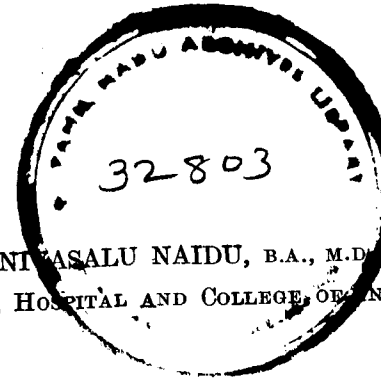

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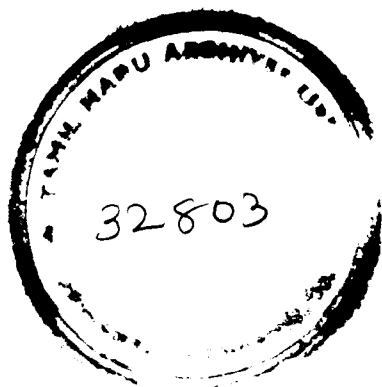

ANNUAL REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE COLLEGE AND SCHOOL OF INDIGENOUS MEDICINE FOR THE YEAR 1953-54.

Academic year.—The academic year of the College extended from the beginning of July 1953 to June 1954.

2. The Government have created a post designated as Dean to be the head of both the Hospital and College of Indigenous Medicine from July 1953 and Dr. A. Srinivasalu Naidu, B.A., M.D., B.S.Sc., retired Police Surgeon and Professor, Madras Medical College, has been appointed as the first Dean. Instead of the post of Principal, the post of Vice-Principal has newly been created. The post of Herbarium Superintendent is upgraded and made a gazetted one.

There were no other changes in the number of gazetted teaching staff in the College during the year 1953-54. The number of posts sanctioned for the different sections are—

A Lecturer, Grade I, sanctioned for the Literary Research continued during this year.

3. *Strength of students.*—The total number of students on the roll at the end of the year 1953-54 was 629 as against 668 during preceding year.

Further details regarding the students are given in the appendices.

5. The number of students in receipt of stipends from Government and local bodies were 55 and 22 respectively. The corresponding figures for the previous year were 55 and 36 respectively.

Thirty-eight candidates were in receipt of residential and non-residential scholarships from the Harijan Welfare Department of the State Government of Madras and ten were in receipt of scholarships from the Government of India.

6. *Library.*—Three hundred and eleven new books were purchased during the year making a total of 8,912 as against 8,601 last year.

7. *Herbarium.*—The small herbarium was shifted to Arumbakkam. The plantation of medicinal herbs is proceeding. An Assistant Superintendent for the Medicinal Farm is appointed to look after this work.

8. *Board Examinations.*—As usual Board Examinations were conducted by the Commissioner for Government Examinations. The table below gives the number that appeared, passed and the percentage of passes in the Board Examinations held in 1953 :—

9. *Sports.*—The work of levelling the low land for use as playground is still incomplete. The open land available in the Walajah Bagh compound is being made the best use of for the playground. The College has been affiliated to the Madras Collegiate Athletic Association League Tournaments in all games.

10. *Buildings.*—The work of construction of permanent buildings for the College, hospital and nurses' quarters have since been completed.

11. *Hostel.*—The two rented buildings used as hostels have been vacated accommodating the students in the "Walajah Bagh" main building and in the 'A' block where the resident Sub-Warden was residing. The post of resident Sub-Warden has since been converted into that of a non-resident Deputy Warden.

12. *Village Vaidya Course.*—The number of candidates admitted for the six months' training for the Village Vaidyas were :—

13. *Course of study.*—The course of study for the G.C.I.M. course has been reduced from 5 years to 4½ years making one year of House-Surgeoncy as compulsory keeping the hours of teaching of Modern Medicine the same as before.

14. The Government have declared that G.C.I.Ms. who have undergone the House-Surgeoncy course are eligible (1) for appointment as Medical Officers in dispensaries of Indigenous Medicine and Modern Medicine on a scale of pay Rs. 100—5—150—10—200, (2) for appointment as Lecturers, Grades I, II and III and Tutors in the College of Indigenous Medicine on the scale of pay admissible for the posts, (3) for appointment as Rural Medical Practitioners on a subsidy of Rs. 900, (4) for appointment as Medical Officers under the Community Projects and (5) for recruitment as Medical Officers (Maternal and Child Health), Grade II, in Public Health Department under local authorities (Women G.C.I.Ms.). G.C.I.Ms. are also eligible for appointment as Health Officers, Class II—vide G.O. Ms. No. 1917, Health, dated 8th July 1954.

2. *Strength of the College.*—There was a decrease in the total number of students from 668 in 1952-53 to 629 in 1953-54. Of the total number of students, 358 were College students, 263 were school students and 8 were in the compounders' course.

3. *Stipendiaries.*—The number of stipendiaries during the year under review was 77 (55 Government and 22 Local Board stipendiaries) as against 91 during the previous year. Thirty-eight candidates were in receipt of residential and non-residential scholarships from the Harijan Welfare Department of the Government of Madras and 10 were in receipt of scholarships from the Government of India.

4. *Examination results.*—The percentage of passes in the final G.C.I.M. Examination decreased from 84 in the previous year to 60 during the year under review. The percentage of passes in final L.I.M. Examination fell from 39 to 29. Out of four candidates only one came out successful in the H.P.I.M. Examination.

5. *Buildings.*—The construction of permanent buildings for the College, hospital and nurses' quarters have been completed.

6. *Accounts.*—The total receipts fell from Rs. 77,618 in the previous year to Rs. 67,433 during 1953-54. The total expenditure increased from Rs. 2,23,482 in the previous year to Rs. 2,79,434.
