Kumararajah Muthiah Chettiar of Chettinad who was elected Mayor on 5-11-34 held the office of the Mayor till 6-11-35 when Mr. Abdul Hameed Khan, M. L. C., was elected Mayor of Madras by the Council and he continued to hold the office of the Mayor during the year under report.

In the usual course the following divisions would have come off for re-election during the year 1935-36 :—

Divisions 3, 4, 5, 9, 22, 25, 26, 27, 28, & 29.

The electoral lists were prepared and published as usual but the elections, however, were not held as the Government directed in their Memorandum No. 28430-1-A-2, L.&M., dated 18th July 1935, that no arrangements need be made for holding the 10 divisional elections on the ground that they had decided to introduce legislation postponing the elections. Subsequently, in exercise of the powers conferred by Clauses (a) & (b) of Section 2 of the Madras City Municipal (Amendment) Act of 1935, the Government were pleased to extend up to the 31st March 1936, the term of office of the 10 divisional councillors whose term expired at noon on the 1st day of November 1935 and directed that the ordinary election of the divisional councillors required to be held under sub-section 2 of Section 55 of the Madras City Municipal Act, 1919, in the months of August and September 1935 be postponed accordingly. There were also no casual elections during the year in question.

Government and the Madras Port Trust and to reduce the maintenance cost to $\frac{1}{2}$ instead of full in the matter of protective measures to be taken to prevent erosion.

Necessary provision has been made in the budget under loan funds for the prevention of coast erosion as per Government Memo No. 1550/C. 35-9 dated 8-8-1935. The question of raising the required loan is under consideration.

(4) *Laying out playing fields on the foreshore*:—The Council at its meeting held on 3-5-1935 agreed to the proposal of the Government, as an experimental measure, for 5 years to the laying out of some playing fields on the foreshore North of the Iron Bridge and that no portion of the foreshore south of the Napier Bridge be converted into playing fields and further resolved that the Mayor, the Commissioner and two Councillors be co-opted as members of the Committee appointed by the Government to advise them on the question of laying out playing fields on the foreshore.

The resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(15) *Inclusion of Sembiam within the limits of Madras* :—The Council at its meeting held on 22-10-35 considered the proposal in the Government Memorandum No. 47105-1 (33)-A-2 L. & M., dated 8-2-34 and resolved that they did not approve the proposal in view of the heavy financial commitments involved in the proposal.

The resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(16) *Gift* :—The Council at its meeting held on 30-10-35 accepted the gift of a building for the Corporation High School, Nungambakkam proposed to be presented by Rao Sahib C. Ganapathy Sastri, the executor to the estate of the late Brahadambal Ammal on the following conditions :

1. The cost of the building should be about Rs. 25,000.
2. The building should be constructed by the executor

the balance is due to the bad financial situation. Even well-to-do persons were not able to pay the taxes in time. A sum of Rs. 42,000 could not be realised within the year from persons with property list ledger. There were numerous applications asking for time to pay the dues.

Warrants.—The number of warrants executed during the year was 36 as against 24 in the previous year though all possible efforts were made to collect the taxes without actual execution of the warrants.

Civil suits.—The number of civil suits filed during the year for recovery of Property tax was 90 as against 85 in the previous year. 18 cases of the previous year were pending decision. Decrees were obtained in 70 cases of which 67 related to the suits filed in the current year and 3 cases of the previous year. 5 cases of the current year and 15 cases of the previous year were settled out of court and the remaining 18 cases were pending decision. The application made to the Full Bench of the Small Causes Court for review of the judgement of the 2nd Court about the recovery of Rs. 201-

the half yearly tax on cycles from Rs. 2 to annas eight with effect from 1st April 1936 and the number of cycles registered during the current half year alone rose up to 27,200 cycles up-till now.

Current collections amounted to Rs. 1,00,214 which included Rs. 2,076 received as advance for the succeeding year. The net collections of the year amounted to Rs. 98,138 which with Rs. 2,520 prepaid in the previous year for the year under report amounted to Rs. 1,00,658. The percentage of collection to demand for the year was 93.62 against 92.50 in the previous year. There was a balance of Rs. 6,847 to the collected of which Rs. 2,500 have since been recovered.

The Government have paid during the year under report a sum of Rs. 1,43,010-6-0 towards the annual contribution of Rs. 3,38,000 fixed in G. O. No. 325

the properties had already been mortgaged to a third person. The Vakil at Gudivada has since been instructed to take further proceedings against the judgment debtors for their arrest. The percentage of collection to demand was 47.50 as against 55.65 in the previous year.

(2) *Current*.—The demand under this head for the year 1935-36 was Rs. 1,02,660-6-9, as against Rs. 85,659-1-5 in the year 1934-35. The entire demand was collected. The percentage of collection is cent per cent as in the previous year.

The total Entertainments Tax realised during the year was thus Rs. 1,03,146-8-3 and this is the highest collection on record since the introduction of the Entertainments Tax Act in the City. The increase in the income is due to the fact that all the cinemas, where silent picture were exhibited, have been converted into Talkies. There are 14 picture houses in the City and more than 75 per cent of the income under this tax is derived from the cinema shows. The income from dramatic performances was not much and it was only 3 per

27. *Encroachments.*—The question of appointing a special officer to attend to the duties of removal of the encroachments in the city has been engaging the attention of the Corporation for a long time. The number of encroachments removed was 46, while 274 cases were recommended for assignment. The post of Encroachment Officer having been abolished since 1-10-35, no appreciable progress could be shown in this matter. There are about 4,000 cases of encroachments in respect of which action has to be taken. The number is bound to go up when fresh cases are detected by the Collector. The Government have pointed out the desirability of restoring the post of the Encroachment Officer in view of the large number of encroachments still to be dealt with. The Council has therefore been requested to reconsider its previous decision and to sanction the employment of a Special Encroachment officer for a period of one year on a salary of Rs. 200 per mensem.

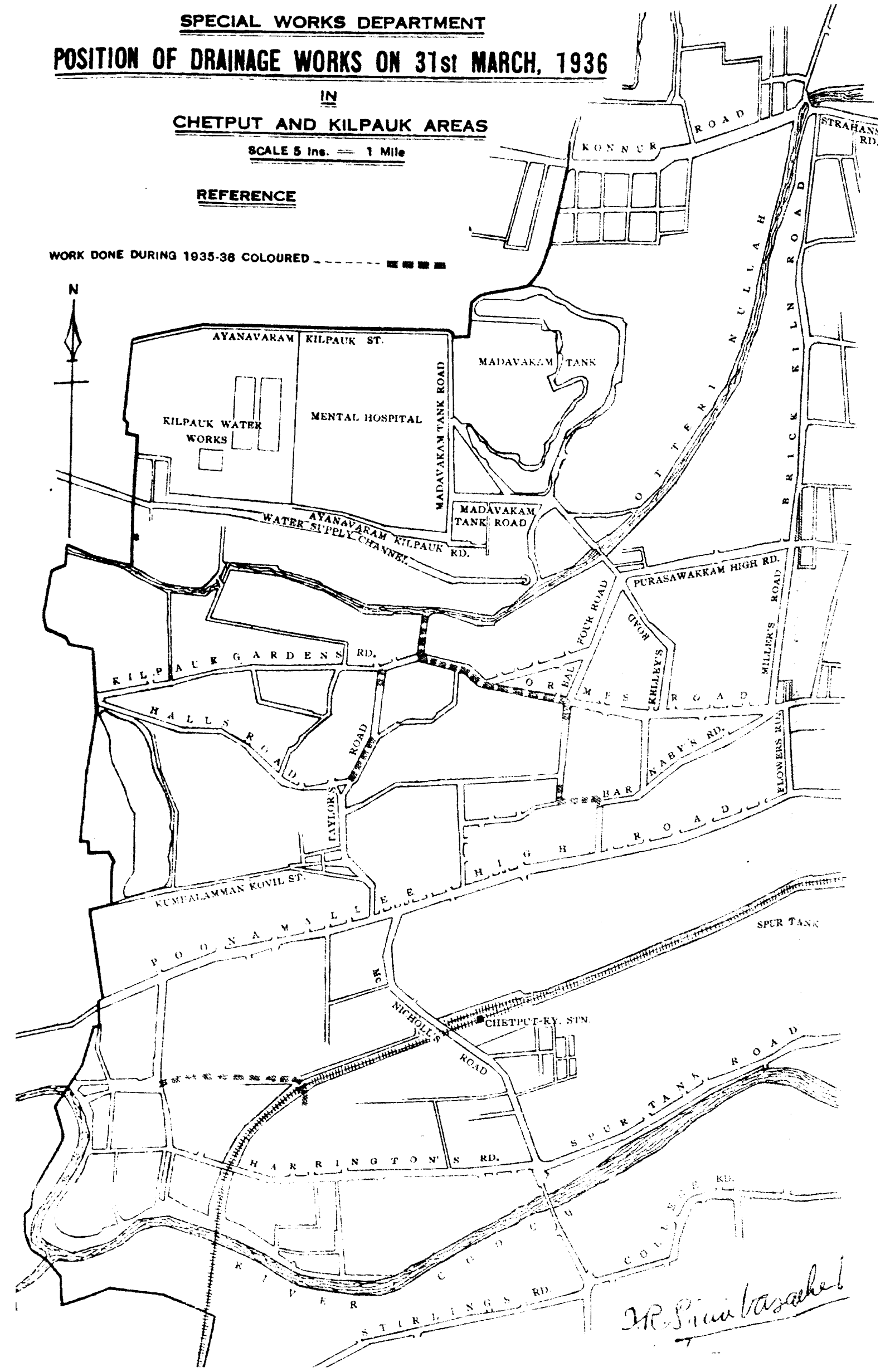

Contract No. 7.—This relates to laying of Intercepting sewers in Napier Park area and is in progress. In this connection it may be mentioned that the contractors Messrs. General Construction Co. Ltd., paid Rs. 550, to the Commissioner for workmen's compensation on account of a fatal accident to a cooly by name Sabapathy who was under the employ of the contractors for about 8 weeks getting Rs. 12-8-0 per month, the accident taking place by reason of one of the legs of the shear legs slipping and the latter with the suspended pipe falling on him. This took place on 1-6-1935 and at the inquest held on the same evening at the General Hospital, the jury returned a verdict that the cooly Sabapathy died following the above mentioned accident.

Piece-work Contract No. 10.—Sewer laying in different areas. The final decision of the Council as to whether the work should be done by contract or by departmental labour had at last been reached and the Council at its meeting held on 3-5-35 accepted the lowest tender of Mr. R. Venkatesam Chetty. The contractor has executed the necessary agreement and the work has been put in hand and is in progress.

The drain in Ritherdon Road from Piosala Parachari Street to Poona-malle High Road has been completed to a total length of 1820 feet.

GEORGE TOWN AREA.

Repairs to northern half of Kelly's drain have been carried out during the period to a length of 114 feet, the total length of the drain so far repaired being 6629 feet. Removing, cleaning, grouting and plastering the sides and intrados of the arch are the items of work attended to in connection with the repair.

Construction of masonry twin drains near the junction of Ibramjee Sahib Street and Poplams Broadway along the realigned route has been completed to a length of 75 feet.

11 feet drain along the realigned route—

The net fee income realised from the pupils during the year was Rs. 14,474-13-6 (*Vide* D.C.B. Statement No. 8 Appendix III) the expenditure on staff was Rs. 15,427-4-6, and that on the provision of the shed, equipment, and contributions to the games fund amounted to Rs. 3,748-1-8. The net cost to the Corporation for the year was Rs. 4,700-8-8.

Proposals for giving effect to the revised scales of pay suggested in G. O. No. 4619, L & M., dated 20-10-34 for teachers in Secondary Schools were made during the year under report and are under the consideration of the authorities concerned.

The usual extra-curricular activities of the High School were kept up. The different games were so organised that most of the pupils took part in them with enthusiasm. The open space adjoining the School was utilised as play-ground. Application to Government for alienating about 5 acres of land for use as play-grounds was submitted during the year, and the necessary sanction has since been accorded. The Scouting activities were more marked during 1935-36 than in the
