Sub : [Report—Annual Report on the working of Civil Hospitals and Dispensaries in Madras State for the year ending 1958.]

I submit herewith the Annual Report on the working of Civil Hospitals and Dispensaries in the Madras State for the year 1958.

2. Dr. V. R. Thayumanaswami, M.S., F.R.C.S., M.Ch. (Ortho.), continued to hold the post of Director of Medical Services, throughout the year under report.

3. *Madras Medical Service.*—The Madras Public Service Commission recruited 83 candidates by direct recruitment for appointment as Assistant Surgeons in the Madras Medical Service to fill up the vacancies that existed in the cadre. Apart from the above, 81 candidates were recruited under emergency provisions for appointment as temporary Assistant Surgeons in the Madras Medical Service. The Government have upgraded 28 posts of Assistant Surgeons into a selection category of Assistant Surgeons in the Government Medical Institution. During the year under report, a Special Officer in the grade of a Civil Surgeon has been appointed for the Tanjore Medical College, Tanjore.

4. *Junior Assistant Surgeons.*—Sixteen G.C.I.M. candidates were appointed as Junior Assistant Surgeons in Madras Medical Subordinate Service (Non-Gazetted) in the place of existing Assistant Surgeons on a scale of Rs. 150-10-250.

5. *Training of Medical Officers in foreign countries.*—Two Medical Officers were deputed abroad, for training in the United Kingdom in Dermatology and Respiratory Diseases. In addition to this Medical Officers were selected and deputed to undergo training in Radiology and Tuberculosis (four in each).

6. *Madras General Service.*—A post of Gazetted Assistant (Planning and Development) was created in the Office of the Director of Medical Services, Madras. Regular selection of candidates for appointment as Lay Secretaries and Treasurers was made by the Madras Public Service Commission, Madras. The post of Gazetted Assistant to the Assistant Director of Medical Services (E.S.I.) has been upgraded from Lay Secretary and Treasurer Grade II into that of Gazetted Assistant to Assistant Director of Medical Services (E.S.I.) in the scale of Rs. 300-25/2-450.

7. *Honorary Medical Officers.*—There was no change in the system of appointment of Honorary Medical Officers in Government medical institutions.

8. *Nursing Staff—General.*—During the year under report additional posts of Nursing Superintendents, Head Nurses and Nurses were sanctioned for some of the Government Hospitals in the State, on account of the increase of bed strength and to provide adequate Nursing Staff in accordance with the scales laid down by the Government.

9. (a) *Nursing Education and Training.*—The Government sanctioned the implementation of a course in Physiotherapy training in the Government General Hospital, Madras, from 1st January 1959. They also sanctioned the employment of Physiotherapy instructor in the grade of a Nursing Tutor Grade I and a Physiotherapist Grade II in the grade of a staff nurse with a special allowance of Rs. 30. per mensem for the successful completion of the above training course.

(b) The Auxiliary Nurse-Midwives Course was implemented in the Government Erskine Hospital, Madurai, from July 1958 with Central Assistance and thirty candidates have been admitted for the training.

(c) Three nurses and one head nurse were deputed for undergoing Post-Certificate Course in Psychiatric Nursing at the All-India Institute of Mental Health, Bangalore.

(d) One head nurse and one staff nurse were deputed for short term refresher course in Pediatric Nursing (without any fellowship) at the Government General Hospital, Madras, with the assistance of the World Health Organization/UNICEF.

(e) One batch of 29 Auxiliary Nurse-Midwives have completed their training of 2 years on 31st July 1958 and they are being absorbed in the rural areas under the Community Development Programme to work as Maternity Assistants.

10. *Registration.*—The number of Registered Medical Practitioners in the Madras Medical Register was 11,337. The number of Registered Pharmacists was 4,472.

11. *Provincialization of medical institutions under the control of the local bodies.*—During the year under report the following 11 (eleven) Taluk Headquarters Local Fund Medical Institutions were sanctioned for provincialization.

13. *Leprosy.*—Under the Leprosy Control Scheme sponsored by the Government of India, three Leprosy Subsidiary Centres were sanctioned by the Government during the year under report in the following places:—

- 1 Leprosy Subsidiary Centre at Orathanad, Thanjavur district.
- 2 Do. Kodumudi, Coimbatore district.
- 3 Do. Tiruvellore, Chingleput district.

The Leprosy Subsidiary Centre at Orathanad has been opened and is functioning. The other two centres could not be opened before the end of the year.

14. *District Laboratories.*—Under the scheme for the Development of Public Health Laboratory Services, sponsored by the Government of India, the State Government have sanctioned the establishment of two District Laboratories one at Tiruchirappalli and the other at Nagercoil during the year under report. The District Laboratory at Tiruchirappalli started to function by the end of the year and arrangements for the opening of the District Laboratory at Nagercoil had been made. One

Public Health Laboratory at Government Headquarters Hospital, Salem and one Public Health Laboratory at Government Headquarters Hospital, Thanjavur, which were sanctioned in 1957 were opened during the year.

15. *Primary Health Centres.*—The Government have sanctioned the establishment of the nine Primary Health Centres during 1958-59 at the following places:—

- 1 Kallamanickenpatti, Ramanathapuram district.
- 2 Sendamaram, Tirunelveli district.
- 3 Alanganallur, Madurai district.
- 4 Gangavalli, Salem district.

On the whole there are 111 Primary Health Centres so far sanctioned. Out of these 111 Primary Health Centres, 94 Primary Health Centres were functioning in the State on 31st December 1958.

Buildings for Primary Health Centres and staff quarters were sanctioned in respect of 62 Primary Health Centres availing of 75 per cent grant from Ministry of Health. Besides, construction of staff quarters was also sanctioned for 15 Primary Health Centres opened in I Plan and Community Development Blocks. The construction work is under progress.

16. *Special Diet Kitchens.*—One special Diet Kitchen was opened in the Government Erakine Hospital, Madurai.

17. *Child Guidance Clinics and Psychiatric Departments.*—During the year under report no additional Child Guidance Clinic or Psychiatric Department was opened the clinics and departments which are already in existence in Government General Hospital and Stanley Hospital, Madras continued to function satisfactorily.

18. *Tuberculosis.*—The following schemes are contemplated under the Second Five-Year Plan:—

(1) Establishment of well equipped and adequately staffed Tuberculosis Clinics in District Headquarters Hospitals.

(2) Isolation of advanced cases of Tuberculosis.

(3) Provision of an After-care and Rehabilitation Centre for ex-Tuberculosis patients.

(2) The Government have sanctioned the upgrading of Tuberculosis Clinics in the Government Hospital, Kancheepuram and Government Headquarters Hospitals, at Salem and Tiruchirappalli. The upgraded clinics have started to function. The construction of a Tuberculosis Ward of 30 beds in the Government Headquarters Hospital, Tiruchirappalli, at a total cost of Rs. 78,500 sanctioned in 1957-58 is nearing completion.

(3) Under the Plan it is proposed to provide about 138 isolation beds in Madras City and 60 isolation beds near Madurai. The Corporation Tuberculosis Hospital at Otteri has been taken over under State Government control from 1st April 1958 and the hospital will be expanded by providing 138 additional beds.

A new Tuberculosis Sanatorium is under construction at Austinpatti, near Madurai. The Government have sanctioned the construction of additional wards for providing 60 isolation beds in this Sanatorium. The construction work is in progress.

(4) An After-care and Rehabilitation centre already exists in the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Tambaram, to take care of 45 cured cases that have to continue to be under medical supervision. The accommodation available is not adequate and it is proposed to expand the facilities and also introduce suitable cottage industries, like watch repairing, basket making, paper bag making, etc. For this purpose the construction of an additional hostel for 55 ex-patients at a cost of Rs. 2.25 lakhs has been sanctioned and the work is in progress.

19. *Blood Bank.*—No blood bank was newly opened in any of Government Medical institutions during the year under report. Twenty-one Assistant Surgeons of the Madras Medical Service from the various medical institutions in the City and mufassal were given training in the technique of blood transfusion and Resuscitation work at the King Institute, Guindy, during this year.

20. *Medical Education—Medical College.*—The Government have sanctioned during the year under report, the opening of a Medical College at Thanjavur with a view to increase the output of medical officers. The number of seats allotted to this college for M.B.B.S. Course is 75. Seventy-five students have been admitted to the Pre-professional course for 1958-59 session in this connection. As the college is not ready for functioning, arrangements have been made for admitting the candidates to the first M.B.B.S. Course in the Madurai Medical College, Madurai, temporarily.

With the opening of the Thanjavur Medical College, the number of seats for the M.B.B.S. Course in Government Medical Colleges in the State has been raised from 345 to 420.

21. *Post-Graduate Courses.*—The Government sanctioned during the year under report the institution of the following Post-Graduate courses:—

(i) The Bachelor of Dental Surgery Course conducted at the Madras Medical College, Madras, affiliated to the University of Madras was declared by the Dental Council of India to be a recognized Dental qualification.

(ii) The proposal of the Director of Medical Services, for the abolition of the Government Licentiate Courses of L.G.O. and L.O. and Government T.D.D. course, was approved by the Government as there are corresponding courses conducted by the University of Madras.

The conduct of the training course for the training of Physiotherapists in the department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation attached to the Orthopaedics Department of the Government General Hospital, Madras, was approved by the Government during the year under report.

22. *Reservation of seats for Andhra State for courses conducted in the Madras Medical College, Madras.*—Reservation of seat for candidates belonging to the erstwhile Andhra State for the C.R.A. course conducted at the Barnard Institute of Radiology Government General Hospital, Madras, has been stopped from July 1958 session.

23. *Refresher course for medical officers.*—The refresher course was ordered to be discontinued during the year under report as there was not enough response from the Medical Officers.

24. *Medical Bulletin.*—The printing and publications of the Medical Bulletin for distribution to the Medical Officers of this State was continued during the year.

25. *Dental Council of India.*—A re-election to the Dental Council of India was conducted, and Dr. R.L.N. Rao was elected as a member of the Dental Council of India. But the Central Government set aside his election and ordered another re-election during the year.

26. *Medical Council of India.*—An election of a member to the Medical Council of India to be reconstituted consequent on the enactment of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956, was ordered by the State Government at the instance of the Central Government.

27. *War Educational Concessions.*—The modified scheme of educational concessions has been ordered to be continued beyond 1957-58 in the case of children and dependants of deceased and incapacitated personnel till the education of such children who have already been granted the concession is completed.

28. *Short term training course in special subjects.*—The scheme of short term training courses in special subjects of Surgery, Radiology, Anaesthesia and Pathology for the benefit of the Private Medical Practitioners of this State and other States was continued during the year under report.

29. *Drugs Act, 1940 and drugs rules, 1945.*—During the year under report the following licences were issued:—

30. *Prosecutions.*—During the year under report 12 prosecutions were launched under the Drugs Act, 1940 and all of them were decided during the year of which 10 cases ended in conviction of the accused while 2 cases ended in acquittal.

31. *Spurious drugs.*—With a view to put down the menace of spurious drugs, an Anti-spurious drugs committee was formed. The first meeting of the committee was held on 11th December 1958 under the Chairmanship of Honourable M. A. Manickavelu, Minister of Health as Chairman of the Committee and the committee made the following recommendations:—

(1) Propaganda to educate the Public through exhibitions, posters, films and cinema slides, etc., in regional language about the menace of the Spurious drugs, destruction of old containers and cartons, drugs to be purchased by the Public only from the licensed dealers and the Public insisting on the bills, etc.

(2) Offences under the Drugs Act should be made cognizable for taking speedy action in detecting spurious drugs cases.

(3) Special training in criminal investigation work for Drugs Inspector.

During the year under report one case of manufacture and sales of spurious Anacin was detected and the person concerned was prosecuted. He was fined Rs. 250, i.e., Rs. 150 for the offence under Drugs Act and Rs. 100 for the offence under I.P.C. The property worth about

Rs. 200 was confiscated and destroyed. Another case of sales of spurious Waterbury's compound was also detected and the case is under investigation.

The Drugs control Administration participated for the second time in the All-India Khadi, Swadeshi and Industrial Exhibition held in Madras City from December 1958 to February 1959. In this exhibition various machines used in the manufacture of drugs and interesting charts explaining various provisions of Drugs Act and Drugs and Magic Remedies (Objectionable Advertisement) Act, were displayed. The spurious drugs seized by the Department were also exhibited with detailed instructions about the detection in a section of the stall. The Public showed a great interest in the exhibits displayed. A documentary film on 'Spurious drugs' were also shown.

In districts also, the Drugs control Administration took part on the Exhibitions and hospital Day Celebrations of the District Headquarters Hospitals. Printed Pamphlets instructing the Public as to how they should safeguard themselves from the menace of spurious drugs were distributed. The renewal of M1 and M2 licences to dealers under dangerous Drugs Act was recommended only after inspection and careful enquiries of the dealers. This procedure resulted in the rejection of 3 applicants for renewal of M1 licences in Madras City. The manufacturing and import of spiritous Medical preparations are also restricted, and recommended only to some reputed firms.

Drugs and Magic Remedies (Objectionable Advertisement) Act in this State:

The Government have implemented the Drugs and Magic Remedies (Objectionable Advertisement) Act, 1954, in the year 1957 in this State. A large number of application for advertisement of Drugs were received in this office during the year under report. They were carefully scrutinized by this office. It was found that most of the advertisement submitted by the applicants contravened the section 3 of the said Act. In addition to these a large number of reports from other State regarding the advertisement published by the individuals in this State on various Medical products were also received and carefully scrutinised. Several dealers who were publishing advertisements in contravention of this Act and rules have been warned and directed to comply with the provisions of the Act.

32. Employees State Insurance Scheme—During the year under report, the Employees State Insurance Scheme continued to function satisfactorily at Madras, Coimbatore, Madurai, Ambasamudram and Tuticorin.

Besides this, the Employees State Insurance Medical benefit Scheme have been extended to Udumalpet, Nruppur, Salem and Mettur Dam and about 20,000 additional workers have been brought under the scheme from these four places. Thus a total number of about 72,000 workers have been brought under the scheme in this State. At Udumalpet and Salem, Mobile Van dispensaries were established to provide medical facilities for insured workers residing in the outlying and sparse areas, in addition to the establishment of an Employees State Insurance Dispensary at Mettur Dam, the medical facilities available with the Mettur Chemicals and Industrial Corporation, Mettur Dam, were utilised under the scheme.

Two X-ray plants have been purchased for use in the Government hospitals at Udumalpet and Tiruppur at the cost of the scheme and they are being used for insured persons and general public of the above areas.

Due to the dearth of Medical graduates, G.C.I.M. Doctors have been appointed as Second or Third Medical Officers in the Employees State Insurance Medical institutions in this State.

The Government have sanctioned the purchase of a second ambulance van at Madras and necessary arrangements are being made to put the van on the roads shortly.

At Madras, part-time specialists have been appointed under the various categories to provide specialist treatment to the insured workers from this area. Fifteen additional beds have been provided at the Ramalingam Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Perundurai, Coimbatore, for the treatment of the insured workers coming from the four new areas referred to above.

33. Advisory committees in the Medical Institutions.—The Advisory Committees of the Government Hospitals which were constituted to keep the Director of Medical Services and the Government informed as to the needs of the hospitals as viewed by the Public, continued to do useful work. The members took keen interest in providing additional amenities for the patients and made useful suggestions. Some of the members paid surprise visits periodically to the institutions. The suggestions made by the members both during the meetings and during their surprise visits were considered and given effect to as far as practicable.

34. Five-year Plan—Buildings.—(1) The Government have sanctioned in 1957-58 the construction of a new Headquarters Hospital Buildings at a cost of Rs. 17,50,000 and Rs. 15,00,000 at Tirunelveli and Chingleput, respectively. The Government have also sanctioned the construction of an additional out-patient and in-patient block of 100 beds at a cost of Rs. 13,90,000 in the compound of the Government Headquarters Hospital, Cuddalore, during 1957-58. The works are in progress.

The following are the District Headquarters Hospitals where Major schemes were sanctioned by the Government during 1958-59:—

The Government have sanctioned the construction of additional wards in the Government Taluk Headquarters Hospitals at Wallajah (North Arcot district), Kodaikanal and Periakulam (Madurai district), Gudalur (The Nilgiris district), Pollachi (Coimbatore district), Madukulathur (Ramanathapuram district), Ambasamudram and Tenkasi (Tirunelveli district) during 1957-58 and these works were in various stages of construction during 1958.

3. The Government have also sanctioned the following major works in the City institutions during the year and construction work will begin after drawing up detailed plans and estimates:—

(1) Construction of museums and additional hostel, in the Hospital and College of Integrated Medicine, Madras, at a cost of Rs. 3.50 lakhs.

(2) Construction of Administration Block and Ante-Natal and Postnatal wards (100 beds) in the Government Kasturba Gandhi Hospital for Women and Children, Madras, at a cost of Rs. 4.70 lakhs.

(3) Construction of an out-patient block in Stanley Hospital at a cost of Rs. 11.70 lakhs.

(4) Construction of operation theatre and wards over Hope block and nurses quarters (cost Rs. 3.85 lakhs).

(5) Construction of stables for 100 horses and store-room in King Institute, Guindy (Rs. 4.90 lakhs).

35. Venereal Diseases Clinics.—Under the Second Five-Year Plan, it was proposed to establish in each District Headquarters Hospital an up-to-date Venereal Disease Clinic. The opening of Venereal Diseases Clinics in the Headquarters Hospitals, Thanjavur, Chingleput and Nagercoil was sanctioned during 1958-59 and they started functioning during the year.

36. Dental Clinics.—The Government have sanctioned the opening of dental clinics in the Government Headquarters Hospitals at Thanjavur, Vellore and Salem. The above could not be opened before the end of the year for want of personnel. One clinic sanctioned in 1957-58 at Government Headquarters Hospital, Palayamkottai, was opened during the year.

Education and Training Programme.—The existing Family Planning Training Institute in the Government Hospital for Women and Children, Madras was ordered to be upgraded as one of the Regional Family Planning Training Centres in India. - A memorandum giving instructions to be followed by persons undergoing vasectomy operations.

Arrangements are being made to distribute wooden rosary beads explaining the safe period method, free of cost, to mothers and also to exhibit film shorts on Family Planning.

The Family Planning stalls held at various exhibitions did effective Family Planning propaganda and attracted a large crowd. Four private medical practitioners have been appointed to do vasectomy operation in Madras City on subsidy basis to the benefit of the persons who feel reluctant or do not have convenience to go to Public Hospitals. Persons undergoing vasectomy or salpingectomy operations are not levied operations charges.

The Government sanctioned the 'Madras City Public Employees Family Welfare Scheme' under which concentration is made on the public employees in Madras City and cash grants are given to them to meet incidental charges for undergoing the operations. Two nurses have been appointed to contact almost all the public employees in Madras City.

Contraceptives are distributed free of cost to persons with an income of Rs. 100 per mensem and below and to others sold at subsidiary rates in all the centrally aided Family Planning Clinics.

During the period from 1st January 1958 to 31st December 1958, 986 Vasectomy and 1,854 Salpingectomy operations were performed in the State.

The State Family Planning Board and the Co-ordination committee are doing very good service in suggesting methods and means for the effective propagation of Family Planning in this State.

38. Contracts and diets.—Diet articles, etc., required for use in the various Government Medical Institutions in the State were as usual obtained generally under the tender system. As in the past, re-tenders were invited in cases where the original tender rates were found to be high or where no tenders were received. The Heads of Medical Institutions kept a watch over the supplies by contractors. Samples of diet articles were sent periodically to the Government Analyst for test. The supplies were on the whole satisfactory.

The Government sanctioned the continuance of the single tender system for all the Government Hospitals in the City in respect of the major diet articles. Accordingly the requirements of all these hospitals were pooled together and a single tender for the supply of these articles was invited by this office.

Handpounded rice required for the Government Hospitals was obtained from the Cottage Industrial Co-operative Societies and Government units engaged in the production of handpounded rice.

The permissible cost of extra diet and substitute diet was continued at Re. 1 in the case of general ward patients irrespective of the class of diet for which it was substituted.

39. Hospitals and Dispensaries— Statement A.

This statement gives the classification of Medical Institutions in the State in six different classes, viz., Class I State Public, Class II State Special, viz., Police, Canals, Railways and others, Class III Local Fund and Municipal, Class IV Private Aided, Class V Private non-aided, and Class VI Subsidized Rural Dispensaries. At the commencement of the year 1958, there were 773 institutions of all classes and at the end of the year there were 845 Institutions.

Out of the 76 Medical Institutions opened during the year 1958, 35 were State Public, 8 State Special, 15 Local Fund and Municipal and 18 Subsidized Rural Dispensaries. The number of State Public and Local Fund and Municipal Institutions working at the end of the year was 72 State Special, 33 Private Aided, 47 Private non-aided and 121 Subsidized Rural Dispensaries. Of the total number of 845 Medical Institutions working at the end of the year 1958, 794 were General Hospitals and Dispensaries, 33 were for women and 18 were specialist Institutions, such as Ophthalmic, Dental, Tuberculosis, Leprosy and Infectious Diseases Hospitals, Sanatoria, etc.

Statement B.

40. This Statement shows the distribution of Medical Personnel at the Headquarters of the State and at the District Headquarters and other Urban areas.

The total number of Medical Officers of all classes was 1,569 at the end of the year 1958, as compared with 1,554 in 1957. The total number of salaried Medical Officers of all classes was 1,270 during 1958 as compared with 1,128 in 1957. The number of Honorary Medical Officers at the end of the year 1958 was 299 as compared with 426 in 1957. The total number of Nurses for 1957 and 1958 was 1,621 and 1,636 respectively.

Statement C.

41. The number of in-door and out-door patients treated in the State Public, Local Fund, Municipal, Private Hospitals and Dispensaries and the Subsidized Rural Dispensaries.—The total number of beds available in the medical institutions for both sexes at the end of 1958 was 20,245 as against 19,894 at the end of 1957. The number of beds available for women alone in 1958 was 10,046 as compared with 8,995 at the end of 1957.

The total number of in-patients treated in all classes of hospitals during the year 1958 was 770,341 as against 775,929 during 1957.

The total number of out-patients treated during 1958 was 22,948,621 as compared with 20,560,364 in 1957.

Deaths.—The number of deaths in the hospitals was 23,723 as compared with 24,876 during 1957.

Statement D.

42. Various kinds of diseases, etc., of the in and out patients treated in the State Public, Local Fund, Municipal, Private aided Hospitals and Dispensaries and Subsidized Rural Dispensaries.—Among the various diseases treated in the medical institutions during the year 1958, those which accounts for the largest number of patients are as shown below:—

Statement E.

43. Surgical operations performed.—The total number of operations performed in the medical institutions of all classes during the year 1958 was 607,084 of which 591,956 were principal and 15,128 were secondary as compared with 529,609 (principal 523,506 and secondary 6,003) during the year 1957.

The total number of deaths among the patients who underwent operations during 1958 was 1,206 as compared with 1,011 during 1957. The percentage of deaths to total operations performed was 0.20 in 1958 as against 0.17 in 1957.

Statement F.

44. The total receipts under the various heads such as contribution from Government, local bodies, fees recovered from patients, amounted to Rs. 3,68,81,793.94 during 1958 as compared to Rs. 3,22,10,212 during 1957.

The total expenditure under the various heads such as salaries to staff, medicines, diet charges, buildings, etc., amounted to Rs. 3,23,36,319.88 during the year 1958, as compared with Rs. 2,92,60,316 during 1957.

Statement G.

45. The amount of invested capital at the commencement of the year 1958 was Rs. 9,26,661.55. The amount invested during the year 1958 was Rs. 1,082.10, and the amount withdrawn during 1958 was Rs. 3,762.19. The closing balance of the invested capital was Rs. 9,23,981.46.

46. Medical lending libraries.—The number of members on roll at the beginning of the year 1958 was 631 and that at the end of the year was 730. The number of books at the beginning and at the end of the year was 4,530 and 4,626 respectively.

The total receipts during 1958 was Rs. 3,454.12 and the expenditure was Rs. 5,674.54.

47. Inspection of hospitals and dispensaries.—The inspection of medical institutions in each district was carried out satisfactorily by the respective District Medical Officers.

The number of medical institutions inspected by the Director of Medical Services during the year 1958 was 86 out of which six were surprise inspections.

The number of medical institutions inspected by the Assistant Director of Medical Services (Medical) and Assistant State Drugs Controller, Madras State, during the year 1958 was 92 out of which 10 were surprise inspections. The number of drugs manufacturing concerns inspected during 1958 was 35 out of which 5 were surprise inspections.

The number of medical institutions inspected by the Assistant Director of Medical Services (IM.) during the calendar year 1958 was 143 out of which 9 were surprise inspections.

The accounts of 3 Government Medical Institutions, were inspected by the Assistant to the Director of Medical Services (Accounts) during 1958 out of which 10 were surprise inspections. The number of institutions in the mufassal inspected by the State Family Planning Officer during 1958 was 5 in addition to the institutions in the City being inspected periodically.

General.—I wish to place on record, my appreciation of the efficient manner in which the District Medical Officers and the Heads of the Medical Institutions carried out the administration of the Medical Institutions under their control during the year under report.

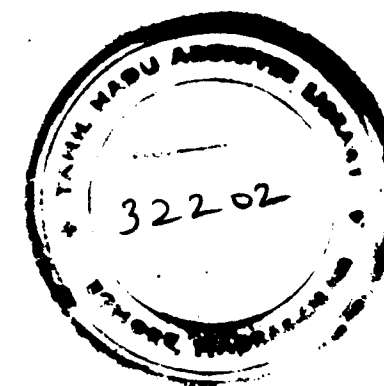

ADMINISTRATION REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1958.

Accommodation.—The hospital continued to be accommodated in the rented building. The daily average number of in-patients treated during the year 1958 was 80.

Out-patient.—The total number of patients that attended the Casualty department (including those that were admitted as in-patients) was 2,856 (Medical) and 2,861 (Surgical) or 5,717 in the aggregate.

Specialist.—There are two part-time specialists attached to this hospital—one for Medical and the other for Surgical. This is another progressive step towards the treatment of patients.

Medical wing.—The common diseases encountered during the year, in the order of number of cases in each category, were—

- (1) Influenza.
- (2) Pulmonary Tuberculosis.
- (3) Peptic Ulcer.
- (4) Enteric Fever.
- (5) Bronchial Asthma.
- (6) Filariasis.
- (7) Bacillary Dysentery.
- (8) Broncho Pneumonia.
- (9) Malaria.
- (10) Infective Hepatitis.
- (11) Hypertension.

Influenza tops the list among the routine diseases for the year.

Surgical wing.—Surgical attendance has been fairly heavy and continues to be on the increase. More patients now willingly come over to the hospital and register themselves for major operations. A waiting list has been opened up and patients are regularly intimated with advance notice to report to the hospital for admission and operation.

Major operations conducted during the year .. 459
Minor operations conducted during the year .. 607

In the casualty department 1,153 out-patient cases have reported for Surgery. Most of these cases are lacerated wounds requiring sutures and abscesses for incision. Fifty-five emergency cases like Strangulated Hernia, Acute Appendix and crushed injuries of limbs, burns, etc., were treated during the year. Fracture reductions, dislocations, plaster tendon repairs are being done but these would be facilitated if we have our own X-ray plant.

Surgical consultant Dr. K. G. Krishnaswamy, M.S., has been doing Subtotal Gastrectomies, Cholecystectomy, etc. On an average about three cases per month at Government General Hospital due to lack of certain facilities like blood transfusion, etc., for surgical emergencies.

A Nurse may be trained in the Physiotherapy department at General Hospital who would be of great use in Employees' State Insurance Hospital for rehabilitation of our patients.

Tuberculosis.—Number of persons on the waiting list for admission to the T. B. Sanatorium, Tambaram, was 114 on 1st January 1958. One hundred and fifteen new cases were registered during the year. There were 95 patients on the waiting list for admission on 31st December 1958.

One hundred and ninety-seven patients were admitted into the Employees' State Insurance Hospital for T.B. emergency, out of which four were cases of T.B. Bones and Joints, etc.

Laboratory.—The routine clinical pathological investigations for both in-patients and out-patients were done during the year 1958.

Number of investigations done.

In-patients 12,136
Out-patients 5,345

Biochemical investigations could not be started owing to lack of a technician and want of adequate accommodation.

Building.—The rented building temporarily improvised is not suited for running a hospital on modern lines. The construction of a new hospital building has not yet been taken up. The urgent need is for a modern and self-contained building capable of accommodating all departments with quarters for Medical Officers, Nursing Staff, etc.

X-ray.—Sanction has been accorded for the purchase of Mobile Plant and the installation is expected to be done shortly.

Staff.—The post of one Junior Assistant Surgeon has been created and filled up. Appointment of four House-surgeons (two for Medical and two for Surgical side) will relieve the Medical Officers much of their routine work.

Ministerial staff.—One lower division clerk is required for the provision, furniture and crockery stores. Another clerk is required to assist the Chief Pharmacist who is in charge of Central Medical Store as well as the Hospital Stores.

Ambulance.—Sanction has been accorded for the purchase of another ambulance which is solely intended for conveying the patients to their residence after their discharge from the hospital. This will be a stand-by in the case of any break-down of the other ambulance.

Medical Board.—The Medical Board meets once a month and about 10 to 12 cases are posted for assessing the degree of disability of industrial accidents.

Report—Civil Hospitals and Dispensaries of Modern Medicine—Annual Report for 1958—Reviewed.

2. *Medical Relief*.—The number of medical institutions of all classes working in the State increased from 773 in 1957 to 845 (294 Government institutions, 350 Local Fund institutions, 80 private institutions and 121 subsidized rural dispensaries) during the year under review. The number of beds available for both sexes and the number of in and out-patients treated in these institutions during the year were 20,245; 770,341 and 22,943,621 respectively. There was a decrease in the number of deaths from 24,876 in 1957 to 23,723 in 1958.

The number of operations performed in the medical institutions of all classes increased from 29,509 in 1957 to 607,034 in the review year. The percentage of deaths to the total number of operations also recorded an increase from 0.17 to 0.29. The total expenditure on the medical institutions during the year was Rs. 3,23,36,320 as against Rs. 2,92,60,316 in 1957.

3. *Provincialization of Medical Institutions*.—During the year under review, eleven Local Fund medical institutions located in taluk headquarters, two non-taluk headquarters institutions and five rural dispensaries were taken over under Government management.

4. *Medical Services*.—Two Medical Officers were deputed to the United Kingdom for undergoing training in Dermatology and Respiratory diseases. In addition, eight Medical Officers were also trained—four in Radiology and four in Tuberculosis.

5. *Nursing Staff*.—As in previous years, additional posts were created during 1958 also to cope with the increase of work in the hospitals consequent on the sanction of additional beds and to provide adequate staff in accordance with the prescribed scale.

6. *District Laboratories*.—Under the scheme sponsored by the Government of India for the development of Public Health Laboratory Services, three District Laboratories, one each at Tiruchirappalli, Salem and Channarayana were opened during the year. Arrangements were made for the establishment of another laboratory at Nagercoil.

7. *Primary Health Centres*.—At the end of the year under review, 94 Primary Health Centres were functioning in the State. The construction of buildings for 63 centres and staff quarters in 15 centres was under progress.

8. *Medical Education*.—During the year, the Government have sanctioned the opening of a Medical College at Thanjavur with an intake of 75 students. With the establishment of this College, the total number of seats available for the M.B., B.S., Degree Course, excluding those in the Christian Medical College, Vellore, was raised from 345 to 420. The B.D.S. Degree Course conducted at the Madras Medical College, Madras, was declared as a recognized dental qualification by the Dental Council of India. The short-term training courses in the special subjects of Surgery, Radiology, Anaesthesia and Pathology for the benefit of the private medical practitioners were conducted during the review year also as in the previous year.

9. *Medical Bulletin*.—The Medical Bulletin was continued to be published in the year for the use of the medical practitioners.

10. *Administration of the Drugs Act*.—Three thousand eight hundred and sixty-two licences, both for sale premises and for the manufacture of drugs, were issued during the year. Out of the thirteen prosecutions launched for the infringement of the provisions of the

Drugs Act and the rules framed thereunder, eleven ended in conviction and two in acquittal. The Drugs Control Administration participated in the All-India Khadi, Swadeshi and Industrial Exhibition at Madras from December 1958 to February 1959 and also in the exhibitions and hospital day celebrations conducted at the District Headquarters Hospitals.

11. *Employees' State Insurance Scheme.*—During the year, the scheme continued to function satisfactorily at Madras, Coimbatore, Madurai and Ambasamudram. The scheme was extended to Tiruppur, Udumalpet, Salem and Mettur Dam and about 20,000 additional workers were brought under the purview of the scheme in the year. The total number of workers covered by the scheme was about 172,000.

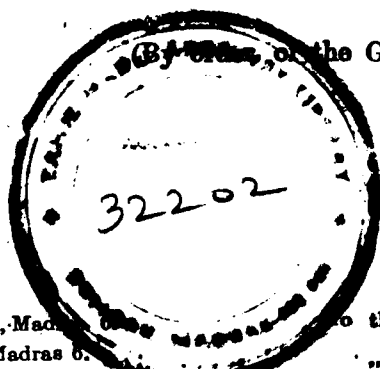
12. *Buildings.*—The construction of Post-natal and Ante-natal Wards of 50 beds each in the Government Kasturba Gandhi Hospital for Women and Children, Madras, an out-patient block, an operation theatre and Nurses' quarters in the Government Stanley Hospital, Madras, and stables for 100 horses, with a store-room, in the King Institute, Guindy, at a total estimated cost of Rs. 25.15 lakhs was sanctioned during the year. Schemes for improvements to a number of other Government Hospitals in the mufassal were also approved during the year.

13. *Special Clinics.*—During the year under review, sanction was accorded for (i) the establishment of a Venereal Diseases Clinic in each of the District Headquarters Hospitals at Thanjavur, Chingleput and Nagercoil and (ii) the upgrading of the Tuberculosis

Clinics in the Government Headquarters Hospitals at Salem and Tiruchirappalli and the Government Hospital, Kancheepuram. All these clinics commenced functioning during the year itself. A Dental Clinic in the Government Headquarters Hospital, Palayamkottai, and a Special Diet Kitchen in the Government Erskine Hospital, Madurai, also started functioning in the year.

14. *Family-Planning.*—The total number of Rural and Urban Family-Planning Clinics functioning in the State at the end of the year under review was 61 and 25, respectively. The Family-Planning Training Institute in the Government Hospital for Women and Children, Madras, was ordered to be upgraded as one of the Regional Family-Planning Centres in India. For inducing the public to take to family-Planning propaganda was made by the opening of Family-Planning stalls in the exhibitions. Besides a number of publications on the subject were also printed for distribution to the public. The Madras City Public Employees' Family Welfare Scheme was sanctioned in the year and under this scheme, concentration was made on the public employees in the City and cash grants given to them to meet the incidental expenses for undergoing the operations. During the review year, 186 vasectomy and 1,864 salpingectomy operations were performed in the State.

15. *General.*—The medical institutions continued to be popular during the year. The administration of the Hospitals and Dispensaries also continued to be satisfactory.
