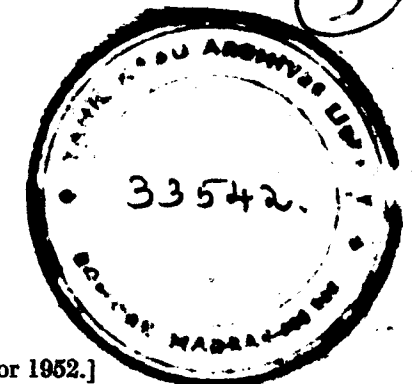

[Reports—Hospitals and Dispensaries—Annual Report for 1952.]

Presented herewith the annual report on the working of Hospitals and Dispensaries in the State for the year 1952.

Dr. P. Arunachalam, M.D. (Madras), M.B.C.P. (London), T.D.D. (Wales), D.M.B. (London), held the office of the Director of Medical Services, throughout the year and Dr. M. V. Ramanamurthi, M.B.B.S., F.R.C.S. (Edin.), continued to hold the post of Deputy Director of Medical Services during the whole of 1952.

3. *Madras Medical Service*.—The Government sanctioned the creation of a post of Dean for the Government Stanley Hospital and Stanley Medical College, Madras. The recruitment of candidates by the Madras Public Service Commission, for regular appointment of Assistant Surgeons in the Madras Medical Service could not be done during 1951 on account of the amalgamation of the cadres of Assistant Surgeons, Classes I and II and the removal of sex discrimination in public services consequent on the advent of the new Constitution of India. During the year under report, the Commission interviewed and selected candidates for appointment as Assistant Surgeons.

4. *Deputation, fellowships and scholarships*.—Two Medical Officers who were selected for post-graduate studies abroad on study leave terms have joined the service and two more medical officers will be proceeding on after they get placements in the University applied for. Three Medical Officers have been selected under the World Health Organization Fellowship for post-graduate studies abroad and they have joined the courses. Out of the four Medical Officers selected under the Technical Cooperation Scheme for post-graduate course, two officers have joined the course and one officer will be proceeding abroad as soon as he gets a placement in the University applied for.

Two Medical Officers for D.M.R. course and four Medical Officers for T.D.D. (in India) have been deputed during the current year. Due to acute shortage of Medical Officers trained in Radiology, Government have sanctioned the deputation of four Medical Officers for training in X-Ray for two months for a period of three years. The question of deputing Medical Officers for this short-term course is under consideration.

5. *Madras General Service—Lay Secretaries and Treasurers*.—During the year under report, the regular selection of candidates for appointment as Lay Secretaries and Treasurers was made and the candidates who were retained before as Lay Secretaries and Treasurers under the emergency provisions of the rules were replaced by regularly selected candidates.

6. *House Surgeons and House Physicians*.—The total number of paid posts for House Surgeons and House Physicians was 165 in 1951. Two paid posts for House Surgeons were sanctioned in each of the following institutions, viz., Kasturba Gandhi Hospital for Women and Children, Madras, Victoria Hospital for Women and Children, Visakhapatnam and the Headquarters Hospital, Tiru, thereby increasing the number of paid posts for House Surgeons to 171 during the year 1952. The number of unpaid posts for House Physicians and House

Surgeons which stood at 180 during 1951 continued to remain at the same level during 1952 also. The paid posts created for House Surgeons and House Physicians could not be filled up completely for want of qualified persons to take up the posts.

7. *Honorary Medical Officers*.—During the year under report, there were 38 Honorary Surgeons and Physicians and 281 Honorary Assistant Medical Officers working in all the Government Hospitals in the State. Nine Honorary Medical Officers resigned and 29 fresh appointments were made. Three posts of Honorary Physicians, four posts of Honorary Surgeons and 24 posts of Honorary Assistant Medical Officers have been created. Dr. C. B. Krishnaswami, Honorary Surgeon, Government General Hospital, Madras, was relieved of the post on 20th November 1952 on attaining the age of 60 years.

8. *Nursing staff*.—The Government approved the employment of a Pediatric Nurse of the World Health Organization in the Pediatrics Department of the Government General Hospital, Madras, under the Technical Assistance Programme and the pediatric nurse deputed by the World Health Organization took charge of her duties in the General Hospital, Madras. A public health nurse of the World Health Organization joined duty in the up-graded Venereal Diseases Department of the Government General Hospital, during this year. The deputation of two Nursing Superintendents and two Nursing Tutors to New Delhi for undergoing a refresher course was sanctioned during the year. The number of posts sanctioned for the members of the nursing staff under various categories was increased by Government during the year under report. The leave reserve posts of Nurses and Head Nurses was also increased by 15 and 1 respectively. The training of nurses in the labour ward in the Government Hospital for Women and Children, Kasturba Gandhi Hospital for Women and Children, Madras and Raja Sir Ramaswamy Mudaliar's Lying-in-Hospital, Madras, was sanctioned. The training of 47 additional Maternity Assistants in Indian languages was sanctioned during the year.

The powers regarding the posting of nurse pupils from partial training centres after the successful completion of Part I Examination in General Sick Nursing which was hitherto vested in the Director of Medical Services were delegated to the President of the Regional Committee for the selection of nurse pupils, Government General Hospital, Madras. Rules for the examination of men nurse pupils in Psychiatry by a Board were issued.

The post-graduate training in Nursing granted by the School of Nursing, Christian Medical College, Vellore, was recognized by the Government. Three candidates who were undergoing probationer nurses' training in the United Kingdom returned to India after the completion of their training and they were posted to the Training Centres for nurses to improve the standard of training in hospitals.

9. *Compounders*.—During the year, the Headquarters Hospital, Anantapur, was recognized as a training centre for compounders. The total number of training centres was increased from 29 to 30 on account of the above recognition.

a combined Tuberculin testing B.C.G. Vaccination and Mass X-Ray survey was conducted in the Women's Christian College during the year under review. With co-operation of the Civil Welfare League of Jagan-shapuram slum area near Chetput, B.C.G. campaign is conducted among the residents of this and the neighbouring slums.

The personnel of the Special Armed Police Battalion stationed at Red Hills were also included in this year's B.C.G. campaign.

The total number of Tuberculin testing during 1952 reached a figure of 31,868 giving an average of 2,656 tests per month. The number of those that were B.C.G. vaccinated was 9,412 with an average of 780 B.C.G. vaccinations a month. Retesting of selected groups of children who were B.C.G. vaccinated were also undertaken as usual. So far no untoward complications after B.C.G. vaccination or onset of Tuberculosis disease among the B.C.G. vaccinated individuals were brought to notice.

During the later part of the year under review, propaganda talks on 'The Problem of Tuberculosis and its Control' with emphasis on B.C.G. were broadcast by Medical Officers from the All-India Radio Studios, Madras, in Tamil, Telugu, Malayalam and Kannada languages.

The B.C.G. campaign in Madras City is completing the fourth year. Till December 1952, a total of little more than 125,000 Tuberculin tests and nearly 35,000 B.C.G. vaccinations were only done. If the B.C.G. campaign is to effect any perceptible change in the morbidity and mortality of Tuberculosis in the country, it has to be expanded to such a scale that all those who need vaccination should be vaccinated within five or seven years.

16. *Ex-patients Colony, Tambaram.*—The ex-patients colony called Amrit Nagar Rehabilitation Centre for ex-patients was opened by Sir Archibald Nye, the High Commissioner for Great Britain in India. At present there are eight cottages providing accommodation for 24 patients, one kitchen room and one store-room and the same is treated as an annexe to the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Tambaram. Some of the patients fit for discharge from the sanatorium are transferred and admitted in the colony for rehabilitation. The inmates are attending to gardening work and they are also engaged in spinning in Gishan charka and thakli. A radio with an amplifier set has been supplied by the Women Sub-Committee of the Provincial Welfare Fund, Madras. They have also up to date some household articles for ex-patients' use. They are visiting the colony once in two weeks, supplying old magazines, novels and books for the inmates. A printing press with machinery worth about Rs. 50,000 has been installed in the colony. During the year, efforts have been made to enable the Superintendent, Government Press, to take over the administration of the Printing Press of the colony.

17. *X-Ray and radium.*—At the beginning of the year under report, the Government Pentland Hospital, Vellore, was the only District Headquarters Hospital, which was not provided with an X-Ray department. The Government sanctioned the purchase of a new X-Ray plant and accessories at a cost of Rs. 32,000 for the hospital during the year under report and also the employment of additional staff required to run the X-Ray department. Arrangements are being made to install the X-Ray plant in the hospital and the new department is expected to start functioning very shortly.

It is gratifying to note that X-Ray departments have also been newly opened in some of the Taluk Headquarters Hospitals, such as the Government Hospital, Kodaikanal, the Government Hospital, Nandyal, and the Government Hospital, Hindupur, with the aid of funds and gifts offered by certain philanthropic gentlemen and social welfare organizations in the State. Of the three institutions mentioned above, the X-Ray department of the Government Hospitals at Kodaikanal and

Nandyal have already begun to function. The X-Ray department at the Government Hospital, Hindupur, is expected to commence work shortly.

In connexion with the implementation of the scheme for the treatment of cancer in some of the City State and District Headquarters Hospitals, the Government have sanctioned the purchase of a deep X-Ray therapy plant for use in the Government Hospital for Women and Children, Madras, at a cost of Rs. 64,000 and also the employment of certain additional staff required to run the new department. The plant has been installed in the hospital and is now functioning. The proposals in respect of the other institutions have been deferred.

The stock of radium in the State owned by Government on 1st January 1952 amounted to 1445.62 mgms. By the conversion of radium bromide into radium needles and the remaking of certain needles, the stock of radium in the State was increased by 769.72 mgms. during the year under report.

18. *Blood bank.*—(1) The number of blood banks in the State in 1951 was only 18. Two more blood banks were opened in the year 1952 in the Headquarters Hospital, Ootacamund, and the Government Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Tambaram. A five year scheme for the extension of blood transfusion service in the State was deferred by Government on financial grounds for consideration as a Part II Scheme for 1954-55.

(2) The Blood Bank Organization took part in the following exhibitions and conferences in different districts in this State to educate the people regarding the importance of blood transfusion:—

(i) All-India Khadi, Swadeshi and Industrial Exhibition, Congress Grounds, Teynampet, Madras.

(ii) The All-India Swadeshi Art and Industrial Exhibition, Kumbakonam.

(iii) International Conference of Social Work Exhibition at the Lady Willingdon Training College, Madras.

(iv) Fourteenth Annual Carnival of the Madras Young Women's Christians' Association.

(v) The Third National Exhibition and Health Festival, Tirunelveli.

In all these exhibitions and conferences, extensive propaganda work was carried out through broadcast and also by exhibition of charts and other exhibits showing how lives of helpless patients dying in hospitals on account of loss of blood due to haemorrhage and other causes could be saved by blood transfusion.

19. *Eye bank.*—The scheme for the supply of eyes of destitute patients dying in City Hospitals to the eye bank maintained in the Government Ophthalmic Hospital, Madras, continued to function satisfactorily. There were 23 calls from the Government General Hospital, Madras, for the removal of eye balls and 14 eye balls were removed and three *Keroplasty*s done.

20. *Administration of Drugs Act.*—Since the submission of last report, 1,793 new licences in Form 20 and 731 new licences in Form 21 have been issued. One thousand five hundred and sixty-one licences in Form 20 and 652 licences in Form 21 have been renewed in this State. Seventeen licences in Form 25 (for the manufacture of drugs other than biological and special products) and 6 licences in Form 28 (for the manufacture of biological and special products) have been issued to the manufacturing concerns in this State. Twenty-two renewal certificates for manufacture of drugs in Form 26 have been granted.

Six hundred and eighty shops licensed under Madras Drugs Rules, 1945, have been inspected by the Drugs Inspector, Madras City. Three thousand nine hundred and seventeen concerns have been inspected in the mufassal by the Drugs Inspectors.

One hundred and three manufacturing concerns in the City and mufassal have been inspected by the Assistant to the Director of Medical Services (Drugs).

Out of 82 samples taken and sent to Government Analyst (Drugs), King Institute, for analysis, 30 samples were reported to be of standard quality and 32 were reported to be of non-standard quality.

Out of 116 candidates called for interview, 91 have been approved as qualified persons under rule 65 (15) (c) of the Madras Drugs Rules, 1945.

21. Rural Medical Scheme.—The response from medical men to take up appointments under the Rural Medical Scheme continued to be poor during the year 1952 also. Consequently 50 dispensaries of modern medicine remained closed during 1952 and 3 subsidised dispensaries of modern medicine were converted into those of indigenous medicine. Government had, however, sanctioned the opening of 6 subsidised dispensaries (5 of modern medicine and 1 of indigenous medicine) during the year under report. To obviate the difficulty in securing qualified medical men for appointment under the Rural Medical Scheme, the question of introducing the training of medical auxiliary personnel who would work in rural areas in combination with Mobile Medical Units, is under the consideration of Government. This will, it is hoped, solve the problem of provision of adequate medical relief to rural areas to a considerable extent.

22. Primary centres.—There are at present 23 primary centres working in this State. The question of replacing these primary centres opened in rural areas under the Post-war Scheme by mobile dispensaries is under consideration of the Government as the existing primary centres have not fulfilled the purpose for which they were established.

23. Medical relief in famine-affected areas.—On account of acute food and water scarcity, conditions which existed in the first quarter of 1952 in Rajampet, Rayachoti and Badvel taluks of Cuddapah district, distribution of gruel in various centres was carried out. Road and other works were started to give employment to labour. The congregation on population in such circumstances in rural parts far removed from hospital facilities required the provision of medical relief in such places. Arrangements were accordingly made to provide medical relief in the famine-affected areas by the provision of Mobile Medical Units.

The Shree Jain Medical Relief Society, Madras, offered to equip one ambulance van to be diverted to the famine-affected area with qualified medical personnel and necessary equipment. The offer was accepted and the ambulance at the General Hospital, Madras, was placed at the disposal of the society. Similarly two ambulance vans at Ramanathapuram and Bellary were diverted for medical relief in the famine-affected taluks of Cuddapah district. When famine conditions were reported in Anantapur and Kurnool districts, three ambulance vans from neighbouring hospitals for rendering medical aid in the Kadiri, Penukonda, Tadpatri and Madakasira taluks in Anantapur district and one ambulance van for doing similar work in the Cumbum and Markapur taluks of the Kurnool district were sent. Eight taluks were declared to be famine affected in Chittoor district and two Fire Service Ambulance vans were placed at the disposal of the District Medical Officer for rendering medical aid in the famine-affected areas. A temporary shed was put up in the compound of the Headquarters Hospital, Cuddapah, to accommodate 50 chronic malnutrition cases. I place on record the exceedingly good work done by the ambulance vans under trying conditions in the various famine-affected areas of the State till the food and water scarcity improved in those parts.

24. Buildings.—The structural alterations to the second floor of the Government General Hospital, Madras, hitherto occupied by nurses at an estimated cost of Rs. 50,000 were approved during the year under report. The Maternity block of the new Headquarters Hospital,

Tiruchirappalli, at an estimated cost of Rs. 4.5 lakhs is nearing completion. The following improvements have been sanctioned:—

- (i) Construction of additional ward and improvements to the Government Hospital, Guntur district, at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,04,000.
- (ii) Improvements to the Government Hospital, Kadiri, Anantapur district, at a cost of Rs. 1,15,000.
- (iii) Improvements to the Government Hospital, Nuzvid, Krishna district, at a cost of Rs. 2,33,000.
- (iv) Acquisition of land for locating the Government Hospital, Paramakudi, Ramanathapuram district, at a cost of Rs. 1,68,800.

During the year under report, the following donations have been accepted by the Government with thanks:—

- (i) The offer of Mr. E. W. Simcock to construct a children's ward in the Government Headquarters Hospital, Salem.
- (ii) The offer of the South East Asia World University Service to provide amenities, etc., to patients in the Government Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Tambaram.

25. District medical lending libraries.—The district lending libraries had 1,233 members at the beginning of the year and 1,211 at the close of the year. The number of books available at the end of the year was 9,681 as compared with 10,283 in 1951. The receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 35,028-2-1. The cash balance at the close of the year was Rs. 28,110-9-7 as compared to Rs. 28,167-15-6 in 1951.

26. Hospital Advisory Committees.—The Advisory Committees of the State Medical Institutions in Madras City, District Headquarters Hospitals and other mufassal stations continued to do useful work during the year. The vacancies caused by the expiry of the term of office of non-official members were filled up by nominating either public-spirited persons or elected legislators.

28. Foreign supplies.—(a) Soap.—The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund have been able to purchase with their allocated funds a total of 307,400 lb. of washing soap for distribution in India. During the year under report, 30,000 lb. of soap (600 cases, each containing 50 lb.) were received free of cost from the

United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund for distribution to poor and indigent women and children attending the medical institutions, while 27,000 lb. were supplied to the Public Health Department. The soap cases were distributed to all the Hospitals in the city and to Headquarters Hospitals in the mufassal and the King George Hospital, Visakhapatnam.

(b) Iron lung.—Portable Iron lungs were supplied to the King George Hospital Visakhapatnam and the Government General Hospital, Madras. The Iron Lung at Visakhapatnam is working satisfactorily. The Iron Lung supplied to the Government General Hospital, Madras, was given on loan to authorities at Bangkok through the Representative, Ministry of Commerce, Government of Thailand and Calcutta.

(c) Motor vehicle.—The Upgraded Venereal Diseases Department of the Government General Hospital, Madras was provided with a motor vehicle by the World Health Organization for use as transport to the World Health Organization personnel attached to the Upgraded Venereal Diseases Department. The maintenance charges of this vehicle are met by the State Government.

(d) A list of equipments, etc., required for the use of Pediatric Department of the General Hospital, Madras, was sent to the Regional Director of United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund in the matter of aid promised by him during his visit to the Pediatric Department. The first consignment of equipment required was received in February 1952 from the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund through the Deputy Assistant Director-General, Madras.

(e) The Physicians Obstetrical Bag was received from United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund through the Medical Store Depot, Madras, free of cost for the use of Government Victoria Hospital for Women and Children, Visakhapatnam.

29. District Medical Officers' Conference.—The first conference of the District Medical Officers was held in August 1929, the second and third in July 1931 and March 1937 respectively. After 1937, no conference of the District Medical Officers was convened. In 1948, the necessity for holding a conference of District Medical Officers at Madras was felt. Though the Government sanctioned the holding of the conference in September 1948, yet for some reason or other it had to be deferred till 1950 when finally it was decided to hold the conference at a still later date. The fourth District Medical Officers Conference was finally held from 22nd August to 24th August 1952. The various recommendations of the conference are under active consideration of Government and the Director of Medical Services.

STATISTICS.

Statement A.

30. This statement gives the classification of medical institutions in six different classes, viz., State Public, State Special, Local Fund and Municipal, Private aided, Private non-aided and subsidised Rural dispensaries. At the commencement of the year, there were 1,232 medical institutions of all classes and at the end of the year there were 1,224.

Twenty-nine institutions were opened during the year of which 8 were State-Public, 7 Local Fund and Municipal, 5 Private aided and non-aided and nine subsidised rural dispensaries.

Statement B.

31. This statement shows the distribution of medical personnel at the Headquarters of the State and at the District Headquarters and other urban areas. The number of graduates in service (Civil Surgeons and Civil Assistant Surgeons) during the year under report was 97 and 1,489 respectively. The number of Honorary Medical Officers was 379, and the number of medical officers under other category comes to 407.

Statement C.

32. This statement gives the total number of in-door and out-door patients treated in the various medical institutions in the State. The total number of beds available in the medical institutions for both sexes in the year 1952 was 23,741 as compared with 21,392 beds in 1951. The total number of beds for women alone was 11,548 as against 9,898 in 1951. The total number of in-door patients treated during the year was 926,965 as compared to 813,252 in 1951. The total number of out-door patients during the year was 23,432,008 (males 9,874,914, females 6,985,960 and children 6,571,114) as compared to 21,079,013 (males, 8,983,349, females 6,321,626 and children 5,774,038) treated in 1951. The number of deaths in the institutions during 1952 was 32,466 as compared to 29,683 in 1951.

Statement D.

33. This statement gives the geographical distribution of diseases treated in all classes of medical institutions. Among the various diseases treated in the institutions during the year, those which accounted for the largest number of patients are shown below:—

Labour cases.—During the year 1952, the number of labour cases conducted was 234,498 (168,026 normal and 66,472 abnormal) as compared with 196,257 (135,243 normal and 61,014 abnormal) in 1951.

Statement E.

35. This statement gives the surgical operations performed in the State-Public, Local Fund and Private-aided hospitals in the State. The number of operations performed in the medical institutions of all classes during the year was 655,693 of which 629,628 were principal and 26,065 were secondary as compared with 703,932 (681,303 principal and 24,629 secondary) in 1951. The total number of deaths among the patients operated during the year 1952 was 1,538 as compared with 1,567 in 1951. The percentage of deaths to total operations performed was 0.23 in 1952 and 0.22 in 1951.

Statement F.

36. The cash balance at the commencement of the year was Rs. 1,46,680. The total receipts under the various heads such as contributions from Government, Local Bodies, fees recovered from patients, Charitable Collections and other miscellaneous recoveries amounted to Rs. 3,45,98,365 as compared to Rs. 3,37,23,684 in 1951. The total expenditure under the various heads such as, salaries to staff, medicines, diet charges, buildings, apparatus and other miscellaneous items of expenditure was Rs. 3,43,95,448 as compared to Rs. 3,34,90,721 in 1951.

Statement G.

37. The amount of invested capital.—The correct amount of invested capital at the commencement of the year 1952 was Rs. 13,31,105-2-3. The amount invested during the year was Rs. 31,085-6-2 and the

amount withdrawn was Rs. 12,800. The balance at the end of the year was Rs. 13,49,390-8-5.

38. *Inspections.*—The inspection of medical institutions in each district was carried out regularly and satisfactorily by the respective District Medical Officers and annual verification of the Service Registers and the verification of stock registers were also carried out as usual. The Assistant to the Director of Medical Services (Accounts), inspected seven District Headquarters Hospitals, one City State Hospital and twenty Taluk Hospitals. The Director of Medical Services and the Deputy Director of Medical Services made inspection of various Medical Institutions in the State during the year.

39. *General.*—The administration of all Hospitals and Dispensaries in the State was carried out efficiently by the inspecting District Medical Officers and Civil Surgeons, and I would like to place on record my appreciation of the manner in which the administration of the Hospitals was carried out during the year under report.

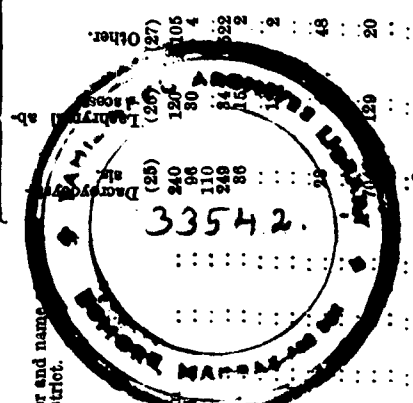

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recruited a number of candidates for appointment as Assistant Surgeons. A number of Medical Officers were sent abroad for higher studies in various specialities.

14. *Honorary Medical Officers.*—Seven posts of Honorary Medical Officers and 24 posts of Honorary Assistant Medical Officers were created during the year. The Honorary system continued to be popular.

15. *Nursing staff.*—The number of posts for members of the nursing profession in various categories was increased during the year. The post graduate training in Nursing given by the School of Nursing, Christian Medical College, Vellore, was recognized by the Government.

16. *Buildings.*—Schemes for improvements to some hospitals were sanctioned.

17. *Advisory Committees.*—The Advisory Committee the various Hospitals in the State continued to do work.

18. *General.*—Facilities for medical relief in State were expanded during the year to the extent financial position of the Government permitted. Medical relief in famine-affected areas in the State was given promptly and effectively by Mobile Medical Units. A conference of District Medical Officers was held in August 1952, for considering ways and means for the improvement of medical facilities. The various recommendations of the Conference were duly considered and action taken wherever necessary.

The administration of the Hospitals and Dispensaries during the year continued to be satisfactory.
