The *Sugalis* continued to cultivate the 38 acres of land assigned to them in previous years. The above grantees are to render services in extinguishing fires. Twelve acres of land were also given to the *Police talaiyaris* for cultivation. In *Kurnool West*, small plots of land aggregating 37 acres were cultivated under the supervision of the Special officer by employing *Chenchu* labour. The expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 1,138 and the harvest was fair except in one place.

258. *Mining and quarrying.*—Two new licences were granted to Mr. Ghose of Gooty for prospecting barytes in the Kamalapuram and Betamcherla reserved forests in *Kurnool West*. The results have not been reported.

LIVE AND DEAD STOCK.

259. (a) *Elephants.*—Seven elephants were maintained in the circle for baggage. Their condition and health was fairly good.

(b) *Other animals.*—Six buffaloes were purchased in *Ganjām* for dragging logs, two in *Kurnool East* for carrying water and four donkeys in the latter district for dragging bamboo splits; one of the buffaloes in *Kurnool East* died. Of the 18 bullocks on hand in *Kurnool West* at the commencement of the year, one was killed by tiger. Ten of the remaining bullocks were used by the Special Chenchu officer for cultivation by *Chenchus*.

(c) *Inventory of valuable stock.*—Stock registers were maintained and verified at inspections. The value of live and dead stock at the close of the year was Rs. 15,082 and Rs. 3,79,052 respectively.

260. *Rain gauges.*—Maintained and readings recorded.

261. *Suits.*—In *Gōdāvari Lower*, a civil suit against the Government in connexion with the imposition of fine under the River Timber Transit rules was pending.

262. *Realization of revenue from the usufruct of toddy-yielding trees on Government wastes and poramboke lands.*—Rupees 91,976 was realized during the year against Rs. 56,291 of previous year. The increase was chiefly in *Bellary*, *South* and *West Cuddapah* districts.

RULES UNDER THE FOREST ACT.

263. *Timber Transit rules*, are in force in *Guntūr*, the three divisions of *Cuddapah*, and portion of *Chittoor*, and are reported to have worked satisfactorily. In the *West Cuddapah* district the extension of the rules is under correspondence with the Board and revised Transit rules for *Chittoor* district were submitted to the Board in October and are pending approval and sanction. The Conservator considers that in all districts which have forests of value transit rules are necessary if efficient check of removals of forest produce is to be rendered possible.

264. *Rules under section 26 of the Forest Act*, are reported to have worked satisfactorily and no complaint or abuse was brought to light.

265. *Inventory of valuable stock.*—The stock registers are reported to have been maintained and verified in all districts except *Nellore* where it is now reported that there is a certain amount of confusion in regard to the stock of two ranges, viz., *Nellore* and *Sriharikota*. The District Forest Officer is giving this matter his attention.

266. *Rain-gauges* were maintained in all districts except *Anantapur*, *South Cuddapah* and *Chingleput*.

267. *Cultivation in reserved forests with a view to afforestation.*—In *West Cuddapah* the cultivable area in Gandur tope was leased out for thirty years' cultivation and in *Nellore* a small portion of *Amancherla* reserved forest was given for cultivation to Police ghaut talaiyaris of *rodalakur*.

268. *Specimens.*—In *Guntūr*, two bottles of the essence of *Ponna* (*Calophyllum inophyllum*) and *Gadiri* (*Erythroxylon monogynum*) used for colouring nets were sent to the industrial exhibition held in December in *Madras*.

Six bags of *Zizyphus xylopyra* (720 seers) and five maunds and 30 seers of *Anogeissus latifolia* bark, were sent to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, *Madras*, in April and June 1918, respectively. Eighty-six yepi or *Hardwickia binata* billets (1 ton and 110 lb.) were supplied to the Deputy Controller of Timber Supplies, *Bombay*, in June 1918.

From *North Cuddapah*, 160 lb. of fruits of *Zizyphus xylopyra* and 164 of lb. twig bark of *Phyllanthus Emblica* were supplied to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs.

In *South Cuddapah*, some herbarium specimens and specimens of different grasses were collected from *Seshachellam Hills* by the Sub-Assistant to the Government Lecturing Botanist; 280 lb. of twig bark and 392 lb. of trunk bark of *Anogeissus latifolia* were supplied to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, *Madras*. Sixty red sanders billets were cut and supplied to the Deputy Controller, Timber Supplies, *Bombay*.

In *West Cuddapah*, 37 candies of twig bark of *Anogeissus latifolia* were supplied in May and June 1918 to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, *Madras*.

In *Nellore*, 310 lb. of *Zizyphus xylopyra* were collected departmentally for supply to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, *Madras*. One bag of twig bark of *Phyllanthus Emblica* was collected departmentally and despatched to the Controller. Also 157 lb. of *Anogeissus latifolia* were collected in *Nellore* range and supplied at Rs. 12 per candy as per Controller's rate sanctioned.

In *Chingleput*, at the instance of the Controller of Tanning Stuffs 1,136 lb. of bark of *Anogeissus latifolia* and three bags of green sumac were extracted experimentally from *Madayathur coupe I* and supplied to him.

In *Chittoor*, 378 lb. of *Carissa spinarum* and 200 lb. of fruit of *Zizyphus xylopyra* were supplied to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, *Madras*.

269. *Suits.*—In *North Cuddapah*, the suit filed against the shrotriyamdar of *Musalreddipalle Agraharam* which was pending in the *Nandalur District Munsif's Court* was disposed of against the Government.

The suit filed against Government by the owner of the land through which the footpath and a cart track run through *Kodur Plantation*, ended in compromise. A coupe contractor failed to pay the lease amount, disposed of his property and evaded payment. A petition was filed in the District Court, *Cuddapah* for cancellation of the sale-deed of his property but it was dismissed. Proposal for an appeal to the High Court is under consideration.

In *Nellore*, the suit filed by the Raja of *Venkatagiri* for a portion of *Nandanavanam* reserve was disposed of in favour of Government with costs.

The suit filed by the shrotriyamdar of *Turravaripalem* referred to in the last report is still pending.

The two claims preferred to the areas in the *Udayagiri Veligondas* referred to in the last report are still pending verification of boundaries by the Land Records Tahsildar.

270. *Live stock.*—There are three buffaloes in *Chittoor* district maintained for gardening purposes at *Horsleykonda Camp*. There is no other live stock maintained in the Circle.

271. *Mining.*—In *Bellary* the application of Mr. A. Ghose for prospecting licence referred in the last report was refused.

A prospecting licence for prospecting black earth in S. Nos. 103 and 148 of *Gundlavaddageri* and S. No. 338 (part), of *Papinaikanhalli* in *Hospet* range aggregating an area of 1,299 acres was issued to Messrs. Cursetjee Muncherjee & Sons, of *Bombay*, for a period of one year from 22nd May 1918, the surface rent payable being Rs. 325. Another for prospecting red-oxide over an area of 854 acres in *Jumbanathahalli*, *Hospet taluk*, was granted to the above merchants for one year from 22nd May 1918 for a surface rent of Rs. 214.

The report on mica mining in *Nellore* is excluded from this report in accordance with B.P. Forest Rout. No. 1107, dated 22nd August 1918.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FOREST COMMITTEE.

(a) Classification of forests.

272. The classification is complete in all districts. In *Anantapur* district the newly reserved *Yerrakonda Extension II* was classed as IV in B.P. Forest Mis. No. 243, dated 27th August 1917. *Kekati* reserved forest was re-classified from Class V to IV in B.P. Forest No. 37, dated 2nd February 1918. In *Guntūr* there were certain revisions of the classification—vide B.P. Forest Mis. No. 265, dated 25th September 1917, Mis. No. 300, dated 30th October 1917 and Mis. No. 373, dated

18th December 1917. In *North Cuddapah*, the Kondur and Venkatapuram topos along with three others which were handed over to the Revenue Department in B.P. Forest No. 71, dated 12th May 1915, were re-transferred to the Forest Department in B.P. Forest Mis. No. 298, dated 29th October 1917.

Although the classification is reported to be complete, it is expected that further revision will prove necessary in some of the districts.

(b) *Constitution of forest panchayats.*

During the year two panchayats were newly formed in *Bellary*, two in *Guntūr*, one in *West Cuddapah* and in *Chingleput*. Two were renewed in *Bellary*, 23 in *Guntūr*, 18 in *West Cuddapah* and two in *Nellore*. Eleven were dissolved in *Bellary*, one in *Anantapur*, one in *Guntūr*, one in *Chingleput* and two in *Chittoor*.

As a special report on the working of the panchayats is submitted to Government annually by the Board there seems no necessity to go into this matter in detail in this report. The panchayats are mostly reported to have worked satisfactorily on the whole. Perhaps this may be so and the Conservator hopes it is, but must confess to being somewhat sceptical on the point.

The Collector of Chittoor writes as follows:—

"These panchayats were started hastily by a Special officer in 1915. Too many were formed. The areas were not well distributed among the villages. Owing to there being too many of them they have not been properly inspected during the last three years by the Tahsildars and Divisional Officer. The Tahsildars concerned have heavy charges. Further Mr. Sathe never, to my knowledge, inspected any one of the areas in company with the Divisional Officer and no Ranger even, to my knowledge, accompanied either a Tahsildar or a Divisional Officer on inspection. Hence the revenue officers, not being properly instructed themselves could not properly instruct the panchayatdars even if they had time to educate so many panchayats, which they had not. Mr. Sathe's attitude to the panchayats was one of undisguised hostility. I consider that the number of panchayats should be reduced and the remainder given another chance."

The Conservator would remark that the Collector seems to be of the opinion that it is the duty of the District Forest Officer and the Range officer to instruct the Divisional Officer and Tahsildars who in turn are to educate the various panchayats as to how they are to manage their reserved forest panchayat areas. Apart from the fact that neither the District Forest Officer nor his range officers have time to run after Divisional Officers and Tahsildars to educate them in panchayat management, it is evident that very little notice was taken in Chittoor on the reports of inspections made by either the District Forest Officer or his Range officers. The Conservator agrees that it is advisable for joint inspections to take place at times by both sets of officers, for unless this is done, whatever the Range officer may report, the Tahsildar will report the exact opposite. To effect this, however, the officers must approach each other and arrange for joint inspections and this they have not done, although the Conservator understands in one case after the District Forest Officer actually arranged for a joint inspection with the Divisional Officer the latter failed to turn up.

As a matter of fact most of the panchayats in Vayalpad and Madanapalle taluks have sought to get as much out of the panchayat areas as possible and have allowed in many places huge herds of goats, so much so that in some places the reserves now look even worse than the surrounding unreserved land does. In these taluks where there is an abundance of unreserved land all being rapidly denuded of tree growth, the formation of panchayats ought not to have been rushed forward as it was in this goat infested country. The Forest Commissioner has asked the Conservator to submit a special report on the subject of panchayats in these two taluks and this will be shortly done. The Forest Commissioner has himself seen the damage done in some of these panchayat areas, and the damage will continue as long as the panchayats in these parts exist.

(c) *Opening of fuel coupes for rural supply.*

Coupes have been opened wherever there is demand and they were generally leased out to contractors for felling as usual.

(d) *The patrol system.*

The special patrol system which is in vogue in the three *Cuddapah* divisions is reported to work satisfactorily.

(e) *Inducement to villagers to aid in forest conservancy.*

The kancha system of grazing has already been introduced in *Nellore* and *Chingleput* and is working satisfactorily. In *Anantapur* and *North Cuddapah*, certain reserves were closed to grazing and free removal of grass as the villagers failed to respond when called upon to render help in putting out fires. The concession of free removal of grass by the villagers at foot of the Yerragondas and Veligondas in *Nellore* district from the hills on condition of preventing fires was continued during the year.

(f) *Improvement of water-supply and grazing facilities in Government grazing grounds (B.P. Forest No. 125, dated 29th June 1914).*

In *Guntūr*, permission was granted for sinking a well and two kuntas and for repairing three existing kuntas. In *North Cuddapah*, a masonry trough for men and cattle was constructed in Loddabanda in the Lankamalais, Vonipenta range and three wells were repaired. In *Chingleput*, for the improvement of grazing-grounds the six special working circles of Chingleput range, prickly-pear and thorny growth were removed in order to endeavour to increase pasture in accordance with the provisions of the working-plan.

(g) *Sale of plantations.*

In *Bellary*, 913.73 acres of plantation in Kowtalam, Halaharivi and Rayachoti reserves were sold. In *Guntūr*, 251.36 acres of casuarina plantation were sold.

273. The war work carried out during the year was—

In addition to supply of hay referred to in paragraph 27 supra arrangement for the supply of the following were made through agency of contractors:—

- (1) Lance staves.
- (2) *Anogeissus* bark and leaves.

The control of collection of tangedu and other tanning materials was transferred under Government orders to the Controller of Tanning Stuffs, the department receiving in revenue the average amount realized during the five years previous to the war.

The different kinds of produce sent to the Controller are detailed in paragraph 58 under "Specimens."

274. *General.*—In last year's report the Conservator respectfully invited the serious attention of the Board and Government to the present unsatisfactory state of affairs in the department and urged the essential necessity of re-organizing the whole Forest establishment in this Presidency. He desires to respectfully repeat the same invitation now. The war has thrown a great deal of increased work on the already utterly inadequate and depleted organization of the department, and although the staff has done its best to cope with the extra work, its ordinary duties in forest work have perforce being seriously interfered with and dislocated in certain localities.

The "Constant state of struggling inefficiency," as the Hon'ble Mr. W. O. Horne so aptly represented the condition of affairs some years ago, becomes yearly more marked than ever, and it is bound to continue to do so until reorganization so long discussed and referred to becomes an accomplished fact, and even then it will take years of strenuous work to make up the ground which has already been lost.

It must here also be stated that there are a few signs existing which give hope for a better state of things. In B.P. No. 2 of 16th January 1918, the Board communicated the sanction of the Secretary of State to a reorganization of the controlling staff involving an increase of ten Imperial Forest officers including a Chief Conservator and ten Provincial officers, but this however has not yet been brought into force.

292. *Rain-gauges*.—Readings were recorded in all the rain-gauge stations.

293. *Specimens—South Vellore*.—Some specimens of *Erythroxylon monogynum* (false sandalwood) tested for their oil value by Mr. Mohan Singh of Madras were found to yield only $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

PREVIOUS YEAR'S SUITS.

294. *South Salem*.—An appeal has been preferred to the District Court against the judgment of the Revenue Divisional Officer deciding the ownership of the range of hills known as the Neyyamalais in favour of the mittadar.

Trichinopoly.—The suit by the Kulittalai pattadar in the District Munsif's Court was decided against Government and an appeal was preferred to the District Court.

Madura.—Of the two suits referred to in the previous year, the one filed by D. P. Rama Rao for lands included in Kallar reserve ended in favour of Government and the other filed by K. Peddan Chetti is still pending.

Tinnevelly.—The Kuttalam waterfall appeal which was pending in the Privy Council ended in favour of Government.

295. There were no new suits during the year.

INSPECTION OF FRONTIER BOUNDARIES.

296. During the year, the Madura-Travancore boundary from Bombadi Shola to the tri-junction of Travancore with Coimbatore and Madura districts was inspected and found to be in good order. It is demarcated with stones and a lockspit part of the way, but there is no lockspit at the Coimbatore end, the ground being exceedingly rocky and precipitous.

PANCHAYAT SYSTEM.

297. *North Vellore*.—Thirty-eight panchayats were formed for twelve reserves and were at work.

South Arcot.—Panchayats for eleven reserves in *South Arcot* and Muthupet reserved land in *Tanjore* were at work during the year, in all of which the working was satisfactory except in Muthupet. The total number of reserves for which there were no panchayats was ten at the end of the year. Panchayats for four reserves have since been formed.

South Salem.—Panchayats were working in all the class V reserves except three.

Trichinopoly.—Thirty reserves were under panchayats during the year and one reserve which was under panchayat management was ordered to be disafforested. Five reserves have still to be made over to panchayats.

Madura.—Panchayats were sanctioned for four reserves but were handed over only in 1918-19.

No new panchayats were formed during the year in *Tinnevelly*, *North Salem*, *South* or *West Vellore*.

298. *Patrol system*.—The system was continued in the districts of *North Vellore*, *South Arcot* and *South Salem* and in one range in *Trichinopoly*. The want of establishment is felt to stand in the way of its success.

299. *Realization of revenue from the usufruct of toddy-yielding trees, etc.*—Revenue from this source was realized chiefly in the two *Mangalore* divisions and *Kollegal* and amounted to Rs. 1,637 against Rs. 1,066 in the previous year. The right to extract toddy from one of the ranges in *South Coimbatore* was leased out for Rs. 60.

300. *Measures adopted to encourage the growth of manure-leaf yielding trees and shrubs*.—No action was taken in this direction nor was any required, as the demand was met from private forests, and patta and unreserved lands.

301. *Supply of forest produce to meet the wants of the people*.—The concession of free removal of grass for thatching and fodder was, as in previous years, continued in *Mangalore* divisions and was not abused. In *South Mangalore* timber fuel, and bamboos in the Bundar depot and timber in the backwaters at *Kasargod* were sold by

auction. The private forests and unreserved lands supply all wants in *Malabar*. In *The Nilgiris* the issue of permits for small timber, fuel and bamboos to the ryots was continued; the *Badagas* got their fuel at the usual nominal fee of Re. 1 a house per year. The public in *Ootacamund* and *Coonoor* were supplied with firewood and charcoal departmentally as were the large military depots at *Wellington* and *Keti*. *Kollegal* contractors purchased fuel from the department and retailed in depots opened in *Kollegal* town. The demand for fuel outside *Kollegal* town is small and is met from the unreserves. In the other three divisions of *Coimbatore* the supply of forest produce was left to the contractors and there were no complaints. Small timber and agricultural implements were retailed from forest depots in *North Coimbatore* and brakepoles were sold to the cartmen frequenting the ghatroads in the *North* and *South Coimbatore* divisions. The removal of brushwood in head loads from coupes under working was continued in *The Nilgiris* and *Central Coimbatore*.

302. (a) *The working of the Forest Panchayats—Reserved forests*.—A portion of *Bolampatti* Block I in *Central Coimbatore* was handed over for panchayat management and two panchayats managing an area of 1,803.10 acres were formed during the year. The formation of one more panchayat in *Central Coimbatore* was sanctioned but the people of that village were unwilling to take it up. The areas managed by panchayat are as shown below:—

Reserved forests.—The work of panchayat in *Mangalore, North*, is reported to be satisfactory; while in *Central Coimbatore* the work was found to be unsatisfactory. The Collector of *Coimbatore* remarks that in any case these areas are not worth retention by the Forest Department. The *Dalavoipattanam* panchayat in *South Coimbatore* is reported to have managed the forests satisfactorily and improvements done by the panchayat are: (1) putting a stop to illicit thefts and (2) clearing of prickly-pear in the forest. The work of the other two panchayats in the division is not well reported on.

Unreserves.—Two small patches of unreserved lands near *Udipi* and *Karkal* in *Mangalore, North*, and the *Andiyur* and *Nagalur* unreserves in *North Coimbatore* were also under the management of panchayats. The work of these panchayats is reported to be unsatisfactory. The unreserves in *South Malabar* were handed over to the Revenue Department as the villagers were not willing to form a panchayat.

(b) *Opening of small coupes for rural supply wherever an effective demand exists or can be stimulated into existence*.—There is no demand for such coupes in all the divisions except in *North Coimbatore*, as the demand is met from the coupes sold to contractors, from private forests and unreserved lands. In *North Coimbatore* in addition to the coupes of previous year, two new bamboo and fuel coupes were opened during the year.

(c) *Measures adopted for improving the water-supply in Government grazing grounds and the facilities for grazing and pasturage*.—There is no necessity for adopting these measures in the *West Coast* districts and in *the Nilgiris*. In *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore* nothing could be done for want of funds. In *Central Coimbatore* the forests are generally within easy reach of the villages and the cattle are watered at the village wells; and in *South Coimbatore* nothing was done.

(d) *System of patrol by a gang of subordinates*.—This system is not necessary in *Malabar* and in two ranges in *South Coimbatore*. In the other two ranges of the latter division the Range officers made very few patrols during the year. In *Kollegal* no attempt was made in this direction. Six new patrol sections were formed in *Central Coimbatore* but it is reported that the patrols could not be properly controlled

by Range officers who have far too much other work to do as it is. This system was not introduced in the two *Mangalore* divisions and in *The Nilgiris* owing to the paucity of establishment. In *North Coimbatore* this system was tried in one range, as systematic theft of fuel was bad in that range.

303. *Grant of cowles for the formation of casuarina plantations in sandy areas.*—Nil. There are no areas suitable for the purpose in this circle.

304. *Rules under the Forest Act.*—

(a) *Timber Transit Rules.*—The rules in *South Kanara*, *Malabar* and *Coimbatore* worked satisfactorily.

(b) *Rules under section 26 of the Forest Act.*—These rules worked satisfactorily and no abuse was brought to notice during the year.

(c) *Other rules.*—The Sandalwood Transit Rules continued in force in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore* and worked well. The rules for *South Kanara* are being revised by Government. A special staff has been sanctioned on temporary establishment to check the illicit removal of sandalwood in *North Mangalore*. In *The Nilgiris* a scheme to control the sandal in waste lands is being adopted. The shooting rules in *The Nilgiris* underwent no change and the Fishing Rules, with slight modifications, were re-notified for another year.

305. *Hill tribes.*—The Kudubies in *North Mangalore* provided labour for the departmental works and were, in return, given lands in the ghat slopes for kumeri cultivation. In *South Mangalore* kumeri passes were not issued to the Mahrattis who are being given work by the department instead. The male-kudubies in the Uppinangadi range of *South Mangalore* were given the concession of removing free of charge, canes for bona-fide domestic use in basket making. In *North Malabar* the Kurumbers were given, as an inducement to live in the forests for supply of labour, 88 acres of land to raise a crop and simultaneously to plant up with teak seedlings. In *The Nilgiris* the Kurumbers in Mudumalai and Benne continued to work on fire protection and as elephant attendants. It is very difficult to secure their labour for felling and other works as employment on tea estates afford greater attractions. The Kasuba settlement at Anaikatti was continued and the people are now said to be assisting the department to a greater extent than used to be the case. The Irula and Kurumba settlements on the eastern and southern slopes were, as usual, not of any help to the department. The Sholagars in *Kollegal* and *North Coimbatore* continued to supply labour to the department. Five plots of 25 acres each, and one of 16.03 acres, more were granted on lease in the latter division towards the close of the year. The hill tribes in *Central Coimbatore* were granted leases of lands (946 acres) free or on nominal rent in three ranges on condition that they supply labour to the department. In *South Coimbatore* it is reported that the co-operation of the hill tribes in the matter of providing labour was maintained and that the existing free leases to hillmen were continued.

306. *Cultivation in reserved forests.*—Tenant-at-will leases covering 5.90 acres on an annual rental of Rs. 6-2-11 in *Mangalore, North*, 15.19 acres on a rental of Rs. 13-4-0 in *South Mangalore* were continued. In *North Malabar* 236 acres of dry and 4 acres of wet, lands were granted for cultivation to the Kuruchiers; and 465 acres of wet in Begur and Chedleth ranges were leased out on annual leases. In *South Malabar* the lease of four acres in the old Amarampalam reserved forest for paddy cultivation was renewed for another year on an annual rental of Rs. 10; the lease of paddy fields covering 120 acres in the new Amarampalam reserve, renewed for five years from 1st April 1916 on an annual rent of Rs. 402, was in force during the year. In *The Nilgiris* the land given to the Kurumbers in the Benne tuckle area was not cultivated, the reason assigned by them being want of rain. They however continue to attend to the 1.4 acres placed under teak. The Wood Estate of 267 acres included in the Naduvattam reserved forest was handed over to the Cinchona Department. The lease for coffee cultivation in *Kollegal* and the grant of 169 acres in Gutialattur and North Bargur reserves in *North Coimbatore* for cultivation on payment of rent continued. In *Central Coimbatore* the lease of 84.84 acres in Chennimal reserve, granted free of rent for thirty years in 1905 on behalf of a Panchama settlement, was in force. Fresh leases were not granted in *South Coimbatore* pending disposal of the question of forming cinchona plantations on the Anamalais.

Live and Dead Stock.

307. (a) *Elephants.*—The capturing operations were carried out in *South Mangalore*, *North* and *South Malabar*, *the Nilgiris* and *South Coimbatore* and were extended to *Central Coimbatore* where there were two captures during the year under report. Twenty-two elephants were on the whole captured and there were five births also. The operation in *South Coimbatore* was extremely successful as 14 elephants were captured in that division alone. Eighteen were sold for Rs. 53,150 six died and one was killed by a wild tusker. The number of deaths included one young undeveloped calf, three new captures, one very old animal and one died of choking due to some obstruction in the oesophagus. The condition of the elephants is reported to be generally good and the number remaining at the end of the year was 108.

(b) *Other live-stock—Bullocks.*—Twenty-four were purchased during the year. The casualties of the year were 14 sold and one destroyed, being unfit for forest work, two died and two killed by a tiger. The balance stock at the end of the year was 50. *Buffaloes.*—The stock remaining now is 54, nine having died and six having been sold being unfit for forest work.

(c) *Veterinary establishment.*—Mr. F. X. Mascarenhas inspected the live-stock in different districts. The inspections are not as frequent as might be desirable in *The Nilgiris* with so many elephants. The work of the Assistant Inspector attached to the *South Coimbatore* division is reported to have been satisfactory.

(d) *Inventory of valuable stock.*—Stock registers were maintained and verified at inspections. The value of the live-stock and stores at the close of the year was Rs. 3,27,897 and Rs. 3,88,559, respectively.

308. *Rain-gauges.*—Maintained and readings recorded; and these records in *South Mangalore* continued to be unreliable.

309. *Suits.*—In *South Mangalore* a suit filed by a minor produce farm contractor for the recovery of the alleged loss caused to him by investment of the security deposits in Government promissory notes, instead of in the Postal Savings Bank, is pending in the District Munsif's Court, Puthur. In *North Malabar* a civil suit is pending disposal by the Mysore District Judge against a Mysore timber contractor, for the recovery of the loss sustained by the department on account of his failure to pay for the timber purchased by him in auction. The letters-patent appeal filed by the Tirumalpad of Nilambur, the lessor of Mudumalai forests, against the decree of the High Court in the second appeal, was dismissed with costs.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE MADRAS FOREST COLLEGE, COIMBATORE, FOR THE YEAR 1917-18.

CHAPTER I.—CONSTITUTION.

(1) Staff.

Mr. F. L. C. Cowley-Brown held the post of Principal throughout the year.

The posts of First Imperial Instructor was held by Mr. C. B. Dawson, that of the Second Imperial Instructor by Mr. H. C. Bennett till 28th May 1918. Messrs. E. M. Crothers and W. C. Hart, respectively, were the First and Second Provincial Instructors for the whole of the year.

Mr. K. Natesa Ayyar, Sub-Assistant Surgeon, was attached to the College throughout the year. Mr. M. S. Venkatramana Ayyar, Second Sub-Assistant Surgeon, joined duty on 30th September 1917. He accompanied the College on tour until 4th February 1918, from which date he was detailed for duty in the municipal hospital. He was eventually taken off the Forest College list from 5th April 1918, as owing to ill-health he was unable to tour. These officers gave instructions in first aid and camp hygiene to both the divisions.

(2) Board of Visitors.

The Hon'ble Mr. M. E. Couchman was President, and Messrs. P. M. Lushington, C. D. McCarthy, H. B. Bryant, and H. A. Latham were members of the Board of Visitors during the year under review, except for the period from 3rd April 1918 to 18th June 1918, when Mr. H. F. A. Wood joined the Board owing to the absence of Mr. H. B. Bryant on privilege leave.

CHAPTER II.—RESULT OF EXAMINATIONS.

The Board of Visitors met on 21st June 1918, and remained till 1st July 1918, on which date the certificates of the 1916-18 division were awarded. Twenty-seven students sat for the final examination. The following is the list of prize-winners and of the successful candidates in the order of merit showing the certificates awarded.

Mr. Kesavaswami Ayyar, L.M.S., Assistant to the District Medical and Sanitary Officer, delivered a refresher course of lectures in first aid to the students of the 1916-18 division. Lieut. Col. C. F. Fearnside, the District Medical and Sanitary Officer and his Assistant conducted the final examination both written and oral in that subject. Nineteen students succeeded in obtaining the St. John's Ambulance certificates.

The 1917-19 division comprised 33 men at the beginning of the college year. By the close of the first term 5 men were withdrawn by reason of incapacity to follow the college course, leaving only 28 to start on their second year course.

The final examination in Physical Science for the year 1917-19 was held in June 1918.

T. D. Ponniah of the 1917-19 division won the Board of Visitors' gold medal for the best first-year student.

Messrs. C. E. C. Fischer, R. D. Richmond, R. Bourne, F. J. Marshall, M. Panchapakesa Ayyar, Raman Menon and Abdul Qadir were the examiners for the final examination. The orals were as usual supervised by the Board of Visitors.

The senior division (1916-18) was rather above the average: student Srinivasa Rao showed himself to be intellectually far beyond his fellows.

The juniors (1917-19) promise well with the exception of five men who were sent down under Rule 24 of the College Rules.

The Examiners' reports for the most part show that the instruction has been thorough, but that at the 'tail' a lack of either intelligence or general education betrayed itself. More than one examiner commented on the illegibility of the students' hand-writing: special measures are now being taken to combat this fault. It was further observed that greater attention is evidently being paid to the practical side of the training. The demonstration forest on the estate will afford largely increased facilities to both divisions for out-door work in all branches of forestry and surveying: it has been proposed by Mr. Dawson to introduce the cultivation of lac. The engineering park for bridging, fuel slide, etc., laid out by Mr. Crothers, the first Engineering Instructor, has already proved of marked benefit to the senior division. It is about to be largely extended and fitted with an angled sledge road turn-table and sledge, derrick and shears, water-shoot, tramway, etc. At least 5 to 6 hours per week is now during headquarter terms devoted by each division to field work: either forestry, or engineering, etc., i.e., for the senior division besides the Demonstration Forest operations, bridge building, estimating, check-measuring, etc. and for the junior division, brick making, surveying, demarcation, line-cutting and road construction.

Students plates are now bound at the end of the course and returned to them: but drawings of very exceptional merit are retained and hung in the drawing hall

On tour free-hand drawing is encouraged.

The lack of text books in silviculture, engineering and range administration continues to be serious impediments to the curriculam.

For the first time gymnastics formed part of the regular curriculum,—instruction being given to the senior division by one of the Havildars throughout the head-quarter terms.

The Examiner Sergeant Jones of the Central Police School reported that the division as a whole was well trained and that the winner of the Fischer cup as well as his nearest competitors displayed a high degree of proficiency. The Fischer cup for Gymnastics was presented this year as a permanent challenge trophy by C. E. C. Fischer, Esq., Deputy Conservator of Forests. The junior division was instructed in drill only. It is intended in future if possible to train both divisions in gymnastics. The senior division gave a satisfactory gymnastics display before the Board of Visitors.

CHAPTER III.—TOURING, HEALTH, CONDUCT AND ADMINISTRATION.

Touring commenced at the beginning of October instead of September—the students returning with light kit early in November for a week to undergo the periodical examination. The change was found to be in many ways most advantageous.

Programme of touring of Senior division.

October.—Komuttiyeri (Javadi hills)—Sandalwood. In Tirupattur sandal depot the method of classifying and storing sandalwood was seen: the Darbar held by the District Forest Officer to distribute awards to the Malayalis was attended: levels for a pipe line to the forest bungalow at Komuttiyeri were taken and longitudinal sections prepared: Botanical specimens collected: Deputy Ranger's accounts examined and notes sent to the District Forest Officer.

November–December.—Anaipadi. Mount Stuart—Weeding and cleaning in the College block: witnessed elephant captures: teak forests examined in detail: estimate and plans designed for the improvement for the siding tramway: 3 span trestle bridge constructed: identification of trees by means of blazers practised: lecture on elephants by the Veterinary Assistant: Botany excursion.

January.—Walliar—Enumeration survey: thinning: tree analysis: stone and brick arches on the railway line studied: A trestle foot bridge and a bamboo fuel slide were constructed: Range records were examined: Botany excursions.

February.—Sativayal—Fire tracing: writing up of the working plan report: two trestle bridges were constructed one 32' 6" and the other 62' in length: well boring demonstration. Botany excursions.

April–May.—Coonoor–Bandysbala—Thinning of blue gum: *Loranthus Nilghiriensis* on blue gum studied: pitting for transplanting blue gum seedlings: final survey examination: inspection of the new college road with the District Forest Officer: the Wellington fuel depot inspected: the Sims Park visited for botanical observations.

(Forest cases were attended at the Magistrates' Courts in headquarter terms on three occasions.)

Junior division.

October.—Mount Stuart—Silviculture and regeneration of teak: study of improvement fellings: thinnings and weeding: enumeration survey of sample plots: eradication of bamboo: coppies with standard system: demarcation of coupes: inspection of the Pollachi depot (and forest utilization examination) tram-line trace: construction of tramway bridge: study of differential pulley and hydraulic ram. Botany excursions.

November–December.—Nilambur and Nedungayam—Teak plantations examined in detail: study of soils: enumeration surveys: calculation of volume of standing crops: regeneration of teak: inspection of rubber plantation and rubber factory: study of rafting road alignment: blasting and quarrying: inspection of range office records: check of timber checking stations: Botanical excursions: visited at Calicut Kallai saw mills, cannery, tile works and Dutts oil mills.

January.—Mundanthorai–Tinnevely—Thinning of teak coppies: marking for girdling: improvement fellings: enumeration surveys: regeneration of *Hopea parviflora*: plane table and chain survey of the camp site: taking of levels for road construction: botany excursions.

February.—Sativayal—Inspection of coppies with standard: construction of charcoal-kiln: clearing and burning of fire lines: weeding of nursery: improvement fellings: survey and plotting of coupes. Trestle bridge construction with seniors: tube well boring: Botany excursions.

April and May.—Aramby—Study of Eucalyptus plantations: measurement of trees in sample plots: marking for thinnings: calculation of volume: visit to the Eucalyptus oil still in the Government gardens: Botanical specimens studied: stem analysis of trees: examination of range office records and forest depot: instruction in survey and contour marking, demarcation of the Aramby reserve and alignment of road in the Maldanna plantation, in combination with the forest guard training school with the object of giving the Forest College students practice in control.

Probably more time than is necessary is spent at Mount Stuart. On the Nilgiris another week would be distinctly advantageous to the course.

As usual all operations on tour have been recorded in the College Journals—extracts or special notes being communicated to the District Forest Officers concerned.

Owing to the elephant sales being no longer held at Walliar it was not possible this year for the College to attend them.

Forty-two students passed in swimming.

The thanks of the College are due to Messrs. Wood, Richmond, Barry, Bourne, and Venkatramana Ayyar for the trouble taken to render the touring comfortable and advantageous. The College tours necessarily cause considerable inconvenience to District Forest Officers, and although every effort is made to make some return by carrying out operations that will be of use to the district, the balance of indebtedness must always be against the College but for the eventual benefit to the department by the production of efficient Rangers.

The conduct of the students as a whole left nothing to complain of with the exception of a certain lack of responsiveness. The average age on 30th June 1913 was senior division 28, junior division 26. In the senior division were 8 men over 30 and in the junior division 3. Men over 25 are naturally less capable than their juniors of assimilating to the full the benefit of the College training.

Of the 1917–19 division 7 came with good, 14 with fair, 2 with moderate and 5 with less than moderate characters.

The few serious cases of illness or injury that occurred were dealt with by the Municipal Hospital. In two instances students sent there by reason of a football accident or for other causes subsequently developed typhoid. The health otherwise of the College was good throughout the year.

At the meeting of the Board of Visitors held on June 29th and 30th resolutions (amongst others) were passed to the effect that—

- (i) the municipal well should be acquired and joined to the engine-house well by an adit;
- (ii) a windmill and pump should be obtained to work the Arboretum well.
- (iii) a storage tank should be constructed to collect rain water from the College roof;
- (iv) the Mali's pay should be considerably increased;
- (v) marks for Botany should be raised;
- (vi) an Engineering Manual should be prepared by one of the College staff;
- (vii) the annual allotment for roads, buildings and avenues should be raised to Rs. 5,000;
- (viii) the Library annual allotment should be raised to Rs. 150.
- (ix) past students should be encouraged by special arrangements to attend to prize Day a social function being also combined with the distribution of prizes;
- (x) the Demonstration Forest Project was approved.
- (xi) Hundred marks, from which mark fines would be deducted, should be allotted to conduct and efficiency.

Owing to the present financial stress the urgent necessity for increasing the pay of the Head Clerk and Overseer and for providing quarters on the estate for the Overseer was not formally laid before the Board of visitors.

CHAPTER IV.—THE GASS FOREST MUSEUM:—COLLEGE AND STUDENTS' LIBRARIES.

During the year the Principal was deputed to Dehra Dun to study the Museums of the Research Institute. Material alterations in the arrangements of sections and exhibits, have in consequence been introduced into the Gass Museum—each section being denoted by a prominent label. Models of the various sylvicultural systems will shortly be constructed at the College carpenter's shop; these combined with the diagrams received from Dehra and in connexion with the Demonstration forest should be of great value in appealing to the student's eye rather than to his memory. A large number of timber panels collected by Mr. A. W. Lushington, C.I.E., have been added. All forest produce has been arranged as far as possible in botanical order to facilitate search for a particular exhibit. The characteristic bark when procurable is now affixed to each timber panel. Over 70 sample pencils of different species tried with varying success have been received from the Department of Industries. Mr. C. E. C. Fischer has again made a generous contribution (of 147 specimens) to the herbarium. By the removal of curios, toys, etc., having little bearing on forestry proper the museum has been made less of a 'Wonder house', and space has thereby been obtained for exhibits of greater instructional value. A considerable number of inferior trophies have been shroffed.

Creepers have been trained on to the walls of the museum. The windows have been provided with blinds by the Public Works Department at a cost of Rs. 825.

About 12,800 people (excluding Madras Forest College students) as against 10,600 last year and 5,000 the previous year have visited the museum.

One of the eleven sections of the Museum catalogue was printed, copies being supplied to many of the Forest officers in the Presidency.

The Curator was relieved in February of all supervision of planting operations on the estate and is now able to concentrate on museum work proper.

GENERAL LIBRARY.

One hundred and fifty-four books were added, of which 46 were presented by C. E. C. Fischer, Esq.

STUDENTS' LIBRARY.

The stock was increased by 55 volumes, 23 being presented by C. B. Dawson, Esq., and 18 by Mr. S. Doraiswami Ayyar. A large number of magazines, etc., were sent periodically to the Military hospitals at Secunderabad.

The catalogues of the general and students' libraries were printed.

CHAPTER V.—WATER-SUPPLY, PLANTING, ROADS BUILDINGS, ETC.

For the improvement of the water-supply the engine well was deepened by 5' by the Public Works Department. This has resulted in an increase of about 600 gallons per day. The minimum yield is now about 4,200 gallons per day in non-rainy months when water is most needed. This supply just suffices for domestic requirements when the college is at headquarters, but does not permit of the Dhobie Khana being used, or of the avenue trees, nursery and arboretum being watered. Consequently the Dhobie Khana cannot be utilized, and water for the trees, etc., in non-rainy months when the college is in residence has to be drawn from another well and transported by coolies at very considerable expense; for the latter purpose alone about 2,000 gallons per day are required. No progress has been made with regard to the proposal to put a windmill over this well (the college is rarely free throughout the year from a strong wind) or with the project for storing the rain water from the college roof.

Adjoining the engine-well at a distance of about 30 yards is a two-moto well, the yield of which is probably about 40,000 gallons per day. The Executive Engineer proposes to acquire this well, connect it with the engine-well by an adit and to work both wells with the present engine. There seems little doubt that this scheme (of which the Sanitary Commissioner approves) would provide an ample supply for all purposes except drinking. All competent authorities appear to be agreed that drinking water cannot be obtained on the college estate. It is still obtained by cart

from a more distant and reputedly purer well than its neighbours. The Sanitary Engineer has made an alternative proposal to move the engine-house to the edge of a public tank $\frac{1}{2}$ mile further off. Since the close of the year a water-finder has been employed: he has indicated nine spots below which water may be expected: one has been bored to a depth of 70' and water has risen to within 40' of the surface: a well, if sunk here, would be of undoubted value as a supplementary supply, but for the main source the connexion of the adjoining to the engine-well would probably be by far the more economical and satisfactory scheme.

In the meantime the college continues to suffer what can only be characterized as a grievous disability from lack of water. The estate is being developed but at a very enhanced cost and progress is necessarily very slow. If an adequate supply of water were assured—and it is only a question of funds and energy—a system of pipes and taps to all parts of the estate would be laid out, progress would be both cheaper and quicker, the avenues and private gardens would flourish, the college and museum and all buildings would become covered with the bright blossoms of creepers, the nursery and arboretum would be of real instructional benefit to the students, and the 25 acres surrounding the main building would be transformed into something approaching an ornamental park: it is now a dreary babul waste, in the hot weather fissured with wide and deep cracks and covered with long spear grass and in the rains a morass.

Creepers and ornamental shrubs are being planted round the walls of the main building (as well as of the museum) but their maintenance under present conditions is expensive and precarious. During the year about 1,200 trees have been planted in the avenues and arboretum and a large number of seedlings have been raised in the nursery. More than two miles of paths have been laid out to a considerable extent by the students. An estate and sanitary overseer on Rs. 25 was appointed from February 23rd. He certainly does his best, but for the pay offered a really competent man cannot be expected. It would be an economy to offer a salary sufficient to induce a retired trained ranger to take up the post.

Owing to the insufficiency of the annual grant for maintenance of roads and buildings (Rs. 2,500 for the repair and maintenance of the $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles of roads and paths and the Rs. 374,275 worth of buildings in charge of the Principal), it has not been possible to do more than carry out urgently necessary repairs to the hostels and to a small length of the roads. The exterior iron and wooden work of the college and museum have not been repainted since the college was completed and is consequently deteriorating rapidly. The inadequacy of the annual grant has been specially brought to the notice of the Board of Visitors.

CHAPTER VI.—GENERAL.

The stock of the college was checked in July 1917 and the defects noticed were remedied. The office was inspected twice during the year: once in July 1917 by the second Imperial Instructor and secondly in January 1918 by the Principal.

The service registers have been posted up to date and the services of the 1916-18 students were verified up to 2nd July 1918.

The work of the office has been quite satisfactory, and reflects great credit on Mr. Doraiswami Ayyar, Head Clerk. The Storekeeper Mr. A. Marudachallam Pillai has usually carried out his varied duties with efficiency.

The work and conduct of the subordinate establishment (especially malis and sweepers) have improved somewhat during the year, owing to the efforts of the overseer, the unfailing tact and careful control exercised by the house tutor Mr. Crothers, as also to the low standard of outturn hitherto demanded and to the expectation of an early increase in pay. Unless this latter expectation is realized it will be impossible to keep them for any length of time on their present wages which are now considerably less than the rates prevalent in Coimbatore or offered by recruiting officers, as it is resignations are frequent and sudden. On the other hand efficiency rises with every additional month of service, and progress cannot be expected if it is found impossible to retain this class of servant in regular continuous employment. The success of the project for developing and improving the estate naturally depends to a large extent on an improvement in the pay of these people.

Students' gardens are being started at the hostels.

From March 1st the supply of dairy produce was undertaken by the Agricultural College and farm and cattle were finally prohibited on the estate. The result has been of marked benefit to the comfort and health of the students and to the welfare of the plants.

Towards the end of the year a provision and fuel store was opened on the estate: this has proved a boon and an economy to the residents and at the same time a financial success to the promoters.

A temporary reading room at some inconvenience has been arranged for: a permanent recreation room near the hostels (in which the students can amuse themselves at their ease) is badly required; the students have subscribed a certain amount already towards this object.

Athletics.—During the year the athletic ground was laid down, a portion of the work being carried out by the students. Three tennis courts were constructed by the Public Works Department. Two badminton courts have been prepared at the hostels. The advantage of having grounds for football, hockey, tennis, cricket, athletics, etc., on the estate, in lieu of having to journey out to the Coronation Park to claim a debatable pitch, needs no emphasis. Under Mr. Bennett's supervision the athletics were managed with efficiency and zeal.

The season at football and hockey was less successful than at cricket: one student scored two centuries in consecutive matches at intervals of a week. The athletic sports were held in the Police Recruits' School grounds: Mr. Richmond's cup for the highest aggregate being won by junior student C. B. Chengappa, who at the end of the year also gained the Pentland Shield for the championship of the college in all branches of athletics.

The Marathon race ($7\frac{1}{2}$ miles hill and plain) was run over the usual Sadiyaval course: practically the whole college competed, senior student P. K. Perameswaram Pillai being the winner, while for the inter-division cup the juniors defeated the seniors.

The efficiency of the work of the staff is clearly indicated by the fact that there were no failures amongst the students who completed the course. The willing co-operation of Messrs. Dawson and Crothers merits special mention.

Forest Administration Report

Recording, with remarks, the — for the year 1917-18.

READ—the following paper:—

Proceedings of the Board of Revenue (Land Revenue), Forest
No. 42, dated 22nd November 1918.

The Hon'ble Mr. M. E. COUCHMAN, I.C.S.,
Commissioner of Land Revenue and Forests.

The Board submits to Government its report on the progress of Forest Administration in the Madras Presidency for the year ending 30th June 1918.

2. *Alteration in area.*—The present policy of Government is to abandon small isolated reserves which are not likely to repay the time and money spent on them, and the protection of which, owing to their being surrounded by cultivation, leads to constant friction with the villagers, and to convert all valuable unreserved lands into reserved forests.

In pursuance of this policy, about 71 square miles were notified under section 16 of the Forest Act, mostly in *Gunjam*. About 39 square miles, in *Kurnool*, *Guntur*, *South Arcot*, *Trichinopoly*, *Gōdāvari Lower* and *North Vellore*, were disafforested. As a result of his inspection the Forest Commissioner has come to the conclusion that there are still many reserves which should be given up, in a few cases because they are fit for cultivation but more often because they consist of isolated rocky hills on which no good growth could ever be hoped for. Where possible, forest panchayats are being formed for such areas and in some cases the grazing fees are being raised in order to induce the villagers to take them up on panchayat. Where panchayats cannot be formed, the areas will be given up altogether.

The total area of reserved forests was 18,838 square miles at the close of the year, an increase of 28 square miles on last year's figure. The area of reserved lands fell from 725 square miles to 678 square miles, chiefly owing to the transfer of a large area to reserved forests. Since the close of the year the Sandur leased forests (63 square miles), which are included in the area of reserved lands, have been surrendered to the Darbar.

In the Parlakimedi Maliahs two blocks of four square miles were added to reserved lands during the year. The total number of blocks which had been selected for reservation in the Maliahs up to the end of the year was 27, aggregating 200 square miles.

3. *Forest settlement.*—As in previous years, forest settlement work was carried out by Revenue Divisional officers. Out of a total area of 488 square miles, which awaited settlement at the close of the year, the Northern Circle alone accounts for 418 square miles, consisting of three large blocks in the *Gōdāvari* district. It is reported that the final notification for two of these blocks, viz., *Peddamedisaleru* (96.48 square miles) and the *Coringa* extension reserve (75 square miles), will be ready for publication during 1918-19. No progress worth the name has yet been made with the scheme of reservation in the *Rampa* forests. The question of employing a special staff to push on the work is now under correspondence with the Conservator of Forests, Northern Circle. As regards the Southern Circle, the area of unreserved forests which have to be reserved under the Forest Act in the *Attur* taluk of the *North Salem* division alone is about 39 square miles, but the proposals which have so far been received relate to only 13 square miles. The Conservator of Forests,

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Southern Circle, has been asked to report what is being done to select and notify the remaining areas. Very little forest settlement work remains to be done in the Central and Western Circles.

4. *Demarcation.*—An inconsiderable advance was made in the demarcation of forest boundaries, only 60 miles of boundary lines having been dealt with during the year, of which 29 miles were in *Bellary* and 21 in *Madura*. Four hundred and forty-six miles remained to be demarcated at the close of the year (principally in the districts of *Madura*, *Mangalore South* and *Kollegal*) out of which the Western Circle alone is responsible for 361 miles. The length of old boundaries repaired during the year was 17,996, against 18,808 miles in the previous year; of this length, 15,542 miles were cleared by subordinates free of cost, against 12,259 miles in 1916-17. The average cost per mile of fresh demarcation and of repairs rose from Rs. 37-1-8 and Rs. 3-2-0 to Rs. 96 and Rs. 7-10-8. The increased cost occurred chiefly in the Southern Circle, where the final demarcation of reserves was carried out in *Madura* over a length of 21 miles at a total cost of Rs. 3,530 or Rs. 167 per mile. The revision of the boundaries between the *Nilgiri* and *Coimbatore* districts, which was sanctioned in G.O. No. 2953, Revenue, dated 20th December 1916, was being dealt with by the District Forest Officer of the *Nilgiris*, and the Collector of the *Nilgiris* has been requested to expedite the draft notification called for in paragraph 1 of the Government Order. The work of verifying and demarcating forest boundaries in the *Nilgiris*, for which a special Forest establishment was sanctioned in G.O. No. 2038, Revenue, dated 6th September 1916, has been postponed with the sanction of Government—vide G.O. Mis. No. 2491, Revenue, dated 2nd July 1918.

5. *Surveys.*—The Survey of India party continued its operations in the *Nellore* district and completed the survey of 45 square miles on the 4" scale and 134 square miles on the 2" scale. Some work was also done by the party in the *South Ouddapah* division. A special Surveyor deputed by the Survey of India completed the final survey of some of the teak plantations in *South Malabar*. The Surveyor deputed by the Madras Survey party (G.O. Mis. No. 3849, Revenue, dated 30th November 1917) completed the survey of 14 blocks on the Anamalais from December 1917 to February 1918. A special district reference map of the *South Malabar* division (prepared by Mr. Descubes) was printed and published by the Forest Map Office, Dehra Dun. The work of printing the maps of forest divisions in the Forest Map Office, Dehra Dun, was retarded by the absence of officers on Military duty.

6. *Working-plans.*—The shortage of officers during the war and the dislocation of work caused by the requirements of the Indian Defence Force Act prevented much progress being made with working-plans. Plans covering 273 square miles were sanctioned during the year. For about one-third of the area of the reserved forests of the Presidency working-plans have yet to be prepared.

In his note on some European sylvicultural systems, Mr. R. S. Troup says (page 13): "The fundamental principles on which the preparation of the Indian working-plans is based are unsound. . . . As provisional methods of treatment and pending the introduction of true system of management, such fellings may answer a temporary purpose but the time has come when serious efforts should be to place a larger area of forests under true systematic working." This is specially true of the Madras Presidency where the variety of species, climates, soils and other local conditions are probably larger than in any other province of India. The Board is therefore glad to record the fact that during the year the Government have sanctioned the appointment of a Provincial Sylviculturist, because one of the essentials for the preparation of true systems of management is a thorough knowledge of the sylviculture of the chief species. In *Malabar* and *Gunjam*, Messrs. Bourne and Minchin are preparing working-plans for which a considerable knowledge of the

Sylviculture of the chief species involved has been already collected. Mr. H. F. A. Wood has completed a similar working-plan for the Tekkadi forests in *South Coimbatore*, which is now under consideration. In the course of time, it may be hoped that working-plans based on true sylvicultural and economic principles will be prepared for other areas. Useful working-plans already exist for some of our chief sandal areas and during the year a working-plan was sanctioned for the *South Salem* sandal forests. A special staff is working on the revision of the working-plans of the Begur forests, *North Malabar*. Little progress could be made during the year with the *Tinnevely* working-plan as the officer in charge was frequently called away for military duties.

7. *Communications and buildings*.—Strict economy was exercised in expenditure and only Rs. 1.55 lakhs were spent on roads and communications. Expenditure on buildings rose from Rs. 1.02 lakhs to Rs. 1.16 lakhs. This increase was chiefly due to the construction of sandalwood godowns and quarters for subordinates in the Javadis. The important road to Komattiyeri in the Javadis was opened soon after the close of the year and the Forest Engineer has completed the plans and estimates for the proposed steam tramway from the Anamalai road station to the Mount Stuart forests. The estimate amounts to Rs. 6½ lakhs and will be submitted to Government shortly.

8. The present bullock tramway in the Tekkadi forests was extended by four furlongs. No other new works of any magnitude were undertaken during the year, but programmes for opening up the forests of *Cuddapah* and *Kurnool* have been called for, with a view to increasing and cheapening the supply of fuel and timber in those districts.

9. *Forest offences*.—The following table compares the forest offences of all kinds reported during the year with those of 1916-17 and with the average of the preceding three years:—

It will be seen that the total number of offences reported during the year is 996 less than in the preceding year and 3,413 less than the average of the three preceding years.

This satisfactory decrease of crime is attributed generally to better protection; in *Kurnool* to the fact that the inhabitants of the villages bordering on the forests were fully employed in work in coupes, and in hay-making; in *Nellore* to the kancha system, by which the villagers are interested in the protection of the forests; and in *South Kanara* and *Coimbatore* to the deterrent punishment inflicted on gangs of habitual thieves. The formation of forest panchayats for forests in which grazing is the chief consideration, and the introduction of the forest village system in the Javadi hills must also have contributed to this result. The decrease would have been greater but for the fact that with the increases which are being sanctioned from time to time in the forest staff fewer offences escape detection.

10. Unauthorized fellings formed the largest head of forest crime in all the circles. There was a satisfactory decrease under unauthorized grazing, although cases were numerous in the Central Circle, especially in the districts of *Anantapur*, *Chittoor*, *Nellore* and *Guntur*, in all of which districts large numbers of goats are kept.

The further extension of the forest panchayat system and the forest village system, the extension of the kancha system to the *Chingleput* district and the disafforestation of small isolated forests for which panchayats cannot be formed, should lead to a decrease of crime under this head. The total number of offences connected with injury to forests by fire shows an appreciable increase—234 over the numbers of the preceding year. Ninety-three per cent of these cases remained undetected and this was due to the fact that all fire occurrences, except those caused in fire tracing, have been treated as offences. The miscellaneous offences under the head 'other offences,' which relate for the most part to breaches of forest rules, are comparatively unimportant and call for no comment.

11. The percentages of the cases that were taken to court, compounded and undetected, were 24.16, 68.59 and 7.25 respectively against 22.13, 71.08 and 6.79 in the previous year. The total number of cases disposed of by Magistrates fell from 7,438 to 6,871. That prosecutions in the majority of cases are not instituted without careful inquiries and due discrimination may be inferred from the fact that 91.66 per cent of the cases taken to court ended in conviction. The punishments inflicted by the Magistrates were generally adequate except in *Chittoor* and the *Nilgiris*. The matter is receiving the attention of the Collectors concerned.

12. More than half the cases were compounded and the compensation fees realized amounted to Rs. 1,72,932. The average compensation fee per case was Rs. 10-0-9 against Rs. 9-13-8 in the previous year.

13. Rewards amounting to Rs. 1,122 were granted to informers and forest subordinates, against Rs. 772 granted in the previous year. The Nilgiri Game Association paid Rs. 67-8-0 as rewards to forest subordinates for detecting cases of poaching.

14. *Protection from fire*.—The season was, generally speaking, dry and unfavourable to protection. Out of 7,142 square miles over which special protection was attempted, 699 square miles were burnt. Instances of deliberate incendiarism were reported from *Kurnool*, *Anantapur*, *Cuddapah* and *Nellore*. The hill tribes in *Ganjam*, *Gōdāvari* and *South Coimbatore* were helpful in putting out fires. In *South Kurnool*, the Chentsus did good work, but in *West Kurnool* they were responsible for many fires. The special measures which are being taken to provide the Chentsus with other means of living will, it is confidently hoped, minimise fires in this district in the future, though time will be required for the desired result.

In addition to the specially protected areas, ordinary protection was attempted over 8,811 square miles and was successful over 8,059 square miles. The Board, however, is sceptical as to the reliability of these figures. In many districts it is difficult to check the burnt areas. In several cases punitive steps were taken when fires were bad and when the villagers rendered no help in extinguishing them.

15. *Grazing*.—Grazing licences were issued to 2,482,532 animals, a decrease of 222,367. It may be hoped that the decrease in grazing, if real, is partly due to the transfer of reserves to panchayats, to the extension of the kancha and forest village systems and to the success of the attempts which are being made to reduce the excessive incidence of grazing in many of the reserves by the introduction of grazing schemes. The kancha system worked well in the *Nellore* district and is being introduced into the *Chingleput* district. Thirty-three silver medals and cash rewards amounting to Rs. 2,383 were awarded for good protection, and were much appreciated. Defaulting kanchadars were fined where protection was specially bad. An Extra Assistant Conservator was specially deputed to popularise the system and to hold the kancha sales. Three hundred and seventy kancha leases were granted for 256,379 acres of grazing land: 5,627 acres of forests closed to grazing were entrusted to kanchadars for protection.

16. The aggregate receipts for the whole Presidency under grazing fees amounted to Rs. 7,39,674; the figure of the previous year was Rs. 7,08,869. The increase is explained by the enhanced grazing fees which were imposed in several districts with the object of stimulating the formation of panchayats and the introduction of the forest village system. If these objects are attained, the grazing fees will actually be reduced, by refunds made at the end of each year. The forest village system was

a success in the hill villages of the Polur and Santavasal ranges of *South Vellore* division and in three ranges in *West Vellore*. Refunds amounting to Rs. 6,720 were granted to those villages which had earned it by good protection. No one system will be suitable for the whole Presidency; but the Board is hopeful that by some scheme of rewards and penalties, modified to suit local conditions, the grazing problem throughout the Presidency may in time be, if not solved, at least rendered less acute than it is now. Such a solution is desirable no less in the interests of the villagers than of the forests. The number of cattle impounded was 118,806 or 7 per cent in a total of 1,620,964 head of cattle which grazed in the forests either free or on payment.

17. *Sylviculture—Natural and Artificial reproduction.*—The natural reproduction in respect of teak, sandalwood and other species was satisfactory in several districts. At Nilambur the 27 acres of mature teak plantations felled last year were successfully replanted, and 17 acres were clear-felled and replanted. The regeneration of the natural forests at Nedungayam was also commenced; 46 acres of these forests were sold for clear felling with the intention of planting teak, but owing to the abnormally early monsoon only 10 acres could be got ready for planting. Some experimental planting of *Terminalias* and other species besides teak is being undertaken here, as portions of the land are unsuited to teak. In all 69 acres were planted during the year in the Presidency. Other cultural operations were carried on over 9,086 acres. The appointment of a Provincial Sylviculturist having been sanctioned during the year, it is anticipated that this section of the report will gain in interest and importance in the future.

18. *Exploitation.*—(1) *Fuel.*—Fuel coupes amounting to about 2,500 square miles were worked over during the year, in addition to which a large quantity of fuel was extracted from the improvement fellings in *Cuddapah* and other districts.

(2) *Timber.*—At Nilambur 70 acres of teak plantations were felled. The highest yield per acre was Rs. 13,450 net after allowing for the cost of extraction, and the average yield over 21 acres was Rs. 7,370 per acre net. In the Amarampalem reserve of the same district 46 acres of natural forest were clear-felled for the formation of a teak plantation. The amount realized for the sale of standing timber was Rs. 4,024. Fellings were also begun in the Karimpoya reserve to supply timber to the Munitions Board. 10,720 c.ft. of timber were supplied to that Board from the Tekkadi forests. The rest of the timber extracted was from selection and improvement fellings.

(3) *Sandal.*—Sandalwood has risen in price during the war and is now an important item of revenue.

The following table shows the value of the sandalwood sold during the last four years:—

The receipts during the year under report would have been much higher had the demand continued, but the price fell to an almost nominal figure towards the end of the year, and only 31 tons were sold in the Western Circle leaving over 200 tons unsold. The average value per ton of the sandalwood sold was Rs. 1,733 in the Western Circle and Rs. 1,822 in the Southern Circle.

(4) *Bamboos* are becoming a more and more important item of revenue. During the year, the value of the bamboos sold was Rs. 3,24,710.

(5) *Tanning stuffs.*—The whole of the business of marketing *Cassia auriculata* and *Cassia fistula* was handed over to the Munitions Board in return for a fixed payment based on the average revenue derived by the Forest Department from tan stuffs during the five years preceding the war. This arrangement involved during the year 1917-18 a sacrifice of about Rs. 3 lakhs which is part of the Madras contribution to the war. The Munitions Board has expressed its appreciation of this concession.

Large quantities of the bark of *Anogeissus latifolia* are also being supplied to the Munitions Board for tanning purposes. This is a new discovery made in the Madras Higher Trade School.

(6) *Hay-making.*—The work of hay-making, which had been abandoned by the Department under the orders of Government, was taken up during the year in several districts of the Presidency to meet the requirements of the Army. About 100 tons of hay were supplied to the Military Grass Farms Department, in addition to the quantity exploited by that department in *Kurnool* and *Cuddapah* under the supervision of Mr. T. Clear, Deputy Conservator of Forests, whose services were placed at the disposal of the Military department for the purpose.

19. *Agency of exploitation.*—The quantities of timber and fuel, extracted other than for free grants or for the benefit of right holders, amounted, in thousands cubic feet, to 26,476 units, against 24,531 in the previous year. For timber, the ployment of departmental agency was almost confined to the Western Circle. The districts which contributed chiefly to the increase in departmentally felled timber were (1) *South Malabar*, where 70 acres of teak plantations were felled in Nilambur and where increased fellings were carried out in other plantations and (2) *South Malabar*, where timber was felled for supply to the Military Department. Fuel is extracted departmentally chiefly in the *Nilgiris*, where the increased outturn was due to arrear clear fellings and increased demand.

The value of the bamboos extracted departmentally increased by Rs. 12,257 while that of the produce removed by purchasers decreased by Rs. 19,371. The chief centre of departmental collection was *Kurnool West*, the object in view being to provide employment for the Chentsus.

20. The value of the minor produce removed by departmental agency increased by Rs. 1,69,504 and that removed by purchasers by Rs. 1,68,878. The high prices realised for tanning barks, the enhancement of grazing fees in several districts, chiefly in the Southern Circle, and the sale of hay to the Military department, chiefly contributed to the increase.

21. The estimated value of forest produce removed by right holders was Rs. 52,225 (against Rs. 55,684 in the previous year) and the value of produce sold free amounted to Rs. 39,591 (against Rs. 47,766 in the previous year).

22. *Financial results.*—The financial results of the year are noteworthy. The gross revenue realised during the year amounted to Rs. 54.16 lakhs, an increase of Rs. 6.37 lakhs over last year. This increase was chiefly due to the high prices of sandal, the sale of teak from the Nilambur plantations, the manufacture of hay for the army, the sale of forests no longer considered worth preserving in the *South Malabar* and *Trichinopoly* districts, and the high prices realised for tanning barks.

The expenditure under A. Conservancy and works increased from Rs. 11.89 lakhs to Rs. 13.34 lakhs and that under B. Establishment rose by Rs. 10,361 and the total expenditure under both the heads amounted to Rs. 29.20 lakhs. The net surplus amounted to Rs. 24.97 lakhs, compared with Rs. 19.95 lakhs of the last year. This surplus is the highest yet recorded, but represents an unhealthy state of affairs, as all but the most urgently necessary expenditure was postponed. A good many officers are absent on military duty, and thus the efficiency of the department and the development of the forests has been retarded. This is an inevitable result of the war. Receipts have also been abnormally high, owing to the sale of forests during the war. The great rise in the value of sandalwood and other produce. After the war, an increase in expenditure and a temporary decrease in revenue must be anticipated and a considerable capital outlay will be necessary to develop the forests.

23. *Research and experiments.*—Messrs. Parry & Co. reported after experiment that *sal* wood was useless for making casks, being too brittle and porous. Reference was made last year to experiments made with *Euphorbia* as a pencil wood. The Director of Industries has now reported unfavourably; he finds the wood too knotty. Painting trees with lime as a means of destroying creepers was again, generally speaking, a failure. Experiments are being continued in *Ganjām* and *Kurnool West* and it is expected that they will be concluded in 1918-19. Since the end of the year the Conservator has received a report from the District Forest Officer, *South*

Cuddapah, on the results of the experiments initiated by Mr. Marsden, the Imperial Sylviculturist, for the purpose of determining the girth increment and development of heavily thinned red sanders and the condition best suited for the natural regeneration of this species. The report is awaited. Experiments in the inoculation of *Butea frondosa* and *zyzyphus xylopyra* with lac culture are being made by the Government Entomologist in the *Central Coimbatore* division in consultation with the District Forest Officer. Thinnings of bamboo clumps are being continued in certain reserves in the Southern Circle and the results are being watched. Many of the tan-stuffs which abound in the Southern Circle have been tested and analysed by Mr. J. A. Pilgrim, Tanning Expert. The analyses made in the Leather Trade school show that *Anogeissus latifolia* bark contains a high percentage of tannin. The leaves of the same tree are also a valuable tanning material and it is possible that a trade in this may be developed both for local use in producing finished leather and for export to Europe.

24. **Administration.**—The Hon'ble Mr. M. E. Couchman was head of the forest administration throughout the year. He toured in thirteen districts of the Presidency. In July 1917 he visited the Sriharikota reserve in the *Nellore* district in connexion with the question of acquiring and reserving the enclosures in the island. In *Ganjām* he visited the *sal* forests to examine a proposal to open a saw-mill at Russellkonda. In *Kurnool* he dealt with the questions of allotting of lands for a Donga Woddar settlement near the Siddapuram tank and of providing employment for the Chentsus. In the Javadis the working of the Malayali village system engaged his attention. In *South Kanara* he inspected the sandalwood areas with both the District Forest Officers and held a conference there in connexion with the revision of the sandalwood transit rules. Copies of the Forest Commissioner's inspection notes of his tours in the districts of *Kurnool*, *Cuddapah* and *Anantapur* have already been submitted to Government. Copies of his inspection note of his tours in the Mamundur forests of the *Chittoor* district were communicated to the local officers.

Messrs. H. A. Latham, P. M. Lushington and C. D. McCarthy were in charge of the Northern, Southern and Western Circles throughout the year. Mr. H. B. Bryant was in charge of the Central Circle up to the 2nd April 1918 and from 18th June 1918 to the rest of the year. During the intervening period Mr. H. F. A. Wood, Deputy Conservator of Forests, acted as Conservator. All the District Forest offices except those of *Gōdāvari Upper* and *South Arcot* were inspected by the Conservators. The Board has received the Conservators' inspection notes on the forests inspected by them in the districts of *Ganjām*, *Vizagapatam*, *Kistna*, *Chingleput*, *South Cuddapah* and *Vellore*. The Conservator of Forests, Western Circle, inspected some of the forests of his circle. His inspection notes on *Central Coimbatore* and *North Mangalore* were received after the close of the year. The Conservator has been requested to expedite his inspection notes on the remaining forest divisions in the circle. All the Conservators of Forests and all District Forest Officers except those of *North Salem* and *North Coimbatore* spent an adequate number of days in touring and the short touring of the excepted officers has been satisfactorily explained. All the range offices except one in *Kurnool West*, one in *West Cuddapah* (which range was formed only on 1st April 1918), one in *North Salem* and one in *North Coimbatore* were inspected by the District Forest Officers. The accounts of all the District Forest offices but nine were inspected by the auditors of the Accountant-General's office and the results were reported to be generally satisfactory.

With a view to securing the efficiency of the forest offices, the control of the District Forest office establishment was retransferred to the Collector in G.O. No. 3369 Revenue, dated 29th October 1917.

25. **Forest Panchayats.**—Though the forests have all been classified in accordance with the recommendations of the Forest Committee, it is reported that revision will prove necessary in some of the districts, specially in the Central Circle. There has been a satisfactory increase in forest panchayats, which now number 354 compared with 290 last year. The area under management is now about 496 square miles of reserved forests and unreserved lands, compared with 479 square miles during the last year. The panchayats are reported to have worked well on the whole. The chief irregularities reported were over-grazing, goat browsing, illicit felling of trees and removal of manure leaves. Only five panchayats are reported to have been dissolved and th-

area under their management resumed on account of misconduct. The dissolution of a panchayat in *Kistna* and the resumption of the forest is reported to have had a salutary effect on the other panchayats in the district which are now working better. Since the close of the year 56 additional panchayats have been formed (or are likely to be formed) for the management of 88 square miles. In some cases the grazing fees have been raised in order to put pressure on the villagers to take up the forests on panchayat management.

26. **Chentsus.**—The Government have sanctioned the extension for a further period of two years of Mr. L. Saunders' deputation as Special Chentsu officer (G.O. No. 110, Revenue, dated 2nd August 1918). The Board has submitted to Government, since the close of the year, Mr. Saunders' annual report for the year 1917-18 which explains the measures he has devised to provide permanent employment for the Chentsus on a business basis. They were chiefly employed on the extraction of bamboos, the collection of minor produce, fire protection and the bunding of streams in the *West Kurnool* division where Mr. Saunders has chiefly concentrated his work. The wages earned by the Chentsus on forest works amounted to Rs. 21,325. Some of them were also being taught agriculture under the supervision of the special officer. The results of Mr. Saunders' work during the year were very promising.

27. **Miscellaneous.**—Mr. A. W. Lushington, C.I.E., resigned his appointment as temporary assistant to the Forest Commissioner with effect from 8th January 1918. His experiments in the seasoning of timber were not carried on long enough to justify any conclusions being drawn from them.

M.R.Ry. K. R. Venkataramana Ayyar, Extra Deputy Conservator of Forests, was appointed for a period of six weeks to ascertain the conditions of the sandalwood and sandalwood oil markets. His report on the subject was submitted to Government after the close of the year. The period of the special duty of Mr. T. N. Hearsey, Extra Assistant Conservator of Forests, who is engaged in the investigation of 'spike' in sandal, was extended to October 1919.

The report of Mr. J. Brookes of Messrs. Parry & Co., who was deputed by Government to investigate the possibility of erecting a saw-mill at Russellkonda, showed that there would be no difficulty in erecting the mill if the required plant could be secured from England or America. Messrs. Parry & Co. are writing to well-known manufacturers of saw-mill machinery in England and America to obtain quotations for the plant required.

The transfer of the control of the Anamalai township to the Revenue Department was sanctioned by the Government after the close of the year. At an exhibition which was held in Madras during the Christmas week of December last under the auspices of the Madras War Fund Committee the Forest Department exhibited a number of products, consisting chiefly of various species of hard and soft woods. The stall was under the charge of Mr. A. W. Lushington, C.I.E., and was awarded by the Exhibition Committee a certificate of merit. During the year the sanction of the Secretary of State was received for the reorganization of the controlling staff of the Forest Department. The cadre of the controlling staff has been augmented by ten Imperial posts including a Chief Conservator and ten Provincial posts. The local Government have submitted proposals to the Government of India for the reorganization of the subordinate staff of the department and final orders on the subject are awaited.

28. **Forest charges.**—The transfer of the headquarters of the Southern Circle from Trichinopoly to Salem was sanctioned and the move will shortly be made. Proposals for the redistribution of the forest divisions of *Salem*, *South Arcot* and *Trichinopoly*, which have been received from the Conservator of Forests, Southern Circle, are now under the Board's consideration. Government have approved of the proposal of the Board of Revenue for a readjustment of the boundaries between the North and West divisions of the *Cuddapah* district; as a consequence the *West Cuddapah* division has become a major charge and the *North Cuddapah* division a minor charge. During the year the Board has again considered the question of the formation of a fourth division in the *Kurnool* district and has called for a notification describing the limits of the new division before addressing the Government in the matter.

29. Among the Imperial officers, Messrs. Bigold, Clear, Wilson and Whitehead have joined the Indian Army Reserve of officers and Messrs. R. B. Cornwell, R. Mitchel, P. W. F. Walpole and A. Brand among the Provincial officers. M.R.Ry. K. R. Venkataramana Ayyar received the title of Rao Sahib for meritorious work. Mr. P. M. Lushington, Conservator of Forests, Southern Circle, was permitted to retire after the close of the year and to take up the post of the Deputy Controller of Timber supplies under the Munitions Board. The work of the superior officers was generally satisfactory.

30. *The Forest College, Coimbatore.*—The College continued to work satisfactorily. Out of the 27 students who appeared for the final examination, two Government students won the honours certificate and one of them received several prizes. Twenty obtained the higher standard certificate and five the lower standard. The final examinations in all the subjects were conducted by examiners from outside the staff of the College. The examiners' remarks go to show that the instruction was thorough and that greater attention was being paid to the practical side of the training; in the men at the bottom of the list, however, a lack of either intelligence or general education betrayed itself.

The 1917-19 division started in August 1917 with 33 students and closed the year with 28. By the close of the first term, five students who were found unfit to continue the training were weeded out.

During the year the Principal, who had been deputed to Dehra Dun to study the Museum of the Research Institute, introduced material alterations in the arrangement of sections and exhibits at the Gass Forest Museum. The Museum has continued to attract a large number of visitors.

31. *General Rules under the Forest Act.*—The working of the Timber and Sandalwood Transit rules was satisfactory. During the year the Sandalwood Transit rules were introduced newly into the South Arcot district. The people generally availed themselves of the privilege allowed by the rules under section 26 of the Forest Act and there were no complaints of any importance.

32. *Improvement of water-supply in Government grazing grounds (G.O. No. 1622, Revenue, dated 4th June 1914).*—Three tanks in Gōdāvari Lower, Kurnool East and in Kurnool South, were repaired and deepened. In Kurnool West, two public-spirited ryots were permitted to repair two tanks in forest reserves. Their example is being followed by others who have been encouraged to come forward to undertake similar repairs. In Guntūr and North Cuddapah (Central Circle) some wells were repaired. In North Vellore 431 bunds were constructed in one reserve at a cost of Rs. 341. In South Salem, similar work was entrusted to the Malayalis in the Chitteris who constructed 190 bunds at a cost of Rs. 95. Bunding work is said to have been carried out in four reserves in Trichinopoly, but no details of the number of bunds constructed have been furnished. In South Arcot six tanks in forest reserves were repaired and four put in order by private agency. No measures of this kind were considered necessary in the West Coast districts, in The Nilgiris and Central Coimbatore. Expenditure under this head was curtailed owing to financial restriction.

The Conservators of Forests are requested to furnish information in their future reports as to the amounts spent under this head in the several districts in the Presidency.

33. *Opening of small coupes in the vicinity of villages for rural supply (paragraph 20 of G.O. No. 3020, Revenue, dated 13th October 1913, on the Forest Committee's report).*—In the Northern Circle coupes in convenient localities were sold to contractors to meet the wants of the people, and in the Central Circle they were opened wherever there was a local demand. In the Southern circle sale coupes at the edge of forests were maintained by coupe contractors, while in the Western Circle no such measures were considered necessary as demand for fuel was met from the coupes sold to contractors and other sources.

34. *Patrol system (paragraph 22 (1) of G.O. No. 3020, Revenue, dated 13th October 1913, on the Forest Committee's report).*—In the Northern Circle the system was in force in all the districts, except in Gōdāvari Upper, where it was not introduced.

The Conservator of Forests, Northern Circle, says that the system worked on two different lines in the circle. Under the system in force in Kurnool East and South, the beats controlled by a patrol officer are clubbed together and the area to be patrolled being large the whole gang is away from headquarters for two or three days at a stretch, which renders service unpopular. The results are, however, reported to be satisfactory. Under the other system, which is in force in Ganjam, Vizagapatnam, Gōdāvari Lower and Kistna, the forest guards and watchers are posted to beats, three or four of which are under a Deputy Ranger or a Forester who, when he wants a gang for any particular purpose, takes the men with him. As an example of how the system worked, it is stated that in Ganjam the gangs have cleared creepers over 14,000 and odd acres of sal forests. The system, which is in vogue in all the forest divisions in Cuddapah, is reported to have worked satisfactorily. In the Southern Circle the system was continued in North Vellore, South Arcot, South Salem and one range in Trichinopoly, but was not a success owing to the inadequacy of establishment. In the Western circle the system is not required in Malabar and in two ranges in South Coimbatore. It was tried in one range in North Coimbatore on account of systematic thefts of fuel. It was not introduced in other forest divisions as men could not be spared from their other duties.

35. *Conferences.*—A Conference was held by the Forest Commissioner with the Conservators of Forests in February 1918. Messrs. R. D. Richmond and A. A. F. Minchin, Deputy Conservators of Forests, attended the preliminary Conference of Forest Officers held at Dehra Dun in October last to consider the question of standardizing the methods of collecting forest statistical data. Mr. P. M. Lushington attended the Tanning Conference convened by the Government of India in connexion with the supply of tanning materials by the Forest department and the tannin industry generally, which was held at Dehra dun on the 14th of August 1917. The Spike Conference held at Bangalore in October 1917 was attended by Messrs. P. M. Lushington and T. N. Hearsey.

2. The outstanding feature of the work of the Forest Department during the year under review was the varied activities designed to meet the demands of the Military Department. Thousands of tons of hay were supplied, large quantities of tanning stuffs were procured for the Munitions Board at special concessions rates involving a sacrifice of three lakhs and the department was also busily engaged on helping to improve the supply of timber required for war purposes.

3. On the other hand the war checked progress in many directions. Strict economy was the rule and few works of any magnitude were undertaken. The absence of officers on military duty still further reduced a staff which has never been adequate and thus restricted attempts at new developments. Some dislocation was also caused by the demands of the Indian Defence Force. It is hoped that with the return of officers from military duty and the relaxation of the rigid financial restrictions hitherto enforced, substantial progress will become possible in the near future both under actual works and in regard to general development. In particular the Government desire to emphasize the need for a rapid improvement in communications especially in the neighbourhood of the most important timber and fuel reserves.

4. *Paragraphs 9 and 10 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The Government note the decrease in forest offences and observe with pleasure that it is mainly ascribed to the better protective measures undertaken by the department and to the increased enlistment of co-operation on the part of the villagers.

5. *Paragraphs 15 and 16 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The decrease in the number of grazing licences and the decline in the number of cattle impounded are matters for satisfaction in so far as they indicate some measure of progress towards the solution of the difficult grazing problem.

6. *Paragraph 22.*—The unusually high surplus was largely due to war conditions and cannot be expected to continue. Much deferred expenditure will have to be incurred in the next few years and the introduction of a more decided policy of development will necessarily entail greater outlay on works not immediately remunerative.

7. *Paragraph 25 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The Government are glad to observe that the forest panchayat system is considered on the whole to have been working satisfactorily. This branch of the administration will come under closer examination in connexion with the special annual report on the subject.

8. *Paragraph 26 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The Government endorse the Board's appreciation of Mr. Saunders' work among the Chentsus.

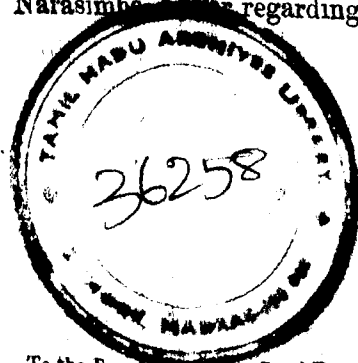
9. *Paragraph 27 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The Government trust that sanction will soon be received for the scheme of reorganization of the subordinate establishments and that it will shortly become possible to give at least partial effect to the sanction already accorded for the improvement of the cadre of the controlling staff. These schemes, when carried out, should go some way towards providing the department with a staff adequate to its needs.

10. *Paragraphs 29 and 30 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The Government note with satisfaction the Board's testimony to the work of the superior officers of the department and to the continued efficiency of the Forest College.

11. *Paragraph 32 of the Board's Proceedings.*—The attention of the Board is invited to the discussions at the meeting of the Legislative Council held on 19th November 1918 in connexion with a resolution moved by the Hon'ble M. B. V. Narasimha Aiyar regarding the improvement of water-supply in grazing grounds.
