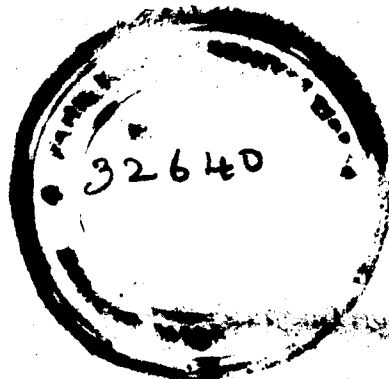

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ANNUAL REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE COLLEGE AND SCHOOL OF INTEGRATED MEDICINE FOR THE YEAR 1955-56.

Academic year.—The academic year of the College extended from the beginning of July 1955 to June 1956.

2. Dr. A. Srinivasalu Naidu, B.A., M.D., B.S.Sc., retired Police Surgeon and Professor, Madras Medical College, who was appointed as the first Dean continued to be the Dean, during the academic year 1955-56 up to 28th June 1956. He was on leave from 27th April to 28th June 1956, and during the leave period Dr. M. Visweswara Sastri, H.P.I.M., Vice-Principal, was in-charge. Dr. B. Govindaraj Shenai, M.B.B.S., L.O., District Medical Officer and Superintendent, Government Headquarters Hospital, Coimbatore, was appointed as Dean and he took charge of the post on 28th June 1956 afternoon and continued till the close of the academic year.

The administrative control of the department of Indigenous Medicine has been transferred to the Director of Medical Services, Madras, with effect from 1st July 1955 in G.O. Ms. No. 1881, Health, dated 1st June 1955, and the post of Honorary Director of Indigenous Medicine was abolished. The Government were also pleased to merge the Modern Medicine teaching staff in the Madras Medical Service in G.O. Ms. No. 2293, Health, dated 14th July 1955.

The Government in their Order No. 2886, Health, dated 12th September 1955 abolished all the posts of Modern Medicine, viz., Lecturer, Grade I and Grade II and Tutors and created new posts of Clinical and Non-Clinical Lecturers, Tutors and Demonstrators.

They have also created a post of a Health Officer for teaching Hygiene and one Assistant Lecturer for teaching Organic Chemistry.

3. *Strength of students.*—Admission of students to the G.C.I.M. Course was increased from 100 to 125 with effect from the academic year 1955-56 in G.O. Ms. No. 2271, Health, dated 12th July 1955, and 125 students were admitted to the G.C.I.M. Course during July 1955. Thirty-three seats were reserved for students of Andhra State. The total number of students on rolls at the end of the academic year was 567 as against 602 during the preceding year.

Further details regarding the students are given in the appendices.

4. The total number of women students on the rolls was 43 against 55 in the previous year as detailed below :—

Stipendiaries.—The number of students in receipt of stipends from Government and Local Bodies were 27 and 5 respectively.

Thirty-five candidates were in receipt of residential and non-residential scholarships from the Harijan Welfare Department of the States of Madras and

Andhra and nine were in receipt of scholarship from the Department of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward Classes Scholarship Board, Ministry of Education, Government of India.

Library.—Two hundred and nineteen books were added during the year under report making a total of 9,270 as against 9,051 last year.

Twenty-one periodicals were subscribed for and they received great demand both from staff and students.

Herbarium.—The Medicinal Farm continued to grow the medicinal plants of various types including rare specimens.

Board of Examinations.—As usual, Board Examinations were conducted by the Commissioner for Government Examinations. The following table gives the number of students who appeared at the Examination held during 1955-56 :—

Sports.—The College teams continue to take part in Inter-Collegiate tournaments.

Buildings.—Construction of buildings for the Physiology and Pathology laboratories have been finished and since occupied.

Village Vaidya Course.—The Village Vaidya Course has been abolished with effect from 10th October 1955 in G.O. Ms. No. 2898, Health, dated 14th September 1955 and Government Memorandum No. 94423-HV/55-1, Health, dated 27th September 1955. However, arrangements have been made to conduct examinations for the failed students.

Course of study.—There were no changes in the curriculum of studies except in the subject of "Premedicals" on Indigenous side, for which class examination was conducted during First year course, it has been clubbed with the subject "Fundamental Principles" for the purposes of examination.

General.—In the place of the Governing Body which was functioning and dealing with the matters relating to the College, a College Council was constituted in accordance with G.O. Ms. No. 3513, Health, dated 27th December 1954, and the activities of the Governing Body was restricted only to matters relating to the hospital. The College Council is purely an advisory body and deals with the matters regarding change in courses of study, curriculum, etc.

2. *G.C.I.M.*—The total number of seats for the G.C.I.M. Course was increased from 100 to 125. Thirty-three of these seats are reserved for students belonging to the Andhra State.

3. *Strength of the College.*—The total number of students on the rolls at the end of the year was 567 as against 602 at the end of the previous year.

4. *Modern Medicine Section.*—The Modern Medicine Section of the College was re-organized and the posts of Lecturers, Grades I and II were abolished and in their places posts of Clinical and Non-clinical Lecturers and Tutors in the Madras Medical Service were sanctioned.

5. *Administrative Control.*—The post of the Honorary Director of Indigenous Medicine was abolished and the College was put under the administrative control of the Director of Medical Services.

6. *Accounts.*—The total receipts in the year was Rs. 83,376 as against Rs. 87,197 in the previous year. The total expenditure increased from Rs. 3,04,448 in the previous year to Rs. 3,25,571.

7. *General.*—A College Council was formed for the College and the activities of the Governing Body were confined to the hospital.
