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2. *Population.*—The population of the three mental hospitals and their daily average strength continued to increase—the figures being 2,329 and 1,727 respectively as against 2,261 and 1,665 in 1933.

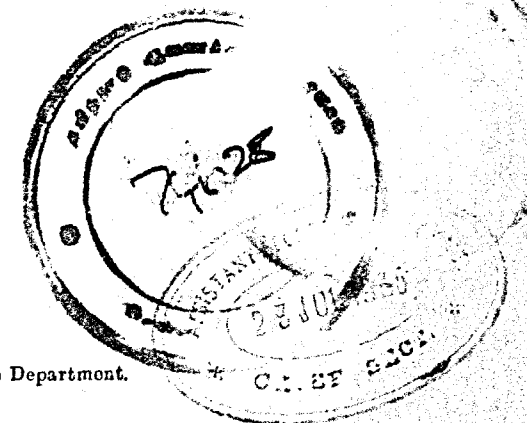
3. *Sick Rate and Mortality.*—The death-rate fell slightly as compared with the previous year (from 6.96 to 6.60 per cent of the average strength). The daily average number of patients sick in the hospitals stood at 301 as against 294 in the previous year. The Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut were free from epidemics of any kind. There were attacks of influenza and chicken-pox (149 and 13 respectively) in the Mental Hospital, Madras, but there were no deaths from these diseases.

4. *General.*—The question of increasing the accommodation at the Mental Hospital, Madras, is under the consideration of the Government.

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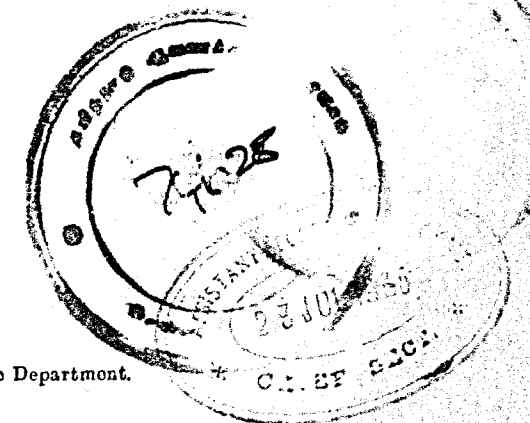

Sir,

I have the honour to forward herewith the Annual Report on the working of the Mental Hospitals in this Presidency for the year ending with 31st December 1934.

2. *Population*.—The total population of the three Mental Hospitals, Madras, Waltair and Calicut during the year under report was 2,329 (1,771 males and 558 females) as against 2,261 (1,738 males and 523 females) in the previous year. There were 1,674 patients remaining at the commencement of the year as against 1,597 in the previous year. The number of patients admitted and readmitted during the year was 655 as against 664 in the previous year. Of the total treated during the year, 220 were "cured," 129 "improved," 60 "not improved," 42 "discharged otherwise," 114 "died," and 1,764 remained at the end of the year. The daily average strength of inmates in the three Mental Hospitals was 1,727.42, as compared with 1,665.01 in the previous year, and the daily average sick was 301.34 as against 293.88 in the previous year.

Of the total admissions during the year, 18 were Europeans and Anglo-Indians, 54 Indian Christians, 456 Hindus, 109 Muhammadans, and 6 other castes. The classification of the population was as follows:—

3. *Escapes*.—Two Civil male patients escaped from the Mental Hospital, Madras, of whom one was traced and brought back to the hospital and the other is still at large. In both the cases the Police and the Magistrate were informed as usual and every effort was made to trace them. There were no escapes from the Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut during the year.

4. *Treatment and its Results*.—As usual rest, fresh air, liberal dieting as far as possible, sedatives, tonics, and hydrotherapy were the chief means that were adopted for treatment of patients. Sympathy, persuasion, suggestion, occupation, open air recreation, indoor and out-door games and amusements

were also tried to improve the mental condition and bring back patients to normal life. Cerebral syphilis and general paralysis are slowly increasing in the Mental Hospital, Madras, and the result of treatment in these cases is observed to be not satisfactory. The Superintendent, Mental Hospital, Madras, states that in cases where syphilis was the exciting cause leading to toxic psychosis the effect of active antisyphilitic treatment has been found to be satisfactory. Gland therapy is still being continued. Snake venom in minute doses is also being tried in cases of epilepsy in the Mental Hospital, Waltair. As in previous years, the system of parole has been continued in the Mental Hospital, Madras, and is working satisfactorily.

5. *Age and Previous Occupation*.—Of the patients admitted and readmitted during the year, 48 were under 20 years of age, 124 between 20 to 40 years, 164 between 40 to 60 years, and 7 upwards of 60 years. It will be observed that as in the previous years the incidence of insanity was large between the ages of 20 and 40, i.e., during the active period of life. Among the patients admitted during the year, the number of persons of no occupation was the largest, i.e., 207; then came general labourers 88, tenant cultivators 27, other domestic services 24, general store-keepers and shopkeepers 23.

6. *Types of Insanity*.—The principal types of insanity in their order of frequency were, dementia praecox, mania associated with other types, cannabis indica, imbecility, secondary or terminal dementia, epilepsy, delusional insanity, circular insanity, and melancholia other forms.

7. *Causes of Insanity*.—Amongst the predisposing causes, the admissions during the year were generally from mental stress, previous attack, heredity, cannabis indica, privation and starvation, neurosis and epilepsy.

8. *Criminal Insanes*.—At the beginning of the year, there were 219 criminal insanes in the Mental Hospital, Madras, 46 were newly admitted during the year including the one at the Calicut Hospital temporarily retained pending transfer to Madras, 3 were readmitted making the total number of 268 (245 males and 23 females) as against 266

in the previous year. Of these, 43 were discharged, transferred, etc., and 14 died, as against 36 discharged, transferred, etc., and 11 died during the previous year.

9. *Deaths*.—The total number of deaths during the year was 114 (78 males and 36 females) as against 116 in the previous year, and the percentage of deaths to the daily average strength was 6.60, as against 6.96 in the previous year.

10. *Accommodation*.—The following statement shows the sanctioned accommodation, etc., in each of the three Mental Hospitals in the Presidency and the number of patients actually admitted for treatment in these hospitals:—

The daily average population at the Mental Hospital, Madras, exceeds the available accommodation by 487. The Superintendent, Mental Hospital, Madras, has, in this connection, pointed out the undesirability of overcrowding and its consequent ill-effects on the health of the patients.

11. *Buildings*.—(a) *Madras*.—With a view to relieve the congestion at the Mental Hospital, Madras, it was proposed to locate a Mental Hospital in the vacant buildings of the Alipuram Jail at Bellary but the proposal was subsequently dropped. The question of utilizing the hostel buildings attached to the Tanjore Medical School for starting a Mental Hospital is now being examined.

(b) *Waltair*.—Plans and estimates for the construction of a block to accommodate 18 patients are under preparation. A proposal for the electrification of the hospital is also under consideration in connexion with the scheme of electrification of Government Hospitals in the Presidency.

(c) *Calicut*.—The construction of a recreation shed for females has been taken on hand and will be completed during 1935-36.

12. *General Hygiene of the Insanes*.—As far as possible personal cleanliness of the patients is carefully attended to and supervised, particular attention being paid to their feeding, bathing and clothing besides the prevention and early treatment of pyorrhoea and skin diseases.

13. *Drainage and Conservancy*.—The drainage and conservancy of the Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut are satis-

factory while the drainage system of the Mental Hospital, Madras, still continues to be unsatisfactory. The improvements to the drainage at Madras which has been merged in the remodelling scheme of the hospital buildings stands postponed for financial reasons.

14. *Water-supply*.—(a) *Madras*.—The water-supply is from the Red Hills and it is adequate.

(b) *Waltair*.—Water for drinking, cooking and partly for bathing is got from the Municipal mains and it is adequate.

(c) *Calicut*.—The unsatisfactory method of water-supply in this hospital by manual labour from the deep wells in the compound of the hospital which dry up in the hot season still continues. Under the scheme sanctioned by Government for water-supply to this hospital, the Industrial Engineering Department have bored tube-wells in the adjacent land and the Public Works Department is still conducting the qualitative test. As soon as a detailed report is received, the question will be examined.

15. *Industries and Employment*.—(a) *Madras*.—Forty-three per cent of the patients were engaged in various occupations during the year of whom 18 per cent worked in the manufacturing department, i.e., oil mill, mat-making, weaving and knitting. The remaining 25 per cent were employed in unskilled labour, such as gardening, sweeping, cleaning of food stuffs, etc. Selected patients were also utilized for assisting the carpenter, dhobies, blacksmith, mason, tailors, cooks, etc. As usual these patients were rewarded with small presents on the occasions of the Christmas Tree and the annual sports held during the year and also by indulgence in small luxuries such as cheroots, tobacco, snuff, betel-nut, cinema shows, motor drives, etc.

(b) *Waltair*.—Most of the patients of this hospital come from rural parts, and the males were engaged in the work which they were accustomed to such as agriculture, cattle tending, weaving, gardening while the female patients were utilized in such work they were habituated to do at home. Some of them spin on charkas.

(c) *Calicut*.—The patients were chiefly employed in weaving, vegetable cultivation, tailoring, coir-making and some female patients in embroidery. Some selected patients were also employed for work in the kitchen, drawing water, gardening, preparing curry powder, sweeping, etc.

16. *Amusements*.—(a) *Madras*.—The usual annual sports for the patients in general and a Christmas Tree for Europeans and Anglo-Indians and Indian Christian patients in particular were held. At the former, Lady Beatrix Stanley very kindly presided.

Football, badminton, tennis, and baseball attracted a large number of patients whilst those not interested in active sports had in-door games like table-tennis, billiards, cards, chess, etc., or were taken out for walks. As in previous years, some of the patients of the hospital competed in the Annual Park Fair Sports at the South Indian Athletic Association, Madras, held during the Christmas holidays. The prizes won by them amounted to Rs. 75. The privilege of allowing certain number of patients to attend the Wellington and Paragon Talkies in the evenings has been continued through the kind courtesy of the proprietors. The Committee of Lady Visitors continued their good work among the female patients. His Excellency the Governor of Madras kindly allowed his band to play once every month as in previous years. The Central Christmas Charity Committee made a generous donation of Rs. 500 towards the annual treat to the patients of this hospital which went a great way towards defraying the expenses of the Christmas Tree, dinner and the annual sports. The editors of the newspapers and journals continued their free supply of newspapers and journals to the patients of the hospital, while the Guild of Service sent books and periodicals every month from their book dump.

(b) *Waltair*.—Music was provided by gramophones. The patients took part in games such as football, badminton, cards, chess and attended cinemas. They were occasionally amused with feats of professional jugglers and acrobats and by excursion trips. The motor bus was freely used for the benefit of the patients. The editors of newspapers and journals continued their free supply of papers and journals.

(c) *Calicut*.—As usual the annual sports and entertainments were held during the year and prizes were distributed among the winners with the contributions received from the charitable public. A Malayalam drama staged by some of the patients and the staff was much appreciated. The patients took part in out-door games, such as football, badminton, kolattam and other in-door games like ping-pong, cards, etc. They were also entertained with gramophone songs and the harmonium. As usual the patients attended free the cinema at the Radha Picture Palace. The editors of newspapers and journals continued their supply of newspapers and journals.

17. *Epidemics*.—There were no epidemics in the Mental Hospitals, Waltair and Calicut, during the year; but there was an attack of influenza in the Mental Hospital, Madras, where 149 cases were treated in August and September 1934. Although the attacks were mild the patients had a long period of

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convalescence and some of them have not yet attained their normal health. Thirteen cases of chicken pox were admitted and treated in January 1934. There have been no deaths as a result of the epidemics.

18. *Finance*.—The total receipts including those from paying patients in all the Mental Hospitals of the Presidency during the year amounted to Rs. 5,03,474-1-7 as against Rs. 5,08,292-2-10 in the previous year. The total expenditure was Rs. 5,03,474-1-7 as against Rs. 5,06,291-9-8 in the previous year.

(a) *Mental Hospital, Madras*.—The increase in the expenditure under establishment proper is due to the additional staff sanctioned in G.O. Mis. No. 1114, P.H., dated 26th April 1934, and the increments earned by the various members of the staff. The decrease in the expenditure under diet of patients in spite of the increase in the population of the Hospital is due to an appreciable fall in the prices of the important articles of diet during the year; the increase under contingencies is accounted for as follows:—

(1) the purchase of additional aluminium dekshies, cans, bowls, etc., at a cost of Rs. 500,

(2) the purchase of a new platform weighing machine,

(3) the supply of additional prolonged bath tubs and ordinary zinc baths, and

(4) an additional barber.

The apparent decrease under Rates and Taxes is due to the low consumption of Red Hills water recorded by the faulty meter during January to May 1934; this was brought to the notice of the Engineer (Water works) of the Corporation of Madras, and the meter was replaced by a new one.

(b) *Mental Hospital, Waltair*.—The increase under establishment is due to periodical increments to staff and the appointment of a Deputy Overseer. The decrease under diet is due to the fall in prices of diet articles and consequent low tender rates. The increase under contingencies is due to some more works paid for, under petty construction and repairs.

(c) *Mental Hospital, Calicut*.—The increase of charges under establishment is due to an additional Deputy Overseer and some temporary additions to the mental staff sanctioned to the Hospital. The decrease of expenditure under "Diet" is due to low tender rates and the increase of expenditure under "Repairs and Maintenance and Medicines" is mainly due to the adjustment of the cost in 1934 of work done and the medicines supplied in the calendar year 1933.

The cost of maintenance of each patient in each of the Mental Hospitals works out as follows :—

Madras ... Rs 257-15-0 per annum as against Rs. 259-11-0 per annum in the previous year.

Waltair ... Rs. 208-13-2 per annum as against Rs. 221-10-4 per annum in the previous year.

Calicut ... Rs. 182-14-0 per annum as against Rs. 206-1-8 per annum in the previous year.

19. *General Administration.*—Dr. H. S. Hensman, L.M.S., L.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., M.C.P., continued to be the Superintendent of the Mental Hospital, Madras, during the year under report while there were some changes in the post of Superintendents in the Mental Hospitals, Waltair and Calicut as shown below :—

(a) *Waltair.*—(1) M.R.Ry. N. Venkataswami Chetti Garu, M.B.C.M., from 1st January to 23rd April 1934; (2) M.R.Ry. D. Raghava Rao Garu, L.M. & S., from 24th April to 15th May 1934; (3) Major A. Krishnamurti, B.A., M.B.C.M., A.I.R.O., from 16th May to 27th December 1934; (4) M.R.Ry. K. Narayanaswami Ayyar Avargal, L.M. & S., from 28th to 31st December 1934;

(b) *Calicut.*—(1) Major A. Innes Cox, I.M.S., from 1st January to 30th April 1934; (2) M.R.Ry. C. M. Philip, L.M. & S., from 1st May to 12th July 1934; (3) Captain M. G. Kelly, I.M.S., from 13th July to 31st December 1934.

20. *Visitors.*—All the officials and non-official visitors attended the monthly meetings of the Mental Hospitals by turn.

The Inspector-General of Prisons and the Surgeon-General visited the Mental Hospitals at Waltair and Calicut during the year.

21. *Verification of Service Books and Stock Registers.*—The annual verification of the Service Books of the establishment and Stock Registers was duly carried out in all the Mental Hospitals during the year.

22. *General Remarks.*—The daily average strength of the Mental Hospital, Madras, was 1,231 against the available accommodation of 744. Although the admission of mental patients from certain districts into the Calicut Mental Hospital has restricted the admission of patients into this hospital to a certain extent, there is still serious overcrowding in this hospital, resulting in the health of the patients being in jeopardy. The outstanding item that calls for immediate attention at the Mental Hospital, Madras, is therefore more accommodation for patients. The present unsatisfactory conditions of accommodation have already been pointed out to Government in my previous reports of the Mental Hospitals as well as by separate correspondence. It is unfortunate that the scheme for improvements has had to be postponed on grounds of finance. Further the Mental Hospital, Madras, is the premier institution of its kind in the Presidency and should be brought up-to-date at as early a date as possible. It is hoped that Government will make provision for the improvement of the hospital buildings as soon as circumstances will permit this being done.

It is agreed that special provision for mentally defective children is a necessity and very desirable in their own interest and in those of the public. The Government however have not been in a position to provide funds for the establishment of a Home for Mentally Defective Children.
