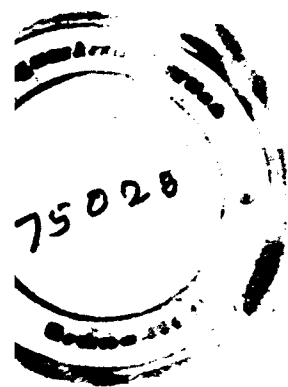
Annual Progress Report.

PART I.

DEPARTMENTAL NOTES.

1. **Touring.**—I held charge of the office of Superintendent, Archaeological Survey, Hindu and Buddhist Monuments, Northern Circle, throughout the year under report. Owing to heavy work at the headquarters, to be detailed below, and the fact that the Public Works Department were unable, for want of time, to undertake part of the Conservation work which had been proposed for execution during the year, only 98 days were spent on tour when the following places were inspected:—Bhairo Sthan and Baghbaupura, District Lahore, Delhi including Raisina, the Qutb Minar and Suraj Kund near Tughlaqabad, Nurpur, Kotla and Baijnath in the Kangra District, Kapal Mochan near Jagadhri, Sarai Kala, Simla and Harappa in the Montgomery District in the Punjab. The localities visited in the United Provinces were Mathura with its various ancient sites, Brindaban, Gobardhan, Chhatikar, Sarai Azampur, and Salimpur all in the District of Mathura, Mahoba, Jhansi and Kasia. I halted about 20 days at Simla under orders of the Director-General of Archaeology in India to attend a Conference of officers of the Archaeological Survey and the Public Works Department, which was convened by that officer in July 1920, for a discussion of a new Manual of Principles of Archaeological Conservation drafted by him, in supersession of the one issued by him in 1907. The last three weeks of August and the first few days of September were spent at Mathura for the preparation of a complete detailed account of the excavations and other exploratory work that had been carried out under the supervision of Rai Bahadur Pt. Radha Krishna from the year 1915-16 downwards. These operations had been noticed from year to year in the Annual Progress Reports of this Circle, but a continuous description with readings of all new inscriptions, notes on important sculptural and other discoveries was a desideratum. The treatise will now be published as an Archaeological Memoir. During the month of January 1921 I was engaged on the supervision of excavations inaugurated at Harappa in the Montgomery District.

I now refer to the work carried out at the Headquarters in addition to the ordinary routine, the compilation of the Annual Progress Report for the year ending 31st March 1920 and of Inspection and Conservation Notes. An important item of this unforeseen work, which occupied my attention for over a couple of months was the compilation, in connection with the new Reforms Scheme, of complete lists of Hindu and Buddhist Monuments in the Northern Circle, on which the activities of this office are to be concentrated in future years, and which were to be at once brought under the protection of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act. Another work of some considerable magnitude which came in for attention during the year was the compilation of an up-to-date list of photographic negatives preserved in this office. The previous list, which was published by Mr. Hargreaves, included photographs taken up to the year 1915. The new list comprises these and all those prepared up to the end of March 1921 and has been arranged in the alphabetical order of the names of monuments, localities and the districts in which they are situated. This will facilitate reference and the new arrangement will be useful as well to the Superintendent as to the public who require prints of these photographs. The photographic negatives have themselves had to be re-arranged in their boxes, and typed lists of negatives contained in them have been pasted on them to facilitate the task of finding the negatives. In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Managing Committee of the Central Museum, Lahore, on the subject of the compilation of catalogues of the various sections of that institution, the Director-General of Archaeology in India was requested to place me on special duty for



some time to prepare a catalogue of the non-Gandharan sculptures, but the Director-General of Archaeology was of the opinion that this work should be done gradually along with my ordinary duties. During the year under report, photographs of typical Brahmanical sculptures in the Museum were prepared and those objects are briefly described in the List of Photographs at the end of this report.

2. Preservation of Hindu and Buddhist Monuments.—The total expenditure on preservation of Hindu and Buddhist Monuments in the Northern Circle during the year 1920-21 amounted to Rs. 16,652-14-9. Out of this amount, Rs. 14,558-7-9 were spent on all kinds of repairs in the Punjab and the remainder in the United Provinces, the annual repairs being responsible for Rs. 858-4-3 and Rs. 699-15-0 in the two provinces respectively. The special repairs carried out in the Punjab comprised the acquisition of certain mounds and fixing up of boundary pillars at Harappa, District Montgomery, and excavation of the same mounds; repairs to the temples and other remains in the Ancient Hindu Fort at Amb and conservation of the temple and gateway at Malot in the Salt Range; erecting boundary pillars round the notified area at Sunet, District Ludhiana; the dismantling of the protection sheds from over the rock inscriptions at Kanihyara; and repairs to the temple in the Nurpur Fort, the fort at Kotla, the Kangra Fort, the Baijnath temple at Baijnath. In the United Provinces special repairs were carried out at the temples at or near Mahoba in the Hamirpur District and to the temples at Brindaban in the Muttra District and at Sarnath.

3. Protection of Ancient Monuments under Act VII of 1904.—During the year under report, 367 Hindu and Buddhist Monuments were proposed and finally declared as "Protected Monuments" under the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act (VII) of 1904 in the United Provinces. Proposals for similar treatment of 200 monuments in the Provinces of the Punjab and Delhi were also submitted to the Punjab Government, but the final notification could not issue for want of sufficient time. The list of the Punjab Monuments is under revision and will be resubmitted to Government shortly. Inspection reports on the condition of Hindu and Buddhist Monuments in all the three Provinces were, as usual, received from the officers of the Public Works Department. The Executive Engineer concerned reports that a Buddhist Chaitya in the Bijnore District called Mordhaj requires inspection. Three temples at Thal in the Bahraich District are said to be in want of repairs. The Executive Engineer of Nainital calls attention to the desirability of early inspection of the monuments at Champawat in the Almora District.* No cases of wanton injury to any of the monuments in my charge came to my notice during the past year.

4. Museums.—It has been customary hitherto with Archaeological Superintendents to incorporate in their Annual Progress Reports concise notices of the annual acquisitions made from year to year to the Archaeological sections of the several museums in their respective circles. In the previous reports of this circle, the Lahore, Muttra, Lucknow and Sarnath Museums were thus dealt with. The first three of these institutions having now become Provincial concerns, the Archaeological museum at Sarnath alone will remain in the charge of this office. As there were no excavations at Sarnath during the past year, no fresh additions were made to this museum. All copies of the 2nd edition of the Guide to the Buddhist remains at Sarnath are sold out, and a revised and up-to-date hand-book will soon be issued.

5. Epigraphy.—The inscriptions copied and studied during the year are mostly the unpublished inscriptions in the Archaeological Museum at Muttra, where as I stated above, I spent about five weeks on the preparation of a detailed memoir on recent discoveries. The readings of these inscriptions are being published in the above-mentioned memoir. Here it is only necessary to refer to one or two points of outstanding interest. In the year 1918-19 Rai Bahadur Pandit Radha Krishna had discovered an image pedestal with an inscription dated in

the Kushan year 20, which reduced the existing interval between Kanishka and Vasishka to three or four years. The energetic honorary Curator has now brought to light another inscription engraved on a pedestal which states that in the Kushan year 23 in the first month of the summer season in the reign of Kanishka (abbreviated in the epigraph to Kani), a certain Pusyada [ta] caused the Bodhisatva image on which the inscription is incised to be installed in her own hospice *vihara*. Now we know from the Mathura *Yupa* inscription that Vasishka was reigning in the year 24 in the fourth month of the summer. It now becomes evident that Kanishka must have died or retired from the throne and Vasishka taken his place some time during the fifteen months that separate the two dates.

Another valuable inscription in the Mathura Museum awaits careful treatment. This is the epigraph on the much shattered image pedestal which was unearthed at the Mat site in 1911-12. It is incomplete and the extant portion has come down on fourteen pieces of different sizes. It was very briefly noticed by Dr. Vogel in his special article on the excavations concerned. The inscription is being fully dealt with in an Archaeological Memoir on "Excavations and other exploratory work at Mathura".

Another pedestal (G42 of the Mathura Museum Catalogue by Dr. Vogel) deserves to be noticed here. Between the feet of the missing image that remain on the pedestal is an inscription of two lines. Dr. Vogel tentatively read the first word as *Mahahinayanasya*. It now appears that this word should be read as *Mahadanda ayakasya*. The inscription would then mean that the image now lost, which stood on this pedestal, was an image of a certain Ulana, the Chief Police officer. The inscription is not dated, but the characters are Brahmi of the Kushan period. It is interesting to see that side by side with statues of royal personages statutes were also raised to important officers of the State.

Lastly, I should mention here a copper plate inscription of Govindachandradeva of Kanauj of Vikrama Samvat 1177. This inscription is engraved on two copper plates which, with the usual ring and seal, were unearthed by a *Chamar* near the village of Chhattarpore, District Cawnpore, and forwarded to the Director-General of Archaeology in India by the District Magistrate of that District. Under instructions from the Director-General of Archaeology an article on these plates has been submitted to the Government Epigraphist for India for publication in the *Epigraphia India*. The historical information recorded in the inscription is to the effect that King Govindachandradeva granted the village of Sasaimau in the *pattala* of Koti to a Brahman named Sahulasarman. The village of Sasaimau is presumably identical with the village named Sisamau which now forms part of the city of Cawnpore.

6. Publications.—During the year under review I prepared the following publications:—

- (a) Annual Progress Report of the Superintendent, Archaeological Survey, Hindu and Buddhist Monuments, Northern Circle, for the year ending 31st March 1920.
- (b) Memoir on archaeological excavations and other discoveries made at Muttra since the publication of Dr. Vogel's catalogue. This is a large illustrated article which is being revised for final publication as an Archaeological Memoir.
- (c) Article on the Chhattarpore (District Cawnpore) copper-plate inscription of Govindachandradeva of Kanauj of V. S. 1177.
- (d) Inspection and Conservation Note on the Suraj Kund (District Delhi).
- (e) Inspection and Conservation Note on the stone pillar in the Hindu fort at Kosam, District Allahabad.
- (f) Conservation Note on the Buddhist remains at Sarnath.

At the request of the Secretary, the Victoria Diamond Jubilee Technical Institute, I read an illustrated paper before that society on "Kasia, the scene of the Buddha's Parinirvana".

7. **Personnel.**—L. Duni Chandra, M.A., was appointed as Assistant Surveyor on the 26th May 1920, but resigned his post on the 7th January 1921 in favour of a job in a private banking concern, where he expected quicker promotion. During the short period he was attached to my office he gave proof of considerable ability and aptitude for research work, and worked satisfactorily. Up to the time of his appointment and for about 2½ months after his resignation, L. Munshi Ram Beri, the Head Clerk, acted as Assistant Surveyor. Pandit Kedarnath, M. A., Shastri, was appointed as Assistant Surveyor on probation on the 21st March 1921.

Owing to his ill-health L. Munshi Ram was again this year granted privilege leave for three months, while B. Sulekh Chand was on leave without pay for one month and 8 days. M. Ghulam Muhammad was, in view of his good past service, granted an extension of one year with effect from 1st July 1920. I am grieved to have to record the untimely death of B. Bhura Mal, which occurred on the 22nd May 1920 after a severe attack of influenza, which he contracted during an official visit to Lucknow. B. Bhura Mal served in this office for more than 17 years, during which period he won the unstinted appreciation of all the officers under whom he had worked. With his high professional skill as a draftsman, photographer and artist he combined an uprightness of character and devotion to duty which is not met with in every subordinate. On my recommendation the Government of India have been pleased to sanction a compassionate gratuity of Rs. 300 for his childless widow. The post of second draftsman-photographer remained vacant for about three months, as I was unable to find a suitable man on the minimum pay of Rs. 35 a month, and it was not until the Government had been pleased to create a new post on Rs. 50 a month that a competent man was secured on the 14th August 1920. All members of the staff worked to my satisfaction. Lists of photographic negatives and drawings prepared in my office during the year are given in Appendices C and D. There was a much greater demand for prints of photographs from the public and learned societies during the past year than in any previous year since the formation of this office. This will be evident from the fact that in addition to the photographs prepared for this office for the Director-General of Archaeology and other officers of the department, photographs to the value of Rs. 165 were sold. The photographer naturally found it difficult to cope with all this work, and was frequently helped by the second draftsman-photographer. Up to the end of the year only Rs. 19-8-0 were received from the purchasers of the photographs, and this amount was duly credited into the Treasury.

8. **Programme for 1921-22.**—The months of April to June will be devoted to office routine and other work at the headquarters. During July and part of August I propose to undertake a tour of inspection in the Almora District, where the temples of Champawati, which have not hitherto been inspected by any Archæologist, call for early examination. Inspection and conservation notes will then be prepared on these monuments and on the temple at Katarmal and others. I intend to reserve the months of September and October for the excavation of the Stupa mound at Chaitru near Dharamsala, if funds can be found for the purpose, and urgent literary work. The months of November and December will be set apart for the conservation and excavation work at Sarnath, for which a sum of Rs. 5,000 has been recommended. In January I hope to resume the exploration of the mounds at Harappa in the Montgomery District and to continue it for about seven weeks. The remaining few weeks of the year will be required for inspection of works completed during the year and for preparation of fresh projects for the future year. There will be casual visits to works in progress under my own Conservation Assistants who are about to be appointed and under the subordinates of the Public Works Department, but these it is impossible to forecast. The Conservation Assistants, who, I fear, will, with one exception, be quite new to archæological methods of work, will require frequent visits for one or two years to come from the Superintendent.

PART II.

A.—CONSERVATION

I.—PUNJAB.

9. The names of Hindu and Buddhist monuments in this province, which received attention during the year 1920-21 are given above at page 2 of this report. Here I insert the details of conservation work carried out at each individual monument together with the expenditure incurred and proposals for further repairs wherever they are necessary.

Nurpur Fort.—The estimate for works proposed for the Nurpur Fort in Mr. Natesa Aiyar's Note on the Ancient Monuments in the Kangra District amounted to Rs. 1,250. This sum included Rs. 840 for the construction of a shed for the loose sculptures lying about the ancient temple. Owing to late allotment of funds, however, a mere beginning was made with the work. The measures effected related to certain small repairs to the east gateway of the citadel and the removal of the debris from the north-east side of the old temple basement. I inspected this temple on the 27th March 1921, and soon discovered that the sculpture shed which had been proposed in the Conservation Note referred to was scarcely necessary, at any rate at the present stage. At my suggestion the Executive Engineer, Kangra Division, has been good enough to reappropriate the amount thus set free for the excavation of the basement of the ancient temple which is hidden under debris on all sides, only a small portion of the retaining wall being visible on the south side. The work is in progress, and the Sub-Overseer, Pt. Beli Ram, has been deputed to assist the Public Works Department subordinate in charge in the supervision of the work. It is expected that the whole of the basement will have been brought back to light before the end of the year. There is one other point which does not find mention in the Conservation Note. This refers to the floor of the Jagmohan which has sunk in part and requires to be taken up and relaid in its original position. The channel which carried away water from the sanctum is also choked and should be opened out.

The Shishmahal, or the palace in the Nurpur Fort, is not separately mentioned in the Conservation Note, though a lump sum of Rs. 150 is provided in the estimate for the general clearance of the entire fort area. The palace buildings have suffered more injury from the vandalism of the inhabitants of the town, who have carried away all wood-work from doors, windows and other serviceable parts, than from the ravages of time. The extant remains are, however, worthy of certain inexpensive repairs, which will be carried out.

10. **Kotla Fort.**—The repairs on the monuments in this fort, which were of a simple nature, had been practically completed when I inspected them in the end of March, 1921. They consisted of the making of a footpath to various monuments, pointing of masonry joints in the steps ascending the hill, grouting of fissures in the walls of the *baradari* and clearance of jungle. The only item which is not provided for in the Conservation Note or in the estimate is the repair of the upper gate at the top of the stair which is split up by two large trees. The *baradari* also needs certain further repairs which were pointed out to the Sub-Overseer in charge, Plate I, Photo. No. 2724.

11. **Kanihyara.**—The modern shed that had been erected over the rock inscription at Kanihyara in the Kangra District has been dismantled, though the wire fences have not yet been erected around them.

12. **Bajinath.**—At the temple of Bajinath at Bajinath in the Kangra District, which I inspected on the 31st March 1921, repairs have been carried out to the dharamsala at the south-west angle of the enclosure, and further progress was made with the scraping off of the whitewash from the interior of the *mandapa* and the porch.

I should add the following recommendations to those contained in Mr. Aiyar's Conservation Note regarding this temple. The right hand intercolumniation in the front of the gateway on the south side which is blocked with modern walling should be opened out, and its roof, which was partly renewed some time ago, reconstructed after its original design. There is a wide gap in the compound wall on the west side. It should be repaired. The restoration of the south outer wall of the *mandapa* of the main temple which was carried out after the earthquake of 1905 is an eyesore, but it should not be disturbed for the present. The octagonal tower at the north-east corner of the enclosure fell down in the earthquake of 1905, and is in a neglected condition. It should be tidied up and its walls built up to a uniform height.

13. **Amb.**—The following notes on the work carried out at Amb during the period 1st April 1920 to end of April 1921 have been made after a personal inspection. At the larger temple the superfluous limepointing (objected to in Item 1 of my Conservation Note dated 6th February 1919) has been scraped off except from the niches on the outside of the temple. I showed this to the Sub-Divisional Officer in charge. The arrangements for the supporting of the overhanging passage around the uppermost storey (Item 2 of Conservation Note) have been completed, and are expected to give a new lease of life to the monument, Plate II, Photo. No. 2823. The only suggestion I have now to make is that the two girders between the new masonry piers and the roof should be re-painted so as to harmonize in colour with the surrounding masonry. In connection with Item 3 of my Conservation Note which relates to the existing foundations of the anti-chamber, it is to be observed that nothing can be done until the elaborately moulded modern walls are first done away with. The steps in the stair ascending into the spire (Item 4) have been repaired. The basement of the temple (Item 5) has also been exposed, and an area equal to 20 feet freed from debris on all four sides of it. At my visit, however, it became evident that the original floor lay about four feet lower down. At this lower level I laid bare a well-made concrete floor which extends for a distance of about 35 feet, where it was terminated by a rubble-built wall. The latter might prove to be the original compound wall of the temple. The basement is found to be in a much ruined condition, as the facing has mostly perished, Plate III, Photo. No. 2826. What does remain of this facing, however, is enough to show that it was adorned on all sides with rows of boldly conceived niches separated by moulded pilasters, as is generally the case in *stupa* plinths in Gandhara. These niches must originally have contained images, but none of them were reclaimed. It is to be noted that only the lowest three or four courses are in white limestone, the rest of the facing being composed of Kanat. Only one of the niches has been completely restored with its original material, Plate III, Photo. No. 2831. The conservation of this basement presents difficulties. I had photographs taken from different points of view, and am seeking the advice of the Director-General of Archaeology in India on the subject. The flight of steps on the west side of the basement (Item 6) which was completely buried under debris has been exhumed in a better state of preservation than the basement itself, due, no doubt, to the fact that it is solidly constructed from top to bottom with slabs of white stone, Photo. No. 2823. The lower twelve steps require no repairs. The upper five or six were much damaged. They have been reconstructed with small stones and will have to be renewed. The new flanking walls are also defective and should be removed, but no attempt should be made to restore them, as we do not know their original design, and they are not needed. The interior of the cella on the ground floor as well as in the uppermost story has been improved by terraced flooring. Among the minor antiquities found during the operations three deserve special mention: (a) Image of Mahadeva, Plate VII, Photo. No. 2838; (b) an image of Nrisimha, Plate VII, Photo. No. 2837; and (c) a stone plaque, Plate VII, Photo. No. 2845.

Smaller temple.—The cinque-foil arch has been renewed in accordance with my recommendation (Item 1), Plate II, Photo. No. 2834.

(Item 3.) The basement of the temple has been excavated. It measures 46' 7" x 34', and it is evident that the northern portion must have supported another temple similar to the existing one. Some of the older folk told me that they had seen the missing temple in their lifetime, so that General

Cunningham's statement that there were three temples at Amb might after all have been correct. The basement has been added to on the east side in modern times; the new accretions should be cleared away. It is possible that this operation will reveal small flights of steps which originally led to these shrines.

The floors of the cella and the portico (Item 4) have been repaired. The paths which have been laid between the two temples and between them and the fort wall as also the road from the village to these temples (Item 5) are of a very temporary nature, and will have to be improved.

14. **Malot.**—The expenditure on the special repairs to the temple and gateway at Malot during the year amounted to Rs. 3,319-5-0 and brought the conservation of the monument to completion, Plate IV, Photographs Nos. 1903 and 2820, and Plate V, Nos. 1907 and 2819. The items of work actually carried out during the period under review were the completion of the domed ceiling of the temple, the repairs to the *Chhatra* on its top, the completion of the floor of the temple and portico, the underpinning of the decayed portions of the north and south walls of the gateway, and other minor measures.

15. **Raisina, Delhi.**—A Brahmanical shrine of the Mughal period, which I inspected for the first time during the past year, is a small shrine of Mahadeva situated on the Baird road at Raisina, New Delhi. My attention was drawn to this monument by a letter from certain Hindu officials of the Imperial Secretariat who had applied to the Director-General of Archaeology in India for the restoration of this shrine at Government expense. In its present condition the temple consists of a single chamber measuring 9' 9" square externally with a square platform built of rubble stone. It faces east and is covered with a hemispheric dome resting on arched pendentives. The walls on the inside are adorned with paintings representing Hindu mythological scenes, some of which are: Vishnu sleeping on the Sesha, the man-lion incarnation of Vishnu, Krishna playing on his flute, Sri being bathed by elephants, etc. The character of the shrine as a Saiva fane is placed beyond doubt by a square basin in the centre of the floor which must have held a *Siva Linga*. A platform which served the purpose of a Tulasi stand and a well belong to the temple, but the size of the original compound can no longer be ascertained.

The gentlemen of the Imperial Secretariat mentioned above had an ambitious scheme for the restoration of this temple, including the establishment of a school for imparting instruction in higher Sanskrit learning, a library, etc. My own recommendations have been embodied in a Conservation Note, and consist of the declaration of the temple as a "protected" monument under the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, the cleaning of the inner walls and dome which are soiled with soot, repairs to the floor, the eaves on the outside, and the platform, and the levelling up and fencing of a suitable area around the temple so as to include the Tulasi platform.

16. **Suraj Kund near Delhi.**—This is the name of an extensive tank (Plate I, Photo. No. 2765) surrounded with continuous flights of stone steps on all sides, and situated at the distance of about twelve miles from Delhi near the Tughlaqabad Railway station. The country around the tank was once occupied by an important ancient town, of which the only other existing remains are the dam known as the Anekpur Bund and a stone well. The Anekpur dam is attributed to Anangapala II, who is supposed to have constructed it in 1051 A. D.

On account of its great historical importance and its proximity to the capital of the country the monument deserves to be brought under the operation of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act (VII) of 1904 and to be suitably repaired. A printed Conservation Note dated the 4th December 1920 has been submitted to the local Government, and it is hoped my recommendations will meet with their approval.

II.—UNITED PROVINCES.

17. **Sarnath.**—The construction of the stone pavilion over the stump of the Asoka pillar was taken in hand during the year 1919-20. During the year under report the work was pushed forward, and at the end of the year it was all but completed, the only portion that remained to be done being a part of the roof. In the absence of any other work at

Sarnath or in its neighbourhood, I did not consider a personal visit to it necessary, but I did the next best thing in getting a photograph of the work as it stood at the end of the year, Plate VI, Photo. No. 2846.

18. **Mahoba, District Hamirpur.**—The only work carried out at Mahoba itself was the clearance of debris from the south side of the Rahilya temple, the earth thus obtained being utilized for the making of an approach road. It is, however, gratifying to observe that the work at the Makarbai temple went forward rapidly and the construction of the new compound wall was nearing completion at the end of the year. At the Kakra Marh temple nothing was done beyond the clearance of vegetation, etc. This was due to my mind to the transfer of both the District Surveyor and the subordinate who were in charge of the monuments at the time of my first inspection, when I discussed with them on the spot the nature of the work that was to be done. I was therefore requested by the Executive Engineer to inspect the monuments again and explain the measures required on the spot.

19. **Brindaban, District Muttra.**—During the year under review Rs. 400 was expended on repairs to the Gobind Deo, Jugal Kishor and Radha Ballabh temples at Brindaban. The plinth of the Gobind Deo temple was repaired with cement pointing three years ago. The pointing is, however, defective, as it is too conspicuous and not confined to the joints. The interior is disfigured with bats' nests and pigeons' dung, which should be cleaned away with care. Provide stone slabs of suitable size in the corner of the gallery in front of the sanctum similar to those in the other corners. The inner walls of the north or Brinda Devi's shrine are begrimed with smoke, and should be cleaned.

At the Jugal Kishor temple, the south-west outer angle of the sanctum had disappeared for about seven feet above the plinth and been restored in brickwork, leaving the superstructure partly unsupported. The brickwork should be taken out and the corner repaired in stone in exact imitation of original work. A few other minor repairs are needed. On the north side a flooring slab is missing and the wire netting in the window of the *mantapa* is broken. Wire-netted screens in angle iron frames should be provided in the openings in the dome over the cella and the walls on the inside cleaned.

B.—EXPLORATION.

I.—PUNJAB.

20. **Excavations at Harappa.**—The history of the site at Harappa, as far as it was ascertainable from European writers, is given in General Cunningham's *Archæological Survey Reports*, Vol. V, page 104 *seq.*, and I have nothing to add to it. The General rightly describes these ruins as the most extensive of all the old sites along the banks of the Ravi. He identified them as the city of *Po-fa-to*, or *Po-fa-to-o*, where the Chinese pilgrim Hiuen Tsang halted for two months to study the principles of the sect of the Sammitiyas, and which at that time was densely populated and provided with four stupas and twelve monasteries containing about 1,000 monks, besides twenty Brahmanical temples. The only ancient structures that Cunningham noticed on this site were the remains of flights of steps on both the eastern and western faces of the high mound to the north west (marked A B in General Cunningham's sketch plan), the basement of a large square temple, the Naogaza tomb, and the ruined Idgah. General Cunningham also mentions the traces of a large square building resembling a Buddhist monastery which he noticed on the south side of the southern mound (E). The Naogaza and the Idgah are still extant; the other structures noticed by the General have completely vanished.

A site like the one at Harappa would have yielded countless dwelling houses, religious buildings, and other valuable material relating to the culture and arts of the ancient Panjab. But alas! the ruins have been subjected to continued exploitation for bricks by thoughtless Railway contractors and villagers. Already before General Cunningham's visit in 1853 A. D. the site had furnished brick ballast for more than a hundred miles of the Lahore and Multan Railway line. These depredations have, if

anything, been carried on even more vigorously since General Cunningham's time, and it is patent that the town of Harappa has been built and rebuilt many times over with bricks obtained from this site. The first modern brick kiln was started at this place only last year, and one or two dwellings have been built partly with British standard bricks manufactured in that kiln.

Pt. Hirananda Sastri, who visited this site in January 1909, reported to Dr. Vogel that the mounds at Harappa were "not likely to repay excavation", though the mound with the Naogaza tomb and the Police Station mound appeared to be more promising. Mr. Hargreaves inspected these remains in 1914 and expressed about the same opinion regarding the prospect of exploration. In a manuscript note he submitted to the Director-General of Archaeology in India he suggested that as the owners demanded an exorbitant price (Rs. 4,706) for all the mounds, arrangements should be made in the beginning for the excavation of only one mound, marked F in General Cunningham's plan, which showed no indications of having been disturbed. When I inspected the site for the first time in 1917 Mr. Hargreaves' suggestion appealed to me so strongly that I at once submitted a proposal for the acquisition of this mound, together with a portion of the highest mound (marked A B in General Cunningham's plan), where an old stout wall underneath the Naogaza tomb raised hopes of the existence of some important brick monument. The compensation paid for these mounds, together with the cost of erecting boundary pillars, amounted to Rs. 2,771-9-5. The other mounds were not acquired, but were brought under the operation of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, section 3, with the result that all unauthorized diggings for building material have entirely ceased.

The excavation of the mounds F and A and B was commenced in the beginning of January 1921, and continued up to the middle of February. The operations were carried on under my personal supervision, but arrangements for supply of labour, tools, etc., were kindly made by the Executive Engineer, Lahore Provincial Division. The total expenditure on excavations, including the cost of huts provided for the use of the Bikaner labourers that had to be imported from outside, as no local labourers were available, amounted to Rs. 4,384-5-6.

Mound F is the northernmost mound on the site, and measures roughly 780' from north to south by 970' from east to west. At the time of General Cunningham's visit the height of this mound was 25 to 30 feet above the surrounding land, and it is still about the same. The mound was covered with potsherds and brick bats, but no brick foundations were visible anywhere that might have served as a starting point. It was therefore decided to carry a trench wide and long enough to lay bare the general lie of the remains hidden in it. A plan and section of this trench will be published in a special article and will show the nature of the structural remains exposed. They are, it must be admitted, somewhat disappointing, as soon after the work was begun it became apparent that this mound had suffered from the greed for bricks as much, if not even more, than the other mounds, with this difference that in this case the holes left by the entrenchments had been filled up and the mound presented an appearance which led one to think as if it had never been touched. The excavation was taken down to a depth of about twelve feet throughout the 500 feet of the trench, though it need scarcely be stated that there must be several strata before the virgin soil will be reached. The structural remains which occur from one end to the other are marked a to l in the plan, and are too fragmentary to afford anything in the way of a systematic plan of the buildings to which these wallings belonged. The latter are everywhere composed of well-burnt bricks of fine texture which have the interesting size of $11" \times 5\frac{1}{2}" \times 2\frac{1}{2}"$ to $3"$. This is also the size of the bricks in the building which was partly exposed in mound A B, and I believe of all bricks dug out on this site. The chief interest of these bricks lies in the scientific proportion of two widths to the length, which is the essential condition of good structural bonding. Bricks of this type have not so far been noticed at any other ancient site with the sole exception of a couple of Gupta bricks now preserved in the Sarnath Museum. These two bricks measure $14" \times 7"$ instead of the common size of $14" \times 9"$ to

10" of the Gupta monuments, and it was due to these two specimens that I consented to this more convenient size being employed in the restoration of the Parinirvana Stupa at Kasia. The structural remains may be very briefly noticed here. The fragment marked *a* is a corner of a room twelve feet below the present ground level, the walls being 2' 4" thick. Among the antiquities found here was a seal die (No. A 214), Plate IX, Photos. Nos. 2817 *a-b*. It is square in shape, $\frac{1}{2}$ " along each side and provided with a round projection on the reverse pierced with a hole for the string by which it was suspended. It was found at the depth of 4½ feet below the present ground level. The next fifty feet of the trench revealed no remains of any kind, though there were no signs of the area having been tampered with. The wall marked *b* in the plan must be put down to the latest period of occupation of the site, though in the absence of any definitely dateable antiquities it is difficult to determine this period. The remains designated *d* belong to three successive epochs. It was at this point that the large earthen jar (No. A 233 of the list and photo. No. 2741) came to light. The contents of this vessel were a number of domestic earthenware utensils, a stone chess figure, etc. Of the three fragments marked *f*, *g* and *h*, the middle one contains a covered brick drain which might have formed part of a dwelling-house or of a lane. The ruin distinguished by the letter *l* in the plan which came to light at the depth of 4' 3" below the present ground level is somewhat better preserved than the other fragments. In its present condition it consists of an incomplete wall (3' wide), 32' 4" long, with five parti-walls, only one of which belongs to the original structure. The building appears to have opened to the west, as there is an entrance 4' 9½" wide on that side. How far the house extended in the other directions cannot any longer be ascertained. Among the minor antiquities found in this building special interest attaches to a seal matrix (No. A 263) (Photos. Nos. 2817 *a-b*), which is 1½" square and has a hole in the reverse as is the case in No. A 214 mentioned above.

Of the mound marked A, B, C in General Cunningham's plan (Plate VIII, Photo. No. 2742) only a small area measuring 55' x 25' situated to the west of the Naogaza tomb was excavated. The ancient wall 11 feet high, which is partly visible underneath the north wall of the tomb, has been referred to above. The two large undulating rings of lime stone and slab locally believed to be the thumb-rings and ring gem of the Naogaza saint, but in reality some kind of architectural members which must have been found in this mound, are also already well-known. It was, therefore, not unreasonably expected that other portions of the edifice to which these relics belonged might still be reclaimed. My operations did, indeed, reveal portions of a large brick building, but unfortunately they were found to have been so badly hacked about by brick diggers that it is well nigh impossible to determine its real nature or date, Plate VIII, Photo. No. 2745. The excavation was rendered extremely laborious by the immense masses of earth that had to be shifted. The first four or five feet were quite barren of any kind of relics, but underneath this level the excavations brought to light a stratum that was thickly strewn with fragments of stone of various sizes, some highly polished, liak works of the Maurya period, others rough and coarsely dressed, which might be assigned to the Kushan times. Most of these fragments were, however, easily identified as parts of the undulating rings, three complete specimens of which are lying on the site. The precise purpose of these rings is not yet ascertainable, and I have not seen anything like them at any other site.* The only conjecture I can offer is that they might be bases of finials of some kind which answered to the usual ribbed ornaments or *amalaka* of the Hindu and allied temples. One large stone contains a socket for the tenon of a door, while two other slabs measuring 3' 4" x 3' x 3½" thick must have been used in the covering of a roof.

The floor level of the building referred to above was reached at the depth of about thirteen feet below the surface of the mound. The portion of the structure that has survived consists of parts of two rooms. One of them appears to have been a fairly large hall, as its northern wall has already been exposed for a length of 22' 6". It is standing to a height of about seven feet, and is three feet thick. Only a part of this room could be cleared, as the rest of it is hidden under a high mound of earth, and it will involve consider-

able expense and time to remove it. In the case of the other room only a small piece of the east wall remained. The southern wall had been removed by brick diggers and a neat tunnel only remained to mark its position. So skilfully had this operation been carried out that I was at first misled to believe that the tunnel might be a narrow covered passage leading to some sacred object. Another tunnel, however, running at right angles to the one described above set all doubts at rest. The existing portions of the building, as mentioned above, are composed of bricks of the same size as occurs all over the site. The other remains unearthed in the trench belong to a later epoch. I am unable to offer any suggestions regarding the date of this structure, as it is difficult to say if the stone fragments of the Maurya and Kushan periods referred to above originally belonged to it. Its floor level is more than forty feet above the level of the surrounding fields. What lies buried in the lower strata it is impossible to say. I doubt if tunnelling by the villagers has penetrated so deep as to have destroyed the remains of the earlier periods, especially in the areas removed from the sides which everywhere bear testimony to the spoliation perpetrated. The expense of such excavation is, however, bound to be great. It is therefore proposed, first, to examine the interior of this mound by sinking a shaft of sufficient width right down to the virgin soil, or to such depth as it is practicable to reach without destroying any useful evidence. The most suitable spot for this purpose would be the area immediately to the south of the trench just described.

A second trench was started in the western portion of this mound, but I was so completely bewildered by the enormous accumulations of earth that had to be cleared away that it appeared futile to continue it at the present stage.

As to minor portable antiquities, the greatest importance naturally belongs to the two seals in unknown script (Nos. A 214 and A 263). The legends and devices engraved on these seals are similar to those on the three previously known to us from this site and now deposited in the British Museum, London. Mr. Y. R. Gupta, a former Assistant Surveyor in this office, obtained two seals and one sealing, and these are now in the Central Museum, Lahore. One of these latter is also illustrated along with the two dug up by me. A cursory examination of the characters on these three seals shows at least seven symbols which are not found on any of the seals deposited in the British Museum. Several scholars have dealt with the seals deposited in the London Museum, but evidently no satisfactory interpretation of the legends has as yet been obtained. The excavations being described have so far failed to supply any aid in the solution of the problem. Further particulars of these documents will be published in the special article on these excavations.

General Cunningham states in his Archaeological Survey Report (Volume V, page 108) that Harappa had yielded thousands of coins of the Indo-Scythians and their successors. Neither Pandit Hira Nanda nor Mr. Hargreaves and Mr. Gupta obtained any such coins during their visits to Harappa, and although I myself saw a few Mughal coins with the villagers, there was not a single one of a pre-Mohammadan period. It appeared strange, therefore, that if coins of the Indo-Scythians and their successors had been as abundant on this site as described by General Cunningham, our enquiries for them should have been so futile. My excavations prove the General's statement to be definitely incorrect, for although hundreds of other small things were found, the operations did not bring to light a single coin of any kind. Why this is so I am at present unable to explain.

Nor did I find any stone images. That stone was employed in the construction of houses on this site in the Maurya and later periods is apparent from the few pieces found in the area to the west of the Naogaza. The only other objects in this material that were discovered during my excavations and those of General Cunningham were a number of small implements in a soft, dull cream-coloured kind of stone which the General believed to have been used for scraping wood or leather.*

No objects in any kind of metal were found except one or two iron nails and a hollow bead of gold, which latter might have been dropped on the site in modern times.

* General Cunningham remarks that he saw similar objects in Multan.

The excavations were fruitful in bringing to light an interesting collection of earthenware objects of a pre-historic date which may be classified under the following heads:—

- (1) Vessels of ordinary domestic use all turned on the wheel.
- (2) Terracotta objects consisting of figurines of men, animals, etc.
- (3) Ornaments.

The pottery found at Harappa is of the light red or brown colour, excepting some specimens which are black. The latter colour is produced by the application of a variety of earth after it has been fired once. The pottery is put back into the kiln again and taken out when the kiln is cool. The decoration of the wares is in most cases of the simplest description, and consists of a few lines cut into the body when the vessel is being moulded on the potter's wheel. In some cases black lines are smeared on the vessels before they are baked. The material for the pottery must have been easily available from the coarse alluvial clay from the bank of the river Ravi, which formerly flowed quite close to the ancient city, and fine sand from its bed. All pottery found at Harappa is unglazed, and not a single piece of glazed pottery was noticed during the excavations. Red ochre or *geru* appears on a few fragments, while one fragment (A 198) is decorated with a labyrinth of circles and an ornament resembling the Greek fret both in black colour. A few specimens of the earthen mallet, which is used to this day for tapping the vessels after their removal from the wheel, were found. Some of the forms of the pottery are simple, but pleasing. Some of these vessels closely resemble in shape the pre-historic pottery from Tinnevely. The domestic vessels are of the following kinds:—

- (1) Large grain or water jars or *chatis*. No small pitchers or *gharas* or *surohis* were found. These *chatis* are of the oval or egg-shaped form with narrow, circular bottoms and broad mouths with stout rims. (A 233.)
- (2) Large-sized troughs for the use of the dyer, etc.
- (3) A stoutly made dish in which flour was mixed and prepared. The only specimen found is a fragment. (No. C 18).
- (4) Ornamental cover for plates. (No. C 23.)
- (5) Ordinary *lota* or *gadvi* with flat bottom. (A 174.)
 - (a) A *lo* for water with a projecting narrow bottom. This type claims more specimens than any other.
- (6) A large water jug with a bulbous body and long neck. (A 224.)
- (7) A water bottle with a broad body, but a narrow neck, which might have been used for keeping oil. (A 3.)
- (8) The jar known as *marthan* for keeping pickles of the type which is used to this day. (A 276.)
- (9) Earthen plate out of which food was eaten. (Compare fragment No. A. 259.)

Crucibles.

- (10) A tumbler or crucible, cylindrical in shape, which occurs in several sizes, the largest being $4\frac{3}{4}$ " high. (C/. A 233.)
- (11) Lids for crucibles, which are shallow bowls with handles on the convex or concave side. (Compare No. A 218.) One such lid (No. A 267) has four holes for the passage of air.
- (12) Small crucibles with pierced sides, which may have been used as filters of some kind for liquids, or possibly as sand-holders, which are used by old-fashioned bankers for blotting inks. (Compare No. A. 257.)

- (13) Inkpot of the shape used in old type *Pathshalas* and *maktabs* to this day. (Compare No. A 281.) No. C. 2 has three holes in the mouth for the string.
- (14) Earthenware rests for dishes or pitchers. (Compare A. 171.)
- (15) Diamond-shaped cakes or discs of coarse clay which must have been used as supports or rests for vessels of water. (A 321.)
- (16) An earthen instrument for making twines. It is a curved shaped piece with five holes, one of which is broken off. Each hole received a strand, all five of which combined into the completed twine. The exact purpose of this piece is, however, uncertain. (No. C 25.) I have recently noticed a similar object among the Central Asian antiquities deposited in the Indian Museum, Calcutta.
- (17) A conical-shaped object with a hole in the base which might have held a wooden stick. Such instruments are used for twining the sacred thread.

II.—ORNAMENTS.

No metal ornaments of any kind were found, not even those of brass or copper or iron. The only exception was a small hollow bead of gold leaf which was found in trench C.

- (18) Earthenware bangles of various sizes were found in large abundance. A few complete specimens were found. One pair of them attains a high degree of excellence. It is made of fine clay coloured blue. (No. A 182.) Plate IX, Photo No. 2759.
- (19) Earthenware beads of exceptional length. (No. A. 62.)

Toys.

The toys found include terracotta figuring of men, animals and birds and two bowl-shaped rattles. (Nos. A 226 and A 174.)

Among human figures the most interesting perhaps are two crudely-shaped diminutive figurines with the legs bound in the hands. (Nos. A 322 and A 234.) All the other human figures are female figures (Plate X, Photo. No. 2807-b) which appear to be crude caricatural representations. The method of making these figures is very simple. The entire body is roughly shaped out of a lump of wet clay, and features, drapery, ornaments, etc., are then separately made and struck on in proper positions. In the more complete specimens, such as No. A 78, A 176 and A 175 (type 20), the hair is done up in a high mass, ending on both sides in closed volutes or horns.

The figures of animals comprise those of a lion (No. A 74), log (A 199), humped bulls (Nos. 153 and C. 14), and another animal (A 310) which cannot be definitely identified. Plate X, Photo. No. 2808. The figure has four holes, one in each of the horns, one in the hump, and the fourth in the hind part. The purpose of these holes is not understood.

- (21) The only other kind of toy is a cart (Plate X, Photo. No. 274) consisting of a shallow rectangular basin with rings for the ends of the axle at the sides and another ring in front for the string by which the cart was drawn. Several earthenware wheels which belonged to such carts were found (c/. A 168.) In connection with terracotta figurines it is worthy of note that no divine images for votive offerings or household worship were reclaimed with the single exception of No. B54, Plate IX, Photo. No. 2813.
- (22) Baked balls of clay, which must have been thrown from flings to scare away birds, were found in large numbers. One ball of polished stone was also found. Was it a child's marble?

II.—UNITED PROVINCES

No excavations were carried out in the United Provinces during the year under review. I spent, however, a period of about five weeks at Muttra in the summer of 1920, when I was engaged on the preparation of a detailed Memoir on the exploratory works carried out at and near Muttra by Rai Bahadur Pandit Radha Krishna and while there succeeded in discovering, in company with the energetic Honorary Curator, two important sculptures. One of them is now worshipped as Gokarnesvara Mahadeva in a temple outside the Brindaban gate of Muttra city. This temple stands on a lofty mound and the image is said to have been found in it. The statue, which evidently represents a Kushan King, is six feet high. It is seated in Hindu style on a Simhasana and is in perfect preservation including the head and head-dress, which are missing in the other royal statues of the Kushan dynasty. As in the statue of Wima, the dress consists of a loose open coat which, I learn from Sir Aurel Stein, is worn to this day by the inhabitants of Turkistan, who call it by the name of *chappan*. The head-dress is a high conical cap similar to the *kulah* worn by the Afghans in these days. It now becomes evident that if the heads of the Kanishka, Wima and Chastana (?) statues had been extant they would have been similar to the head of the image being described. It was with considerable difficulty that permission to photograph (Plate XI. Photo No. 2767) the statue was obtained, but if it is ever possible to examine the statue more closely it may yield its own name.

The other sculpture discovered during my stay at Muttra through the kindness of Rai Bahadur Radha Krishna is a female statue which is now worshipped as Manasadevi (Plate XII. Photo No. 2768) in a modern temple built on the top of a mound near the village of Gopalpur. This village is about twelve miles distant from Muttra on the road leading to Bharatpur. There are two fairs held in honour of this goddess, which take place on the Purnamasis of Vaisakha and Jyeshtha. The image, which is carved in the round, and which is represented as seated on a semi-circular wickerwork stool is five feet in height, the width of the base being 2 feet 2 inches. The head of the statue has been recarved in modern times, like that of the Bodhisattva statue from the Gayatri Tila now deposited in the Muttra museum. The whole of the front of the statue is much defaced. The feet are bare and the existing ornaments are bracelets and large thick anklets. Between the feet of the statue, on the top of the base, is engraved a document of three lines in the same type of Brahmi characters as occur in the inscription on the large statue from Parkham now in the Archaeological Museum at Muttra. The inscription is being studied. Both these statues are of considerable historical interest and should, if possible, be acquired for the Museum.

One other sculpture deserves special mention. At the time of its acquisition in 1912 for the Muttra Museum by the Honorary Curator, it was being worshipped by the inhabitants of the village of Bhadar, distant ten miles from Muttra. It represents a Naga standing with a *nagi* on either side. In front of the base is a relief consisting of five male and five female worshippers and below it an inscription of three lines in Kushana Brahmi characters. The purport of the record is that on the 5th day of the fourth month of the summer of Sam 8 (in the reign) of Maharaja, Rajatiraja, Kanikkha, a tank, a garden, and a gateway (were founded) in honour of the Bhagavat Bhumina. The inscription is interesting for several reasons. The name of the Naga deity Bhumina has not so far been met with in any other inscription.

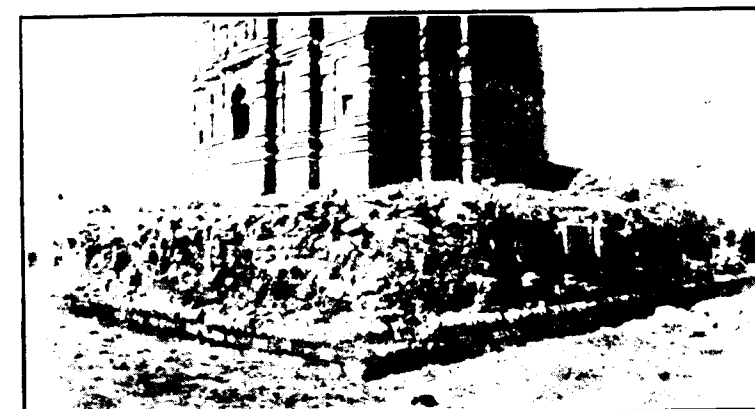

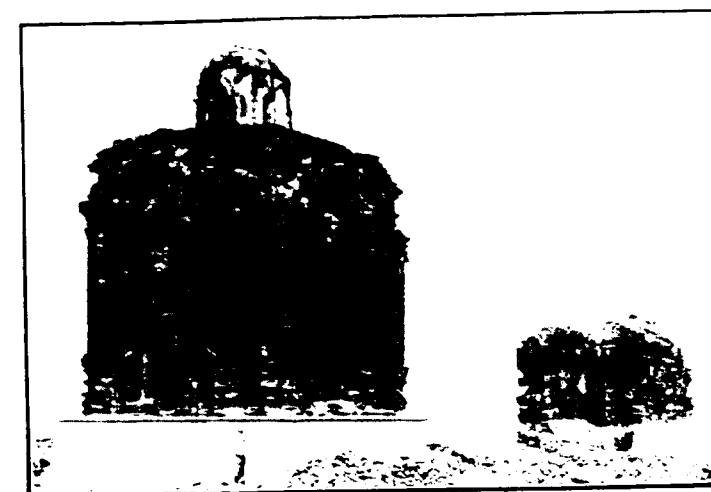




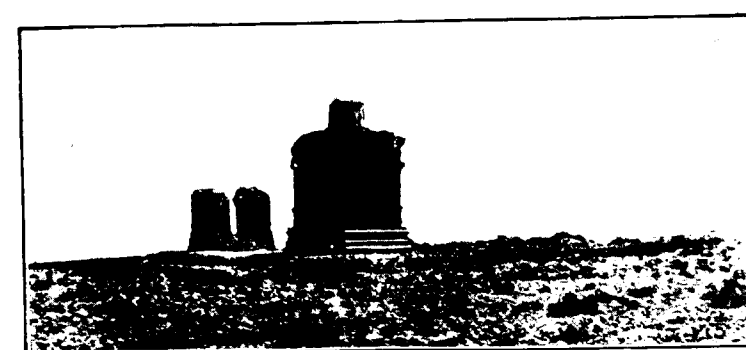

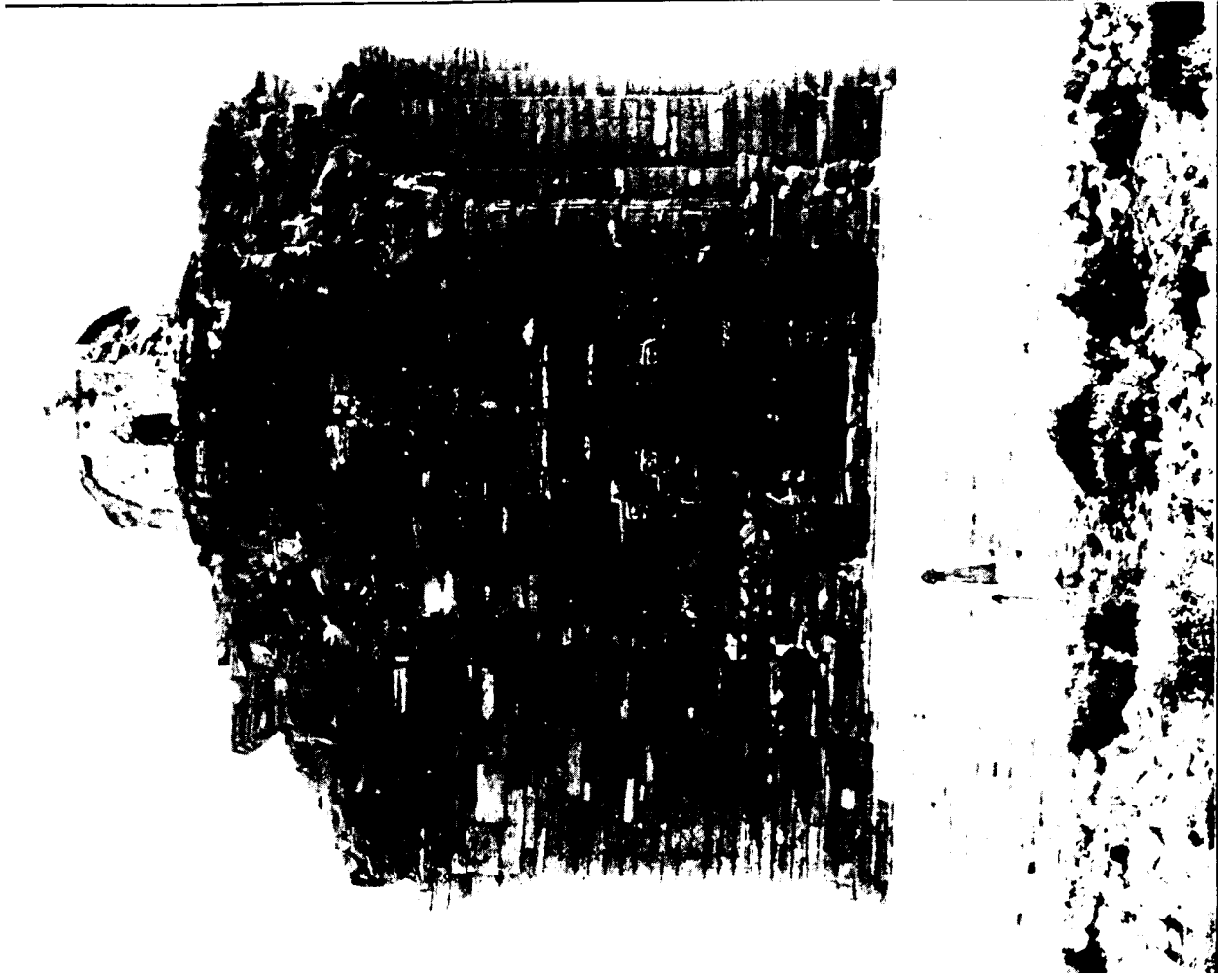

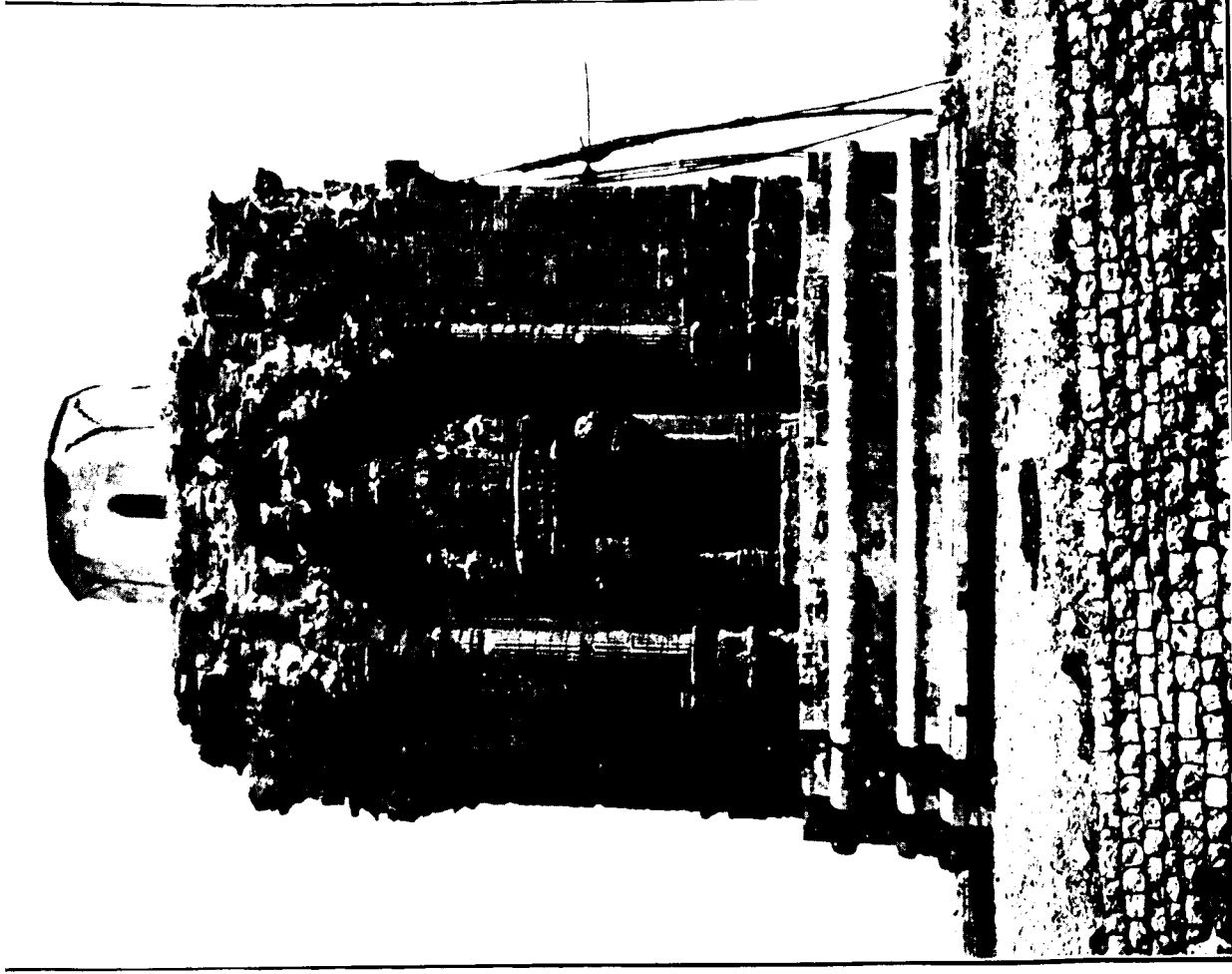
