SIR,

I have the honour to forward the annual report on the working of the Mental Hospitals in this Presidency for the year ending 31st December 1932.

2. *Population.*—The total population of the three mental hospitals during the year under report was 2,147 (1,646 males and 501 females) as against 2,077 in the previous year. The number of patients remaining at the beginning of the year was 1,516. The figure for the previous year was 1,435. The number of patients admitted and re-admitted during the year was 631 against 642 in the previous year. Of the total treated, 213 were "cured," 124 "improved," 71 "discharged not improved," 39 "discharged otherwise," 10 "died" and 1,597 remained at the end of the year. The daily average strength of inmates in the three mental hospitals was 1,559.80 as compared with 1,499.9 in the previous year, and the daily average sick was 242.81 as against 233.7 in 1931. Of the total number of patients admitted during the year, 31 were Europeans and Anglo-Indians, 54 Indian Christians, 422 Hindus and 114 Muhammadans. There were two escapes during the year, one from the Mental Hospital, Madras, and the other from Mental Hospital, Calicut. The patient who escaped from Madras Mental Hospital is still at large, while the one from Calicut was brought back to the hospital by the police and later discharged "cured."

3. *Treatment and its Results.*—The results of treatment on the whole appear to be satisfactory. The percentage of cured on the daily average strength was 13.66 as against 17.00 in 1931 and that on admissions was 18.73, the corresponding figure for 1931 being 21.17. The comparative decrease in the percentage of recoveries is due to the fact that for lack of accommodation in the Mental

Hospital at Madras in view of the increase in the population and consequent overcrowding of patients, many of the cases had to be discharged "improved" without waiting for complete recovery.

4. *Age and previous Occupation of the Inmates.*—Of the patients admitted and re-admitted during the year, 40 were under 20 years of age, 414 between 20 to 40 years, 156 between 40 to 60 years, and 11 upwards of 60 years. As usual the incidence of insanity was heavy between the years 20 to 40, i.e., on the active period of life. Among the patients admitted during the year, the number of persons of no occupation or whose previous occupations were not known was the largest, i.e., 180; next came general labourers, and cultivating tenants numbering 69 and 45, respectively.

5. *Types of Insanity.*—The principal types of insanity in their order of frequency were dementia praecox, mania, insanity due to cannabis indica, secondary or terminal dementia, circular insanity and imbecility.

6. *Causes of Insanity.*—Mental stress, previous attack, heredity, insanity due to cannabis indica, epilepsy, alcoholism, privation and starvation accounted for the largest number of admissions at the Madras and Calicut Mental Hospitals. In the Waltair Hospital amongst the predisposing causes, the admissions during the year were from puberty and adolescence, neurotic, previous attack, syphilis, epilepsy and mental stress.

7. *Criminal Insanes.*—At the beginning of the year, there are 192 criminal insanes in the Mental Hospital, Madras. Fifty-two were newly admitted during the year; thus the total number was 244 (224 males and 20 females), of these 32 were discharged, transferred, etc., 6 died and 206 remained at the end of the year.

8. *Deaths.*—The total number of deaths during the year was 103 (71 males and 32 females) as against 87 during 1931. The percentage of total deaths to daily average strength was 6.60 as against 5.80 in the previous year.

The highest number of patients accommodated in the Madras Mental Hospital, i.e., 1,188, was the highest on record against the available accommodation 744. The tendency for the population to increase still continues. The Superintendent, Mental Hospital, Madras, reports that the redistribution of patients from Madras, Ramnad, Salem and Tinnevely districts to the Mental Hospital, Calicut, ordered in G.O. No. 483, P.H., dated 3rd March 1932, has not relieved the overcrowding in the Madras Hospital to any extent. All civil mental patients from Coorg who were hitherto sent to the Mental Hospital, Madras, were ordered to be sent to the Mental Hospital, Calicut. The Superintendent, Mental Hospital, Calicut, also reports that the total number of patients admitted from the districts mentioned above and from Coorg during the year was not so large as to adversely affect the working of his institution.

10. Buildings.—There was no new construction in the mental hospitals during the year, with the exception of certain minor works and repairs.

11. General Hygiene of the Insane.—Special attention was paid by the staffs of the mental hospitals to feeding, bathing, clothing and also to the prevention and early treatment of pyorrhoea and skin diseases.

12. Drainage.—This is satisfactory in the mental hospitals at Waltair and Calicut. In the Madras Mental Hospital, the drainage scheme which has been merged into the scheme for the remodelling of the hospital has been deferred for financial reasons.

13. Water-supply—(a) Madras.—The water-supply is from the Red Hills and is adequate.

(b) Waltair.—Chief source is from the municipal mains. Minor internal extension proposed in 1931 has been carried out during the year. The municipality supplies only 350 gallons of water per diem free of cost to the hospital and the excess water over and above that quantity is charged for. Owing to this restricted supply the Superintendent states that hydro-therapy is not freely resorted to at the hospital. The Government have been addressed for an increased free supply of water by the municipality to the hospital.

(c) Calicut.—The water required for all purposes is obtained by the manual labour of patients and attendants from the deep wells

situated here and there in the compound. The supply from these wells was not adequate and especially in summer the use of water had to be restricted to a great extent which was a disadvantage to the cleanliness of the various wards, vegetable plantations and the garden. The question of water-supply is one of the most important items to be taken up urgently. The estimated cost of excavating two wells with necessary oil engines, pump house, storage tank, pipes, etc., and of the cost of acquiring three acres of land required for sinking the wells comes to Rs. 43,708. In G.O. No. 110, P.H., dated 16th January 1932, the Government informed the Surgeon-General that they are unable to provide funds for the acquisition of land required for extension to the hospital as well as for the sinking of wells. It is proposed to re-submit the scheme again to Government as Part II scheme for 1934-35.

14. Industries and Employment—(a) Madras.—Fifty-one per cent of the patients were engaged in various occupations during the year, 19 per cent of whom worked in the manufacturing department, i.e., the oil mill, mat-making, weaving and knitting, etc., and the remaining on unskilled labour.

(b) Waltair and Calicut.—As the majority of the hospital patients is rural, agriculture, cattle-tending, weaving and gardening are the principal occupations for the males.

15. Amusements—(a) Madras.—The usual annual sports for the patients were held. Football, badminton, tennis and base ball attracted several patients, whilst those not interested in active sports had in-door games like table tennis, billiards, cards, chess, etc., or were taken out for walks if necessary accompanied by attendants. The privilege of allowing a certain number of patients to attend the Wellington Cinema in the evenings was continued through the kind courtesy of the proprietor of that cinema. The band of His Excellency the Governor of Madras played once every month in the hospital as in previous years. The Red Cross Society made a generous donation of Rs. 500 towards the annual treat to the patients. The editors of the newspapers and journals continued their supply of their papers free. The Committee of Lady Visitors to the hospital continued to carry on their good work among the female patients.

(b) Waltair.—Patients took part in games like football, badminton, etc., and other amusements like cards and chess. Music was provided systematically by a gramophone and also by concerts given by patients with talent for music. The patients were also amused occasionally with feats by professional jugglers and acrobats and they were regularly sent on excursion trips. The motor bus was freely utilized for taking patients to fairs and festivals in surrounding places and to bi-weekly shows of the local "Sree

Krishna" Cinema. The editors of the newspapers continued their supply of papers. The nucleus for a hospital library was found with Telugu books presented by Messrs. V. Ramaswami Sastrulu & Sons, Madras.

(c) Calicut.—Annual sports and new year celebrations were conducted and prizes distributed to the winners. As usual, the patients were provided with various kinds of amusements. The editors of the papers continued the free supply of their papers. A Malayalam drama was staged by the attendants and patients during the annual sports.

16. Epidemics.—The Mental Hospital at Waltair was entirely free from any epidemic disease during the year. As regards Madras and Calicut, there were some cases of influenza of a mild type. There were no casualties.

17. Finance.—The total receipts including those from paying patients amounted to Rupees 4,80,961-14-4 as against Rs. 5,60,467-11-8 during 1931. The increase under receipts in 1931 is mainly due to the Public Works Department charges on account of the construction of paying wards in the Mental Hospital at Calicut. As the special wards were lying vacant for want of patients, the minimum rate of Rs. 1-8-0 per diem for the special wards for mental patients in the Government Mental Hospital, Calicut, has been reduced to Re. 1 per diem as a tentative measure for one year so as to see if patients will come forward to occupy the vacant wards. The decrease in the expenditure under establishment and maintenance, diet, bedding and clothing, miscellaneous items, etc., is due to the emergency cut in pay and other compensatory allowances of the nursing staff, fall in the prices of some of the important articles of diet and restriction of supply of costly diets and extras to suitable and deserving cases only, and also to the general economy observed as a measure of retrenchment.

18. General Administration.—Dr. H. S. Hensman, L.M.S., L.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., M.P.C., was in charge of the Mental Hospital, Madras, for the whole year except for one month from the 30th May 1932 when Captain G. R. Parasuram, B.A., L.M.S., M.R.C.P., L.R.C.S., L.R.P.P. & S., DIPL. PSYCH., A.I.R.O., the Deputy Superintendent, acted for him. The superintendentship of Mental Hospital, Waltair, was held by M.R.Ry. C. Rama Kamath Avargal, M.B., C.M., from 1st January to 21st April 1932 and by M.R.Ry. Rao Sahib T. Madhava Rao Avargal, B.A., L.R.C.P. & S., etc., for the rest of the year under

report. M.R.Ry. S. Kumaraswami Pillai Avargal, L.R.C.P. & S. (Edin.), etc., was the Superintendent of the Mental Hospital at Calicut from 1st to 31st January 1932 and Major A. Innes Cox, I.M.S., for the rest of the year.

19. Visitors.—All the official and non-official visitors attended the monthly meetings of hospitals by turn. The Subdivisional Magistrate, the District Judge of Vizagapatam, and the Inspector-General of Prisons, Madras, visited the Mental Hospital, Waltair. The Inspector-General of Prisons visited the Mental Hospital, Madras, and the Surgeon-General visited the Mental Hospitals, Madras and Calicut.

20. Verification of Service Books and Stock Registers.—The annual verification of the service books of the establishment and stock registers was duly carried out in all the three mental hospitals during the year.

21. General Remarks.—The redistribution of patients ordered in G.O. No. 488, P.H., dated 3rd March 1932, has not relieved the overcrowding in the Madras Mental Hospital to an appreciable extent. The daily average population in that hospital during the year was 1,156.32 against a total accommodation of 744 beds available. Thus there was an increase of 55.4 per cent in the daily average population. The overcrowding is becoming more acute every year and the reasons for enlarging all the mental hospitals that I have previously put before Government still hold good and with increased force.

The Government are already considering the proposal to extend the Mental Hospital, Madras, or to open a new Mental Hospital at Tanjore utilizing the Medical School hostel building to relieve the overcrowding in the Mental Hospital, Madras.

We cannot yet claim that our institutions for reception of the insane are mental hospitals in the best sense of the word: they still retain the features of lunatic asylums where the primary consideration was the protection of the outside public from a possible danger rather than the treatment of individual mental patients. To attain that end an increase in staff as well as in accommodation would be necessary.

In my report of last year I pointed out the pressing need of a home for mental defectives. This need remains, though second in importance to the question of increased accommodation for certified mental patients.

Strength and accommodation.—The population of the three hospitals and their daily average strength continued to increase during the year as shown in the margin. The Mental Hospital at Madras was responsible, as may be expected, for the largest population 1,573, while Calicut and Waltair had a population of 413 and 161, respectively.

With a view to relieve the overcrowding in the Mental Hospital, Madras, patients other than criminal insanes from the districts of Madura, Ramnad, Salem and Tinnevely are admitted into the Mental Hospital, Calicut, and those from Chittoor are sent to the Waltair Mental Hospital. As even this arrangement does not seem to have had the desired effect, proposals are now under consideration to extend the Mental Hospital at Madras or to open a new Mental Hospital at Tanjore by utilizing the buildings of the Medical School hostel.

3. Sick rate and mortality.—The death-rate rose from 5.8 in 1931 to 6.6 in the year under review. The daily average number of patients sick in the hospitals stood at 242 as against 233 in the previous year. Except for a few cases of influenza of a mild type at Madras and Calicut there were no epidemics worth mentioning.

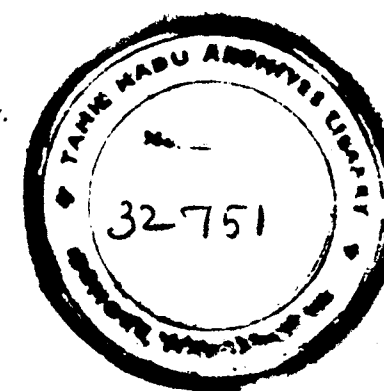
4. General.—Financial stringency continued to stand in the way of progress but normal activities were carried on as usual.
