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MADRAS PRESIDENCY Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society

1. During the year under review, new district committees were formed at Cuddapah and Nellore, but the Anantapur District Committee was amalgamated with the Bellary District Committee. In all, there are now 17 District Committees working in this Presidency, exclusive of the Central Committee working in the Presidency town.

2. The Bellary District Committee opened branches at Rayadurg, Harpanahalle and Hadagalli Taluks.

3. The total strength of the annual and life members of the Society in the Presidency town at the end of the year was 137 as against 118 at the end of the previous year. For the whole Presidency, the figures were 445 at the end of the year.

4. Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Willingdon ceased to be Patron and Patroness of the Society, and H. E. Viscount Goschen and Viscountess Goschen have been pleased to become patron and patroness in their stead.

5. During the year under report, the Society sustained a serious loss in the untimely demise of Mr. D. M. Dorai Raja, B.A., B.L., High Court Vakil, Madura, who had been President of the Madura District Committee. He had been a member of the Indian Jail Committee and was taking much interest in the working of the Society, which he evinced not only by his association with the Society from its inception till his death but also by a liberal contribution towards its funds. The Society also regrets the death of Mr. T. Soma-sundara Mudaliyar, M.L.C., during the year.

Commissioner A. R. Blowers of the Salvation Army resigned his seat on the Central Committee in the month of August 1924 and Col. Muthiah was appointed in his stead.

6. Mr. G. Narasimham continued to be the auditor of the Society and his careful scrutiny of the accounts of the Society deserves the gratitude of the Central Committee.

7. Four meetings of the Central Committee were held during the year. The business transacted at the meetings consisted, besides the formal business of accepting resignations and filling up vacancies, of the making of the following amendments to the Articles of Association and the bye-laws:

“(a) In Art. No. 3, of the Articles of Association, for the words ‘30th March’ the words ‘30th November’ shall be substituted;

(b) in the last sentence of Rule 6, of the Subsidiary Rules for District Committees, for the last word ‘five’ the word ‘three’ shall be substituted.”

The effect of the first amendment was to enable the annual meeting of the Society to be held before 30th November instead of before 30th March.

8. The Executive Committee at Madras combines in itself the functions of the District Committee for Madras and of the working committee of the Central Committee for the whole Presidency. The only change in the personnel of the Executive Committee was the appointment of Col. Muthiah as a member in the place of Commissioner Blowers resigned.

9. The receipts of the Central Committee during the year amounted to Rs. 5,282-2-0 as against Rs. 7,814-8-10 of the previous year, and the total expenditure during the year was Rs. 3,513-6-2 as against Rs. 2,638-10-9. The fall in the receipts was due to a fall in the amount of donations and subscriptions received by the Central Committee. Out of the total expenditure, the establishment charges amounted to Rs. 705-3-7, as against Rs. 640 of the previous year, the excess being due to the necessity for granting leave on Medical Certificate on full pay to the late Agent of the Society, Seshadri Nayudu who, the Committee regrets to report, has since died, and the appointment of an acting incumbent in his stead. A sum of Rs. 1,303-2-1 was spent upon pure relief work and a sum of Rs. 960 was paid towards the rent of the Society's home at Madras. A detailed account of the receipts and charges is given in the appendix.

The total income of the District Committees during the year was less than that of the previous year by Rs. 1,195-14-8, but their total expenditure was more by Rs. 274-14-7. The total balance in the hands of the District Committees at the end of the year was Rs. 5,916-5-3.

11. Out of a sum of Rs. 5,282-2-0 shown as receipts of the Central Committee, a sum of Rs. 3,000 constituted the grant made by the Government towards its funds. The Central Committee of the Society has already expressed its gratitude to the Government for this liberal grant and the society once more, takes this opportunity of expressing its thankfulness to the Government for the above grant and hopes that in the years to come the Government will more and more appreciate the good work done by the Society and will increase the grants made towards its maintenance. A sum of Rs. 100 was received from Her Excellency Lady Willingdon being the proceeds of a concert arranged by her for the benefit of the Society. This was another instance of the great personal sympathy which she and Lord Willingdon always evinced in the work of the Madras Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society. To them, the Society begs leave to express its most profound gratitude. Rao Sahib G. Sitarama Chetti Garu and Rao Bahadur V. Ranganatham Chetti Garu presented the Society with Government promissory notes worth Rs. 500 and Rs. 1,000 respectively, and the Society is thankful to these gentlemen for their liberal assistance. The other substantial contributions to the Central Committee were those of the Zamindar of Sivaganga who paid Rs. 250, and Rao Sahib O. A. O. K. Chidambaram Chettiar, who paid Rs. 200. The Corporation of Madras, paid Rs. 100 to the Central Committee.

One or two District Committees also received important donations from local bodies, such as a sum of Rs. 200 by the District Committee at Bellary from the Bellary Municipal Council and a sum of Rs. 300 by the District Committee at Salem from the Salem District Board. To these and to other generous hearted gentlemen who helped the Society with money, the Society tenders its most heartfelt thanks.

12. The thanks of the Society are also due to the numerous employers of labour who were so good as to entertain the men recommended to them by the Society, and particularly to Messrs. Binny and Co., the Madras Port Trust, the Superintendent of the Government Press and the Engineer of the Madras Corporation.

13. In addition to Rao Sahib Sitarama Chetti who had been appointed in 1922 as a visitor of all the jails in the Presidency, Diwan Bahadur P. Kesava Pillai and Diwan Bahadur G. Narayanaswami Chetti were appointed as provincial jail visitors during the year. This institution of provincial jail visitors has proved very beneficial to the Madras Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society. It enables the Central Committee to keep in touch with the District Committees, to infuse fresh life into those committees which have become slack in their work and generally to enlist public sympathy and support in the cause of the Society. The appointment of Mr. Narayanaswami Chetti has a particular value, because as one of the Secretaries of the Society, he has proved, in the language of the Report on the administration of jails in the Madras Presidency for 1924 "his intense interest in and zeal for the reclamation of criminals". During the year under report. Mr. G. Sitarama Chetti visited Salem, Madura and Tinnevely, while Mr. G. Narayanaswami Chetti visited Coimbatore, Salem, Cuddapah, Nellore, Vellore, Tanjore, Saidapet and Trichinopoly. During their visits these gentlemen have done excellent work in reviving the activities of the branch societies, in creating local interest, enlisting members and arousing enthusiasm among the public to co-operate in the laudable object of ameliorating the condition of discharged prisoners. Special mention should also be made of the valuable assistance given by Diwan Bahadur P. Parankusam Naidu to Honorary Secretaries during the year.

14. As usual, the Agent of the Central Committee at Madras and Mr. G. Narayanaswami Chetti, one of the Honorary Secretaries, regularly interviewed the Penitentiary, the prisoners expecting their release and on their release, they were either kept in the Society's home or, if they

chose to remain outside, they were taken care of and given the necessary assistance by the Agent. In addition to the persons released from the Penitentiary, the Executive Committee at Madras also helped various persons sent to Madras by the Superintendents of the several District Jails and by the Superintendent of the Tanjore Borstal Institute. Most of these persons were provided with employment in the manner suited to their habits and training. Some of the ex-prisoners who were anxious to go to their homes or to find work out of Madras were provided with railway tickets and food and also furnished with introductions to the Local District Committees. In some cases, the ex-prisoners were desirous of setting up independent trades. In such cases and even in cases where they obtained employment through the help of the Society, they occasionally wanted some initial money for the purpose of maintaining themselves till they received their first instalment of income or salary. In such cases, the men were either helped with small presents of money or with small loans which the Society afterwards collected by means of easy instalments without interest. In deserving cases, the loans were subsequently treated as gifts.

15. The number of prisoners who sought the help of the Society at Madras during the year was 157. Out of these, 140 persons were admitted into the Society's home at Madras, as against 94 in the previous year. They were all sheltered and fed in the home, and the Society was able to obtain employment for 64 by direct efforts made by the Committee or its agent. The nature of the employment obtained for these men was as carpenters, coolies, rickshaw pullers, watchmen, attenders, peons, fitters or compositors. Seven were provided with licenses as motor drivers, 30 were given tools or money to continue their accustomed calling, 36 were provided with railway tickets to go to their native homes, 2 absconded from the home and one was discharged for misbehaviour.

16. Admission into the home is without restriction of caste, creed or previous occupation and is conditional only upon a recommendation from a jail official or other responsible person. Continuance

in the home is dependent on orderly behaviour in the home. As far as possible, there is separation between casuals and habituals, and Borstal and Reformatory boys are prevented from associating with habituals and other older criminals. The inmates are paid a daily batta of 8 as. in the case of a Hindu and Re. 1, in the case of an Anglo-Indian or European. They are allowed, if they so desire, to cook their own food in the premises of the home on condition of their keeping them clean and tidy. No person can ordinarily be kept for more than 10 days at a time, though with the express orders of the Honorary Secretary one can be kept longer.

Classification of persons admitted into the Home.

17. In the year under report, admission included men from all classes and communities as follows:—

Classified in another way, there were 52 habituals, 74 casuals, 12 Borstal boys, 2 Reformatory boys.

Yet another classification. 21 were persons who had been convicted of offences against person or imprisoned for failure to give security or report their residence, while all the rest were persons convicted of offences against property. The prisoners for whom the Society was able to find employment came under both the above categories, persons convicted of offences against person and persons convicted of offences against property. The Society did not find it more difficulty to get employment for the former than for the latter, though it was difficult to get employment for either.

18. At the request of the Government, the Society consented to accommodate in their home and feed certain groups of Mappilla women and children who arrived in Madras for the purpose of joining self-supporters in the Andamans. The number of Mapilla women and children who passed through the Society during 1924 was 84 and the

Mapilla women and children bound for Andamans.

expenses incurred on their behalf amounted to Rs. 52-6-8. The women and children were received at the railway station by the Society's Agent, accommodated in the Society's home and fed at the expense of the Society before they departed to the Andamans.

19. Two girls who had been convicted by the Chief Presidency Magistrate of Madras had been entrusted to the Case of two girls

Salvation Army under Section 401 of the Cr. P. C. under an order of remission of sentence conditional on their living with the Salvation Army. The term of their sentences having expired, they were entitled to release from the Salvation Army, who however brought their case to the notice of the Society through the Government. The Society thought it undesirable to let them relapse to their original environment and undertake to maintain them until such time as they became majors or capable of protecting themselves. As the Society has no facilities at present for keeping girls in its home, it had to allow them to remain in the custody of the Salvation Army in their Girls' School at Nellore on condition of their permitting the responsible officers of the Society to visit them at any time they pleased and withdrawing them from the hands of the Salvation Army whenever they thought that in the interests of the girls such removal was necessary.

20. The work of District Committees has shown an improvement during the year. The total number of persons who were helped by the District Committees was nearly 150 and the amount spent by them on pure relief work was Rs. 765-11-0. Like the Central Committee at Madras, the District Committees not only assisted the men who sought their help with money, but in most cases were able to find employment for them.

21. The Bellary District Committee has started a Prisoners' Homes in the Home on the model of the Society's Home at Mufassal. Madras. In Salem, though there is no separate building used as a home for ex-prisoners, the Superintendent of the Central Jail has permitted two rooms outside the jail premises to be used by the Society for the purpose of accommodating the persons seeking its help until finally disposing of them.

22. One of the activities of the District Committees has taken the direction of providing religious and moral lectures to the inmates of the jails in their localities. The Secretary at Rajahmundry delivered nine such lectures. The District Committee at Ramnad got 4 Pundits appointed as jail lecturers and these appear to have given discourses on moral and religious topics to the inmates of the jail. The Secretary of the Salem District Committee, in collaboration with the catechist of the London Mission, also delivered periodical lectures in the Salem Central Jail on morals and religion.

23. With a view to expanding their work, some of the District Committees have formed branches within their Districts. For instance, the Bellary District Committee has established branches at Rayadurg, Harpanahalli and Hadagalle. The Chingleput District Committee has got branches at Saidapet and Chingleput and the Madura District Committee has got a branch at Sivakasi.

24. During the year under report, the District Committee at Tanjore transformed itself into a Borstal Association and it is especially devoting itself to the after-care of Borstal boys. Two months before the release of each Borstal boy, intimation is given to the Secretary of this Borstal Association. The boys who require help are interviewed by the Secretary and necessary steps are then and there taken to help them. Sometimes, private bodies and public officers apply for the services of the inmates for some particular work in their institution or office. Then, conditional releases are obtained of the boys suitable for such work and they are employed accordingly. In other cases, intimation is given to the Secretary of the District Committee having jurisdiction over the area to which the boy wants to go and in consultation with him, a probation officer is appointed for him. For almost every Borstal boy, there now exists a probation officer. On account of the increased

activities of the Tanjore District Committee and of the useful character of the work which it proposed to undertake, the Executive Committee at Madras, on 8-12-1924, sanctioned a sum of Rs. 100 to the Tanjore committee to enable it to carry on its useful work.

25. In the Annual Report of 1923, special attention was called to the necessity and importance of probation officers in any scheme of aid to discharged prisoners. If the work of the Society is to have any permanent value, the Society must not content itself with performing the functions of an employment bureau for discharged prisoners, but should take effective steps to supervise their after-lives. To do this, the Society need not necessarily have probation officers in each and every village, but must certainly be in a position to know the existence of and to approach efficient and sympathetic men who will be able to get into contact with ex-prisoners, wherever they may happen to work and live and be willing to give them advice and befriend them. For this purpose, the Society should have a committee at least in the head-quarters of every revenue division. And these committees should be officered by men possessed of some ability, influence, leisure and, above all, of willingness to do unselfish work.

26. The Executive Committee at Madras and other District Committees in the mufassal have done their best to appoint probation officers to take charge of the men who pass through their hands. In the work of appointing probation officers the Society gratefully acknowledges the help that has been rendered by District Magistrates everywhere in choosing men and inducing them to accept the appointment. In the very nature of things, it is not possible for the District Committees located at the head-quarters of each District themselves to appoint probation officers, and they have to depend upon the assistance of District Magistrates and other officers of Government in selecting suitable persons to take care of ex-prisoners. Several District Committees have even represented that the work of appointing probation officers may definitely be undertaken by the District Magistrates themselves. In the

circumstances, the Society requests, with all the earnestness it can command, that all District Officials will render every possible assistance in this vital matter.

27. In 1921, on the recommendation of the Society, the Government had issued an order, No. 1176 Law (Genl.), dated 23rd August 1921, allowing Government servants to take part in the collection of funds for the Society, but the effect of this order was not sufficiently tangible. On 25-2-1924, the Government have issued another order G. O. No. 634 Law (Genl.), impressing on all District Magistrates and other leading officials the necessity for working with special interest on behalf of the Society and of enlisting non-official sympathy in its cause. Foremost among the officials who have evinced deep interest in the growth and usefulness of the Society must be mentioned Lt. Col. Cameron, C.I.E., who with his knowledge of similar societies abroad and his great influence as the head of the Jail administration in this Province has given more help to the Society and has contributed more to its success than any other person.

28. Neither the Executive Committee at Madras nor the District Committees in the mufassal are satisfied with merely appointing Probation Officers for the ex-prisoners in their charge, but they are insisting upon progress reports from each Probation Officer in regard to each ex-convict entrusted to his charge. There are reasons to be afraid that in the past the appointment of probation and parole Officers has in some cases been nothing more than merely nominal. Probation and parole Officers are expected constantly to visit the persons entrusted to their care, make enquiries about them both of their employers and neighbours and to give all such advice and encouragement as may be necessary to keep them steadfastly in the ways of virtuous living.

29. Though the Society has had a successful year, it must be mentioned that it has not received the full measure of support from the public with it is entitled to expect. Public apathy has yet to be surmounted; much more intensive work remains to be done

by many District Committees. Promised subscriptions are in arrears and many prominent and wealthy gentlemen have yet to assist the society.

30. The Society has now existed for nearly 4 years. The objects which it set before itself at the commencement were as follows:—

(a) To give, as far as possible, such help as may be needed on release by persons convicted of criminal offences without distinction of race or creed;

(b) to make efforts to reclaim habitual offenders from a life of crime, and to enable prisoners after release to lead honest and respectable lives,

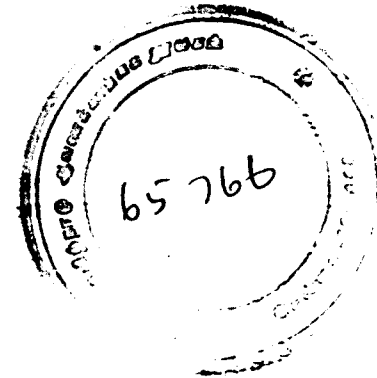
(c) to make special arrangement with a view to preventing casual juvenile offenders from becoming habitual offenders,

(d) to promote legislation with the object of preventing imprisonment, in cases which can be adequately dealt with in any other manner; and,

(e) to collect funds and do all such other things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects or any of them.

The Executive Committee at Madras alone has till now given help of some kind or other to nearly 450 ex-convicts. It has actually sheltered and fed in its home about 300 persons and for most of these men, it has been able to find work or employment. As regards the rest, it has satisfied itself, after such enquiry as it could make, that they were able either to return to their old avocations amidst accustomed surroundings or to find new work. Local Committees in the Districts have also done appreciable work in the same direction. Altogether, the Society may be said to have succeeded in carrying out its first object. The Central Committee has more than Rs. 20,000 to its credit by way of investment in war bonds or Government promissory notes and is thus assured of an annual income from securities of nearly Rs. 1,000. The various District Committees have also larger or smaller balances to their credit. Though the Society wishes that its finances were

in a better condition, yet there is no room for dissatisfaction with the results of its activities in regard to collection of funds, the last of the objects set forth above. In the matter of supervision and reclamation of habitual offenders, (items (b) and (c) above), it has done its best to carry out this object also, by appointing probation and parole officers wherever possible. Now that the Society has established itself on strong foundations, the time has come for it not only to consolidate its activities in these directions, but to extend them in the direction enunciated in object No. 4. To enable it to undertake this work of consolidation and extension, with credit and success, it calls upon all philanthropic ladies and gentlemen to join it and help its cause.

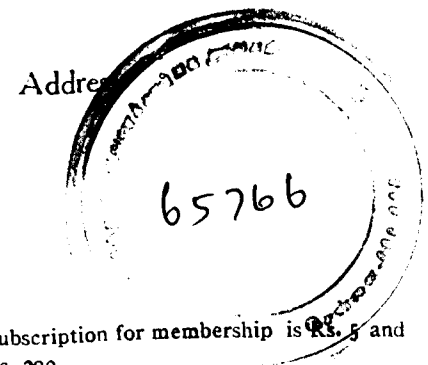
