The Annual Report of the College of Integrated Medicine for the academic year 1956–57 together with the appendices is sent herewith.

ANNUAL REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE COLLEGE  
OF INTEGRATED MEDICINE FOR THE YEAR  
1956–57.

*Academic year.*—The Academic year of the College extended from the beginning of July 1956 to June 1957.

2. The names of the College and the Hospital attached to the same have been changed as College and Hospital of Integrated Medicine with reference to G.O. Ms. No. 1944, Health, dated 13th June 1956.

The College continued to impart instructions leading to the award of the Government Diplomas to the G.C.I.M. and L.I.M. students of the Madras and Andhra States. The College continued to impart training of the students for the issue of certificates to the compounders in Indigenous Medicine.

3. *Staff.*—Dr. A. Srinivasalu Naidu, B.A., M.D., B.S.Sc., was granted leave from 27th April 1956 and Dr. B. Govindaraj Shenai, M.B.B.S., L.O., was appointed as the Dean of the College and Hospital from 28th June 1956 (G.O. Ms. No. 1121, Health, dated 11th June 1956). Dr. M. Visweswara Sastry, H.P.I.M., Vice-Principal, was performing the duties of the Dean from 27th April 1956 to 27th June 1956 in addition to his own.

Dr. M. Visweswara Sastri, H.P.I.M., the Vice-Principal, was relieved of his duties on 7th December 1956 (*a.n.*) to take up his appointment as Special Officer, Indigenous Medicine, under the Government of Andhra Pradesh and Dr. Mir Fida Hussain, H.P.I.M., was promoted as the Vice-Principal of the College from 11th April 1957.

Additional staff for the Pathology Museum of the College has been sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 2128, Health, dated 4th July 1956.

For the effective functioning of the Medico-legal Centre in the institution, the post of a Resident Medical Officer in the grade of an Assistant Surgeon in category 2 of Class I, Branch I of the Madras Medical Service was sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 1184, Health, dated 10th April 1957.

4. *Strength of students.*—The maximum number of students for admission to G.C.I.M. course was 125 as in the previous year and 129 students were admitted as five of the newly admitted students discontinued their studies, as they got admission to other institutions. Of these 129 new admissions, 34 were from Andhra State and 95 were Madras State.

The total number of students on rolls at the end of the academic year was 555 as against 567 during the preceding year, as some L.I.M. students passed out of the College.

Further details regarding the students are given in the appendices.

The total number of women students on the rolls was 48 against 43 in the previous year.

5. *Stipendiaries and Scholarship holders.*—The number of students in receipt of stipends from Government and from Local Bodies were 9 and 4 respectively.

Thirty-seven and 8 candidates were in receipt of residential and non-residential scholarships from the Harijan Welfare Department, Madras, and from the Social Welfare Department, Andhra Pradesh, respectively. Seven students were in receipt of scholarship from the Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe and Other Backward Classes Scholarship Board, Ministry of Education, Government of India.

6. *Library.*—One hundred and twenty-six books were added during the year under report making a total of 9,396 books as against 9,270 last year. In addition 21 scientific periodicals, both foreign and Indian were subscribed during the year as usual.

7. *Medicinal Farm.*—The Farm continued to grow the medicinal plants of various types including rare specimens. Two kite-motion pumps which were removed from the College and Hospital compounds were installed in the Farm at Arumbakkam

This eased much of water difficulties. The third well was fitted up with one picottah. The fencing work in the eastern side was taken up and the work is being continued. The crops like omam, Anise, dill, senna and coriander which are not cultivated in the surrounding districts were taken up on large scale cultivation for use in the Hospital Pharmacy.

One herbal garden was started in the College compound for students' observation and study. Some rare specimens like *Gymnema sylvestre*, *Rauwolfia serpentina*, *Piper longum* and *Cyclea peltata* are grown in the College herbal garden.

8. *Clinical Study.*—As usual the clinical instructions to the students were continued to be given at the Government Royappa Hospital and at the Hospital attached to this institution, both in the wards for the treatment with Modern Medicines and Indigenous Medicines.

The Hospital of Integrated Medicine was constituted and deemed to be a Centre for the Practical training of G.C.I.M. and L.I.M. House-Surgeons in addition to the existing training centres (G.O. Ms. No. 358, Health, dated 31st January 1956.)

9. *Board Examinations.*—As usual the Board Examinations were conducted by the Commissioner for Government Examinations. The venue for the conduct of G.C.I.M. and L.I.M. Clinical and Oral examinations was changed to the Hospital of Integrated Medicine from October 1956 Examinations.

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10. *Physical Education.*—The Physical Education Department which is in existence ever since the opening of the College continued to face difficulties occasioned by a lack of suitable play areas for major games like Cricket, Hockey and Foot-ball. In spite of it, the Athletic Association had affiliated the College to the Madras Collegiate Athletic Association League Tournament in all games and gained rich experience by such participations.

The ground adjoining the College Hostel acquired from the Fisheries Department could not be brought into use as the conditioning of the same is yet to be completed.

The College Annual Sports was conducted on 16th March 1957 at the Xian College High School Grounds. Sri M. A. Manickavelu, B.A., B.L., Hon'ble Minister for Revenue and Health, presided and distributed the prizes.

11. *Buildings and equipments.*—The construction of buildings at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,25,000 for Pathology and Physiology Laboratories were completed and occupied during the year.

The construction of a Surgical block and In-patient ward with Operation Theatre at an estimated cost of Rs. 2,70,000 was proposed and the foundation stone for the same was laid by Hon'ble Sri C. Subramaniam, Minister for Finance on 18th October 1956.

The purchase of equipments and furniture at a total cost of Rs. 45,000 for the Pathology Museum, Anatomy Dissection Hall and for Hygiene, Forensic Medicine and Anatomy Museums was sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 2128, Health, dated 4th July 1956.

The purchase of an X-Ray Diagnostic set at an estimated cost of Rs. 50,500 was sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 2689, Health, dated 10th September 1956 and the same was switched on by Hon'ble Sri A. B. Shetty, Minister for Health on 18th October 1956.

12. *Course of study and privileges.*—There were no changes in the curriculum of studies.

With reference to G.O. Ms. No. 2183, Health, dated 11th July 1956, G.C.I.M. and L.I.M. Practitioners employed in Local Fund and Municipal Dispensaries and Hospitals of Modern Medicine are permitted to conduct post-mortem examination and to issue certificates subject to certain conditions.

A shortened course of House-Surgeoncy for L.I.M. Practitioners has been sanctioned to enable them to become eligible for appointment as Medical Officers in institutions of Modern Medicine.

The establishment of a Medico-legal Centre in the College for the Medico-legal work and post-mortem training to the G.C.I.M. and L.I.M. students is under consideration of the Government.

13. *Hostels.*—The two hostels attached to the College, one for men students and the other for women students continue to be run and the mess sections are working on contract basis.

The total number of students in the hostel is 280 men students and 20 women students against the available total accommodation of 250.

14. *Rural medical relief wing.*—The Social Service League of the students of the College commenced giving relief to the residents in and around Gallettipatti village, which is about 18 miles from the institution. The scheme was inaugurated by Hon'ble Sri K. Kamaraj, Chief Minister, on 19th August 1956. Every Sunday batches of students with members of staff proceed to the village in the College van and render medical aid to the villagers. Both Modern and Indigenous medicines are dispensed as per the requirements of the individual case.

15. *Clinical Society.*—Weekly Clinical meetings are held in the College and eminent medical men and specialists in various branches of medicine (including specialists in Indigenous systems) are invited to take part in the discussions at the meetings. Film shows have also been arranged. The meetings have been thrown open to clinical students of the College.

16. *General.*—(i) The members of the Dave Committee appointed by the Government of India to suggest measures for standardization and uniformity of teaching in institutions of indigenous medicine, all over India, visited the College in January 1956 and have incorporated their findings in their report which was released subsequently.

(ii) A farewell to Sri A. B. Shetty, the Hon'ble Minister for Health was given by the staff and students of the College on 23rd October 1956.

(iii) On 9th February 1957 the Hon'ble Srimathi Marayatham Chandrasekhar, Deputy Minister for Health, Government of India, who presided over the Hostel Day Celebrations, visited the College and hospitals.

(iv) General K. M. Cariappa, our former Commander-in-Chief and High Commissioner for India in Australia addressed the students on the occasion of their Union Day celebration on 25th March 1957. As an aftermath of his visit, vigorous efforts were made to have a Medical wing of the National Cadet Corps started in this College. The matter is still under correspondence and it would appear that it might perhaps be possible to start the wing in this College from the next academic year.

(v) Sri Kaviraj Pratap Simha, Honorary Adviser in Indigenous systems of medicine, Central Ministry of Health visited the institution during the first week of June 1957.
