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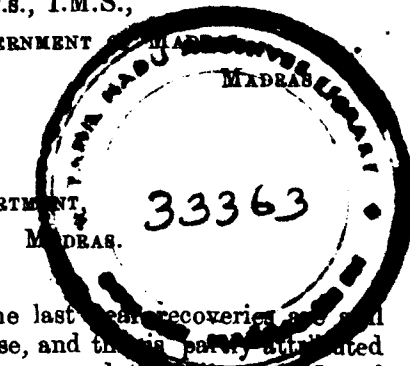

Sir,

I have the honour to forward the Annual Report on the working of the Mental Hospitals in this Presidency for the year ending 31st December 1933.

2. *Population.*—The total population of the three mental hospitals during the year under report was 2,261 1,738 (males and 523 females) as against 2,147 in the previous year. The number of patients at the beginning of the year was 1,597—the figure for the previous year being 1,516. The number of patients admitted and re-admitted during the year was 664 against 631 in the previous year. Of the total treated, 225 were “cured,” 127 “improved,” 61 “discharged otherwise,” 116 “died,” and 1,674 remained at the end of the year. The daily average strength of inmates in the three mental hospitals was 1,665·01, as compared with 1,559·80 in the previous year, and the daily average sick was 293·88 as against 242·81 in 1932.

Of the total number of patients admitted during the year, 21 were Europeans and Anglo-Indians, 77 Indian Christians, 440 Hindus, 111 Muhammadans, and 6 other castes. The total population is classified as follows:—

There were three escapes one from each of the Mental Hospitals, Madras, Waltair, and Calicut during the year, and the patient from Madras is still at large, and that of Waltair and Calicut were brought back the next day of their escape. The escaped patient of the Calicut Hospital was since discharged cured on 17th June 1933.

3. *Treatment and its Results.*—Rest, fresh air, liberal dieting as far as possible, sedatives, tonics, and hydrotherapy were the chief means of treatment that were followed. Radical cures were effected in certain cases of physical causes such as syphilis, acute illness, etc. The percentage of the cured on the daily average strength was 13·51 as against 13·66, and that on admissions was 20·20 as against 18·78 for 1932. As was

reported in the last year, recovery was still on the decrease, and this is partly attributed to lack of accommodation in the Mental Hospital at Madras on account of the large increase in the population and consequent overcrowding of patients, which resulted in the discharge of many of the cases “improved” without waiting for complete recovery.

A number of patients in the Mental Hospital, Madras, were sent out (by themselves on parole) for short periods to their relatives or friends. This system has justified itself, in that the patients have proved worthy of the confidence placed in them, and have invariably returned to the hospital without any trouble. Patients were also sent out on trials during their period of convalescence to their homes to the care of their relatives before discharging them finally. This system of parole or trial is reported to have helped in most cases to bring about a marked improvement, and sometimes even complete recovery in their mental condition.

4. *Age and Previous Occupation of the Inmates.*—Of the patients admitted and re-admitted during the year, 50 were under 20 years of age, 455 between 20 to 40 years, 142 between 40 to 60 years, and 8 upwards of 60 years. As usual, the incidence of insanity was heavy between the years 20 to 40, i.e., during the active period of life. Among the patients admitted during the year, the number of persons of no occupation previously was the largest, i.e., 159; then came general labourers, cultivating tenants, labourers, and workmen otherwise unspecified numbering 54, 50, and 45 respectively.

5. *Types of Insanity.*—The principal types of insanity in their order of frequency were, dementia praecox, mania associated with other forms, secondary or terminal dementia, and insanity due to cannabis indica, imbecility, circular insanity and epilepsy.

6. *Causes of Insanity.*—Amongst the predisposing causes, the admissions during the year were from mental stress, mental instability revealed by previous attacks, diseases due to disorders of nutrition or metabolism,

privation and starvation, heredity, cannabis indica, and epilepsy.

7. *Criminal Insanes*.—At the beginning of the year, there were 206 criminal insanes in the Madras Mental Hospital, Madras. Sixty were committed during the year, thus the total number was 266 (242 males and 24 females). Of these, 30 were discharged, transferred, etc., 11 died, and 219 remained at the end of the year.

8. *Deaths*.—The total number of deaths during the year was 116 (80 males and 36 females) as against 103 during 1932. The percentage of total deaths to daily average strength was 6.99, against 6.60 in the previous year.

The largest number of patients accommodated in the Madras Mental Hospital, was 1,248, and this exceeds the normal accommodation by 504. The Superintendent of this hospital reports that on account of increase of patients and want of accommodation, the health and welfare of the patients are affected. He also reports, that there is a tendency to a gradual increase in the incidence of tuberculosis, and that for a large institution of the size and character of the Mental Hospital, Madras, there are no facilities even for the proper segregation of infectious diseases in times of need. The Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Calicut, also insists upon providing additional accommodation in his hospital, as the strength of the hospital is always on the increase side.

10. *Buildings*.—(a) *Madras*.—The entire scheme of improvements to the Mental Hospital, Madras, involves an expenditure of about Rs. 20 lakhs, and cannot be contemplated therefore in the near future. In 1931, a scheme for temporary buildings costing Rs. 71,000 to lessen the overcrowding was put up to Government, but that also was deferred owing to lack of funds. Again in 1932, the question of constructing some of the new wards at a cost of Rs. 2,17,200 for the additional accommodation of patients as part of the main scheme was put forward to Government. As an alternative to building additional accommodation in the Madras Mental Hospital, the Government wanted to consider the question of utilizing the Guntūr and Tanjore Medical School buildings, so that some of the patients from the Madras Mental Hospital may be transferred to the proposed

new institutions as a means of relieving the pressure. This proposal was examined in consultation with the Consulting Architect to Government, and a report has already been submitted to Government.

(b) *Waltair*.—The main scheme of improvements to the Government Mental Hospital, Waltair, costs approximately Rs. 2,12,000, and it is so little likely of realization for some years. The urgent need in this institution is a convalescent ward for female patients, and the Public Works Department have been addressed for the preparation of plans and estimate for the construction of a block to accommodate 18 patients. This scheme is reported to cost approximately Rs. 8,000.

(c) *Calicut*.—The bath shed for females, which was under construction in 1932 was completed during the year. The construction of six single rooms in the male hospital section for which an expenditure of Rs. 8,000 was approved by Government in G.O. No. 2339, Ms. W., dated the 14th September 1931, is nearing completion. The main scheme of improvements costing approximately Rs. 3,27,000, will have to be taken up as soon as the finances permit.

11. *General Hygiene of the Insanes*.—The personal cleanliness of the patients is being carefully attended to and supervised, and special attention paid to the feeding, bathing, clothing, and also to the prevention and early treatment of pyorrhoea and skin diseases.

12. *Drainage and Conservancy*.—This is satisfactory in the Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut. The drainage system obtaining in the Mental Hospital at Madras is very primitive and unsatisfactory. The scheme which has been merged into the remodelling scheme of the hospital has been deferred for financial reasons.

13. *Water-supply*.—(a) *Madras*.—The water-supply is from the Red Hills and is adequate.

(b) *Waltair*.—Chief source is from the municipal mains. It is adequate for domestic purposes, but not for gardening, etc. The Superintendent suggests, that a small oil engine with a force pump may be installed, so that a large supply of well water may be got and all the available land may be brought under cultivation, which will not only provide work for a large number of patients, but also increase in the long run the sources of revenue. This should form the subject of a separate communication.

(c) *Calicut*.—The water required for all purposes is obtained by the manual labour of patients and attendants, from the deep wells situated here and there in the compound. This system of obtaining water from deep wells by the hard labour of patients and attendants, is found to be quite unsatisfactory.

The scheme for adequate water-supply is under the consideration of Government—vide Government Memo. No. 43452-1 D. 1, P.H., dated 27th November 1933.

14. *Industries and Employment*.—(a) *Madras*.—Forty-nine per cent of the patients were engaged in various occupations during the year, of whom 19 per cent worked in manufacturing department, i.e., oil mills, mat-making, weaving and knitting, and the remaining on unskilled labour.

(b) *Waltair*.—As the bulk of the patients is mainly rural, agriculture, cattle tending, weaving and gardening, are the principal occupations for the males. Female patients are generally put to work they are accustomed to do at home, and some do spinning at charkas.

(c) *Calicut*.—The items of remunerative labour were, weaving, vegetable cultivation, tailoring, coir-making and embroidery by female patients. Some selected patients were also employed on unskilled labour.

15. *Amusements*.—(a) *Madras*.—The usual annual sports for the patients in general were held. Football, badminton, tennis, and baseball attracted a good number of patients whilst those not interested in active sports had in-door games like table tennis, billiards, cards, chess, etc., or were taken out for walks. As in previous years, some of the patients of the hospital competed in the annual Park Fair sports held during the Christmas holidays. The prizes won by them amounted to Rs. 75. The privilege of allowing certain number of patients to attend the Wellington Cinema in the evenings, had been continued through the kind courtesy of the proprietor of that Cinema. The Committee of Lady Visitors to the hospital continued to carry on their good work among the female patients. The Red Cross Society made a very generous donation of Rs. 500 towards the annual treat to the patients of this hospital. The editors of newspapers and journals continued their free supply of newspapers and journals for the patients of the hospital. The Guild of Service also sent books and periodicals every month from their book dump.

(b) *Waltair*.—Some patients took part in games like football, badminton, cards, and chess. Some of the patients who can sing are made to do so occasionally for the entertainment of others. They are also amused occasionally with feats of professional jugglers and acrobats, and they are regularly sent on excursion trips. The motor bus was more freely used for taking the patients frequently outside to fairs and festivals in places round about, and to sea-baths. The patients were also entertained to a sumptuous feast by Sir Raja Sahab V. Narayana Gajapati Raja Bahadur Garu, Zamindar of Chemudu, on 31st December 1933. Miss G. M. Lazarus of

Canadian Baptist Mission has been kind enough to attend and give lessons on scripture once a week to the Christian patients. The editors of the newspapers continued their free supply of papers for the use of the patients. The nucleus for hospital library, formed with Telugu books presented, was freely utilized.

(c) *Calicut*.—Annual sports and new year celebrations were conducted and prizes distributed to the winners. As usual, the patients were provided with various kinds of amusements, and they also took part in games like football, badminton, kolattam, and other in-door games, ping-pong, cards play, etc. A certain number of patients attended the cinema at the Radha Picture Palace on every Saturday through the courtesy of the proprietor of the Cinema. The editors of journals and newspapers continued their free supply of their issues.

16. *Epidemics*.—The Mental Hospitals, Waltair and Calicut, were free from any epidemic disease during the year. As regards Madras, there was a small outbreak of cholera in the month of November, and prompt measures were taken to prevent the spread of the epidemic—the number of deaths being 5. Influenza and chicken pox were also prevalent, but there were no deaths from these epidemics.

17. *Finance*.—The total receipts including those from paying patients amounted to Rs. 5,08,292-2-10, as against rupees 4,80,961-14-4 in the previous year. The total expenditure amounted to rupees 5,06,291-9-8, against Rs. 4,80,961-14-4 in the previous year. The increase in the expenditure under establishment proper is due to the restoration of the 10 per cent emergency cut with effect from 1st April 1933, the increments earned by the various members of the staff of the mental hospitals, and the appointment of temporary staff of attendants and totis, and to the grant of personal compensatory allowance of Rs. 5 each to the two compounders employed in the Madras Mental Hospital, while the increase under expenditure is due to the restoration of the 10 per cent emergency cut, and to the promotion of Dr. Hensman to the Selection Grade of Civil Surgeons in the Madras Medical Service from 1st January 1931 as per G.O. No. 1432, P.H., dated 27th June 1933. The increase in the expenditure under other heads is due to increase in the population. The apparent increase under the head "Rates and Taxes" is due to the payment in 1933 to the Corporation of Madras of the arrears of water charges for October, November, and December 1932, after the question of refund of excess water charges for the residential quarters due from the Corporation was decided. The cost per

18. *General Administration.*—Dr. H. S. Hensman, L.M.S., L.R.C.P., M.B.C.S., M.F.O., was in charge of the Mental Hospital, Madras, for the whole year. The superintendship of Mental Hospital, Waltair, was held by M.R.Ry. Rao Sahib T. Madhava Rao Avargal, B.A., L.R.C.P. & S., from 1st January 1933 to 25th October 1933, and by M.R.Ry. P. Sanjiva Pai Avargal, M.B., C.M., from 26th October 1933 to 22nd December 1933, and by M.R.Ry. N. Venkataswami Chetti Garu, M.B., C.M., from 23rd December 1933 to 31st December 1933. Major A. I. Cox, I.M.S., was the Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Calicut, throughout the year.

19. *Visitors.*—All the official and non-official visitors attended the monthly meetings of hospitals by turn. The Inspector-General of Prisons visited all the mental hospitals, and the Surgeon-General, Madras and Calicut.

20. *Verification of Service Books and Stock Registers.*—The annual verification of the service books of the establishment and stock registers was duly carried out in all the three mental hospitals during the year.

21. *General Remarks.*—In spite of the redistribution of patients ordered in G.O. No. 488, P.H., dated 3rd March 1932, the

population of the Mental Hospital, Madras, is on the increase every year. There is still a tendency for the population to increase further, and the Superintendent states that the necessity for locking of a larger number of patients than there is accommodation for in the general cottages and single rooms still continues. This overcrowding is a serious menace to the health and welfare of the patients. The remarks of the Surgeon-General made in previous years as to overcrowding in the Mental Hospital, Madras, still hold good. When I visited the Mental Hospital, Madras, recently, I was greatly alarmed at the state of overcrowding, and the many disabilities under which the medical staff and patients carried on. I have already informed Government that Dr. Hensman has submitted a resume of the present position as regards accommodation and treatment of mental patients, and that some concrete beginning, however small, should be made to tackle the situation in spite of the financial stringency. Dr. Hensman in this connection also reiterates the subject of the starting of a Home for the mentally defective children which is becoming increasingly important. Although there is need for a Home for mentally defective children, the question of increased accommodation for certified mental patients requires first consideration. In this connection, it is noted that the Madras Children's Aid Society have addressed Government on the starting of a Home for mentally defective children, and the matter is under their consideration.

Report—Mental Hospitals—1933—Recorded with remarks.

READ—the following:—

Letter from Major-General Sir FRANK P. CONNOR, Kt., D.S.O., V.H.S., I.M.S., Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras, to the Secretary to Government, Local Self-Government (Public Health) Department, dated 10th May 1934, No. 7294/G.

Order—No. 1783 P.H., dated 23rd July 1934.

Recorded.

2. *Population.*—The population of the three hospitals and their daily average strength continued to increase—the figures being 2,261 and 1,665 respectively as against 2,147 and 1,560 in 1932.

3. The Surgeon-General is requested to report the circumstances in which a patient from the Madras Mental Hospital escaped and what steps were taken to trace the missing patient.

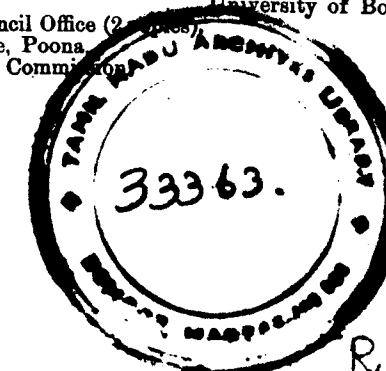
4. *Sick Rate and Mortality.*—There was a slight increase in the death-rate, the percentage of total deaths to the daily average strength being 6.96 during the year under report as against 6.60 in 1932. The Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut were free from epidemics of any kind. There was a slight outbreak of cholera in the Madras Mental Hospital, but the prompt measures taken prevented its spread. Influenza and chicken-pox were also prevalent but caused no deaths.

5. *General.*—Financial stringency stood in the way of proceeding with the schemes for additions and improvements to the hospitals. The question of relieving the congestion in the hospitals is under consideration.
