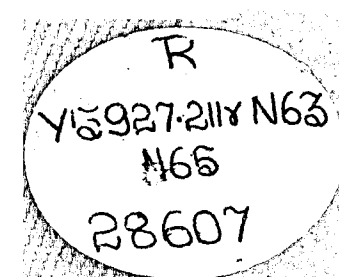

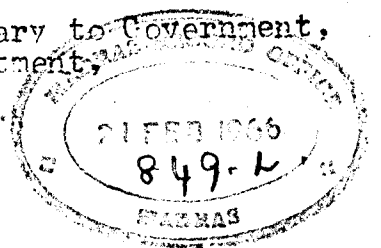

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PART I

ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT ON THE WORK DONE FOR THE AMELIORATION OF THE CONDITION OF THE ELIGIBLE COMMUNITIES FOR THE YEAR 1963-64.

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1. PERSONNEL

Sri R. Subramanian, I.A.S. continued as Director of Harijan Welfare during the period under report.

Sri T. R. Venkataraman, B.A., (Hons.) continued as Joint Director of Harijan Welfare upto 2.1.64 After-noon. Sri K. Krishnamurthy assumed charge on 2.1.64 after-noon and continued as Joint Director of Harijan Welfare during the rest of the period under report.

Sri S. Krishnaraj, B.A., continued as Personal Assistant to Director of Harijan Welfare during the period under report.

Sri T. R. Kesavan, B.A., continued as Additional Personal Assistant upto 14.10.63. Sri J. D. Milton assumed charge as Additional Personal Assistant on 25.10.63 and continued during the rest of the period under report.

Sri V. Palaniyandam, B.A., continued as Special Officer for Government of India scholarships during the period under report.

Sri A. Mohamed Sultan, M.A., continued as Senior Accounts Officer during the period under report.

Sri V. Mahalingam, M.A., continued as Junior Accounts Officer upto 14.11.63. The post of Junior Accounts Officer was Gazetted till 14.11.63. Sri T. S. Sarangan assumed charge as Non-Gazetted Junior Accounts Officer on 14.11.63 and continued during the rest of the period.

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DISTRICT ESTABLISHMENT: The Collectors of the districts continued to be responsible for the ameliorative work done in the districts with the Director of Harijan welfare as Coordinating Officer. Collectors are assisted by the District Welfare Officers who are in the grade of Deputy Collectors in all districts. The post of the District Welfare Officer, Nilgiris which was in the grade of Tahsildar was upgraded to that of the post of the Deputy Collector in G.O.Ms.No.1010 Home dated 11.6.63.

One Additional District Welfare Officer in Madurai district is in the cadre of a Tahsildar was continued during the year under report.

Particulars of the staff who assisted in each district and the Director of Harijan Welfare in Madras city are shown in the Statements I.A. to I.C..

COMMUNITIES ELIGIBLE FOR HELP BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The ameliorative work undertaken by the Harijan Welfare Department was confined as usual to the communities specified in Annexure A.

2. STATE HARIJAN WELFARE COMMITTEES:

The State Harijan Welfare Committee reconstituted in G.O.Ms. No.3600 Home dated 10.11.60 with a strength of 23 non-official members continued to function as an Advisory Committee. During the period under report, the Committee met twice on 17.6.63 at Rameswaram and on 24.10.63 at Madras, and discussed various measures to the undertaken to improve the economic condition of the Scheduled Castes.

3. DISTRICT HARIJAN WELFARE COMMITTEES

The District Harijan Welfare Committees continued to function with the respective district Collectors as a Chairman. The No. of meetings held by these committee in the districts are given below:

4. THE MADRAS TRIBES ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Madras Tribes Advisory Council was reconstituted in C.O.Ms.No.3043 Home dated 4.9.61 and C.O.Ms.No.1547 Home dated 25.1.62 with a strength of ten members who were all non-officials and of whom, nine members belong to Scheduled Tribes. The Minister in charge of the Harijan Welfare was the Chairman. The Secretary to Government (Home) in Charge of the administration of Scheduled Tribes, and the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras were ex-officio members. During the period under report, the council met twice at Thandikudi, Madurai on 16.6.63 and at Papanasam, Tirunelveli on 27.12.63 and discussed the various ameliorative measures to be undertaken for the welfare of scheduled tribes.

5. STATE BACKWARD CLASSES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The State Backward Classes Advisory Committee was originally constituted under C.O.Ms.No.960 Firka, Development dated 22.10.49 and it is being reconstituted by the Government as and when the term of the members of the Committee expires.

The Committee was lastly re-constituted by the Government in their Order No.2530 (Home Department) dated 26.7.62 with twenty non-official members with effect from the date of the order with the Minister in charge of Harijan Welfare as Chairman and the Secretary to Government (HOME DEPARTMENT) the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras and Director of Public Instruction, Madras (since included with reference to C.O.Ms.No.3753 Home department dated 3.12.64) as ex-officio members of the Committee. The Director of Harijan Welfare was the Secretary to the above Committee during the year under report.

During the period under report the Committee met at the following places and discussed various measures to be undertaken for the uplift of the Backward classes in the State.

In C.O.Ms.No.451 Home dated 6.2.63, the Government have decided that the meeting of the above committee should be held once in six months during the period of National Emergency. Subsequently in C.O.Ms.No.1056 Home dated 24.6.64, it was ordered by the Government that the meetings of the above Committee should be held once in three months and this was subsequently changed to once in four months (vide C.O.Ms.No.3600 Home dated 27.12.64) as the holding of the above committee meetings, once in three months would be at too short an interval.

6. AMELIORATIVE MEASURES UNDERTAKEN BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT.

The ameliorative work consists of
1. Provision of house sites

2. Maintenance of schools, grant of scholarships, stipends, boarding grants and grants to private educational institution for the benefit of the communities mentioned in Annexure A.

3. Provision of wells and tanks for the supply of drinking water.

~~4. Provision of wells and tanks for the supply of drinking water.~~

4. Provision of Irrigation wells, sanitary amenities, pathways, street lights burning and burial grounds.

5. Grants to private bodies, engaged in social and economic uplift of the Eligible Communities.

6. Grant of subsidy for the purchase of bulls and sinking of wells for agriculture purposes.

7. Grant of subsidy for Housing.

8. Starting of Cottage Industries etc.

Details of the work turned out during the year under the heads mentioned above are given in the following paragraphs.

7. HOUSE SITES:

House sites had been provided by assignment of lands at the disposal of the Government and by acquiring private lands. Details of house sites provided by assignment of Government lands are furnished in Statement No.II.

5958 house sites covering an extent of 300.86 acres of lands were provided for the Scheduled Castes in the State. The total No. of house sites provided since the commencement of the operation of the Harijan Welfare Department upto 31.3.64 were 62526.

An extent of 1095.62 acres was acquired at a total cost of Rs.12,29600.77 as detailed in Statement No.III. The total no. of house sites provided during the year were 15550. The Government contributed a sum of Rs.12,25,173.47 towards the cost of acquisition of house sites and private individuals contributed a sum of Rs.4512.30. The total No. of house sites provided by way of acquisition since the commencement of the operation of the activities of the Harijan Welfare Department upto was 1,35,094.

8. LOANS TO INDIVIDUALS FOR THE ACQUISITION OF HOUSE SITES:

The arrear demand at the beginning of the year under the head of account "Loans for the acquisition of the house sites for the communities eligible for help by the Harijan Welfare Department was Rs.83166.47. The demand during 1963-64 was Rs.36140.01. The total demand for the year was Rs.119316.38. A sum of Rs.2586.24 was collected during the period under report. The balance of demand to be collected at the end of the year under the head of account was Rs.116730.14. (The figures are subject to variations as they are not reconciled).

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PERSONAL DEPOSIT.

The Personal Deposit account in the name of the Director of Harijan Welfare was reopened for the year 1963-64 with ref. to G.O.Ms.No.876 Home dated 25.3.64.

During the year under report 5045 bills were passed for which 1082 cheques were issued involving Rs.57,44,830.15 in respect of payment of State and Government of India scholarship.

6. EDUCATION:

In the field of education, the following facilities had been provided.

1. Maintenance of schools run by this Department.
2. Sanction of scholarship, boarding grants, supply of books clothing and payment of examination fees.
3. Maintenance of free Government hostels at important centres over the State.
4. Grant of financial assistance to private bodies engaged in t maintenance of hostels, schools etc. for the benefit of eligible communities schools.

Particulars showing the No. of Harijan Welfare schools in Madras are given in Statement IV Part I and II with the No. of teaching etc. At the beginning of the period under report there were 855 No new schools were started during the year. The total No. of children receiving education was consisting of 59,578 boys and 460 girls. The total No. of teachers employed was 3061. The details showing the no. of trained and untrained teachers in the different categories are furnished in the Statement No. IV Part II.

In addition to 855 Harijan Welfare schools, 301 schools were al run by this Department for the benefit of other students belonging to Scheduled Tribes and De-notified Tribes. The details of school are given below:

MIDDAY MEALS:

The supply of midday meals to pupils in the Harijan Welfare schools was continued during the period under report. The expenditure incurred towards the supply of midday meals was Rs.26,28,851. This scheme worked satisfactory during the period under report.

THE GOVERNMENT NANDANAR SCHOOLS AT CHIDAMBARAM

The following institutions continued to be run by the Harijan Welfare Department at Chidambaram, South Arcot.

Midday meals were also supplied to the pupils studying in the above institutions. Pupils studying in these institutions and the staff position are also included in Statement No. IV Part I and in Statement No. IV Part II respectively.

10. GOVERNMENT HOSTELS:

During 62-63 there were 277 Government Hostels in the State for Scheduled Caste students. These hostels were continued during 63-64.

During 63-64, the Government have accorded sanction to the opening of 17 New Government Hostels in the State as detailed below.

These hostels have been opened with the strength noted against each.

During the period, the Government Girls Hostel, Srirangam was merged with the Government Girls' Hostel, Tiruchi. The Government Boys Hostel, Pudukottai was only to be merged with the Government Korava Boarding Home, Pudukottai. The Government Boys Hostel at Erode was ordered to be merged with the Government Boys Hostel, Erode (Vide G.O. Ms. No. 3061 Home dated 25.9.63. G.O. Ms. No. 2038 Home dated 26.6.63 and G.O. Ms. No. 2400 Home dated 16.7.62.

The Government in their orders no. 2246 Home dated 16.7.63 have ordered the taking over of the following ten subsidised hostels during 1963-64.

According to the instructions issued by Government, the above hostels except the Seva Nilayam Hostel, Coimbatore and S.T. Boys Hostel, Tirumangalam, Madurai have been taken over from the management of the subsidised hostel and run as Government hostels.

As regards the selection of boarders in the Government hostels, instructions issued in G.O. Ms. No. 2470 Home dated 20.7.62 were followed.

During 1963-64 two sets of clothes costing Rs. 12/- (One set for Deepavali and another set for Pongal) were supplied to the Girl students residing in the Government Hostels.

The total No. of Government hostels during 63-64 is 299. The District-wise details regarding the name and place of the hostels with their strength are furnished in annexure B.

GOVERNMENT HOSTEL FOR COLLEGE BOYS, MADRAS CITY.

This hostel is intended mainly for College students. The sanctioned strength of the hostel during 63-64 was 204. During the year under report a sum of Rs. 87,473/- was spent towards the maintenance of this hostel.

GOVERNMENT HOSTEL FOR INDUSTRIAL STUDENTS

This hostel is intended for students who are undergoing industrial courses of training in the various industrial institutions in Madras city. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 200. During the year under report a sum of Rs.65,723/- was spent towards the maintenance of this hostel.

GOVERNMENT BOYS HOSTEL, ROYAPURAM

This hostel is intended for the students studying in Elementary and Higher Elementary and High Schools in North Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 150. A sum of Rs.15,213/- was spent towards the maintenance of the hostel during the period under report.

GOVERNMENT BOYS HOSTEL, KODAMBAKKAM, MADRAS.

The hostel is intended for the students studying in Elementary and Higher Elementary and High Schools in South Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 30. A sum of Rs.6422/- was spent towards the maintenance of the hostel during the year under report.

GOVERNMENT GIRLS HOSTEL, KILPAUK, MADRAS-10.

This hostel is intended for the Girl students studying in Elementary and Higher Elementary and High Schools in South Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 125. A sum of Rs.10,183/- was spent towards the maintenance of the hostel during the year under report.

GOVERNMENT GIRLS HOSTEL, ROYAPURAM

The hostel is intended for the girl pupils studying in the Elementary and Higher Elementary and High Schools in North Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 150. A sum of Rs.15,214/- was spent towards the maintenance of the hostel during the period under report.

11. EDUCATION IN MADRAS CITY.

There were five Harijan Welfare schools in the city under the direct control of the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras. The total No. of teachers employed were 60.

MIDDAY MEALS:

During the period under report the scholarship of midday meals to the pupils in the five Harijan Welfare schools in the city was entrusted to private contractors. 2241 pupils of the Harijan Welfare schools in the City were supplied with midday meals for the period under report. A sum of Rs.71160/- was spent towards the supply of midday meals to these children during the year 1963-64.

A sum of Rs.44,385/- was spent towards the supply of midday meals to Harijans in Non-Harijan Welfare schools in Madras city. The No. of students benefitted approximately by this scheme during 63-64 was 1300 as detailed below:

12. BRISLEENAGAR SETTLEMENT, MADRAS-12.

A sum of Rs.200/- sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 1615 Home dated 14.5.63 for the continuance of one library in Brisleenagar Settlement Madras-12 was drawn and disbursed to the President of Brisleenagar Settlement Welfare Association, Madras-12.

13. HOSTELS SUBSIDISED BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The Policy of granting financial assistance to organisation such as Harijan Sevak Sangh and Private individuals towards the cost of maintenance of boarding homes conducted by them for the benefit of the communities eligible for help by the Harijan Welfare Department was continued during the period under report. The names of such institutions, the No. of boarding grants and the amount of boarding grants sanctioned are shown in the Annexure C. The Government in their Order No. 2707 Home dated 2.2.62 increased the rate of boarding charges at Rs.15/- p.m. per boarder by Re.1/- p.m. per boarder in the case of hostels located in the plains and by Rs.2/- p.m. in the case of hostels located in hill areas. A sum of Rs.3,11,025.02 was sanctioned to the management of these hostels towards the maintenance of 4663 Scheduled Caste pupils residing in the subsidised hostels as detailed in the annexure C.

BOARDING GRANTS TO BACKWARD CLASSES:

During the period under report 2472 boarding grants amounting to Rs.2,26,965.38 were sanctioned to pupils belonging to Backward Class residing in the subsidised hostels. The Name of the subsidised hostels the number of grants and the amount sanctioned are furnished in annexure 'C'.

BOARDING GRANTS TO FORWARD COMMUNITIES:

With a view to eradicate untouchability, a sum of Rs.35,096/- was sanctioned to 323 boarders belonging to the various forward communities residing in the subsidised hostels during the year under report. The rate of subsidy was Rs.107 per boarder in a year are furnished in the Annexure 'D'.

MATRONS SUBSIDY:

The Government have in their Memo. No. 410 H.W. IV 53-1 dated 27.1.53 permitted the Director of Harijan Welfare to grant subsidy towards the pay of matrons employed in the Girls and mixed hostels subsidised by this Department at the rates sanctioned in G.O. No. 381 B.W. dated 4.4.52 for every year. Particulars of hostels which were in receipt of matron subsidy for the year 1963-64 are furnished in annexure 'E'. A sum of Rs.2127/- was sanctioned for giving subsidy towards the employment of twelve members in the subsidised hostels in the Madras State.

14. SCHOLARSHIPS TO ELIGIBLE COMMUNITIES

The grant of scholarship to the pupils of Eligible Communities continued on the usual lines. As in the previous years separate allotments were made in the budget for the year 1963-64 for granting scholarship to the students of Eligible Communities. The work relating to the sanction of scholarships for pre-matric and post-matric (except for courses for which the limit in the No. of scholarships to be awarded is fixed) was attended to by the District Welfare Officers in the districts and by the Personal Assistant to the Director of Harijan Welfare in Madras city. The sanction of scholarships for courses for which no. of scholarship is limited was continued to be sanctioned by the Director of Harijan Welfare.

According to the Orders in G.O.Ms.No.2672, Home dated 2.3.62, the students belonging to Eligible Communities undergoing teachers training course in basic and non-basic training schools were granted Residential scholarships at a flat rate of Rs.25/- p.m. for ten months in a year in time of stipend from the Education Department. The expenditure on this account has been included in the statement regarding Residential scholarships to pupils in Secondary Schools.

NON RESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIPS (BASIC AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS)

1, 10, 571 Non-residential scholarships for ordinary General education in Basic and Secondary Schools involving an expenditure of Rs.22,13,941/- was sanctioned during the year under report, both by the Collectors in Districts and by the Personal Assistant to the Director of Harijan Welfare in Madras city as detailed below:

20. CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR OF WELLS:

During the year new wells were constructed and old wells were repaired. Besides these, the construction of wells was started and they were in progress of various stages. A total expenditure of Rs.4,22,558.61 was incurred on this item during 63-64. The total expenditure incurred for this purpose since the commencement of the operation of the Harijan Welfare Department upto 31st March '64 works out to Rs.4,37,654-18. 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21. ASSIGNMENT OF LANDS:

22. PROVISION OF SANITARY AMENITIES:

A sum of Rs.4,05,375.95, was spent during the year for the provision of Sanitary amenities in Harijan colonies such as formation of pathways, provision of burial grounds, public conveniences, bath rooms, playing, enclosures etc. The district-wise details for the above expenditure are furnished in statement No.VII.

23. THE UNTOUCHABILITY OFFENCES ACT:

The untouchability offences Act 55 and the Madras Temple Entry Authorisation Act 47 continued to improved the social conditions of the Harijans to a great extent during the period under report. Though the practice of untouchability could not be eradicated completely, the above said Act has helped much to minimise the offences relating to social disabilities to the extent possible. As the offences under this Act have been declared as cognisable, prosecutions are launched against the offenders by the Police Department which is entrusted with the working of this Act successfully and the Government are watching the progress. 24 Harijan Day Celebration:-

The Harijan Day was celebrated on the 29th February 1964 and on the 30th of each month remaining months of the year throughout the districts Meetings were held during the Harijan Day celebrations and ameliorative measures undertaken for the uplift of the Harijans and the evils of untouchability were explained to the public. During the year under report the last week of January (28th to 30th) was celebrated as "Harijan Week" throughout the State including Madras city in all the seven days Meeting were held in Harijan colonies and Health campaign concluded. Common dinners were also arranged wherever possible. These celebrations proved a great success in getting the Harijans feel their quality of status in the society and the rights they have got and the various facilities the Government have provided for their benefits.

25 Award of Government of India Scholarships for other Backward Classes:-

Under the Government of India scholarship scheme for Post-matric studies for Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward classes, scholarships are awarded every year to the students belonging to these communities for post-matric studies in India. The Government of India, Ministry of Education were themselves awarding scholarships till 1958-59. The scheme was decentralised to respective state Governments from the year 1959-60. The Director of Harijan Welfare is implementing the scheme since 1959-60. In their letter No F5 13/63 Satt 4 Ministry of Education, dated 26-7-63 the Government of India had authorised the State Government to continue the scheme for 1963-64 in accordance with the rules and regulations communicated by them.

A sum of Rs 30,55,800/- was provided during the period under report, for the award of Government of India scholarships to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward classes. Against this provision a sum of Rs 30,58,849-13 was spent towards the grant of scholarships to students belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward classes for the post-matric studies.

26 Government of India scholarship to Scheduled Castes:-

During the year 1963-64 a sum of Rs 15,57,100/- was allotted for the award of Government of India Post-matric scholarship to Scheduled Castes (ie Rs 8,71,400) sanctioned by the Ministry of Education New Delhi as original allotment and Rs 6,85,700/- as additional allotment sanctioned under plan schemes. A sum of Rs 15,60,041-04 was sanctioned to 2804, Scheduled Caste students as detailed below:-

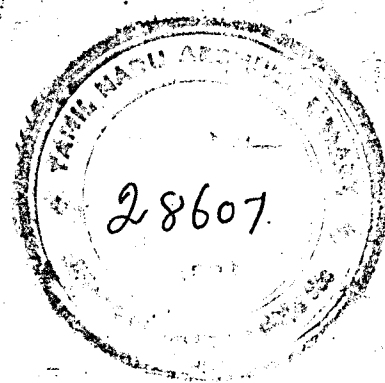

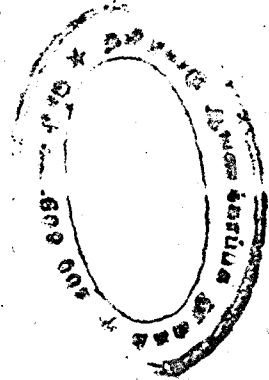

The Special Deputy Collector, Kallar Reclamation and his subordinates continued to concentrate on the improvement of attendance of pupils on rolls where pupils were irregular; in attendance, the parents were frequently contacted and persuaded to send their children regularly to the schools. There is a sharp increase in the strength during the year under report.

The non-kallar children are freely admitted in all Kallar schools as per G.O.No.4200, (Home) dated 15.11.48. The number of such non-kallar pupils recurring instruction during the year under report is 9028.

Midday meals are being supplied to all the children reading in kallar schools. The Special Deputy Collector and his executive subordinate officers visit the schools by surprise and see to their proper functioning.

The teachers employed in kallar schools are qualified and trained hands. The distribution of teachers according to the grade is as shown below:

All the Kallar schools are complete Elementary schools of which 35 are Higher Elementary schools. 86 are basic schools and the remaining 116 are lower Elementary schools. The pay of the teachers is disbursed on a fixed day in each month by the Supervisor of the respective ranges at their headquarters or at centres fixed for the purpose. Advantage is taken of these meetings to impart

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Departmental instructions to them by the respective supervisors. These schools are visited by the Special Deputy Collector by surprise and are inspected by the Supervisors and the Officers of the Education Department periodically. The officers of the Revenue Department are also making visit to the Kallar schools when they tour the area.

Method of teaching:-

The syllabus for Elementary schools prescribed by the Government and approved by the Deputy Inspectors of Schools, of the ranges concerned, year after year is being followed in all the Kallar Elementary schools. Necessary steps are taken to enroll all the schools age children and to enforce their regular attendance and to reduce stagnation. Record sheets introduced in G.O.No. 2103 (Education) dated 22.10.35 are maintained for all the pupils in the schools.

Equipment for schools:-

A sum of Rs.2919.95 was spent towards the supply of equipments for Kallar schools during the year. Many of the schools are not adequately equipped.

Free supply of Books and Clothing:-

A sum of Rs. 10,300.67 was spent during this year towards the supply of free books and clothings to the pupils. Besides this, a sum of Rs. 15,742.67 was also spent towards the supply of clothings to Boarders in the Government Hostels from the Central grants.

Midwifery Grants:-

There was no award of midwifery grant during this year as there was no application.

Midday Meals:-

The scheme relating to the supply of midday meals was introduced in Kallar Reclamation for the first time in September '60. Children of all communities studying in the Elementary and Higher Elementary schools are supplied with midday meals on all working days. The rate of a meal is 15 np. During the year under report, a sum of Rs. 9,06,157.15 was spent on the supply of free midday meals.

7. Rallies, Displays Etc.:-

Independance day, Republic Day and the Children's day were observed by all the Cup-packs and scout troops during the year as usual. Rallies were conducted on these days at various centres and sweets distributed to children to encourage scouting in the areas.

Visists and Inspection:-

Inspections and visits were made by the three scout organisers to all scout units once in a year and instructions are being given for the improvement of scout activities in the department.

General:-

A separate scout Association has been started for the Kallar Reclamation Department and is functioning properly under the presidentship of the Special Deputy Collector, Kallar Reclamation, since March 1963.

Consequent on the affiliation of Kallar Cooperative Societies with Madurai District Central Cooperative Bank, five posts of Junior Inspector have been retrenched upto March 64. Out of the remaining (6 + 4) posts of Inspectors (3 + 4) Cooperative Inspectors are working in Cooperative institutions as Secretary or Manager and only one Sr. Inspector and 2 Junior Cooperative

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Inspectors are attending to the supervision of all Kallar Cooperative Societies.

The Government have ordered in G.O.Ms.No.1349 H.W. I.L.C. dt. 14.3.60 and G.O.Ms.No.4016 H.W. dt. 12.12.60 that all Kallar Cooperative Societies should be affiliated with Madurai District Central Cooperative Bank so that the Bank can finance these societies were affiliated and the Bank is sanctioning loans for these affiliated societies.

Loans due to Societies:

A sum of Rs.9,46,893.50 was outstanding at the beginning of the year and Rs.3,58,507 was collected during the year.

Trust Fund Loans:-

A sum of Rs.2,29,501 was outstanding at the beginning of the year Rs.25,035 was collected during the year the Balance at the end of the period was Rs.2,04,466/-.

13.Kallar Cooperative Sale Society:

This society with 4 branches was also affiliated with the Madurai District Central Cooperative Bank and the bank was granting loans to this society. The Government have since ordered to transfer of the Control of the Society to the Deputy Registrar, Madurai for supervision. During the period under report, the society had issued pledge loans amounting to Rs.1,46,659/- to its members. The society had established a decorticator and rice mill at Theni, and they were working ~~satisfactorily~~ satisfactorily. The Society had got 4543 members with a paid up share capital of Rs.52,605 at the end of March '64.

14.Kallar Labour Society:

The Year under report is the 25th year of the working of the Kallar Labour Society. A sum of Rs.87,782 is outstanding in the Trust Fund Loans under Principal at the end of the year. The entire amount is over due and the society may not be able to repay even the principal under loans to Trust Fund. The Society is managed by a Senior Inspector at Madurai as Ex-Officio Secretary. The Special Deputy Collector is its Ex-Officio President. The Society is carrying out all work connected with building through Sub-Contractors who are members. All the Works pertaining to Kallar Schools etc. under the control of the Special Deputy Collector are entrusted to this society for execution.

15.Urban Banks:

The Bank was revived after affiliation with the Central Bank in 1962. The Central Bank is granting loans to this Bank and a Central Bank employer is working in this Bank. During the period from 1.4.63 to 31.3.64 the Bank has issued short term loans amounting to Rs.29,780 to its members besides jewel loans amounting to Rs.11,904.

16.Usilampatti Cottage Industries Society:-

The Society has got 247 members on roll with a paid up share capital of Rs.1518/- The society undertakes the following items of work viz. Purchase and sale of honey, production of hand pounded rice and supplying it to the Government Boarding Homes and Hospitals at Usilampatti etc. and extraction of oil and its sale to the public. 17.Milk Supply Societies.

There were 7 milk supply cooperative societies at the beginning of the year. Out of 7 milk supply Kallar Cooperative Societies 5 milk supply societies were affiliated. The milk supply society at Andrewsapuram is ~~down~~ and has been recommended for liquidation. The remaining one society will either be affiliated or liquidated early.

18.Employees Cooperative Society:

Out of two employees Cooperative Societies formed for the employers of Kallar Reclamation, the Madurai South District Kallar Reclamation Employees' Society was affiliated with the Madurai District Central Cooperative Bank and North District Kallar Reclamation society is under liquidation. As regards the financing of the South Employees Society, the Madurai District Cooperative Central Bank is functioning satisfactorily. A sum of Rs.1,28,590 was disbursed to this society during the year under report. The total No. of Members on roll as on 31.3.64 are 655 and the total paid up share capital is Rs.35,548/-

The General working of Kallar Cooperative Societies continued to be generally satisfactory.

19.Piramalai Kallar Common Funds.

The Fund registered under the societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 continued to function as usual for the welfare of the Piramalai Kallar Community. It is administered by a committee consisting of 15 members elected from Piramalai Kallar Community with the District Collector as its Ex-Officio president, the Special Deputy Collector (Kallar Reclamation) as its Ex-Officio Secretary and the Head Clerk, Office of the Special Deputy Collector, Kallar Reclamation, Madurai, The Treasurer. Four meetings of the Kallar Common Fund Committees were held during the year.

Object: The object of the fund is to uplift the Piramalai Kallar Community educationally and economically by giving loans and advances to Kallars and institutions. The Chief source of the income to the fund is by way of collection of donation and subscription from the Kallars. A sum of Rs.1945/- was collected as donation and subscription during the year towards the funds.

ASSETS:

The Kallar ~~ware~~ ware-houses at Usilampatti, Chekanurani

and Theni continued to be occupied by the Madurai District Kallar Cooperative Marketing Society, Usilampatti and its branches for stocking the produce pledged by its members. The two buildings at Checkanurani and Batlagundu are used as Government Boarding Homes under the control of the Kallar Reclamation Deptt. on payment of rent to the fund. The Madurai District Kallar Cooperative Marketing Society, Usilampatti has constructed a building for the installation of a *deconticator* and a rice *huller* on a position of the site owned by the fund at Theni and based to the society. The construction of a compound wall at an estimated cost of Rs.9,300/- on the site owned by the fund at Madurai, is under progress. A sum of Rs.3080 has ~~is~~ so far been paid as part payment towards this work. The lands at Usilampatti owned by the fund have been leased for a period of three years from 1.3.62 on an annual base of Rs.850/- for the lands and annual rent of Rs.250/- for the electric motor installed on the well in the same lands.

The main functions of the department were directed towards educational social and economic uplift of the community.

II. Reclamation of Koravars and Denotified Tribes in Ramanathapuram District during 1963-64.

The Kallar Reclamation work in respect of this district was confined to the maintenance of two Kallar schools in Srivilliputtur Taluk. The strength of the school was 259, of which 147 boys and the rest were girls. The pupils were provided with free supply of slates and books. Two sets of dresses were also provided to the girl students studying in these schools.

Reclamation of Koravars:

There were two Govt. Hostels one for the Korava boys and the other for the Korava Girls at Aruppukottai. The strength of these hostels was 58 and 28 respectively.

Denotified Tribes:

For the Welfare of Denotified Tribes, five Marava Schools were continued to be administered during this year. The children of these schools were provided with free supply of books, slates and midday meals. Five reading rooms and libraries were attached to these schools. The two Maravar Boarding Homes at Mudukulathur and Kamuthi were continued to be administered.

III. Reclamation of Koravars in Salem District:

The District Welfare Officer, Salem was in charge of the work relating to the welfare of Denotified Tribes in the District. Four Koravar schools and two boarding homes one for boys and another for girls were being run in the district.

There were 294 boys and 202 girls studying in the above four schools during the year 1963-64. These pupils were supplied books and slates for which a sum of Rs.1783.25 was spent. Further a sum of Rs.11,903/- was spent towards the supply of midday meals to these pupils.

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Two boarding homes, one for boys and another for girls were being run at Attur Taluk. The strength of boys and girls in these hostels were 90 and 70 respectively. A sum of Rs.21708.45 was spent towards the maintenance of the boarding homes.

IV. Administration Report on Habitual Offenders Settlement at Aziznagar, South Arcot District for theyear 1963-64.

The Administrative Control of Aziznagar Settlement was transferred from the Police Department to the Director of Harijan Welfare on 15th June 1954 in accordance with the orders passed by the Government in their G.O.Ms.No.1522 I.L.C. dt. 10.6.54.

1. Personnel: Sri K.R.Krishnamurthy Rao continued as Manager, of the Settlement upto 26.12.63 Sri M.Gopala Panikkar, B.A., is the Manager for the Settlement from 27.12.63. The strength of the Ministerial staff is as follows:

There are three Instructors for the three industries viz. Weaving, Carpentry and leather, run by the Settlement.

2. Population:

The population of the settlement is as follows:

All the above were free settlers and were permanently residing in the settlement. Apart from them there were ten habitual offenders. Out of whom six habitual offenders were out of view and their whereabouts were also not known.

3. Agriculture:

The main occupation of the settlers is agriculture. The total extent of the settlement is 1411 acres. During the year under report an extent of 326.58 acres were cultivated with paddy and other crops. There was no seasonal rain during the period. Zambari tank is the main source of irrigation for this settlement. Paddy was harvested with poor yield and not upto the satisfaction of the settlers. The failure of crops was due to insufficient supply of water from the Zambari tank.

In general, the Agricultural wealth of the settlers has improved by the supply of plough bulls and agricultural implements every year. During the year under report, a sum of Rs.4000/- was spent under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme for the supply of ten pairs of plough bulls and agricultural implements to ten beneficiaries.

During the year under report, six beneficiaries were granted subsidy of Rs.750/- each and loan of Rs.750/- each for the sinking of wells outside the settlement as there is no possibility for sinking wells in the settlement.

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Cattle and Govt. Cart.

One pair of Govt. work bulls were being maintained properly as usual. A sum of Rs.937.50 was spent during the year for the maintenance of work bulls. The condition of the cattle owned by the settlers was found to be fair. The Govt. cart was also maintained properly. A sum of Rs.94/- was spent during the year for carrying out repairs to the cart. A total sum of Rs.74.21 was collected as cart hire during the year.

Industries:

The three Industries (i.e.) Carpentry, Weaving and Leather attached to through settlement continued to function as usual, providing alternative employment to the settlers. Each industry was in charge of a qualified Instructor. About twenty settlers were provided with work on an average in these Industries. The attendance in those three industries was gradually increasing and also not regular since several skilled workers are being employed in the Neyveli Lignite Corporation, Neyveli, which is at a distance of three miles from the settlement.

Carpentry Industry:

The work in this industry was normal due to lack of more workmen. About eight settlers were working in this industry. The No. of workers has reduced, as some of them got employment in the Neyveli Lignite Corporation, Neyveli nearby and in some other private firms outside the settlement. Some of the workers of this industry are not inclined to work in this industry as they diverted their attention to work in the Neyveli Lignite Corporation to eke out their livelihood. Standardised articles of furniture such as chairs with arms and without arms, Tables both for Junior Clerks and Senior Clerks, Record Racks, Record Boxes, Stools, Teapots, Platforms, Foot rest, benches, Karnams desks etc. were manufactured and supplied during the year.

A sum of Rs.10,395.53 was spent for this industry during the year as against the sanctioned allotment of Rs.10,400/-. The following items of furnitures were manufactured during the year.

There was heavy demand for handloom textiles, such as Dhothies, Towels, Shirting, Pavadi Cloth, Jacket cloth, Sarees and Carpets etc. Manufactured in this industry. Most of the goods produced in this industry were supplied to the Denotified Tribes students towards free clothing under State and Central Grants goods worth about Rs.4011.96. The total amount of sales during the year comes to Rs.4889/-. A sum of Rs.9999.98 was spent for this industry during the year as against the sanctioned allotment of Rs.10,000/-. 6. Education:

The amalgamated Co-educational Govt. Higher Elementary School at Aziznagar now converted as Senior Basic School continued to function satisfactorily. 7. Cooperative storey.

The Cooperative stores of this settlement is run by a Board of Directors consisting of seven members with the Manager of this settlement as Ex-Officio President. The activities of the stores are confined only to the supply of Midday Meals to the students of the school of Aziznagar Settlement.

8. Band Party

The permanent Band set of Aziznagar Settlement consisting of twelve members continued to function regularly. During the year the Set was engaged for thirty eight days in the district and outside the district and won the appreciation of the public. There was heavy demand for the engagement of the Band set especially in Marriage seasons. During the year under report a total sum of Rs.5532/- was collected by the Band set for the engagements.

9. Crime and Control.

The settlers were living in healthy surroundings and availing the opportunity afforded to them to enhance their earnings capacity and facilities for education. The discipline among the settlers continued to be satisfactory. Yet some of the settlers were not amenable to discipline and in the habit of committing petty crimes and quarrels here and there. Any amount of advice and warnings had no effect and in the interest of maintaining discipline in the settlement, it was quite necessary that a few had settlers who were not amenable to discipline were to be expelled from the settlement or to be registered and watched as Habitual Offenders to set an example to others.

10. Boys Home:

The Boys Home was opened by the Collector of South Arcot on 6.2.61 as per the instruction of the Inspector General of Police for bringing the bad juveniles to a good character, and it continued to function properly. The Rural Library was functioning with a few books and journals.

Under this scheme, about 1206 families have been provided with 1206 pairs of plough bulls and 162 families have been granted subsidy for sinking of 162 wells.

III. LAND COLONISATION:

The provision of Rs.5 lakhs sanctioned for the above scheme has been placed at the disposal of the Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Madras who is implementing the scheme. A sum of Rs.3.01 lakhs was spent during the year 1963-64.

IV. COTTAGE INDUSTRIES:

The provision sanctioned for 1963-64 is Rs.6.50 lakhs, out of which a sum of Rs.2.50 lakhs was distributed among the districts towards supply of free distribution of tools and appliances to the technically trained scheduled caste persons. The expenditure incurred during 63-64 on the above item is Rs.2.50 lakhs. Out of Rs.1 lakh placed at the disposal of the Director of Industries and Commerce, Madras, a sum of Rs.1.03 lakhs was spent towards organisation of Industrial Cooperative Societies for Scheduled Castes and a sum of Rs.1.25 lakhs has been placed at the disposal of the Secretary, State Khadi and Village Industries Board. An expenditure of Rs.74,230/- was incurred during 63-64.

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Further a sum of Rs.25,000 was also placed at the disposal of Director of Women's Welfare. The balance amount of Rs.1.50 lakhs was placed at the disposal of the Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Madras, towards organisation of Milk Supply Cooperative Societies for Harijans. An expenditure of Rs.3.61 lakhs was incurred during 63-64.

V. HOUSING.

During 63-64, a sum of Rs.6.30 lakhs was provided under Housing for Scheduled Castes. Under this scheme, houses were constructed at a cost of Rs.1000/- each.

During 63-64, an expenditure of Rs.6.42 lakhs was incurred towards the construction of houses.

2. GRANT-IN-AID SCHEMES FOR THE WELFARE OF SCHEDULED TRIBES.

During the Third Five Year Plan, under the Grant-in-aid schemes for the welfare of scheduled tribes, a sum of Rs.3.16 lakhs was provided for the implementation of various developmental schemes during the year 63-64.

A sum of Rs.77.81 lakhs was spent for the implementation of the schemes as detailed below:

The details of the schemes implemented under the above major heads are furnished below:-

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I. EDUCATION: Three new residential schools and five boarding homes were opened during the year under report.

Twenty-nine adult education centres were run in the State. Nine school buildings were constructed and 1020 scholarships were awarded for the benefit of Scheduled Caste students.

II. AGRICULTURE: A sum of Rs.400/- per head was sanctioned to the scheduled Tribes for the purchase of plough bulls, seeds and implements during the year 63-64. A sum of Rs.0.99 lakhs was utilised for the grant of this subsidy. Besides this subsidy of Rs.1500/- was granted for sinking of an irrigation well. A sum of Rs.0.59 lakhs was spent during the year under report and 43 wells were sunk.

III. COTTAGE INDUSTRIES: During the year under report four poultry units which continued to run in North Arcot District incurring an expenditure of Rs.0.05 lakhs.

Five Cottage Industries work Centres for Scheduled Tribes Women, in South Arcot, North Arcot, Tirunelveli, Kanyakumari and Salem districts were continued to run during the year, under the control of Director of Women's Welfare, Madras, G. A sum of Rs.0.09 lakhs was spent towards the maintenance of these centres.

Three centres at Madurai, the Nilgiris and North Arcot Districts were continued to run during the year under report by the Director of Industries and Commerce, Madras, 5, and a sum of Rs.0.32 lakh was spent towards the maintenance of these centres.

Further a sum of Rs. .22 lakhs was incurred by the State Khadi and Village Industries Board Madras for the supply and maintenance of the Bee-keeping Industry for the welfare of Scheduled Tribes in various districts.

IV. HOUSING: Under this programme, the subsidy for each house at Rs.750/- was granted and the beneficiaries had to contribute Rs.250/- by way of materials and labour. During the year under report, a sum of Rs.1.99 lakhs was spent towards the construction of 235 houses for the benefit of Scheduled Tribes in the State.

PUBLIC HEALTH: Under this scheme, twentyseven drinking water wells were sunk in various places for the benefit of Scheduled Tribes incurring an expenditure of Rs.0.70 lakhs. Further a sum of Rs.0.33 lakhs was incurred for providing cutcha road (i.e. link roads) to Tribal colonies.

VI. MEDICAL: Two medical units were maintained in North Arcot and the Nilgiris districts by the Medical Department. In addition to this one Mobile Medical Centre was opened in Madurai District incurring an expenditure of Rs.0.21 lakhs.

MISCELLANEOUS: One Tribal Model Village at Nedugal Gombai was sanctioned during 1962-63 and the execution is in progress during the year under report.

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3. GRANT-IN-AID SCHEMES FOR THE WELFARE OF BACKWARD CLASSES.

For the year 63-64, a sum of Rs.13.09 lakhs was provided under Grant-in-aid schemes for Backward Classes. A sum of Rs.29.05 lakhs was incurred as expenditure for the award of scholarships and boarding grants as detailed below:

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HOUSING FOR SWEEPERS AND SCAVENGERS.

During 63-64, the Government have sanctioned a sum of Rs.6 lakhs towards Housing for sweepers and scavengers. In order to give better living conditions for the persons engaged in unclean occupation, houses were constructed for sweepers and scavengers employed in local board at a cost of Rs.1500/- each. Out of this, a sum of Rs.750/- will be paid as subsidy and the balance to be met by the local bodies concerned. The entire amount was spent on the construction of 90 houses.

(ii) HOUSE SITES FOR HARIJANS

The allotment sanctioned for the above scheme was Rs.10.50 lakhs. House sites were given free of cost to all Harijans who did not own house sites already. A sum of Rs.10.05 lakhs was spent on the acquisition of 225 house sites.

(iii) SUPPLY OF WHEELBARROWS:

The provision made for 63-64 was Rs.4/- lakhs. Wheel barrows were supplied to the scavengers working in Municipalities and Panchayats through the agency of the Chief Electoral Officers, Madras. A sum of Rs.3.81 lakhs was spent on the supply of 2826 wheel barrows.

(iv) AWARD OF POST MATRIC SCHOLARSHIPS.

The provision made for 63-64 was Rs.4.32 lakhs. A sum of Rs.6.87 lakhs was spent on the award of 1103 scholarships.

2. CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES FOR THE WELFARE OF SCHEDULED TRIBES

A sum of Rs.0.40 lakhs was provided for the formation of Forest and Multipurpose Cooperative Societies during the period under report. This amount was placed at the disposal of the Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Madras for the implementation of the scheme. The Registrar of Cooperative Societies reported that a sum of Rs.0.2 lakhs was spent towards the five societies, two at the Nilgiris District and one each at Coimbatore, North Arcot and Tirunelveli Districts.

3. CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEME FOR THE WELFARE OF DENOTIFIED TRIBES.

During the Third five year plan a sum of Rs.100.00 lakhs was provided for the welfare of Denotified Tribes. Under this scheme, a sum of Rs.13.11 lakhs was set apart for implementing the welfare schemes for Denotified Tribes during the year under report. A sum of Rs.10.43 lakhs was spent under various schemes as detailed below:

EDUCATION:

The Denotified Tribes were provided with Educational facilities such as Scholarships, supply of mid day meals, books and free clothing, awarded of boarding grants etc. Hostels were also run for them and boarding and lodging facilities were given to them to enable to prosecute their studies in schools.

During 63-64, a sum of Rs.8.0 lakhs was incurred as expenditure towards the award of scholarships to 1277 students, boarding grants to 4300 pupils, maintenance of four hostels and construction of one building.

ECONOMIC UPLIFT:

Under the scheme, agricultural subsidy at Rs.400/- per family were sanctioned for the purchase of plough bulls, seeds etc. and Rs.1500/- was sanctioned on half loan and half grant basis for sinking of irrigation wells for agricultural purposes to the men and women of denotified community.

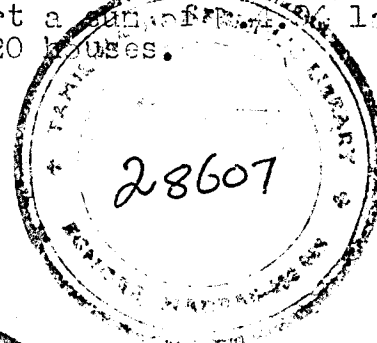
During the period under report, a sum of Rs.3.20 lakhs was spent towards the supply of 501 pairs of bulls and sinking of 135 wells.

COTTAGE INDUSTRIES:

Under this, Industrial Cooperative Societies were ~~not~~ opened and financial assistance rendered to the Denotified Tribes. Work centres were also opened to provide training for the women folk, as this would supplement their income. General purpose Engineering Work shops were opened under this scheme. Sewing machines, Leather stitching machines, tools for carpentry and Blacksmithy were also distributed to selected artisans. A sum of Rs.3.32 lakhs was spent under this scheme, during the period under report.

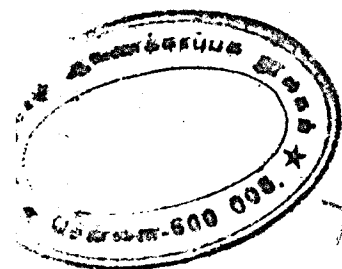
HOUSING.

To enable the Denotified Tribe people to settle in a place permanently, they were granted Rs.1000/- each subsidy of Rs.750/- and Rs.250/- as contribution by the beneficiary by way of labour or materials for each house during the period under report a sum of Rs.96 lakhs was spent towards the construction of 420 houses.
