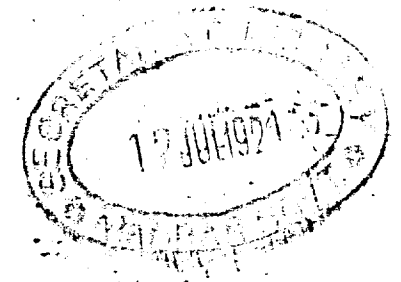

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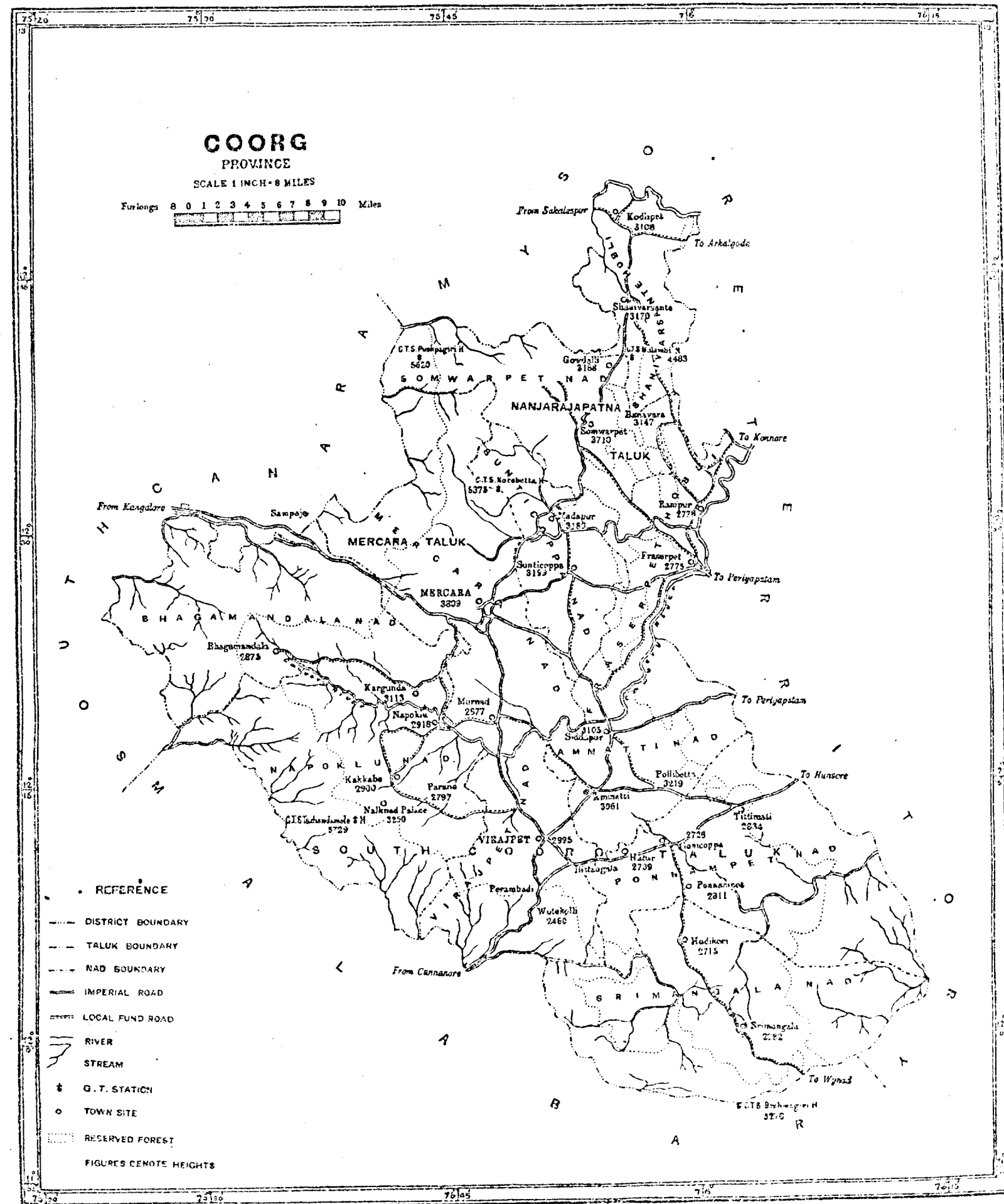

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PART I.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

1. *General and Political.*—On the whole the year under report, so far as politics was concerned, was one of expectation. As was noted in the general summary of the previous year's report, proposals were formulated to constitute a Legislative Council in the province. These proposals were submitted for sanction: but for various causes did not obtain approval during the year. This unavoidable delay caused a certain amount of heart-burning and a recrudescence was noted of the proposal to amalgamate Coorg with Madras. This proposal emanated mainly from a comparatively small clique in the Landholders' Association and did not voice the general feeling of the country.

On the whole the agricultural position during the year was distinctly good. The rice crop was excellent and good prices were obtained. Coffee also yielded a good harvest and prices were high. The only crop which suffered to any extent was cardamoms which were severely affected by a caterpillar. Prices, however, were higher than they had been for nearly 10 years.

The health of the province was only fair, but there were no severe epidemics.

Coorg like the rest of India found the necessity for severe retrenchment in its expenditure on the services and an officer of high standing was specially deputed from Madras to inquire into the expenditure in the province. He thoroughly over-hauled every department and as a result of his recommendations, the expenditure on the services in Coorg will eventually be decreased by over a lakh and a half of rupees per annum. Many economies were effected and one more taluk was abolished. The number of clerks was cut down and considerable reductions were made in the Police force. These retrenchments naturally gave rise to a certain amount of dissatisfaction, since service under the Government had long been looked upon as a source of income for very many families in the province. The feeling of dissatisfaction, however, seems to be gradually lessening.

2. *Civil and Criminal Justice.*—There is little to relate in regard to the administration of justice. Recourse to the civil courts is steadily increasing and there was a considerable rise in the value of the suits instituted during the year. The Workmen's Breach of Contract Act will cease in the course of a few years; but there is a general desire in the province for the substitution of some Act on similar lines. Coorg depends mainly on labour from outside and until the classes from which recruitment is effected show more respect for a contract some form of summary remedy against defaulters will be necessary.

The police, as usual, continued to be efficient, although the percentage of successful cases declined considerably during the year. It will be interesting to see how far the curtailment of the force is responsible for this decline.

3. *Local Self-Government*.—The main question which agitated the District Board was that of raising the cess to the full amount allowable by the law. Just after the close of the year, the Board decided to raise it to the maximum. The decision was not very well received; but it was obviously necessary if an adequate salary was to be given to the large majority of poorly-paid teachers in the Local Fund schools. The increase in the cess was ear-marked for this purpose.

4. *Forests*.—The revenue from forests exceeded all previous records. A larger quantity of sandalwood was sold at very remunerative prices. The tramway in the Western Ghats was also completed. Unfortunately the negotiations for the disposal of the timber from these forests were not completed: but there is every hope that this tramway will form a remunerative source of revenue. The price of timber generally fell very greatly and considerable difficulty was experienced in disposing of timbers from the deciduous forests. The market was dull throughout the year and has shown little signs of improvement since.

5. *Public Instruction*.—There is little to record under education. The number of pupils was not so great as in the previous year and the results of the S.S.L.C. examination were not so successful. Owing to lack of funds, the Wesleyan Mission had to close three of their schools and the Municipalities two.

6. *Co-operation*.—The co-operative movement in Coorg steadily gained in strength. The number of members of societies increased largely and the receipts were considerably more than in the previous year. The Central Bank which had been started in the previous year has been a success. No less than 91 of the credit societies became affiliated to it and there is every prospect that this bank will be of the greatest assistance to co-operation.

7. *Administration*.—The Hon'ble Mr. W. P. Barton, C.S.I., C.I.E., was in charge of the province throughout the year as Chief Commissioner. He visited the province and made a prolonged stay during the course of which he inspected most places of importance. He also presided at a Co-operative conference at which most of the important matters relating to co-operation were fully discussed. Mr. C. A. Souter, I.C.S., held the post of Commissioner throughout the year and Rao Sahib K. Chengappa, the Assistant Commissioner, officiated as District Magistrate during that period.

Other statistical information will be found in the Coorg District Gazetteer, Volume B. Statements Nos. 1 to 5 exhibit the prescribed statistics regarding the area, character of the surface, climate, civil divisions and population of the province.

2. There were no changes in the form of administration during the year under report.

Changes in the administration

3. Mysore is the only foreign State adjoining and the relations therewith were satisfactory.

Relations with Native States.

4. The public health during the year was not so good as in the last year, the number of deaths registered being 989 more. Fever claimed the greatest number of victims. Plague broke out in Fraserpet hobli but the epidemic was satisfactorily dealt with and the mortality was very low. The season on the whole was favourable for wet and dry crops. The outturn of rice and ragi was good and the ryots were greatly benefited by the high prices prevailing in the neighbouring provinces. The coffee crop was better than in the previous year and good prices were realised. The cardamom crop suffered severely from the ravages of caterpillars, which appeared on many of the estates, but the prices realised were the highest on record for the last eight years. Prices continued to rule high for food stuffs and the other necessary commodities of life. Those with fixed incomes were hit by the high prices of necessaries. Cattle mortality was heavier than in the last year but there were no severe attacks of contagious disease.

Condition of the people.

II.—ADMINISTRATION OF THE LAND. (1922-23.)

Realization of
the revenue.

5. Statement No. 6—*Land revenue.*—The demand for the year was Rs. 3,74,189 as compared with Rs. 3,80,435 for the previous year. The decrease of Rs. 6,246 is due to the reduction of assessment on abandoned estates, etc. Including an outstanding balance of Rs. 1,28,950 at the beginning of the year, the gross demand amounted to Rs. 5,03,139. Of this sum, Rs. 3,89,544 were collected and Rs. 4,117 remitted leaving a balance of Rs. 1,09,478. This amount however includes Rs. 63,780 due from coffee planters who are allowed to defer payment until 31st May and Rs. 418 Vaisakha demand due in September and Rs. 3,073 suspended till next year. The actual balance was therefore Rs. 42,207.

6. Statement No. 7—*Assignments of land revenue.*—The total value of assignments was Rs. 1,08,921 or Rs. 228 less than that of the previous year. The decrease is due partly to the sale of jama and jodi lands for arrears of revenue and partly to the conversion of gowdumbli lands into sagu tenure.

7. The acreage held under the principal tenures is shown in the following table, which includes the corresponding figures for the previous year:—

The decrease under sagu wet and dry, jama wet, jodi wet and dry and jaghir wet is due to redemption of lands and conversion of jaghir lands into sagu during the year. The decrease in the area under coffee, orange, is due to relinquishments and the increase under rubber to expansion of cultivation.

8. Statement No. 8—*Incidence of land revenue on area and population.*—This is a quinquennial return prepared in the year under report. The total land revenue excluding cesses was Rs. 3,89,782 giving an incidence of Rs. 2-6-1 per head of population. The incidence per acre of land revenue on the area fully assessed was Rs. 2-7-3.

9. Statement No. 9—*Transfers of landed property.*—Of the 87 transfers of unprivileged lands, 36 cases refer to sales by revenue courts for the recovery of the arrears of assessment, 32 cases refer to resumption to Government owing to resignations for want of bidders at sales and the remaining 19 cases to sales by order of civil courts. The number of privileged holdings brought to sale for arrears of revenue was 17. In no case land was sold for the recovery of loans advanced under the Co-operative Societies Act.

Agricultural
advances.

10. Statements Nos. 10, 11 and 12—*Transactions under the Land Improvement and Agriculturists' Loans Acts.*—The total amount advanced to cultivators during the year under both Acts, aggregated Rs. 18,070 as against Rs. 11,890 in the preceding year. This together with the outstanding balance of Rs. 90,298 at the beginning of the year, brought the gross total for recovery

to Rs. 1,08,368. The realizations amounted to Rs. 29,939 leaving a balance of Rs. 78,429 made up of Rs. 239 which became due but were not realized before the close of the year and Rs. 78,190 not payable during the year. In 9 cases lands were attached and sold for arrears due by the recipients. The net result from these loan operations was an income of Rs. 2,649 as compared with Rs. 4,621 in 1921-22 and Rs. 2,260 in 1920-21.

11. The sum advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act, was Rs. 7,590 distributed among 82 ryots in sums ranging from Rs. 30 to Rs. 300. The amount falling due for recovery during the year including arrears was Rs. 22,389 and the percentage of collection was 94.00 against 89.00 in the previous year.

12. The advances under the Agriculturists' Loans Act to ryots amounted to Rs. 10,480. The number of ryots who were given loans was 179 and the sums distributed ranged from Rs. 30 to Rs. 120. The percentage of realizations was 100.00 against 99.00 in the previous year.

13. Statement No. 13—*Survey and Settlement.*—The progress made by the Land Records Department was satisfactory. The maps and records were kept up to date. Twenty-six village maps were republished during the year. Twenty-five crop experiments were conducted. Surveys, settlements and land records.

14. No survey school was opened during the year at Fraserpet for want of candidates.

15. The area of land sold under the Waste Land Rules during the year was 44.76 acres. Excluding the value of tree growth, the amount realized was Rs. 293 giving an average per acre of Rs. 6-8-9 as compared with an average of Rs. 23-5-2 in the previous year. Waste lands.

16. The number of minors under the official guardian increased from 11 to 12 during the year under report. The arrangements made for the management of their landed properties and for the recoveries of the debts due to them were satisfactory. Wards' estates.

17. There are no zamindaris in Coorg and the great bulk of the holdings are ryotwari, though there are one or two separate villages held as jaghirs. Particulars have been given in paragraph 7 supra of the holdings under the various classes of tenure, a separate description of which will be found in paragraphs 33-40 in the Administration report for the year 1921-22. Owing to the fact that individual ryots frequently hold land under more than one tenure, it is impracticable to compile statistics of the several rent-paying classes. Reference has been made in paragraphs 6 and 8 supra to the revenue foregone in respect of the several privileged tenures and to the incidence of the land revenue demand on the population, while information as to the average assessment is furnished in Statement No. 82. Revenue and rent-paying classes.

III.—PROTECTION.

18. The standing information which should be incorporated in this chapter is printed at page 15 of the Administration Report for the year 1921-22 under the heading "Legislating Authority". Standing information.

19. Statement No. 14—*Acts of the Governor-General in Council affecting Coorg.*—No Act of the Governor-General in Council was extended to Coorg under the Scheduled Districts Act during the year. But the Madras Stamp (Amendment) Act, 1922 (VI of 1922), and the Madras Court Fees (Amendment) Act, 1922 (V of 1922), were extended to Coorg under the Scheduled Districts Act during the year. Regulation No. II of 1923, further to amend the Coorg Courts' Regulation, 1901, received the assent of the Governor-General in Council on the 10th February 1923. Course of legislation. (1922-23.)

Police.
(1922.)

20. Statements Nos. 15 and 16—*Cognizable crime*.—There was a slight increase in the total number of true cases of cognizable crime under the Indian Penal Code excluding nuisances (344 against 338). The number of cases reported during the year fell from 425 to 292. The total number of serious offences reported against person and property was 101 against 122. The percentage of convictions obtained in true cognizable cases investigated by the police was 64.75 as against 74.32 in the previous year.

21. Four cases of murder including two pending from the previous year were investigated during the year. In one of these, the accused was discharged, in two, the offenders committed suicide and the remaining one was pending at the end of the year. A case of culpable homicide was also pending at the end of the year.

22. Twenty-seven suicides and 30 accidental deaths were reported as compared with 24 and 43 respectively.

23. Statement No. 19—*Property stolen and recovered*.—The value of property lost during the year rose from Rs. 10,025 to Rs. 13,370, while the percentage recovered was 59.05 as against 40.94.

24. Statement No. 20—*Sanctioned strength and cost*.—In consequence of the retrenchment scheme, the strength of the permanent force was reduced by 28 members, comprising 1 Inspector, 3 Sub-Inspectors and 24 constables. The total expenditure was Rs. 99,371 as against Rs. 1,06,251 in the previous year.

25. Statement No. 21—*Equipment, discipline and internal management*.—The actual strength of the police was 229 as against 250 in 1921. The Tavunad and Fraserpet stations were converted into out-posts and the out-posts at Tittimatti, Ammatti, Gonikoppal and Gaddige, were abolished. Recruitment during the year was fairly satisfactory, but there were seventeen resignations. The number of deaths in the year was 4 against 2, while the number of admissions into hospitals was larger than in the previous year. The number of dismissals was 6 against 7 in the previous year, while the number of other departmental punishments rose from 89 to 112. The number of policemen literate in Canarese was 210 against 228 in 1921. The number of Coorg policemen was 134 against 138 in the previous year.

26. Rao Sahib P. Devayya was in charge of the department throughout the year.

Criminal
Justice.
(1922.)

27. Statements Nos. 22-23—*Number of criminal courts and trials conducted*.—Rao Sahib K. Chengappa, B.A., held the office of the District Magistrate throughout the year.

The Kiggatnad Taluk was abolished and the incumbent holding the post of the Subedar Magistrate was put in charge of the newly constituted South Coorg taluk. The Revenue Parpattigar at the headquarters of the abolished taluk was invested with the powers of a third-class magistrate and one of the incumbents holding the post of taluk magistrate was absorbed elsewhere. As it was found that the South Coorg Subedar, who has a heavy revenue charge could not do much criminal work, he was divested of criminal jurisdiction and the jurisdiction of the Virajpet Munsiff Magistrate was extended to the whole of South Coorg.

The Bench of Magistrates at Mercara was invested with second-class powers and a similar Bench of Magistrates with third-class powers was constituted at Virajpet on the 15th December 1922. There were no other changes in the personnel of the subordinate magistracy.

28. Statement No. 24—*Particulars regarding the trial of offences*.—The number of cases brought to trial (3,333) was 1,358 less than in the previous year, and the number of offences reported (4,837) decreased by 177. Under the Workman's Breach of Contract Act (XIII of 1859), as subsequently amended, 3,119 cases were instituted as compared with 3,240 cases in 1921. The total number of cases brought to trial under this Act, including those pending from last year (93) was 1,765. Omitting cases of this class, the criminal trials during the year resulted in the discharge or acquittal of 1,235 persons and the conviction 868. The percentage of convictions was thus 37.62 as compared with 45.15 and 42.90 in the two previous years. Excluding petty cases of hurt, assault, mischief and insult, of which a large number were compounded under section 345 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the percentage of persons convicted comes to 63.09 against 73.82 in the previous year. Offences against public tranquillity and justice numbered 36, those against the person 348 and those against property 277, while there were 154 other offences under the Indian Penal Code and 2,518 breaches of special and local laws. Cases under the Police Act and District Fund Regulation were 296 and 233 against 435 and 202, respectively in the preceding year. There were no cases of opium smuggling nor were any proceedings taken under the Indian Press Act during the year.

29. Statement No. 25—*Miscellaneous proceedings under the Criminal Procedure Code*.—There were fifteen cases brought to trial against fourteen in the previous year.

30. Statement No. 26—*General result of criminal trials*.—The average duration of each case was 15 days in the District Magistrate's Court, 14 days in the first-class Magistrate's Court, 5 days in the subordinate courts and 18 days in the Sessions Court.

31. Statements Nos. 27 to 31—*Punishments inflicted by various courts*.—The amount of fines imposed and of compensation awarded was Rs. 5,428 and Rs. 492 respectively as compared with Rs. 6,573 and Rs. 600 in the previous year.

32. Statement No. 33—*Result of appeal and revision*.—The Judicial Commissioner received six appeals against convictions: in two cases the sentences were reduced: in three cases the sentences were upheld and in one case the appellant died: four appeals were dealt with by the Sessions Judge: in one case the conviction was reversed and in three cases the sentences were upheld. Thirty-five appeals were preferred before the District Magistrate: the sentences were reduced in three cases and convictions reversed in seven cases. There were 26 applications for revision as compared with 21 in the previous year.

33. Statement No. 34—*Juries and assessors*.—Trials before the Sessions Court were conducted with the assistance of assessors.

34. The records and registers of all subordinate courts were inspected by the District Magistrate during the year.

35. Statements Nos. 35 to 62—*Detailed statistical information regarding the administration of the jail department during the year 1922*. Prisons.
(1922).

36. The Mercara Jail was ordered to be treated as a District Jail although convicts sentenced to over six months were transferred to the Cannanore Central Jail.

37. The accommodation available in the Mercara Jail was the same as in 1921. There was no overcrowding in any of the wards of the jail during the year.

38. The number of Taluk sub-jails was the same as in 1921. The total number of admissions to sub-jails during the year under report was 311 against 446 in the previous year.

39. Six convicts were confined in the sub-jails against 7 in the previous year. The maximum period of detention in the case of under-trial prisoners was 129 days, the average being 10.50 days.

40. Statements Nos. 36 to 43—*Number and disposal of jail population, classification according to religion, age, offences, etc.*—On the 1st January 1922, there remained in the jails 51 prisoners of all classes; 544 were admitted during the year and 561 discharged from all causes, leaving 34 in confinement at the close of the year. The daily average population fell from 60.23 to 39.97 during the year under review. The number of under-trial prisoners who remained in custody at the beginning of the year was 17; 438 were received during the year and 438 were discharged from all causes, leaving 17 in confinement at the end of the year. The daily average number was 14.93 as compared with 18.45 in 1921.

41. At the commencement of the year, the convict population stood at 33 males and 1 female; 98 males and 2 females were imprisoned during the year. Of those discharged during the year, 112 were released on expiry of sentence, and 1 under the remission rules. Two were transferred to the Cannanore Central Jail and two died. Seventeen males remained in confinement at the end of the year.

Mercara

42. Statements Nos. 44 to 49—*Particulars regarding jail discipline.*—The number of jail offences committed by convicts declined from 34 to 26. Two convicts who escaped in previous years remained at large. Corporal punishment was not inflicted during the year. There were 12 habitual offenders. They formed 13.04 per cent of the convict population. During the year one convict was released under the remission rules. The largest remission of 16 days was earned by a convict sentenced to six months rigorous imprisonment.

43. Statements Nos. 50 to 53—*Scales of diet.*—Diet was, as usual, supplied departmentally in accordance with the authorized scale. The result was satisfactory. The quality of the food is good and the quantity sufficient to keep the prisoners in good health. The daily cost per head was three annas and one pie against two annas and eight pies in the previous year. The increase is due to high prices of food stuffs.

44. Statements Nos. 54 to 56—*Detailed statistics of health.*—Water is supplied from the Mercara reservoir. Conservancy and drainage arrangements were adequate and satisfactory. The health of the prisoners was much better than in the previous year; the daily average number of sick being 1.64 as against 1.69 in 1921. There were two deaths among the convicts.

45. Statement No. 58—*Expenditure on guarding and maintaining prisoners.*—The gross expenditure was Rs. 7,376 against Rs. 9,946 in the previous year. The decrease is due to the fall in the jail population. The total cost per head of average strength rose from Rs. 207 to Rs. 237. The increase is due to the biennial supply of clothing to warders.

46. Statement No. 60—*Employment of convicts.*—As no indoor labour was carried on in the jail, convicts were hired by the Public Works Department, other departments and private individuals.

47. Statement No. 61—*Net cash earnings of convicts.*—The total receipts from jail labour were Rs. 1,369 against Rs. 1,947 in the previous year. The decrease is due to the low population. The expenditure on materials was Rs. 14 as against Rs. 403 in the previous year and the net profit to Government was Rs. 1,293 against Rs. 1,544. Taking the profit into consideration, the net expenditure was Rs. 6,083 as against Rs. 8,402 in the previous year and the average cost per prisoner was Rs. 183 against Rs. 169.

A sum of Rs. 2,655 was incurred on account of 32 convicts undergoing sentence at the Cannanore Central Jail. A further sum of Rs. 69 was also paid towards escorting 5 prisoners to the Cannanore Central Jail.

48. Statement No. 62—*Result of the employment of convicts on manufactures and extra-mural labour.*—As long term convicts are transferred to the Cannanore Central Jail no manufacture was undertaken during the year. The only source of income is the extra-mural labour. The gross profits amounted to Rs. 1,304 and the average profit per head sentenced to labour was Rs. 140.36.

49. Mr. G. L. Narayan Rao, B.A., B.L., Munsiff, Mercara, was in charge of the Mercara Jail throughout the year.

50. There was no change either in the number of civil courts (five) or in their jurisdiction. Civil Justice.
(1922.)

51. Statement No. 63—*Number and description of suits instituted.*—Two thousand nine hundred and seventy-nine suits were filed in the year against 2,688 in the previous year.

52. Statement No. 64—*Number and value of suits instituted.*—There was an increase in the value of suits which was Rs. 3,24,702 against Rs. 2,68,405 or 2.09 per cent more than in the previous year and the average value (Rs. 109) was 9 rupees higher.

53. Statement No. 65—*Result of the disposal of original suits.*—Two thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven suits were decided against 2,831 in the previous year and the arrears rose from 378 to 560 in the year under report. The number of suits decreed without contest was 2,097 against 2,103. Six out of 18 applications for review were granted and 12 were rejected. Four applications to sue *in forma pauperis* were received, of which two were granted and two rejected.

54. One thousand nine hundred and thirteen witnesses were examined against 1,941 in the previous year.

55. Statement No. 66—*Result of the disposal of the miscellaneous cases.*—Four hundred and seventy-five miscellaneous applications including 50 pending from the previous year were for disposal. Four hundred of these cases including 16 cases under the Guardians and Wards Act, VIII of 1890, and four for probate and letters of administration were disposed of.

56. Statements Nos. 67 and 68—*Regular and miscellaneous appeals.*—Of the 59 regular appeals for disposal including 22 pending from the previous year against 58 in 1921, lower courts' orders were confirmed in 30 cases, three cases were remanded for retrial, the orders in three cases were reversed and in four cases the orders of the lower Courts were modified, leaving eighteen pending at the close of the year.

Ten cases out of twenty-three including eleven pending from the previous year were decided by the Judicial Commissioner. Orders of the lower courts were upheld in eight cases, one was reversed and one was remanded leaving thirteen pending at the close of the year.

There were nineteen miscellaneous appeals against fifteen in the previous year. Orders of the lower Courts were confirmed in twelve cases, one was modified and one reversed leaving five pending at the close of the year.

One miscellaneous appeal pending from the previous year was for disposal in the Judicial Commissioner's Court during the year under report. The order of the lower Court has been confirmed in this appeal.

57. Statement No. 69—*Particulars of the execution proceedings.*—Five thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven applications for execution which included 1,133 of 1921, were for disposal during the year; of these, 1,597 were pending at the close of the year. No recovery was effected in 3,375 cases.

58. Statement No. 70—*Result of insolvency applications.*—Forty-nine applications including thirteen pending at the close of the previous year were for disposal. Thirty-four of these were rejected, six were granted appointing receivers in all the cases and nine were pending at the close of the year. Eighteen thousand six hundred and fourteen processes were issued in the year, the fees recovered therefor being Rs. 10,494.

59. The quarterly and annual returns were scrutinized by the District Judge who also inspected all the subordinate courts.

60. There were eleven first-grade and seven second-grade pleaders practising in the province in the year under report.

Registration.
(1922.)

61. Statements Nos. 71 to 74—*Working of the Registration Department.*—The total number of documents registered rose from 2,599 to 2,787. Documents affecting immovable property formed, as usual, the bulk of the transactions. There was also an increase of Rs. 1,69,849 in the value of the property concerned. The net surplus realized on the working of the department was Rs. 3,321, the average surplus for the last ten years being Rs. 1,507.

The number of documents pending delivery at the close of the year was 57 against 68 in the previous year and the average time taken to register each document was 16 hours. Registration was refused in five cases and no appeal was preferred against the orders of refusal.

62. There were four whole time sub-registry offices at the beginning of the year but two of these were subsequently abolished and two ex-officio sub-registrars and three ex-officio joint sub-registrars were appointed. The joint ex-officio sub-registrars forward documents they admit for registration to the office of the ex-officio sub-registrars to be copied and registered; such documents are then returned to the parties through the officer who received them. This procedure has been adopted to obviate long journeys by parties desiring to register documents.

63. All the sub-registry offices were inspected by the Registrar and that of the Registrar by the Inspector-General of Registration.

District Board.
(1922-23.)

64. Statement No. 75—*Constitution of the District Board.*—No union committees, village panchayats or other village committees were formed during the year. There was no change in the personnel of the Board.

65. Statement No. 76—*Income of the District Board.*—The receipts amounted to Rs. 1,09,164, while the total expenditure was Rs. 1,10,265.

66. Statement No. 77—*Expenditure of the District Board.*—The number of schools maintained by the Board rose by 3, to 84 with 4,920 pupils in attendance against 5,075 in the previous year. The decrease is mainly due to the fact that the children were withdrawn from school earlier than usual. The number of schools teaching English remained the same as in the previous year (31), the number learning the language was 832 as against 885. Two thousand and fifty-seven boys and 842 girls of Coorg race received instruction as against 1,979 boys and 785 girls in the previous year. The number of day and night schools

for panchamas remained the same, viz., 9 as in 1921-22. The number of pupils under instruction was 265 as against 272 in the previous year. The percentage of children unprotected from small-pox was 1.60 as against 1.11 per cent in the previous year. Medical inspection was conducted as in the preceding year in some of the schools. The total outlay on education was Rs. 45,838 as against Rs. 36,819 in the previous year towards which, school fees contributed Rs. 2,818 and Imperial Funds Rs. 10,547. The increase is mainly due to the re-organisation of establishment. The percentage of expenditure on education charged against the direct income of the Board was 38.23. The number of free institutions was 37 as against 36 in the previous year.

67. There was no change in the number of Local Fund dispensaries (7). The total number of out-patients was 83,441 as against 82,451 during the previous year. Three hundred and one in-patients were treated at Somwarpet and 42 at Gonikoppal. The gross expenditure on dispensaries including sanitation was Rs. 28,372 against Rs. 21,535 in the previous year. The Sanitary Inspector was, as usual, engaged in inspecting the municipalities and pettas.

68. The net revenue from tolls on roads and market fees amounted to Rs. 16,338 and Rs. 4,568 respectively.

69. The grant for public works under the control of the Board was Rs. 24,310 and the expenditure Rs. 24,023. As usual, the bulk of the grant was devoted to communications.

Mercara Municipality.

70. Statements Nos. 78 to 80—*Constitution, income and expenditure of the municipalities.* The constitution of the committee during the year was slightly altered, there being an increase of two non-official members in the committee. Rai Bahadur K. Kuttayya continued to be the President and Mr. R. S. Sanjiva Rao, B.A., B.L., held the Vice-Presidency during the year. The committee held 17 meetings and the average attendance of the official and non-official members was respectively 1.30 out of 4 and 7.29 out of 12.

71. The actual receipts including the opening balance of Rs. 7,354, amounted to Rs. 28,231 and the expenditure to Rs. 20,393, thus leaving a balance of Rs. 7,838. The average incidence of municipal taxation per head of the population rose from Rs. 2-3-4 to Rs. 2-5-8.

72. The important items of expenditure were Rs. 4,159 under education, Rs. 3,937 under conservancy, Rs. 3,125 under medical, Rs. 1,186 under communications and Rs. 809 under water supply.

Virajpet Municipality.

73. Except the appointment of Mr. Kupppandra Muddayya as Vice-President in November 1922 there were no changes in the composition of the committee during the year. The average attendance at ten meetings held during the year was 2.40 in the case of ex-officio and 6.00 in the case of non-official members.

74. Including an opening balance of Rs. 3,956, the gross receipts amounted to Rs. 14,578. The expenditure was Rs. 10,529, leaving a balance of Rs. 4,049 of which Rs. 1,100 represents the amount deposited in Government promissory notes.

75. During the year under report tolls were levied on all carts entering the municipality laden with articles for sale with the result that the income was enhanced by Rs. 1,169.

76. The average incidence of Municipal taxation per head of the population rose from Rs. 1-13-4 to Rs. 2-4-4.

Notified Areas.

77. The average attendance of members at the seven meetings held by the Fraserpet committee was 7.00, the total strength being ten. The income of the year including the opening balance of Rs. 808 amounted to Rs. 3,072 and the expenditure to Rs. 2,402, the closing balance being Rs. 670. Rs. 1,098 were spent under conservancy, Rs. 383 under lighting and Rs. 347 under roads.

78. The Somwarpet committee held seven meetings at which the average attendance of members (11) was 6.00. The gross receipts of the year including the opening balance of Rs. 7,169, was Rs. 11,485 and the expenditure Rs. 4,044 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 7,441. The important items of expenditure were Rs. 1,679 under conservancy, Rs. 714 under roads and Rs. 577 under lighting.

79. At the four meetings held by the Kodlipet committee, the average attendance of the members was 6.5, the total strength being nine. Including the opening balance of Rs. 1,333, the receipts amounted to Rs. 2,785 and the expenditure to Rs. 1,882. The balance at the close of the year was Rs. 903. Rs. 1,001 under conservancy and Rs. 178 under pounds were spent during the year.

(Military.)
(1922-23.)

80. *Auxiliary Force (India).*—As the composition of the Corps was found unsuitable on account of the scattered nature of the Unit, it was reorganized during the year under report and sanction was granted for 6 light motor patrols with 32 cars. The Unit was divided into two Groups (Coorg and Mysore) and each Group was subdivided into 3 sections. Mercara is the Headquarters of the Corps and Coorg Group, and Chickmagalur is the Headquarters of the Mysore Group. The enrolment of members was very satisfactory. The strength at the end of the year was 104, all ranks.

81. A Camp of Exercise was held at Mercara between the 10th and 16th of April 1922 for both the Groups and members were trained in rifle shooting, Lewis gun and formations of sections into light motor patrols. Small tactical schemes were also carried out. A Camp of Exercise was held exclusively for the Mysore Group at Saklespur during the last week of March 1923.

82. To complete the sanctioned establishment of the Unit four Lewis guns and other stores were indented for and Bangalore Brigade Area issued Emergency Arms for use in cases of emergency.

83. *Indian Territorial Force.*—The Military authorities having decided on the formation of a Territorial Battalion in Coorg, recruiting operations were commenced in October 1922 and by the end of January 1923 over six hundred recruits were enrolled. About 150 more recruits are needed to complete the Battalion and there will be no difficulty in securing that number before the next training commences. The training of the officers and non-commissioned officers was begun on the 26th March 1923 and the men were called up on the 17th April. The training lasted till the 20th May. Major-General Ponsonby inspected the Battalion on the 1st May and expressed satisfaction at the progress made. Major C. G. M. Plumer, O.B.E., the Administrative Commandant, was in charge of the operations.

IV.—PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION. (1922-23.)

Character of the
seasons.

84. Statement No. 3—*Rainfall and climate.*—The season on the whole was favourable to wet and dry crops. The paddy crop was distinctly good. On high-lying lands in many cases the crop was bumper and in low-lying lands was up to the normal. Prices also for a considerable portion of the year were very good although towards the end of the year they showed a tendency to drop. The coffee crop was better than in the previous year and good prices were realized. The cardamom crop suffered severely from the ravages of caterpillars which appeared in vast numbers on many of the estates but the prices

realised were the highest for the last eight years and to some extent compensated for the very poor crop. The ragi crop was good and the prices were fair. The total rainfall was 142.43 inches as compared with 128.78 inches in the previous year and an average of 125 inches for the last 15 years.

85. Statement No. 81—*Area under crops.*—The total area cropped during the year was 139,616 acres as compared with 140,305 acres in the previous year or a decrease of 689 acres. Including the double crop cultivation (858) acres, the area under rice was 84,602 acres giving a percentage of 83.13 to the gross wet holdings (101,768 acres) as compared with 83.68 acres in the previous year. The total area of dry holdings was 20,764 acres, the extent actually cropped being 6,760 acres, which includes 1,058 acres of second crop (dry) cultivation. The total extent held under the coffee tenure was 96,128 acres, which included (a) 9,356 acres of ryotwari cardamom malais, (b) 1,121 acres of orange gardens, (c) 41,325 acres of abandoned coffee land granted for coffee but not planted, and (d) 3,512 acres planted with rubber. The area under actual coffee cultivation was thus 40,904 acres as compared with 40,702 acres in the previous year. In addition to the area shown under (d) supra 3,461 acres were cultivated with rubber and 344 acres with *ayave*.

86. The area which is estimated as being actually cultivated with cardamom viz., 2,291 acres, is made up of (a) jama malais (385 acres), (b) leased malais (1,319 acres) and (c) coffee assessed malais (587 acres), the aggregate holdings under these heads being 8,834, 44,394 and 9,356 acres respectively (total 62,584 acres).

87. The 4,880 acres shown as "fruits and vegetables" include 4,237 acres of orange gardens, of which 1,121 acres were cultivated in the area held under coffee tenure referred to in paragraph 86 supra. The extent of pepper cultivation in the holdings other than those under coffee tenure was 1,015 acres.

88. The area irrigated from Government channels and tanks was respectively 2,565 and 1,447 acres as compared with 2,565 and 1,345 acres in the preceding year.

Irrigated area

89. Statement No. 82—*Rates of rent and produce.*—The outturn under rice was above the normal and ragi was about the average. The coffee crop was considerably better than in the previous year.

90. Statements Nos. 83, 93, 94, 95 and 96—*Prices, imports, exports, coinage and paper currency.*—The price of rice for most of the year was very good although it had a tendency to drop towards the close of the year. The price of coffee was better than in the previous year. The import and export figures are for the most part compiled from the information supplied by the toll-gate contractors and cannot be relied on; nor is it possible to draw any inference as to the state of trade from the prescribed returns of coinage and paper currency.

91. Statement No. 85—*Live-stock.*—This is a quinquennial return prepared in 1919-20.

Agricultural

92. Statements Nos. 86, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91 and 92—*Cost of the Veterinary Department, etc.*—Including fourteen elephants, sixty buffaloes and ten bullocks of the Forest Department, the number of animals treated by the Veterinary Assistants on tour was 1,538, while 4,198 were attended to as in- and out-patients at the dispensaries as compared with 1,657 and 2,979 respectively in the previous year. Rinderpest was prevalent in many villages, but the mortality was comparatively small as the virulence of the disease seems to have diminished. Of the other contagious diseases, foot and mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicæmia and anthrax claimed some attention. Inoculation against rinderpest, anthrax and hæmorrhagic septicæmia was undertaken in 99 outbreaks on 2,115 animals as compared with 1,240 animals during the previous year. In all 815 cattle are reported to have died from rinderpest and 125 from anthrax as compared with 595 and 178 in the previous year. The total number of deaths from all causes

was 11,838 as compared with 9,423 in the previous year. The total receipts and expenditure of the department were Rs. 77 and Rs. 9,804 respectively. M.R.Ry. K. N. Subbaraya was in charge of the department.

93. Experiments on orange trees were made at the farm at Sidapur and it seems likely that the depredations of the borer beetle will be checked. The receipts and expenditure of the department were Rs. 148 and Rs. 446 respectively.

94. Statement No. 84—*Prices of labour*.—The labour market continued to be dull and it was again difficult to procure adequate labour. A considerable amount of coffee was in consequence lost as it could not be picked. The wages for skilled and unskilled labour remained the same and the prices of commodities and rate of cart hire were very high.

Forests.

95. The area of the reserved forest (332,527 acres) remained the same as in previous year.

96. 103 acres of reserve over which selection fellings had been carried out in previous years were brought under regeneration in 1922-23 by the kamri method in the Nagerhole Range. 30 acres were kumried in the Kutumpole Range, sowing *Aini* (*Artocarpus hirsuta*) and *Buruga* (*Bombax* and *Malabaricum*). 80 acres were brought newly under regeneration by the "Y" method in the Tittimatti and Nagerhole ranges at a cost of Rs. 1,271.

97. 18,334 cubic feet of different species of ghât timber were sold at Kaketodu for Rs. 9,678 and 21,864 cubic feet more were sold at Beliapatam for Rs. 11,545 from the Kutumpole Range. The total quantity of timber floated to Beliapatam subsequent to these sales was 28,248 cubic feet.

98. The usual selection and improvement fellings were continued during the year. These fellings yielded the bulk of the timber revenue from the eastern forests. Of the 74,206 cubic feet of timber carted to roadside depôts at Tittimatti, Mattigodu and Murkal, 50,339 cubic feet were sold for Rs. 41,500 leaving a balance of 23,867 cubic feet of timber consisting mostly of teak. The prices realized were disappointing owing to the glut in the market.

99. "Y" regeneration fellings in Anekad were carried out and 699 cubic feet of timber were sold.

100. One hundred and fifteen acres were sown with sandal. The area sown in previous years was resown where stocking was insufficient. In addition to these sowings, 60 acres of kumri at Pulingoth, 30 acres at Karike, 17 acres at Dubare and 16 acres at Sampaji were newly opened during the year.

101. The outlay on roads and bridges including repairs and temporary establishment was Rs. 1,61,732 as against Rs. 2,28,075 in the previous year. Of this, Rs. 1,30,558 were spent on the construction of the ghât tramway. Up to 31st March 1923 a total sum of Rs. 9,23,781 was spent on this project. The earth work on the whole of the Makut Kakkepale section was completed besides the construction of bridges and plate laying and ballasting. The expenditure on buildings including repairs was Rs. 24,233 against Rs. 29,911 in the previous year. The expenditure on miscellaneous works was Rs. 3,615. A sum of Rs. 1,177 was spent in repairing cairns and clearing boundaries of reserves.

102. The total number of cases reported was 10 against 25 in the previous year. 9 cases were compounded. A prosecution was instituted in one case which ended in the acquittal of the accused.

103. There were 4 fires covering an area of 32½ acres against 888 acres in the previous year. 9,970 acres were burnt experimentally in Tittimatti and Sanivarsante ranges in order to get rid of bamboos and lantana.

104. The prescribed areas, were, as usual open to grazing. In addition to this, about 200 acres of the Mercara East Reserve were for the first time opened for the convenience of the cattle owners in Mercara. To make this possible, fencing of young *Eucalyptus robusta* plantations had to be carried out. The revenue realized including the sale proceeds of grass amounted to Rs. 1,234 against Rs. 903 in the previous year. Free grazing was permitted to persons who enjoy a customary right to it.

105. The total expenditure under sowing and planting was Rs. 23,198 as against Rs. 23,954 in the previous year.

106. Dense lantana growth over 5 acres was uprooted at a cost of Rs. 35. Scattered lantana and lantana regrowths in reserves (including regeneration areas and plantations) and paisaris were uprooted over 5,249 acres at a cost of Rs. 6,344. The total expenditure on lantana work was Rs. 6,379.

107. The quantity of timber felled by departmental agency and by purchasers in reserved forests was 169,576 and 28,614 cubic feet respectively against 184,388 and 27,320 cubic feet in the previous year. 400 tons of sandalwood were sold by public auction during the year for Rs. 5,69,739—an average of Rs. 1,424 per ton. In addition to this, a further quantity of 30 tons was sold to Messrs. V. V. & Sons, Kuppam, for Rs. 22,440. The revenue realized from cardamom male leases was Rs. 13,491 against Rs. 12,207 and that from minor forest produce was Rs. 6,789 against Rs. 4,254 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 7,799 was recovered as value of timber on lands taken up for cultivation against Rs. 5,436 in the previous year. The total valuations made by forest officers were 58 against 35 in 1921-22.

108. Of the 22 elephants in stock at the beginning of the year, 9 were sold for Rs. 14,710 and 3 died. Four elephants were captured. Thus the total number of elephants at the close of the year was 14. The number of buffaloes at the beginning of the year was 69. There were eight casualties during the year. The strength of the buffaloes at the close of the year was thus 61. There were 10 bullocks at the close of the year. The feed and keep of live-stock amounted to Rs. 46,327.

109. The total revenue and expenditure amounted to Rs. 9,46,858 and Rs. 5,83,294 against Rs. 7,33,709 and Rs. 6,24,716 respectively in the previous year.

110. Mr. C. S. Martin, Consulting Forest Engineer to the Government of India, visited the Coorg forests in May 1922. His advice was obtained in the matter of machinery required and the organization of the Exploitation Staff.

111. In June 1922, an "Exploitation Division" was started with the Forest Engineer (Mr. J. L. Harrison) in charge of a suitable staff. From 1st February he was placed in charge of the completion of the tramway work and the accounts connected therewith. The line to Kunnoth was opened by the middle of March 1923.

112. A party of non-official and official gentlemen visited the operations in Barepole valley by invitation on the 30th September 1922 to see the nature of the operations that are in progress.

113. Mr. A. F. Minchin, Deputy Conservator of Forests, was in charge of the Direction (North) Division and Mr. K. G. Belliappa, was the Divisional Forest Officer, South Coorg, throughout the year.

114. Mr. P. W. F. Walpole, extra Assistant Conservator of Forests, was entrusted with the work of sandal enumeration according to girth classes, and with the preparation of a "working scheme" for extraction of sandal from the sandal bearing areas in North Coorg unaffected by spike: the results which are of great importance came to hand after the close of the year under report.

during the year. The suitability of each site in municipalities is discussed by the President of the Municipality concerned, the member appointed for the ward and the adjacent residents, and the question is finally settled by the Assistant Commissioner subject to the approval of the Commissioner. Due regard was, as usual, paid to the opinions of neighbouring planters and ryots in the matter of the location of both arrack and toddy shops: representative local men were also consulted.

140. Statement No. 105—*Consumption of excisable articles.*—The contract for the import and wholesale supply of arrack was undertaken by Messrs. Parry & Co. as in the previous year. The rate of duty remained the same, viz: Rs. 3-15-0 per gallon of 30° under proof. The quantity of arrack issued from the bonded warehouse was 44,554 gallons as against 45,743 gallons in the previous year. The wholesale supply of opium and ganja was, as in the previous years, in the hands of Government. Opium was imported from Madras and ganja from North Arcot. The quantity of opium and ganja sold was 37 seers 44 tolas and 250 seers and 40 tolas as compared with 47 seers 40 tolas and 312 seers 60 tolas in the previous year. There was also a decrease in the sale of foreign liquor during the year.

141. Statements Nos. 103 and 107—*Incidence of consumption, and demand, collection and balance of excise revenue.*—The demand for the year was Rs. 3,29,511, a decrease of Rs. 19,623, as compared with that of previous year. The total incidence of still-head duty and licence fees per gallon of London proof was Rs. 8-10-2.

142. Statement No. 108—*Excise offences.*—The number of prosecutions (30) instituted was less than in the previous year. Six of these cases related to illicit distillation and possession of paddy and toddy arrack, one illicit sale of ganja, two to breach of conditions of the licence and the remaining twenty-one to the sale and possession of toddy without licence. There were no reported cases of drunkenness on licensed premises during the year. A sum of Rs. 882 was realized on account of fines, out of which Rs. 66 was distributed as rewards to excise officers and informants as compared with Rs. 1,440 and Rs. 137 respectively in the previous year.

143. Palm tree owners lease their trees or sell the toddy drawn for cash only to the licencees.

144. The Educational department continued to teach temperance in schools in the province.

145. There were no cases of illicit possession, unlicensed sale and smuggling of cocaine. No cocaine is imported for sale in Coorg.

146. In consequence of the retrenchment scheme, the excise staff was reduced by one Assistant Daroga, one Inspector, two Sub-Inspectors and six peons. The subordinate excise staff was under the direct control of the Commissioner and the work of the preventive establishment was on the whole satisfactory.

Stamps.

147. Statements Nos. 110 to 113—*Receipts and charges under Stamps.*—The receipts and charges amounted to Rs. 72,970 and Rs. 1,434 respectively giving a net revenue of Rs. 71,536 against Rs. 71,837 in the previous year.

148. Statements Nos. 114 and 115—*Insufficiently stamped or unstamped instruments and stamp prosecutions and results.*—The total sum levied in respect of duty and penalty was Rs. 1,765 on 186 documents impounded under the Stamp Act. There was no stamp prosecution during the year.

149. Statement No. 115—*Action taken to test the valuation of estates.*—No cases to test valuation of estates for which application for letters of administration had been made, were referred to the Collector during the year.

Income-tax.

150. The Act was, as usual, administered by the ordinary revenue establishment under the supervision of the Assistant Commissioner, who exercises the powers of Income-tax Officer under the Act, and therefore no extra cost

on the work of assessment and collection was incurred during the year. The Commissioner of Coorg who has been appointed as Commissioner of Income-tax exercises also the powers of an Assistant Commissioner of Income-tax.

151. Statement No. 117.—This statement shows the amounts due under the various heads of income, the collections and the balance during the year.

152. Statement No. 118.—There were no collections on account of Supertax.

153. Statement No. 119.—Rs. 201 was collected on account of interest on securities held by the Government. Of this, Rs. 169 was refunded to the assesseees.

154. Statement No. 120.—The collections on account of the demand were Rs. 19,955 against Rs. 20,676 in the previous year. The number of assesseees who paid up their dues before the end of the year was 127. The amount that fell due for collection on account of adjustments made in the income-tax levied during the year 1921-22 under section 19 of the Act, was Rs. 1,867 against Rs. 2,843 in the preceding year: the decrease was chiefly due to the careful scrutiny of the incomes of the various assesseees. The refunds that fell due during the year were Rs. 1,062, of which, Rs. 120 remained to be adjusted at the close of the year.

155. Statements Nos. 121 and 122.—There were no collections on account of Supertax.

156. Statement No. 123.—Both the powers of the Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioner of Income-tax were exercised by the Commissioner of Coorg and therefore there were no second appeals. There were 8 appeals to the Assistant Commissioner and Commissioner of Income-tax: in only one case was the tax reduced.

157. There were five objection petitions against summary assessments: in 3 cases the assesseees were let off and in one case the assessed income was reduced.

158. Including an arrear balance of Rs. 1,870, the total demand under all the heads was Rs. 28,735 or Rs. 1,496 more than last year. The increase is accounted for by the fact that several traders who had escaped assessment were brought within the scope of the Act as a result of the institution of searching enquiries. The collections and remissions amounted to Rs. 22,910 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 5,825 at the end of the year. The balance has since been reduced to Rs. 2,495.

159. The forest receipts amounted to Rs. 9,46,238 including Rs. 6,31,651 which was realized outside Coorg or adjusted by book transfer, and the charges as debited in the treasury accounts to Rs. 5,46,594. There was thus a surplus of Rs. 3,99,644. Forests.

Revenue and Finance other than Imperial.

160. Including an outstanding balance of Rs. 5,867 at the commencement of the year, the gross demand of the District Fund amounted to Rs. 1,18,426. The collections and remissions amounted to Rs. 1,12,220, leaving an uncollected balance of Rs. 6,206 at the close of the year. With the opening cash balance of Rs. 43,545, the gross receipt of the fund amount to Rs. 1,52,709, and the expenditure to Rs. 1,10,265 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 42,444. The District Fund.

161. Including an outstanding balance of Rs. 5,623, the total demand of the municipalities and the notified areas amounted to Rs. 46,132. The collections and remissions aggregated Rs. 39,973 leaving a balance of Rs. 6,159 at the close of the year. Together with an opening cash balance of Rs. 20,620 the receipts amounted to Rs. 60,151 and the expenditure to Rs. 39,255 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 20,901. Municipal Funds.

162. The opening cash balance of the Mercara School Endowment Fund was Rs. 202. The receipts and expenditure amounted to Rs. 2,008 and Rs. 1,800 respectively and the closing balance was Rs. 470. The Mercara School Endowment Fund.

VI.—VITAL STATISTICS AND MEDICAL SERVICES.

Births and
deaths.
(1922.)

163. Statement No. 125—*Births registered*.—The number of births (4,272) registered was 222 less than in the previous year. The male births exceeded the female by 252.

164. Statement No. 126—*Deaths registered*.—Deaths registered during the year numbered 5,668 against 4,679 in 1921. The death-rate was 34.60 per mille as against 28.56 in the previous year. Male deaths exceeded the female by 220.

165. Statements Nos. 127 to 138—*Detailed information regarding deaths registered*.—There were 1,164 deaths amongst infants under one year as compared with 1,011 in the previous year. The rate of mortality among male infants was 302.51 and that among female infants 263.06. The death-rate among Muhammadans was 32.26 per mille and that among Hindus 36.16. Small-pox accounted for one death against six deaths in 1921. The number of deaths from plague registered was eight against one in the previous year. Fever was the most common cause of death. Under fevers a total of 4,604 deaths was registered during the year against 3,615 in 1921. Dysentery and diarrhoea caused 188 deaths. There were four deaths from cholera during the year under report. The number of deaths recorded amongst Coorgs was 1,443 against 1,010 in the previous year.

Emigration and

166. There are no recruiting stations in Coorg and no record is kept of emigration and immigration.

Medical relief.
(1922.)

167. Statement No. 141—*Number of hospitals and dispensaries*.—The number of hospitals and local fund dispensaries remained the same as in previous year.

168. Statements Nos. 142 to 148—*Accommodation, number of patients treated during the year and the rate of mortality among in-patients*.—The number of in-patients in the Imperial and local fund dispensaries was 4,202 or 102 less than in the previous year. The number who died was 349 giving a death-rate of 8.31 per cent against 7.04 per cent in 1921. The chief causes of death were, as usual, pneumonia, diseases of the digestive system, dysentery and malaria. The total number of (indoor and outdoor) patients treated rose, by 2,705, to 142,528, while the number of patients treated in the three private institutions in South Coorg fell, by 563 to 5,222.

169. Statement No. 151—*Operations performed*.—Two thousand one hundred and fifteen operations were performed against 1,837 in the previous year and the percentage of success was 99.67 against 97.99 in 1921.

170. Statement No. 152—*Income and expenditure of hospitals and dispensaries*.—The total expenditure on medical relief was Rs. 1,08,215 against Rs. 63,225 in the previous year. The previous year's expenditure did not include the adjustments by book transfer made by the Accountant-General, Central Revenues, on account of cost of medicines supplied to the several hospitals and dispensaries in Coorg.

Three hundred and eighty quinine packets were sold to the public through the agency of 25 post offices in Coorg at a cost of Rs. 1,067.

171. All the hospitals and dispensaries were inspected by the Civil Surgeon during the year.

172. Lieut.-Col. E. C. C. Maunsell, I.M.S., held office of the Civil Surgeon until the 1st April 1923, when he was relieved by Major F. C. Fraser, I.M.S.

Sanitation.
(1922-23.)

173. All the pettas were inspected during the year by the Civil Surgeon, who is also the Sanitary and Health Officer, the Commissioner or the Assistant Commissioner. During the year, plague broke out in Fraserpet hobli, the infection being imported from the adjoining Mysore villages. Precau-

tionary measures were taken with the aid of the grant of Rs. 288 sanctioned by the Government to prevent its spread to the adjoining towns and villages; The duties of the Sanitary Inspector were mainly confined to the periodical inspection of the municipalities and pettas.

174. No special sanitary work was undertaken for want of funds.

175. In connection with the prevention of malaria, attention was paid to (a) filling up disused wells and borrow pits, (b) the periodical removal of rank vegetation, (c) the removal of all refuse to a reasonable distance from dwelling houses, (d) the prohibition of cattle sheds and manure pits in the vicinity of dwelling houses, and (e) the free distribution of quinine to educational institutions in the province.

176. Statements Nos. 155 and 157—*Summary of Vaccination work*.—The total vaccinations performed by all agencies were 8,486 primary vaccinations and 5,978 re-vaccinations as against 8,181 and 4,367 respectively in the previous year. The quantity of work done by the vaccination staff showed an improvement over last year, but there is room for further improvement in the quality of the work. The percentage of successful cases of primary and re-vaccination was 95.62 and 70.56 as compared with 94.42 and 74.62 per cent, respectively in the previous year.

Vaccination.
(1921-22.)

177. Statement No. 156—*Cost of the vaccine department*.—The personnel of the staff was increased by the appointment of two more vaccinators during the year, the pay of one of the vaccinators being met by a contribution from the three notified areas and that of the other vaccinator partly by the District Board and partly by the Virajpet Municipality. The total expenditure including supervision charges amounted to Rs. 5,440 or Rs. 809 more than in the previous year. The average cost of each successful case was 7 annas 8 pies as compared with 7 annas 6 pies in the previous year.

178. Statements Nos. 160 and 161—*Infantile vaccinations in municipal areas and the annual successful vaccinations*.—115 children under one year were successfully vaccinated in municipal towns as compared with 92 in the previous year. The total number of successful vaccinations was above the average, while the number of deaths from small-pox was below the average.

VII.—INSTRUCTION. (1922-23.)

179. The general system of instruction is detailed in paragraphs 221 to 232 of the Coorg Administration Report for the year 1921-22.

General system
of public
instruction.

180. The Coorg Education Department was under the Director of Public Instruction, Madras, subject to the control of the Chief Commissioner and under the direct supervision of the Inspector of Schools, South Kanara, Coorg and Bangalore.

Education
Preliminary
remarks.

181. The main events of the year worthy of note are the following:—

(1) Opening of the Form IV in the Lower Secondary School for girls at Mercara with a view to make it a complete high school.

(2) Opening of Form V in the Virajpet Secondary School.

182. Statements Nos. 162 and 164—*General statistics of attendance*.—The closure of the four schools by the Wesleyan Mission and two Panchama schools by the Mercara and Virajpet Municipalities is partly responsible for the decrease in the attendance. The increasing number of applications for free-scholarships that flew in year by year is an index of the poor economic condition of the people. This state combined with the prevailing high cost of labour has

General
summary.

also prompted the parents, who are for the most part agriculturists, to withdraw their children earlier from school. Thus the percentage of scholars in public institutions to the total male and female population was 6.48 and 3.17 as against 6.86 and 3.26 in the previous year. The private institutions however doubled both in their number and attendance. Though the number of institutions teaching English remained stationary, the number of children learning the language suffered a decrease owing to their inability to pay the additional fees charged for it.

183. Statement No. 174—*Results of examinations.*—As there was no demand from the pupils in standards V and above for the award of elementary school leaving certificates no examination was held for granting such certificates. The results of the S.S.L.C. and T.S.L.C. examinations are enumerated in paragraphs 190 and 196 below :—

184. Statements Nos. 169 to 172—*Scholars according to race or creed.*—All castes showed a fall except the Muhammadans who rose by about 9 per cent. The Jain pupils numbered 10 as against 11 in the previous year.

185. The population of the province being mainly an agricultural one the bulk of the pupils at school are children of this class. Classified according to their means the percentage of richer, middle and poorer classes are 1.77, 27.52 and 70.71 respectively as against 1.05, 24.24 and 74.71 in the previous year.

186. Fifteen schools were visited by medical officers for medical inspection of the children. The results of the medical inspection, as published in the Coorg District Gazette, disclose the fact that 50 per cent of the diseases discovered are of spleen, 16 per cent of teeth, 10 per cent of skin and 8 per cent of mouth and throat. The vaccinators too paid their visits as usual. Almost the whole school population is now protected from small-pox.

Financial summary.

187. Statement No. 163.—*Expenditure on education.*—The rise in the expenditure on education representing roughly 13 per cent of that of the previous year is partly due to raising the minimum pay of the Local Fund Schoolmasters from Rs. 11 to Rs. 18 and partly to providing the Virajpet Secondary school with furniture, books and science apparatus. The excess also includes the additional grants given to the girls' school at Mercara for opening Form IV. The comparative percentages in respect of the several sources of expenditure for the past three years are exhibited below :—

The sources of income remained unchanged but on the other hand the cost of maintaining schools rose considerably and the attendance declined. The result was that the cost of educating a scholar in each class of institution rose. In the case of a pupil teacher of the training school especially the cost appears extravagant. This is explained by the fact that no fresh admissions were made during the year under report, while the staff remained unchanged.

Controlling agencies.

188. *Controlling Agencies.*—There was no change in the personnel of the Inspector of Schools. Mr. J. A. Yates visited the province in November 1922 for the inspection of secondary and training schools. Some of the elementary schools as well were visited by him. The Assistant Inspector could not visit all the elementary schools as usual as he was in charge of the Central High School from October 1922, in addition to his own duties. Hence only 62 visits were paid by him. He travelled 1,160 miles. The average visits paid by the Supervisors to each school were three.

Collegiate education.

189. *Collegiate Education.*—Collegiate education is secured by awarding scholarships to deserving students outside the province.

Secondary education.

190. *Secondary Education.*—Mr. W. B. Brierley being transferred in the middle of the year M.R.Ry. P. Mangesh Rau, the Assistant Inspector of Schools, was in charge of the High School, Mercara, in addition to his own duties. Sixty seven students appeared for the S.S.L.C. examination of whom 17 were declared eligible for higher studies.

191. M.R.Ry. O. M. Rama Rau was in charge of the Virajpet Secondary school during the whole year. The number of boarders in the hostel of this school stood at 45 at the close of the year as against 34 in the previous year.

192. *Primary Education.*—Owing to retrenchment of expenditure the Wesleyan Mission closed three of their boys' schools and the municipalities two. But the Local Fund schools increased by three, the school at Kuttandi having been revived and two new schools opened at Inakanalli and Hatur. Thus the total number of boys' schools numbered 97 on 31st March 1923 as against 99 on 31st March 1922.

193. There was no change in the curriculum of studies in the primary schools. The advantages of the kindergarten method of teaching the infants are being realised slowly. But want of sustained effort and resourcefulness on the part of the teachers renders it difficult for children to derive the full benefits of the system.

194. In some of the larger schools, organised games, such as, football, hockey, etc., are still practised and drill and country games in all schools.

195. The condition of the weaving school at Sanivarsante and the carpentry section at Mercara remained unchanged. The same is the case with the rattan work.

196. *Training Schools.*—As the question of amalgamating the Mercara Training School with that at Bangalore was under consideration and as there was insufficient provision for the candidates after training; no fresh admissions were made during the year. M.R.Ry. R. Raghavendra Rau was in charge of the school. Eight candidates were sent up for the T.S.L.C. examination; their results await publication. There were only two girls in the girls' hostel at the close of the year.

Training schools.

197. *Technical Education.*—There are no special schools imparting this sort of instruction. The schools on weaving and carpentry have been already referred to in paragraph 195 supra.

Technical education.

198. *Female Education.*—The number of girls' schools fell by one and numbered 10 on 31st March 1923 as against 11 on 31st March 1922. The decrease is owing to the closing of the Wesleyan Mission Girls' School at Mercara. The total number of girls at school fell by 69 and stood at 2,357 of whom about 63 per cent were attending boys' schools. The falling off is mainly seen among the children in primary schools. The circumstances related in paragraph 182 above concerning the fall in attendance of boys apply here also. The Government sanctioned an additional grant of Rs. 4,560 for opening Form IV in the Secondary Girls' School at Mercara. Most of this was devoted to the purchase of furniture, books, maps, and science apparatus.

Female education.

199. There are no separate schools for Europeans and Anglo-Indians.

European education.

200. It is worthy of note that the Muhammadan children rose further by 23 to 307 and the percentage of those in the secondary schools to the total attendance rose from 1.20 to 2.87.

Muhammadan education.

201. *Special Classes.*—At the beginning of the year under review the panchama people held a conference and demanded more facilities for the education of their children in the shape of additional schools and scholarships. But what is really wanted is not more schools but greater scope for their admission into caste schools where really better education is imparted. A scheme for this purpose has already been formulated and approved by the Chief Commissioner and awaits provision of funds for the purpose. Panchamas are

Special classes.

now being admitted into caste schools in larger numbers. The number of schools specially meant for these stood at 9, of which four were night schools as against 12 in the previous year and the total children at school numbered 301 as against 333 on 31st March 1922.

Private
institutions.

202. The private institutions doubled both in number and attendance. Two of such institutions were taken over by the Board during the year.

Educational
conferences.

203. The teachers' associations did not meet often during the year; but the Assistant Inspector and the Supervisors held several 'talks' for instructing the teachers on the methods of teaching and means by which instruction may be made more practical.

204. M.R.Ry. P. Mangesh Rau continued to be in charge of the primary schools during the year.

Preparation and
distribution of
text-books.

205. The work of distribution of class books, etc., to the several schools in the province was done by the Coorg Teachers' Co-operative Stores which is supplying a real need.

206. There is no Text-book Committee for Coorg.

The Press.

207. Statements Nos. 176 to 181—*Receipts, expenditure, etc.*—Including a sum of Rs. 285 adjusted by book transfer on account of depreciation of plant and type, the charges amounted to Rs. 6,909 as compared with Rs. 6,593 in the previous year. The value of work done for the various offices and the cash receipts were respectively Rs. 5,423 and Rs. 1,230 as compared with Rs. 5,575 and Rs. 1,188. In consequence of the retrenchment scheme the Coorg District Press was amalgamated with the Residency Press, Bangalore, on 1st March 1923. The value of plant, transferred to the Residency Press, Bangalore, at the close of the year was Rs. 5,915.

208. The outturn of composing work done was equal to 989 pages of pica solid foolscap folio and the number of impressions printed was 293,800. The cost of composing a page of foolscap folio was Rs. 3-14-11, while the cost of printing 100 impressions was 12 annas 10 pies against Rs. 2-11-2 and 7 annas 6 pie respectively last year.

209. The management of the Coorg District Press which, as usual, devolved on the Foreman, was satisfactory.

Literary
societies.

210. There are no literary societies, properly so called in Coorg, but in statement No. 182 will be found particulars of three institutions which incidentally foster the study of literature through the medium of libraries and reading rooms.

VIII.—ARCHÆOLOGY. (1922-23.)

Archæology.

211. The reconstruction, repair and remodelling of the Mercara Palace was held in abeyance as the Government of India could not provide funds during the year.

IX.—MISCELLANEOUS. (1922-23.)

Ecclesiastical
jurisdiction.

212. The standing information which concerns this chapter is printed at page 35 of the administration report for the year 1921-22 under the head "Ecclesiastical jurisdiction."

213. Statement No. 183—*Religious institutions.*—There were no changes during the year.

Ecclesiastical

214. The contributions paid by the Government to the indigenous religious institutions in the province amounted to Rs. 19,149 and consisted of cash payments (Rs. 7,049), deductions from the land revenue demand (Rs. 972) and assignments of land revenue (Rs. 11,128). Of the gross amount, Rs. 12,325 forms the endowment of minor temples under the management of the village communities concerned, while the remaining Rs. 6,824 relates to the grants made to the temples under the management of the committee constituted under the Coorg Temple Funds Management Regulation, 1892. This body consisting of 15 members held eleven meetings during the year. The average attendance at the meetings was 8. With an opening cash balance of Rs. 2,521 the income including the sum of Rs. 6,737 paid by Government towards the upkeep of the chatrams, was Rs. 22,634. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 20,373 and the closing balance to Rs. 2,261. This balance includes the sum of Rs. 1,701 held in deposit in the Post Office Savings Bank as a reserve fund. In addition to the Government grant (Rs. 13,561), the other sources of income were voluntary offerings by pilgrims (Rs. 3,157) and contributions of grains by the people (Rs. 893). The chief items of expenditure were the purchase of food-grains to the value of Rs. 12,029 and the performance of the customary religious ceremonies and services.

215. Statement No. 184—*Charitable institutions.*—The chatrams are situated at Mercara, Bhagamandala and Irpu. They enjoy an annual endowment of Rs. 6,737 from Government and are under the control of the Temple Funds Management Committee. There are five similar institutions maintained by private charity during certain festivals. These are located at Talakaveri, Bhagamandala, Virajpet and Somwarpet.

216. The number of co-operative credit societies rose from 94 to 100 owing to the registration of 5 agricultural and one non-agricultural societies.

Co-operative
societies.

217. The total number of members of the co-operative credit societies at the close of the year was 5,922 as against 5,014 of the previous year. The total receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 2,10,044 and the disbursement to Rs. 1,74,355 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 35,689. A sum of Rs. 95,029 was collected towards the outstanding debts as against Rs. 67,539 during the previous year. The amount of loans advanced rose from Rs. 1,01,207 to Rs. 1,35,750.

218. A society for the weavers of Sanivarsante was registered in February 1923. At the end of March, it had only 15 members and Rs. 51 being the entrance fee and paid up share capital. The society will collect funds and purchase yarn at the cheapest market and distribute it amongst its members taking cloth or cash for the value of yarn supplied. It is hoped that this society will remove a want keenly felt by the weavers.

219. During the year, four societies were registered bringing the total number of societies at the close of the year to 45. Membership rose from 1,757 to 2,113. At the close of the year, there were 5,343 batties of paddy in stock, valued at Rs. 26,715 at Rs. 5 per batti.

Grain bank.

220. The number of members in the society rose from 131 to 133 during the year. The total receipts in the year amounted to Rs. 9,007 and the disbursement to Rs. 8,501 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 506. The value of books, stationery etc., purchased during the year was Rs. 4,210 and the sale proceeds amounted to Rs. 4,377.

Teachers' store
society.

221. Forty-one policies were redeemed at a cost of Rs. 574 as against 51 at a cost of Rs. 548 in the previous year. At the end of the year, there were 186 policy holders as against 203 in the previous year and the number of cattle insured was 209 as against 230 in the previous year. Except the Murnad Cattle Insurance Society, none are working properly. It is thought advisable to give the insurance societies a chance to improve themselves under the guidance of supervisors who are now under training.

Central bank. 222. Though the Coorg Co-operative Central Bank was registered on 28th June 1921, it commenced its work only at the end of the year ending 31st March 1922. There are 24 individual members and 91 co-operative credit societies including grain banks as members of the bank. The total receipts of the bank in the year under report were Rs. 50,261 and the disbursements Rs. 26,544, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 23,717. The paid-up share capital amounted to Rs. 6,380. A sum of Rs. 32,447 was received as deposit and Rs. 25,600 was lent out to the affiliated societies.

Stationery. 223. The supply of articles of stationery to Government offices in Coorg is arranged for in communication with the Superintendent of Stationery, Madras.

Treasure trove. 224. There were no cases of treasure trove during the year under report.

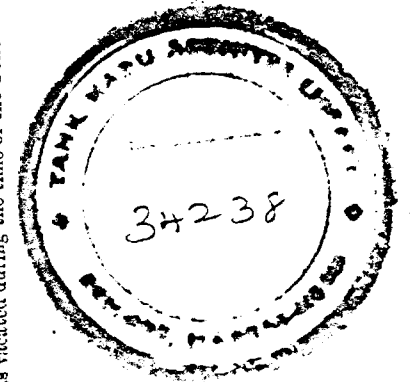

Explanations

1. *School year.*—In these tables the school year is assumed to coincide with the financial year, i.e., to extend from April 1st of one year to March 31st of next, though in actual practice some institutions, e.g., European Schools, may close in December and others, e.g., Colleges, in May.

2. *Recognised institutions* are those in which the course of study followed is that which is prescribed or recognised by the Department of Public Instruction or by a University or a Board of Secondary and Intermediate Education constituted by law and which satisfy one or more of these authorities, as the case may be, that they attain a reasonable standard of efficiency. They are open to inspection and their pupils are ordinarily eligible for admission to public examinations and tests held by the Department or the University or the Board.

3. *Unrecognised institutions* are those which do not come under the above definition of recognised institutions. They are for the most part independent institutions for education of religious character.

4. *Other sources* include income from endowments, subscriptions, contributions, etc.

5. *Classification.*—In statements Nos. 159 and 170, class I represents the lowest class in the school, whether called Infant class, Sub-standard I A or Class I. Where the number of school classes exceed X the additional classes should be entered in the spaces left blank below X and number for the purposes of this statement, XI and XII.

6. *Intermediate Colleges and examinations.*—Intermediate College means an institution preparing students for admission to the Degree Courses of a University or Entrance into Vocational Colleges. The intermediate examination means an examination qualifying for admission to a course of studies for a degree.

7. European scholars are included in the general summary and statements Nos. 165–166, 169–170, 171–172, 174 & 175.
