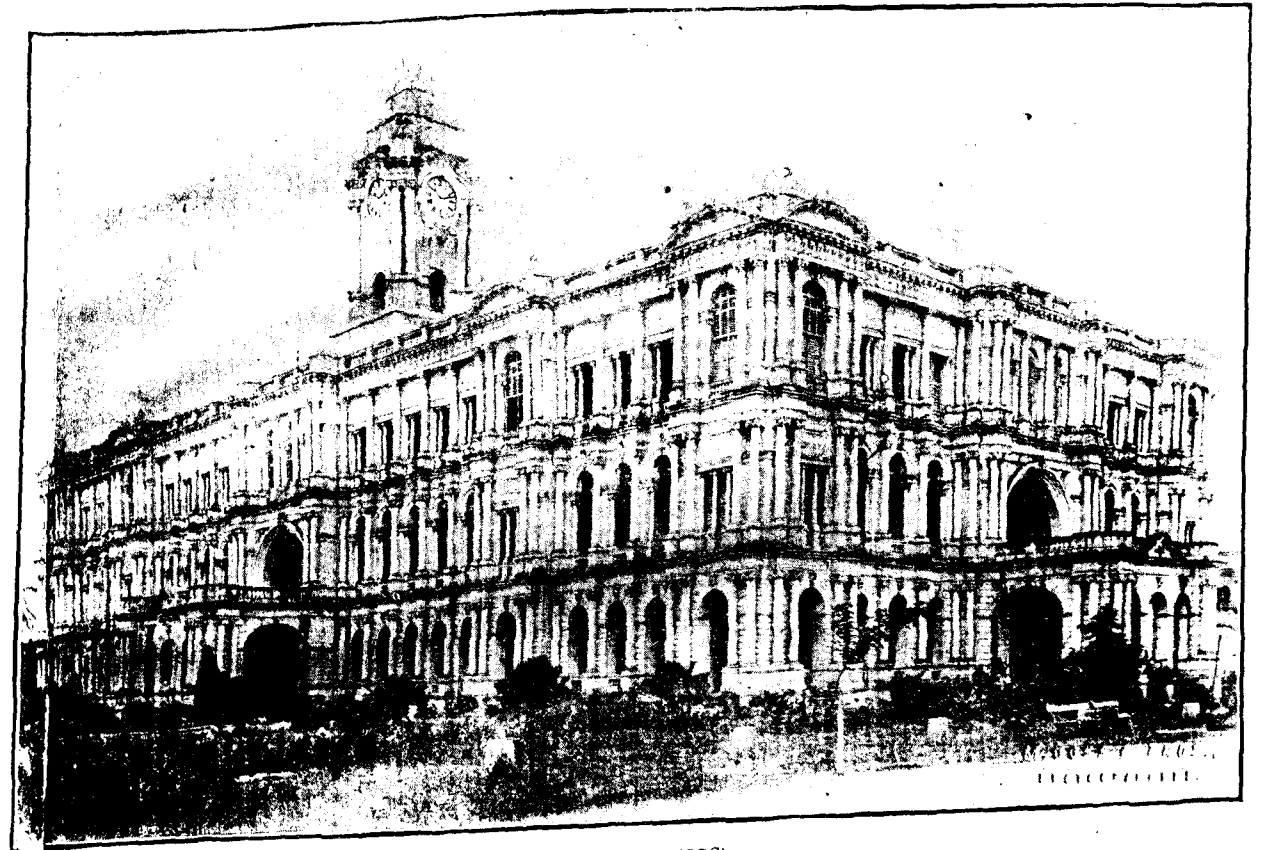

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INTRODUCTION.

I took charge of the office of the Commissioner on the 8th January 1937 and my work during the year under report covered a period of less than 3 months.

The Administration of a premier Corporation like that of Madras entirely depends on the satisfactory position of its finances and it is therefore imperative that the financial position should be maintained in sound condition. To meet this as also to avoid loss, it was necessary to examine the various items of revenues of the Corporation and to take steps for the speedy realisation of the same. Hence the first item of work that engaged my attention was the question of the collection of taxes.

On examination I found that the various taxes and fees payable to the Corporation were heavily in arrears and in some cases the dues were even time-barred. The practice obtaining in this Corporation appears to be to collect every year only a certain percentage of taxes as per the budget estimate and leave at the close of every year a considerable amount of taxes as arrears. The budget estimate is no criterion in the matter of collection and the policy must be to collect all the items of taxes and fees as far as possible leaving no arrears at the close of the year in view of the fact that the Act provides a very wide scope for realising the dues.

Instructions were therefore issued to all the officials of the Revenue Department to bestow greater attention in the matter of collections and to make all possible efforts for collecting the maximum amount. Having been mainly engaged in the elections to the Provincial Legislatures, till the end of February 1937, I could not seriously take up the collection work before the 1st March 1937. Though very satisfactory results could not be achieved within the very short period of one month, the efforts taken have not proved to be in vain as there was considerable improvement in the collections compared to the previous year.

Audit:—The disposal of audit objections appears to have been neglected for some years past. Due importance was not given to the speedy and prompt disposal of the objections with the result that as many as 12,905 objections covering a period of 8 years from 1927-28 were found to be pending disposal at the time I took charge. Government took very serious notice of this state of affairs and ordered that the Commissioner and the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts should consult each other and submit joint proposals for putting matters on a proper basis. The matter was discussed with the Examiner and the Heads of Departments at several Conferences and proposals were drawn up by the Examiner which were accepted by Government. Government were also pleased to sanction a special staff for looking after the arrear audit and the clearance of the objections was rushed through with a greater amount of strain. With the hearty co-operation of the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts, the audit staff and the several Heads of department, 12,369 objections were completely reviewed leaving 536 objections to be disposed of. These are being reviewed and the outstanding items have been reduced to the lowest minimum. The audit work has been brought up to date and a system of concurrent audit is being followed by which the objections of a particular month are reviewed by the end of the third month and it is hoped that the same position would be continued to be maintained. In G. O. No. MS. 2988 dated 7-8-37 Government have observed as follows in regard to the business done in this respect :—

“ Government note with approval that the long-standing audit objections relating to the transactions of the Corporation of Madras are now being dealt with in an efficient and expeditious manner ”.

The following are the other important items of work which engaged my attention.—

1. Propaganda by Civic talks.
2. Provision of public conveniences in the City.
3. Improvement of slums.
4. Reform of roads.

5. Municipalisation of Markets.
6. Removal of encroachments and plank projections.
7. Opening of additional schools and appointment of additional teachers.
8. Improvements to the Park and the Zoo.
9. Destruction of noxious Food sold on roadsides.

Propaganda by Civic talks.—The creation and rousing of civic consciousness among the public is an absolute necessity and propaganda by means of radio talks and distribution of pamphlets are very good aid in securing the above end.

The several departments of the Corporation were asked to broadcast messages on subjects connected with important Civic problems and other public amenities. Various messages on questions connected with Public Health, Education, Works and Finance were broadcasted both in English and Vernacular. The messages were received by the public in most cases with appreciation.

Provision of Public Conveniences.—The number of Flush-out latrines, Urinals and bathing places provided for the use of the public was quite insufficient to meet the needs of the City. The question of providing additional public conveniences was therefore examined and a comprehensive scheme for the provision of public conveniences at 69 places in the City costing Rs. 2.5 lakhs has been prepared and placed before the S.C. and Council for approval. To start with, the provision of Rs. 50,000 made in the budget in the current year has been proposed to be utilised towards the above scheme.

Improvement of Slums.—The existence of Slums contributes to a very great extent to the insanitary condition and the heavy mortality of the City. In the report of the Housing Committee which was approved in general by the Council a list of slums which are either to be removed wholly or improved has been furnished. A very large amount of loan will have to be raised for carrying out the complete scheme of improvements. In view of the fact that action should necessarily be taken against the owners of private cherries for carrying out improvements, it is necessary that the Corporation slums should first be improved. To begin with, the improvement of some of the cherries at a cost of Rs. 54,000 has been taken up and the proposal has been placed before the S. C. and Council.

Reform of roads.—In regard to the reform of roads the practice appears to be to carry out the work indiscriminately without any definite programme drawn up previously. Before applying for an allotment in the budget, the best course should be to draw up a programme of the roads requiring reform such as tarring, metalling & c., and prepare the necessary estimates for carrying out the work. It was found that most of the roads in Madras were woefully neglected and required reformation urgently. A comprehensive programme of the roads requiring immediate reform was drawn up at an estimated cost of Rs. 6,60,000 and the Council was pleased to sanction a supplemental grant of Rs. 2,67,500 in addition to the original allotment of Rs. 3,90,000 and the work is now in progress. The aim is to provide decent tarred roads in all parts of the City.

Municipalisation of Markets.—From a sanitary point of view it is necessary that private markets which are mostly maintained in a very insanitary condition should be municipalised. Municipalisation of Markets as a remunerative enterprise also deserves consideration. At present there are 42 markets besides the Sheep, Cattle and Poultry Shandies. The total estimated cost of acquiring all these markets will be about Rs. 22 lakhs. Before launching on a comprehensive scheme of acquiring all the markets in the City, a beginning has been made for the acquisition of 5 markets at an estimated cost of Rs. 3,57,600 and the proposals are under consideration by the S. C. and Council.

Removal of encroachments and plank projections.—The foot paths provided on road-sides for the convenience of pedestrians have in most places been used by squatters or other vendors. These occupations are unauthorised

and though the Corporation had the right to clear away the squatters and unauthorised occupiers, no action was practically taken in the direction. In many of the streets and roads in Madras in business quarters, the stall-holders have put up plank projections encroaching on the roadside land thus narrowing the width of the road and rendering the traffic practically impossible. These encroachments are a source of obstruction to the pedestrian and vehicular traffic and are responsible for serious accidents. To put an end to such nuisance, action is being regularly taken to remove these encroachments and to clear the pavements and foot-paths and render pedestrian traffic more convenient and safe.

Opening of Additional Schools.—As already pointed out the steps taken in the matter of improving the collections resulted in the collection of Education tax in excess of the amount anticipated in the budget and this resulted in a surplus closing balance of Rs. 58,845. According to the census of school going population, nearly 14,300 children are still to be provided with education and the Corporation having approved the policy of free and compulsory education throughout the City provision has to be made for the education of these children. It is proposed to provide for the present for the Education of 2550 additional pupils in poorer localities by opening 3 independent schools and 13 branch schools at an estimated cost of Rs. 17,800. Besides this the increased strength in the existing schools warrant the appointment of additional teachers and a proposal to appoint 20 additional teachers for the existing schools is also made. The balance is proposed to be utilised for additional accommodation and other amenities to existing schools. The proposal has been since sanctioned by the Council.

Improvements to the Park and the Zoo.—In an extensive and growing City like Madras, the provision of Parks and lawns is an imperative necessity as these would serve as lungs in over-congested areas. Proposals have been sanctioned for effecting improvements to the Peoples Park which is the pioneer Park in Madras and which is probably the most popular one here. My Ladyes Garden is proposed to be kept in trim throughout the year. Similar improvements are proposed to be effected for the Napier Park and other parks in the City and action is being taken in this respect.

A scheme for improving the Zoo, which has been fast dwindling and for making it more attractive and really worthy of the name, has been sanctioned and action is being taken to execute the improvements without delay.

A campaign of cleaning up the various markets in the city and rendering them more sanitary than what they were before was started and rigorous sanitary measures were enforced with very salutary results.

The campaign for seizing and destroying all noxious food that was sold on roadside and over gutters was similarly started in the interests of public health. This also met with good results.

Compared to other cities, the needs of Madras are rather heavy. The total mileage of roads in this city is much higher than in the other cities while our resources compare unfavourably with those of other cities. The cost of road reform, water supply, lighting, conservancy etc. is considerable. Tapping of new resources is therefore necessary. The Council is making a proposal to levy a tax on advertisements. This has not yet taken a definite shape.

The Council has seriously taken up the question of launching remunerative enterprises with a view to augment its resources, and with the ample scope available in Madras for such augmentation, the Corporation may probably hope to provide greater and better amenities than are available at present and to compare favourably with other pioneer cities in India.

CORPORATION OF MADRAS.

Report of the Commissioner from 1st April 1936 to 31st March 1937.

LEGISLATION.

During the year under report, the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 was amended by the Madras City Municipal (Amendment) Act 1936, (Madras Act X of 1936) which came into force on 21st April 1936.

The Amendment Act has introduced among others very many important changes in the constitution of the Corporation and in the provisions relating to taxation and the improvement of cheries and hutting grounds.

The changes introduced in the constitution of the Corporation and in the mechanism of its working are intended to have the effect of popularising the administration and associating a much wider circle of people in the task. It has secured a constituency really representative of the rate-payers by lowering the general qualifications of voters to vote, and thereby widening the franchise.

In the Amended Act the constitution of the Council has been liberalised; the strength having been raised from 50 to 65 and the elective strength from 41 to 60 (Divisional elections 45, elections by institutional bodies 14 and the appointment by the S.I.Ry. and M. & S. M. Ry., Companies 1.) Of the 45 seats allotted for divisional elections 40 are for general seats, 3 specially reserved for Adi-Dravidas and 2 specially reserved for labour.

The powers of the Local Government to nominate 9 members with a view to provide for representations of Mahomedans and other minority communities have been withdrawn and instead, provision is made for the election by the elected members of the Council of 5 Aldermen of whom one shall be a woman. The Act also provides that every person elected or appointed as Councillor or Alderman should take an oath of affirmation of his allegiance to the Crown.

With a view to the Councillors associating in larger numbers in the practical work of the administration and to turn into useful channels the special knowledge of individual members the Amended Act has introduced in place of four Standing Committees 6 Standing Committees dealing respectively with (1) Accounts, (2) Education, (3) Health, (4) Taxation and Finance excluding Taxation Appeals, (5) Town Planning and Improvements & (6) Works. The Council is also authorised with the previous sanction of the Local Government to constitute additional Standing Committees for such purposes as it thinks fit. The Amended Act also provides for the formation of a Committee for dealing with Taxation Appeals with a Chairman appointed by Government with or without remuneration as may be fixed by Government and two other members elected by the Council. Provision is also made for the election of a Deputy Mayor who is empowered to discharge the functions of the Mayor during his absence. Every meeting of the Council will have to be presided over by the Mayor, in his absence by the Deputy Mayor and in the absence of the Mayor and the Deputy Mayor by a Councillor or one of the Aldermen chosen by the meeting to preside for the occasion.

In addition to the Councillors referred to above the Act provides for the appointment by the Local Government of a person or persons having special knowledge or experience of any subject relating to the municipal administration to be Special Councillor or Councillors for such subject the number of such Special Councillors on the Council at any time being limited to three. The Council may if so required by the Local Government shall join with one, or more than one, other local authority in constituting a joint committee for any purpose in which they are jointly interested or for any matter for which they are jointly responsible. If any difference of opinion arises between the local

authorities constituting the joint committee it shall be referred to the Local Government whose decision shall be final.

With regard to the resources of the Corporation the Amended Act provides for the levy of a graded tax on properties and the levy of tax on advertisements in addition to the taxes authorised in the original Act.

The other changes introduced by the Amended Act are of considerable importance. The way of improving the amenities of the city and its general sanitation special provisions have been incorporated in the Act with a view to enable the Corporation to exercise necessary and effective control over owners of buildings in areas of the city for the purpose of ensuring the sanitation of the city. Provision of other necessary amenities thereto. The Commissioner and Standing Committees are empowered for effectively dealing with insanitary premises and hutting grounds which are the root causes for heavy mortality rates in the City. The Amended Act provides for the appointment by the Corporation of an Electrical Engineer, a Water Works Engineer, and an Educational Officer who will also be Heads of departments working under the Commissioner along with the other Heads of departments under the original Act.

Elections.

(2) The Amended Act 1936, introduced changes in the territorial divisions and the qualifications for franchise. The electoral rolls for the year 1936-37 had to be revised in conformity with the amended provisions of Act IV of 1919. On final revision, it was found that the total number of electors for the 40 General Seats and the 3 seats specially reserved for Adi-Dravidas was 36,052 of whom 29,167 were males and 6,885 females. The names of electors belonging to the Adi-Dravida community were shown separately at the end of each divisional roll. The percentage of Adi-Dravida electors on the electoral roll with reference to their total population in the City was 1.03. The percentage of the aggregate number of electors of other communities with reference to their total population was 6.13. On the preparation of the rolls for the two seats specially reserved for Labour it was found that the total number of electors, was 10,412.

The elections for the 40 general seats, the 3 seats specially reserved for Adi-Dravidas and the 2 seats specially reserved for Labour were held on 26th October 1936. The elections in almost all the divisions were contested, except those for the general seats in divisions 7, 12, 32 and 37 and the reserved seat for Adi-Dravidas in Division 29.

On the completion of the counting of votes which took place the next day viz., 27-10-1936 it was found that ten candidates had forfeited their deposits of Rs. 100 as each had failed to obtain 1/8 of the total number of votes polled in their respective divisions.

Representatives of the South Indian Chamber of Commerce:—M. R. Ry. Rao Sahib T. S. Kachapakesa Mudaliar and Mr. M. J. Md. Ibrahim Sahib Bahadur who were elected Councillors on 18-6-35 continued to hold office till the formation of the new Council.

Representative of the Harbour Trust Board:—Mr. G. G. Armstrong who was elected Councillor in place of Mr. G. P. Alexander with effect from 5-11-35 continued to hold office till the formation of the new Council.

Representative of the Anglo-Indian Association of South India:—Mr. J. Flory who was elected Councillor on 2-7-1935 resigned his seat on the Council on 14-9-1936 and no Councillor was elected in his place till the formation of the new Council.

Representative of the University of Madras:—M. R. Ry. Dewan Bahadur A. Ramaswamy Mudaliar who was elected Councillor on 1-1-1935 ceased to be a councillor on 2-7-1936. No councillor was elected in his place.

Councillors appointed by Government:—Mrs. K. Alamelu Mangathayammal, Mr. T. S. Nataraja Pillai, Rao Sahib N. Sivaraj, Mr. J. Sivashunmugam Pillai, Mr. C. Masilamony Pillai, Major. W. S. E. Money and Khan Sahib Md. Abdulla Sahib Bahadur who were appointed Councillors on 3-11-1933, 30-7-1935, 30-7-1935, 30-7-1935, 16-4-1935, 29-10-1935 and 30-7-1935 respectively continued to hold office till the formation of the new Council. Kumara Rajah M. A. Muthiah Chettiar of Chettinad who was appointed Councillor on 26-6-1934 ceased to be a Councillor on 10-10-1936. Mr. R. Dann who was appointed councillor on 29-10-1935 ceased to be a Councillor on 20-4-1936 and no Councillor was appointed by Government in his place.

Executive Officers.

3. Khan Bahadur J. Hussain, Bar.-at-law, continued to hold the office of the Commissioner till 8th January 1937 when he proceeded on leave for four months and reverted to Government service and Dewan Bahadur R. Subbayya Naidu Garu was appointed Commissioner from 8-1-1937 and he continued to hold the office of the Commissioner during the year under report. Mr. S. Subramaniam Chetty continued to hold the office of the Revenue Officer till 5-1-37 when he was granted leave on average salary for three months and he died on 2-4-1937. Pending the appointment of a Revenue Officer Mr. S. Kalyanasundaram Ayyar was appointed under Sec. 87 (4) of the Act to hold the office of the Revenue Officer temporarily from 26-1-1937. He continued to hold office till 6-2-1937 when he was granted leave on grounds of ill-health. In his place Mr. T. A. Subramania Ayyar was appointed by the Council under Sec. 87 (4) to hold the office of the Revenue Officer temporarily and he continued to hold the office till the close of the official year. Mr. I. Kuriyan, Dr. C. S. Govinda Pillai, Rao Bahadur C. V. Krishnaswamy Chetty, Mr. T. R. Sreenivasa Chariar and Mr. S. Satchithanandam Pillai continued to hold the offices of the Engineer, the Health Officer, the Electrical Engineer, the Special Drainage Engineer and the Educational Officer respectively during the year under report. The question of appointment of a Water Works Engineer newly created in the Am. Act was pending consideration by the Council.

Meetings:—

4. During the year the Corporation held 12 Ordinary meetings, 24 Adjourned Ordinary meetings, 11 Special meetings, 3 Adjourned Special meetings, and one meeting which proved abortive for want of quorum. The average number of Councillors including the Mayor present at each meeting of the Council under the Original Act of 1919 was 32 as against 35 in the previous year and that under the Amended Act was 46.2, the percentage of attendance of the Councillors under the original Act of 1919 to the sanctioned strength was 77.6 among divisional Councillors, 40.1 among Institutional Councillors and 51.8 among Councillors appointed by Government. The percentage of attendance of the Councillors as constituted under the Amended Act to the sanctioned strength was 77.5 among elected divisional Councillors and Aldermen, 65.4 among Institutional and appointed Councillors.

The Standing Committee dealing respectively with (1) T. and F., (2) Works, (3) Health and (4) Education constituted under the original Act met 12, 9, 12, 9 times respectively and the Standing Committee dealing respectively with (1) T. and F. (2) Works (3) Health (4) Education (5) Town Planning and (6) Accounts constituted under the Amended Act met 22, 13, 11, 10, 7 and 14

times respectively and the number of subjects disposed of by the various Committees during the year were as follows :—

5. (a) The Council at its meeting on 7-4-1936 referred the proposals of the Commissioner for strengthening the supervisory staff of the Education Department to an *Ad Hoc* Committee consisting of the following Councillors for scrutiny and report :—

(2) The Council at its meeting on 24-11-1936 appointed an *Ad Hoc* Committee consisting of the Chairmen of the Standing Committees and Messrs. T. P. Meenakshisundaram Pillai, Rao Bahadur K. V. Krishnaswami Iyer and M. Damodaram Naidu to scrutinise the draft regulations framed under Section 20 of the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919.

The Committee had not concluded its deliberations on the subject till the close of the official year.

(3) The Council at its meeting held on 2-2-1937 passed the following resolution :—

"This Council resolves that the recommendations of the Housing Committee (1934) regarding the Beggar Problem in the city be given effect to forthwith and a special committee consisting of Chairmen of the various Standing Committees be appointed to submit a practical scheme as soon as possible for the same."

The Committee had not completed its consideration till the close of the year.

(4) The Council at its meeting on 27-2-1937 passed the following resolution :—

"This Council requests the Commissioner not to allow hawkers in the open space of the Moore Market compound to squat and hawk goods with or without permit, as it is a source of great nuisance and annoyance to the people who resort to the Market and also to the stall holders in the evening bazaar as well as main market"

and referred the matter to a Committee consisting of the following members :—

1. Mr. K. Bhashyam Iyengar, 2. Mr. M. S. Subramania Iyer, 3. Mr. T. V. Ethirajulu Chetty, 4. Mr. N. Rajagopalan, 5. Mr. A. R. Venkatram Achar, 6. Mr. Gopathy Janakiram Chetty, and 7. Mr. G. Rungiah Naidu (Convenor).

The Committee concluded its deliberations in the matter and their report is before the Council for approval.

Important Resolutions of the Council.

5. (b) *Circulating Library*.—The Council at its meeting on 7-4-1936 approved the proposal to open a circulating library for the rate-payers of the 30th Division as an experimental measure for a period of one year and sanctioned the necessary expenditure therefor.

The circulating library was opened on 23-10-1936.

(2) *Corporation Treasury Cheque Fraud*.—The Council at its meeting on 5.3 July 1936 passed the following resolution in connection with the investigation carried on by the Deputy Commissioner of Police, Crime Branch, in regard to the Cheque fraud case.

"That the Government be requested to depute a senior qualified Officer to report on the system of accounting in the Revenue and other departments with a view to suggest necessary improvements."

The resolution of the Council was communicated to Government. In G. O. No. MS. 3725 dated 24-8-1936 Government ordered that the matter may be referred to them for consideration after the 2 cases of defalcations of the moneys belonging to the Corporation are disposed of.

(8) The Council at its meeting held on 7-7-1936 passed the following resolution in connection with the investigation carried on by the Deputy Commissioner of Police in regard to Cheque fraud case.

"That the Commissioner be requested to arrange immediately with Messrs. Fraser & Ross to have an audit of the accounts of the Revenue Department for the last 3 years and that in the meanwhile the Commissioner be requested to address Government to bear the cost."

The accounts were examined by Messrs. Fraser and Ross and their report is now under the consideration of the Council. Government were addressed to bear the cost of the audit, but in G. O. No. M. S. 3725 dated 24-8-1936 Government refused to meet any portion of the cost of such examination from provincial funds.

(4) *Victory Memorial Building*.—The Council at its meeting on 14-7-1936 approved the proposal for taking over the Victory Memorial from the Victory Memorial Committee as resolved by the Council on 11-12-1934 subject to the following conditions :—

- (a) The Victory Memorial shall be maintained properly.
- (b) No person shall be allowed to enter on the buildings save for the purpose of viewing and inspecting them.
- (c) At least two watchmen shall be employed to take care of the buildings at all times during the day and night.
- (d) The Corporation shall insure and keep insured the Memorial to the extent of Rs. 2 lakhs against all loss and damage by storm

and earthquake and also against riots provided the total yearly premium does not exceed Rs. 275.

- (c) The Corporation shall hold the sum of Rs. 50,000 upon trust and invest the same in duly authorised trust securities and use the income arising therefrom for the maintenance of the buildings.
- (1) The Corporation shall hold the said sum of Rs. 50,000 in trust for the ex-service Association, India, in case the Memorial is destroyed or ceases to exist.

The resolution was given effect to.

(5) *Congratulatory Message*:—The Council at its meeting on 21-7-1936 passed the following resolution:—

The Mayor and the Councillors of the Madras Corporation desire to express their heartfelt thanks and humble congratulations on His Majesty's merciful escape from the recent attempt made on his life".

The resolution was duly forwarded to Government for communication to His Majesty the King Emperor.

(6) *Overbridge*:—The Council at its meeting on 4-8-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"That the Government be requested to reconsider its decision as regards the overbridge at Gengu Reddy Road and the Government be requested to contribute half of 1.35 lakhs which is necessary after the South Indian Railway Company contributes 0.60 lakh and that the Government be requested to reconsider its decision regarding an overbridge at the High Court Level Crossing".

The resolution was communicated to Government. In G.O. No. Ms. 4815 dated 3-11-1936 Government declined to sanction the proposal and the matter is again placed before the Council.

(7) *Teaching of Hindi*:—The Council at its meeting on 4-8-1936 passed the following resolution:

"That the Council do reiterate its previous resolution in regard to the inclusion of 'Hindi' as one of the subjects to be taught in the Corporation Schools and requests the Government to reconsider their orders in the matter."

The resolution was communicated to Government. In G. O. No. 1908 Education dated 9-10-1936 Government expressed their inability to reconsider the orders already passed on the subject.

(8) *Contribution*:—The Council at its meeting on 18-8-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"That this Council sympathises with the sufferers in the recent flood in Lucknow and resolves to contribute a sum of Rs. 1000 for relief of the distressed".

The resolution was duly communicated to Government. In G. O. No. Ms. 4756 dated 29-10-1936 Government declined to sanction the proposal in view of the unsatisfactory financial position of the Corporation.

(9) *Terminal Tax*:—The Council at its meeting on 18-8-1936 passed the following resolution:

"This Council requests the Government to give permission to the Madras Corporation to levy terminal tax on Easter and Xmas Holidays concession ticket holders who arrive at Madras at that time by Rail".

The resolution was duly communicated to Government but in G.O. No. Ms. 4695 dated 27-10-36 Government refused to reopen the question as

there had been no change in the position subsequent to their previous order communicated in G. O. No. 1974 L. & M. dated 11-5-26.

(10) *Improvement Trust*:—The Council at its meeting on 9th September 1936 passed the following resolution:

"This Council requests the Government to undertake necessary legislation at a very early date for the constitution of an Improvement Trust for the City of Madras as suggested by the Mayor in his note dated 26-8-1936".

The resolution was communicated to Government. In G. O. No. MS. 2425 dated 26-6-37 Government suggested the advisability of appointing an Architect for scrutiny of building plans, alignment of roads etc., and the matter is under consideration.

(11) *Assessment*:—The Council at its special meeting held on 13-10-1936 passed the following resolution:

"This Council hereby prescribes under Section 372 that separate notices to individual assesses affected in general revision of 1936-37 be issued stating that revision petitions will be considered if they reach the Municipal Office within 30 and 15 days as the case may be from the date of service of the notice and requests the Commissioner to issue notices as now prescribed by the Council".

As the resolution of the Council was legally opposed to the provisions of the Madras City Municipal Act it was not possible to give effect to the resolution and the matter was duly reported to the Council for information.

(12) *Appreciation of service*:—The Council at its meeting held on 20-10-1936 passed the following resolution:

"This Council places on record its appreciation of the services of Mr. Abdul Hameed Khan as Mayor of Madras".

The resolution was duly Communicated.

(13) *Congratulatory Message*:—The Council at its meeting on 24-11-1936 passed the following resolution:

"This Council tenders its respectful congratulations to His Highness the Maharaja of Travancore and his Dewan Sir C.P. Ramaswami Iyer on the courageous and gracious act of throwing open to all classes of Hindus by Royal Proclamation all temples of the state."

The resolution was duly communicated.

(14) *Contribution*:—The Council at its meeting on 24-11-1936 passed the following resolution:

"That this Council do sanction a sum of Rs. 1,000 towards relief of sufferers who have been affected by the recent cyclone in Guntur District".

The contribution of Rs. 1,000/- was paid to the Collector of Guntur with the sanction of Government (Vide G.O. No. Ms. 5376 dated 14-12-1936).

(15) *Auction of unserviceable articles*:—The Council at its meeting on 1-12-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"1. That all articles to be auctioned must be certified by the Heads of Departments after inspection to the effect that they are unserviceable and (2) that all the unserviceable articles of all departments are to be collected at one central place periodically and the auction to be held in the presence of an Officer not lower than the rank of an Assistant Revenue Officer on a day to be widely published".

The resolution of the Council is being given effect to.

(16) *Clotning*.—The Council at its meeting on 1-12-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council resolves to supply the undermentioned dress to the Sanitary Inspectors:

- Khaki Khadi shirts with open collar (3 Nos.)
- Khaki Khadi Shorts (3 Nos.)
- Khadi Hat (1 No.)
- Stockings (1 pair)
- Brown Boots (1 pair)
- Badges made of Brass (1 No.)".

The resolution was given effect to.

(17) *Clotting*.—The Council at its meeting on 8-12-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council resolves that all the clothing purchased by the Corporation of Madras for use by its staff be made of hand spun and hand woven khadi"

The resolution of the Council is being given effect to.

(18) *Portrait*.—The Council at its meeting on 8-12-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council resolves that in all Corporation Educational Institutions the portrait of Mahatma Gandhi will be put up in a conspicuous place".

Necessary sanction by the Divisional Inspector of Schools, South Range has since been accorded. Action is being taken to put up the portraits in Schools.

(19) *Otteri Bridge*.—The Council at its meeting on 9-12-1936 passed the following resolution.

"This Council resolves that the Otteri Bridge situated at the junction of Strahans Road and Cooks Road in point of narrowness and heavy bus traffic, be broadened".

Necessary plans and estimates have been prepared. The work will be taken up as soon as the loan is sanctioned by Government.

(20) *Electric Supply rates*.—On the Government Memo. No. 1544 E-36-14 dated 26-10-1936 regarding revision of rates by the Madras Electric Supply Corporation for supply of energy to the public and others the Council at its meeting on 22-12-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council is of opinion that the G. O. which has been issued in respect of this matter is unsatisfactory and considers that the reductions given by the Company in respect of the rates are halting and niggardly. This Council therefore calls upon Government to go into the matter once again in the light of public criticism and reduce the rates further so as to benefit the poorest classes of consumers."

The resolution was duly communicated to Government.

(21) *Monthly Budget*.—The Council at its meeting on 11-1-1937 passed the following resolution.

"That this Council resolves to accept the recommendation of the S.C. (Accounts) to introduce a monthly estimate of receipts and expenditure".

This has been given effect to.

(22) *Cleaning of River*.—The Council at its meeting on 26-1-1937 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council notes with concern that the Government does not keep the Cooum River in a clean and sanitary condition as this is

endangering the health of the citizens of Madras and impresses upon the Government the urgent necessity to take early steps to maintain in a clean condition the Cooum River and the Adyar River and Buckingham Canal within the limits of the City".

The resolution was communicated to Government.

(23) *Shelter of Passengers*.—The Council at its meeting on 26-1-1937 passed the following resolution:

"This Council resolves that in view of the terrible hardships to which the passengers are subjected, due to sun and rain at the bus stand, opposite to the Central Station, a suitable shed be constructed immediately for the shelter of the passengers at the bus stand".

The contractor to whom the contract was awarded having refused to execute the agreement in accordance with the pattern suggested by the Commissioner of Police the work has been taken up departmentally and it will be executed in due course.

(24) *Treasury*.—The Council at its meeting on 2-2-1937 passed the following resolution:

"That the Revenue Officer of the Corporation of Madras do at least on one day in each month personally check the cash book entries of the day and the balance with the actual cash on hand and certify the correctness of the same on that day itself".

This is being done regularly every month.

(25) *Municipalisation of private markets*.—The Council at its meeting on 2-2-1937 passed the following resolution:

"This Council resolves that the Commissioner be requested to put up proposals for acquiring and municipalising the private markets within a period of 5 years".

Specific proposals have been put up for Municipalisation of markets and the matter is pending consideration before the Standing Committees (Taxation and Finance) and Health.

(26) *Dog ward*.—The Council at its meeting on 2-2-1937 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council resolves that the dog ward situated in the Veterinary College compound be shifted to a place where it will not be a source of nuisance to the occupants of houses in the neighbourhood or that steps be taken to minimise the nuisance and that the Government be addressed in the matter."

The resolution was communicated to Government and the matter was referred by Government to the Principal, Veterinary College for necessary action—(Vide G. O. No. 9257-1—dated 1-5-1937.)

(27) *Addressing of employees*.—The Council at its meeting on 23-2-1937 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council recommends to the Commissioner to instruct the officers of the Corporation to use the correct names in addressing their employees, particularly members of the Adi-Andhra and Oddar etc., communities and not to use abbreviated names, Lokiah as Logadu, Chengiah as Chengadu, Nagiah as Nagadu etc.,

Necessary instructions have been issued in the matter.

(28) *Purchase of Indian articles*.—The Council at its meeting on 23-2-1937 passed the following resolution:—

"Whereas it has been expressed in this Council that Indian made materials are to be used wherever quality and price compare favourably and available in the country this Council regrets to notice the non-insistence of this express opinion in the

departmental purchases and in tenders for contract for supplies and constructions."

The resolution is given effect to wherever possible.

(29) *Acquisition*.—The Council at its meeting on 2-3-1937 approved the following resolutions of the Standing Committee (Town Planning and Improvements).

"1. This Committee recommends to the Council the Commissioner's proposal to acquire the Harness and Saddlery Factory area of about 148 acres from the Military authorities immediately".

Necessary provision has been made in the budget under Loan Funds. Negotiations with the owners of the property having failed it is proposed to acquire the lands under the Land Acquisition Act.

"2. *Perambore Rifle Range*.—Further it is of opinion that opportunity should be taken to acquire the Perambore Rifle Range of about 67 acres which may be acquired for extending the Corporation dumping ground or for poor class housing".

Necessary provision has been made in the budget under Loan Funds. Negotiations with owners of the property having failed it is proposed to acquire the lands under the Land Acquisition Act.

(30) *Filling up of low lying land*.—The Council at its meeting on 2-3-1937 passed the following resolution.

"This Council resolves to fill all low-lying lands with rubbish covering each day's collections with sufficient earth".

This is being done.

(31) *Presentation of Civic Addresses*

(a) The Council at its meeting on 9-9-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"That a civic address of welcome be presented to the members of the South African Delegation on their ensuing visit to the City that a sum of Rs. 100 be sanctioned for the purpose".

The address was presented on 24-9-1936.

(b) The Council at its meeting held on 30-9-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"That a civic address of welcome be presented to Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru on his visit to Madras, and that a sum of Rs. 250 be sanctioned for meeting the expenses."

The address was presented on 7-10-1936.

(c) The Council at its special meeting held on 24-11-1936 passed the following resolution:—

"This Council do present a civic address to Sirdar Vallabhai Patel on his ensuing visit to Madras and a sum not exceeding Rs. 100 be spent therefor and that the National Flag of India be used among the decorations for the Council Chamber and the Ripon Buildings on the occasion."

The address was presented on 14-12-1936.

(d) The Council at its meeting on 2-2-1937 passed the following resolution:—

"That a civic address of welcome be presented to H.H. the Maharaja and Her Highness the Maharani of Travancore on their ensuing visit to Madras and that a sum of Rs. 200 be sanctioned for the same".

The address was presented on 17-2-1937.

Capital Account

6. (1) The year opened with a balance of Rs. 21,43,893-3-2 as against Rs. 26,33,735-12-2 in the previous year and this is made up of

The Corporation received from Government during the year a free grant of Rs. 2,61,304 for the improvement of Drainage and Rs. 32,344 for water supply. A loan of Rs. 8 lakhs was received from Government during the year as against Rs. 5 lakhs in the previous year for the following works—

The total receipts (inclusive of the opening balance) amounted to Rs. 33,21,052-0-8. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 12,71,979-7-1. The amount spent on Mambalam Scheme was Rs. 51,049-1-1 that on Capital Works from the General Account was Rs. 1,11,402-14-8 and that on New Water Supply and Drainage Works was Rs. 7,70,652-0-3. The expenditure on the extension of Electric Lighting was Rs. 2,78,612-12-4 and that under Advances Rs. 60,262-10-9. The balance at the close of the year was Rs. 20,49,072-9-7. Of this balance the amount relating to General Account was Rs. 5,46,798-10-5, that relating to Water Supply and Drainage Account was Rs. 11,47,211-2-9 to the Lighting Account was Rs. 2,50,125-15-10 and to Mambalam Scheme Rs. 1,13,325-0-10 and Rs. —8,388-1-3 under advances.

Ordinary Account.

(2) The balance at the beginning of the year was Rs. 5,26,409-14-0 as against Rs. 2,08,423-6-5 in the previous year. The Revenue from all sources amounted to Rs. 68,11,101-1-1 as against Rs. 68,22,755-8-3 in the previous year. The receipts under the General Account amounted to Rs. 39,54,551-0-2 (including Rs. 1225-3-8 realised from the sale of land Extraordinary), under the lighting account Rs. 6,06,217-7-2 under Water Supply and Drainage Account Rs. 18,24,300-1-11 under Mambalam Town Planning Account Rs. 2,47,042-10-7 and under advances Rs. 1,78,989-13-3. Towards the above income the taxation proper alone contributed to Rs. 47,38,109-12-8 as against Rs. 46,43,454-7-2 in the previous year. During the year the contribution to the Education Fund amounted to Rs. 3,20,000 and the expenditure under Extraordinary items amounted to Rs. 80,111-5-1. The total expenditure, excluding the contribution to the Education fund and expenditure under Extraordinary items amounted to Rs. 68,50,439-11-4 against an estimate of Rs. 60,39,450 and against the actuals of Rs. 60,72,951-15-8 in 1935-36. The balance at the close of the year was Rs. 10,86,959-14-8.

Of this Rs. 4,69,908-9-9 represents the balance under General Account Rs. 15,369-9-1 under lighting account Rs. 4,00,381-1-7 under the Water and Drainage Account, Rs. 3,78,476-9-7 under Town Planning Account and Rs. 1,77,175-15-4 under advances.

PROPERTY TAX.

Current.

7. (1) *Rate*.—The consolidated rate of property tax for the year under report was levied at 15½ per cent. on the annual value of all buildings and lands as

in the previous year. The percentages fixed by the Council for the items comprised in it are as follows:—

In pursuance of G. O. No. 3180 L. & M., dated 12-11-1924 the Mam-balam area with the exception of the streets mentioned below for which the property tax was levied in full from the year shown against them, continued to receive the benefit of exemption from the Water and Drainage tax in full. The consolidated rate of tax for this area was therefore 11½ per cent. made up of 8½ per cent for tax for general purposes and 2½ per cent. for lighting tax.

As these streets received the benefit of Water Supply System of the City from the years specified, the property tax was levied at the full rate of 15½ per cent.

Education tax continued to be levied at 1½ per cent. on the annual value of all buildings and lands.

(2) *General Progress in annual value*:—The annual value of all buildings and lands in the City as determined under Section 100 of the Act was Rs. 2,35,81,004 during the year under report. 1208 new buildings came in for assessment and their annual value was Rs. 3,13,052. 1536 old buildings underwent structural alterations and this increased the annual valuation by Rs. 3,64,435 on account of revision of assessment. 310 buildings were demolished during the year and this decreased the demand by Rs. 73,418. The gross increase by the amendment of assessments on account of new constructions and re-construction of buildings and the rise in rental value of old buildings under Rule 3 Schedule IV of the Act was Rs. 843,194. As against this, there was reduction by Rs. 1,87,239 on account of subsequent amendments and cancellations. The net increase during the year was Rs. 6,60,955. At the close of the year the annual value increased to Rs. 2,42,41,959.

(3) *Completion of Property Tax Registers*:—Public notice under Rule 2. Schedule IV of the Act of 1919 as amended by the Madras Act X of 1936 was given on 30-9-1936 in the leading local daily newspapers (English and Vernacular) of the fact of completion of Property Tax Registers of six divisions viz., 2, 8, 10, 12, 17 & 18 that underwent general revision.

Application for revision of assessment:—The number of applications received as valid for revision of assessment of the standing valuation and enhanced valuation was 4114 as against 5034 in the previous year. 1430 appeals were disposed of by the Commissioner as against 4433 in the previous year. The applicants expressed dissatisfaction in 105 cases. There was one meeting of the Standing Committee (T. & F.) on 4-4-1936 and it disposed of 65 cases. The Madras City Municipal Amendment Act X of 1936 created the

Taxation Appeals Committee to hear the appeals against the orders of the Commissioner. The Taxation Appeals Committee after it was constituted on 1-9-1936 held 15 meetings during the year and disposed of 746 cases. Only 2 appeals were made to the Small Causes Court against the decision of the Taxation Appeals Committee. One case was decided against the Corporation and the other was dismissed with costs.

Exemption:—In pursuance of the Council's resolution under proviso (b) to Section 102 of the Amended Act, exemption from property tax was given in 8 cases, the annual value of which was less than Rs. 36 and this reduced the demand by Rs. 287-8-0.

Result of revision of assessments:—There was a gross increase from General and other casual revision of assessments of Rs. 98,109-10-7 as against Rs. 1,18,906-1-4 in the previous year the reason for the decrease being that the general revision could be given effect to only for the 2nd half-year of 1936-37 and not for the 1st half-year of 1936-37 as the Amended Act X of 1936 required publication prior to the commencement of the half-year which could not be done for 1/1936-37. The gross increase on account of general revision of assessments in six divisions viz., 2, 8, 10, 12, 17 and 18 was Rs. 22,860-7-5 as against Rs. 44,079-8-0 in the previous year. The net increase after disposal of the appeals in these six divisions was Rs. 22,210-11-4. As a result of the reductions made on appeals against both the enhanced and the standing assessments by the orders of the Commissioner and the Taxation Appeals Committee, the net increase was Rs. 71,488-14-4 as against Rs. 33,536-13-6 in the preceding year.

Demand:—The gross demand for the year amounted to Rs. 40,44,284-1-0 as against Rs. 40,14,887-10-0 in the previous year. After reductions and cancellations made by the Commissioner and the Taxation Appeals Committee the demand amounted to Rs. 40,17,663-4-9 as against Rs. 39,29,518-6-2 in the previous year.

Collection:—The gross collection amounted to Rs. 33,75,635-10-9 as against Rs. 32,64,821-11-5. The net collection after deducting the refunds etc., was Rs. 33,68,645-10-1 as against Rs. 32,55,174-10-0 in the previous year.

Taxes payable by the Madras Port Trust:—A sum of Rs. 1,24,088-5-2 was provisionally recovered during the year under report, for property and education taxes. After the gross earnings of the year were settled in the Port Trust Accounts, the demand was settled at Rs. 1,27,127-1-7. The balance of Rs. 3,038-12-5 due has since been recovered.

Taxes payable by the Government Departments:—Against a demand of Rs. 3,95,940 due by the Government for the year 1936-37, a sum of Rs. 3,87,040 was recovered during the year under report. Of the balance of Rs. 8,900 a sum of Rs. 3,780 has since been recovered and the balance of Rs. 5,120 as also the prior arrears of Rs. 1,250 form the subject of correspondence.

Taxes payable by the M. & S. M. Ry. Co., Ltd.:—The demand of Rs. 98,588-6-2 against the M. & S. M. Ry. Co., Ltd., was recovered in full during the year under report. Recovery of a sum of Rs. 6,500 due towards prior arrears is under correspondence.

Taxes payable by the S.J. Ry. Co., Ltd.:—The demand of Rs. 71,754-10-8 against the South Indian Railway Co., Ltd., was recovered in full during the year under report.

Taxes payable by persons in the Property List Ledger:—Out of a demand of Rs. 7,55,920 due for the year 1936-37 from the persons in the property list ledger, a sum of Rs. 7,37,354 was recovered during the year under report. Of the balance of Rs. 18,566, a sum of Rs. 2,644 has since been recovered. The balance of Rs. 15,922 as also the prior arrear of Rs. 20,382 is pending recovery. As in most of the cases objections have been raised to the demand for various reasons, recovery could not be effected, and recovery is being made after scrutiny, of such sum as is actually due.

Remission:—A sum of Rs. 30,067-8-5 only was remitted on account of vacancy and other causes as against Rs. 70,079-12-10 in the previous year. Under Section 105 (b) of the Amended Act, claims for vacancy remission could be admitted only for the number of days the building remained vacant after the receipt of notice of vacancy in the municipal office whereas under the old provisions the whole period of actual vacancy was taken into account. Again, assessments have been levied for the full half-year for buildings newly constructed, and the old assessments revised for the full half-year for those reconstructed unless a notice has been given within 15 days from the date of completion of construction or reconstruction. Remission for the broken period during a half-year before the date of completion could not be allowed in the absence of a claim in accordance with the amended provisions. The amount of remission has fallen by failure of owners to give notices in time. Notices of vacancy, 3467 in number, were received during the year. In 701 cases claims were not admitted. In 940 cases vacancy lasted between 30 and 90 days and in 575 cases vacancy lasted over 90 days and moiety of tax was remitted from the demand.

Balance:—The balance outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 6,18,950-2-3 as against Rs. 6,04,263-14-6 in the previous year.

Warrants:—The number of warrants executed during the year was 45 as against 36 in the previous year though all possible efforts were made to collect the taxes without actual execution of the warrants.

Civil suits:—The number of civil suits filed during the year for recovery of the property tax was 53 as against 90 in the previous year. 18 cases of the previous year were pending decision. Decrees were obtained in 59 cases of which 43 related to the suits filed in the current year and 16 cases of the previous year. One case of the current year and 2 cases of the previous year were settled out of court and the remaining cases were pending decision. The amount covered by decrees is Rs. 6,438-4-0.

Percentage of collection:—After allowing for a sum of Rs. 25,624-14-0 for assessments levied at the close of the financial year and also allowing for a sum of Rs. 89,213-0-10 recoverable after disposal of appeals, the percentage of net collection to the demand was 87.08 as against 86.86 in the previous year. These percentages are calculated as usual after taking into credit for remission granted. If these remissions are excluded the percentage of collection will be 86.31 as against 85.08 in the previous year. The Madras City Municipal Amendment Act 1936 was given effect to after the commencement of the financial year 1936-37. The divisional areas were changed from 30 to 40. The delimitation of the areas and the arrangement for the new elections imposed a heavy burden of additional work on the staff. Processes for collection had to be issued after ascertainment of the legal procedure on various points. In spite of the great handicaps, it is really noteworthy that a higher percentage of collection was obtained.

Incidence of taxation:—The incidence of tax per head of population was Rs. 6-3-4 as against Rs. 6-1-2 in the previous year.

Note:—D.C.B. statement as compared with the corresponding figures for two years is shown in Appendix 1, Table No. 1.

Arrear.

(4) *Demand, Collection, Remission and Balance.*—The outstanding demand at the beginning of the year was Rs. 11,83,505-9-6. As a result of the amendments made subsequently in the course of the year, the demand went down to Rs. 11,81,449-8-9. The amount of net collection made during the year was Rs. 5,40,784-14-2 as against Rs. 5,20,264-13-1 in the preceding year. A sum of Rs. 5,186-1-0 was remitted on account of vacancy and other causes. The balance at the end of the year was Rs. 6,35,478-9-7.

(5) *Percentage of Collection.*—After allowing for a sum of Rs. 47,239-5-2 covered by civil suits and also allowing for a sum of Rs. 20,382 for items of demand under objection, the percentage of collection to net demand was 49.00 as against 51.47 in the previous year.

The fall in the percentage under arrears is due to the residue of bad items. They relate to small sums in each case due from the poor rate-payers. Recovery has to be made piecemeal as coercive processes were found futile. The civil suits have to be reserved as a last resort when other means have failed. Vigorous measures are being taken to wipe off the old arrears.

Percentage of collection (arrear and current) from the year 1924-25 to 1936-37 is shown in **Appendix I, Table No. 3.**

Tax on Companies.

8. (a) *Current*:—Companies tax was levied under Section 110 at the rates prescribed under Rule 7 of the Taxation Rules, Schedule IV to the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 as modified by the Act X of 1936. The gross current demand was Rs. 1,64,310 as against Rs. 2,05,540 in the year 1935-36. The fall in demand is due (1) to the change of the basis for assessment in case of branch companies being on paid up capital to being on gross income basis and (2) Co-operative Societies whose paid-up-capital is below Rs. 50,000 were not assessed. A sum of Rs. 110 was remitted on appeals, and the collection for the year amounted to Rs. 1,55,814-9-1 as against Rs. 1,90,952-4-0 in the previous year. The balance left uncollected at the close of the year was Rs. 8,385-6-11 as against Rs. 12,422-12-0 in the previous year.

(b) *Arrear*:—The arrear demand opened with a sum of Rs. 33,120-6-0 by which supplemental assessments relating to the arrear periods went up to Rs. 38,635-6-0. Again by reduction on appeals the arrear demand fell down to Rs. 36,815-6-0. The collection during the year was Rs. 8,086 as against Rs. 4,332-13-6 in previous year, and the balance was Rs. 28,729-6-0 as against Rs. 20,697-10-0 in the previous year.

(c) *Percentage of collection*:—Under current a sum of Rs. 2,085 is covered by correspondence with Liquidators and the several Companies either in connection with the recovery of tax or for eliciting information regarding their liability. The percentage of collection is 96.11 as against 96.19 of the previous year. A sum of Rs. 16,725 under arrears represents the taxes due by the poor Co-operative Societies which were unable by their financial position to pay their dues. A sum of Rs. 1,550 will have to be recovered from the Liquidators who promise to remit the tax as soon as assets of the companies are realised. A sum of Rs. 50 is covered under suit and another sum of Rs. 1,675 is covered under correspondence. Thus the percentage of collection under arrears is 48.08 as against 47.09 of the previous year.

Profession Tax.

9. (a) *Current*:—Profession tax was levied under Section 111 at 25 per cent. over and above the minimum rates prescribed in Rule 8 of the Taxation Rules, Schedule IV of the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 as modified by the Act X of 1936. The gross current demand was Rs. 3,57,944-0-0 as against Rs. 3,44,483-12-0 in the previous year. This gross demand includes a sum of Rs. 3,270 levied on persons who hold appointment etc. outside the City and at the same time reside in Madras. The gross demand was subsequently reduced to Rs. 3,49,307-12-0 on appeals. The collection was Rs. 2,80,887-9-1 as against Rs. 2,69,537-9-0 in the previous year and the balance at the end of the year was Rs. 68,430-2-11 as against Rs. 52,765-3-0 in the year 1935-36.

(b) *Arrear*:—The arrear demand which stood at Rs. 1,00,442-8-6 rose to Rs. 1,04,837-15-6 on account of supplemental assessments and it was subsequently reduced to Rs. 1,00,620-5-6 on account of remission and reduction on appeals. A sum of Rs. 38,521-1-0 was collected during this year and the balance was Rs. 62,099-4-6. A sum of Rs. 150 was written off by S. C. (T. & F.) as irrecoverable.

(c) *Percentage of Collection*:—After allowing a sum of Rs. 20,220 covered by appeals and correspondence in regard to liability, the percentage of collection under current is 85.35 as against 84.78 in the year 1935-36. After allowing for a sum of Rs. 2,450 covered by suits, a sum of Rs. 12,430 covered by appeals and write off and another sum of Rs. 6,210 due from persons who had gone out of Madras Presidency and India, the percentage of collection under arrears is 48.43 as against 49.96 in the previous year.

52 appeals went up to the Taxation Appeals Committee as against 72 in the previous year. 43 cases were decided and 9 are pending decision. In 12 cases the assessments were reduced and cancelled and in 31 cases the assessments were confirmed.

Tax on Carriages and Animals.

10. (a) The net demand under the tax amounted to Rs. 83,695-12-0 as against Rs. 1,07,505 in the previous year. The fall in the demand is due to reduction of tax on bicycles from Rs. 2 to 8 annas per half-year.

The number of vehicles and animals assessed during the year under the several classes of Schedule IV Part III of the Madras City Municipal Act, as compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year is shown in **Appendix I, Table No. 4.** The number of free licenses issued during the year under Section 118 is shown in column 6 of the table.

Seizure of cycles:—As in the previous years unlicensed cycles found running on the roads of the City were seized under Section 127 of the Act with the result that 56,992 cycles were registered in both the half-years of the current year against 27,235 cycles in the preceding year.

Current collections amounted to Rs. 75,939-8-0 which included Rs. 2291-8-0 received as advance for the succeeding year. The net collections for the year amounted to Rs. 73,648-0-0 which with Rs. 2,076 prepaid in the previous year for the year under report amounted to Rs. 75,724-0-0. The percentage of collection to demand for the year was 90.48 against 93.62 in the previous year. There was a balance of Rs. 7,971-12-0 to be collected of which Rs. 2,078 have since been collected.

The Government have paid during the year under report a sum of Rs. 1,94,580 towards the annual contribution of Rs. 3,38,000 fixed in G. O. No. 3250 L. & M., dated 11-7-1934 payable to the Corporation of Madras as compensation under Section 10 (2) of the Madras Motor Vehicles Taxation Act of 1931 for the loss of revenue involved in the Government's taking over the right of taxing motor vehicles.

The statement appended shows the amount of annual contribution received from the Government against the maximum fixed during the last 6 years.

(b) *Arrears*:—The arrear demand at the beginning of the year was Rs. 8,719-14-7 which by subsequent amendments and additions rose to

Rs. 12,622-14-7. Of this, a sum of Rs. 2,030-8-0 was found on investigation to be erroneous and was cancelled. Thus the net demand was Rs. 10,592-6-7 and of this a sum of Rs. 110-7-7 was written off as irrecoverable by the S. C. (T. & F.) A sum of Rs. 7,529-10-0 was collected leaving a balance of Rs. 2,952-5-0 at the close of the year. The percentage of collection to demand was 71.09 against 68.33 in the previous year.

Tax on carts and other vehicles without springs.

11. (a) The demand under the tax amounted to Rs. 45,112 as against Rs. 46,704 in the previous year. The number of carts voluntarily offered for registration was 8504 as against 8653 in the previous year and the number seized under Section 127 of the Madras City Municipal Act was 2844 carts against 3022 carts in the previous year. Of the 2844 carts seized 2690 were released on payment of tax while 80 were let off without payment of tax on proof of non-liability. 38 carts were sold in auction on 30-9-1936 and 36 remained in the godown unredeemed at the close of the year awaiting disposal.

The current collection inclusive of Rs. 1,408 received as advance payment for the ensuing year amounted to Rs. 44,412. The net collections excluding the advance payment amounted to Rs. 43,004 which with Rs. 1,492 collected in the previous year towards the demand for the year under review amounted to Rs. 44,496 against Rs. 46,001-14-0 in the previous year. Demands on 80 carts amounting to Rs. 320 were cancelled as not liable. There were 74 carts remained unredeemed of which 38 were disposed of in auction. The total balance under this tax at the end of the year was Rs. 296. The percentage of the collection to demand was 99.24 against 99.87 in the previous year.

(b) *Arrears*:—The demand at the beginning of the year was Rs. 105-2-0 which by subsequent amendment rose to Rs. 141-2-0. Of this Rs. 40 was collected leaving a balance of Rs. 101-2-0 for further recovery.

Tax on Timber

12. *Collection*:—Under the provisions of the Madras City Municipal Act 1919 as amended by Act X of 1936, the timber tax was levied and collected at a flat rate of Rs. 5 per ton. Exemption from tax was allowed to timber brought into the City in the course of transit to any place outside the City. The gross collections, excluding the sum of Rs. 1,367-3-10 being the amount of arrear collection, amounted to Rs. 1,45,007-15-7 as against Rs. 1,50,166-14-8 of the previous year.

Refunds:—The amount of tax refunded during the year under report on re-exports of timber was Rs. 34,963-7-7 as against Rs. 39,398-2-5 in the previous year.

Collecting Agencies:—The relationship between the collecting agencies and the executive continued to be cordial. The sum of Rs. 1,367-3-10 being the tax collected by the collecting agencies during the first half of the previous year was remitted during the year. The percentage of remittance to the arrear demand was 100.

Out of the sum of Rs. 1,46,784-0-0 collected on imports during the year, a sum of Rs. 1,45,007-15-7 was remitted into the treasury and the balance of Rs. 1,776-2-3 could not be remitted by the collecting agencies before the close of the year as it was collected during the month of March 1937. The percentage of remittance to the current demand is 98.7.

Duty on Transfers of Property.

13. (a) *Current*:—The duty on transfers of property under Section 98 (h) of the Madras City Municipal Act IV of 1919 as amended by Act X of 1936 was levied at 1½ per cent as sanctioned by the Government (*vide* G. O. No. 552 Mis. P. S. dated 24-4-1920 and G. O. No. 4081 L. & M., P. S. dated 21st September

1926). The gross collection for three quarters ending 30th June 1936, 30th September 1936 and 31st December 1936 amounted to Rs. 83,604-0-0. Out of this, a sum of Rs. 2090-2-0 being 2½ per cent. of the collection was credited to the Government for the collection of the duty as per G. O. No. 274 L. & M. P. S. dated 9th February 1922. The net collection, therefore, amounted to Rs. 81,513-14-0 as against Rs. 96,238-15-0 in the previous year.

(b) *Arrear*:—The gross collection for the quarter ending 31st March 1937 amounted to Rs. 37,505-8-0. After deducting Rs. 937-10-0 credited to the Government for the collection of the duty, a sum of Rs. 36,567-14-0 was realised by way of arrears. Thus the total collection by way of duty on transfers of property was Rs. 1,18,081-12-0 as against Rs. 1,26,976-15-0 in the previous year.

Entertainments Tax.

14. (a) During the year under report in the case of Theatre, Cinema, Exhibition or Circus the Entertainments tax was levied on all payments for admission at the maximum rates prescribed in Section 3 (3) of the Entertainments Tax Act subject to exemption if the payment for admission is 4 annas or below. For other kinds of entertainments, the tax was levied at 25 per cent. of the payments for admission under Section 3 (1) of the said Act.

(b) *Collection of arrears*:—At the end of the previous year there remained a balance of Rs. 536-15-0. But on account of the settlement of the demand in certain cases after the expiry of the year the demand under arrears rose to Rs. 748-13-6. Out of this amount, a sum of Rs. 211-14-6 was collected leaving a balance of Rs. 536-15-0. A decree was obtained for this amount and steps were taken to arrest the judgment debtors but they have absconded. Arrest has not yet been made. The percentage of collection to demand is 39.3.

(c) *Collection under current*:—The demand under Entertainments tax for the year 1936-1937 was Rs. 97,929-11-9 as against Rs. 1,02,660-6-9 in the year 1935-1936. A sum of Rs. 97,927-4-3 was collected making the percentage of collection nearly cent percent.

The total entertainments tax realised for the whole year both under arrear and current was Rs. 98,139-2-9.

The entire collection was effected without resorting to the penal provisions of the Act.

RATES OF TAXATION.

1. The tax on arts, etc., was levied at 25 per cent over the minimum rates specified in Rule 8 of the Taxation Rules in Schedule IV of the Act and the tax on companies at the rate specified in Rule 7 of the Taxation Rules in Schedule IV of the Act.

2. The tax on house property was levied at 16½ per cent which is distributed as follows:—

4. The tax on carriages and animals excluding Motor vehicles was levied at the maximum rates specified in Rule 10 (a) of the Taxation Rules in Schedule IV of the Act, except in the cases of ordinary cycles, the half yearly tax on which is levied at 8 annas as shown in the schedule on the reverse.

5. The tax on carts was levied at the maximum rate of Rs. 4 per cart per half year as laid in Section 124 (2) of the Act.

REVENUE DERIVED FROM MUNICIPAL PROPERTY AND POWERS APART FROM TAXATION.

Rent of Municipal Lands and Buildings 1936-37.

15. (i) *Current*.—The demand under this head was Rs. 81,378-11-10 as against Rs. 79,046-8-8 in the preceding year. The increase in the demand is chiefly due to the income derived from the Model Lines newly constructed in New Bogipalayam etc. The collection was Rs. 71,854-12-9. Out of this a sum of Rs. 10,266-8-1 was refunded to the Tahsildar of Madras being 50% of the rents realised from the lessees of lands in Wall Tax Road and Basin Bridge Road and the refunds of advance rents to other lessees. The net collection excluding the advance rent of Rs. 701-14-9 amounted to Rs. 61,588-4-8 against Rs. 67,187-9-1 in the preceding year. The decrease in collection is due to the fact that a sum of Rs. 5,412-8-11 being 50% of the rents realised from the lessees of lands in Wall Tax Road and Basin Bridge Road, due to the Tahsildar of Madras during the year 1935-36 was refunded during this year.

The demand under municipal bunks was Rs. 9,219 as against Rs. 12,352-8-11 in the preceding year. The decrease in the demand is due to the removal of bunks in the city. The collection was Rs. 8,771-1-8. Out of this a sum of Rs. 41 was refunded to the bunk-holders towards refund of the advance rent etc. The net collection excluding the advance rent of Rs. 112-6-5 amounted to Rs. 8,730-1-8. The total demand under both the rent of municipal

lands and bunks together was Rs. 90,597-11-10 and the net collection excluding the advance rent of Rs. 814-5-2 amounted to Rs. 70,318-6-4. The percentage of collection to the demand after deducting the amount covered by civil suits etc., is 89.30 as against 88.71 of the previous year.

Arrear.

The demand under this head including bunks was Rs. 17,473-6-0 and the collection amounted to Rs. 9,782-6-6. The percentage of collection to the demand after deducting the amount covered by civil suits etc., is 70.81 as against 80.48 of the previous year.

The total collections this year under arrear and current amounted to Rs. 55,596-4-6 as against Rs. 52,793-12-7 last year. Of this the collections under current amounted to Rs. 49,116-3-8 out of a demand of Rs. 54,531-1-2 as against the collections of Rs. 48,845-2-9 out of a demand of Rs. 54,531-1-2 of the previous year. The collection under arrear is Rs. 6,480-0-10 out of a demand of Rs. 12,430-6-4 as against Rs. 3,948-10-7 out of a demand of Rs. 11,211-10-9 of the previous year.

The percentage of collections under current is 91.1 as against 90.4 of the previous year. The percentage of collections under arrear is 52.1 as against 36.1 of the previous year.

Distrait Fees.

(iii) A sum of Rs. 76-4-0 was realised under this head. There were 54 cases as against 43 in the previous year.

Income from License fees.

(iv) The income under this head amounted to Rs. 2,08,941-0-4 as detailed in Table No. 68, Appendix II against Rs. 1,96,433-3-8 in the previous year. The total number of items dealt with was 30,210 as against 32,827 in the previous year.

Grants and Contributions.

(v) A sum of Rs. 3,14,024 as detailed below was received from Government as grants and contributions during the year.

- Rs. 4,139 for the repair of Bridges over the Cooum and Buckingham canal.
- Rs. 1,580 for the maintenance of roads in Chepauk.
- Rs. 800 for lighting lamps in Chepauk.
- Rs. 13,607 towards compensation for withholding sanction for the issue of the licenses by the Corporation for places used for sale of spirituous and intoxicating liquors.
- Rs. 250 for the payment of buta to pregnant women in the Ramaswamy Mudaliar Lying-in Hospital.
- Rs. 2,93,648 for Drainage and Water supply as free grant.

(vi) Payment for water supply for Non-domestic Purposes (Current.)

The demand under this head for the year was Rs. 7,52,434-9-0 as against Rs. 7,15,799-10-0 last year and the collections amounted to Rs. 7,18,830-5-0 including Rs. 2,737-12-0 adjusted towards the current demand from the payments made during the previous years. The year closed with an uncollected balance of Rs. 33,604-4-0 as against Rs. 63,695-10-6 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 2,755-14-0 was collected in advance during the year.

Arrear.—The year opened with Rs. 75,579-15-2 as outstanding arrear which, on account of subsequent revisions during the year came to

Rs. 99,100-3-2. Out of this amount a sum of Rs. 83,777-15-2 was collected while the amount adjusted from the previous year's payment was Rs. 663-8-0 thus leaving a balance of Rs. 14,658-12-0 as uncollected at the close of the year as against Rs. 11,834-4-8 last year.

(vii) *Grass Farm*.—As already stated in the last Administration report Messrs. P. S. Gopala Iyengar and Marga Iyer continued to be the lessees of the Grass Farm at Tondiarpet paying a rental of Rs. 2,135 per annum. They were permitted to use the two Corporation pumps on payment of Rs. 75 per mensem for the irrigation of the farm. The area of the Grass Farm is about Cawnies 80-Gr. 16—sq. ft. 1200 and that of the Market Farm is about C. 17—Gr. 1 and 438 sq. ft. The poor income is due to the fact that rearing vegetables on land irrigated with sewage is prohibited and also because the demand for grass is on the decline. Consequently only a small area of the farm is cultivated. With a view to increase the revenue from the farm, it is proposed to reserve 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ Cawnies from the lease land and utilise it for making plantation as an experimental measure in consultation with the Agricultural Department.

General incidence of Taxation.

16. The incidence of taxation per head of population under all taxes was 7-5-1 as against 7-2-10 in the previous year.

Deposit Account.

17. (a) This account, which exhibits transactions, relating to the Corporation Stores and Workshop, the payment made on account of Sinking fund for loans raised in the open market and the security deposits of Corporation servants and contractors etc., opened with a balance of Rs. 69,73,448-3-0. The receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 22,59,316-13-3 and the expenditure Rs. 17,45,399-14-9 leaving a balance of Rs. 74,87,365-1-6 at the close of the year.

Advances.

(b) At the beginning of the year, a sum of Rs. 2,12,695-1-0 was outstanding under this head of which permanent advances held by the several officers of the Corporation amounted to Rs. 1,17,530-10-0 and miscellaneous advances to Rs. 95,164-7-0. The permanent advances are represented almost entirely by money invested in the stock at Corporation stores and the miscellaneous advances include payment made on account of amounts for which bills have been sent out, amounts paid on advance or in deposit but awaiting adjustment. During the year fresh advances were made to the extent of Rs. 2,28,684-14-0 under miscellaneous and Rs. 6,101-10-0 under permanent and recoveries and adjustments were made to the extent of Rs. 2,50,095-11-5 under miscellaneous and Rs. 11,821-10-0 under Permanent, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,11,810-10-0 under permanent and Rs. 73,753-9-7 under miscellaneous advances or Rs. 1,85,564-3-7 in the aggregate against Rs. 2,12,695-1-0 at the end of the previous year.

Cheque Fraud.

An unfortunate incident during the year under report was the fraud in the cash transactions of the Corporation. The practice appears to have been to allow the cheques of private parties to be cashed at the Corporation Treasury though there was practically no necessity for such an obligation on the part of the Corporation. In these transactions 13 cheques, covering a sum of Rs. 11,180 which were cashed at the Corporation treasury by or at the instance of G. Ananthachary a clerk of the Corporation were dishonoured and the value thereof was left unrealised. A sum of Rs. 6,400 was however realised subsequently and the balance of Rs. 4,780 could not be realised as responsibility could not be fixed on any one person. The matter was placed in the hands of the Police who instituted criminal proceedings which are pending disposal. Due action was however taken to put an end to the practice of allowing private cheques to be cashed at the Corporation Treasury and the procedure obtaining in the Treasury has been suitably revised to avoid the recurrence of such defalcations.

EXPENDITURE—PUBLIC WORKS.

18. Owing to paucity of funds, provision was made in the Budget under "Expenditure Non-recurring—iii Communications-2. Roads", only for two

acquisitions viz., (1) Acquisition of land for connecting Kumarappa Mudaly Street with Kodambakkam High Road and (2) Acquisition of land in R. S. Nos. 2685 and 2687 of George Town for connecting Katchaleswarar Garden I Lane with Sengalaner Pilliar Coil Street. At the close of the year the former was pending with the Tahsildar and the latter was dropped.

Besides the above acquisition, the following acquisitions were taken up out of the divisional allotment as suggested by the Divisional Councillors:—

1. Acquisition of land in R. S. No. 3058/7 of Tondiarpet for the extension of Thambu Chetty Lane.
2. Acquisition of land in R. S. No. 1565 of Triplicane for widening Venkatarangam Pillai Street.
3. Acquisition of land for connecting Ponnuswamy Chetty Street with Irusappa Maistry Street.
4. Acquisition of land for widening Kothandarama Iyer Street.
5. Acquisition of land in Marimuthu Lane for a park.

The acquisition referred to in Item No. 1 was effected while, the other acquisitions were either under correspondence with the Collector or pending before the Council for sanction.

Arrears.—Acquisitions of land for extending Chandrappa Mudaly Street, and in R. S. No. 4/1 of Perambore for connecting Polu Naicken Street with Parthasarathy Naidu Street were effected during the year. Valuation statements in respect of (1) the acquisition of land to connect Shaik Maistry Street with Hencock Cheri and (2) Acquisition of land in R. S. No. 2472 of Triplicane for widening Nallathamby Mudaly Street, were received from the Collector and pending before the Council for sanction.

Public Works—Expenditure Normal.

19. The amount spent on the reform of roads including cost of departmental quarrying, maintenance of bridges, culverts, foot-paths etc., excluding "Establishment" came to Rs. 4,91,229 as against the provision of Rs. 5,70,710 leaving a balance of Rs. 79,481 due to unpaid liabilities and savings. 9,91,093 c.ft. of blue granite were manufactured during the year as against 9,94,257 c.ft. last year and 7,88,354 c. ft. issued from Periamet Metal Depot as checkmeasured on road sides.

Reform and Repairs of Roads.—The length of roads metalled for the first time came to F. 5 Yds. 133. The total length of metalled roads in the city at the close of the year was M. 363 F. 3 Yds. 30, including M. 1 F. 1 Yds. 170 of roads metalled anew in Theagarayanagar. Reform was done to a length of Miles 53 F. 3 Yds. 125 while, regrading was done to an extent of Miles 6 F. 5 Yds. 44. The number of squares reformed amounted to 55,282 nearly (*vide* Appendix II, Table Nos. 52 to 54). The cost of reform per mile came to Rs. 3,831 nearly. The total cost of metalling including materials and laying, but exclusive of rolling and patching was Rs. 2,03,090.

In many divisions, roads were treated with laterite. A statement showing the quantities of Blue Granite and laterite spent on reform and repairs is given below:—

Tarring of Roads—Ms. 9-F. 4-Yds. 188 of roads were tarred while retarring was done to a length of Ms. 2-F. 6-Yds. 118. The total length of tarred roads at the beginning of the year was Ms. 130-F. 4-Yds. 188 and at the end of the year Ms. 140-F. 1-Yds. 156.

During the year a sum of Rs. 66,760 was paid to Messrs. McKenzies Ltd; the contractors for road-making, towards the retention amount, interest etc. As already stated in the last year's report much improvement can be effected in the matter of special road-making only if the Government helps the Corporation with loans or permits the Corporation to raise loan for such purposes, as the Corporation cannot undertake such capital works from the limited resources available from Revenue funds.

Culverts-Foot-Paths and Bridges—The culverts in Cochrane Basin Road, Casa Major Road and Ennore Road were repaired and those in Vadivelu Mudali Street were provided with R. C. slabs. The culverts down the Law's Bridge were repaired while the repairs to the culverts in Venkatachala Mudali Street were in progress. Foot paths in Erusappan Street, Kandappa Mudali High Road, Mount Road, Fort Beach Road, etc., were repaired while Jehangir Street and Jeremiah Road were provided with foot paths on the eastern and southern sides respectively. The cement foot path in Langs Garden Road was extended and a foot path was constructed in Harris Road.

Repairs to the retaining wall of Graeme's Road Bridge and repairs to the Napier and Grant Duff Bridges were done. The bridge in Brodies Road over the Buckingham Canal was widened at a cost of Rs. 1527.

The widening of the General Hospital Bridge is one of dire necessity and will be carried out by the P. W. D. as soon as funds are made available, Corporation bearing half the cost.

New Works (Revenue and Loan Funds).

20. (a) **Revenue Funds**—A Karmandiram shed was constructed in progress during the year under report. Provision for the construction of quarters for the medical officer at Pallavaram quarries, made in the Budget for 1936-37 was deleted by the S. C. (T. & F.) while considering the supplemental budget. A shed for camels was constructed in the Zoo at a cost of Rs. 1500 and the construction of cages for the lions' cubs reported to be in progress last year.

was finished this year. A Reading Room in Kandappa Mudali High Road was constructed at a cost of Rs. 2612 and the installation of electric lights, fans etc., was in progress. Improvements to the Reading Room in Cemetery Road Model Lines and in T. H. Road were completed while those to the Reading Room in St. Xavier Street, were in progress. The formation of a cricket pitch at Peoples' Park was in progress during the year under report. The acquisition of land for a Reading Room in Sowrimuthu Street and in R. S. No. 2304/part of G. T. for a Reading Room was pending with the Collector during the year under review.

Loan Funds—With regard to the acquisition of the superstructures on the land required for a market in Wall Tax Road, award for Rs. 13,767-13-10 was received from the Collector and paid for, since writing this report.

Other Remunerative Enterprises.

(b) **Land Development-Buildings**—Though a sum of Rs. 4 lakhs was asked for, (2 lakhs by way of loan and 2 lakhs by way of grant) as the amount required for "the Housing Scheme for the poor", no amount was realised from the Government, as no provision for the same was made in the Provincial Civil Budget for that purpose. Hence no new works were taken up under the above heading. In respect of the acquisition of land in Bogipalayam for the construction of tenements, award was awaited from the Collector and with regard to the construction of additional tenements in the Harbour Division, tenders are being called for.

(c) **Improvement to Slums**—The side walls of the Anti-Malarial channel in Angalamman Coil Hutting ground were raised and the bridge in Demellow's Road Junction of Hutting ground was widened, while, the construction of water tables and concrete margins was in progress. The laying of roads, drains, etc., in Tondiarpet Cheri, was completed. The improvements to the Old Slaughter House Road could not be done as the alienation of the land was pending with the Collector.

As regards the improvements to Parthasarathy Kuppam, construction of Bathing Fountain, installation of electric lights, etc., were done and the acquisition of a major portion of the site was pending with the Collector.

As already pointed out in the last year's Administration Report, no housing scheme nor any scheme for improvements to slums can be done by the Corporation unless the Government comes forward with loans and grants to help the Corporation to solve the problem. The only other alternative is for the Corporation to raise money in the open market.

(d) **Mambalam Town Planning Scheme**—About 872 grounds and 1567 sq. ft. of land were sold during the year realising on the whole a sum of Rs. 3,54,728 as against Rs. 2,92,141 for 1069 grounds and 1232 sq. ft. of land last year.

The following are the major items of works done during the year:—

- (1) Earthwork formation of roads and filling up low lands.
- (2) Metalling of roads to a length of about 4 miles.
- (3) Tarring of roads.
- (4) Construction of culverts at the junction of streets.
- (5) Plantation of avenue trees.
- (6) Laying of water mains in streets.

Construction of residential buildings continued to make rapid progress.

(e) **Town Planning Schemes**—At the beginning of the year the number of schemes under preparation was 15 including the General Town Planning Scheme. Of these, the detailed scheme for Nungambakkam Western Section Part I was submitted to Government for sanction. In the absence of special staff to attend to this, no detailed schemes could be sent to Government.

Mylapore South-East area was added on during the end of the year.

EXPENDITURE—CAPITAL—WATER SUPPLY WORKS.

Improvements to the Red Hills Tank.

21. From further correspondence with the Public Works Department in the matter, it is learnt that some minor works such as grouting still remain to be carried out and that the work is not altogether complete as stated in the last year's Administration report. The amount debited against the Corporation's contribution of Rs. 42,209 was Rs. 38,843-3-8 upto the end of March 1937.

Comprehensive scheme to set the Madras Water Works on a sound basis as approved by the Council on 30-10-1937.

(a) *Acquisition of irrigation rights.*—The test suit filed in the High Court as to the extent of the rights possessed by a land-holder in the ayacut of the Red Hills Lake was decided in favour of the Government against the ryots. The landholder has filed an appeal against this decision and it is pending disposal. As requested by us, the Government have, in the meanwhile, furnished us in Memorandum No. 10156-A.—E-2 P. H. dated 9-10-36, the Collector's letters giving rough estimates for the acquisition of irrigation rights. The estimated figures for the acquisition of the irrigation rights of the II crop on compounded double crop lands only, amount to Rs. 1,59,000 approximately for a total acreage of 378.53. This is no doubt based on the recent decision of the High Court that owners of single crop lands are not entitled to any compensation for the loss of 2nd crop and is subject to confirmation at the appeal now preferred. If, however, the appeal should be decided in favour of the ryots, the acquisition of 2nd crop right in the ayacut of the Red Hills Lake will become necessary. It is estimated to cost approximately Rs. 7,19,900 for a total acreage of 1980. The whole matter is receiving consideration.

(b) *Duplicating the conduit from Red Hills Lake to Kilpauk Pumping Station.*—At its meeting held on 29-1-1937, the Standing Committee (Works) wanted an estimate for duplicating the conduit to be put up along with the proposals for the purchase of irrigation rights and filtration and purification of water. A detailed estimate for Rs. 8 lakhs is being put up for sanction.

(c) *Filtration and Purification of the City Water Supply.*—At its meeting held on 12-9-36, the S. C. (Works) rejected all the tenders that were received for the full comprehensive scheme as being either unsatisfactory or incomplete and wanted the Engineer to draft a revised specification in consultation with the Government Committee on Water and Sewage Purification for calling for fresh tenders. Accordingly, The Government Committee were consulted in the matter. The Committee's opinion as expressed in the President's letter dated 9-1-37 is given below :—

“The Government Committee are faced with a difficult situation in that the orders of the Government to the Corporation to install two large size experimental filters as recommended by the

Committee on the results of five years' experimentation, had not been given effect to. The desirability of installing a new upto-date mechanical filter plant was recommended by the Government Committee in 1923. Many of the experiments carried out between 1927 and 1932 by the Committee leading upto the recommendation of percolating filters as the next best solution of the problem, were necessitated by the fact that the Corporation was not prepared to scrap the existing filters and instal an upto-date mechanical filter plant instead. So, if the Corporation would rescind its original decision and agree to the installing of an altogether new modern filter plant and communicate that decision to Government, the Committee would be in a position to proffer the necessary advice.” The Government also in G. O. No. M. S. 156 dated the 21st January 1937 called for the views of the Corporation Council on the note of the Government Committee with regard to the present position of the City Water Supply Purification Scheme.

The whole matter was considered by the Works Committee on 29-1-1937 when the Sanitary Engineer to the Government was also present. The latter stated that he saw no reason to alter or modify the original recommendation made in 1933 for the installation of two large size units of prefilters, one of the percolating and one of Paterson Type, of a two million capacity each. The S.C. thereupon resolved to reconsider the estimates for these two full size units along with the schemes for the purchase of irrigation rights and duplication of conduit.

Additional Plant for Kilpauk Pumping Station.—The erection of two electrical units by Messrs. Mather & Platts Ltd., Bombay and the extension of the Engine House by The General Construction Co., Ltd., Madras were completed during the year. The electrical units were brought into commission in October 1936. The resultant saving in pumping costs is being watched.

A grant of Rs. 14,711 was received from the Government in G. O. Nos. M.S. 511 dated 16-2-1937 and 691 P.H. dated 15-3-1937 on expenditure incurred on this estimate during the course of the year. The total grant so far received on this work, amounts to Rs. 1,11,598-11-8. An estimate for Rs. 45,000/- for the installation of a third electrical unit of 0.80 million gallons capacity has been sent up to the Standing Committees and Council for sanction.

The desirability of installing a standby Diesel Unit capable of pumping about 2 million gallons per hour in place of the existing Steam unit is under consideration.

5th Filtered Water Storage Reservoir.—Proposals for this are under consideration and estimates are being prepared for installing a fifth filtered water reservoir of about 2 million gallons capacity to increase the storage for ensuring adequate supply during the maximum demand period in the morning from 6 to 10 A. M.

Duplicating Pumping Main from Kilpauk Pumping Station to Shaft.—An estimate for Rs. 2.50 Lakhs for duplicating the pumping main from Kilpauk Pumping Station to the shaft to a length of about 3000 feet was sanctioned by the Corporation on 14-7-1936. The estimate was put up to the Government for sanction with a request to provide funds half as loan and half as grant. The Government in G. O. No. M. S. 604 dated 8-3-1937 accorded sanction for the estimate and stated that the question of providing funds was under consideration in connection with the budget for 1937-38 and no promise of a half grant could be held out in the meanwhile. Further orders are awaited from the Government.

Booster Pumps and Storage Tanks.—To remedy the defective water supply in some parts of Triplicane and Mylapore, the Council on 5-5-1936 sanctioned an estimate for Rs. 95,000 for the construction of three ground level storage tanks and the installation of Booster Pumping sets in Triplicane, Santhome, and Mandavalli areas. This estimate was also sanctioned by the

Government in G.O. No. Ms. 602, dated 6-3-1937. The question of payment of half grant is stated to be under consideration by the Government in connection with the budget for 1937-38. The contracts for the construction of storage tanks and installation of Booster Pumping sets having already been decided upon, action is being taken to proceed with the work.

Waste Water Detection Meter System:—Tenders for the supply of venturi meters stated to be under consideration by the Standing Committee (Taxation and Finance) during last year, were decided upon. The tender of Messrs. Burn & Co., Howrah, for the supply of 4 venturi meters of sizes 14, 18, 21 & 30 inches for Rs. 19,631-8-3 was accepted. An order was accordingly placed with them and the supply is awaited. The Standing Committee decided to call for fresh tenders both in the case of Waste Detection meters and cold Water meters. Accordingly, revised tenders were called for and received. These are under consideration. Preliminary survey of the area was made during the year. Regular work will commence as soon as all the required meters are received. In addition to the grant of Rs. 432-2-0 received last year, a sum of Rs. 2080 was received from Government on the expenditure incurred on this work during the year, as per G.O. No. Ms. 511, dated 26-2-1937 and 691 P. H., dated 15-3-1937.

22. **City Distribution System Improvement:**—The work included in the estimate for Rs. 2.50 lakhs sanctioned by the Council on 3-9-1935 was continued during the year and about 6.85 miles of street mains were laid as against 9.31 miles of last year.

Separate estimates under the following heads have been submitted to Government as required by them. Sanction from the Government is awaited.

The completion report for Rs. 2,52,500 on the estimate for Rs. 2.50 lakhs sanctioned by the Council on 4-2-1930 which was under consideration by the Council, was approved on 14-7-1936. This has been submitted to the Government for the payment of half grant, and the orders of the Government are awaited.

The completion report on the estimate for Rs. 2.30 lakhs sanctioned by the Council on 10-1-1933 is under preparation.

Thyagaroyanagar (Mambalam) Water Supply:—The works provided for in the estimate for Rs. 1.60 lakhs sanctioned in G.O. No. M. S. 277 L & M., dated the 25th January 1935 were completed and about .86 miles of mains were laid during the year. A sum of Rs. 14,080 was received from Government towards grant on expenditure incurred on this estimate (G.O. No. M.S. 511, dated 26-2-1937). The total grant so far received from the Government on this estimate, amounted to Rs. 78,105. An estimate for Rs. 1.25 lakhs for further works to be carried out in Thyagaroyanagar, was sanctioned by the Corporation on 2-2-1937. This is awaiting sanction by the Government.

Scraping and cleaning Water Mains:—About 4.58 miles of street mains of different sizes were scraped and cleaned by pressure scrapers. The scraping of old water mains did help to improve both the quality and quantity of water supply in the respective localities wherein such scrapings were done. During the year under report, a contract (M. & M. No. 11) was entered into with Messrs. Best & Co., Ltd., Madras (Agents to Mysore Iron Works) for the supply of pipes of sizes 4" to 12" at a total cost of Rs. 76,413-15-7. Supplies are being received. Besides this, an order for the supply of 85 sluice valves of 2½" size was placed with the South Indian Export Co., Ltd., Madras for Rs. 1530.

Visible waste inspection:—Water Works Overseers inspected 39,468 houses and rectified 2365 leaks and defects.

Bursts on water mains:—A statement showing the number of bursts that occurred during the year is given in Appendix II, Table No. 60.

Consumption of water:—The total quantity of water supplied during the year was 8512 millions of gallons which is equivalent to nearly 33.01 gallons per head per day for an estimated population of 7,06,471 according to the recent census. The maximum daily average consumption per head in any month was 25.07 gallons in the month of March 1937 and the minimum was 22.38 gallons in the month of September 1936. A statement showing the regulation of the pressures in the principal mains is given in Appendix II, Table No. 65.

Kilpauk Pumping Station:—The total quantity of water pumped during the year was 8611.5 millions of gallons as against 8109.45 millions last year. The expenditure incurred on the maintenance of the station including establishment came to Rs. 2,54,365-4-1 as against 2,05,150-7-1 in the previous year.

63 public fountains and 1 bathing fountain were erected while 8 public fountains, 1 bathing fountain and 2 cattle troughs were removed leaving public fountains 2649, bathing fountains 143 and cattle troughs 79, at the end of the year. 3 valves and 27 meters were fixed during the year.

Statements showing the rainfall and the water level of the Red Hills Lake are given in Appendix II Table Nos. 66 & 67. The quantity of water supplied during the year was 143,17,98,973 c.ft. as against 144,01,81,404 c.ft. last year. The cost of maintaining the lake, filter beds, conduits, Kilpauk shaft, fountains and payment for Red Hills Water including establishment came to Rs. 2,59,609-6-9 as against Rs. 2,70,750-4-9 last year.

Private Water Service.

The number of new house service connections laid by licensed plumbers was 1211 and the number repaired, cleaned or extended was 2408. 278 old washers and 382 leaky taps were replaced by new ones.

Out of the new connections, the number of metered service was 48 while the rest 1163 were unmetered (II class). The total number of house service connections on 31-3-1937 was 47,109 while the total number of meters on those connections stood at 2535. 27 meters were fixed and 31 removed—16 meters were not in service. 601,947,650 gallons of water were used in metered services in excess of free allowance. Of this, the supply for industrial purposes and the consumption in excess of free allowance in metered domestic houses were 291,500,531 gallons and 74,033,400 gallons respectively. The income derived from the excess water supplied to domestic purposes alone was Rs. 92,541-12-0.

The supply of water to domestic premises consisting chiefly of garden bungalows, quarters attached to Hospitals, Mills, Railways, Police Lines, etc., was controlled by 1352 meters. Rs. 8,02,103-10-2 was the amount realised under "Excess water supply charges" as against Rs. 7,51,609-7-3 while Rs. 9,116-6-0 were collected as meter rents as against Rs. 10,691-14-0 in the year previous.

During this year also, it was not possible to purchase new meters to be fixed in premises with I class connections or to replace the existing old meters, as no provision was made under "Revenue Account" for the same.

23. *Expenditure Normal—Drainage.*—The details of works taken up under the above head are found in Appendix I, Statement No. II-A.

Drainage Pumping Stations.—The cost of maintenance of the Sewage Pumping Stations including establishment, labour etc. came to Rs. 2,01,149-8-8 as against Rs. 2,01,472-8-5 last year.

House Drainage.—The number of house drainage connections done under No. 11 "Account Deposit" and "Advances Recoverable" was 1315 and 12 respectively.

24. *Administration.*—3441 Notices were issued under various sections of the Act to prevent misuse of water, unauthorised constructions etc. Out of this the number complied with was 2967.

25. *Permits.*—The number of applications received for the construction or reconstruction of buildings and huts was 2743. Out of these 2010 applications were sanctioned and the rest were either refused or pending disposal. The license fees collected amounted to Rs. 30,228-4-0.

26. *Prosecutions.*—Prosecutions were launched in 99 cases of which, 62 resulted in conviction realising Rs. 89-4-0 as fines, 17 cases were withdrawn and the rest pending.

27. *Provisional and Final orders.*—The number of Provisional orders issued was 797 while in 311 cases final orders were served on account of non-compliance with the former.

28. *Encroachments.*—No special officer was appointed by the Council though the sanction for such appointment was pressed for. The Overseers in charge of buildings and roads in addition to their duties are looking after the detection and removal of encroachments as far as possible. A special encroachment officer is necessary to deal with the detection and removal of encroachments numbering to more than 7,000.

SPECIAL WORKS DEPARTMENT.

General.

29. (1) The progress of work done during the year under review is shown by red dotted lines in the key plans facing this page. The full lines represent the work done previously.

(2) As usual, all the storm water drainage work and house connection works are carried out departmentally and the sewerage work by contract system. But in the case of collecting, screening and suction chambers for the Chetput and Kilpauk Pumping Stations which were proposed to be done by Piecework Contracts D. & E. respectively, the work with the sanction of the Council had been done departmentally, as the tender amount in each case exceeded that of the office estimate. The proposal of the Corporation for departmental execution in this case has been approved by Government in G. O. Ms. No. 2083, dated 29-10-36. The work has been put in hand and is practically completed.

(3) The sanction of the Council for doing the Chetput, Kilpauk and Tondiarpet 'E' pumping station building work departmentally has been applied for and is awaited.

(4) In connection with the plans and estimates for the drainage of Nungambakam, Mylapore extensions and Adyar referred to in the last report as awaiting the sanction of Government, further correspondence on the subject took place during the year and the final orders of the Government have not yet been received. Orders sanctioning the schemes are awaited.

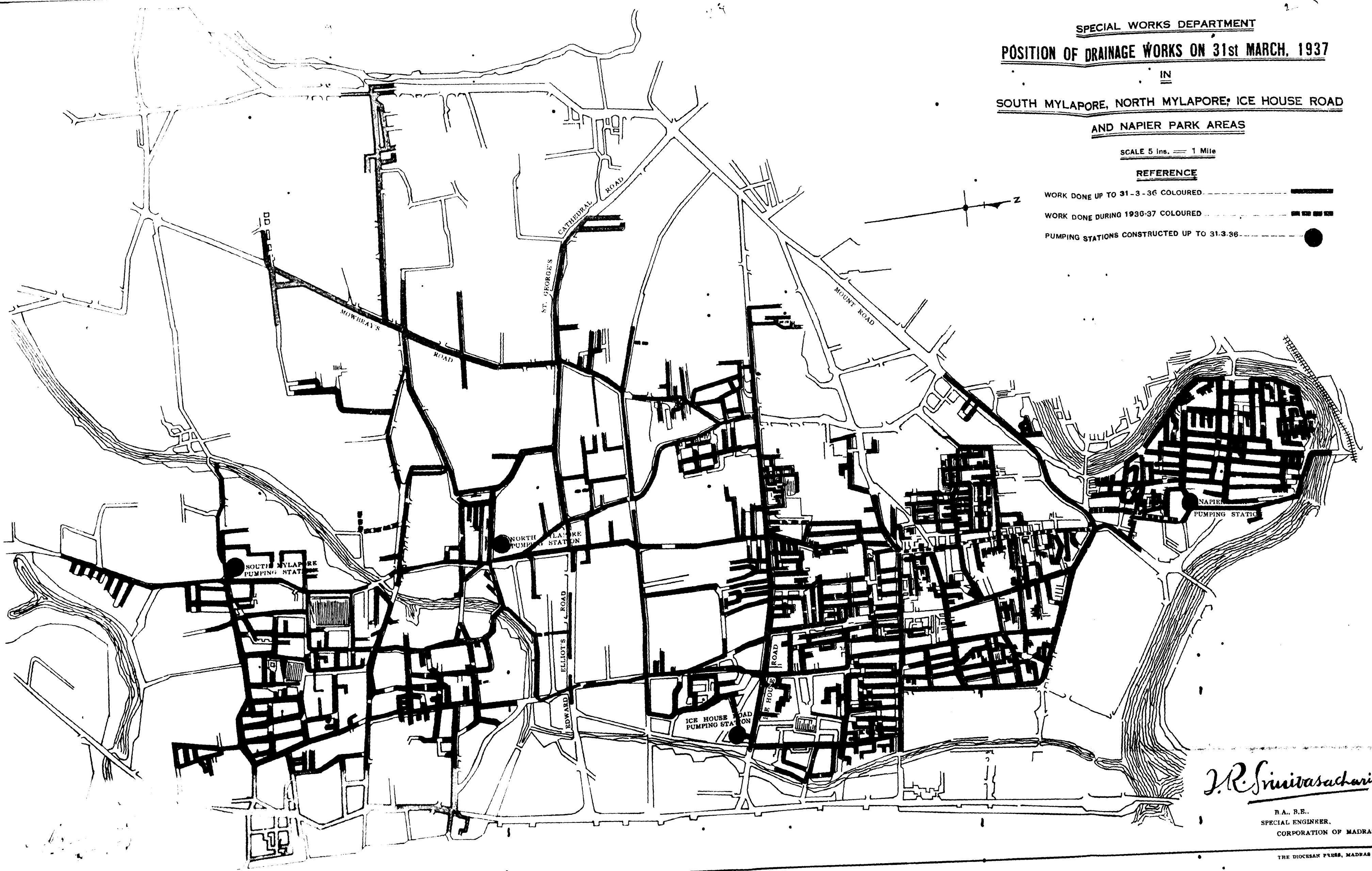
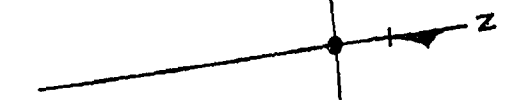

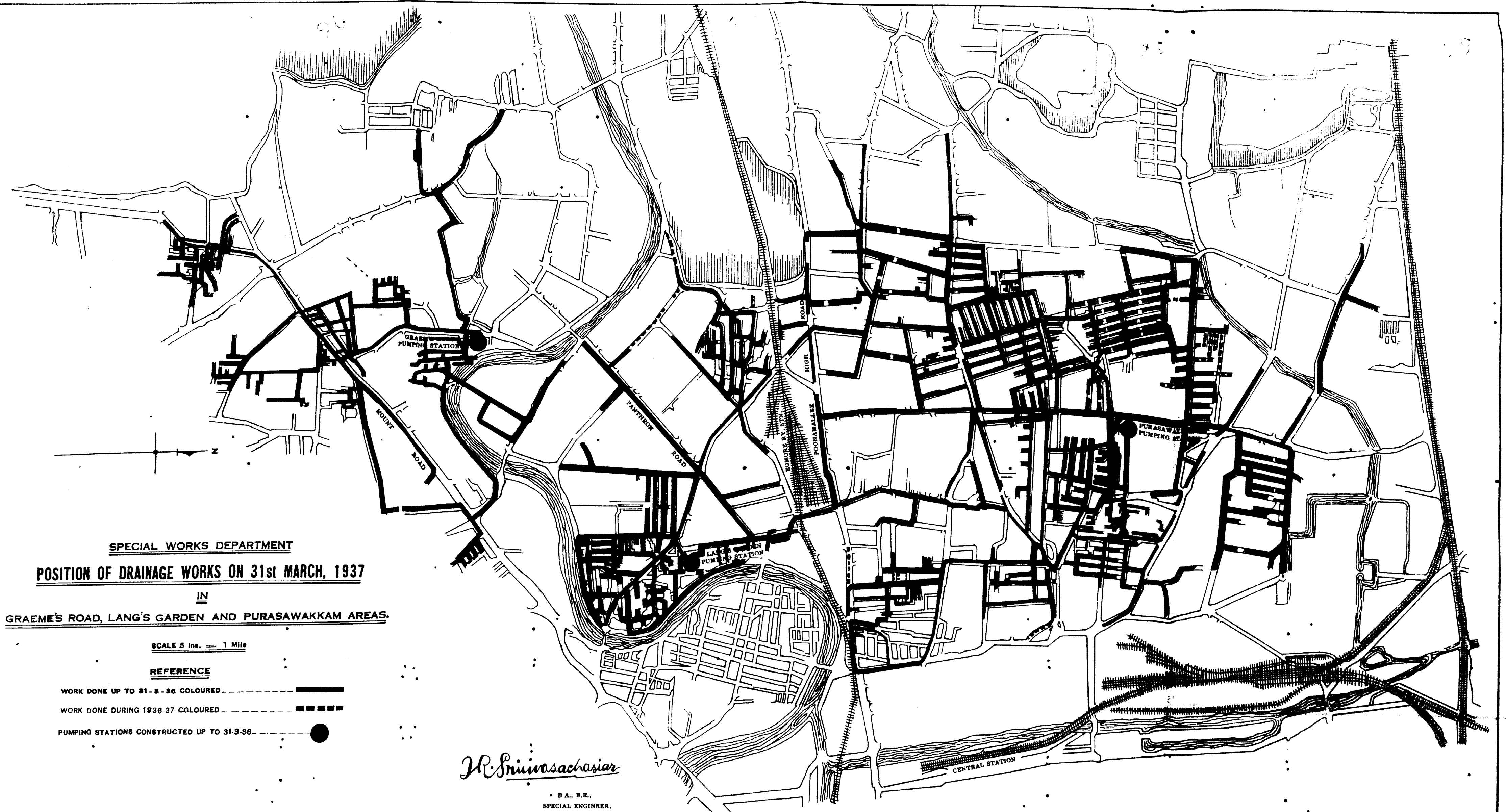

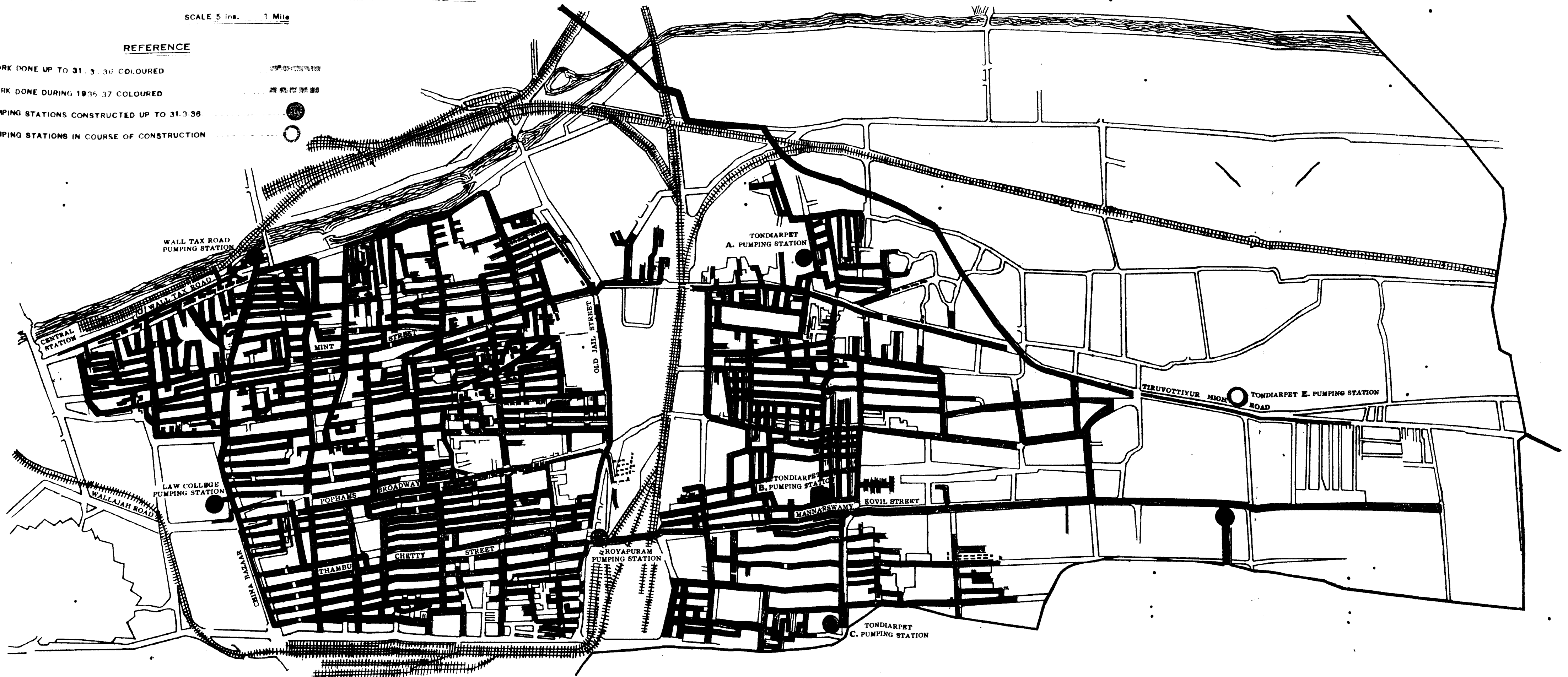

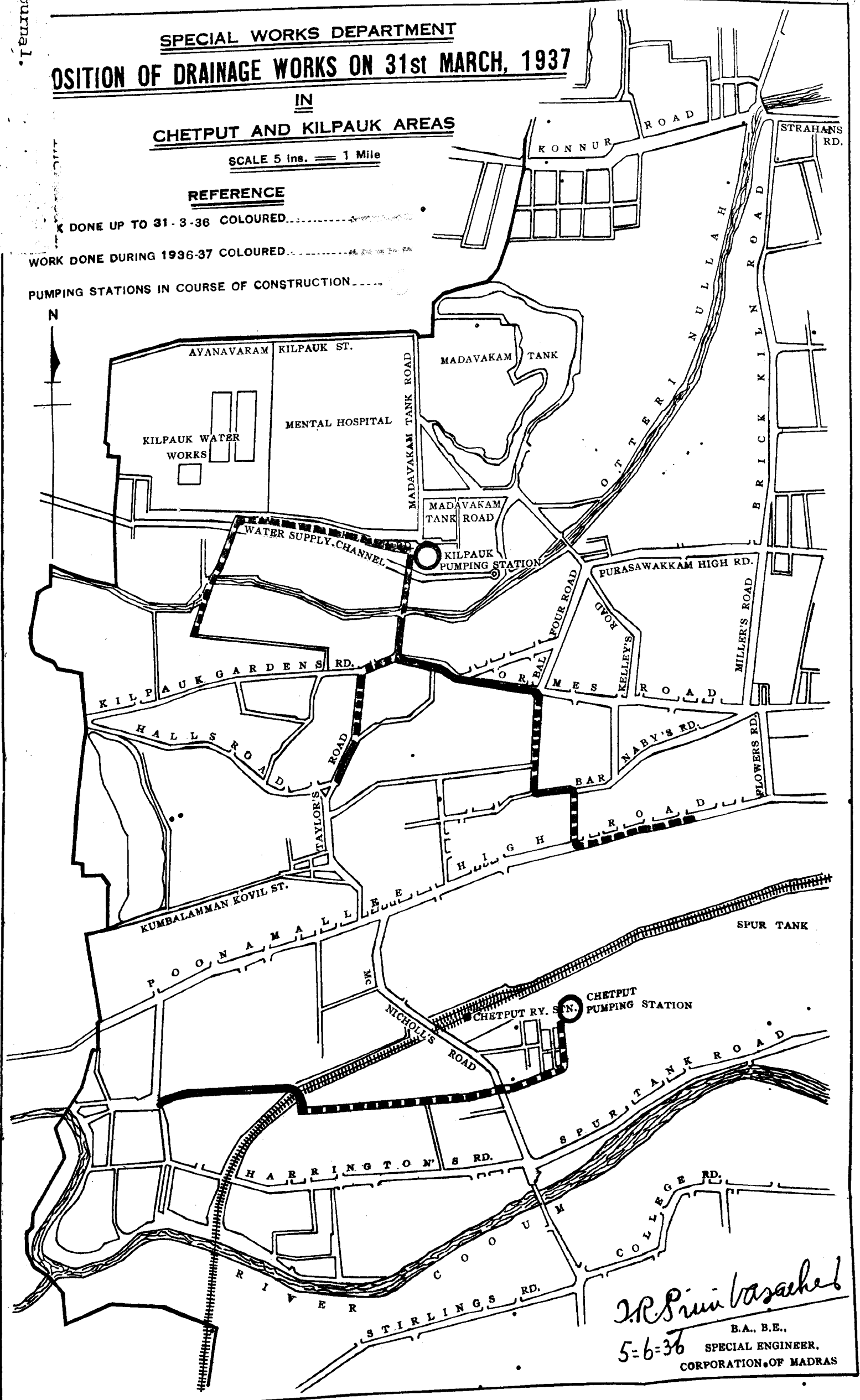

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(6) As has been reported last, the preparation of plans and estimates for the drainage of Perambur and Vysarpady areas have been put in hand and will be submitted to Government when ready.

(7) With reference to the Third Series of plans and estimates for storm water drainage scheme referred to in the last report, further correspondence is going on between the Government and the Corporation.

(8) The inspection and check measurement of drainage works executed is, as usual, being done by the Executive Engineer, North Presidency Division. The measurement of works during the year was found to be correct except in one instance where the length between M. H. Nos. 2 and 3 in Thattankulam Lanes, Choolai, was by mistake noted as 99'-6" instead of 97'-8" resulting in an excess payment of Rs. 2-5-7. This has been recovered.

(9) *Sewage Disposal.*—In his letter dated 15-2-37 Dr. Fowler enquired whether the Corporation or the Standing Committee would require his presence during the consideration of his report on the Madras sewage and refuse disposal and, if in the affirmative, he would go down to Madras provided he is paid his out-of-pocket expenses. This was recommended by the Commissioner and the Standing Committee who considered the proposal at its meeting on 5-3-37 resolved:—"The Committee sanction the payment of out-of-pocket expenses to Dr. Fowler and he may be requested to go over to Madras to address the Council during the 2nd week of April. The Mayor may be requested to arrange for the meeting of the Council to hear Dr. Fowler." The Council at its meeting on 29-6-37 approved the proposal of the Standing Committee and Dr. Fowler was requested to go over to Madras to address the Council on the subject on 12-7-37. Dr. Fowler has accordingly met the Council and explained the subject to the members.

(10) In G.O. No. Ms. 477 dated 20-5-36, the Government while accepting liability for a half grant in regard to sewerage certain streets and lanes, laid down that in an area covered by the Madeley's Scheme in which sewerage work is completed, no liability for a half grant will be admitted in respect of subsequent sewerage of an odd road here or a lane there but only in respect of areas where the Madeley's Scheme has not yet been completed the liability for a half grant will be accepted on the basis of streets as they were in existence on 1st January 1936 and provided also that in such streets no initial sewerage has yet been done. In conformity with this order, the Commissioner was requested to have such a list of streets prepared and forwarded to Government. This was communicated in letter G.D.C. No. 1398/36 dated 11-11-36 with the request that Government will be pleased to bear half the cost involved as and when estimates and plans are submitted to them for sanction. After some correspondence, this was recorded in G.O. No. 232 dated 23-1-37 with the remark that the question of half grant for the works referred to in the list will be considered after detailed plans and estimates are received by them.

(11) *Defalcation of Imprest Money.*—During the year a defalcation of Rs. 4,790-4-7 out of the imprest amount of Rs. 5,000 was noticed. The matter was reported to the Police for investigation. The Chief Accountant who was in charge of the imprest amount and a clerk were charge-sheeted before the Third Presidency Magistrate and were convicted on 11-2-37 and sentenced to undergo rigorous imprisonment for 1 year each and to pay a fine of Rs. 500 each and in default to undergo a further imprisonment of 6 months each. The amount found short, viz. Rs. 4,790-4-7 was however made good by the Special Engineer on the understanding that it would be returned to him as and when the Corporation recovered it from the culprits concerned.

Construction of Flush-out latrines in private houses.

The number of Flush-out latrines constructed in private houses under the compulsory scheme during the year is 1,518 as against 1,480 of the previous year.

30. *Sewer laying*:—Departmental. Five house connections have been given in Pedariar Coil Lane.

Sewer laying:—Departmental. Four house connections have been given to the premises in Pannakara Arokiam Street and Gulam Abbas Ali Khan 2nd Street, where house drains have been repaired and brought to street limit. Three columns 6 inch in diameter 25 ft. in height have also been erected to ventilate the sewers in Commander-in-Chief Road.

Sewer laying:—Departmental. Eleven house connections have been given in Sullivans Lane.

Sewer laying:—Departmental. Thirteen house connections have been given in Begam Sahib 3rd Lane, Masthura Begam Petta Street, Venkatachala Naicken Lane, Rasool Omara Bahadur 3rd Lane, Muthia Mudaly Street and Javar Hussain Khan Street.

Piecework Contract No. 10:—Sewer laying in different areas.—Rasool Omara Bahadur lane that remained to be sewered in Halls Garden has been completed during the year.

Napier Park Area.

Sewer laying:—Contract No. 7—Thiruvateeswaranpet Intercepting sewers.—The sewers in Narasingapuram Street, Ellis Road, Kuppu Muthu Mudaly Street and Fakir Saib Street that remained to be laid under this contract have been completed.

Much difficulty was experienced in laying 27 inch and 21 inch cast-iron sewer across Mount Road from Narasingapuram Street to Ellis Road on account of very heavy traffic in the roads and many sets of electric cables, storm water drains etc. which had to be crossed at different levels. Work had to be done during day and night to minimise inconvenience to the tram and vehicular traffic. The subsoil in the trenches being slushy at the invert, the stoneware pipes were laid on concrete cradle with blue granite jelly in combination mortar and haunched at sides with brick jelly in combination mortar. The cast iron pipes were supported on teak wood piles driven to reach firm ground.

Greames Road Area.

Sewer laying:—Departmental.—Ten house connections have been given in Mount Road, Conron Smith Road, Nungambakkam High Road, Ponnuswamy Naicken Street and Gulam Muhamad Mohideen Street.

Table No. 15—Appendix II gives the quantity of work done and the expenditure incurred.

Langs Garden Area.

Sewer laying:—Departmental. Fifteen house connections have been given in Gengu Reddy Lane and Spur Tank Road.

Piecework Contract No. 10.—Sewer laying in different areas.—During the year Gengu Reddy Lane has been sewered and also the sewer in Spur Tank Road has been extended with 6 inch stoneware pipes to a length of 328 ft.

Purasawalkam Area.

Sewer laying:—Departmental.—Two hundred and eighty-one house connections have been given in this area and six columns have also been erected to ventilate the sewers.

Piecework Contract No. 6 :—Sewer laying in Purasawalkam area 1730 ft. of 6 inch stoneware pipe sewers and 1626 ft. of 9 inch stoneware pipe have been laid in Dadashaw Mackham Street and Lanes, Kanakamal Street, Naval Hospital Road Lane Nos. 5, 6 & 12 and Poonamalle High Road. With these lengths, the Contract has been closed.

Piecework Contract No. 10 :—Sewer laying in different areas.—1196 ft. of 6 inch. stoneware pipes have been laid in Thatankulam, Ethirajaya Garden Lane, Alexander Lane and southern end of Chellappa Mudaliy Lane.

Royapuram Area.

Sewer laying :—Departmental—197 house connections have been given in this area.

Contract R. M. No. 1—Laying Royapuram Intercepting sewers. The last length of 42 inch cast iron pipe sewer has been laid. The work under the above contract has been completed except repairs to Government buildings in Old Jail Road, that were damaged on account of sewer laying works.

Piecework Contract No. 10—Sewer laying in different areas.—2701 ft. of 6 inch stoneware pipe sewers and 379 ft. of 9 inch. stoneware pipe sewers have been laid in Odden Paracheri, North Wall Road and Pophams Broadway.

Tondiarpet A, B. & C. Areas.

Sewer laying :—Departmental.—104 house connections have been given and 3 columns of ventilators have also been erected to ventilate the sewers.

Piecework Contract No. 10—Sewer laying different areas.—1077 ft. of 6 inch stoneware pipe sewers and 949 ft. of 9 inch. stoneware pipe sewers were laid in Dharmaraja Koil Street, Kolhandarama Iyer Street, Flag Staff Street, Bentlemen Garden Lanes and St. Xavier Lane.

510 ft. of 21 inch cast iron pipe sewers have been laid across Thiruvottiyur High Road and in the Pumping Station compound and the Contract has been completed.

Piecework Contract No. 16 :—Constructing, collecting, screening and suction chambers.—The above work has been finished except fixing of penstocks, screens, etc. which will be done departmentally.

DRAINAGE OF OUTLYING AREAS.

Kilpauk Area.

Sewer laying :—Contract A—Kilpauk Main Intercepting sewers.—The sewers that remained to be laid under the contract in Poonamalle High Road, Barnabys Road, Dr. Muniappa Road and Temple lane have been completed. The subsoil in the above streets being bad at the invert level of the sewer the cast iron pipes were laid on teakwood piles and transoms.

The sewers completed under the above contract were taken over from the contractor after the maintenance period.

Contract 'B'—Kilpauk Branch Intercepting sewer.—Kilpauk Garden Road Iynavaram Burial Ground Road, and Iynavaram Kilpauk Road have been sewerred. Three lengths of 12 inch stoneware pipe sewer that remained to be laid under the contract in Taylors Road have also been completed. The subsoil being bad at the invert level of the sewers, the stoneware pipes were laid on concrete cradle with blue granite jelly in combination mortar and haunched at sides with brick jelly concrete in combination mortar. The cast iron pipes were supported on teakwood bearing piles driven to reach firm ground.

The sewers completed under the contract were taken over from the contractors after the maintenance period.

Table No. 22—Appendix II gives the quantity of work done and the expenditure incurred.

Chetput Area.

Sewer laying :—*Contract C*—Chetput Intercepting sewer.—2079 feet of 15 inch cast iron pipe sewer have been laid from Pachaiyappas Hostel Road to Mc. Nichols Road through the intervening private land bearing R. S. No. 357 Egmore and Poramboke channel R. S. 363, Egmore. The work of laying 18 inch cast iron pipe sewer was continued from Mc. Nichols Road through Jagannathapuram School Street and Jagannathapuram 3rd Street to the pumping station and completed except one length in the former street which is in progress. The soil and subsoil continued to be bad. The cast iron pipes were allowed to rest on piles about 12 feet below the invert level of the sewer.

Table No. 23—Appendix II gives the quantity of work done and the expenditure incurred.

Pumping Stations :—Kilpauk and Chetput—Collecting, screening and suction wells.—Tenders for the construction of these wells for Chetput and Kilpauk pumping Stations were received, but as the lowest tender amount was more than the departmental estimate, the Council at its meeting on 18-8-36 decided that the work should be done by direct labour. The matter has been duly reported to Government. During the year the wells have been sunk and completed to the required level and also sealed at the bottom with blue granite jelly in cement mortar. Further work of fixing screen is in progress. It is satisfactory to record that the work will be completed within the estimated amount.

SUPPLEMENTARY WORKS.

Ice House Road Area.

Sewer laying in Royapettah—Sanctioned by Government in G. O. No. M. S. 5068 L. & M., dated 23-11-1934.

Sewer laying :—Departmental.—Two house connections have been given in Royapettah High Road.

Drainage of certain Streets and Lanes—Sanctioned by Government in G. O. M. S. 477, dated 20-5-1936.

Departmental.—House drains in the Street will be connected to the sewer as and when the drains are constructed and brought to the Street limit. One house connection has been given in the Street.

Piecework Contract No. 17—Tholasingaperumal Coil Lane and Madhi Hussain Lane have been sewered during the year. The Lanes are now free from stagnation of sewage.

House connections will be given as and when the interior drains are constructed and brought to the street limit.

North Mylapore Area.

33. A 6 inch stoneware pipe sewer has been laid by direct labour to a length of 276 feet in Lloyds Lane and 196 ft. in Arrack Godown Street at the cost of the residents. House connections will be given to the premises as and when the cost of connections intimated to them is deposited.

Table Nos. 40 & 41—Appendix II gives the quantity of work done and the expenditure incurred.

STORM WATER DRAINAGE WORKS.

George Town Area.

34. Constructing one 11 ft. drain along Pophams Broadway, Old Slaughter House Road and M. & S. M. Railway compound.

This drain was constructed to a length of 709 ft. Some portions of compound walls and a latrine which came across the alignment had to be dismantled and reconstructed.

Constructing one 11 ft. drain in M. & S. M. Ry. yard with abutments 3'-6" thick:—

This is the continuation of the above drain and the abutments for this portion had to be increased to 3'-6" thick to allow for loads of moving locomotives on goods sidings over the drain. The length constructed is 697 ft.

Constructing two 11 ft. drains near the northern outfall:—

As the above two 11 ft. drains cross the North Beach Road transhipment of tramway passengers had to be arranged. The work was completed expeditiously. A length of 149 ft. of double drain was completed.

Constructing two 11 ft. drains near the northern outfall under the railway tracks with abutments 4'-6" thick:—

Much difficulty was experienced when this work was taken up especially in excavation of the trench in which a large quantity of big boulders were met with. These boulders seem to have been part of the old harbour rivetments. These were removed with the help of Steam cranes hired from Port Trust. The work had to be done on three week ends only without any hindrance to the railway traffic. In order that train service may not be dislocated elaborate temporary crib work arrangements were made, and the work was completed with great care and speed. This was one of the most difficult piece of work that was undertaken during the year. The temporary crib work arrangements were made by the M. & S. M. Ry. The length of the double drain constructed under the railway tracks is 55 ft.

Improvements to the tributary drains:—Improvements such as widening of drains, plastering covering with R. C. Slabs etc. were done in Parish Venkatachala Iyer Street, Ammen Koil Street, Mannady Street, China Bazaar Road (West of Pophams Broadway), Audiappa Naicken Street and Anna Pillai Street.

North Mylapore Area.

A further length of 50 ft. of open channel that remained to be constructed has been completed. A silt pit to arrest foreign matters and a foot bridge across the channel to serve as passage for the public have also been provided at the end of the channel near the Buckingham Canal. Along the southern side of the channel, a barbed wire fence has been put up to prevent nuisance being committed.

Lloyds Road Drain.

In continuation of 6'-3" x 5'-0" drain in Mowbrays Road a masonry drain of 8'-9" x 5'-9" has been constructed in Edward Elliotts Road from Mowbrays Road to Sullivans Garden Road. Inspection chambers at about 50 ft. apart and storm water inlets at suitable intervals have also been provided.

Table No. 42—Appendix II gives the quantity of work done and the expenditure incurred.

FLUSH-OUT LATRINES.

35. Progress in the construction of flush-out latrines in private houses continues to be fair. The compulsory introduction of the scheme has been extended and is in force in the following divisions :—

Of the Divisions above, Division 23 has been practically completed and the 14th, 15th, 18th, 20th, 26th and 28th divisions are nearing completion.

Besides the compulsory areas, work has been in progress in the other divisions of the city also.

The total number of latrines constructed upto 31-3-1937 is 6123 under the Advances Recoverable Account and 5596 under Deposit Account.

Tables 43 & 44 give details about the work.

During the year 1563 proposals submitted by plumbers for sanitary installations were examined, the total number of flush-out latrines constructed by Sanitary Engineering firms and private plumbers during the year being 1403.

Registration of flush-out latrine agreements and effect on progress.

Registration of agreements executed by parties for payment of the cost in instalments continues to be enforced. The number of agreements registered during the year is 203, the total number up to the end of the year being 918.

Owing to enforcement of registration of these agreements entailing certain amount of delay and inconvenience to the house owners there has not been good progress under Advance Recoverable works. But there has been a corresponding increase in the progress of Deposit works. During the year

the number of works done under Deposit Account is six times that under Advances Recoverable Account.

Collections:—In about 3402 cases under Advances Recoverable Account the cost of construction with interest has been completely collected. This number excludes 475 cases where Standing Committee authorised the writing off of interest dues referred to in the previous report.

Suits:—Sanction to file suits was obtained in about 35 cases during the year, the total number of cases sanctioned upto 31-3-37 being 1132. In 92 cases suits were filed during the year, the total number of suits filed upto the end of the year being 378. Of the 92 suits, 17 were settled out of Court, 71 were decreed and 4 are under trial.

Measures Adopted:—Only persuasive measures were being adopted in getting the parties to comply with the scheme till recently. As this was found to produce no satisfactory result prosecutions were commenced in or about August '36. Before prosecutions are launched sufficient time is given to the parties for complying with the scheme.

Table No. 44 gives details about prosecutions.

Establishment and other charges:—It was understood at the time of introduction of the scheme that the establishment and other charges would be met from general funds of the Corporation. Supervision charges were not levied in the beginning. Later, a 10 per cent. supervision charge was fixed by the Council and this rate has been increased to 15 per cent when the additional staff was sanctioned on 24-4-34. The cost of establishment in excess over the supervision charges levied upto 31-3-37 works out to about Rs. 68,012.

General:—The total number of proposals prepared upto the end of the year is about 33,477. Of these, work has been done in about 11719 cases. In most of the remaining cases, parties have been postponing the constructions on some excuse or other. Efforts are being made to concentrate attention in the compulsory areas and to complete the scheme early.

CONTRACTS.

36. The following is a short account of some of the important contracts under execution during the year. For a fuller account reference may be made to Table No. 45 Appendix II.

Contract M. & M. No. 89:—For the supply of glazedware pipes and specials. The tender of the Perfect Pottery Co. Ltd. was accepted as being lower than that of the other, there being only two tenders. The pipes and specials had been supplied by the contractors and the contract closed.

Contract M. M. No. 91:—Tenders for the supply of glazedware pipes and specials were received on 12-2-37. As the rates tendered by each firm were about 30 to 50 per cent. higher than the rates tendered by them in the previous contracts during the past three years, and as the rates and conditions were identical, it was decided to reject the two tenders and to call for fresh ones specifying clearly that foreign made pipes will also be considered. Sanction of the Standing Committee applied for is awaited.

Contract R. M. No. 1:—Laying Royapuram Intercepting sewers by Messrs. Gannon, Dunkerley & Co. Ltd. has been completed except for repairs of buildings damaged.

Contract No. 7:—Laying Thiruvateeswaranpet Intercepting sewers by the General Construction Co., Ltd. has been completed.

Piecework Contract No. 6:—Sewer-laying in Purasawalkam area by the General Construction Co., Ltd., has been completed.

Piecework Contract No. 10:—Sewer-laying in different areas in the city by Mr. R. Venkatesam Chetty is in progress.

Piecework Contract No. 14-A:—Laying sewers etc., from the junction Manhole No. 1 at Thiruvotiyur High Road to the Collecting Well of the

proposed 'E' pumping station. The contract has been awarded to Mr. G. Seetharama Chetty, and the work has been completed.

Piecework Contract No. 16:—Tenders for constructing collecting, screening and suction chambers in Tondiarpet 'E' area were received on 17-5-36, and the lowest that of Mr. G. Seetharama Chetty has been accepted and the work has been completed.

Piecework Contract No. 17:—Sewer-laying in a few different streets and lanes. Tenders were received on 5th August 1936. The lowest tenders, namely, that of Mr. R. Venkatasam Chetty for sewerage Nayar Varadha Pillai Street, Thanappa Chetty Street, Madhi Hussain lane, Bye-lanes in Seven Wells, Nattu Subroya Mudali lane and conservancy lane behind Tholasinga Perumal Koil Street and that of Mr. T. A. C. Subramania Chetty for sewerage Luz Avenue Road have been accepted. The works in all the streets and lanes mentioned above have been completed by the respective contractors except for a lane in Seven Wells Division.

Piecework Contract No. 18:—For laying sewers, constructing manholes and all appurtenances in Tondiarpet 'E' area. Tenders were received on 15-1-37 and the S. C. at its meeting on 30-3-37 accepted the lowest tender of Mr. K. V. Kuppusawmy Chetty.

Piecework Contract No. 19:—For laying sewers, constructing manholes and all appurtenances in South Mylapore area. Tenders were received on 15-1-37 and the lowest, that of Mr. K. V. Kuppuswami Chetty has been accepted, and the work is in progress.

Contract Nos. A, B & C:—For laying Kilpauk Main and Branch Intercepting sewers and Chetput Intercepting sewers. The successful tenderer in the case of Contracts A & B is Mr. K. V. Kuppuswami Chetty and Messrs. Gannon, Dunkerley in Contract C. The works in Contracts A & B have been completed and those in Contract C are in progress.

Piecework Contract Nos. D & E:—Tenders for constructing, collecting, screening and suction chambers in Chetput and Kilpauk areas were received on 8-6-36. As the amount of tenders in each case exceeded the sanctioned estimate figure, the Council at its meeting held on 18th August 1936 rejected the tenders in favour of direct labour. The work has been put in hand departmentally and is in progress.

Piecework Contracts F & G:—Laying sewers etc. in Chetput and Kilpauk areas. Tenders were received on 24th August 1936. The lowest tender in each case has been accepted, and the contracts have been awarded to the respective contractors, namely, Messrs. Gannon Dunkerley & Co., Ltd. and Messrs. K. Rathnam & Co. The contractors have executed the necessary agreements and the works are in progress.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

37. *General Progress.*—As in the past three years the Corporation continued, for financial reasons, the policy of confining its entire attention to the maintenance of its existing schools in an efficient condition. Thus, the total number of Corporation Elementary Schools on 31-3-1937 was 134 which was the figure for the previous year also. A higher standard was opened during 1936-37 only in one school i.e., the 8th standard in the Muslim Girls' Higher Elementary School, Thayar Sahib Street, Thiruvateswaranpet. Though the number of schools maintained by the Corporation remained stationary in 1935-36, the number of pupils on the roll rose from 34,916 on 31-3-1936 to 35,520 on 31-3-1937.

According to the statement furnished by the Government Educational Department, the total number of Elementary Schools in the city during the year under report was 353 as against the 367 in the previous year. Of the former, 134 were Corporation Schools as reported above; 13 were managed by the Government; 198 were aided schools, both Mission and Non-Mission; and 8 were unaided schools, the corresponding figures in the previous year being

134, 16, 213 and 4. The number of non-Municipal Schools fell from 233 in 1935-36 to 219 during the year under report.

The table below shows the number of Municipal and Non-Municipal Schools in the city and the children reading in them since 1932-33 :—

It will be seen from the statement that the total number of children under instruction in the Corporation Schools during the year increased by 604, the increase in the previous year being 753.

According to the rough census of children of school-going age taken by the teachers of the Corporation Schools in 1936, there were still 14,607 children of such age without instruction. As in the previous years, only persuasive methods were adopted to bring children of school-age under instruction, and the facilities afforded by the Teachers' Associations were availed of to exhort Corporation School Teachers to persuade parents to send their children to school regularly. As explained last year, the difficulty experienced in effectively enforcing compulsion is due to want of adequate finance. In the latter part of the year under report, civic talks were broadcast from the radio at the Ripon Buildings explaining to the public the necessity and importance of elementary education, and the value of parental co-operation with teachers in the matter of sending children to schools, and ensuring their regular attendance until the 5th standard course is completed. Demands for additional accommodation and additional staff and equipment were received from several schools, and these were met to a fair extent. But the financial position during the year was not found to be sufficiently strong to justify either the enforcement of compulsion in regard to all the children of school-age who were not attending any school, or the starting of new types of schools like Part-time schools.

Housing of Corporation Schools.—Out of the 134 Corporation Elementary Schools both for boys and girls, 57 were located in 56 Corporation and Government buildings, and 77 in 76 rented buildings. Besides these, 14 additional buildings were used for accommodating some classes. In 1936-37 two of the owned buildings were provided with additional accommodation. Substantial additional accommodation was provided to 3 rented buildings in which two Boys' Schools and one Girls' School are located. And one girls' school was shifted to a more spacious building. Further, as in the previous year, systematic efforts were made to rectify the defects pointed out from time to time by the Inspecting Officers of Government and the Medical Inspectors and Inspectresses, in the matter of improving the sanitation and accommodation of rented school buildings inspected by them.

Elementary Education.—The total number of Corporation schools remained stationary at 134 since 31-3-1934, as stated already. The total number of children on the rolls of all the Corporation Elementary Schools taken as a whole rose from 34,916 (21,107 boys and 13,809 girls) in 1935-36 to 35,520 (21,205 boys and 14,315 girls) i.e. by 1.7 per cent. The rule regarding removal of chronic absentees was strictly enforced. The number of boys and

girls belonging to Adi-Dravida and Adi-Andhra communities rose from 5,267 (3,857 boys and 1,410 girls) on 31-3-1936 to 5,447 (3,881 boys and 1,566 girls) on 31-3-1937) i. e. by 3.4 per cent. In the case of Muslim children in Corporation Schools the strength in 1936-37 was 5013 (2,459 boys and 2,554 girls) as against 5,199 (2,546 boys and 2,653 girls). Thus there was a decrease of 186 (87 boys and 99 girls) i. e., by 3.6 p. c. So far as can be ascertained, economic causes forcing several poor children of school-age to earn their livelihood appear to be the primary reason for the fall. The presence of unrecognised rival schools was found to be the main cause for the depletion of strength in one Corporation Muslim School. Steps were then taken to shut the school to a more promising centre from the school year, 1937-38.

Finance Capital Account—The year opened with a balance of Rs. 37,752-8-1, as against Rs. 43,251-5-11 in the previous year. A loan of Rs. one lakh was granted by Government towards the close of March 1937. The balance left at the end of the year was Rs. 1,35,696-0-6.

Revenue Account—The balance at the beginning of the year was Rs. 46,566-12-7, as against Rs. 51,889-3-0 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 3,07,384-4-6 was realised by way of education tax at 1½ p. c. on the Annual Valuation of the buildings, and a sum of Rs. 2,69,908-12-0 was received from Government as equivalent contribution, under section 37 of the Elementary Education Act, in respect of the education tax realised during 1935-36, besides another sum of Rs. 29,700 as grant under the proviso to Section 37 of the Act. Statements 1 & 3 of Appendix III show the financial position of the Elementary Education Fund, and the expenditure on education during the year.

Recognition—The following Corporation Schools remained unrecognised by the District Educational Council at the end of the year:—

1. Corporation Boys' School, Ibrahim Sahib Street, G. T.
2. Corporation Girls' School, Madavaram High Road, Perambur. The Corporation Boys' School, Ibrahim Sahib Street, G. T., for which temporary recognition was granted till 1-4-1936 had been shifted to a new and better building with the previous approval of the Inspecting Officers of Government, and fresh recognition was sought for during the year under report. And steps had already been taken to remedy the defects pointed out by the District Educational Council in regard to the accommodation in the Corporation Girls' School, Madavaram High Road, Perambur. Grant of recognition to this school also is awaited.

Staff—On 31-3-1937 there were 993 assistants for secular instruction, 31 assistants for religious instruction, 15 music mistresses, 45 instructors for teaching crafts and 1 drill master and 1 drawing master for Muslim Boys' Schools. All the head teachers, except two and all the assistant teachers except six were fully qualified. Of the eight exceptions, one working in Muslim school has been exempted by the Government from training, two have undergone training, though they have not passed the written test. Of these, one who was instructed to re-appear and pass her written test examination was not able to do so this year also, though she has remitted examination fees, and tried to prepare for the Examination. The other is too old to sit for the examination. The remaining five are Gujarati teachers. The proposal to send them up for training at the Training school for men, Baroda, in batches has been passed by the Standing Committee (Education) and (Taxation and Finance), and the subject is pending before the Council.

The strength of the supervising staff remained the same as in the previous year. Their work was mainly instructional in character. They had to assist, however, to a certain extent in the administration of the schools, and in the organisation of the monthly meetings of the Corporation Teachers' Association. They supervised the taking of census by the school teachers. Proposals for the re-organisation of the supervisory staff with a view to improving its efficiency were under active consideration during the year under report.

The Teachers' Association worked, as usual, during the year in six groups—four for men and two for women.

The attendance at the meetings was, as usual, compulsory. Considerable work of educational value to the teachers was done by the several branches of the Association. The Inspecting Officers of Government and several other educationists helped the work of the Association by taking part in its meetings.

Adult Education—Besides imparting Elementary Education in its ordinary day schools, the Corporation has been encouraging adult education by permitting private associations to run night schools in the Corporation School buildings. 38 private night schools were thus working in such buildings during the year under report.

Permission was also given to several Corporation School teachers to work in *bona-fide* night schools. Sanction was accorded further to a large number of associations to use the Corporation school buildings for conducting literary study classes and for holding public meetings when lectures on topics relating to literature, ethics, public health and civic matters were delivered.

38. **Midday Meal**—As in the previous year, midday meal was supplied to 4500 poor children reading in 84 of the Corporation Schools. Demands for the meal for many more poor children could not be met for financial reasons. The total cost of providing this free midday meal during the year amounted to Rs. 37,110-9-6 as against Rs. 30,266-0-11 in the previous year. As explained in the last years' report the entire cost on this supply was met from the General Funds of the Corporation.

39. **Education Camp**—The annual Education Camp for the Corporation School teachers was held at Red Hills in January 1937. 245 teachers (214 men and 31 women) attended. As in the previous year, the camp was organised by the teachers themselves, under the auspices of their own private Association, and conducted with the active support of the Corporation which contributed a sum of Rs. 200 towards the expenses of the Camp as against Rs. 100 sanctioned last year.

The Mayor, The Commissioner and several Councillors, Officers of the Government Educational Department, and many other distinguished educationists took part in the proceedings of the Camp. Mr. G. L. Lobo, I.E.S., B. A. (Hons.) Cantab., the Divisional Inspector of Schools, Madras South, opened the Camp.

40. **Physical Education**—One more school play ground was added during the year under report. The following is a list of all the play-grounds maintained from the Elementary Education Fund:—

The last named Play Ground (Royapettah) was opened newly during 1936-37. Besides these 8 play grounds with separate instructors, there were two other play grounds within school compounds, which were also fitted with apparatus but which had no separate instructors. The public play grounds at Papples' Park and Robinson Park were, as usual, maintained from the General Funds.

Inter-School Sports—Inter-school Sports for the year were held in March 1937, and 118 schools and 2,577 boys and girls competed this year, as against 105

girls belonging to Adi-Dravida and Adi-Andhra communities rose from 5,267 (3,857 boys and 1,410 girls) on 31-3-1936 to 5,447 (3,881 boys and 1,566 girls) on 31-3-1937) i. e. by 3.4 per cent. In the case of Muslim children in Corporation Schools the strength in 1936-37 was 5013 (2,459 boys and 2,554 girls) as against 5,199 (2,546 boys and 2,653 girls). Thus there was a decrease of 186 (87 boys and 99 girls) i. e., by 3.6 p. c. So far as can be ascertained, economic causes forcing several poor children of school-age to earn their livelihood appear to be the primary reason for the fall. The presence of unrecognised rival schools was found to be the main cause for the depletion of strength in one Corporation Muslim School. Steps were then taken to shut the school to a more promising centre from the school year, 1937-38.

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Inter-School Sports—Inter-school Sports for the year were held in March 1937, and 118 schools and 2,577 boys and girls competed this year, as against 105

schools and 2,026 pupils in the previous year. For the first time this year, sports were held for the Corporation Muslim Girls' Schools also. A sum of Rs 250 provided in the Elementary Education Budget for the sports was utilised in the manner laid down by the rules governing the matter. Prizes for the non-Muslim winners were distributed by Mrs. Ammu Swaminathan, Chairman of the Standing Committee (Education) at the S. I. A. A. Grounds, those for the Muslim Girls were given away by Mrs. Rukmini Lakshmipathi, M. L. A. Chairman of the Standing Committee (Works).

41. *Reading Rooms*:—The number of free reading rooms for the public maintained by the Corporation increased from 10 last year to 11 in 1936-37. They are located at the following places:—

The Corporation Free Reading Room at Vepery,—No. 5 in the above list was the one newly opened during the year under report.

42. *Sunkuvar Civic Library—Ripon Buildings*.—As stated in the last year's report, this Library is open to the public during office hours on all working days. It has 825 volumes relating largely to civic matters. During the year under report, it was made use of by 1207 visitors.

43. *The Corporation Circulating Library, Mylapore*.—A free circulating library was opened by the Corporation on 23-10-1936 in the old 80th Division (now 39th Division) by M. R. Ry. T. S. Ramaswamy Iyer Avergal, B.A., B.L., the then Municipal Councillor of the division. The library contains 1,134 volumes in English, Tamil, Telugu, Urdu, Sanskrit and Canarese. It is open to the rate-payers of the division, and there were 8 members attached to the Library till 31-3-1937. Each member has to deposit a sum of Rs. 2. The library has an attender who circulates books to the members.

44. *Medical Inspection of Schools*.—The defects noticed by the Medical Inspectors and Inspectresses during the year were rectified, as far as feasible. The Standing Committee (Education) took keen interest in the following up—work done by the teachers. Minor ailments were treated at the Corporation Dispensaries, while cases of a serious nature were recommended for treatment at the Special hospitals, and several children were benefited by such treatment. A detailed report on the medical inspection of Corporation Schools will be found in the Annual Report of the Health Officer for the year 1936.

45. *Radio*.—At the end of the year there were 14 Corporation Schools with radios installed in them as against the 12 of the previous year:—

In two schools last named, radios were installed in 1936-37, and in addition to these 14 school radios, there is one installed in the Corporation Free Reading Room at Lawder's Gate Road, Kilpauk.

Stories and music for school children were, as usual, broadcast from the Studio at the Ripon Buildings by music mistresses and teachers of Corporation Schools.

Excursions:—Statement No. 7 Appendix III of the report indicates the places to which the children of the Corporation Schools were taken on excursion during the year. These were, as usual, arranged on different days to suit the needs of individual schools, the cost being borne by the pupils themselves. The number of places visited during the year rose from 29 in 1935-36 to 32 in 1936-37.

Flower Show:—As in the previous year, a competition in Flower Show for the Corporation Elementary Schools was held at the general Annual Flower Show held at People's Park in February 1937. 26 Corporation Boys' and Girls' Schools took part, and the prize was won by the pupils of the Corporation Girls' School, Venkatarangam Pillai Street, Triplicane.

As usual, the Corporation Schools teachers, served in large numbers as volunteers on the Leper Day organised by the Madras City Leper Relief Council, the Government having declared that day a holiday to enable the teachers to render this service.

46. *Boy Scouts*:—The number of Scout units in the Corporation Schools during the year under report was 90 as against 80 in the previous year. They were made up of 46 troops, 42 packs and 2 crews and 1 Sea Rover Crew. There were 95 Scouters, 44 Rovers, 777 Scouts and 813 Cubs or 1,729 in all, as against a total strength of 1,541 Scouts in the previous year. 5 Scouts were deputed during the year to undergo Wood-badge Training in Cubbing, 2 in Scouting and 1 in Rovering. 15 Scouters in the Corporation area underwent training in firefighting. In connection with the Jamboree held in Delhi in February 1937, the Madras Corporation Local Association sent an interesting collection of exhibits to the Scout Craft Exhibition at Delhi. A certificate of merit has been won. The Annual Boys' Camp was held at the Besant Scout Camping Centre for 3 days in March 1937, and was attended by 400 Scouts and Cubs. This was one of the biggest camps ever organised by any Local Association. The Visitors' Day of the camp was celebrated on 14-3-1937, when an enthusiastic reception was given to the new President of the Local Association, M. R. Ry. Dewan Bahadur R. Subbayya Naidu Garu, the Commissioner of the Corporation. A number of group camps were organised by individual groups.

During the year under report, the Scouts and Cubs of the Corporation area attended all the Central rallies organised from time to time.

The Scout Day was celebrated on 1-10-1936 on which occasion Mr. Abdul Hameed Khan, M.L.A., the then Mayor, gave a radio talk on Scouting.

As in the previous years, the Scouters of the Corporation area rendered social service in some form or other. On all sea-bathing days, they posted themselves at important bathing centres along the sea-shore, and warned the

public against the danger of getting into the sea beyond the safety line. The members of the Sea Rover Crew are particularly interested in this work. Services were also rendered at several local festivals. Scouters and Rovers also helped in putting out a fire at Solayappa Street on 11-9-1936, and assisted at the conduct of public functions, such as Educational Conferences etc.

During the year under report, scouting in Corporation Schools was placed on a permanent footing by the inclusion of the post of Organising Secretary in the schedule of permanent appointment.

Girl Guides.—The number of Blue Bird flocks and that of the Blue Birds remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 30 and 400 respectively. The Blue Birds attached to two of the Corporation Girls Schools presented a possee of Welcome to Their Excellencies in February 1937, in connection with the opening of the Flower Show. During the year under report, six of the lady teachers of the Corporation Girls' Schools underwent Guiders' Training at Ooty.

47. *Corporation High School, Nungambakkam. Strength.*—The strength of the High School during the year was 544 including 31 girls as against 490 in the previous year. There were 57 pupils of scheduled classes, 3 Muslims, 31 Indian Christians, 171 Brahmins, and 282 Non-Brahmin Hindus. The average number on rolls for the year was 550, and the average attendance, 505. Under rule 92 of the Madras Educational Rules, 291 pupils enjoyed the concessions granted by the Standing Committee (Education). The fee income foregone by the Corporation on that account was Rs. 4,928-2-0. The District Educational Officer, Madras, sanctioned to 13 pupils of the High School scholarships, amounting in all to Rs. 486. The value of the scholarships granted by the Inspectress of Girls' Schools, 3rd Circle to 2 pupils amounted to Rs. 54. And the Commissioner of Labour, Madras, sanctioned such scholarships to 20 pupils, the total amount awarded being Rs. 1,054.

Accommodation.—An old zinc shed accomodating 2 sections was replaced by a stronger shed with asbestos roof and cement flooring at a cost of Rs. 910 and certain minor improvements were also made. The construction of a pucca building for the High School which was generously promised for it as free gift by M.R.Ry. Rao Sahib Ganapathi Sastrigal could not be started, owing to the unavoidable delay in getting possession of the necessary site. The matter is still under correspondence and special endeavours are being made to get over the obstacle expeditiously.

Equipment.—The necessary furniture, library books, Science apparatus, and other appliances for teaching, costing in all about Rs. 1,200 were supplied to the school during the year under report.

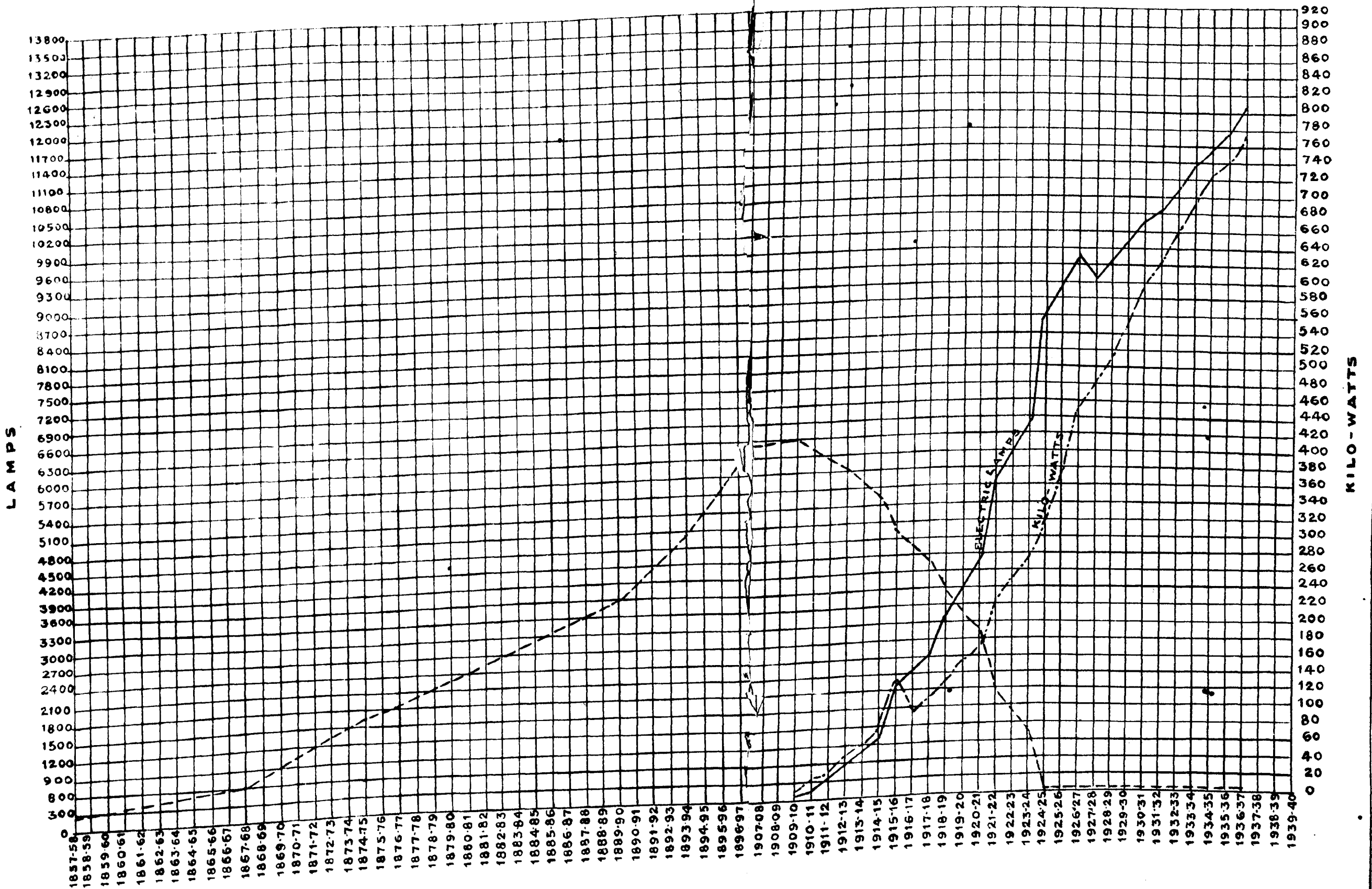
Staff.—An additional section in Form I was added during the year. There are 24 members on the staff, including one who is doing duty as clerk in the High School. Ten are L.Ts., Seven Intermediate Trained teachers, one a Secondary Grade Trained teacher, Four Pandits, one Drill Master, and one Drawing Master.

The net fee income realised from the pupils of the High School during the year 1936-37 was Rs. 15,852-7-0 (*Vide* D. C. B. statement). The expenditure on the staff and clerks and servants was Rs. 16,127-6-0 and that on the new shed, equipment and contribution to the Games Fund amounted to Rs. 3,587-6-7. The net cost for the Corporation for 1936-37 was Rs. 3,862-5-7.

All the usual extra curricular activities of the High School were kept up. Fourteen class-associations worked systematically during the year. Several papers were read, and discussions on many topics were held, and pupils took greater interest than in the past.

There were 36 scouts during the year, and they were more systematic in meeting and learning to equip themselves for their work.

In June 1936, the Government were pleased to alienate 5 acres of land for the use of the Corporation High School, Nungambakkam for purposes of a Play Ground. The improvements to the play ground carried out include fencing

**SANITATION AND MEDICAL SERVICES
HOSPITALS AND DISPENSARIES.**

48. The amount spent on the institution was Rs. 32,145-12-7 as against Rs. 31,922-10-3 in the previous year and Rs. 34,670-0-0 in the budget. The number of in-patients treated was 4133 and that of out-patients 10,220 against 4161 and 13,699 respectively in the previous year. Statements showing the Medical and Non-Medical Institutions to which contributions were paid during the year under report appear in Appendix IV—Table Nos. 8 and 9.

49. *Street Electric Lighting*.—The total number of Street electric lights on 31-3-1937 in the city of Madras was 12,129 as against 11,768 on the same day the year previous to the one under review. The lights consist of:—

6.10 miles of Low Tension and 18.55 miles of High Tension cables were laid during the year. The total length of mains laid by the Corporation for Street lighting is 366.55 miles of which 24.67 three phase High Tension underground cables, 321.22 miles twin core Low Tension underground cables and 20.66 miles are Overhead Mains. The length of High Tension cables laid in connection with the Street Lighting Improvement Scheme is not included. The statement showing the length of the cables laid, the number of lights installed and removed in each year from the commencement of electric lighting is shown in **Appendix IV, Table No. 1.**

Thyagarayanagar Lighting.—The Street electric lighting scheme for providing lights for the Eastern Section is now under progress. So far, 553 lights have been installed. The remaining lights will be installed as and when the roads are formed.

The Street electric lighting scheme for the Western Section at an estimated cost of Rs. 1.5 lakhs was sanctioned by the Council and approved by the Government many years ago. The Scheme will be taken up as soon as the loan applied to the Government is sanctioned. There are at present 80 bracket lights on the Madras Electric Supply Corporation overhead posts and 1 electric lamp post in the area. Besides, there are 32 incandescent oil lamps.

Ornamental lights in front of temples, churches & mosques.—The number of lights installed during the year is 124. The total number of ornamental lights installed up to 1-4-1937 is 747 for which the details are given in **Appendix IV, Table No. 2.**

Electric Clocks on Street Electric Lighting Posts.—16 Street electric clocks (2 faced) were installed during the year. The total number of street electric clocks in the city installed up to 1-4-1937 is 33. The details are shown in **Appendix IV, Table No. 3.**

Lighting the new layouts and hutting grounds taken over by the Corporation.—12 lights were installed during the year in the streets of new layouts and hutting grounds as per **Appendix IV, Table No. 4.**

Advertisement contract.—The contract with Mr. Kalappan for fixing advertisement boards on street electric lamp posts on payment of Rs. 4,000 continued during the year under review.

Electrocution of dogs.—The electrocuting apparatus is working satisfactorily.

50. **Street Lighting Improvement Scheme.**—The scheme for municipalising the distributory system for street lighting throughout the city at an estimated cost of Rs. 12.75 lakhs has been under progress. A sum of Rs. 6.25 lakhs has been received so far from the Government as loan towards this work. This includes the sum of Rs. 2.50 lakhs received in February 1937. The amount of appropriation made up to 1-4-1937 was Rs. 5,42,343-12-2 and the amount of expenditure was Rs. 4,10,674-9-2.

High Tension Mains.—18.55 miles of High Tension cables (.076 miles of 37/083, 5.415 miles of 19/083, 11.375 miles of 19/064, and 1 mile of 7/064) were laid with the necessary cement trough coverings during the year. The total length of High Tension cables laid is 21.095 miles including 2.545 miles of last year.

119 High Tension joints were made during the year. The total number of High Tension joints made was 130.

Sub-stations.—The following sub-station buildings were completed during the year:—

1. Main controlling station at Basin Bridge.
2. South George Town Sub-station.
3. Vepery Sub-station.

Out of the remaining 7 Sub-stations, the site for West George Town Sub-station was acquired and placed in possession at the fag end of the year, awards for the acquisition of East George Town and Chetput Sub-station sites were passed, the site for Mount Road Sub-station was recently settled and the acquisition of sites for Egmore and Ice House Road sub-stations are still pending with the Collector of Madras.

Switchgear.—During the year, erection of Low Tension and High Tension switchgear was under progress in Main Controlling Station, South George Town, Vepery, Thousand Lights Sub-stations and in High Tension Bunk, the supply of High Tension and Low Tension Switchgear, Transformers having been made during the year.

Additional posts.—289 electric lamp posts were fixed, but not lit, for replacing the bracket lights on M. E. S. C. overhead posts in Vepery, South George Town, Egmore, Thousand Lights and Chetput Sub-station areas.

Low Tension cables.—An order was placed with Messrs. Gordon Woodroffe & Co. for the supply of 50 miles of Low Tension cable (20 miles of 7/048 and 30 miles of 7/064) during the year.

51. **Broadcasting Service.**—The Broadcasting Service was first initiated on the 31st July 1924 in this City by the Madras Presidency Radio Club. The Club carried on its useful work till October 1927 when it was wound up owing to financial reasons and the Transmitter was presented to the Corporation of Madras. The Corporation of Madras after considerable correspondence obtained a licence from the Government of India for broadcasting and a regular service was started by the Corporation on the 1st April 1930. The service is intended only for the City of Madras but the outlying districts are taking advantage of the service by installing Radio loudspeakers and hearing the Madras Programmes.

Musical programmes are broadcast in the evenings and special music lessons and interesting stories with morals behind them are broadcast on school days from 4 P. M. to 4-30 P. M. In addition to the daily programme in the evenings, gramophone music is being broadcast in the mornings, from 10 A.M. to 11 A.M. on Sundays and Public Holidays. European Music was broadcast on one Monday each month from 5-30 P. M. to 7-30 P. M. a licence having been obtained from Messrs. Vernon & Co., Madras, Agents for the Performing Right Society Limited, London.

Radio loudspeaking equipments have been installed at the following places and are in operation daily in the evenings:—

Saraswati Bai, Vidvan Chittoor Subramaniam Pillai, Prof. P. Sambamurthy Iyer, Miss Reshom Jan and others gave their performances.

The School Programmes were arranged by the Educational Officer, Corporation of Madras.

Talks on Social, Educational and Health subjects were continued to be broadcast during the year. Rao Bahadur Dr. M. Kesava Pai, O.B.E., M.D. gave a series of lectures on Tuberculosis under the auspices of the Indian Red Cross Society, King George V. Thanksgiving (Anti-tuberculosis) Fund and Dr. J. Josiah Joseph, Chief Leprosy Officer, Madras Presidency, gave a series of interesting talks on Leprosy. Mr. A. S. Trollip, Hony. Joint Secretary, The Safety First Association of India, Bombay, gave a series of lectures on "Safety First". Moulvi Habibullah Sahib, M. A., L. T. gave a talk on "The Life of Prophet Muhammad". Janab Abdul Hameed Khan Sahib Bahadur, B.A., M.L.C. the then Mayor of Madras gave a talk on "Scouting". Major-General Sir Frank P. Connor, Kt., D. S. O., K. H. S., I. M. S., Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras gave a talk on "Maternity & Child Welfare". Col James Sleeman, C. B., C. M. G., C. B. E., M. V. O., Chief Commissioner, The St. John Ambulance Brigade Overseas gave a talk on "The St. John Ambulance Brigade Overseas". Short talks on the significance of Indian Festivities from the book "Some South Indian Festivities" by the late Mr. P. V. Jagadisa Ayyar were broadcast on the day of each festival with the kind permission of the author.

The reports sent by the Police Department about missing persons and foundlings were broadcast at the end of each day's programme. In addition to this, civic talks about health and other subjects for rousing the civic consciousness among the citizens prepared by the various Heads of Departments in the Corporation were broadcast under the orders of the Commissioner, Corporation of Madras. From reports received it was found that these talks were appreciated by the public.

Special Programmes:—During last Christmas, Christmas Music by the Choir of St. Mathias Church, Vepery, Madras was broadcast from 9 P.M. to 10 P.M. on 24-12-1936. During the Easter, a special Easter service by the Rev. J. Darashah, B.A. and other members of the Vepery Baptist Church was broadcast for four days from the 26th March 1937 from 8-30 P.M. to 9-30 P.M. each day.

During the year under report, 110 ladies and 510 gentlemen took part in the broadcast programmes. The total period of transmission was 923 hours and 3 minutes of which a period of 84 hours and 32 minutes was devoted to school programmes and 10 hours and 19 minutes to important news. A further period of 1 hour and 25 minutes was devoted to experimental transmissions. 2671 songs in 199 ragams, 167 Varnams in 36 ragams, 78 Javalis in 17 ragams, 50 Padams in 23 ragams, 122 songs in miscellaneous tunes 16 pallavis in 10 ragams and 10 Thanams in 7 ragams were sung during the year.

Two lawns were laid in College Road, Nungambakam, and the park in Ebramjee Sahib Street was reformed. The plot in front of the Ripon Buildings was improved by laying out a lawn provided with sprays. Peoples Park was also improved further by laying out a garden in the plot opposite to the Zoo gardens. The 18th Annual Flower Show was held on 27-2-1937 and opened by His Excellency the Governor of Madras and Lady Marjorie Erskine. It was kept open till 6-3-1937. The Flower Show was very popular as it attracted thousands of visitors to the garden. On the Ladies' day the show was as usual very well participated and a number of women and children not only from the City but also from the mofussil visited the show. This year also, a Directory of the Flower show was printed and thousand copies were freely distributed to the visitors.

CORPORATION ZOOLOGICAL GARDENS.

54. The Corporation Zoological Gardens in the Peoples Park is in charge of a qualified Superintendent assisted by two Sergeants with the necessary Staff of Animal keepers and coolies for the gardens, working under the immediate orders and supervision of the Assistant Health Officer, South Range, and the institution is under the general control of the Health Officer. The Professor of Zoology, Presidency College, continued to be the Honorary Visitor. The Principal, Veterinary College, was consulted on matters of health of the live-stock whenever necessary, the Corporation Veterinary Officer being in charge of the treatment of the live stock.

Improvements to the Zoo.

The Zoo is in need of improvements in the shape of extension of the area, provision of adequate caging accommodation and equipment on modern lines giving the animals natural environment and fullest possible freedom of movement to keep them healthy and in good condition consistent with their life in captivity, change of habits and other impediments to their natural life.

Owing to financial limitations of the Corporation, improvements on a large scale cannot be effected all at once. However, during the year under report, a start was made by way of constructing a set of cages with an outing yard for wild animals and another shed to stable Giraffes and Camels. The matter of improvements has since been taken into serious consideration. A programme of the scheme of improvements which works out a rough estimate of nearly Rs. 80,000 has been drawn up, with the idea of spreading it over a period of years and getting through the work by yearly instalments of Budget Grants. At the time of the issue of this report, a sum of Rs. 13,200 has been provided as the first instalment for the year for carrying out some of the improvements. It is hoped that this programme will be followed and yearly grants made for the items of improvements selected for the year, so that in course of three or four years the improvements shall have been carried out and the Zoo made worthy of the capital City of the Presidency.

Breeding in the Zoo.

During the year under report, there was breeding among the larger Carnivora, but the cubs were short lived and did not survive the suckling period. Causes contributing to this were ill-breeding owing to the absence of fresh blood stock, want of accommodation in some cases for isolating the mother and litters during the weaning period. However the Zoo was fortunate in securing a Tiger Cub, which was born in the Zoo for the first time in the history of the Zoo, and a Lioness cub which survived all the vicissitudes of the cubstage. The Tiger and the Lioness Cubs are being brought up together and have grown fine. It is hoped to conduct the rare experiment of a cross breed between the Tiger and the Lioness resulting in the birth of a 'Tigon'. The following is the increase by births and hatching during the year under report—4 Lion cubs, 4 Leopard cubs, 7 Spotted Deer, 50 Rabbits, 2 Sheep and 6 Pea-fowl chicks.

Gifts to the Zoo.

During the year under report, 2 Leopards were received as gift from the Estate of Mandasa and an Indian Black Bear from Dr. Sundarraj. An attempt has since been made to address the various Native States with requests for gifts of animals as one of the means of acquiring live stock for the Zoo and the Government of Travancore has been kind enough to respond to the request with an offer of a Tiger Cub and a pair of Sambur deer. It is hoped other States may be pleased to respond to the request.

Purchases.

Owing to the absence of provision in the Budget of the year under report under this heading, no live-stock could be purchased. Action is since being taken for making a provision in the coming Budget to acquire some rare Animals wanted for the Zoo. The Zoo requires replenishment of stock as most of the existing Animals and Birds are very old. It is hoped progress will be made in this direction by the provision of adequate grant in the Budget.

Exchange of Live-stock.

Exchanging of Animals and Birds is one method of clearing the surplus stock of one species and acquiring other rare varieties. The following was the exchange. 4 Lion cubs, 2 Leopards, 2 Baby Baboons were exchanged for 1 German Bear, 1 North Indian Bear, 1 Siamese Bear Cat and 1 Sumatra large sized Monkey.

Sales of Live-stock.

The following surplus stock was cleared by sales viz., 2 Lion cubs, 14 Sheep and 2 Kids, 59 Rabbits, 28, Guinea Pigs, 1 Manilla duck, 1 Common Monkey, 7 Guinea fowls, 6 Pea-fowl chicks and 10 Pigeons.

Deaths.

8 Lion cubs during the suckling stage, 1 sick lion cub (destroyed) Leopard cubs (a few days old), 1 Panther (black), (died of Pnuemonia) 1 Woolly

Monkey (of Ascites), 1 Camel of (Spasmodic Colic and Convulsions died of ailments in spite of treatment), 1 Zebra mare died of injuries from Coetias 1 Kangaroo (injuries due to accidental escape) 1 Emu, 1 Crane, 3 Swans died of old age and natural decay. The causes of death of cubs have been discussed in this report. Animals which were sick were treated but died. Wild animals under captivity lose gradually their powers of resistance to infection and recovery by treatment is purely a matter of chance. All human aids are only artificial and do not generally help the wild animals which are protected by nature and thrive by instinctive methods of self-preservation. All possible sanitary precautions in the matter of feed &c., and medical aid in cases of sickness are helpful up to a certain extent.

Conclusion.

It is gratifying to note that the public and the Council are taking keen interest in the Zoo and it is hoped that in course of time with the help of valued suggestions from the public for improvements to the Zoo, and with the enthusiasm of the Council, the Zoo will become an ideal place of public resort as a Zoological Garden ought to serve as a Civic Amenity and an Educative Institution.

Though the Zoo is one of the Civic Amenities maintained by the Corporation, it is yielding revenue from the leases of the right of collecting gate fees, Bazaars and the right of plying Boats. During the year under report, the right of collecting entrance fees from the visitors and of holding two bazaars was leased out for a period of 3 years ending with 31st March 1939 for a sum of Rs. 59,500 and the three year contract of the right of plying boats in the Zoo lake ended with the year under report.

The report of Captain Westbrook of Calcutta on the reorganisation of the Madras Fire Brigade was pending consideration by the Standing Committee and Council. The expenditure incurred in the maintenance of Fire engines including establishment came to Rs. 24,050-9-2 as against Rs. 23,805-1-7 in the previous year.

Supervision and Management.

56. The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 5,75,491-13-7 which is 9 per cent of total receipts of the year. The portion of this sum spent on Establishment for the purpose of Assesment and collection was Rs. 2,91,076-7-2 or 4.5 per cent of the total receipts.

Repayment of Debt.

57. The total investment at the beginning of the year on account of sinking funds relating to the several loans of the Corporation exclusive of the Government loans, repayable in instalments, stood at Rs. 60,76,700 in Government securities and Madras Municipal Debentures with a cash balance of Rs. 71,334-4-5. During the year under report an allotment of Rs. 1,30,030 was made to the sinking fund from General revenues and a sum of Rs. 2,53,219-11-0 was realised as interest on prior investment of the fund. The total cash receipts of the year amounted to Rs. 4,54,583-15-5. With this, Government securities of the face value of Rs. 3,05,000 and Municipal debentures to the face value of Rs. 34,400 were purchased at a cost of Rs. 3,75,194-4-5. The investments at the close of the year at the credit of the fund aggregated to

Rs. 64,16,100 in Government securities and Municipal debentures with a cash balance of Rs. 79,389-11-0.

Payments amounting to Rs. 7,28,270 were also made during the year towards Government loans of Rs. 92 lakhs, out of which Rs. 3,50,380 was appropriated by the Accountant-General towards the repayment of loans and Rs. 3,77,890 towards interest. The Special Buildings Loan of 1907 for Rs. 1 lakh was discharged during the year. The total amount of loans outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 176,04,380 and the annual charges for their repayment with interest amount to Rs. 13.38 lakhs against the maximum of Rs. 29.09 lakhs to which the borrowing power of the Corporation is limited under Section 144 of the Madras City Municipal Act of 1919.

58. *Remunerative Enterprises—Workshop.* The total value of works carried out in workshop during the year was Rs. 1,45,886-12-0 against Rs. 1,41,416 5-4 last year and the amount earned by way of supervision charges was Rs. 22,021-9-5 as against Rs. 24,890-1-0 in the previous year.

The establishment charges amounted to Rs. 14,324-10-2 as against 13,954-12-11 last year and the expenditure incurred on account of contingent charges such as maintenance of motors, leave allowance to workmen, contingent charges etc., was Rs. 14,334-14-2 or 10.1% on the value of works turned out. Interest on capital outlay was Rs. 2,496-3-10. The total receipts fell short of expenditure by Rs. 9,134-2-9.

GENERAL STORES.

59. The method of issues and other transactions continued as usual.

Scheduled articles.

The total cost of the scheduled articles purchased during the year was Rs. 1,26,257-14-5.

Non-scheduled articles.

12 contractors registered their names for supply and the total cost of the non-scheduled articles purchased during the year was Rs. 28,798-2-2.

The total cost of the articles issued during the year was Rs. 1,47,019-5-6.

Verification of stock.

The periodical verifications were conducted and necessary adjustment due to surpluses and shortages were made with the sanction of the competent authority. The value of surplus stock found during the Annual Verification was Rs. 305-7-0 and shortages written off was Rs. 19-13-4.

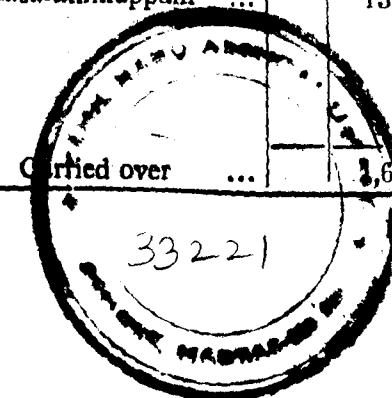

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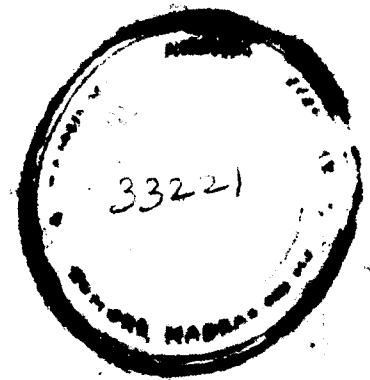
