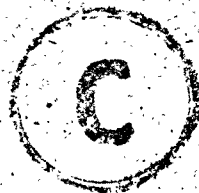

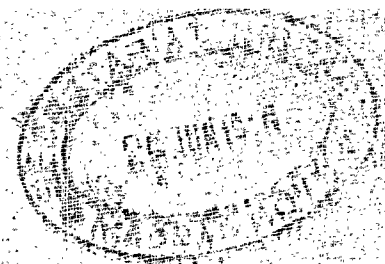

I have the honour to submit, for the information of Government, the Annual Report on the working of the Mental Hospitals in the Madras Presidency during the year 1925.

2. *Population*.—The total population of the three mental hospitals during the year was 1,303 (990 males and 313 females) as against 1,295 (983 males and 312 females) in the previous year. Of these, the number of patients remaining at the commencement of the year was 950, and the number admitted and re-admitted during the year was 349. Of the total treated, 165 were cured, 42 improved; 16 discharged not improved and 16 discharged otherwise and 1,001 remained at the end of the year. The treatment adopted in the Mental Hospital, Madras, now is, as far as possible, in keeping with the latest methods of treating mental cases. The total population may be classified as follows:—

Of the total number of patients admitted during the year, 46 were Europeans and Anglo-Indians, 53 were Christians, 209 were Hindus, 58 were Muhammadans and 13 were other castes. There was no escape of inmates during the year in any of the three mental hospitals.

3. *Age and previous occupation of the inmates.*—Of the 349 inmates admitted and re-admitted during the year under report, 19 were under 20 years of age, 231 were between 20 to 40 years, 89 were between 40 to 60 years and 10 above 60 years. As usual, the number of inmates between the ages of 20 and 40 was the largest. As regards the previous occupation of the inmates, the number of general labourers was the largest, i.e., 54, and next came cultivating tenants numbering 24.

4. *Causes of insanity.*—Among the causes of insanity, mental stress, mental instability and heredity account for the largest number of admissions.

5. *Types of insanity.*—The principal types of insanity in their order of frequency were as follows :—

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6. *Criminal insanes.*—The total criminal population during the year was 177 (165 males and 12 females), of whom 142 remained at the beginning of the year and 35 were newly admitted during the year. The result of the treatment of this class of insanes was:—31 were discharged, transferred, etc., 5 died and 141 remained at the end of the year. The daily average strength was 147·87 as against 145·17 during the previous year.

7. *Deaths.*—The total number of deaths during the year under report was only 63 (52 males and 11 females) as against 107 and 89 during the years 1924 and 1923, respectively. The low percentage of deaths during the year reflects much credit upon the administration of these hospitals. The chief diseases causing death were tubercle of the lungs, other respiratory diseases, diseases of the circulatory system, anæmia and debility and digestive diseases.

8. *Accommodation.*—The highest number of inmates accommodated on any day during the year in the Mental Hospital, Madras, was 713 on the 16th September 1925, 90 on the 10th January 1925 in the Mental Hospital, Waltair, and 227 on the 19th November 1925 in the Mental Hospital, Calicut. In the Mental Hospital at Madras, the accommodation for Indian civil males and in the female section continued to be insufficient. Plans and estimates for improvements and additions to this hospital have been submitted to Government for sanction. The accommodation in the Mental Hospital at Waltair remains the same, i.e., 79 for males and 17 for females. Plans and estimates for the following buildings have been returned to the Public Works Department duly countersigned. The execution of the works will be commenced in the early part of the official year when funds permit.

(1) A platform for the washerman and (2) a four-seated latrine for the new hospital building at Waltair.

In the Mental Hospital at Calicut, accommodation is now available for 200 male and 62 female patients. The weaving room and the dining hall had to be converted into emergency wards and temporary thatched heds have been put up for the purpose of weaving and dining. It is proposed to build an industrial workshop to replace the weaving shed, and the required funds for this have been provided in the budget of the next official year. Proposals for the construction of a dining room are also under consideration.

9. *Buildings—Madras.*—In the Mental Hospital at Madras, a block of 20 additional single rooms for Indian civil male patients was constructed. The following minor works were also completed during the year:—

(1) The construction of drainage in the isolation camp, referred to in the previous report.

(2) A bath room to cottage No. 89 in the female enclosure.

(3) Plain galvanized iron fencing round vegetable garden.

Waltair.—Six single cells for filthy and noisy patients are under construction, and new hospital building for males consisting of 8 beds was taken charge of on 24th October 1925.

Calicut.—No new constructions were carried out during the year.

As usual, the annual repairs to the buildings of the three mental hospitals were carried out during the year.

10. *Sanitation.*—The sanitation of the hospital in all the three institutions was as satisfactory as it could be. Dry earth system of disposing of the night-soil is in vogue both in Calicut and Waltair Mental hospitals. The Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Madras, still presses for the acquisition of the very congested and growing village just outside the south-eastern wall of the hospital which is a source of danger to the health of the hospital.

Report for 1925—recorded with remarks.

READ—the following:—

Order—No. 909 (Public Health), dated 27th May 1926.

Recorded.

2. *Accommodation.*—The accommodation for Indian civil male patients in the Madras Mental Hospital was increased during the year by the addition of a block of 20 single rooms. The construction of two new wards of 16 and 8 beds for the segregation of tubercular patients has been sanctioned and funds have been provided for the purpose in the current year. The question of increasing the accommodation further is engaging the attention of the Surgeon-General and the Government as part of a general scheme of improvements to the three mental hospitals.

3. *Strength.*—Although there was no appreciable increase in the total number of patients who received treatment (1,303 against 1,295 in 1924), the average daily strength rose from 942 in 1924 to 981 in 1925. This is due to the fact that patients remained in the hospitals for longer periods, thus enabling themselves to derive a fuller benefit from the treatment provided.

4. *Sick rate and mortality.*—The death rate showed a marked decline from 11·4 per cent to 6·4 per cent of the average strength. There was a slight improvement in the percentage of cures from 15·8 in 1924 to 16·8 per cent in the year under review. There were no epidemics except an outbreak of chicken-pox in the Madras Mental Hospital which soon subsided as the result of prompt action.

5. *Water-supply and drainage.*—An estimate for Rs. 14,000 for improving the water-supply of the Madras Mental Hospital has been sanctioned. The Government have also directed the Sanitary Engineer to proceed at once with the investigation of a proper drainage scheme for the hospital.

6. *Buildings.*—The question of effecting improvements and extensions to the mental hospitals on up-to-date lines is engaging attention. Meanwhile, the Government have accorded sanction for the execution of the following works which are regarded as urgent:—

(a) *Madras Mental Hospital*—

(i) Two wards for tubercular patients.

(ii) A new dispensary and operation theatre.

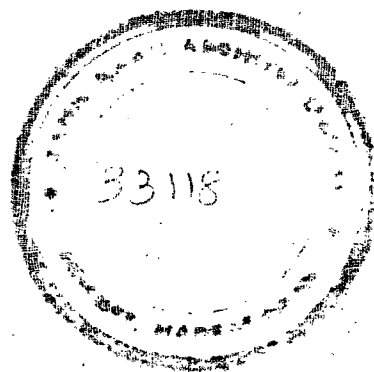
- (iii) A new administrative block.
- (iv) New quarters for the nursing staff.
- (b) Calicut Mental Hospital—
- (v) An industrial workshop for males.

7. *General.*—The Government are glad to note that the scheme under which ladies visited the Madras Mental Hospital periodically has worked satisfactorily. As remarked in the reports of previous years a gradual reformation is taking place in the administration of mental hospitals especially in the direction of creating a home atmosphere in which scientific treatment can be most successfully applied. Specially trained attendants and medical and nursing staffs and adequate provision for the separation of the different classes of patients and types of cases are among the improvements still most needed. These matters are under consideration. The question of making special provision for the treatment of mental defectives, especially cases of definite insanity in the early stages when there is some prospect of cure, is under examination. The establishment of a small home as an annexe to the Madras Mental Hospital and the opening of mental clinics in the General Hospital, Madras, and the Headquarter Hospitals at Calicut and Vizagapatam have been suggested for the purpose.

11. *General hygiene of mental patients.*—Personal cleanliness of the insanes and the sanitation of the buildings and surroundings are being carefully and satisfactorily supervised and carried out in all the three mental hospitals.

12. *Drainage.*—In the Mental Hospital at Madras night-soil as usual continues to be trenched outside the Mental Hospital on the newly acquired land. This is an objectionable practice which has been allowed to go on for years and needs to be rectified as soon as possible. No progress has yet been made in the underground sewage and drainage scheme, though Government have in their order No. Mis. 1320 W., dated 26th August 1925, approved the proposed investigation of the drainage scheme for this hospital. Want of drains within the hospital keeps some parts of it in a filthy condition. The drainage system is satisfactory in the Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut.

13. *Water-supply.*—Water-supply to the Madras Mental Hospital continues to be inadequate in its distribution owing to the calibre of the pipe from the mains having been diminished on the northern side to one inch. Though plans and estimates have been received from the Public Works Department and permission obtained from the Engineer, Waterworks, Corporation of Madras, for laying a 5" main inside the compound, the change has not been carried out for want of funds. The Mental Hospital at Waltair is provided with a municipal water-supply which is supplemented in times of scarcity from the hospital well. The water supply of the Mental Hospital, Calicut, is obtained from deep draw wells and is good. But in the hot season the wells dry up and the cultivation of vegetables is hardly possible.

14. *Amusements.*—Various kinds of amusements were as usual provided for the patients. The annual treats and sports for the patients were held during the year. The system of Lady Visitors corresponding to "Lady Almoners" in England was introduced into the Mental Hospital at Madras as an experiment. The system has worked satisfactorily. A trial is being made to get up a similar committee of men to work on the same lines on the male side. As in previous years the Honorary Secretary, Red Cross Society, was kind enough to present the patients with valuable gifts.

15. *Epidemics.*—There was an outbreak of chickenpox at the Mental Hospital, Madras, but as a result of prompt action the epidemic soon subsided with no deaths. There was no epidemic of any kind in the other two hospitals.

16. *Finance.*—The total receipts including those from paying patients amounted to Rs. 3,87,681-15-6 as against Rs. 3,55,079-12-6 in the previous year, thus showing an increase which was due to an increase in all the items of receipts. The value of stores received from the manufacturing department less cost of raw materials was Rs. 14,926-2-10. The expenditure under superintendence shows a slight increase. This was due to increment earned by the Superintendent and the special pay of Rs. 150 drawn in the Government Mental Hospital, Madras. There was also an increase under diets at the Mental Hospital, Madras. This increased cost of dieting the patients as compared with the preceding year is chiefly due to the following causes:—

(1) enormous increase in population, (2) the higher tender rates accepted for some important articles of diet and (3) the increased cost of dieting a larger number of Indian special paying patients than in the previous year.

17. *General administration.*—Throughout the year Dr. H. S. Hensman, L.M.S., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., M.P.C., was the Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Madras. While in the Mental Hospital, Waltair, Lieut.-Col. M. N. Chaudhuri, I.M.S., was in charge from 1st January 1925 to 8th May

1925, Civil Assistant Surgeon M.R.Ry. C. Totadri Avargal, L.M.S., from 9th May 1925 to 9th June 1925, Civil Surgeon M.R.Ry. T. S. Tirumurti Avargal, B.A., M.B., C.M., from 10th June 1925 to 29th July 1925, and Major A. S. Leslie, I.M.S., from 30th July 1925 to 31st December 1925. Major A. P. G. Lorimer, I.M.S., held charge of the Mental Hospital, Calicut, throughout the year.

18. *Visitors.*—As usual during the year under report, official and non-official visitors inspected the respective hospitals. A remark has to be made in this connexion as regards the official visitors of the Mental Hospital, Waltair. Some of the official visitors of this institution were irregular in their attendance at the monthly meetings of visitors. Meetings had sometimes to be postponed for want of a quorum. This was brought to the notice of Government who have issued the necessary instructions to the officials concerned. Among those that visited the Mental Hospital, Madras, during the year were Her Excellency Viscountess Goschen and the Surgeon-General. While the Mental Hospital at Waltair was visited by the Surgeon-General, Inspector-General of Prisons, Huzur Deputy Collector and the Treasury Deputy Collector, Vizagapatam. The Inspector-General of Prisons visited the Mental Hospital at Calicut.

19. *Verification of service registers and stock books.*—In all the hospitals, service registers were verified and found correct. The stock was verified periodically and found correct.

20. *General remarks.*—During the year the question of giving proper treatment to mental defectives, especially cases of definite insanity, in the early stages where there is some prospect of cure was raised in the shape of a resolution in the Council of State. To cope with this problem the Madras Government called for certain proposals, i.e.—

- (1) Teaching and propaganda.
- (2) Improvement of existing mental hospitals.
- (3) Complete separation of criminal from non-criminal lunatics and
- (4) Establishment of mental clinics in General Hospital.

Certain suggestions, such as the rebuilding of the existing Mental Hospital, the training of medical officers in the treatment of mental diseases, the reorganization of the staff of the hospitals and the building of a small home for the treatment of the mental defectives, made by the Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Madras, were submitted to Government. The Government, however, are of opinion that the question of rebuilding the existing Mental Hospitals and the establishment of a fourth one for the southern districts is impracticable at present on financial grounds. The other suggestions are under consideration.

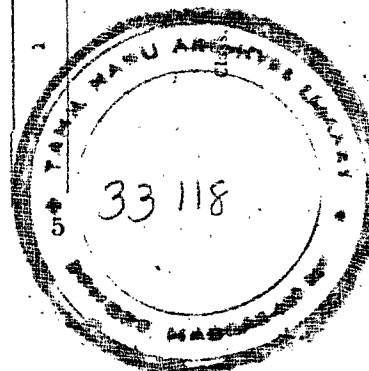
