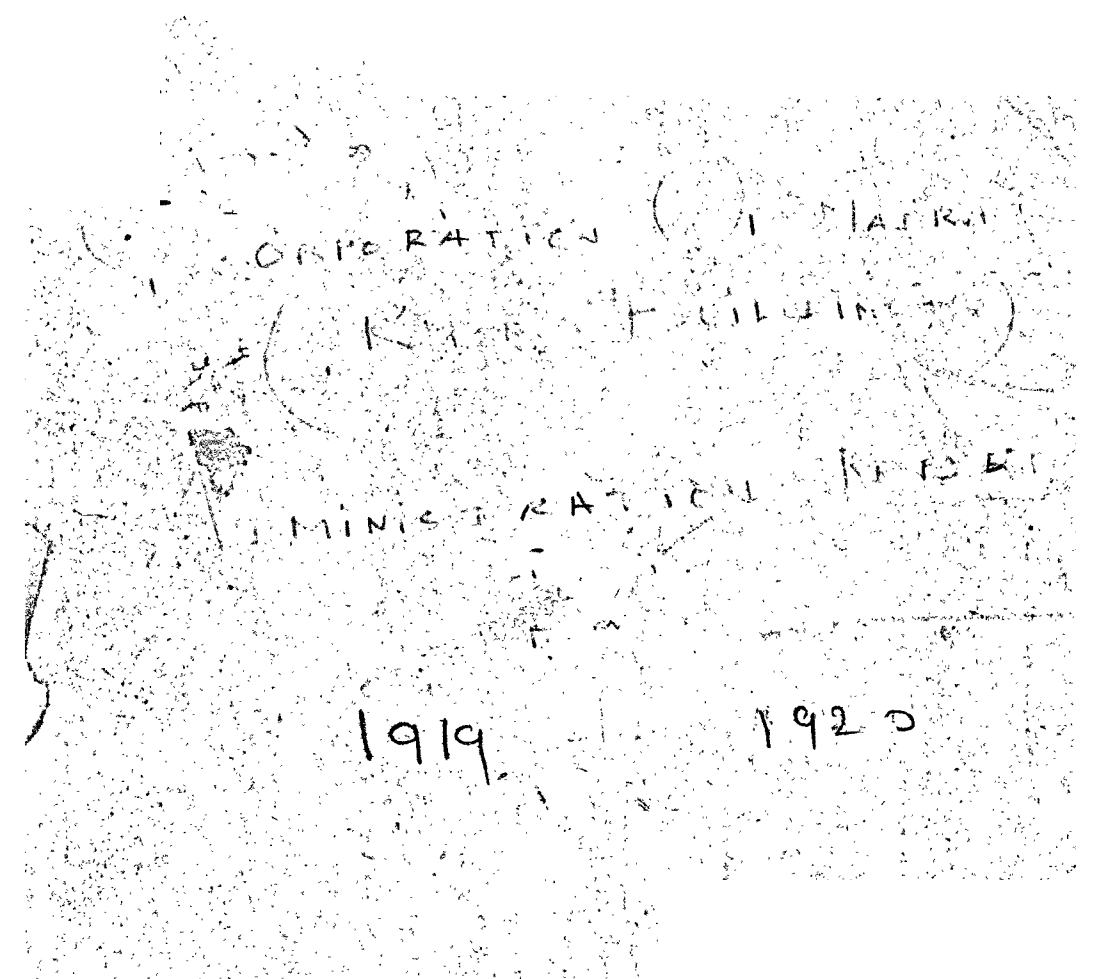
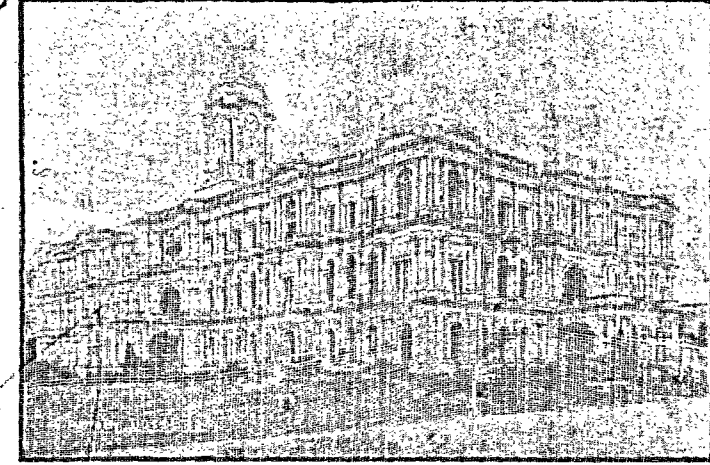

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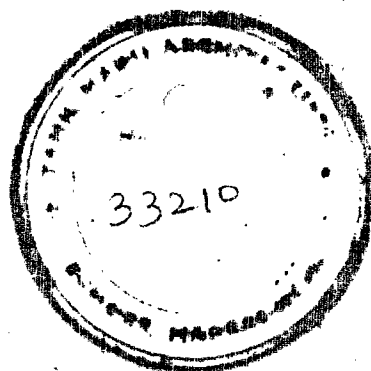

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CORPORATION OF MADRAS.

Report of the Commissioner from 1st April 1919
to 31st March 1920.

LEGISLATION.

During the year under report the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 came into force on 1st October 1919 superceding the Madras City Municipal Act III of 1904, Madras City Municipal Act (Amendment Act) 1907, and Madras City Municipal Act (Amendment Act) 1911.

2. The New Act has introduced important changes in the constitution of the Corporation and in the provision for increase of revenue.

The changes introduced in the constitution of the Corporation and in the mechanism of its working are intended to have the effect of popularising the administration and associating a much wider circle of people in the task. It has secured a constituency really representative of the rate-payers. Every tax-payer is given the franchise and the occupancy qualification is lowered to Rs. 60 from Rs. 120.

The constitution of the Council has been liberalised, the strength having been raised from 36 to 50 and the elective strength from 28 to 41 (Division elections 30 and elections by institutional bodies 11). The nominated element has been reduced to 9—the bare minimum necessary to provide for the representation of Muhammadans and other minorities and for experts. The Municipal authorities charged with carrying out the provisions of the Act are (a) a Council, (b) Standing Committees of the Council and (c) a Commissioner. With a view to the Councillors associating in larger numbers in the practical work of the administration and to turn into useful channels the special knowledge of individual members, the Act has introduced 4 Standing Committees, each consisting of 7 members in the place of one Standing Committee dealing respectively with (1) Taxation and Finance, (2) Works, (3) Health and (4) Education. The Council at its first meeting after the first day of November in each year, will elect one of its members to be its President and each Standing Committee at its first meeting after that date in each year will elect one of its members to be its Chairman. The President by virtue of his office is a member of every Standing Committee and other committees appointed by the Council and has free access to all the records of the Corporation and every official correspondence between the Corporation and the Governor-in-Council is conducted through the President.

The Commissioner is the chief Executive authority and his main function is to attend to the efficient discharge of the entire work of the administration and the multitudinous details that arise in the government of this large city.

With regard to the resources of the Corporation the Act has regraded the profession-tax, the animal and vehicle taxes and has empowered the Council to levy a duty on transfers of property in the shape of additional stamp duty. The exemption hitherto enjoyed by the Port Trust was withdrawn and the properties of the Port Trust are now subject to the levy of the usual property tax but so as not to exceed 4 per cent on the gross earnings of the Port Trust and this concession was extended to the Port Trust since the basis of rental value is not applicable to the capital works (technically called buildings) which consist mostly of backwaters, sea walls etc. Further the rate at which the property tax should be levied on buildings and lands has not been defined but has been left to the discretion of the Council.

Elections.

3. In pursuance of the transitional and transitory provisions of the Act, the old Council continued in office till 5th February 1920, when the following Councillors constituted the Corporation under G. O. No. 1372 M., dated 17th September 1919.

4. These Councillors continued to hold office during the year under report except M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur K. B. Ramanathan Avargal who resigned his office on 16th February 1920 and in whose place Dr. S. Swaminathan was elected as a Councillor of the Corporation of Madras with effect from 13th April 1920 and M. R. Ry. P. V. Duraiswami Mudaliar Avargal who died on 1st March 1920 and in whose place M. R. Ry. P. V. Nataraja Mudaliar Avargal was elected with effect from 11th May 1920.

5. The following paragraphs show the changes in the constitution of the Corporation between the period from 1st April 1919 to 5th February 1920 when the New Council was formed :—

Representatives of the Chamber of Commerce :—Mr. A. J. Leech who was appointed on 17th April 1917 resigned his seat on 1st October 1919 and the Government to whom the same was reported did not appoint any substitute in his place. Mr. W. A. Turner who was appointed on 11th February 1919 resigned his seat on 12th March 1919. Lieut-Col. W. H. Johnston who was appointed in his

place on 30th September 1919 continued to hold office up to 5th February 1919. Mr. A. J. Powell who was appointed on 10th April 1917 resigned his seat on 2nd May 1919. The Government who was addressed in the matter appointed no substitute in his place.

Representatives of the Trades Association:—M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur N. C. Rajagopalachariar Avargal who was appointed on 27th March 1917 continued to hold office till the formation of the New Council. Mr. H. W. Wilson who was appointed on 30th July 1918 resigned his seat on the Corporation on 24th March 1919 and Mr. D. Morrison was appointed in his place on 13th May 1919.

Mr. W. H. Nurse who was appointed on 15th October 1918 continued to hold office till the formation of the New Council.

Representatives of the Harbour Trust Board:—Khan Bahadur Abdul Kuddus Badsha Sahib Bahadur who was appointed on 5th March 1918 continued to hold office till the formation of the New Council.

Representatives of the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway Company:—M. R. Ry. Rai Bahadur B. Mopurappa Garu who was appointed on 18th December 1917 continued to hold office till the formation of the New Council.

Nominations by Government:—The Hon'ble Mr. M. D. Devadoss, the Hon'ble Mr. Yaqub Hasan Sahib Bahadur, Mr. E. R. Osborne and Mr. H. W. Callaghan continued to hold office till the formation of the New Council. The Hon'ble Sir G. Fraser who was appointed on 23rd April 1918 resigned his office on 17th February 1919 and Rev. D. G. M. Leith was appointed in his place on 15th July 1919. Mr. J. W. Crusha who was appointed on 6th February 1917 resigned his seat on the Corporation on 13th February 1919. Mr. A. C. Hanbury who was appointed in his place on 1st July 1919 also resigned on 17th September 1919. Government who was addressed in the matter appointed no substitute in his place till the formation of the Council under the New Act. Lt.-Col. R. Bryson who was appointed on 8th August 1916 left Madras on Field service on 5th June 1919 and Major E. W. C. Bradfield was appointed in his place on 29th July 1919 and he continued to hold office till the formation of the Council. Lt.-Col. C. Donovan who was appointed on 21st May 1918 ceased to be a Councillor on 15th May 1919 and Government who was addressed on the subject appointed no substitute in his place until after the introduction of the New Act.

Reinstatement.

6. Under Section 54 of the Madras City Municipal Act 1904, the following Commissioners lost their seats on the Corporation by failing to attend either three consecutive general meetings or six consecutive meetings. They were reinstated under the proviso to Section 55 of the Act.

Executive Officers.

7. Mr. Molony held charge of the office of the President till the afternoon of the 13th April 1919 when he proceeded on combined privilege leave and furlough without medical certificate for a period of 6 months. Khan Bahadur Muhammad Bazlullah Sahib Bahadur acted for him from the 14th to 28th April 1919 both days inclusive when Mr. Burkitt took charge from him and continued to hold the office during the rest of the year under report. Dr. K. Raghavendra Rao held office as Health Officer during the year and continued to be as Special Malaria Officer too. Khan Bahadur Muhammad Bazlullah Sahib Bahadur held office as Revenue Officer till the afternoon of 18th September 1919 when he was absent on privilege leave for one month and 12 days. During his absence M. R. Ry. S. Dandapani Iyer Avl., acted for him. Mr. Muhammad Bazlullah Sahib Bahadur rejoined duty as Revenue Officer on the expiry of this leave and continued to hold office till the afternoon of 25th November 1919 when he reverted to Government service. M. R. Ry. S. Dandapani Iyer Avl. was appointed to act as Revenue Officer from the said date and continued to hold office during the year. Mr. Coats, Engineer, left the service of the Madras Corporation for that of the Calcutta Corporation and Mr. J. E. Hensman who took charge of the office on the afternoon of 31st March 1919 continued to hold office during the year. Mr. J. W. Madeley continued as Special Engineer for the design and execution of the water and drainage works except for the period from 7th April 1919 to 14th October 1919 both days inclusive when he was absent on combined privilege leave and furlough. During his absence Mr. A. L. Houston, Senior Drainage Assistant Engineer, was in charge of the current duties of the office of the Special Engineer in addition to his own duties.

Meetings.

8. During the year the Corporation held twelve General Meetings, four Adjourned General Meetings and nine Special Meetings. The average number of Commissioners including the President present at each meeting of the Corporation under the Old Act was 20 as against 25 in the previous year and that of Councillors at each meeting of the Corporation under the Madras City Municipal Act, 1919, was 39. The percentage of attendance of the Commissioners under the Old Act to the sanctioned strength was 66.4 among divisional Commissioners, 48.5 among Institutional Commissioners and 30.8 among nominated Commissioners. The percentage of attendance of the Councillors as constituted under the Madras City Municipal Act, 1919 to the sanctioned strength was 92 among elected divisional Councillors, 47.5 among Institutional Councillors, and 81.9 among Councillors appointed by Government.

9. The Standing Committee under the Old Act met 24 times. The Standing Committees dealing respectively with (1) Taxation and Finance (2) Works, (3) Health and (4) Education constituted under the Madras City Municipal Act, 1919, met each 7, 6, 5, and 3 times respectively.

Committees and Sub-Committees.

10. (1) *Building line and encroachment of steps in streets.*—A Committee consisting of the President, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur P. Tyagaraya Chetti Garu, the Hon'ble Mr. M. D. Devadoss, M. R. Ry. C. P. Ramaswami Aiyar Avargal and Mr. A. J. Leech was appointed by the Corporation on 19th November 1918 to report on questions concerning (a) building lines and (b) encroachment of steps in streets. This committee submitted a report and the Corporation at its meeting held on 15th April 1919 resolved that its consideration be adjourned *sine die*.

(2) *Rates for Electric lights and fans.*—In Government Memorandum No. 3009 A-D 18-9 P. W. D. dated 13th March 1919 Government forwarded an advertisement published by the Madras Electric Supply Corporation in the local newspapers regarding the raising of the rates for lights and fans and requested the remarks of the President as to whether he had any objection to the proposed amendments being sanctioned by the Local Government. A Committee consisting of the President, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal, M. R. Ry. G. A. Natesan Avargal, Mr. E. R. Osborne, M. R. Ry. T. Ethiraja Mudaliar Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur N. C. Rajagopalachariar Avargal and Mr. A. J. Leech was appointed by the Corporation on 15-4-1919 to consider and report on the subject with special reference to the necessity for the increase in charges. The report of the Committee was considered by the Corporation on 14-5-1919 who adopted the report

laying special emphasis on the condition that the increase of rates shall be for 3 years only. This resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(3) *Comprehensive schemes for the water supply and drainage of the Madras City.*—In G. O. No. 893 M. Mis., dated 11-6-1919 Government enquired whether the Corporation proposed to take up the comprehensive schemes for the water supply and drainage of the Madras City after the restricted programme is completed and, if so, how the schemes were to be financed. The Corporation by whom this matter was considered on 16-9-1919 appointed a Committee consisting of the President the Hon'ble Dewan Bahadur P. Tyagaraya Chetti Garu, M. R. Ry. G. A. Natesan Avargal, the Hon'ble Mr. M. D. Devadoss, Mr. W. H. Nurse, M. R. Ry. K. C. Desikachariar Avargal and M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal to examine the question and report to the Corporation. The Corporation by whom the report of the Committee was considered on 24th February 1920 passed the following resolution:—

“The Corporation authorises the President to inform the Government that it will bear a third of the cost of the comprehensive schemes if the balance would be provided by the Government and the Government are satisfied with the soundness of the scheme as a scientific scheme of drainage.”

This resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(4) *Improvement of Parthasarathi Kuppam.*—The Corporation at its meeting held on 16th September 1919 appointed a Special Committee consisting of the President, M. R. Ry. G. A. Natesan Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur G. Narayanaswami Chetti Garu, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal and Rev. D. G. M. Leith to take into consideration the condition of Parthasarathi Kuppam and to make a report to the Corporation at an early date as to the steps that are immediately necessary to improve the general condition of the Kuppam. The Committee met on 15th November 1919 and their deliberations were not completed during the year under report.

(5) *Framing of Byelaws and regulations.*—The Corporation at its meeting held on 7th October 1919 appointed a committee consisting of the Hon'ble Dewan Bahadur Sir P. Thyagaraya Chetti Garu, M. R. Ry. Salla Guruswami Chetti Garu, M. R. Ry. G. A. Natesan Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur G. Narayanaswami Chetti Garu, Rev. D. G. M. Leith, M. R. Ry. C. P. Ramaswami Iyer Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur N. C. Rajagopalachariar Avargal, Mahammad Usman Sahib Bahadur, the Hon'ble Mr. M. D. Devadoss, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal and the President, for the purposes of framing bylaws, regulations and rules under the provisions of the New Act. The following draft regulations, rules and Byelaws were framed by the Committee:—

- (1) Regulations for the conduct of business at Meetings of the Council.
- (2) Rules for the election of the President of the Council.
- (3) Rules for the election of Members of Standing Committees of the Council.
- (4) Rules for the election of the Chairman of a Standing Committee.
- (5) Byelaws regarding water-supply to private premises.

The Corporation at its meeting held on 20th March 1920 appointed a new byelaw committee consisting of:—

in place of the one of 7th October 1919. The Committee continues to exist as its deliberations are not yet over.

(6) *Mr. A. M. Manickam Chetti's Market Committee*:— Mr. A. M. Manickam Chetti in his letter dated 2nd February 1920 submitted proposals for the construction of a vegetable market in Rasappa Chetti Street. The Standing Committee (Taxation and Finance) in their proceedings, dated 9th March 1920 recommended that the proposal of Mr. A. M. Manickam Chettiar for the construction of a vegetable market be accepted on condition that he executes a formal deed endowing 50 percent of the net income of the market for educational purposes to be settled in consultation with the Corporation, the Corporation undertaking not to give licenses for similar markets within the division. The Corporation at its meeting held on 16th March 1920 appointed a Committee consisting of M. R. Ry. K. C. Desikachariar Avargal, M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal, the President, M. R. Ry. O. Thanikachala Chettiar Avargal and M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur C. Cannan Chetti Garu to settle terms with Mr. Manickam Chettiar for the construction of the market. The deliberations of the Committee are not yet completed.

(7) *Corporation Provision Depot*.—The Corporation at its meeting held on 16th July 1918 approved the proposal to purchase and sell stores of food and necessary clothing at Central localities in the city for the benefit of the poorer classes

of the population and a Committee consisting of the President and Messrs. T. Rangachariar, S. Guruswami Chettiar and C. Srinivasachariar was accordingly appointed to go into the question of the feasibility of purchase and sale of food stuffs etc. The Committee submitted a report recommending that a provision depot be opened in North Georgetown with a capital of Rs. 25,000. This report was adopted by the Corporation at its meeting of 20th August 1918 who also appointed a small committee consisting of the above three Divisional Commissioners to supervise and conduct the provision depot. The depot was opened on 11th September 1918. All preparations and arrangements connected with this depot were kindly undertaken by Mr. S. Guruswami Chettiar, Commissioner for the 8th Division. The depot continued in view of the economic distress in the city till the end of December 1919.

M. R. Ry. S. Guruswami Chetti Garu forwarded his report on the working of the Corporation Rice Depots from 12th September 1918 to 31st December 1919 and the Corporation, at its meeting held on 18th May 1920, passed the following resolution:—

“In recording the report, the Corporation places on record the valuable services rendered by M. R. Ry. S. Guruswami Chetti Garu in managing the rice depots without any loss to the Corporation and which had done a great deal of useful service to the poor people in Madras.”

(8) *Improvement of housing accommodation to the poorer classes in the city*.—The Corporation at its meeting held on 30th March 1920 passed the following resolution:—

“That in view of the overcrowding and the difficulty of securing houses in the City of Madras a Committee of the Corporation be appointed to make a careful survey of the situation and to consider in consultation with the Tramway Company, the Railway Companies, the Government of Madras and any other bodies actively dealing with the housing question the steps that should be taken to increase the number of houses available for occupation by the poorer classes of the citizens of Madras.”

A Committee consisting of the following Councillors was appointed to go into the question:—

(9) *Level Crossings*:—The Corporation at its meeting held on 18th June 1918 passed the following resolution:—

“That in view of the great obstruction and inconvenience caused to public traffic by too frequent, often prolonged, and even, futile closings, with at times almost no interval between them, of the railway gates at the level crossings on the Tiruvattiyur High Road and the Moneghar Choultry Road, the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway Company be required to construct a ridge from Washermanpet to Moneghar Choultry and to lay their railway lines on the ridge, so that two roads will be available to public traffic at their present level, and that in the meantime the Railway Company be required to put up forthwith an overbridge for passengers at both of these level crossings.”

The Government to whom this resolution was communicated appointed a committee to consider the matter and submit definite recommendations as to the work which should be carried out and as to the apportionment of the cost between the Railway Company and the Madras Corporation. (G. O. No. 604-M., dated 15th April 1919.)

The Corporation at its meeting held on 25th June 1919 appointed a committee consisting of the Commissioners (now styled Councillors) of the 1st 3 divisions to meet the Committee appointed by the Government in the Government Order referred to above and discuss the matter.

The Committee appointed by Government met in November 1919 and submitted their report to Government.

Government in their memorandum No. 1052-1 M., dated 5th March 1920, forwarded a copy of the report of the Committee appointed by them and enquired whether the Corporation accepts the conclusions arrived at by the Committee and if so to settle with the Railway Company (1) alignment of the approach road and

of the overbridges at the Tiruvattiyur High Road, (2) the width of the two overbridges and (3) the apportionment of the cost of the new works.

The report was referred to the Council for consideration.

Tramways.

11. In G. O. No. 886 M. Mis., dated 1st June 1918 the Government informed the Corporation that the Government of India sanctioned the re-alignment of tramway line along the Body Guard Road, on the understanding that the Penitentiary and the Government House Bridges would be widened; and the Joint Manager of the Madras Electric Tramway Company forwarded a Draft Tramway Order for the tram lines to be laid along the Body Guard Road and Mount Road, and requested sanction to lay the tramway track in the following roads in anticipation of the completion of widening of the Government House Bridge:—

(a) From Spencer's corner and along Mount Road, coupling up with the lines at W. E. Smith's corner and at the Vijjanagaram fountain to the west side of Government House Bridge.

(b) From the east side of Government House Bridge along Body Guard lines connecting up to the existing track at General Hospital Bridge.

The Draft Tramway Order was approved by the Corporation with certain alterations at its meeting held on 15th October 1918 and was forwarded to Government on 17th October 1918 for their orders.

The Government in Memorandum No. 8354-1 M., dated 23rd January 1919, forwarded for remarks letters from the Joint Manager, Madras Electric Tramways and the Chairman of the Madras Trades Association offering certain remarks on the Draft Tramway Order.

The Corporation at its meeting held on 20th February resolved that the question of removal of congestion on the tram line by the replacement of the Chin-tadripet section by a line from Smith's corner along Mount Road and Body Guard Road should be settled definitely by Government before further proposals for extension are considered. The opinion of the Corporation was forwarded to Government.

Government in G. O. No. 726 M., dated 7th May 1919 and in Notification No. 441, dated 20th May 1919, published the Draft Tramway Order.

The Draft Tramway Order was approved by the Corporation with certain alterations at its meeting held on 17th June 1919 and was forwarded to Government for their orders.

The Government in G. O. No. 1107 M. Press, dated 23rd July 1919, directed the final publication in English, Tamil, Telugu and Hindustani in the

Fort St. George Gazette of the order authorising the construction of an additional tramway in the Madras City and regulating the working of such tramway.

As regards the cost to be incurred in widening the Government House and Penitentiary Bridges necessitated by this new alignment of the tramway, the Corporation at its meeting of 20th November 1917 already resolved that the Tramway Company, the Madras Corporation and the Government should pay the same in the proportion of one-third each. This resolution together with the letter from the Tramway Company declining to commit themselves beyond the maximum of Rs. 1,06,667 being a third of the cost of widening the bridges as estimated by Government in Memorandum No. 7109-M, dated 26th October 1917, was duly communicated to Government on 10th December 1917.

The Government in Memorandum No. 8-A-1 M. O. dated 5th May 1919, forwarded to the Corporation a copy of a letter, dated 22nd April 1919 of the Madras Electric Tramways (1904) Ltd., agreeing to increase their contribution towards the cost of widening the Penitentiary and Government House Bridges to one and a half lakhs and requested the Corporation to report whether it is also willing to similarly increase its contribution to a lakh and a half on the understanding that the Government will meet the balance of expenditure on the widening of the bridges, the cost of which was estimated at Rs. 5.71 lakhs.

The Corporation at its meeting held on 25th June 1919 resolved to contribute Rs. 1,50,000 towards the cost of widening the bridges and this was communicated to Government on 4th July 1919.

Resolutions.

12. The following are among the more important resolutions passed by the Council during the year under review :—

(1) *Transfer of Rayapettah Hospital to Government.*—Government in their Memorandum No. 47-1 Medical dated 22nd January 1919 informed the Corporation that if the Rayapettah Hospital be transferred to Government, the Corporation would be relieved of an expenditure of two-thirds of the cost of its maintenance, i.e., Rs. 36,000 and that if this amount was capitalised it would amount to a grant of Rs. 7.20 lakhs and requested a report as to whether the Corporation was prepared to make over the hospital to Government for 3 lakhs of rupees on the understanding that the money would be employed on medical purposes, viz., the provision of an infectious diseases hospital in Madras. The Corporation considered the question at its meeting held on 20th February 1919 and passed the following resolution:—

“That the President be requested to address the Government stating that the Corporation is prepared to hand over the Rayapettah hospital, provided it be

re-imbursed the value of construction and improvement as well as equipment, and that the Corporation be relieved of the maintenance and expense in respect of the hospital, a valuation statement of building, equipment, etc., being made before the next meeting of the Corporation for consideration.”

This resolution was communicated to Government.

The Corporation Engineer furnished the following valuation of the Rayapettah Hospital buildings (excluding medical equipment to the Hospital)—

Buildings	Rs. 3,30,000
Land	Rs. 1,00,000

Lt. Col. R. Bryson valued the cost of furniture, etc., of the hospital roughly at Rs. 25,000 excluding drugs.

On the basis of the estimates furnished by the City Engineer, Government Public Works Department and the Surgeon in-charge, the Corporation at its meeting held on 25th June 1919 resolved to hand over the Rayapettah Hospital to Government for a sum of Rs. 3,75,000 and to earmark the sum so realised for the construction of an Infectious Diseases Hospital. The hospital was accordingly transferred to Government with effect from 1st October 1919. Building with its equipments was formally transferred to Government by a deed of conveyance executed by the Corporation on 4th October 1919.

A sum of Rs. 3,75,000, was received from Government on 27th October 1919.

(2) *Eligibility of Corporation servants for seconded service under Government.*—With reference to Government Memorandum No. 1156-1 Medical, dated 8th May 1919 requesting the views of the Corporation on the proposal of the Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras to combine pensionable service under the Corporation with pensionable service under Government the Corporation at its meeting held on 25th June 1919 unanimously accepted that its servants should be eligible for seconded service under Government.

This was duly communicated to Government.

The Government in their Memorandum No. 2382-1 Medical, dated 4th October 1919 pointed out that what was intended was that Government should undertake to bear, under rule 1 of Article 801 of the Civil Service Regulations, a proportionate share of the pension ultimately payable from Municipal funds to those medical men who are employed in the Corporation service and transferred hereafter, temporarily or permanently, to service under Government, and that the proposed transfer to be restricted to subordinates who are private medical men.

The Corporation at its meeting held on 18th November 1919 declined to accept the proposal of Government.

The resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(3). *Application of the Civil Service regulations to the Corporation Establishment*:—The Corporation at its meeting held on 12th January 1920 approved the proposal that the provisions of the Civil Service Regulations should apply to the Corporation establishment including the officers appointed under sections 85, 86, 87 and 89 and that subject to the provisions of sections 86, 88 and 94 the Commissioner, the Standing Committee, the Council and the Local Government shall be the corresponding authority to the Head of a Department, the Local Government, the Government of India and the Secretary of State respectively.

The sanction of Government was not received during the year under report to this proposal. It was, however, since been received.

(4). *Indian Reform*:—The Corporation in considering the Government Report on Indian Reform passed the following resolution at its meeting held on 12th January 1920:—

“On behalf of the citizens of Madras, this Corporation most respectfully offer their sincerest gratitude to his Imperial Majesty the King Emperor for his Royal Proclamation of the 23rd December 1919 to the People of India and also convey their heartfelt thanks to the Right Hon'ble Mr. Montague and Lord Sinha for their valuable services in connection with the Indian Reforms”

(5). *Sale of rice to menials on labour*.—With a view to relieve the economic distress prevailing in the country the Corporation at its meeting held on 16th March 1920 resolved to purchase rice locally for sale to menials on labour (monthly wages) at a rate of 41 measures per rupee as a temporary measure which still continues.

(6). *Legislation for the prevention of Juvenile smoking*:—The Government Memorandum No. 7441-1 M, dated 21st November 1919 forwarded a copy of discussion at the meeting of the Legislative Council, dated 19th March 1919, on a resolution on the subject of the prevention of juvenile smoking and requested that if the Corporation desire any special legislation in regard to juvenile smoking, their views may be furnished to the Government at a very early date. The Corporation at its meeting held on 20th March 1920 decided to refer the subject to the Health and Education Committees for consideration and report.

The Corporation at its meeting held on 20th April 1920 approved the recommendation of the Standing Committee (Health) and Standing Committee (Education) that legislation to control juvenile smoking was necessary.

The resolution of the Corporation was duly communicated to Government.

(7). *Working Men's Canteen at Parthasarathy Kuppam*:—With reference to Government Memorandum No. 7323-1 M, dated 20th November 1919 forwarding a copy of the reference of the Board of Revenue, Separate Revenue, submitting proposals for the Working Men's Canteen at Parthasarathy, Kuppam, Triplicane, and enquiring whether the Corporation is willing to

undertake the scheme from its own funds or give it any support, the Corporation at its meeting held on 20th March 1920 passed the following resolution “The Corporation while regretting its inability to contribute at present to the cost of a Working Men's Club is of opinion that it is most desirable that such clubs should be found and maintained in various parts of the City.”

The resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(8). *Rajah Sir Ramaswami Mudaliar Lying-in-Hospital*.—In view of the present policy of the Government of taking over headquarter hospitals, the Corporation resolved at its meeting held on 29th March 1920 to request the Government to take over Rajah Sir Ramaswami Mudaliar's Lying-in-hospital at Royapuram, with a view to effect a saving of Rs. 20,000 a year and over, which is now being spent by the Corporation on it.

The resolution was duly communicated to the Government and the decision of Government is awaited.

(9). *Revision of Corporation Establishments*.—The Corporation at its meeting held on 21st May 1918 approved a proposal to place M. R. Ry. S. Dandapani Aiyar Avargal on special duty for a period of three months in connection with the revision of the establishment of the various departments of the Corporation. No report was however submitted by Mr. Dandapani Aiyar on this matter but his suggestions on routine matters were approved by the then President (Mr. J. C. Molony).

Meanwhile Mr. Burkitt assumed charge of the office of the Commissioner. He undertook this work in connection with the Budget Estimate for 1920-21.

The Standing Committee at their meeting dated 10th December 1919 deputed M. R. Ry. N. C. Rajagopalachariar Avargal and Md. Usman Sahib Bahadar to go through the details with the President.

The President in consultation with the sub-committee framed a scheme for the revision of the establishment and placed it before the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee on the 3rd February 1920 approved the scheme with slight modifications. The New Council at its meeting dated 23rd February 1920 resolved to refer back the Budget with the proposition statement to the Standing Committee for further consideration with the recommendation, amongst others that in fixing the pay of the Establishment the principles laid down in G. O. No. 146, dated 18th February 1920, should be adhered to as far as possible in consultation with the newly created Standing Committees.

The Standing Committee (Taxation and Finance) in consultation with the Standing Committee (Works) at their meeting dated 6th March 1920 recom-

mended that all employees in superior service in receipt of a salary of Rs. 90 and less should be granted an increase of Rs. 10 per mensem subject to a minimum of Rs. 35 and those drawing between Rs. 90 and 100 to receive a salary of Rs. 100. The minimum pay of employees on the inferior establishment was determined at Rs. 15.

The Corporation approved the recommendations of the Standing Committees at the their meeting held on 29th March 1920 and also granted a temporary increase of Rs. 15 to the Inspector of Taxes and assessors of the Revenue Department.

(10) *Water-supply to the Madras City.*— The Committee appointed by Government in G. O. No. 1576-M., dated 15th September 1917 to inspect and report on the Madras Waterworks and the City water-supply generally submitted a report on the subject. The Government in Memorandum No 4303/1. M. dated 20th July 1918, forwarded the report of the Committee to the Corporation with the request that it should report what steps it proposed to take on the recommendations of the committee. The Special Engineer also submitted a note on the report of the committee. The Corporation by whom the whole matter was considered on 26th November 1918 passed the following resolution:—

“The Corporation after considering the various defects in the waterworks as disclosed in the report of the waterworks committee, some of which are stated to have arisen from the unauthorised deviations from the sanctioned designs and in view of the highly technical points involved in the consideration of some important portions thereof, the Corporation resolved to refer the committee's report (together with the Special Engineer's reply thereto and the remarks of the Commissioners) to the Government for such action as they may consider necessary after consulting the Sanitary Commissioner to the Government of India or other high authority”.

The resolution was duly communicated to Government and Government in G. O. No. 546 M. Press, dated 22nd April 1920, forwarded a copy of the Memorandum framed by Major Morrison with regard to the water supply to the city and communicated the further steps which the Corporation has to undertake in regard to its improvement. The matter is receiving the attention of the Corporation

Revenue Administration.

13. The current Revenue under Profession tax, combined Property taxes and tax on Vehicles and Animals exceeded that of the previous year by Rs. 2,68,059-1-7 of which Rs. 81,311-11-7 was from property tax, Rs. 1,66,465-8-0 was from Profession tax and Rs. 20,281-14-0 from Vehicle and Animal tax.

14. The number of warrants issued in the year under report was 192.

There were 32 appeals against assessments under Property tax in which the parties were not satisfied with the order of the Commissioner. They were placed before the Standing Committee and were disposed of by them on 7-8-20. Besides these one case under Profession was also disposed of by them on the same date.

Finance.*

Capital Account.

15. The year opened with a balance of Rs. 5,17,947-0-11. The Corporation received a free grant of Rs. 5,00,000 from Government for improvement of water-supply and drainage. A sum of Rs. 3,75,000 was received from Government for the Royapettah Hospital buildings and appliances which were taken over by them from the Corporation. Rs. 15,513-5-7 was realised by the sale of materials of the Guzili bazaar buildings which were damaged by the fire and Rs. 8,679-3-2 as interest on investment of surplus funds. The amount recovered on account of advances made in the previous years was Rs. 35-11-3 and that transferred from the revenue account out of the Government grants to meet the expenditure incurred on construction of certain permanent buildings was Rs. 6,360. The total receipts inclusive of the opening balance amounted to Rs. 14,23,535-4-11. The amount spent on construction of buildings was Rs. 53,043-2-4 and that on improvement of water-supply and drainage Rs. 8,01,109-1-11 including a sum of Rs. 4,79,250-0-0 held in England for the payment of the cost of pumping machinery and plant. The expenditure on extension of electric lighting was Rs. 1,40,487-8-0. The total expenditure thus amounted to Rs. 9,94,639-12-3. The cost of extension of electric lighting and of construction of certain permanent buildings amounting in all to Rs. 1,83,709-2-1 was met from the sale proceeds of the Royapettah Hospital buildings and it will be repaid in 1920-21 from the revenue account. The balance left at the close of the year was Rs. 4,28,895-8-8, of which Rs. 1,12,711-7-1 relate to the water and drainage fund and the rest to buildings.

Revenue Account.

16. The balance at the beginning of the year was Rs. 5,71,200-9-11 as compared with Rs. 8,77,997-1-0 in the previous year. The revenue from all sources

exclusive of special grants to the extent of Rs. 1,02,000 from Government and from a private individual amounted to Rs. 37,38, 409-8-0 against Rs. 34,83,595-13-10 in 1918-19, thus showing an increase of Rs. 2,54,813-10-2. Towards this income Municipal taxes contributed Rs. 26,94,152-5-2 and Municipal fees and miscellaneous receipts Rs. 10,44,256-2-10 as compared with Rs. 24,95,635-4-7 and Rs. 9,87,960-9-3 respectively in the previous year. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 42,67,523-5-8 against an estimate of Rs. 42,28,140 and against the actuals of Rs. 39,10,642-4-11 in 1918-19. The balance left at the close of the year was Rs. 1,44,036-12-3.

Tax on Companies & Profession Tax.

Current.

17. During the second half year of 1919-20 the assessments were revised with reference to the new schedule of rates prescribed in the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 with the result that the gross current demand rose from Rs. 2,12,602-8-0 in 1918-19 to Rs. 3,79,068 in the year under report.

There were no reductions or remissions.

The current collections of the year amounted to Rs. 3,59,298-6-6 against Rs. 2,11,197-8-0 in the previous year. The balance left uncollected at the end of the year was Rs. 19,769-9-6. Of this Rs. 15,500-1-6 has since been collected. The percentage of collection to demand was 94.73.

Arrear.

18. At the beginning of the year the arrear demand stood at Rs. 1,487-7-0 against Rs. 3,768 in 1918-19. This rose to Rs. 3,807-7-0 on account of subsequent assessment, but was reduced to Rs. 3,454-15-0 owing to remissions and reductions on appeal. The net arrear demand stood at Rs. 3,454-15-0. Of this Rs. 3,184-15-0 was collected during the year and Rs. 10 was written off by the Standing Committee as irrecoverable. The balance left uncollected was Rs. 260-0-0. The percentage of collection to demand was 92.18.

Property Tax.

Current.

19. The gross current demand under this head amounted to Rs. 21,86,647-7-10 against Rs. 21,05,335-12-3 in the preceding year.

The net increase of Rs. 81,311-11-7 over the demand of the previous year, after allowing a deduction of 10 per cent. for repairs, etc., under Section 100 (2) of the new Act was due to revision of assessments and it includes a sum of Rs. 38,399 collected from the Port Trust, newly brought to taxation under the present Act.

20. 32 appeals were preferred against those enhancements of assessments against 14 in the previous year. These appeals have since been disposed of by the Standing Committee.

The net increase after making up the 10 per cent reduction for repairs was Rs. 81,311-11-7 as against Rs. 1,50,392-2-3 in the preceding year and the net demand amounted to Rs. 21,86,647-7-10 as against Rs. 21,05,100-7-1 in the previous year.

21. The net collections amounted to Rs. 20,66,198-5-7 as against Rs. 20,39,906-1-8 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 12,972-5-11 was remitted on account of vacancy and other causes under Section 105 (1) as against Rs. 13,016-0-3 in the preceding year. The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 1,07,476-12-4. The percentage of collection to demand was 94.49. The fall in the percentage was due to extraordinary pressure of work brought on by the introduction of the new Act, in the middle of the year, in connection with the preparation of the Electoral Roll, General Elections and redistribution of the City into thirty divisions.

Only 153 warrants were issued during the year. The incidence of taxation per head of population was Rs. 4-3-5 against Rs. 4-0-11 in the previous year. The total current demand, collection and balance under the combined property tax as compared with the corresponding figures for the previous two years are exhibited in Appendix I, Table I.

Arrear.

22. The arrear balance at the beginning of the year was Rs. 57,003-3-10 which by subsequent amendments came to Rs. 58,333-9-5. Of this demand, a sum of Rs. 50,967-10-11 was realised during the year and Rs. 821-12-3 was remitted on account of vacancy and other causes. The balance left outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 6,544-2-3. The percentage of collection to demand was 87.39 against 85.81 in the previous year. The total demand, collection, remission and balance under arrears as compared with the corresponding figures for the previous two years are shown in Appendix I, Table II.

The details relating to each of the combined property taxes dealt with above, viz., House, water and drainage and lighting taxes are exhibited separately in Appendix I Statements III A. and III B.

Tax on Carriages & Animals under Section 116.

Current.

23. The net demand under this tax amounted to Rs. 1,40,784-10-0 against Rs. 1,20,502-12-0 in the preceding year.

Appendix I, Table 3, compares the numbers of vehicles and animals assessed for the year under the several classes of Schedule IV, Part III of the Act, with the corresponding figures for the previous year.

24. The current collection amounted to Rs. 1,29,961-3-0 which included Rs. 9,724 received in advance for the ensuing year. The net collections for the year amount to Rs. 1,20,237-8-0 which together with Rs. 7,174-0-0 prepaid in the previous year for the year under report amounted to Rs. 1,27,411-8-0 against an estimate of Rs. 1,27,000-0-0. The balance left uncollected at the close of the year was Rs. 13,373-2-0 and of this Rs. 3,333-0-0 has since been collected.

Arrear.

25. The arrear demand at the beginning of the year for vehicles and animals was Rs. 6,027-0-9 which by subsequent amendments and additions rose to Rs. 7,207-0-9. Of this, assessments amounting to Rs. 1,886-10-0 were found on investigation to be erroneous and were cancelled. The actual demand thus stood at Rs. 5,320-6-9. Of this, Rs. 3,896-14-0 was collected and Rs. 2-10-9 was written off leaving a balance of Rs. 1,420-14-0 at the close of the year. The percentage of collections to demand was 70.17 for vehicles and 82.89 for animals against 91.22 and 91.06 respectively in the previous year.

Tax on Carts and other Vehicles Without Springs, under Section 124

Current.

26. The demand under this tax amounted to Rs. 39,504 against Rs. 34,332 in the previous year. The number of carts voluntarily offered for registration was 8,726 against 8,762 in the previous year and the number seized under Section 127 for non-registration fell from 2,742 to 2,578. Of the 2,578 carts seized, 2,565 were released on payment and only 13 carts remained for disposal at the close of the year.

27. The current collections inclusive of Rs. 1,804 received in advance for the ensuing year amounted to Rs. 39,767. The net collections excluding the advance payment were Rs. 37,963 which, with Rs. 1,423 collected in the previous year towards the demand of the year under report, amounted to Rs. 39,391 against Rs. 34,209 in the preceding year. A sum of Rs. 63 was refunded as having been erroneously collected on carts stabled outside the City, leaving a balance of Rs. 50 due on the 13 carts seized and awaiting disposal at the close of the year. The percentage of collections to the demand was 99.71 as against 99.64 in 1918-19.

Arrear.

28. The arrear demand at the beginning of the year was Rs. 34 which by subsequent amendments rose to Rs. 91. Of this, Rs. 72 was collected leaving a

balance of Rs. 19 being the tax on 5 carts seized and awaiting disposal at the close of the year and the difference between the taxes payable and the amount realized by sale in the case of 5 carts.

Tolls on Vehicles and Animals entering Municipal Limits.

29. The right of collecting tolls was sold by public auction for Rs. 51,600 as against Rs. 55,000 in the previous year. The amount was fully recovered during the year.

Revenue derived from Municipal Property and Powers apart from Taxation.

Current.

30. *Rents of lands and buildings*:—The demand under this head was Rs. 38,374-10-3 against Rs. 38,361-6-9 in the preceding year. The collections amounted to Rs. 35,380-15-1 against Rs. 36,115-14-1 in 1918-19.

31. *Moore Market*:—The income amounted to Rs. 32,751-0-7 against an estimate of Rs. 30,000. Out of this amount, a sum of Rs. 435 was realized through the Court in the case filed against late fowl stalls contractor Abdul Mazith Khan Sahib. The increase of Rs. 2,751-0-7 is chiefly due to the enhancement of rents from the fowl and game stalls contract.

32. *Distrain Fees*:—The distraint fees realized during the year amounted to Rs. 44. There were 34 distraints made in the year against 36 in the previous year.

33. *License Fees on Timber and Firewood*.—The gross collections under this head amounted to Rs. 1,83,998-15-9 which includes a sum of Rs. 3,109-0-8 relating to the previous year paid by the collecting agencies during the year under report and excludes Rs. 2,083-15-3 being fees levied and received by the collecting agencies for March 1920 but not remitted to this office till after the close of the year. The corresponding gross collection for 1918-19 amounted to Rs. 1,90,418-9-0.

Refunds of fees on exports granted during the year amounted to Rs. 20,164-0-6 against Rs. 16,998-4-3 in the previous year. The net collections for the year stood at Rs. 1,63,834-15-3 against an estimate of Rs. 1,40,000.

In addition to the refund of Rs. 20,164 paid from the current collections on account of timber exported from imports made during the year, a sum of Rs. 29,075-7-4 was refunded from collections of previous years under the head of "Refund of other than current collections."

34. *Grass Farm, Tondiarpet.*—The farm was worked departmentally and the total receipts from all sources amounted to Rs. 57,699-2-8 against Rs. 55,118-12-9 in the previous year. There was a balance of Rs. 3,251-14-3 left uncollected at the end of the year, of which a sum of Rs. 1,103-14-3 was for grass supplied to consumers which has since been collected. The balance of Rs. 2,148 was due by the Toddy Contractor who did not pay the amount pending settlement of a claim he preferred against the Corporation for compensation for loss sustained by him owing to failure to supply him with sewage for the irrigation of certain groves of coconut and palmyra trees leased to him, due to the construction of an Out-fall sewer at the southern end of the farm for the conveyance of the sewage into the sea. The Standing Committee (Taxation and Finance) subsequently sanctioned the grant of Rs. 1,346 to him which was not paid but was adjusted against the above sum due by him. The total receipts from the farm may therefore be placed at Rs. 60,149-0-11. Consequent on the construction of the Out-fall sewer referred to above, the irrigation of the farm was ordered to be stopped from the southern limit to a distance of 1500 feet northwards, with the channel as the western boundary and a straight line thence to the sea. The plot enclosed in this space was not irrigated for about 10 months and there was a loss of about Rs. 8,000 in the outturn in consequence.

Owing to economic distress cattle grazers found it difficult to keep their cattle, and trespass again increased this year with the result that 187 cattle were seized and sent to the pound against 83 in the previous year. The following prosecutions were instituted during the year in connection with cattle trespass and theft of grass.

4 women for stealing grass—Convicted and fined Re. 1 each or 6 hours imprisonment.

3 men for trespass and assault—Convicted and fined Rs. 25 each. In addition one was sentenced to 4 months rigorous imprisonment and the other two to 3 months each.

During the year there was no erosion of the sea curtailing the farm as in past years, and the area irrigable stood at 101 cawnies 22 grounds and 1287 sq. ft. as at the end of the last year.

The total expenditure on the maintenance of the farm amounted to Rs. 39,833-12-2 against Rs. 35,112-11-5 in the previous year. The increase in the cost was due to the wages of the coolies having been raised on account of dearness of provisions.

35. *Private Markets.*—There were 42 markets in the City and the license fee collections amounted to Rs. 3,600 against Rs. 3,800 in the previous year. One cattle market was proposed to be opened in Strahans Road close to a similar one existing in the locality and it was not allowed.

36. *Fees for Licenses, Registration, etc.*—The fees collected under this head amounted to Rs. 31,693 as detailed in Table No. 22, Appendix II, against Rs. 180,902-4-0 in the previous year.

As in previous years care was taken to see that sanitary conditions as required by the bylaws were enforced on licensees. In doing so a general policy was adopted to refuse licenses outright in cases in which the conditions imposed in the previous year's licenses were not carried out. The fees which were in force under the old Act III of 1904 up to 30th September 1919 continued to be so under the New Act IV of 1919 till the 31st March 1920.

37. *Interest on Investment.*—A sum of Rs. 1,523-8-0 was realised as interest on the securities in favour of Raja Sir Ramaswami Mudaliar Maternity Hospital. The interest derived from investment of the surplus funds amounted to Rs. 10,849-0-2 under the revenue and capital accounts put together as compared with Rs. 19,479-6-11 in 1918-19.

38. *Grants and Contributions.*—Rs. 6,42,101 as detailed below were received by the Corporation as grants and contributions during the year:—

(1) Rs. 20,000 from Government for the maintenance of the Mount and Poonamallee Roads;

(2) Rs. 4,219 from Government for the repair of the bridges over the Cooum and Buckingham Canal;

(3) Rs. 2,000 from Government towards the Zoological collections in the People's Park.

(4) Rs. 13,607 from Government towards compensation for withholding sanction for the issue of licenses by the Corporation for places used for the sale of spirituous and intoxicating liquors;

(5) Rs. 275 from Government for the payment of batta to pregnant women in Raja Sir Ramaswami Mudaliar Maternity Hospital;

(6) A free grant of Rs. 5,00,000 from Government for the improvement of water-supply and drainage;

(7) A special grant of Rs. 1,00,000 from Government for sanitary works;

(8) A special grant of Rs. 2,000 from M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariar Avargal for constructing a reading room in the Model play ground at Egmore.

With the exception of Nos. 6, 7 and 8, all are recurring grants.

39. *Payment for water supplied for non-domestic purposes:—*

(a) *Current.*—The demand under this head amounted to Rs. 2,89,736-14-4 as against Rs. 1,93,454-15-8 in the previous year. Current collections came to Rs. 2,83,550-8-4 as against Rs. 1,89,896-4-2 last year. Rs. 6,186-6-0 were outstanding at the end of the year as against Rs. 3,922-14-10 in the previous year.

(b) *Arrears.*—The arrear outstanding at the beginning of the year was Rs. 3,922-14-10, which was fully collected during the year.

General Incidence of Taxation.

40. The incidence of taxation per head of population under all taxes including tolls was Rs. 5-3-1 against Rs. 4-12-11 in the previous year. Excluding tolls, the incidence was Rs. 5-1-6 against Rs. 4-11-4 in 1918-19.

Advances.

41. At the beginning of the year, a sum of Rs. 1,96,443-6-8 was outstanding of which permanent advances held by the several officers of the Corporation amounted to Rs. 1,14,610 and miscellaneous advances to Rs. 81,833-6-8. The "Permanent Advances" are represented almost entirely by the money invested in the stock at the Corporation Stores and the "Miscellaneous Advances" include payments made on account, amounts for which bills have been sent out, amounts paid in advance or in deposit but awaiting adjustment. During the year, permanent advances amounting to Rs. 153 and miscellaneous advances to Rs. 61,825-3-6 were adjusted and fresh advances were made to the extent of Rs. 110 "Permanent" and Rs. 4,97,231-6-9 "Miscellaneous". The advances outstanding at the close of the year were thus Rs. 1,14,567 under "Permanent" and Rs. 5,17,239-9-11 under "Miscellaneous" or Rs. 6,31,806-9-11 in the aggregate against Rs. 1,96,443-6-8 at the end of the previous year.

EXPENDITURE.

Grant I—(Public Works.)

Communications.

New Works.

42. Out of Rs. 61,500 provided in the Revised Estimate under the above head, Rs. 46,945 were spent on the following important works:—

(1) Roads were raised near the approaches to the culvert at the junction of Kanda Pillai Street, Subraya Gramani Street and Venkatachala Pillai Street.

(2) Lands were acquired for the improvement of roads and streets at the places noted below:—

(a) In R. S. No. 2340 of Triplicane for widening Venkatesa Naick Street, 27th Division.

(b) In R. S. No. 1633 of Egmore for rounding off the corner of Victoria Crescent junction of Commander-in-Chief Road.

(c) In R. S. Nos. 272 and 274 of Triplicane for connecting Byramjung Bahadur Street with Mount Road.

(d) In R. S. No. 8846 of Georgetown for widening Hanumantharayan Koil Street.

(e) Land in R. S. No. 47 of Purasawalkam for rounding off the corner at the junction of Audiappa Mudali Street with Lawders Gate Road.

(f) In R. S. Nos. 1042 (part), 1043/1 (part) and 1043/2 (part) of Egmore for widening Venkatachala Naicken Street.

(3) Culverts at the junction of (1) Subba Nayudu Street and Avadanam Paupier Road, and (2) Krishnan Koil Lane and Avadanam Paupier Road, were constructed during the year.

(4) A side channel along Thiruvengada Mudali Street was constructed.

(5) Besides the cost on above works, the expenditure under this head includes Rs. 25,000 being the first contribution paid to Government towards the widening of bridges near the Government House and the Penitentiary, for Tramways, as approved in G. O. No. 1095 W., dated 22nd August 1919.

The decrease in expenditure is due to payment not having been made for acquisition of land for widening Jani Jan Khan Bahadur Street and also to certain other works completed but claims not preferred within the year.

43. *Private Streets*.—The private streets going by the name of Bashyam Reddi 1st, 2nd & 3rd streets, measuring 850 ft., 850 feet and 650 feet respectively in 16th Division were acquired by the Corporation at a cost of Rs. 1,900 for use as public streets.

Under Section 246 of the Old Act, Makthoom Sherif Street, was taken over and declared public during the year. Under the New Act (Section 219) Muzaffer Jung Bahadur Street (R. S. No. 1035 of Triplicane) and Pallappan Street (R. S. No. 1363 of Triplicane) were declared as public.

In addition, Nowroji Road (Length 1422 feet) in 22nd Division was handed over to the Corporation during the year for maintenance.

Lands in R. S. No. 332 of Tondiarpet east of Thandavamoorthi Chetty Street, 1st Division were alienated by Government for forming a main street and 2 cross streets measuring 435 feet in length.

Repairs.

The total expenditure incurred for the reform of roads including tar and asphalt, cost of departmental quarrying and completion of the tar-macadam plant, maintenance of bridges, culverts, etc., was Rs. 4,39,618 against the Revised Estimate of Rs. 4,50,260.

During the year under review, the scheme of departmental quarrying and supply was inaugurated and has proved a success. A siding was laid at Periamet Depot by the South Indian Railway and handed over to the Corporation in March 1920. The following table shows the quantity of blue metal received, its freight and unloading charges incurred and number of trucks availed of, etc.

The rate per 100 c. ft. of blue metal works out to about Rs. 16 at the Periamet siding during the year.

45. *Reform and repair of roads*.—Two miles 1 furlong and 62½ yards of unmetalled roads were metalled for the first time. The number of squares (100 sq. ft.) laid in the reform of roads was 37,840.44 which corresponds to 35.83 miles of roads 20 feet wide. (Vide Table 19, Appendix II.)

The cost of reform including materials, carting and laying but exclusive of rolling was Rs. 1,24,815. The 35.83 miles of roads reformed cost Rs. 3,483 p mile as against Rs. 3,955 in 1918-19. 46. *Tarring roads*.—The length of roads tarred for the first time during the year was 2 miles 156½ yards and that of roads re-tarred was 2 miles 2 furlongs and 47½ yards, aggregating to a total length of 4 miles 2 furlongs and 204 yards. At the end of the year, the total length of tarred roads in the city was 12 miles or 140½ yards.

47. *Bridges and Culverts*.—The bridges at the following places were repaired during the year:—

- (1) General Hospital Bridge.
- (2) Sunkumar Street Bridge.
- (3) Foot bridge on the Buckingham Canal in Parthasarathy Kuppam
- (4) College and Munro Bridges.
- (5) Adyar Bridge.

and also minor repairs to about 11 bridges were also effected during the year. Scraping and cement plastering of the bottom girders of the Napier Bridge and painting the same with "Cuirass" paint was in progress at the end of the year.

The culvert in Mandapam Road and 2 more in D'Costa Road were extended and certain minor repairs to eleven culverts in Ennore Road and one in 21st Division were made during the year.

Buildings.

Rs. 96,164 were spent on new works and Rs. 48,949 on repairs.

New Works.

49. (1) *Model Schools*:—Two schools, one in Thiruvathiyur High Road and the other in Oobrapalayam, reported to have been under progress last year were completed during the year. Two more schools, one at the Harbour site and the other at the site of old Slaughter House in Mirsahibpet, were commenced at the end of the year and are now in progress. A manual training class was constructed for the Edapaliam Model School at a cost of Rs. 1,887.

(2) (a) *Works carried out for the Health Department*:—(a) Constructing a compound wall, platform, etc., for a lorry-loading station at Vasapmode, reported to have been under progress last year, was completed, and the construction of a lorry-loading station at Appavoo Gramany Street for which land was acquired last year, was well advanced at the end of the year.

(b) A laboratory behind Ripon Buildings at a cost of Rs. 9,400 was nearing completion at the end of the year.

(c) *Latrines*.—Flush-out latrines of 20 seats each in (a) Venkatarangam Pillai Street, (b) Ammen Koil Street and (c) Ebramjee Saib Street, under progress last year, were completed during the year.

A combined flush-out latrine of 12 seats and a urinal was constructed near the Law College Pumping Station where Military land (650 sq. feet) was acquired last year for the purpose.

Another flush-out latrine for the use of fishermen at Nochikuppam, Mylapore, was erected during the year and at Corporation Stores, a flush-out latrine of 6 seats was constructed for the use of its staff.

(d) *Cattle, cart and pail depots*:—The existing pan-tiled roof of one of the sheds in "A" depot was removed and replaced by Mangalore tiles and new teakwood scantlings. Retaining walls and mangers for five cattle sheds were provided during the year in this Depot.

Draining 'F' bullock depot and connecting it with sewer in Barber's Bridge Road, and (2) reconstructing the fallen gram depot with new iron trusses and corrugated sheets both reported to have been in progress last year, were completed.

Constructing scavengers' lines of 60 houses at Goyatope at a cost of Rs. 28,067 was under progress during the year.

(e) *Dispensary*:—A compound wall was constructed in rear of Washermanpet Dispensary.

(f) *Burial grounds*:—Eleven platforms were constructed in Washermanpet Burial Ground at a cost of Rs. 1,193 and a corrugated iron roof shed was erected at Kistnampet Burial Ground where the construction of a compound wall and a cremation platform was under progress at the end of the year.

(g) *Dhobikhana*:—The construction of a dhobikhana at Robinson Park and the extensions to the existing one at Chetput reported to have been under progress last year were completed at a cost of Rs. 21,859 and Rs. 15,971 respectively during the year.

(h) *Bathing fountains*:—A bathing fountain with 6 taps was erected in Mustura Begumpettah Road, 29th Division and improvements to the existing bathing fountain at Badriah Garden Street were under progress during the year.

(3) *Other works*:—At Kilpauk, servants' godowns attached to the quarters of pumping station staff were completed and the overseers' quarters were under progress at the end of the year.

A shed was erected for storing petrol at Corporation workshop.

50. *Repairs*:—Details of repairs and improvements to Municipal buildings and the cost of such works are shown in Appendix I, Statement II. A. Part II.

Water-supply and Drainage—Special Works Department.

51. The total expenditure on the new Water and Drainage works up to 31st March 1920, was as follows:—

52. The value of work executed during the year under review is less than has been the case for a number of years. The principal reasons are:—

- (1) The Waterworks Restricted Programme has been practically completed, additional expenditure being met mainly by the sale of old pipes.
- (2) It has been impossible to obtain plant and materials from abroad. In consequence, the only stoneware pipe sewers laid were those sizes for which pipes could be obtained in India, that is, only the smaller sizes.
- (3) The absence of Special Engineer and of his Chief Assistant on leave. The Special Engineer was away from April 7th to October 14th 1919, and the Senior Assistant left on November 26th and had not returned at the end of the year. This absence of the Chief Engineers, when the staff was already at a minimum, necessarily affected the amount of work done, as the engineer in charge had to devote all his attention to the works already in hand and had little time to get out designs for fresh work. This has been particularly marked in the case of the anti-malaria

and stormwater drainage works, and in the detailed reconsideration of the drainage of some areas, which the Special Engineer is anxious to carry out.

Another factor has been the uncertainty as to the fate of the Special Works Department. This has naturally caused some of the best of the staff to seek work elsewhere, and it had been impossible to find adequate substitutes.

The most noteworthy case is that of the Chief Drainage Assistant, who has been appointed Drainage Executive Engineer to the Calcutta Corporation, and gives as his reason for leaving, that the great uncertainty as to the continuance of the Special Works Department made him feel that he could not let pass an opportunity to obtain a permanent post.

Before proceeding on leave, the Special Engineer in his report, dated 5th April 1919, pointed out that, war being over, it became a matter of necessity to survey the water and drainage works with a view to drawing up a definite programme of work to remedy the seriously insanitary conditions which exist. On this the Government requested the Corporation to report in due course whether it proposes to take up the comprehensive schemes for the water-supply and drainage of the city after the Restricted Programme is completed, and, if so, how the schemes are to be financed.

The Special Engineer submitted a printed note on the subject in November 1919. This was considered by the Corporation at a meeting held on 24th February 1920 when it was resolved:—“The Corporation authorises the President to inform the Government that it will bear a third of the cost of the Comprehensive Scheme, if the balance would be provided by the Government and the Government are satisfied with the soundness of the scheme as a Scientific Scheme of drainage.” The Government have since offered to bear half the cost of the comprehensive scheme. The Corporation have also agreed to proceed with the comprehensive scheme.

Water works.

53. A sum of Rs. 20,910 was provided in the budget for the extension of water-supply in accordance with the Special Engineer's general scheme. The pipe laying has been carried out throughout the year by the Works Department. The net cost has been very small owing to the amounts obtained by the sale of old scrap iron, etc.

At the filter beds, three new sand washers of the Special Engineer's design were erected and have proved thoroughly satisfactory. A fourth is in process of erection.

54. The practice of adding unfiltered water to the filtered water has been continued. No orders have yet been received on the report submitted by Major W.A. Justice and Mr. Hutton and the note prepared by the Special Engineer thereon. The Surgeon-General, accompanied by Major Cunningham and Major Morrison, Specialists in water purification, made a careful and detailed inspection of the works in February 1920. [N. B. Government orders have been received since the end of the year.]

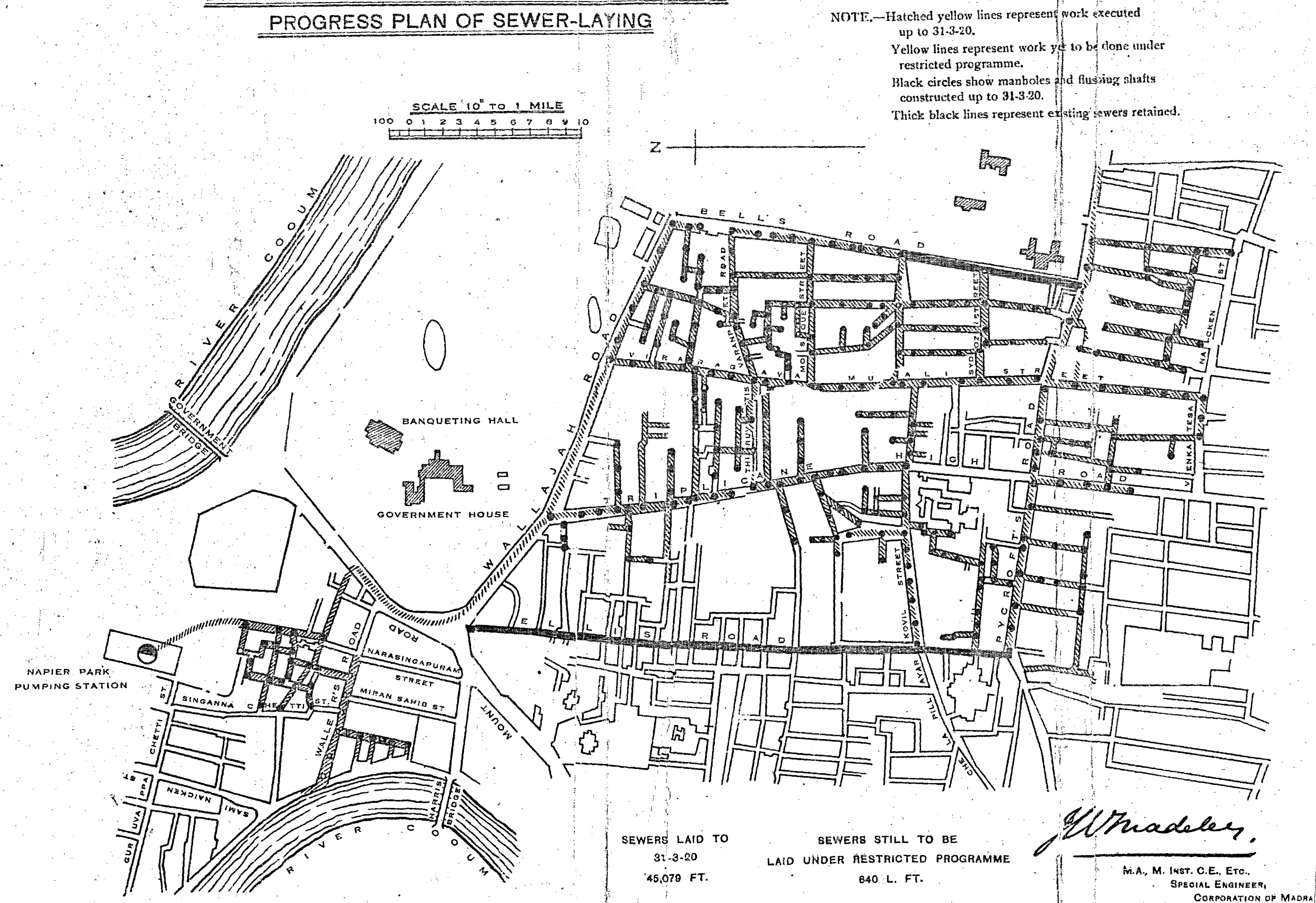
In anticipation of the approval of the Special Engineer's proposal to construct 7 additional filter beds, and of Government financial assistance for that work, preliminary operations have been started. Owing to the difficulty in obtaining carts and the high prices of everything, the Special Engineer has carefully revised the design for filter beds with a view to rendering available local materials that can be obtained or manufactured on the ground. Brick making has been put in hand, the moulding of concrete blocks has been started. The ground has been cleared and 1,19,000 c. ft. of earth have been excavated.

55. The question of raising the top water level of the Red Hills Lake has not yet been settled, but from Government Memorandum No. 1,633-1 M., dated 4th March 1920, it appears likely that the Government will, at an early date, construct works to raise the F. T. L. of the Tank and also the draw-off level for Irrigation by 1½ feet. This work which was strongly recommended by the Special Engineer as long ago as 1911, and has since been frequently pressed by him, should be of material service in diminishing the likelihood of a water famine in the case of a failure of the monsoon.

Drainage Works.

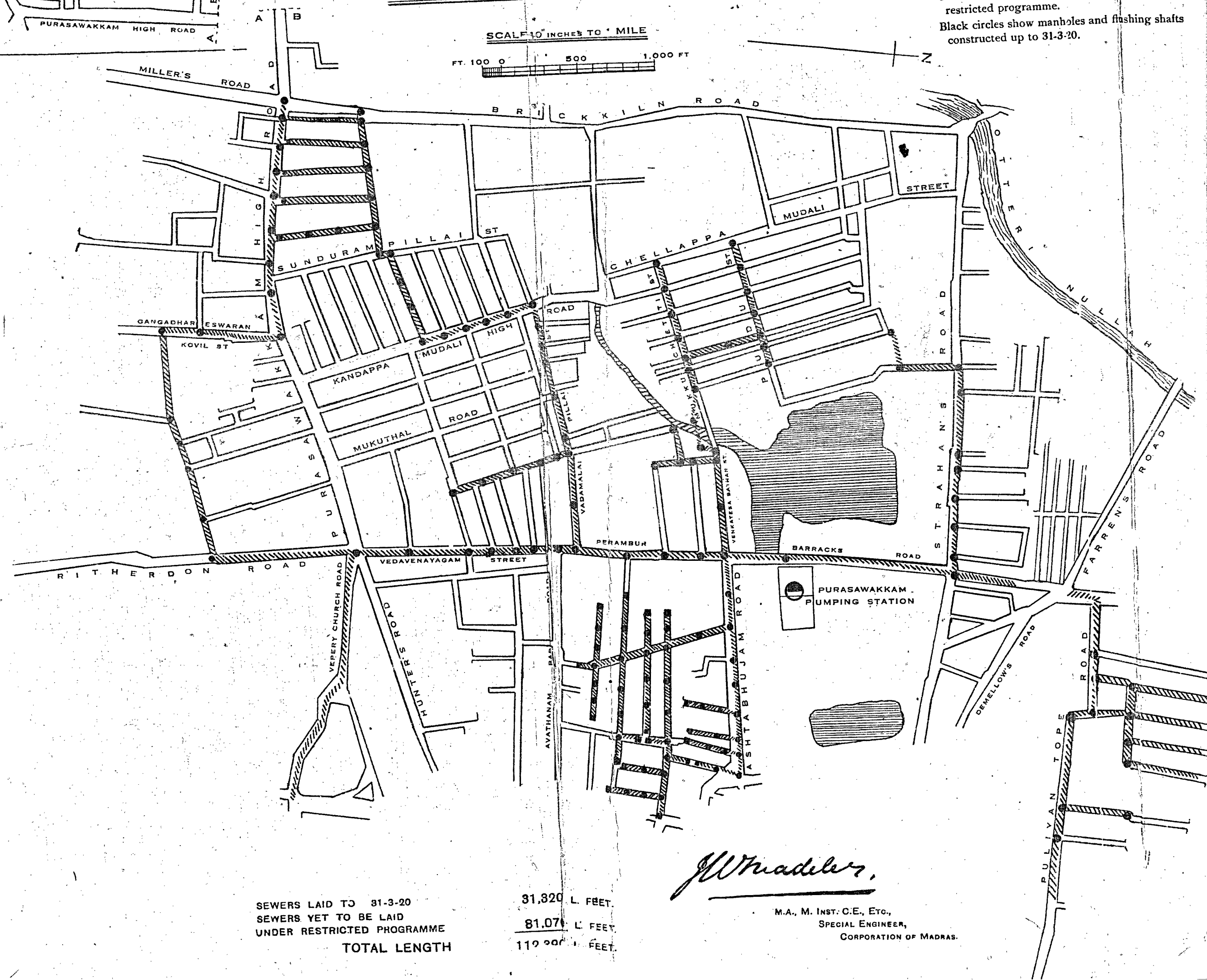
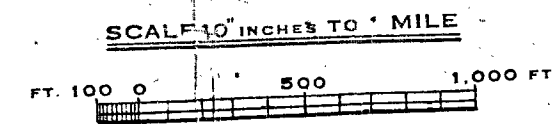
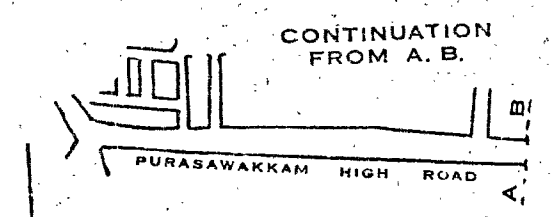
56. The failure of Messrs. Richardson & Cruddas to supply stoneware pipes has continued. Eventually on 19th August 1919 the Corporation determined the contract. Tenders for the pipes undelivered under their contract (M & M No. 18) were called by advertisement, but no offers were received. From enquiries, it has been found that firms in England are not at present in a position to supply owing to the difficulties of labour, scarcity of fuel, and the large demand for the home market. Fortunately, it has been possible to obtain fairly satisfactory small stoneware pipes from Messrs. Burn & Co., and the Corporation has under consideration the question of placing a large order with this firm.

- (15) Ice House Road main sewers—in progress.

57. (a) *House Drainage*.—The total number of house connections to the sewers made during the year was 110 of which 83 were carried out under Advances Recoverable and 27 under Deposit Account at a total cost of Rs. 12,687.

Pumping Stations.—The cost of maintenance of the sewage pumping station including establishment, labour, etc. was Rs. 3,01,505 against Rs. 2,47,192 in the previous year.

Table No. 17 Appendix II shows the cost of pumping at the different pumping stations.

Besides the above silt removal, the systematic cleaning of the 13 pumping station wells in the city was continued during the year and the total quantity of silt thus removed, was 1,36,768 c. ft. as against 1,19,919 in the previous year.

Water supply.

59. *Consumption of water*.—The quantity of water supplied during the year has been 5,110.1 millions of gallons which is equivalent to 26.6 gallons per head per day. The maximum average daily consumption per head in any month was 30.35 gallons in May 1919 and the minimum was 23 gallons in September 1919. During the year, the waste detection staff examined 15,935 houses and brought to notice over 1,869 defects in the services.

except in July, August and September 1919, when the pressure maintained between 10 A. M. and 6 P. M. was only 20 feet.

60. (1) *Kilpauk Pumping Station*.—The maintenance of this station including establishment, labour, etc. cost this year Rs. 1,56,336 as against Rs. 1,27,312 in the previous year, 5,110.1 million gallons being pumped out this year as against 5,391.9

million gallons last year. The increased cost is due to (1) purchase of coal from Chettle Holt & Co. for stock at Kilpauk (2) cost of painting elevated tank and (3) purchase of main pump valve from Home.

(2) *Training Apprentices as Water Works Overseers*.—Two men were taken on during the year. One proved unsatisfactory and was sent away, while the other is now undergoing his second year's course.

(3) *Private Water Services*.—During the year, 436 new services were laid by licensed plumbers and 3,475 were repaired, cleaned, altered or extended. Of the 436 new services, 41 were first class connections and the rest second class. The total number of house service connections in the city as stood on 31st March 1920 was 30,263. There were 45 licensed plumbers during the year. The quantity of water used in excess of free allowance on metered service was 289,736,908 gallons and the amount collected during the year was Rs. 2,87,473-7-2 as against Rs. 2,01,651-5-2 in the previous year, the increase being due to the cancellation from October 1919 of the concessional rates of water charges hitherto allowed to certain hospitals and Government buildings and also to the fixing additional new meters. The rate of charge continued to be Re. 1 per 1,000 gallons during the year.

(4) *New Works*.—During the year 3,433 feet or 5 furlongs 44½ yards of pipes were removed, cleaned and relaid and 6,686 feet or 1 mile 2 furlongs and 28 yards of new mains (Table No. 18 Appendix II) were laid as against 1,967½ feet in the previous year. 11 valves 38 stop cocks 1½ hydrants and 96 meters were also fixed. The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 16,818 against Revised Estimate of Rs. 45,000.

There were 1,436 fountains, 75 cattle troughs and 9 bathing fountains within the municipal limits at the beginning of the year. 58 fountains, 3 cattle troughs and 2 bathing fountains were erected and 10 fountains and 4 cattle troughs were removed during the year leaving 1,484 fountains, 74 cattle troughs and 11 bathing fountains at the end of the year.

(5) *Repairs*.—On the 1st April 1919, the level of the Red Hills Lake stood at 41.51 and on the 31st March 1920 at 42.86.

The rainfall and average water level for each month as furnished by the Public Works Department are shown in Table No. 20 Appendix II. The quantity of water taken out of the lake and measured at Red Hills during 1919-20 was 870,492,590, c. ft. as against 848,801,754 c. ft. in the previous year. The total cost of maintaining the lake, filter beds, conduits, Kilpauk shaft, fountains, pipes, etc including establishment amounted to Rs. 81,898 as against Rs. 79,978 last year.

Miscellaneous.

61. *New Works*.—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,229 only against a sum of Rs. 1,500 provided for in the Revised Estimate. Near the Mosque in Mount Road opposite to the Madras Stable Company's premises, the open ground was improved by the extension of the culvert and construction of a retaining wall.

Administration.

62. *Notices*.—3,038 notices were served under various sections of both the old and new Acts chiefly to prevent misuse and wastage of water and to remove encroachments, projections, unauthorised constructions, etc. Out of this, 2,618 were complied with.

63. *Permits*.—3,440 applications for permission to construct or reconstruct buildings and huts under sections 268 and 276 of the Old Act and under sections 234 and 248 of the New Act were received during the year and in 2,836 cases, permits were granted. The remaining cases were either under correspondence or pending payment of licence fees. The amount of licence fees collected was Rs. 6,374 including the arrear collection of Rs. 409 and the charges levied for water used for building purposes and collected during the year amounted to Rs. 6,050.

64. *Prosecutions*.—Magisterial proceedings were instituted in 85 cases of which 48 convictions were secured, fines levied amounting to Rs. 175-8-0 as against Rs. 152 in the previous year. In 37 cases summonses were withdrawn owing to compliance by the parties themselves, leaving no case as undisposed of at the end of the year.

65. *Provisional and Final orders*.—In 687 cases, provisional orders under section 287 (1 & 2) of the Old Act and under section 256 (1) of the New Act were issued and as the parties failed to comply in 463 cases final orders were issued under section 287 (3) of the Old Act and section 256 (3) of the New Act.

GRANT II—EDUCATION.

66. *Statements 1 to 4 in Appendix III* will give a vivid idea of the progress achieved in Education during the year in Corporation and aided elementary schools of the City.

67. *Number and strength*.—The number of model schools at the close of the year was 27 as against 24 in the previous year. Those in Obralalayam and Thiruvotthiyur High Road were opened in October last in buildings constructed by the Corporation and that in Kassimodu Kuppam, Royapuram, in a rented house in March, '20.

All the three schools were opened in the border limits of the City and cater mainly for obravas, fishermen and such other backward classes. The number on rolls on 31-3-20 was 4155 as against 4162 on 31-3-19. There was a sudden withdrawal of pupils in March 1920 owing to the unfounded but widely prevalent scare of the kidnapping of children. The average attendance which was 69.7 per cent in 1917-18 declined to 62.3 per cent in 1918-19 affected as it had been by plague, influenza, severe storm and rains, and the trying economic strain, but revived satisfactorily and stood at 77.6 in the year under report. In the crowded localities, admission was increasingly sought but had to be refused owing to the want of space to open additional sections.

The following comparative statement will show the progress in strength and attendance during the last 5 years.

In the last 5 years, both the strength and attendance have thus shown an appreciable progress, tending to prove the growing popularity and efficiency of the Corporation Schools.

68. Admission continues to be free and open to the children of all castes and communities.

It is gratifying to note that the poorer and the backward classes continue to resort to the schools largely and that the teachers, leaving off all prejudices, try to move among the parents and exhort them to send their children.

69. The year under report was remarkable for certain special incidents.

(i) Though the closing of the war removed the pall of gloom from the minds of the people and raised their spirits, still its after effects were felt throughout the year in the continuance of high prices and the consequent economic strain which had their adverse influences on the strength and attendance.

(ii) Nearly 40,000 children of all the elementary schools in the city took part in the Peace Celebrations of the 19th July 1919. The Corporation spent a sum of Rs. 10,772-4-1 in the distribution of sweets among the children and the presentation of His Majesty's picture in Coronation robes to Schools. The Divisional Councillors and the Inspector of Schools took a personal interest in the matter.

It was a unique event that His Excellency Lord Willingdon the Governor of Madras, in the midst of his crowded engagements, was pleased to visit the Corporation Schools, Cemetery Road, Periamet, Chetput and Triplicane High Road on the occasion of the Peace Celebrations, and thus expressed his abiding interest in and appreciation of the progress in education.

(iii) A substantial relief was given to the teachers first by the grant of a temporary allowance of 20 to 25 per cent of their pay and later by the permanent revision of the scale of their salaries at the close of the year raising the minimum to Rs. 35 per mensem.

A regrading of the salaries of the teachers according to the qualifications, service and quality of work on the lines of the Bombay system is very desirable.

(iv) Twenty-two of the schools continue to engage the pupils in wood work as a part of manual training. A beginning was however made in the year in imparting vocational training to the pupils by the institution of tailoring as a handicraft in the Corporation School, Kalmantapam Road. Increasing attention is paid to manual training and gardening by the pupils in all the schools.

70. *Staff.*—There were 154 teachers including handicraft instructors in all the schools, and all are professionally qualified. A concession was shewn in the year to a disabled sepoy entertained as an acting teacher and he will be sent up for training at the earliest opportunity. All those recruited during the year were as a rule higher elementary grade teachers. Two secondary grade teachers also were entertained.

The Corporation Teachers' Association continued to hold general and sectional meetings in which model lessons were given, essays read, syllabuses discussed and other means of improvement adopted under the guidance of the Superintendent of Schools. Head Masters' meetings were also convened whenever necessary.

The Sub-Assistant Inspectors of Schools of both the ranges conducted the annual inspections of the several schools and remarked on their work favourably. Constant visits were also paid by the Superintendent of Schools and the teachers guided in the course of their daily work. Children were occasionally taken out in certain schools on excursions to the Museum, the People's Park, Aquarium and the beach. Visits were paid by the teachers and some of the pupils to the Health and Welfare Exhibition held in the Banquetting Hall in the year.

There was a distinct improvement in the quality of instruction and general discipline—a satisfactory advance on the state of affairs described in p. 2 of the Administration Report of the year 1916-1917.

71. *Accommodation.*—According to the Model school scheme sanctioned in G. O. No. 820-M., dated 25th May '11, 35 schools should have been constructed and 32 opened by the end of the year.

There were 27 schools in all at the end of the year of which 24 were held in the buildings belonging to the Corporation while 3 were held in rented ones. In view of the paucity of funds devoted to education, the costliness of sites, and buildings, steps have been taken to suit the design to the nature of requirements in the different localities and in consultation with the Inspector of schools, buildings of a cheap design have been proposed to be constructed in places like Mirsahibpet, Kasi-modukuppam, etc.

The former was completed and the school opened on 21st July 1920.

The thanks of the Corporation are due to the Port Trust and its Chairman the Hon'ble Mr. H. G. Mitchell for having leased a plot for the construction of the latter school at a nominal rent of Re. 1 per year.

72. *Equipment.*—The 24 schools in model buildings were equipped with the necessary articles of furniture and appliances. The other schools were supplied suitably. The libraries in all the schools and the various appliances were fairly used. It may be noted that some of the simpler articles of furniture such as planks, racks, stools, etc. were got made in the manual training classes by the pupils themselves.

73. *Night Schools.*—Free night schools were conducted by philanthropic bodies in 21 of the Corporation schools and a few of the teachers permitted to be on their staff. One of the Corporation schools, that in Periamet, was lit with electricity for the benefit of the night school, the maintenance charges being shared equally between the Poor Schools' Society and the Corporation.

74. *Training of Teachers.*—Five teachers were under training during the year in the Government Training School, Triplicane. The total amount of stipends paid to these teachers was Rs. 461-0-7 as against 1,278-6-1 in the last year. A sum of Rs. 281-3-1 was spent as stipends to clerks undergoing training in the Corporation workshop in mechanical work. The question of paying stipends to teachers under training was discussed afresh, and it was resolved to discontinue the system generally, reserving the right to train teachers if and when necessary.

75. *Medical Inspection.*—The orders of Government on the question of medical inspection of elementary school children are awaited before taking any definite action in the matter.

76. *Finance.*—A sum of Rs. 17,908-4-8 was spent on the construction of new buildings and repairs as against Rs. 11,187-0-0 in the previous year.

It is proposed to investigate the question of school sites thoroughly and reserve by alienation or acquisition, as many sites as possible for future construction. The Superintendent of Schools is giving his close attention to this subject. A sum of Rs. 67,074-8-5 was spent on the maintenance of the Corporation Schools as against Rs. 49,991-15-6 in the previous year. Including the expenditure on the Corporation play ground and the Reading Room, Egmore, and the Annie Besant Free School in Krishnampet, the total amount spent under education during the year, was Rs. 88,853-1-7 as against Rs. 64,348-15-10.

The total receipts of the Corporation for the year were Rs. 27,87,156-8-8 and out of this a sum of Rs. 88,853-1-7 was spent in all including the expenditure on buildings. 15 per cent of the income may be considered a legitimate limit of expenditure on education and making every allowance for the smallness of the resources of the Corporation as compared to the other wealthier metropolitan cities, the meagreness in the amount devoted to the spread of education must stand prominent.

The Elementary Education Bill which has since been passed into law, will, it is hoped, enable the Corporation to go ahead.

77. *The Corporation Play Ground, Egmore.*—The opening of this play ground has thrown open a splendid opportunity for the physical recreation of the youth of Egmore, and an inspection of the same any evening will gladden the hearts of spectators. Coupled with the Reading Room endowed by M. R. Ry. Rao Bahadur T. Rangachariyar Avargal and opened during the year, it forms a centre of healthy attraction.

78. *General Remarks.*—The passing of the New Municipal Act of 1919 resulted in the appointment of a Special Standing Committee for Education in the last quarter of the year. Matters educational will, it is hoped, receive their due importance in consequence.

The schools continued to be under the administrative charge of M.R.Ry. M.T. Venkatacharya the Superintendent of Schools during the year.

Grant III. Sanitation and Medical Service. Hospitals and Dispensaries.

79. *Royapettali Hospital.*—The expenditure on the maintenance of this hospital was Rs. 46,424-3-0 against Rs. 54,700-14-9 in the previous year. The decrease was due to the transfer of the hospital to Government from 1st October 1919.

The total number of in-patients and out-patients treated in this Hospital was 2,903 and 54,420 against 3,370 and 57,251 in the previous year.

80. *Raja Sir Ramaswami Mudaliar Lying-in-Hospital.* The amount spent on this institution was Rs. 27,063-13-7 against Rs. 19,619-12-7 in the previous year and against Rs. 29,180-0-0 in the revised estimate. The total number of inpatients treated was 1957 against 1721 and that of out-patients 3961 against 1845 in the previous year.

The reports of Medical Officers in charge of the above hospitals and dispensaries appear in appendix IV.

Contributions.

81. *Hospital.*—The usual contribution of Rs. 20,000 for hospitals was paid to Provincial Funds during the year.

82. *San Thome Dispensary.*—The usual monthly contribution of Rs. 66-10-8 and the annual contribution of Rs. 800/- were paid to this dispensary during the year. The number of patients treated rose from 11,134 to 11,163.

83. *St Thomas Convent Dispensary.*—The contribution was raised from Rs. 20 to Rs. 25/- per mensem with effect from 1st April 1920 as sanctioned by Government in G. O. No. 912 M. Mis. dated 14th June 1919. The number of patients treated fell from 8272 to 8209.

84. *Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital.*—The contribution of Rs. 2,000/- for the year 1919-20 was paid during the year. The number of patients treated during 1919 rose from 16840 to 17112.

85. *Contribution to the Madras Ayurvedic Dispensary, the Sree Kanyaka Parameswari Dispensary and the Venkataramana Dispensary:—*

The contributions to these dispensaries were not paid as Government in G. O. No. 955 M. dated 1st July 1920 while passing orders on the Budget estimate for 1919-20, disapproved the proposal of the Corporation to continue the Contribution.

86. *Kalyani Hospital.*—The contribution of Rs. 1,000 for the year 1919-20 was paid to the institution during the year.

The reports of the above institutions appear in appendix IV.

87. *Sembium dispensary.*—A sum of Rs. 780 was as usual paid to the District Board of Chingleput being the moiety of the charges for the up-keep of the dispensary.

88. *Pasteur Institute of South India, Coonoor.*—The annual contribution of Rs. 250 sanctioned in G. O. No. 14 M, dated 15th January 1909, was paid during the year.

89. *Monegar Choultry and Native Infirmary.* The annual contribution of Rs. 1,500 sanctioned in G. O. No. 646-M., Dated 22nd April 1909, was paid towards the maintenance of these institutions.

90. *George Town Dispensary.*—The annual contribution of Rs. 8,824 was paid during the year.

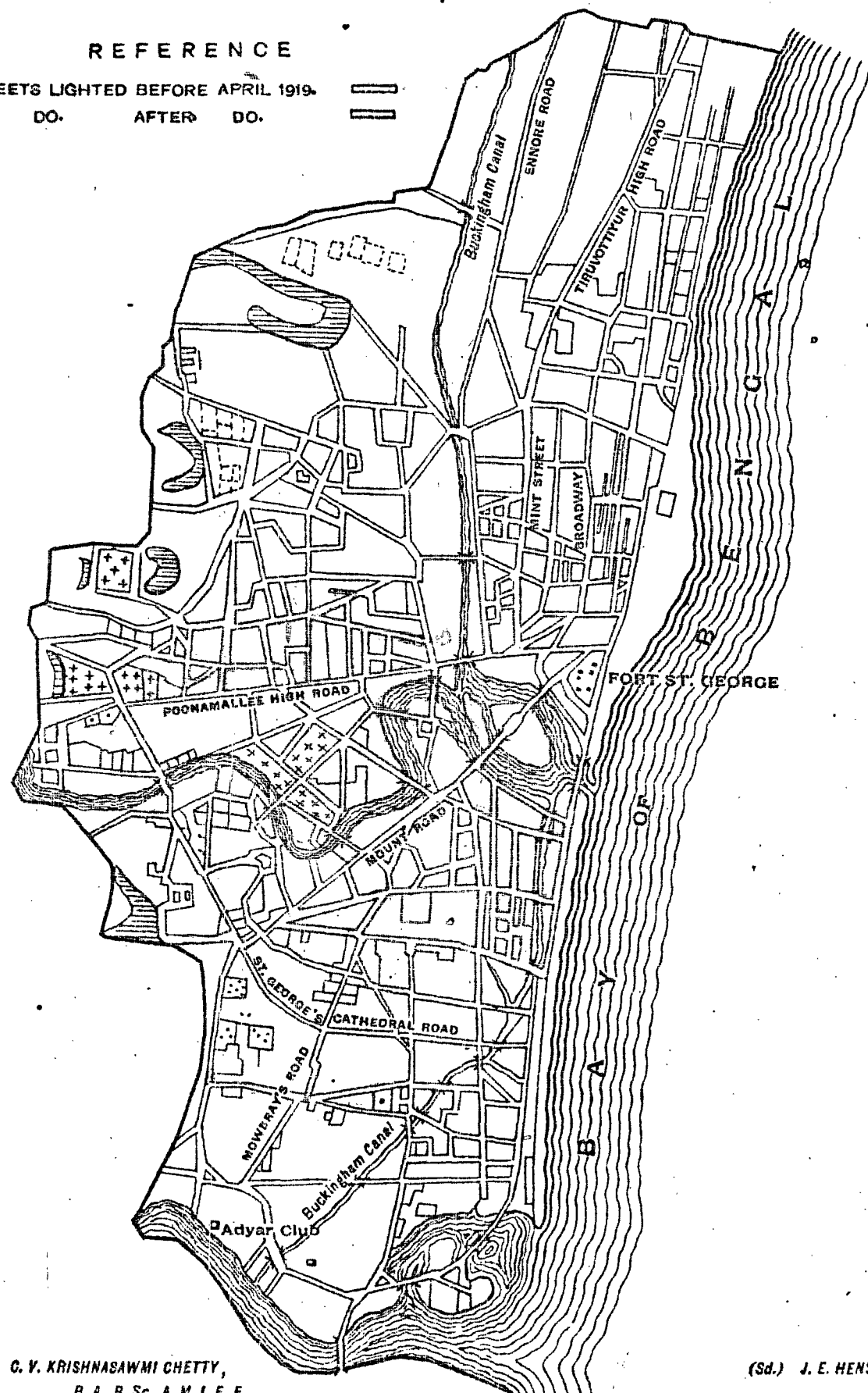
91. *The Madras Society for the Protection of Children.*—A contribution of Rs. 250 was paid to this Institution during the year.

92. *School for the Deaf, Mylapore.*—A contribution of Rs. 250 sanctioned in G. O. No. 142 M. Mis., dated the 26th January 1920 was paid to this institution during the year under report.

Road Watering.

93. The expenditure incurred under this head amounted to Rs. 13,955 as against Rs. 16,662 in the previous year. Watering Main Roads by the Tramway service was continued during the year. To alleviate the dust nuisance, it was ordered to water more roads in various Divisions of the City by hand carts which are being manufactured at Corporation Workshops.

Grant IV—Miscellaneous Municipal purposes Lighting.

94. The total number of kerosine oil lamps at the beginning of the year was 3,595. 97 lamps were newly added and 516 were removed owing to the extension of electric lighting in the City during the year, the total number at the end of the year being 3,176. The power lamp at the Adyar Post Office, 30th Division, was also removed during the year. A sum of Rs. 2,654-10-0 was imposed as fine on the lighting contractor.

Electric lighting.—The plan facing this page shows the progress made since the year 1912-13. The length of the cable laid and streets electrically lit and the number of lights installed in each year are as follows:—

17.95 miles of cable for street electric lighting were laid and 687 electric lights were installed during the year departmentally at a total cost of Rs. 1,40,488.

The expenditure under maintenance of street lights was Rs. 83,840 as against Rs. 76,160 last year. The amounts paid to the lighting contractors alone were as detailed below:—

The balance of Rs. 1,697 was spent on departmental maintenance of the above lights. A sum of Rs. 270 is annually contributed by the Corporation to Messrs. Binny & Co., for maintaining the 19 power lights installed by them in the four streets around the mills.

The lighting was inspected on an average 62 times during the year.

Avenues.

95. The total number of avenue trees at the end of the year under report was 15,246 including 199 planted during the year. Of these 1,077 were fruit-bearing trees. The number of trees that fell down was 149 of which 27 were fruit-bearing trees. The total number of existing trees that require to be watered is 2,544. The total expenditure incurred for the maintenance of avenues during the year was Rs. 9,970.

Public Parks.

96. The License Officer continued to be in charge of all the Parks in the City during the year under review.

97. *People's Park*.—This Park was greatly improved during the year and further improvements are in progress.

A show of flowers, foliage and ferns was held in the Park grounds on the 27th February 1920. It was the first show of its kind and the exhibits were entirely from the several Parks in the city. The show was free to the public and was very much appreciated. Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Willingdon also visited the show. It is hoped to repeat this in future years.

Menagerie—Receipts.—The right to collect fees at the menagerie was leased for Rs. 557-15-11 per month or Rs. 6,695-15-0 per year against Rs. 677-15-11 per mensem in the previous year.

(2) *Charges*.—Food for the animals and birds in the menagerie enclosure was supplied at the following rates:—

98. *Napier Park*.—It is difficult to improve this Park owing to the storage of pipes in it and to its exposed condition.

99. *Robinson Park*.—This Park is much resorted to by the residents of Royapuram and Georgetown. The improvements to it are being steadily carried on.

100. *Loane Square*.—Is very popular as a recreation ground and is much resorted to.

101. *Sivangnanam Park*.—A very popular Park and is much resorted to by the people of the locality.

102. The receipts and charges for the above 5 Parks appear in Appendix II Tables from Nos. 23 to 27.

103. The Band of the Madras Guards played as usual twice a week on the Marina, four times a month in the People's Park, twice a month in the Robinson Park, four times a month in the Loane Square and twice a month in the High Court compound.

104. By kind permission of Her Excellency Lady Willingdon, the String Band of H. E. the Governor played fortnightly at the Band Stand, People's Park, commencing from the 7th January 1920 until April 1920, when the Band left for Ootacamund. The music supplied by this Band was very much appreciated by the public as was evidenced by the large crowds that visited the Park on the days on which this band played.

Fire.

105. The cost of maintenance of the three motor fire engines including establishment was Rs. 16,836 as against Rs. 16,280 in the previous year.

There were 54 fire calls during the year as against 51 in the previous year. The engines worked in only 19 cases. In the remaining cases, fires were extinguished before the engines arrived at the scene of fire.

GRANT V—Supervision and Management.

106. The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 2,02,172-9-8 and was 5.26 per cent of the total receipts of the year. The portion of this sum spent on the establishment maintained for the purpose of assessment and collections amounted to Rs. 1,04,787-15-5 or 2.73 per cent of the total receipts.

Repayment of Debt.

107. The total investments at the beginning of the year on account of sinking funds relating to the several loans of the Corporation, exclusive of the Government loans repayable in instalments, stood at Rs. 27,04,900 in Government Promissory Notes and Stock Certificates and Madras Municipal Debentures and Rs. 2,397-15-10 in cash. During the year under report an allotment of Rs. 1,24,680 was made to the sinking fund from general revenues and a sum of Rs. 55,684-6-19 was realised as interest on prior investments of the fund. The total cash receipts of the year amounted to Rs. 1,82,762-6-8. With this sum Government Promissory Notes and Madras Municipal Debentures of the value of Rs. 1,88,100 were purchased at a cost of Rs. 1,78,995-8-9. The aggregate investments at the close of the year to the credit of the fund stood at Rs. 28,93,000 in Government Promissory Notes and Stock certificates and Madras Municipal debentures with a cash balance of Rs. 3,767-2-11. Payments amounting to Rs. 2,66,829-3-2 were also made during the year towards the Government instalment loans of Rs. 29 lakhs, out of which Rs. 1,43,807-11-9 was appropriated by the Accountant-General towards the repayment of loans and Rs. 1,23,021-7-5 towards interest.

Deposit Account.

108. This account which exhibits the transactions relating to the Corporation Stores and Workshop, the payment made on account of the sinking fund for loans raised in the open market and the security deposits of the Corporation servants and contractors etc, opened with a balance of Rs. 15,99,293-13-5. The receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 14,53,178-0-3 and the expenditure to Rs. 12,80,949-8-3 leaving a balance of Rs. 17,76,522-5-5 at the close of the year.

Workshops.

109. *Workshops*:—The total value of works turned out in workshops during the year was Rs. 2,49,961-2-10 (vide Table No. 28, Appendix II) against Rs. 2,46,398-9-7 in the previous year.

The amount earned in the shape of supervision charges, etc. was Rs. 33,537-14-2 against Rs. 35,287-12-8 in 1918-19.

The expenditure on account of wages of maistries and contingent charges amounted to Rs. 12,713-4-11 or 5.09 per cent on the value of works turned out against 6.39 per cent last year. The cost of establishment including allowances amounted to Rs. 12,913-13-8.

The total receipt exceeded the expenditure by Rs. 7,910-11-7 which represents the profit realised during the year against Rs. 7,218-15-11 in 1918-19.

Accommodation.—The Hospital accommodates 76 Patients, 63 beds for Indians and 8 beds for Europeans and Eurasians.

Patients treated.—There were 2903 in-patients and 54420 out-patients, the corresponding number of last year were 3370 in-patients and 57251 out-patient respectively.

Operations.—A total number of 3331 were performed during the year, 1115 in-patients in Hospital and 2216 out-patients in Dispensary.

Amount of Recoveries.—The amount recovered from the patients treated in Special ward was Rs. 356.

General Remarks.—The Hospital was handed over to Government from 1st October 1919.

I. *Accommodation.*—There are fifty beds in the hospital including 8 beds in the contagious sheds.

II. *Attendance*.—3,961 out-patients and 1937 in-patients were treated during the year as compared with 1,845 out-patients and 1,721 in-patients in the previous year. The number of Confinements were 1,388 against 1233 in the previous year. The daily average was 38.26, in-patients and 24.33 out-patients as compared with 34.26 in-patients and 9.56 out-patients last year.

KALYANI HOSPITAL REPORT FOR 1919-20.

During the year under review the Medical staff of the Hospital has consisted of Mrs. Monahan, M.D., B.S., Honorary Medical Superintendent and Miss M. A. Joseph, Apothecary, Assistant Medical Officer. There has been an increase in all departments of the Hospital work. In particular the number of out-patients has very largely increased. The attendance at the Triplicane Dispensary has risen by several thousands. There has also been an increase in the number of in-patients and operations.

By the kindness of Government the Management has been enabled to install electric light and fans in the Hospital and Dispensaries. The equipment of the Hospital still needs considerable improvement. The accommodation for nurses is inadequate and the out-patients' Dispensary requires to be improved and extended. The Management has undertaken to give all possible facilities for the Clinical Instruction of students of the Women's Medical School which is to be opened in Madras. The Government has been pleased to make a half grant of Rs. 10,000/- towards the cost of extra land and improvements of the buildings.

The Management would take this opportunity of thanking the Corporation for increasing its grant from Rs. 600 to Rs. 1,000. Owing to the increase of the work the cost of this useful institution has greatly increased as will be seen from the financial statement already submitted.

I have the honour to furnish herewith the report on the working of the San Thome Dispensary with the statement showing the attendance of patients, the income and the diseases treated for the year 1919-20.

History.—This charitable Institution was founded by the late Bishop Strachan M.D., in 1874 apparently in connection with S. P. G. Mission and is of great value not only to the general public, but also to the several charitable institutions in and around San Thome and Mylapore and to the poor of all classes and communities without distinction to caste, creed or nationality. It has been in existence for the past 47 years, affording medical and surgical relief to the sufferers that resort to the place. If every thing goes well the Committee desires to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of the Institution after two years.

Constitution and means of support.—The dispensary is now supported by the Corporation and by the generous public and managed by a local Committee.

Accommodation.—The building in which the dispensary is located is the property of the S. P. G. Mission for which a nominal rent is being charged by the mission, for which the Committee with the public is grateful.

Total treated.—The subjoined table shows the total number of patient-treated during the year under report, with the daily average sick, as compared with those for the two previous years.

The increase in the cases treated this year as well as last year and that of the average daily sick is due to recrudence of Influenza and its after-effects Malaria and other allied fevers and etc

Operations.—595 operations of minor nature were performed during the year

Income.—The total income of the year from all sources is Rs. 1,571-15-0 against Rs 1, 612-14-8 in the previous year

Special Funds.—Nil.

The Corporation have been paying their monthly grant of Rs. 66-10-8 and the annual grant of Rs 300 for the purchase of medicines. The deficit is being supplemented by public subscriptions and donations.

Supplies.—European medicines were usually obtained from the Madras Government Medical Stores and minor necessities were obtained on a payment from time to time.

Establishment.—The staff consists of a Sub Assistant Surgeon (L. M. P.) a certificated compounder, and two menials.

Working of the Establishment.—The dispensary is kept open daily from 7 to 10 A. M. but medical aid is available at all hours of the day as the Sub-Assistant Surgeon is living in the premises.

Administration.—The dispensary was inspected on several occasions by the members of the Committee, once by the Corporation President and once by the Divisional Councillor.

General Remarks.—The dispensary maintains its popularity as usual and continues to do its good to all. The Sub-Assistant Surgeon Mr. F. Immanuel Pillai as usual takes great interest in the discharge of his duties.

The Committee have to record with regret the death of Mrs. A. Firth, who for several years was connected with this Institution as its Chairman and her

loss is highly deplorable as she was of great assistance in all endeavours to improve the institution.

The Members of the Committee take this opportunity of thanking the Councillors of the Corporation of Madras, for the increased annual grant for the year 1920-21 and also to all charitable Ladies and Gentlemen of the City of Madras, who actually sympathise with the needs of this Institution and contribute their mite towards its upkeep.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit an account of the working of the Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital during the last year.

The total number of patients treated during the year under Report was 17,112 as compared with 16,840 treated during the previous year. The number of in-patients treated was 2,593 against 2,564 of the previous year, and the number of out-patients was 14,519 against 14,276 of the year before thus showing an increase in the numbers treated in both in-patient and out-patient Department.

The total number of attendance during the year is 37,729.

There were 763 mid-wifery cases admitted during the year 1919 while the number of cases treated during 1918 was 679. This increase is encouraging as it has occurred not with-standing the fact that the Corporation Child Welfare Scheme has a centre in the neighbourhood of the Hospital and draws away a certain number of cases.

Of the 763 labour cases treated, 453 were natural labour and 310 were abnormal cases.

The total number of operations performed both major and minor is 4,188, of these 470 were performed under general anaesthetic.

The Committee is also thankful to the Madras Corporation for having increased the annual grant from Rs. 1,500 to Rs. 2,000 during the year.

I was elected Honorary Secretary to the Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital in August 1915 and the financial condition of the Hospital was not very satisfactory. There were only 9 temporary and 39 permanent beds in the previous year. I am glad to be able to state that owing to the generosity of several citizens of Madras both Indian and European, year after year, the number of temporary and permanent beds increased, and as will be seen from the latest Report a copy of which is herewith annexed, in the last year the Hospital maintained 41 temporary and 50 permanent beds. Besides, during the five years it had been my privilege to be the Secretary, the Institution received substantial pecuniary help from Rao Bahadur C. Cunnan Chetty Garu, M. R. Ry. N. R. Ayyar, a well known Madras connected with Messrs. Andrew Yule & Co. Calcutta, and the late lamented C. Ramanujam Chetty Garu.

The Madras Government which was giving the Hospital a fixed grant of a thousand Rupees in 1914 was good enough to increase it in 1916 to a maximum of Rs. 5,000 a year. On a further representation made by me in May 1919 the Government was pleased to increase the limit of the grant to Rs. 10,000.

Despite the donations received from the public, the annual contribution of the Madras Corporation and the increased grants from the Government, it was found that as the popularity of the Hospital increased rapidly, the expenditure in all directions particularly in the cost of diet, medicines, etc., also increased greatly during the years of the war. A considerable amount of money was required to equip the Hospital and bring it up to date. It was felt by those interested in the welfare of the Hospital, that the interests of the Institution would be better served, if it was taken over and managed by Government.

. . . At a meeting of the Governors held on the 7th January 1920 under the presidency of His Excellency Lord Willingdon, the Governors of the Hospital unanimously resolved to hand over the Hospital to Government.

The Committee of management are now taking the necessary steps to have this decision given effect to.

Administration report

2. *Constitution.*—The new Act, which came into operation on 1st October 1919, introduced some radical changes in the constitution of the Council. The strength of the Council was increased from 35 to 50, of whom 41 were elected. The Council was also given the privilege of electing its President, who presides at its meetings. Associated with the Council were four standing committees elected by the Council dealing with (1) Taxation and Finance, (2) Works, (3) Health, (4) Education.

3. *Finance—Capital Account.*—The receipts during the year consisted mainly of a grant of five lakhs from Government for the water-supply and drainage scheme, and a sum of 3½ lakhs paid by Government for the Royapettah hospital which was taken over by them. The total expenditure was 9.95 lakhs, most of which was in connexion with the water-supply and drainage scheme and the extension of electric lighting. The Corporation spent almost nothing on remunerative enterprises. A sum of Rupees 12,000 was spent on the construction of scavengers' lines at Goyatope. The account closed with a balance of 4.29 lakhs against an opening balance of 5.18 lakhs.

Ordinary revenues.—The total receipts including an opening balance of 5.71 lakhs amounted to 44.12 lakhs, of which 25.94 lakhs were derived from taxation. The duty on imported timber and firewood is really an indirect tax; but the income is shown under 'Revenue from municipal property and powers apart from taxation.'

There are only two municipal markets in the City against no less than 12 private markets. No reason is given for this astonishing growth of private interests to the detriment of what should be a public duty and a most lucrative endowment to the public funds. Cartstand fees realized the paltry sum of Rs. 615, a figure which could easily be attained by a petty mufassal town. The percentage of the revenue derived by the Madras Corporation from markets, slaughter-houses and cartstands to the revenue derived from taxation is only 5.2 against a Presidency average of 15.3 and an average of 16.8 for the six principal Provincial municipalities. The Government would suggest that the Corporation should appoint a committee to examine the possibility of developing its revenues from sources other than taxation, and to ascertain why in this branch of public enterprise Madras City contrasts so unfavourably with mufassal towns.

The total expenditure in 1919-20 was 42.67 lakhs, the closing balance being only 1.45 lakhs.

4. *Roads and buildings.*—The total expenditure on roads was 4.95 lakhs. Two roads were metalled for the first time; about 12 miles are tarred. The success of the departmental quarrying inaugurated during the year rendered the Corporation independent of the vagaries of contractors.

5. *Water-supply and drainage.*—Expenditure on these works was abnormally low (4.19 lakhs), owing partly to the difficulty of getting materials from abroad and partly to the absence of the Special Engineer and his assistant on leave for a portion of the year. It is unfortunate that owing to the uncertainty as to the future of the Special Works Department some of the best officers have sought service elsewhere. The Corporation has since decided to proceed with the comprehensive schemes for the water-supply and drainage of the City, and the Government trust there will not be any avoidable delay in the execution of these works.

6. *Education.*—The number of model schools at the end of the year was 27 against 24 in the previous year. Admission continued to be free and open to the children of all castes and communities. The number of pupils on the rolls on 31st March 1920 was 4,155 against 4,162 on 31st March 1919. The decrease was due to the sudden withdrawal of pupils in March 1920, owing to the 'Kidnapping' scare. It is gratifying to note that the Corporation has begun to impart vocational training in some of its schools. Another pleasing feature of the report is the large number of children of the backward classes in the Corporation schools.

The total expenditure of the Corporation on Education (including buildings) was only .89 lakh or 1.7 per cent of its total expenditure against an average of 11.5 per cent in mufassal towns. The Bombay Corporation maintained 233 municipal schools and spent 8.53 lakhs during the year 1918-19. The Government are however glad to notice that the Corporation recognizes the meagreness of its expenditure on education and trust that there will be substantial progress in the near future.

7. *Hospitals and dispensaries.*—To medical relief the Corporation devotes only 3.3 per cent of its total expenditure against an average of 9.4 per cent for mufassal towns. During the year the three malaria dispensaries at Washermanpet, Purasawakkam and Royapuram were converted into general dispensaries—one for George-town, one for Egmore and one for Triplicane. The Washermanpet dispensary, the Balayya Nayudu dispensary, the Chintadripet dispensary and the two infectious diseases hospitals at Krishnampet and Royapuram which were under the management of the District Surgeons were taken over under the direct control of the Health Department with effect from 1st April 1919. The Royapettah hospital was handed over to the Government from 1st October 1919. The Government regret to observe that, in spite of their order No. 378 M., dated 7th March 1919, the two infectious diseases hospitals, which are very important institutions, have been placed in charge of sub-assistant surgeons. The total number of in-patients and out-patients who received treatment at the hospitals and dispensaries under the Corporation was 6,401 and 188,341 respectively against 6,354 and 1,68,880 during the previous year.

8. *Maternity and child-welfare.*—The number of confinements at the Raja Sir Ramaswami Mudaliyar's Lying-in-hospital was 1,388 and at the Victoria Caste and Gosha hospital 763, of which 310 were abnormal cases. The child-welfare scheme inaugurated by the Corporation in 1917 has completed its second year of work in the City. The Government are glad to notice that the public have begun to appreciate the usefulness of the scheme. The total number of infants delivered by the Corporation midwives or otherwise taken under their care at the Triplicane centre was 1,052 against 681 during the previous year. There were 17 cases of sepsis, of which 14 were due to the interference of barber-women. Two new centres, one at Washermanpet and the other at Purasawakkam, have been opened.

9. The registered birth and death rates for the year were 36.5 and 52.4, respectively, against 38.4 and 60.3 in 1918. The death-rate shows a slight improvement over the previous year, when owing to the influenza epidemic it was the highest since 1878. The mortality rate under cholera, smallpox, dysentery and diarrhoea was higher than in 1918 and the average of the previous four years. Infantile mortality was 329.0 per mille against 355 in the previous year. The high mortality from water-borne diseases indicates the need for the chlorination of the city water-supply.
