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**REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE FACTORIES ACT, 1948, IN
THE STATE OF MADRAS FOR THE YEAR 1956 WITH A NOTE
ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE MADRAS MATERNITY
BENEFIT ACT, 1934.**

1. *Personnel.*—Sri V. Balasundram, I.A.S., Commissioner of Labour, continued to be in charge of the administration as well as the enforcement of the Factories Act, 1948, and other allied enactments during the year 1956. In the effective enforcement of the various enactments, he was assisted by Sri P. V. Viswanathan, Chief Inspector of Factories, 5 Regional Inspectors of Factories, 9 Inspectors of Factories, one Inspectress of Factories, and 140 Assistant Inspectors of Labour up to 31st October 1956. To relieve the Chief Inspector of Factories of his routine work, the Government in their order G.O. Ms. No. 1453, Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 3rd April 1956 sanctioned the post of a Personal Assistant to the Chief Inspector of Factories in the grade of an Inspector of Factories, Grade II. Sri V. Govind, Inspector of Factories, who was appointed to this post assumed charge on 30th June 1956 and continued to hold the post till the end of the year.

In G.O. No. 4170, Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 6th December 1955 the State Government appointed Sri M. A. Natarajan, B.E., the then Regional Inspector of Factories, Tiruchirapalli, as Special Officer for conducting an enquiry into the working conditions in the Beedi Industry with Headquarters at Coimbatore. He assumed charge on 11th February 1956 and submitted his report to Government on 10th June 1956. The suggestions of the Special Officer are under the consideration of the Government.

During the period under report one Grade I Inspector had training in 'Factory Inspection' in the United Kingdom for 5 months under the Colombo Plan and two Grade II Inspectors had undergone refresher courses organized by the Chief Adviser Factories, New Delhi.

The Government also sanctioned during the year, the appointment of 5 Inspectors of Plantations in the Grade of Rs. 250—50/2—500 with necessary ministerial staff for the effective enforcement of provisions of the Plantations Labour Act, 1951. Five of the Labour Officers, Grade III, were temporarily promoted as Inspectors of Plantations pending the framing of the *ad hoc* rules for the post.

The Regional Inspectors of Factories were re-designated as Inspectors of Factories, Grade I, and the other Inspectors as Inspectors of Factories, Grade II, in G.O. Ms. No. 3394 Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 20th July 1956 and each district was placed under an Inspector.

Two Inspectors of Factories and 14 Assistant Inspectors of Labour were transferred to the Kerala and Mysore States consequent on the reorganization of States on 1st November 1956. In G.O. No. 4875, Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 16th November 1956, the Government sanctioned an additional post of Assistant Inspector of Labour for Kanyakumari district. There were at the end of the year besides the Chief Inspector of Factories, 5 Inspectors of Factories, Grade I, 7 Inspectors of Factories, Grade II, one Inspectress of Factories, 5 Inspectors of Plantations and 128 Assistant Inspectors of Labour.

2. *Important meetings and conferences.*—(1) Matters relating to the administration of the various labour enactments were discussed at a conference of the Inspectors of Factories and Labour Officers held at Madras from 17th to 19th May 1956. Sri M. Baktavatsalam, Minister for Agriculture, inaugurated the conference on 17th May 1956 in the Committee Room of the Secretariat. Among the

important subjects discussed at the conference were, the prevention of dust nuisance, laying down of standards for ventilation and lighting, washing facilities and the need for appointment of additional Women Welfare Officers in Factories employing a large number of women workers.

(2) *Conference of the Chief Inspectors of Factories.*—At the ninth conference of the Chief Inspectors of Factories held at New Delhi, a Sub-Committee on wood-working machinery with Sri P. V. Viswanathan as Convenor and Sri P. S. Kukillaya, Chief Inspector of Factories, Travancore-Cochin State, Sri A. P. Verkhedkar, Chief Inspector of Factories, Madhya Pradesh and Sri J. C. Brua, Senior Inspector of Factories, Assam, as members, was formed for the purpose of collection of the basis data, necessary for the preparation of safety pamphlets. The Sub-Committee had its first sitting from 7th to 13th June 1956. The Committee visited a few of the factories having wood-working machinery in Madras, Kozhikode, Cannanore, Trichur, Chalakkudi and Alwaye. The aim of the Committee was to suggest safety and precautionary measures to be adopted in wood-working factories. A detailed report was prepared and submitted by the Sub-Committee to the Chief Adviser Factories, New Delhi.

3. *Factories covered by the Factories Act, 1948.*—The Factories Act, 1948, applies to all power factories employing 10 or more persons and non-power factories employing 20 or more persons. The Act was extended in September 1956, by a special notification by the Government under section 85 of the Factories Act, 1948, to minor engineering factories and certain other classes of factories such as rice mills, decorticating factories, oil mills, structural workshops, etc., employing less than 10 workers with power and less than 20 workers without power.

4. *Number of factories.*—There were 4,999 factories at the beginning of the year, of which 799 factories related to the Malabar and the South Kanara districts. During the year under review, 432 factories have been brought on the registers. Certain provisions of the Act and rules have been made applicable by the Government to 892 establishments, under section 85 of the Factories Act, 1948 (Appendix I and Statement I). Six hundred and eighty factories were removed from the register during the year (Appendix II). The number of factories at the end of the year was 4,998 of which 4,765 factories were in commission. The details of factories which were in commission are furnished below:—

Particulars regarding the number of factories as defined under sections 87 and 93 of the Factories Act and the workers employed therein are furnished in Statement I-A. Details of factories carrying operations declared as dangerous and workers employed in such operation are given in Statement I-B. Statements III and IV contain distribution of working factories according to working strength and number of days worked.

5. *Employment.*—The average daily number of workers employed in the 4,765 factories, which submitted the annual returns in time for the year was 293,606. Thirty-four thousand seven hundred and seventy-one workers were daily employed in the Government and Local Fund Factories which submitted the annual returns in time. Details relating to the employment of persons in different industries are furnished in Statement II.

6. *Registration and licensing of factories.*—During the year under review, licenses issued to the factories for the year 1955 were renewed and fresh licenses issued to factories newly brought under the purview of the Act. The amount of licence fees collected during the year is furnished below:—

7. *Plans.*—One thousand eight hundred and thirteen plans were received and scrutinised by the Chief Inspector of Factories during the period under review. In the scrutiny of plans, besides various other aspects, special attention was paid to stability, ventilation, light, overcrowding, means of escape in case of fire, etc.

8. *Certificate of young persons.*—Three thousand thirty-eight certificates were issued by the certifying Surgeons during the year. Besides, the certifying Surgeons have made 265 visits to the factories in their jurisdiction.

9. *Health and safety—Health.*—The health of the workers was generally normal. No epidemics were reported from any of the factories during the year. Two cases of occupational diseases were reported to this department at the close of the year and the same are being investigated.

Sanitation.—Cleanliness of factory premises and the surroundings was fairly well maintained.

Dust nuisance.—Adequate steps were taken wherever necessary, to mitigate dust nuisance in textile mills, rice mills, decorticating factories, tea and coffee curing factories and also to prevent, as far as possible, inhalation of dust by employees working in processes emanating dust.

Dust extractors have been fitted in quite a number of factories and the dust given off collected at the source and taken out by ducts on the to the cyclones. In cement factories, supply of nose-guards to the workers in the cement filling section is insisted upon. The managements of cement factories have been advised to take up the work of the installation of automatic units for filling the cement bags. Wood-working factories also have been inspected by the Chief Inspector of Factories and the managements instructed to provide suitable saw dust collectors at the point of origin of dust.

Fencing and other safety measures.—Fences and guards to the dangerous parts of ways, works, working parts of machinery, etc., were provided. In the course of inquiries into accidents, the Inspectors impressed upon the managements and workers wherever necessary about the importance of providing guards and their specific utility. Safety posters issued by the Chief Adviser Factories, New Delhi, were distributed to factories free of cost for display in conspicuous places. Steps were taken to see that the orders issued with reference to the fencing of machineries were duly complied with. Constant attention has been directed as in previous years to the requirements of safety provisions.

Textile machinery.—Progress continues in the standards of fencing for textile machinery. Steady progress has been made by the makers in complying with the provisions of law and in providing guards that are essential for safety. New machines installed in factories indicated that they are designed to occupy less space and the distance allowed between them is kept at 1½' to 2'. Automatic stopping of cards, when the cylinder door is opened, is achieved by providing a link motion as suggested by the Chief Inspector of Factories. The latest trend in textile factories is the air conditioning of the entire plant and the working of

the plant has been found to be satisfactory and conducive to the worker and increased production for the management.

Printing machines.—All the Platen machines are provided with finger guards and all the cutting machines are fitted with efficient knife guards.

Wood-working machinery.—Improvements have been noted in the standards of fencing of many types of small circular saws intended for mounting on work benches. The machines are now equipped with Riving Knife of the correct shape and with means of adjustment. A top guard either self-adjusting or manually adjustable is usually mounted on the top of Riving Knife which has been made specially wide for safety and stiff to give support. Guards are also provided for the under-bench portion of the saws in most of the machines.

10. *Hours of employment—Weekly hours of work.*—Particulars relating to weekly hours in all factories from which returns were received are furnished in Statement X. The weekly hours for children did not exceed 27. The total number of children employed was 2,238. Particulars regarding the number of factories working in multiple shifts are shown in Appendix III.

Rest intervals.—Rest intervals as required by section 55 of the Factories Act, 1948, were given in all factories exempted from section 55 of the Act. This exemption was, however, granted subject to the condition that the workers were given sufficient time for taking their meals thought not a fixed period.

Weekly holidays.—Sundays or substituted days were observed as weekly holidays in all the factories where the factories were exempted from the provisions of section 52 of the Act due to exceptional pressure of work. Compensatory holidays for the weekly holidays so lost by the workers were given in all cases as required by section 53 of the said Act. (Statement XIV.)

11. *Wages.*—Particulars regarding the daily average earnings of workers in the important industries are furnished in Appendix IV. The Minimum Wages Act, 1948, was in force in all the scheduled employments in the State. The provisions of the Act were enforced in factories by the Inspectors of this Department.

Leave with wages.—The provisions of Chapter VIII of the Factories Act, 1948, relating to the grant of leave with wages to workers were generally complied with. Exemptions from the provisions relating to the grant of leave with wages to workers (sections 79 to 81) were granted to 22 factories in which leave rules providing benefits were not less favourable than those contained in Chapter VIII of the Act.

12. *Notices and registers—Notices and returns.*—Most of the factories submitted periodical notices and returns under the Factories Act, 1948, regularly and promptly. Prosecutions were taken only against the managers of factories who were habitual defaulters and who failed to submit the returns without any valid reasons. Ninety-three per cent of the working factories submitted their returns in time this year.

Registers.—The registers prescribed under the Act were generally maintained. Instructions were given and orders issued wherever necessary.

13. *Labour Welfare—Labour Welfare Officers.*—Labour Welfare Officers have been appointed in almost all the factories which employ more than 500 workers. Detailed particulars regarding amenities are given in Appendix V and Statement XIII.

Housing.—Housing accommodation and other amenities provided in the factories were continued this year also. Efforts to provide housing accommodation for labour are being pursued both by the Government and the employers under the Government of India 'Subsidized Industrial Housing Scheme'. Several visits were made by the Inspectors of Factories and by the Chief Inspector of Factories to explain to the managements about the scheme and their response is being watched.

Canteens.—Canteens with sanitary arrangements are being constructed in a number of factories with proper arrangements for tea, and cooked meals where desired, as per the standards laid down in the Factories rules. The canteen managing committees in factories continued to be useful in the running of the canteens.

Rest-rooms and creches.—Rest-rooms, creches and shelters have been provided in factories which employ more than 150 workers and 50 women workers respectively.

Drinking water.—Due provision was made in factories for adequate supply of drinking water to workers. Water coolers have been installed in a certain number of factories.

14. *Accidents.*—The total number of accidents reported for the year 1956 was 10,530. Particulars of accidents classified according to causes are furnished in Statement VI. Of the accidents reported, 15 were fatal and 10,515 were non-fatal. The details of fatal accidents are furnished in Appendix VI. Statement VIII furnishes particulars relating to the accidents in cotton mills, while Statements V and VII furnish particulars relating to the accidents under each industry.

The number of fatal accidents that occurred in the year 1956 is 15 as against 25 in the previous year. A general review of these accidents shows that seven out of the 15 accidents can be classified under heads "falling of objects," "handling of goods" under Miscellaneous category. Two accidents relate to the explosion in the match factory and in the cement factory. Out of the 15 fatal accidents, only one could have been avoided by proper fencing of the belt and pulley. Compared to the total number of factories in the State, the number of fatal accidents is small and it is in no way alarming.

The number of non-fatal accidents is on the increase, since the inception of the Employees' State Insurance Scheme, as the managements and the workers are meticulous in reporting even minor and trivial accidents due to the fact that the benefits regarding medical leave and payments are met with by the Employees' State Insurance Corporation for which contributions are made by both.

Out of 10,515 non-fatal accidents 10 resulted in loss of limb, two in loss of power in fingers, two resulted in loss of 10 per cent of earning capacity and 11 cases of permanent disablement.

In 74 cases, the injured persons were paid compensation amounting to Rs. 17,669-11-3 (Appendix VII). Statements V, VI, VII and VIII show the industries in which the accidents occurred. Statement IX shows the details regarding cases of poisoning and diseases.

Fires.—There were three cases of fire during the year. A small fire broke out in a match factory at Dindigul on 22nd February 1956 at 10-30 p.m. in the wax dipping room and it was put out in 15 minutes. The cause of the fire was believed to be from the unextinguished charcoal oven. The damage was estimated at about Rs. 50 only. Two more fire accidents were reported in the Ramanathapuram district for which the causes were not known. The loss incurred was reported to be about Rs. 11,000.

Electricity.—A worker died on the spot on account of the shock received due to the bad insulation of the flux. The above serious accident indicates that proper training and exhaustive instructions have to be imparted to the workers by the management before they are allowed to work in the electrical sections. The Inspectors will be instructed to advise the managements about this requirement.

15. *Exemptions.*—The number of exemptions granted to factories by the Government and the Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras, during the period under report are as follows :—

16. *Inspections.*—Of the 4,898 factories which were on the registers during the year, 1,802 factories were inspected once, 2,672 factories twice, 197 factories thrice and 45 factories more than three times. One hundred and eighty-two factories were not inspected, of which 160 are factories notified in G.O. No. 4036, Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 13th September 1956. Twenty-two power factories were not inspected by them for want of time. Besides, some of the factories were found closed during their visits on more than one occasion. The Inspectors of Factories have already been instructed to inspect these factories first during the year 1957.

In addition to the above, the Inspectors have made 6,502 Sunday, night and special visits to check up the employment of workers outside the specified hours of work. Seven hundred and eighty-seven unregistered factories were also inspected by the full-time Inspectors and 20 by the Additional Inspectors of

Factories. Officers of other departments have made 2,594 regular inspections. Instructions were given wherever necessary for fencing and guarding dangerous parts of machinery. The total number of inspections and visits made during the year by the full-time Inspectors was 14,419. (Details of the inspections made by the Inspectors are given in Statement XI.)

Check Inspection by the Chief Inspector of Factories.—The Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras, visited 77 factories and check-inspected 66 factories along with the Inspectors of Factories. The Chief Inspector of Factories had also inspected 21 factories in connection with the approval of plans and grant of licences. Twenty-one appeals were also heard by him during the year under review.

17. *Complaints.*—One thousand three hundred and eighty-three complaints were received during the year. They were chiefly in respect of non-payment of wages, dismissals or suspension of workers and failure to grant leave with wages. The details are furnished in Appendix VIII. Enquiries were made and action taken wherever necessary.

18. *Prosecutions.*—The occupiers and managers of 364 factories were prosecuted during the year. The prosecutions were taken up against the managements of factories who were persistently in default. Convictions were obtained against 317 factories involving 342 persons. A sum of Rs. 13,725-8-0 was collected as fines. Three cases ended in acquittal and 2 cases abated in the Court as the accused died. Cases against 42 factories were still pending at the end of the year. Details of prosecutions are given in Statement XII.

19. In the administration of the Factories Act, trends in factory construction, lay-out, improved use of lighting, colour and ventilation have an important bearing on safety and working conditions in factories. One thousand eight hundred and thirteen plans have been received from the occupiers of factories and a review of these plans in general indicate that the occupiers of factories are recognising the value of good ventilation and air conditioning and in addition, the advantages of mechanical ventilation are receiving active consideration. Steady improvement had been recorded in all directions.

Consistent with a strict and reasonable interpretation of the provisions of the Act and having in mind the generally co-operative attitude of the Factory occupiers, it is anticipated that progress effected in the past will be maintained in the future also. Reference is also made in this report to the administration of the benefit provisions contained in the Madras Maternity Benefit Act, the Employment of Children Act, Cotton Ginning and Pressing Factories Act and the Indian Merchandise Marks Act during the year, 1956.

20. *Cost of Living Index Figures.*—The cost of living index figures for Industrial workers in the City of Madras and in five other centres in the State, furnished by the Director of Statistics, Madras, are given in Appendix IX.

21. *The Madras Maternity Benefit Act and Rules.*—The provisions of the Act are applicable to women employed in factories provided they are employed in a factory or factories of the same employer for not less than 240 days within a period of one year immediately preceding the date of notice of confinement. Of the 4,765 factories in commission during the year, 2,183 factories employed women. The average daily number of women employed was 45,840. Two thousand and four hundred claims were made during the year of which 1,559 were paid to women or to their nominees concerned. The total amount of maternity benefits paid was Rs. 94,467-9-0. Details regarding the claims and benefits are furnished in Appendix X. No woman was employed in any factory during the four weeks immediately following the day of confinement. Inspections were made by the full-time Inspectors of Factories and claims and benefits were checked by them. The managers of 16 factories were prosecuted during the year for contravention of the

provisions of the Act. Convictions were obtained in 11 cases, realising a sum of Rs. 120 as fine (Appendix XI).

22. *Employment of Children Act.*—In view of the extension of Factories Act, 1948, to non-power factories employing ten or more persons and in view of the Madras Shops and Establishments Act being made applicable to smaller establishments, the employment of children in the establishments covered by the Employment of Children Act has been effectively checked.

23. *Cotton Ginning and Pressing Factories Act.*—The provisions of section 9 of the Act were generally complied with.

24. *Indian Merchandise Marks Act.*—The provisions of section 12 of the Act were complied with by all the Textile Mills in the State.

25. *Statements.*—Statements I to XIV and Appendices I to XI are appended.

APPENDIX V.

DETAILS OF HOUSING ACCOMMODATION, EDUCATION, CO-OPERATIVE STORES AND OTHER AMENITIES PROVIDED IN FACTORIES DURING THE YEAR, 1956.

*Housing accommodation.**Textiles.*

1. *Tirumagal Mills, Ltd., Gudiyattam.*—The management have provided housing accommodation for about 100 families of their employees.
2. *Mettur Industries, Mettur Dam.*—Seven staff quarters of L.G.C. were remodelled to provide more accommodation to the workers.
A new quarter is being constructed with full convenience in Salem Camp.
3. *Lakshmi Mills, Ltd., Korilpatti.*—The management provided two hundred single storeyed two roomed tenements in addition to the 77 old block houses making a total of 277 tenements for the use of about 500 workers.
4. *Vasanth Mills, Coimbatore.*—Seventy-two houses were built during the year for the use of the workers under the subsidized Industrial Housing Scheme.
5. *Cauvery Spinning and Weaving Mills, Ltd., Pudukkottai.*—The management constructed 5 new houses during the year.
6. *Mahaganapathy Spinning and Weaving Mills, Ltd., Pudukkottai.*—The management provided housing accommodation to some of their workers.

Loans to the extent of one month's salary were given to the workers for purposes of affording financial help, from the sum of Rs. 2,000 allotted for Welfare Fund in times of emergency and hardships like accident, sudden sickness or death of a relative at 3 per cent interest and the interest so accrued was spent towards purchase of books for school children.

APPENDIX.

MEMORANDUM.

Number of factories and their inspections—There were 4,999 factories at the beginning of the year. The number of factories at the end of the year was 4,898 of which 4,765 factories were in Commission.

The total number of inspections and visits made by full time Inspectors during the year was 14,419.

The Commissioner of Labour has reported that 182 factories were not inspected. 22 power factories were not inspected for want of time. The Commissioner of Labour has instructed the Inspectors of Factories to give priority to these factories for inspection during the year 1957.

Plans.—One thousand eight-hundred and thirteen plans were scrutinized by the Chief Inspector of Factories during the year as against 1,595 in the year 1955.

Complaints.—1,383 complaints were received as against 1,366 in the year 1955.

Health.—The health of the workers was generally normal. No epidemics were reported from any of the factories during the year.

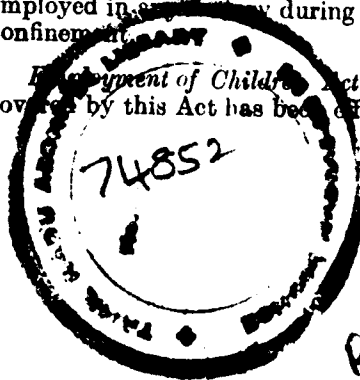
Accidents.—There were 10,530 accidents during the year as against 7,395 in 1955. Of the accidents reported during the year 15 were fatal. The Commissioner of Labour is requested to investigate the reasons, for the short increase in the number of accidents in the year employed to previous years and submit a report to Government.

Prosecutions.—The occupiers and managers of 364 factories, were prosecuted during the year as against 400 in 1955.

Labour Welfare.—In several progressive factories welfare measures like provision of housing accommodation, free education and midday meals to children, co-operative stores and recreational facilities have been undertaken.

Madras Maternity Benefit Act.—The average daily number of women employed in 2,183 factories was 45,840. 2,400 claims were made during the year as against 4,419 in 1955. The total amount of maternity benefits paid was Rs. 94,468 as against Rs. 1,71,790 in 1955. No woman was employed in any factory during the 4 weeks immediately following the day of confinement.

Employment of Children Act.—The employment of children in establishments covered by this Act has been effectively checked.
