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ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE MADURAI MEDICAL COLLEGE, MADURAI (1958-59).

I. ACADEMIC YEAR.

The Fifth academic session of the College commenced on 1st July 1958 and ended on 31st March 1959, but the report covers the period from 1st July 1958 to 30th June 1959.

II. ADMINISTRATION.

Dr. C. K. P. Menon, M.S., F.R.C.S. (Eng.), continued to be the Principal during the period under report.

Dr. M. N. Guruswami, B.A., M.B.B.S., M.S. (Mich.), also continued to be the Vice-Principal during the period.

The following additional departments were established during the period :—

- (1) Infectious Diseases.
- (2) Ante-natal care.

III. ACCOMMODATION.

Although the buildings for Rs. 44 lakhs sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 5295, P.W., dated 21st February 1952, are still in the process of completion, the following departments moved into the new buildings during the period under report :—

- (1) Pathology.
- (2) Forensic Medicine.

IV. ADMISSION AND STRENGTH.

The selection of candidates for admission into the college was made by a committee in accordance with the Government Orders. Those who passed the Pre-Medical Examination were admitted to the College during the month of July 1958.

In July 1958, 100 candidates (men students 79 and women students 21) and in October 1958 two men students were admitted thus making a total strength of 382.

Military concession.—Eligible candidates were granted War Educational concession under G.O. No. 610, Education, dated 20th April 1955.

The grant of one full-free studentship to a deserving lady student and four half-free studentships to deserving men students sanctioned by the Government were also awarded to the students of this college belonging to communities other than those declared as backward or depressed for purposes of rule 92 of the Madras Educational Rules.

The Government of India Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward Classes Scholarships were awarded to 97 students of this college and the Harijan Welfare Scholarships to 69 students.

Eligible students belonging to backward and depressed classes for purpose of rule 92 of the Madras Educational Rules were also awarded half and full-free concessions respectively.

VIII. CLINICAL TRAINING.

The students had their clinical training in the Erskine Hospital, Madurai (attached hospital to the Madurai Medical College).

Internee Students.—The Interne Students were posted to the following units for Pre-Registration Internment:—

Medicine, Surgery and Midwifery.

Thirteen internees were posted in January 1959 and 21 internees in June 1959.

IX. REPORT ON DEPARTMENTAL WORKING.

1. *Anatomy.*—Dr. T. S. Chelvakumaran, B.A., M.B.B.S., M.S. (Mich), Professor of Anatomy, continued to hold the post during the year. The routine teaching of the First M.B.B.S. students was carried on quite satisfactorily. Both Junior and Senior students were trained in the various branches of Anatomy, viz., Gross Anatomy, Embryology, Histology and Neuro-anatomy.

The First M.B.B.S. Examination was held in December 1958, 79 per cent of the total number of students had passed in Anatomy and in April 1959, 41 per cent of students have passed.

The number of bodies received during the year was 47. The number of charts at present in the department is about 250. The number of specimens at present in the department is about 360.

Special work by the members of the staff—

(1) Tissues and organs are sanctioned and stained in the Histology Department and kept as teaching collections. Embryos are serially sectioned and stained for study and research purposes.

(2) Injection of vinyl acetate into blood vessels and hollow organs has been done and casts prepared.

(3) New dissected specimens were prepared with the structures painted with colours.

(4) Cross-sectional anatomical plastic models are added to the museum.

Post-graduate Students.—Full facilities are given for all the Post-graduates appearing for the various medical specialties examination of the Madras University (M.S., M.D., etc.), and for those who are appearing for Primary F.R.C.S. Examination.

2. *Physiology.*—Mr. H. D. Singh, M.B.B.S., M.Sc., took charge as Professor of Physiology on 26th November 1958 and continued to hold the post. In December 1958, 105 students appeared and 52

came out successful in Physiology and in April 1959, 53 students appeared for the University Examination and 37 came out successful.

Papers published during the academic year—

Other activities.—Dr. H. D. Singh attended the Annual Scientific Session of the Association of Physiologists and Pharmacologists of India at Indore in November 1958 and took part in the Seminar of the teaching of Physiology and presented a paper on " Pulmonary function in Athletes ".

3. *Biochemistry.*—Dr. V. Srinivasan, Professor of Biochemistry, resigned and was relieved and Dr. T. M. B. Nedungadi, M.B.B.S., M.Sc., took charge as Professor of Biochemistry on 10th June 1959 forenoon. The Clinical Laboratory had carried out 19,815 investigations for the clinicians during the year. The Laboratory section of the department continued to cater to the needs of the employees under the State Insurance Scheme also.

The following researches are being conducted in this department:—

(1) Role of Inositol in Hyper lipaemic conditions by Miss Rajalakshmi, M.A., Research Fellow, Sponsored by Indian Council of Medical Research.

(2) Study of Riboflavine in Health and Diseases by Sri S. Ramakrishnan, M.A., Assistant Lecturer in Organic Chemistry.

(3) Tryptophane metabolism in Toxaemia of Pregnancy by Sri K. Valmikinathan, M.Sc., Non-Medical Assistant in Biochemistry.

4. *Pharmacology.*—Dr. M. N. Guruswami, B.A., M.B.B.S., M.S. (Mich.), continued to be the Professor of Pharmacology.

Dr. M. N. Guruswami, B.A., M.B.B.S., M.S. (Mich.), offered a prize to be called Hema Memorial Prize in Pharmacology worth Rs. 50 for the student adjudged to be the best in a written Pharmacology Prize Examination. K. S. Gangadaran was adjudged to be the winner for the year 1958-59.

Charts and diagrams—about 400 in number. Five revolving museum tables have been prepared.

Three regular batches consisting of a total of 119 students are undergoing training in Pharmacology at present.

In the year 1958 December examinations—Cent per cent results in Pharmacology, and in April 1959—86 per cent results were obtained.

Research work.—On the pharmacological actions of the following indigenous plants:—

(1) *Chonamorpha macrophylla* A paper by Dr. M. N. Guruswami B.A., M.B.B.S., MS. (Mich.) has been accepted for publication in Indian Journal of Medical Sciences.

(2) *Daemia Extensa*

(3) *Gymnema Sylvestre* .. A paper by Dr. M. N. Guruswami and Dr. (Srimathi) Lalitha Kameswaran and S. Gopalan has been published in Current Medical Practice (May 1959).

Review Iron-therapy—Treatment of Diabetes Mellitus—Medical treatment of malignancy by Dr. M. N. Guruswami, has been published in Indian Year Book of Medical Sciences, 1958.

5. *Pathology.*—Dr. S. P. Vedachalam, M.D., was transferred to Madras Medical College, Madras, and Dr. M. R. Natarajan, M.D., took charge on 12th July 1958 as the Professor of Pathology.

Regular lectures on systematic and clinical Pathology and practical classes were conducted throughout the year.

Number of investigations during the year—

(1) Biopsy—2,083.

(2) Post-mortem—23.

(3) Number of specimen added to the museum—212.

(4) Clinical Pathological investigations—10,590.

6. *Bacteriology.*—Dr. D. V. Ramamurti, M.B.B.S., Ph.D., continued to be the Professor of Bacteriology.

Clinical Bacteriological work for the Erskine Hospital, Madurai, and the E.S.I. dispensaries.

Bacteriological investigations.—The total number of investigations received for investigation were 1,936.

7. *Forensic medicine.*—Dr. C. B. Gopalakrishna, M.B.B.S., continued to be the Lecturer in Forensic Medicine.

The number of medico-legal post-mortem examination conducted was 191 during the year. Forty-six lecture classes were held during the year.

Demonstration classes were held for the M.B.B.S. students to show the working firearms, cartridges, poisonous plants and drugs.

8. *Social and Preventive Medicine.*—Dr. V. S. Ramaswami, M.B.B.S., B.Sc., MPH. (Hopkins) continued as Professor of Social and Preventive Medicine.

During the period under review 65 lecture classes were taken for the final M.B.B.S. seniors and 55 for juniors, 47 lecture classes were taken for the second M.B.B.S. seniors and 52 for juniors and 13 for each batch of the sub-juniors.

Rural Health and Medical Care Work in Uthangudi village, required to be carried out as per syllabus were attended to by the final M.B.B.S. students (seniors and juniors) under the guidance and supervision of this department. The first batch of students for the final M.B.B.S. examination from the Madurai Medical College appeared in December 1958. Out of 23 candidates who were presented for the final M.B.B.S. examination, 22 came out successful in the subject of Social and Preventive Medicine. Out of 21 students appeared for this examination in April 1959, 15 came out successful.

9. *Medicine*.—Dr. G. Victor, M.D., continued to be the Professor of Medicine during the period. There are, one Lecturer in Clinical Medicine, one Honorary Lecturer in Therapeutics and four Tutors in the department.

Dr. V. S. Meenakshi, M.D., continued to be the Lecturer in Medicine during the period.

The heads of the three teaching units, in addition to two lecture classes a week, take the students posted under them in the out-patient departments. Daily bedside demonstrations of classes are conducted in the medical units of Government Erskine Hospital, Madurai. Interesting and important slides, charts, X-rays are demonstrated to the students by the various clinical Assistants during the period of their postings to various units. Special clinical coaching is given to the examination going students. General clinicals on alternate weeks is given to second M.B.B.S. and final M.B. students by the Professor and Lecturers in turn.

The heads of medical units in the hospital run the following special clinics. They examine the cases referred to them, carry out further investigation and make a topical study :—

- (1) Gastro-enteriology clinic—By Dr. G. Victor's unit.
- (2) Chest clinic—By Dr. V. S. Meenakshi's unit.
- (3) Rheumatology and Endocrinology clinic—By Dr. G. Victor's unit.
- (4) Neurology clinic—By Dr. G. Victor's unit.
- (5) Cardiology clinic—By Dr. V. S. Meenakshi's unit.

10. *Paediatrics*.—Dr. K. A. Krishnamurthi, M.D., M.R.C.P., continued to be the Lecturer in Paediatrics.

11. *Therapeutics*.—Dr. V. Srinivasan, M.R.C.P. continued to be the Honorary Lecturer in Therapeutics.

Beside demonstrations of cases were conducted between 10-12 noon in the Government Erskine Hospital. Interesting and important slides, charts, X-rays and procedures were demonstrated by the Chief and Assistant to the students posted in the unit.

A cardiology clinic is being conducted by this unit on every Friday between 2-4 p.m. record, treat and follow-up cases of Cardiovascular disease.

12. *Venereology*.—Dr. M. C. Rama Ayyangar, B.A., M.B.B.S., D.V., Lecturer in Venereology. Three batches of final M.B.B.S. students were given the stipulated lecture demonstration in venereal diseases.

13. *Department of Mental Diseases*.—Dr. V. S. Ramachandran, M.B.B.S., continued as Tutor in Mental Diseases. A course of six lectures on "Introduction to Psychology" was delivered to second M.B. sub-juniors in July 1958 and January 1959.

Final year students were given lectures and lecture demonstrations in psychiatry in the Erskine Hospital, Madurai.

14. *Tuberculosis*.—Dr. V. N. Ambalavanan, Lecturer in Tuberculosis proceeded on study leave in July 1958. Dr. K. Venkataraman, M.B.B.S., T.D.D. succeeded him in the same month. Then Dr. Venkataraman was transferred to Infectious Diseases Hospital on 8th May 1959 and Dr. A. Kathiresan, M.B.B.S., T.D.D., took over charge on the same day.

During the year 1958-59, 183 new cases were admitted in these wards and the number of cases that were treated as out-patients are as under :—

15. *Dermatology*.—Dr. G. A. Naidu, M.B.B.S., F.D.S., Honorary Lecturer in Dermatology, took charge on 5th March 1958.

Lecture demonstrations in skin diseases and Leprosy were given to the final M.B.B.S. examination going students. Leprosy and skin slides were demonstrated to the students.

16. *Infectious Diseases Hospital*.—Dr. Venkataraman, M.B.B.S., T.D.D., Lecturer is now in-charge of this hospital. This hospital is functioning from 1st September 1958. Total number of cases treated : 801.

17. *Surgery*.—Dr. C. K. P. Menon, M.S., F.R.C.S. (Eng.), Professor of Surgery and Dr. K. N. Vasudevan, M.B., M.S., Reader in Operative Surgery and Dr. D. Lakshmanan, M.S., Surgical

Registrar, continued to hold the respective posts during the year. Second M.B.B.S. and final M.B.B.S. students were posted to the Surgical out-patient during their term of postings in the wards. Interesting cases were demonstrated and discussed with the students by the Professor of Surgery between 7 a.m. to 9-30 a.m. on admission days. The students were posted by turn to work in the dressing rooms. They were also given clinical training in the wards of the hospital and classes in the college. The lecture classes in Surgery were taken by the Professor of Surgery for two days in a week for second M.B.B.S. seniors and additional and final M.B.B.S. students.

Results of Surgery examination—

December 1958—20 out of 23.

April 1959—28 out of 30.

Special.—Tuberculosis Gland clinic is conducted on Tuesday by Surgical Registrar, average daily attendance being 27 cases.

The bulk of the surgical work comprised routine abdominal surgery and emergencies. Splenectomy was carried out in five cases of enlarged spleen of varied aetiology. All these patients have done well after the operation.

Interesting cases were investigated and demonstrated at the clinical meetings of the Government Erskine Hospital, Madurai.

18. *Principles and Practice of Surgery.*—Dr. P. Govinda Rau, M.B.B.S., F.R.C.S., F.I.C.S., continued to be Honorary Lecturer in Principles and Practice of Surgery.

Revision classes for examination going students were held once a week as also general clinics to senior students once in six weeks.

A Urology clinic is being conducted by Dr. P. Govinda Rao, who has had special training in New York Hospital, New York.

19. *Anaesthesia.*—Dr. T. M. Ibrahim was transferred on 31st March 1959 and Dr. R. Govindan, M.B.B.S., took over charge on 17th October 1958 as Lecturer in Anaesthesia. There are three tutors in anaesthesia and practical training is given to students and student internees in anaesthesia.

20. *Dental Surgery.*—Dr. K. Ramachandran, transferred to Madras Medical College, Madras, and Dr. B. Perumal Rajan took charge on 5th October 1958, as the Lecturer in Dental Surgery.

Few cases of re-plantation and transplantation were done successfully for the first time with improving standard of surgical procedures. The obturators and Prosthesis were given for few deserving cases to improve the appearance and function. The prosthesis have been tried for cases of Hemimandibulectomy and excision of Maxilla. The attendance in the out-patient has increased in average of about 20 per cent in comparison with the previous year.

21. *Ear, Nose and Throat.*—Dr. Md. Obeidullah, M.S., continued to be the Reader in Ear, Nose and Throat.

The teaching for final year students commenced from July to December. The students attend in batches of 10 to 15 for six weeks. Each batch attend for three days in a week.

22. *Orthopaedics.*—Dr. A. S. Annamalai, M.B.B.S., Honorary Lecturer in Orthopaedic. Two batches of final M.B.B.S. examination students were posted for six weeks each batch. The students attended the department on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. They were given bedside clinics and clinical demonstration lectures.

23. *Radiology.*—Dr. A. Krishnaswami, M.B.B.S., D.M.R., continued as a Clinical Lecturer in Radiology. The Lecture Demonstrations for final year students are being carried on as usual.

24. *Ophthalmology.*—Dr. G. Venkataswami, B.A., M.B., M.S., D.O., continued to be Lecturer in Ophthalmology.

Teaching—Examinations.—First two batches results were 100 per cent. In the third batch the percentage of passes was 94. In the fourth batch the percentage of passes was 96.

25. *Midwifery.*—Dr. A. K. Joseph, M.D., continued to be the Lecturer in Midwifery.

Dr. W. J. C. Rebellow, M.B.B.S., D.G.O., M.R.C.O.G., joined as Lecturer in Ante-natal care in this college on 17th April 1959 in the post sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 3708, Health, dated 10th December 1958. A course of eighty lectures were taken in Obstetrics and Gynaecology.

The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, since the appointment of Dr. Rebellow, has two units with different admission days and operation days. Students are posted for clinical teaching in both units and both are taking lecture classes.

26. *Library.*—Dr. M. N. Guruswami, B.A., M.B.B.S., M.S. (Med), continued to be the officer-in-charge of Library.

The Library is kept open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on all days including Sundays and Government holidays.

The total number of books including back numbers of journals in the Library is 6,225 of which 1,060 books have been added during the year under report. Subscription has been arranged for 183 journals for the year mentioned.

The total amount of money spent on the purchase of books and journals during the year under report is Rs. 45,500.66.
