SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Triennial Report on the working of the Civil Hospitals and Dispensaries in this Presidency for the years 1932 to 1934.

2. I took charge of the department on 20th November 1933. My predecessor Major-General C. A. Sprawson, C.I.E., V.H.S., I.M.S., was in charge for nearly two years during the triennium under report.

3. Under the orders of the Government of India, the statements of the Annual Report on the working of the Civil Hospitals and Dispensaries have been revised, Statements D, supplementary, E and F-1 have been omitted and columns in certain others have been deleted, increased or revised.

4. *Number of hospitals and dispensaries (Statement A).*—The total number of medical institutions of all classes working in the Presidency at the beginning of the triennium under report, viz., on 1st January 1932, was 1,337 while at the close of the triennium, viz., at the end of 1934, it was 1,356, i.e., 1,107 in rural areas and 249 in urban areas. There were thus 20 institutions more at the end of the triennium than at the beginning. The total number of institutions of all classes opened during the year 1934 was 27 of which 11 were of local and municipal, 1 was private non-aided and 15 were rural dispensaries. The number of institutions that were closed during the year 1934 was 6, of which 1 was of State special, 1 local and municipal, 1 private non-aided and 3 rural dispensaries. The number of State-public institutions working at the beginning of the triennium was 192 while at the end of the year 1934 it was 191. The number of State-special institutions was 34 at the end of the previous triennium, while the number at the end of present triennium was 28.

5. *Rural medical relief—Opening of subsidized rural dispensaries.*—In their Order No. 472, P.H., dated 3rd March 1932, the Government ordered as a measure of retrenchment in view of the financial stringency, that the appointment of medical practitioners to subsidized rural dispensaries which have been sanctioned but not opened, should be kept in abeyance, and that no midwives should be appointed to the existing rural dispensaries in which the midwives had not been employed previously. The orders have not been relaxed, and owing to the uncertain state of provincial finances, Government were unable to make any provision in the budget estimate for 1933-34, 1934-35 and 1935-36 for payment of subsidies for new rural dispensaries. As the scheme has not been extended, but on the other hand curtailed to a certain extent, the triennium under report does not show any improvement under the subsidized Medical Relief Scheme in rural areas.

6. *Visited Dispensary system.*—An examination of the working of "the Visited Dispensary system" in this Presidency, showed that the only districts in which the programme laid down in Government Memorandum No. 8647-1 D-3, P.H., dated 8th March 1930, of attendance twice a week on fixed days and at the hours fixed at each of the stations, which medical officers visit, was carried out are Anantapur, South Arcot, Guntur, Malabar, Nilgiris, Tinnevely and Vizagapatam Agency. The District Medical Officers of these districts and the Vizagapatam Agency Surgeon, Koraput, were therefore asked to continue this system of rural medical relief except in places where the attendance is persistently (for over several months) below 20. In other districts this system of medical relief has not been successful in spite of the attempts made to work it.

7. *Local fund and municipal institutions.*—The number of institutions at the close of 1934 was 506 as against 496 and 494 in 1933 and 1932, respectively.

8. *Statement B.*—The number of I.M.S. and I.M.D. officers in this Presidency during the year 1934 was 31 as compared to 25 in 1933. There were two W.M.S. officers in this Presidency during the year 1934. The number of salaried graduates and salaried licentiates during the year 1934 was 309 and 1,303, respectively, as compared to 333 and

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1,277 in the year 1933, and 349 and 1,406 in the year 1932. The number of honorary graduates and honorary licentiates in the year 1934 was 148 and 99, respectively, as compared to 140 and 81, respectively, in 1933 and 99 and 36, respectively, in 1932. The number of Europeans and Anglo-Indian nurses that were employed in the medical institutions in the Presidency during the year 1934 was 337 as compared to 464 in 1933 and 254 in 1932 and the number of Indian nurses employed was 246 in 1934 as compared to 216 in 1933 and 92 in 1932. The number of midwives and dhais was 775 and 16, respectively, in the year 1934 as compared to 949 and 10 in 1933 and 890 and 6 in 1932. The number of compounders who were employed in the medical institutions in the Presidency during the year 1934 was 1,110 as against 1,079 during 1933 and 1,026 in 1932.

9. *Statement C—(a) In-patients—(i) Beds.*—The accommodation available for in-patients of both the sexes in the hospitals of classes I, II, III and IV in 1934 was 10,658 beds as compared to 9,625 in 1933 and 9,588 in 1932. The number of beds available for women alone in 1934 was 4,508 as against 4,368 in 1933 and 4,235 in 1932. The practice of providing extra beds to the in-patients in the verandas of the respective hospitals in mufassal as well as in City State hospitals to meet the growing demand of the people seeking admission for treatment is still being continued and the number of these extra beds is not taken into account in the above figures.

(ii) *Number of in-patients.*—The number of in-door patients treated during the year 1934 was 231,623 as compared to 224,888 in 1933 and 212,980 in 1932. It will thus be observed that there is an appreciable increase in the number of in-patients treated as in-door patients in the medical institutions in the Presidency during the year 1934.

(iii) *Daily average.*—The daily average number of in-patients treated in 1934 was 10,387.46 as against 9,413.57 in 1933 and 8,672.99 in 1932.

(iv) *Deaths.*—There were 11,327 deaths among in-patients treated during the year 1934, as compared to 10,623 and 9,366 in 1933 and 1932, respectively, and the death-rate in 1934 was 4.89 as against 4.72 in 1933 and 4.39 in 1932.

(b) (i) *Out-door patients.*—The total number of out-door patients treated in the hospitals and dispensaries during the year 1934 was 16,006,374 (7,655,784 males, 3,795,652 females and 4,554,938 children) as compared to 15,722,769 (7,530,772 males, 3,703,925 females and 4,488,072 children) in 1933 and 14,744,318 (7,111,063 males, 3,441,915 females and 4,191,340 children) in 1932.

(ii) *Daily average.*—The daily average number of out-door patients treated in the medical institutions during the year 1934 was 109,704.08 (50,691.30 males, 29,568.31 females and 29,444.47 children) as compared to 105,328.84 (49,027.06 males, 27,708.94 females and 28,592.84 children) in 1933 and 97,078.18 (45,399.45 males, 25,299.00 females and 26,379.73 children) in 1932. It may be observed that there has been a steady increase in the total number of out-patients treated during the triennium. This may be attributed to the growing popularity of the allopathic medical institutions and recognition of their usefulness by the public.

10. *Statement D.*—Among the various diseases of in-door and out-door patients treated in all classes of medical institutions during 1934, the following diseases accounted for the largest number treated. They are shown below in order of their prevalence :—

Malaria.—The total number of patients treated in 1934 was 1,094,553 with 244 deaths as compared to 1,050,146 with 147 deaths in 1933 and 1,031,363 with 232 deaths in 1932.

Dysentery.—The total number of patients treated in 1934 was 301,777 with 476 deaths as against 307,217 with 495 deaths in 1933 and 304,209 with 410 deaths.

11. *Statement E.*—The total number of operations performed in all classes of medical institutions during 1934 was 571,988 on 565,358 patients—of these 565,358 were principal and 6,630 secondary operations. The corresponding figures for 1933 were 551,063 on 544,504 patients and for 1932 the number was 527,811 on 521,631 patients.

The percentage of deaths to total operations was 0.28 in 1934 as compared to 0.27 in 1933 and 0.26 in 1932. The standard of surgical work in the Presidency is on the

whole satisfactory there being a steady improvement every year. The apparent slight increase in the death-rate in 1934 is explained by the more serious nature of the general average number of operations performed under the revised classification.

12. *Statement F (Financial)—(i) Receipts.*—In the beginning of the year 1934, the cash balance was Rs. 51,212 as compared to Rs. 40,784 in 1933 and Rs. 23,012 in 1932. The total receipts of the year 1934 amounted to Rs. 80,22,534 as compared to Rupees 80,93,321 in 1933 and Rs. 80,92,375 plus £192 in 1932. Of this amount, Government contributed Rs. 52,50,247 in 1934 as compared to Rs. 56,34,789 in 1933 and Rupees 57,84,437 plus £192 in 1932. The contribution from local and municipal funds in 1934 was Rs. 18,50,095 as compared to Rs. 18,21,900 in 1933 and Rs. 15,68,239 in 1932. It will be noted that the Government contribution towards medical relief during the year 1934 works out to about 65.46 per cent of the total receipts.

(ii) *Expenditure.*—The total expenditure during 1934 amounted to Rs. 80,86,217 as against Rs. 80,43,121 in 1933 and Rs. 80,77,283 in 1932. The amount spent on medical officers, nurses, etc., as salaries was Rs. 40,76,855 as against Rs. 39,67,432 in 1933 and Rs. 37,77,701 in 1932. The cost of medicines, apparatus and instruments in 1934 was Rs. 12,08,959 as compared to Rs. 13,02,525 in 1933 and Rs. 11,88,107 in 1932. The diet charges amounted to Rs. 10,45,615 in 1934 as compared to Rs. 10,47,149 in 1933 and Rs. 9,00,462 in 1932. The expenditure on account of buildings including repairs, etc., in 1934 was Rs. 7,10,378 as against Rs. 7,77,836 in 1933 and Rs. 10,85,513 in 1932. The miscellaneous charges in the year 1934 were Rs. 10,44,410 while in 1933 and 1932, the charges were 9,02,240 and 9,35,815, respectively.

13. *Statement G.*—The amount of invested capital at the beginning of the year 1934 was Rs. 10,36,060-0-8. The amount invested during the course of the year was Rs. 28,324-9-8 and a deposit of Rs. 4,588-5-1 was withdrawn during the year, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 10,59,796-4-10 at the end of the year.

14. *Labour cases.*—The total number of labour cases conducted in all classes of medical institutions in 1934 was 84,599 normal with 82 deaths and 13,941 abnormal with 676 deaths as compared to 72,749 normal and 9,275 abnormal in 1933 and 80,172 normal and 12,176 abnormal in 1932. The increase in the number of labour cases shows the tendency on the part of the female population to come to hospitals for maternity relief.

15. *Leprosy.*—The anti-leprosy activities increased greatly during the year 1932, 1933 and 1934 as the result of the working of the Group Leprosy Scheme sanctioned by the Government. The campaign under the direction of the Chief Leprosy Officer developed in various directions chiefly due to the willing co-operation of the medical officers, the public and the financing bodies.

1. *Clinics.*—Leprosy clinics have been opened in all the Government medical institutions. The local boards, appreciating the useful work done to lepers, sanctioned amounts for opening clinics in the medical institutions under their control. The number of clinics that worked in 1932 was 219, in 1933, 322 and in 1934, 408. The 408 leprosy clinics at the end of 1934 are classified as follows :—

2. *Attendance.*—The bi-weekly attendance was above 50 in 48 clinics and above 100 in 12 clinics. The following table shows the annual increase of attendance at the clinics :—

Results of treatment.—Several of the patients who persevere in treatment for a sufficiently long time are considerably benefited by the treatment. The cutaneous cases with a high concentration of the acid fast bacilli respond very well to the Esters cum oil mixture treatment.

The results of treatment obtained in the 12 Mission leper asylums are as follows:—

Training of Medical Officers.—One of the duties of the group leprosy officers was to instruct and demonstrate the up-to-date methods of classification, diagnosis and treatment of leprosy. The number of medical officers trained in 1932 was 125; in 1933, 175 and in 1934, 107. Instructions to the medical officers were also sent through circulars and pamphlets issued by the Chief Leprosy Officer.

Propaganda.—The group leprosy officers continue to carry on propaganda work in the villages with a view to popularize clinics. They have also commenced the work of village-wise registration and are following up in the villages those patients who are indifferent to treatment.

Another activity in which the group leprosy officers are engaged is the examination of students for signs of leprosy. The following is the result of their examination:—

District Leprosy Relief Councils.—A striking feature in the leprosy campaign conducted is the formation of the District Leprosy organizations in accordance with the resolutions of the Calcutta and Madras Leprosy Workers' Conference held in 1933 with a view to maintaining sustained anti-leprosy activities in each district. Sixteen leprosy councils have been formed in the districts. These Councils maintain a fund consisting of contributions from local boards, donations, subscriptions, **Leprosy Day** collections, proceeds from benefit performances, etc., for leprosy work in the district.

The success of the leprosy campaign in the Salem district is due to the activities of the bands of social workers organized by Mrs. Todd. The success in the district was so marked that it was considered whether the experience gathered therein could not be utilized in other districts as well. The Government on the recommendation of the Surgeon-General therefore sanctioned in July 1933 for a period of six months in the first instance a scheme of anti-leprosy campaign in the districts of Chingleput and South Arcot where the incidence of leprosy is high. The campaign was organized and social work commenced by Mrs. Todd with the assistance of Mr. Curtis, Assistant Director of Survey, as her secretary. Leprosy work needs persistent supervision and sustained zeal for development and continuance. As a result of the campaign conducted by the social workers 27 clinics were opened in South Arcot district. A **Leprosy Day** was held on 27th September 1933 and a sum of Rs. 11,536-13-5 was collected. The results produced by Mrs. Todd and her secretary Mr. Curtis in the South Arcot district were very creditable and highly encouraging and indicative of hard work and able organization. As similar results were expected in Chingleput district the continuance of the scheme by the social workers was extended up to 31st March 1934. The expectation has been justified.

As a result of the campaign in Chingleput district, local committees were formed in about ten places and the existing local committees were reorganized and revived. The duties of these committees are propaganda, visiting leprosy clinics and patients and helping the local clinics by collection of funds. Many members of the local committees made their clinics in the district ideal ones. This is largely due to the influence of the social workers. There has also been an increase of 30 per cent in the number of clinics as well as in the number of patients treated. The popularity and efficiency of the clinics has gradually increased. In view of the wide prevalence of leprosy in the Presidency and the need for isolating and providing proper treatment for those early infectious cases which demand hospital care, it was considered essential to increase the in-patient hospital accommodation. The admission of 100 more children into the Lady Willingdon Leper Settlement, Chingleput, was therefore approved.

The continuance of the scheme of social workers was further extended up to 1st April 1935, the work being confined to the Salem district, as it was decided that the work already done in that district should be consolidated before the scheme in Chingleput district and South Arcot district could be dealt with similarly or extended to other districts.

As a part of the scheme of the district leprosy relief work in Salem district, the council has resolved to establish a home for untainted children in the district. Such a home should go a great way towards safeguarding the children of poor leprosy parents from infection. The British Empire Leprosy Relief Association, Indian Council, New Delhi, on the recommendation of the Madras Provincial Committee for leprosy relief have resolved that the grant of Rs. 1,000 provided to the District Leprosy Relief Council, Salem, for 1934 be paid to that Council and that in addition a further grant of Rs. 2,000 per year for three years be made for expenditure on the proposed Children's home in Salem district. The work of the District Leprosy Council, Salem, shows that great pains have been taken by the social workers in stimulating public interests in the campaign to eradicate leprosy.

Mrs. H. C. Buck in Saidapet has also been doing very useful work in completing a survey of the whole of Saidapet at which place 456 cases were detected in a population of 33,000. Mrs. A. Kuriyan also took a keen interest in the leprosy work in Madras City. She obtained funds by holding a Leper Day and was instrumental in opening two private clinics.

Some clinics have social committees for attending to the needs of the clinics. In some clinics the medical officers have been very enthusiastic in affording relief to the lepers and have induced the public to arrange for the construction of clinic sheds and for the feeding of the indigent lepers on treatment days.

16. Venereal diseases.—The venereal department of the Government General Hospital is the largest clinic of its kind in South India. Though it is at present housed in very unsatisfactory premises it will be seen from the comparative statement shown below that the department continues to maintain the popularity:—

The majority of the patients are examined and treated as out-patients. There is separate accommodation for in- and out-patients for the sexes. The number of male patients is four to five times that of the females. A striking feature of the female out-patients is the large number of respectable married women attending for treatment. The hours of work are from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., daily except on Sundays when they are from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m.

Nineteen medical men and women were trained in the department during the three years 1932-34. Medical under-graduates attend twice a week and are given clinical instruction. Candidates for Public Health Examination are given course of lectures on venereal diseases from a public health point of view.

Propaganda by distribution of leaflets to the patients attending the department, also forms part of the daily routine.

Twenty-seven merchant seamen were given ambulatory treatment in the clinic. One hundred and eight dark ground examinations were carried out on British Soldiers sent from the Fort British Military Hospital.

During the three years 24,550 injections of Arsenic, 21,843 of Bismuth and 28,836 other injections were given to the patients. Considering the number of cases of syphilis, the average number of injections which each patient receives falls far short of the standard prevailing in European clinics, but it is hoped that with more enlightenment on the part of the public, conditions will improve. The new venereal block is under construction and is likely to be ready for occupation towards the end of this year.

Patients suffering from venereal diseases are also treated in all hospitals and dispensaries.

From all the evidence available it appears that the incidence of venereal disease in rural parts of this Province is very heavy and an attempt is being made to ascertain its actual gravity. Among the poorer classes it is probably over 50 per cent and in some

places more. The treatment of the disease is not on a very satisfactory basis, partly because many patients will not attend owing to ignorance and shame and partly because proper clinics are not sufficiently widespread. The cost of treatment of syphilitic cases alone by Arsenic, etc., is very considerable and amounted to Rs. 5,457 at the Madras Government General Hospital only, the estimated cost per patient per annum being about Rs. 19 but it works out at about Rs. 2-6-0 as few patients attend more than two or three times instead of 18 months. The average annual cost of treating a venereal patient comes to Rs. 1-9-4 if the calculated cost per head per annum for all venereal cases is considered together.

17. *Tuberculosis.*—The total number of patients suffering from tuberculosis of the lung as well as from other tuberculous diseases treated during the year 1934 was 66,478 with 1,048 deaths as compared to 59,899 with 1,008 deaths in 1933 and 59,106 with 917 deaths in 1932.

The total number of patients treated in the Government Tuberculosis Institute, Madras, during the year 1934 was 9,226 which exceeds the number of patients treated during the year 1933 by 835. The daily average attendance in 1934 was 158.02 which is 16.16 more than the daily average number in 1933. The total number of patients treated in the Government Tuberculosis Hospital, Madras, during the year 1934 was 701 with a daily average number of 80.32 as compared to 817 with a daily average number of 88.72 in 1933 and 826 with a daily average of 88.60 in 1932. The total number of deaths during the year 1934 was 13. The fall in the total number of patients treated in the Tuberculosis Hospital, Madras, during the year 1934 as compared to the previous years is partly due to the longer stay of the patients in the hospital. It is observed that the prevalence of tuberculosis is most between the ages of 15 to 24 years and 25 to 34 years, i.e., during the active period of life. Of the 704 cases treated in the Tuberculosis Hospital, Madras, 532 were cases of pulmonary tuberculosis while the remaining were either non-tuberculosis affections of the respiratory tract or extrapulmonary tuberculosis cases.

The treatment of tuberculosis is still in its infancy in this Presidency as regards the provision of beds in special hospitals or sanatorium dispensaries and clinics. A sanatorium on the lines of that at Madanapalle is needed in various groups of districts within easy distance of the largest towns; one is badly needed outside Madras. A sanatorium is proposed at Perundurai some 48 miles from Coimbatore and local efforts are well advanced in this direction.

18. *Anti-rabic treatment.*—The cost of anti-rabic vaccine was reduced from Rs. 10 to Rs. 6 per course including postage and packing from 1st April 1933. The issue of free railway tickets to indigent patients to proceed to anti-rabic treatment centres by railway companies was discontinued and local bodies asked to meet the cost of railway fares in addition to maintenance charges and actual cost of transit journeys by road or river of indigent patients and their attendants.

19. *X-ray and other examinations.*—The following is the statement showing the statistics of work performed in the Barnard Institute of Radiology, Madras, and in the X-ray departments in the other hospitals in the Presidency during the years 1932, 1933 and 1934 :—

20. *Buildings.*—Owing to financial stringency no new major works were undertaken during the triennium, from provincial funds. The remodelling scheme of the General Hospital, Madras, which was postponed as a measure of retrenchment was ordered to be

proceeded with. The new out-patient surgical and X-ray blocks in the General Hospital, Madras, have been completed and opened. The New Pathology Block in the Medical College, Madras, is nearing completion. These buildings are worthy of the City of Madras and will add undoubtedly to the opportunities for up-to-date study and research. The new X-ray building which has been named The Barnard Institute of Radiology is one of the finest of its kind in the world and it will be necessary to ensure that its staff is raised and maintained to a corresponding level. The new Ophthalmic Block in the King George Hospital, Vizagapatam, was completed and occupied during the triennium. The construction of His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales Hospital for children as an adjunct of the Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital, Madras, was begun and the foundation stone was laid on 20th August 1934. The construction of out-patient and Ophthalmic Blocks in the new Headquarters Hospital, Madura, is nearing completion. The minor works required for all Government hospitals in the Presidency have been attended to as usual. The hospital building programme has fallen behind seriously during the last 10 years and a determined effort is necessary to cope with the present position. Eight hospitals in District Headquarters stations require remodelling and 58 major and 55 minor works in medical institutions have been kept back by financial difficulties. In several localities the Government medical institutions are behind missionary hospitals as regards their buildings, quarters and equipment. Local fund buildings are also in some instances in a neglected condition.

21. The Dental department of the Government General Hospital, Madras, which was temporarily transferred to Rayapuram Hospital was retransferred to the Government General Hospital on the opening of a new out-patient department. The Police Hospital at Vizianagram was re-opened temporarily in 1933.

22. The X-ray department in the Headquarters Hospital, Berhampur, was opened in 1933.

23. The separate Police hospitals at Rajahmundry and Salem were amalgamated with the Government hospitals at those places. In accordance with the policy of Government that all medical institutions intended for the treatment of women and children at the headquarters of taluks should be considered to form part of the main Taluk Headquarters hospitals, the Women and Children Dispensary at Karur was amalgamated with the main Government Hospital there. The Municipal Women and Children Dispensary at Dharapuram was taken over by Government and was amalgamated with the Government Hospital, Dharapuram.

24. As a measure of retrenchment a number of posts of clerks, compounders, jama-dars, nursing orderlies, peons, etc., were abolished and given effect to just before and at the beginning of the triennium.

Under the proposals approved by Government for the retrenchment of the Medical establishments in the Vizagapatam Agency (1) the Medical Headquarters of the Vizagapatam Agency was transferred from Vizianagram to Koraput and the District Medical Officer, Vizagapatam, was entrusted with the inspection and control of the medical institutions in the Narsapatam, Parvatipur and Gunupur agencies. (2) The post of Civil Surgeon for the Vizagapatam Agency was abolished and the existing post of Civil Assistant Surgeon at Koraput filled by a senior Assistant Surgeon styled as the Vizagapatam Agency Surgeon to be in charge of Koraput Hospital and the Superintendent of the Sub-Jail there.

25. *Medical education.*—Considerable improvement was effected in the matter of Medical education in this Presidency during the triennium. The recommendation of the Medical Education Committee appointed by the Government that Medical education should be centralized in Madras and Vizagapatam has been given effect to by closing the Medical School at Tanjore from 1st May 1933. Admissions to the Medical School, Tanjore, were stopped in July 1932, the students from the school being transferred to the Stanley Medical School, Madras. The L.M.P. course has been extended to five years to enable the students to have sufficient scientific knowledge and clinical experience before they pass out of the schools, and to anticipate their hopes for inclusion in a common medical register. The curriculum of studies has also been revised. The percentage of pass marks for the 5-year course students in all Board Examinations prior to the final qualifying examination has been revised in conformity with the standard of the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom. It is noteworthy that it has been possible to admit a class of students possessing better preliminary educational qualifications. With the introduction of the five years course for the L.M.P., the school laboratories have been brought up to the requisite standard. Orders have already been passed sanctioning the installation of a physics laboratory for the Lady Willingdon Medical School for Women, Madras, to avoid the students having to go to the Queen Mary's College, Madras, for their course in Physics.

It was considered that it would be desirable to maintain a record of the after career of the outgoing students of the colleges and schools and arrangements have been made for opening a special register with a continuous record of old students.

Recognition of the M.B.B.S. Degree of the Madras University by the General Medical Council which was in common with that of all Indian Medical Degrees with-drawn is not restored yet.

The year 1934 was marked by an epochmaking event in the history of Indian Medical Education. The primary Fellowship Examination of the Royal College of Surgeons of England was held at Madras in December 1934 for the first time in India. It is a matter of gratification that many of the Madras students came out successful in their first attempt. Out of 60 candidates appearing for the examination, 21 were successful—of whom 13 belong to Madras. Sixty-five per cent of the candidates who have passed belongs to Madras.

It was, however, anomalous that the Andhra University graduates were not permitted to appear for the Primary Fellowship and the University authorities have addressed the Royal College in the matter. The Surgeon-General also wrote to the Director of Examinations, Royal College of Surgeons explaining the position and pressing the question of recognition.

Medical education in both the Colleges at Madras and Vizagapatam continues to be efficient, but the Medical College at Vizagapatam suffers from serious disabilities as regards staff, buildings, and hospital arrangements. In Madras the laboratories and the Research departments have been removed to the new buildings, and are being brought up-to-date. Many improvements for the Medical College, Vizagapatam, and the King George Hospital attached to it are now under contemplation and it is hoped that very soon it may be possible to raise them to the status of recognized institutions closely on the level with the sister institutions at Madras, as required by the Indian Medical Council.

26. *Indian Medical Service Officers.*—During the year nine Indian Medical Service Officers from the Military, Civil and Jail departments were posted to the Madras Civil Medical department. One Indian Medical Service Officer was transferred to Calcutta. One Indian Medical Service Officer died during the year. The number of Indian Medical Service Officers on duty in the Presidency was 26 at the end of 1932, 29 at the end of 1933, and 30 at the end of 1934.

Madras Medical Service.—The Government converted one of the posts of Civil Assistant Surgeons in the Barnard Institute of Radiology into Civil Surgeon's grade and the post has been designated as Medical Superintendent and Lecturer in Radiology. Owing to the abolition of appointments due to retrenchments, 21 Civil Assistant Surgeons were reverted as temporary Civil Assistant Surgeons and a few Civil Assistant Surgeons were discharged from service. The number of permanent Civil Assistant Surgeons in the department at the end of 1934 was 179 as against 214 at the end of 1933 and 209 at the end of 1932.

Sub-Assistant Surgeons.—During the triennium the Government have ordered that the recruitment of sub-assistant surgeons should be stopped and the vacancies occurring in the cadre should be thrown open to local bodies for employment of local fund sub-assistant surgeons in non-Taluk Headquarters Institutions in the Presidency. The Government sub-assistant surgeons attached to non-taluk Headquarters Institutions have been withdrawn during 1934 in about 18 medical institutions and the question of withdrawing Government sub-assistant surgeons in other institutions is under consideration of Government and the local bodies concerned.

Women Sub-Assistant Surgeons.—The Madras Services Commission have recruited eight candidates for appointments of women sub-assistant surgeons during the triennium.

Honorary Medical Officers.—The Government sanctioned the formation of a committee for formulating proposals for the further employment of Honorary Medical Officers in Government medical institutions and suggesting modifications in the regulations therefor during the triennium. The committee have submitted a report to Government which is under their consideration. The number of Honorary Medical Officers working at the end of 1934 was—

Honorary Surgeons and Physicians	18

The experiment has been a partial success. Honorary Medical Officers cannot perform the routine official work of a hospital and are only on duty for two or three hours out of the 24, so that they can only replace Government Medical Officers in a very partial sense.

27. *Nurses.*—The nursing service during the triennium continued to be popular. A large number of qualified candidates are seeking admission for nurses training and each of the training centres has a long list of waiting candidates for admission.

Every effort is being made to raise the status of Indian nurses and to make them proud of their profession. An important step in this direction would be the raising of a few senior members of the service to gazetted rank. It was only in this way that the nursing service of the army was placed on a satisfactory footing—all sisters in the Army Nursing Service count as officers.

28. *Advisory Committees.*—Advisory Committees for hospitals in Madras City and for Government district hospitals and hospitals at divisional centres and visiting committees of ladies for Government women and children medical institutions in the mufassal were constituted with the object of improving the administration of the hospitals through the medium of such committees consisting of officials and non-officials. The main business of these committees is to keep the Surgeon-General and the Government informed of the needs of the hospitals as viewed by the public. From the reports on the working of the Advisory Committees it will be observed that meetings with very few exceptions in some quarters are not regularly held every quarter and it is with greatest difficulty that the quorum required for the meeting is obtained. Many non-official members do not evince much interest in the work. This is deplorable as much good would result from constructive proposals which non-official visits could put forward for the consideration of the authorities though it may not be possible to effect the reforms immediately. It is hoped that some improvements will be effected in the working of these Advisory Committees. It must be admitted however that these Advisory Committees have received little encouragement from Government to their oft repeated recommendations and their requests have proved unheeded because of the recent financial stress. It is hoped that they will receive more encouragement in the near future, in this respect, when the purse strings are loosened.

29. *Medical Lending Libraries.*—District Medical Lending Libraries had 1,019 members at the beginning of the year 1934 and 1,040 at the close. The number of books available for circulation at the end of the year was 8,940 as against 9,323 in 1933 and 9,248 in 1932. The total receipts in the year 1934, amounted to Rs. 16,620-4-6 and the total expenditure during the year amounted to Rs. 5,339-2-7.

30. *Inspection work.*—Inspection of medical institutions in each district was carried out regularly and satisfactorily by the respective District Medical Officers and Civil Surgeons and the annual verification of service books of establishment and stock registers was also carried out during the year. The Surgeon-General inspected the King Institute, Guindy, Government Rayapuram Hospital, Government Royapetta Hospital, Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital and Government Tuberculosis Hospital, Stanley Medical School and Lady Willingdon Medical School in the Madras City and 24 District Headquarters Hospitals and Civil Surgeoncies and 69 hospitals and dispensaries in the mufassal during the year 1934.

31. *General.*—In accordance with the policy decided upon by Government for relieving local bodies of considerable financial liabilities and improving the facilities for medical relief in the mufassal, 119 medical institutions under the control of local bodies were taken over by Government in 1928-30 for development as medical and surgical centres. The question of taking over more institutions from the local bodies was considered and the Government came to the conclusion that in the present state of provincial finances no further commitment could be undertaken in respect of medical institutions under the control of local bodies. Hence no local fund or municipal medical institutions was taken over during the triennium under review. The Government are however considering the question whether uniformity of principle cannot be achieved in the matter of medical relief without extra cost to the Government by a readjustment of responsibility between the Government and the local bodies.

During the last year of the previous triennium and the present triennium expansion of the department has not only been restricted but curtailed in certain respects on account of the retrenchment due to financial stringency. The proposal of the Surgeon-General and the Director of Public Health to constitute a Public Health Committee in place of the Board of Health for a better co-ordination of Public Health work in the Presidency has been approved by the Government. The Government have also approved the Surgeon-General's proposal to hold Annual Medical Conferences in the District Headquarters at the beginning of every year consisting of Presidents of District Boards, Chairmen of Municipal Councils and District Medical Officers to discuss and to solve intricate medical problems connected with the working of medical institutions under the control of local boards. The Surgeon-General's proposal to constitute a Central Research Board for the Province for the purpose of advising in the matter of research on diseases which are met with chiefly in mufassal practice was approved by Government.

The King Institute has gradually included in its scope an enormous amount of routine work for the hospitals of the whole Presidency. This is a very useful function, but it must be remembered that it interferes seriously with research work, the primary function of the Institute. So far the recommendation of the Surgeon-General that this work be decentralized by opening at least two or three smaller laboratories at selected centres for routine and research work in Medical and Public Health have not been accepted by Government.

Civil hospitals and dispensaries—Triennial report—1932-34—Reviewed.

Order—No. 2956, P.H., dated 13th November 1935.

Recorded.

2. The provision of greater facilities for medical relief in the Presidency received a severe set-back during the triennium under review as a result of financial stringency. Almost all big schemes of expenditure were postponed except the remodelling of the General Hospital and the construction and equipment of the Government Institute of Radiology. This institute which has since been re-named as the Barnard Institute of Radiology and which is considered to be the best in the East is provided with the latest types of machinery and is designed to afford the most up-to-date forms of X-ray examination, and X-ray and radium treatment.

3. *Medical relief.*—(a) The total number of medical institutions of all classes working in the Presidency at the beginning of the triennium, i.e., on 1st January 1932, was 1,337 while at the close of the triennium it was 1,356. The total number of patients treated (both in-patients and out-patients) was 16,237,997 during 1934 as against 14,209,576 during 1931.

(b) *Rural medical relief.*—The number of subsidized rural dispensaries fell from 506 at the end of 1931 to 435 at the end of 1934.

(c) *Visited dispensary system.*—An examination of the working of this system in this Presidency shows that the only districts in which the programme laid down by the Government was carried out are Anantapur, South Arcot, Guntur, Malabar, Nilgiris, Tinnevely and Vizagapatam Agency. In other districts this system of medical relief has not been successful in spite of the attempts made to work it.

(d) *Provincialization of medical institutions.*—With a view to relieve local bodies of their financial liabilities and with a view to improve the facilities for medical relief in the mufassal, 119 medical institutions under the control of local bodies were taken over by Government in 1928-30 for development as medical and surgical centres. No further institutions were taken over during the triennium under review on account of lack of funds.

4. *Buildings.*—Though the hospital building programme has fallen behind seriously owing to financial stringency some progress was still being maintained. The works connected with the General Hospital Remodelling Scheme were in progress, the new out-patient, Surgical and X-ray blocks having been completed and already opened. The new Pathology block in the Madras Medical College is nearing completion. The construction of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales' Hospital for Children as an adjunct of the Victoria Caste and Gosha Hospital, Madras, at an estimated cost of Rs. 2,31,950 was begun and the foundation stone was laid on 20th August 1934. The work is in progress. The construction of the Headquarters Hospital, Madura, which was held in abeyance was started and the out-patient and Ophthalmic blocks are nearing completion. The new Ophthalmic block in the King George Hospital, Vizagapatam, was completed and occupied during the triennium.

5. *Hospital administration.*—(i) *Advisory Committees.*—The Advisory Committees constituted for Government hospitals in Madras City, district headquarters hospitals and those at divisional centres and the visiting committees of ladies for women and children institutions in the mufassal were functioning during the triennium under review. These committees serve to bring the needs of the institutions to the notice of the Surgeon-General and the Government. Many of the recommendations made by the committees in the past could not be given effect to for want of funds. It is hoped that the members will however continue to evince greater interest in the administration of the institutions.

(ii) *Honorary Medical Officers.*—The system of appointing honorary medical officers in Government hospitals was continued during the triennium. At the end of 1934 there were 171 honorary medical officers in Government institutions. The scheme is reported to have been a partial success. Definite rules for working the scheme were issued in 1932. The Government have since passed orders on the recommendations of the committee appointed to consider the further expansion of the scheme.

(iii) *Women Medical Officers*.—There were 167 women medical officers in the State, local fund, and municipal medical institutions during the year 1934.

6. *Diseases*—(i) *Venereal disease*.—There were 60 clinics at which treatment was available. The venereal department of the Government General Hospital is the largest clinic of its kind in South India. The department continued to be popular. The new venereal block is reported to be under construction and likely to be ready for occupation by the beginning of 1936.

(ii) *Leprosy*.—The group leprosy scheme sanctioned by the Government was very useful in carrying out intense anti-leprosy campaigns. The group leprosy officers continued to carry on propaganda work in addition to the instructions they were imparting to medical officers on the latest methods of classification, diagnosis and treatment of leprosy.

Sixteen District Leprosy Councils were formed in the districts in accordance with the resolutions of the Calcutta and Madras Leprosy Worker's Conference held in 1933. It is a matter for gratification that the council at Salem has done much to stimulate public interest in the campaign to eradicate leprosy and the Government trust that the other district councils will emulate the good example set by Salem. Special reference may be made to the work in South Arcot and Chingleput where leprosy campaign was started by Mrs. Todd supported by her secretary Mr. Curtis.

There was a gradual increase in the number of clinics opened and a corresponding increase in the number of patients treated in the clinics. At the end of 1934 there were 408 clinics, out of which 199 were of the local boards.

(iii) *Anti-rabic treatment*.—The railway authorities withdrew their concession shown to indigent patients proceeding for anti-rabic treatment centres and the local bodies were therefore asked to meet the railway fare in addition to maintenance charges and actual cost of transit journeys by road or river of indigent patients and their assistants.

7. *Medical Services*—(i) *Indian Medical Service*.—One I.M.S. Officer in the Presidency died during 1934. The number of I.M.S. officers on duty in the Presidency was 26 at the end of 1932, 29 at the end of 1933 and 30 at the end of 1934.

(ii) *Nursing services*.—The Register of Nurses and Midwives for 1934 has on its rolls 934 nurses, 1,841 midwives and 7 dhais as against 618, 1,353 and 6, respectively, at the end of 1931. The nursing service during the triennium continued to be popular.

General.—Progress could not be maintained steadily on account of the general financial depression; but in spite of adverse conditions, special care was taken to see that the general level of efficiency in the medical administration of the Presidency was satisfactorily maintained.
